NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30. 2013 AND 2012

NATURE OF OPERATIONS

St Claire Regional Medical Center, Inc. (the "Medical Center"), a non-profit organization, was incorporated in 1963 for the purpose of operating a hospital to provide inpatient and outpatient services to residents in Rowan County and northeastern Kentucky. The Medical Center also serves as a regional referral center and provides healthcare services through off campus facilities including primary care, specialty care, home health, hospice, and home medical equipment.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant accounting policies followed by the Medical Center in the preparation of the financial statements are summarized below

Management's Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, if any, and the reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could vary from the estimates that were used

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid assets with maturity dates of 90 days or less when purchased, excluding amounts reported in assets whose use is limited

Patient Accounts Receivable and Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center recognizes net patient service revenues on the accrual basis of accounting in the reporting period in which services are performed based on the current gross charge structure, less actual adjustments and estimated discounts for contractual allowances, principally for patients covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and managed care and other health plans. Gross patient service revenue is recorded in the accounting records using the established rates for the type of service provided to the patient. The Medical Center recognizes an estimated contractual allowance to reduce gross patient charges to the estimated net realizable amount for services rendered based upon previously agreedto rates with a payor The Medical Center utilizes the patient accounting system to calculate contractual allowances on a payor-by-payor basis based on the rates in effect for each primary third-party payor. Another factor that is considered and could further influence the level of the contractual reserves includes the status of accounts receivable balances as inpatient or outpatient. The Medical Center's management continually reviews the contractual estimation process to consider and incorporate updates to laws and regulations and the frequent changes in managed care contractual terms that result from contract renegotiations and renewals

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30. 2013 AND 2012

Payors include federal and state agencies, including Medicare and Medicaid, managed care health plans, commercial insurance companies, employers, and patients. These third-party payors provide payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates based on negotiated reimbursement agreements. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and fee schedule payments. Retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts based on the Medical Center's evaluation of its major payor sources of revenue, the aging of the accounts, historical losses, current economic conditions, and other factors unique to their service area and the healthcare industry Management regularly reviews data about the major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Medical Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulty that make the realization of amounts due unlikely) For receivables associated with self-pay payments, which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill, the Medical Center records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts

The Medical Center's current allowance for doubtful accounts policy is to reserve 90 percent of all self-pay accounts less than 150 days old and include all accounts 150 days old and older, net of contractual allowances already taken. The allowance for doubtful accounts estimate prior to 2012 reserved a lower percentage of self-pay accounts and all accounts 150 days and older. The effect of this change was a decrease in *income* (loss) from operations of approximately \$3,200,000 for 2012.

Inventories

Inventories consist of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals and are valued at the lower-of-cost or market, with cost being determined on the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method

Investments and Assets Whose Use Is Limited

Assets whose use is limited include assets set aside by the Medical Center's Board of Directors for future capital improvements and other long-term uses, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes, assets held by trustees under bond indenture and insurance trust agreements, assets that have been restricted by donors for specific purposes, and amounts that have been set aside as part of deferred compensation plans

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair market value in the balance sheets. Investment income or loss, including realized gains and losses on investments, unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends, is included in nonoperating revenues of unrestricted net assets, unless the income is restricted by donor or law

Other Assets

Other assets consist of notes receivable, bond issue costs, ownership in a joint venture, and prepaid rent expense

Provider notes receivable are in varying amounts maturing through July 2022. If the providers meet the period of service requirement, the Medical Center will forgive the notes

If providers do not meet the period-of-service requirement, the notes are immediately due in full. Interest rates vary from 0 percent to 9 25 percent

Bond issue costs are being amortized over the lives of the bonds. The joint venture investment is being accounted for using the equity method.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2013 AND 2012

Prepaid rent expense represents exclusive rights to approximately 12,750 square feet of space in a health, education, and research facility belonging to Morehead State University The Medical Center received these rights in exchange for donating the land upon which the facility was constructed. The Medical Center recorded this asset at its fair market value and is amortizing the asset based on fair value rental rates for the Medical Center's leased facilities.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost, except for donations, which are recorded at the fair market value at the date of the donation

Property and equipment include expenditures for additions and repairs which substantially increase the useful lives of property and equipment. Maintenance, repairs, and minor improvements are expensed as incurred. All property and equipment other than land and construction in progress are depreciated using the straight-line method with a half year convention over their estimated useful lives based upon the American Hospital Association's *Estimated Useful Lives of Depreciable Hospital Assets*

Reserves for Professional Liability Claims

The reserves for professional liability claims include estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported

Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Medical Center has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose, if any Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Medical Center in perpetuity, if any Unrestricted net assets are remaining net assets that do not meet the definition of temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets

Statements of Operations – Income (Loss) From Operations

For purposes of display, transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major, or central to the provision of healthcare services are reported as operating revenues and expenses and included within the line *income* (*loss*) *from operations* in the statements of operations. Peripheral and incidental transactions are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses and are excluded from *income* (*loss*) *from operations*. Nonoperating revenues and expenses which are excluded from *income* (*loss*) *from operations* include contributions, investment income, and unrealized and realized gain (loss) on sale of investments.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30. 2013 AND 2012

Performance Indicator

The statements of operations include the performance indicator excess revenues (expenses). Consistent with industry practice, changes in net assets which are excluded

from excess revenues (expenses) include, if any, changes in net unrealized gains and losses on non-trading investments, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions by which donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

Charity Care

The Medical Center provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Amounts determined to qualify as charity care are reported as deductions from gross revenue.

Income Taxes

The Medical Center is a not-for-profit corporation and has been recognized as tax-exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code As such, the Medical Center is generally exempt from income taxes. However, the Medical Center is required to file Federal Form 990 – Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax which is an information return only

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Medical Center and recognize a tax liability if the Medical Center has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by various federal and state taxing authorities Management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Medical Center, and has concluded that as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the accompanying financial statements. The Medical Center is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions, however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Risk Management

The Medical Center is exposed to various risks of loss from torts, theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets, business interruption, errors and omissions, employee injuries and illnesses, natural disasters, and employee health and accident benefits. Commercial insurance coverage is purchased for claims arising from such matters. Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the three preceding years.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30. 2013 AND 2012

Subsequent Events

The Medical Center has evaluated events or transactions occurring subsequent to the balance sheet date for recognition and disclosure in the accompanying financial statements through the date the financial statements are issued which is August 21, 2013

Reclassifications

Certain 2012 amounts have been reclassified to provide for consistency with reporting of 2013 information. These reclassifications have no effect on the previously reported change in net assets or total net assets.

Board-Designated Depreciation Reserve Fund

The Medical Center's Board of Directors approved a depreciation reserve fund to meet the capital asset replacement needs of the facility. All income earned by the fund is left to accumulate as an addition to the fund

Trustee-Held Under Insurance Trust

The trustee-held under insurance trust amounts represent assets held under reserve for professional liability claims

Donor-Restricted

The Medical Center received donor-restricted funds designated exclusively for curative treatment and rehabilitative therapy of pediatric illness, disease, or deformity

Deferred Compensation Fund

The deferred compensation fund represents assets that have accumulated under the Medical Center's deferred compensation plan. The Medical Center simply maintains the funds for the participants until they are withdrawn. The Medical Center records a liability equal to the deferred compensation assets.

Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active market for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows.

- Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Medical Center has the ability to access
- Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2013 and 2012.

- Mutual funds Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund Mutual funds held by the Medical Center are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price The mutual funds held by the Medical Center are deemed to be actively traded
- Corporate bonds Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities. This includes basing value on yields currently available on comparable securities of issuers with similar credit ratings.
- Hedge funds Valued at the net asset value (NAV) of units of the fund. The NAV, as provided by the investment manager, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. Due to the nature of the investments held by the fund, changes in market conditions and the economic environment may significantly impact the net asset value of the fund and, consequently, the fair value of the Medical Center's interests in the funds. Although a secondary market exists for these investments, it is not active and individual transactions are typically not observable. When transactions do occur in this limited secondary market, they may occur at discounts to the reported net asset value. It is therefore reasonably possible that if the Medical Center were to sell these investments in the secondary market, a buyer may require a discount to the reported net asset value, and the discount could be significant.
- *U.S. government securities* Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities
- Common stocks Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded
- Interest rate swap agreements Valued using pricing models that are derived principally
 from observable market data based on discounted cash flows and interest rate yield
 curves at quoted intervals for the full term of the swap

The Medical Center's policy is to recognize transfers between levels as of the end of the reporting period. There were no significant transfers between levels 1 and 2 during 2013 and 2012.

Investments in Hedge Funds are recorded at fair value as reported by the Fund's administrator or investment manager, which represents the Fund's *pro rata* interest in the net assets of the Funds, substantially all of which are valued on a mark-to-market basis

Risks and Uncertainties

The national and world-wide investment market conditions continue to be volatile. The Medical Center holds investments in common stocks, mutual funds, hedge funds, corporate bonds, and U.S. Government securities. Such investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit. Due to the level of risk associated with these securities and the level of uncertainty related to changes in value, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the various risk factors will occur in the near term that could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements. The Medical Center's management is currently unable to determine the effect, if any, the decline in the market conditions may ultimately have on the Medical Center's investment portfolio and ability to fund certain projects.

4. OBLIGATIONS UNDER CAPITAL LEASES

The Medical Center is the lessee of certain equipment under capital leases expiring in various fiscal years through 2018. The assets and liabilities under capital leases are initially recorded at the lower of the present value of the minimum lease payments or the fair value of the asset. Amortization of assets held under capital leases is included in depreciation expense and was \$194,389 and \$222,264 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The capital lease obligations carry imputed interest rates and are collateralized by the leased equipment.

Series 2010 A Bonds

In March 2010, the County of Rowan, Kentucky, issued \$6,000,000 of Kentucky Industrial Building Revenue Bonds ("Series 2010 A Bonds"), dated March 22, 2010, on behalf of the Medical Center. The proceeds of the bonds are required to be used for the purchase and installation of medical equipment. The 2010 A Bonds bear interest at a fixed rate of 3.42 percent per annum until March 31, 2015. At March 31, 2015, the interest rate will be reset equal to the Five Year Constant Maturity Treasury Rate as of March 31, 2015, plus 1.94 percent. However, the reset interest rate shall not be less than 4 percent per annum, nor more than 24 percent per annum. The Series 2010 A Bonds mature in April 2017 and require the Medical Center to make quarterly principal and interest payments. The 2010 A Bonds are secured by the Medical Center's pledged gross receipts.

Series 2010 B Bonds

In December 2010, the County of Rowan, Kentucky, issued \$14,000,000 of Kentucky Industrial Building Revenue Bonds ("Series 2010 B Bonds"), dated December 22, 2010, on behalf of the Medical Center The proceeds of the bonds were required to be used for the purchase and construction of buildings and medical equipment. The 2010 B Bonds bear interest at a variable rate (1 43 percent at June 30, 2013), mature in January, 2025, and require the Medical Center to make monthly principal and interest payments. The variable interest rate is equal to the 1M-month London Interbank Offered Rate ("LIBOR"), on the day that is two business days preceding the first calendar day of the month, plus 200 basis points, multiplied by 65 percent, plus 25 basis points. The interest rate shall be adjusted automatically on the first business day of each calendar month. The 2010 B Bonds are secured by the Medical Center's pledged gross receipts. In addition, the Medical Center entered into an interest rate swap with a notional amount that matches the outstanding principal amount of the Series 2010 B Bonds.

Sizemore Note Payable

The Medical Center had a note payable to Wanda and Carl Sizemore, in the original amount of \$100,000. The note was payable in monthly installments of \$1,000, including interest at a fixed rate of 6 percent per annum with a final balloon payment of \$66,115 due July 2013 that was paid for in full in June 2013. The note payable was unsecured

Bayless Note Payable

The Medical Center has a note payable to Joseph and Virginia Bayless, in the original amount of \$240,000. The note is non-interest bearing and is payable in monthly installments of \$2,000 through June 2018. The note payable is unsecured.

Interest Rate Swaps

Objectives and Strategies for Using Derivatives

The Medical Center makes limited use of derivative financial instruments for the purpose of managing rate risk. In particular, the Medical Center uses a forward interest rate swap to manage the risk associated with interest rates on variable rate borrowings and to lower its overall borrowing costs.

The swap agreement effectively changes the Medical Center's interest rate exposure on its 2010 B Bonds to a fixed 3 29 percent. The Medical Center is exposed to credit loss in the event of nonperformance by the counterparty to the interest rate swap agreement. However, the Medical Center does not anticipate nonperformance by the counterparty.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30. 2013 AND 2012

This derivative is not designed as a hedging instrument, and is marked-to-market on the balance sheets at fair value at the end of each fiscal year. The change in fair value of the interest rate swap is included as a component of investment income in nonoperating revenues (expenses), and therefore, is included within the performance indicator on the statements of operations. Cash flows from the interest rate swap agreement are classified as an operating activity on the statements of cash flows.

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

Medicare The Medical Center is a provider of services to patients entitled to coverage under Title XVIII (Medicare) of the Health Insurance Act The Medical Center is reimbursed for Medicare inpatient services based on a fixed price per discharge for each diagnosis related grouping (DRG) and Medicare outpatient services based on a fixed price per clinical unit of service. Differences between the total program billed charges and the payments received are reflected as deductions from revenue. At the Medical Center's year end, a cost report is filled with the Medicare program computing reimbursement amounts related to Medicare patients. The difference between computed reimbursement and interim reimbursement is reflected as a receivable from or payable to the third-party program. The Medical Center's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admissions are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Medical Center.

As of June 30, 2013, the Medical Center's submitted Medicare cost reports have been final settled with the fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2010

• <u>Medicaid</u> The Commonwealth of Kentucky Department for Medicaid Services reimburses the Medical Center for care rendered to Medicaid patients based on a diagnosis related grouping (DRG) payment system for inpatient care. Certain outpatient services related to Medicaid beneficiaries are paid based upon a cost reimbursement methodology. The Medical Center is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports filed by the Medical Center and audits thereof by Medicaid.

As of June 30, 2013, the Medical Center's submitted Medical cost reports have been final settled with the fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2008

The Kentucky General Assembly enacted legislation which established a healthcare provider tax for the purpose of funding the Medicaid program. Historically, the tax on hospitals was 2.5 percent of net patient service revenue received. Long-term care services were taxed at 2 percent. Beginning in 2006, the provider tax was capped at the amount hospitals paid in 2005 – 2006. The Medical Center incurred \$1,520,386 and \$1,512,507 in provider taxes for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2013 AND 2012

- <u>Indigent Care Reimbursements.</u> In addition to the Medicaid cost reimbursement program, the Kentucky 1992 General Assembly created a Medicaid disproportionate share plan for indigent care. The distribution formula for indigent care under the plan gives special consideration to care provided to indigent patients below the federal poverty level, and the percentage of each facility's indigent patient volume to Kentucky's total indigent patient volume. The Medical Center recognized payments under the disproportionate share plan in the amounts of \$2,350,710 and \$1,682,646 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively
- Other. The Medical Center has also entered into preferred provider agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements is a discount from established charges.
- Charity Care and Uninsured Discounts. The Medical Center provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Medical Center does not collect amounts deemed to be charity care, they are not reported as revenue. The estimated costs of providing charity services are based on a calculation which applies a ratio of costs to charges to the gross uncompensated charges associating with providing care to charity patients. The ratio of cost to charges is calculated based on the Medical Center's total operating expenses divided by gross patient service revenue. For the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Medical Center incurred estimated costs of \$5,235,704 and \$5,720,142, respectively.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services ("CMS") has been granted authority to suspend payments, in whole or in part, to Medicare providers if CMS possess reliable information on overpayment, fraud or if willful misrepresentation exists. If CMS suspects payments are being made as the result of fraud or misrepresentation, CMS may suspend payment at any time without providing prior notice to the Medical Center. The initial suspension period is limited to 180 days. However, the payment suspension period can be extended indefinitely if the matter is under investigation by the United States Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General or the United States Department of Justice. Therefore, the Medical Center is unable to predict if or when it may be subject to a suspension of payments by the Medicare and/or Medicaid programs, the possible length of the suspension period, or the potential cash flow impact of a payment suspension. Any such suspension would adversely impact the Medical Center's financial position, results of operations, and cash flows

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Final determination of compliance with such laws and regulations is subject to future government review and interpretation. Violations may result in significant regulatory action including fines, penalties, and exclusions from the Medicare and Medicaid programs. The Medical Center believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

8. RETIREMENT PLANS

The Medical Center has a discretionary, non-matching 401(k) plan Eligible employees can contribute up to 10% of their earnings via payroll deductions, but not to exceed certain Internal Revenue Code limits. The plan does not have a matching component, however, the Medical Center may contribute a discretionary amount to the plan each year. The withheld amounts and Medical Center contributions are deposited into investment accounts held at Transamerica Retirement Services (Transamerica) and employees can direct where the funds are invested. For the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the amount of retirement expense was \$1,948,269 and \$2,607,588, respectively

The Medical Center offers a non-matching 403(b) retirement plan to all eligible employees, which permits them to defer a portion of their salary until future years. The Medical Center incurs no expense related to this plan, as all custodial and investment fees are borne by the plan participants. The Medical Center records no assets or liabilities related to this plan.

The Medical Center offers its employees a deferred compensation plan in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457 The plan, available to all Medical Center eligible employees, permits them to defer a portion of their salary until future years. The deferred compensation is not available to employees until termination, retirement, death, the employee reaching 70 ½ years of age, unforeseeable emergency, or de minimis exception as defined by the plan agreement. All amounts of compensation deferred under the plan, all property and rights purchased with those amounts, and all income attributable to those amounts, property, or rights are (until paid or made available to the employee or other beneficiary) solely the property and rights of the Medical Center (without being restricted to the provisions of benefits under the plan), subject only to the claims of the Medical Center's general creditors Participants' rights under the plans are equal to those of general creditors of the Medical Center in an amount equal to the fair market value of the deferred account for each participant. The Medical Center believes that it is unlikely that it will use the assets to satisfy the claims of general creditors in the future The deferred compensation assets and related liabilities under this plan were \$2,140,323 and \$1,630,041 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

9. INCENTIVE PAYMENTS

The Medical Center receives Electronic Health Records ("EHR") incentive payments under the Medicare and Medicaid programs. To qualify for EHR incentive payments, the Medical Center must meet "meaningful use" criteria that become more stringent over time. The Medical Center periodically submits and attests to its use of certified EHR technology, satisfaction of meaningful use objectives, and various patient data. These submissions generally include performance measures for each annual EHR reporting prior (Federal fiscal year ending September 30th). The related EHR incentive payments are paid out over a four year transition schedule and are based upon data that is captured in the Medical Center's cost reports. The payment calculation is based upon

an initial amount as adjusted for discharges, program utilization using inpatient days multiplied by a factor of total charges excluding charity care to total charges, and a transitional factor that ranges from 100 percent in first payment year and thereby decreasing by 25 percent each payment year until it is completely phased out in the fifth year

The Medical Center recognizes EHR incentive payments as grant income when there is reasonable assurance that the Medical Center will comply with the conditions of the meaningful use objectives and other specific grant requirements. In addition, the financial statement effects of the grants must be both recognizable and measurable. For the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Medical Center recognized \$2,314,962 and \$1,120,431, respectively, in EHR incentive payments as grant income using the cliff recognition method. Under the cliff recognition method, the Medical Center records income at the end of EHR reporting period in which compliance is achieved. EHR incentive payments income is included in other revenue in the statements of operations EHR incentive income recognized is based on management's estimate and amounts are subject to change, with such changes impacting operations in the period the changes occur.

Receipt of these funds is subject to fulfillment of certain obligations by the Medical Center as prescribed by the program, subject to future audits, and may be subject to repayment upon a determination of noncompliance

10. OPERATING LEASES

The Medical Center leases certain equipment and building space under noncancelable operating leases expiring through 2019 Minimum future rental payments under these noncancelable operating leases as of June 30, 2013, are as follows

11. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Medical Center maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts, which at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Medical Center has not experienced any losses on such accounts. The Medical Center believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash.

12. FUNCTIONAL EXPENSES

The Medical Center provides general healthcare services to residents within its geographic area. Expenses related to providing these services are broken down as follows for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012.

The costs of providing the various programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the table above. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. While the methods of allocation are considered appropriate, other methods could produce different results.

13. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Medical Center carries professional and general liability insurance on an occurrence basis to cover losses, if any, within policy limits. In 1987, the Medical Center established an irrevocable trust to provide for professional liability losses in excess of insurance coverage.

The Medical Center is self-insured for the first \$1 million per claim and \$3 million in the aggregate. The Medical Center has obtained commercial insurance coverage in the amount of \$15,000,000 for claims over the self-insured limit.

The Medical Center has been named a defendant in certain litigation. In management's opinion, professional and general liability insurance and insurance trust funding are adequate to cover related losses, if any, from such litigation.

As of June 30, 2013, the Medical Center has signed a capital lease agreement for Omni cell equipment. The installation and implementation of the equipment was not completed by June 30, 2013. The lease agreement calls for monthly payments of \$19,948 beginning in fiscal year 2014 when the equipment is installed and ready for use and continuing for 60 months.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The carrying amount reported in the balance sheets for cash and cash equivalents approximates its fair value based on short maturities of those items

Investments and Assets Whose Use is Limited

These assets are reported in the balance sheets at fair value or cost that approximates fair value. The fair value amounts are based on quoted market prices, if available, or are estimated using quoted market prices for similar securities.

Accounts Payable, Accrued Payroll and Payroll Withholdings, and Accrued Expenses

The carrying amounts reported in the balance sheets for accounts payable, accrued payroll and payroll withholdings, and accrued expenses approximate their fair value based upon short maturities of those items

Estimated Third-Party Payor Settlements

The carrying amount reported in the balance sheets for estimated third-party payor settlements approximates its fair value because they are expected to be settled in the near future

Long-Term Debt, Obligations Under Capital Leases, and Deferred Compensation Liabilities

The carrying amount and fair value reported in the balance sheets for the combined amounts of long-term debt and obligations under capital leases were \$16,503,170 and \$16,649,142, respectively, for 2013 and \$17,945,097 and \$18,081,942, respectively, for 2012 The carrying amount reported in the balance sheets for debt and capital leases approximates fair value based upon the variable nature of the primary debt. The carrying amount reported in the balance sheets for deferred compensation liabilities approximates its fair value.

Reserves for Professional Liability Claims
