Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

Jefferson Hospital Association, Inc. (the Association) provides a wide range of health care services to patients from Jefferson County and surrounding areas in southeast Arkansas. All material intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation. The consolidated financial statements include the following divisions and companies.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Association considers all liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents, other than those classified as assets limited as to use. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, cash equivalents consisted primarily of balances in bank repurchase sweep accounts.

Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are measured at fair value in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Other investments are valued at the lower of cost or fair value. Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income, realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments carried at fair value, and realized gains and losses on other investments.

Assets Limited As To Use

Assets limited as to use include assets set aside by the Board of Directors (the Board) for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Assets limited as to use also include restricted assets held under long-term debt agreements. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Association have been reclassified to current assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at June 30, 2013 and 2012.

Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Association analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for uncollectible accounts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Association analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for uncollectible accounts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payer has not yet paid, or for payers who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely)

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Association records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated or provided by policy) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, there were no significant changes in the underlying assumptions used in estimating the allowance for uncollectible and charity accounts or in the policies regarding uncollectible accounts for charity care

Supplies

Supplies are stated at the lower of cost, determined using the average cost method, or market

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost Depreciation is recorded over the estimated useful life of each asset and is computed using the straight-line method

The estimated useful lives for each major depreciable classification of property and equipment are as follows

Buildings and improvements 10 – 40 years Equipment 3 – 15 years

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings or equipment are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets, and are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor restrictions about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when donated or when acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

Long-lived Asset Impairment

The Association evaluates the recoverability of the carrying value of long-lived assets whenever events or circumstances indicate the carrying amount may not be recoverable If a long-lived asset is tested for recoverability and the undiscounted estimated future cash flows expected to result from the use and eventual disposition of the asset is less than the carrying amount of the asset, the asset cost is adjusted to fair value and an impairment loss is recognized as the amount by which the carrying amount of a long-lived asset exceeds its fair value

No asset impairment was recognized during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012

Deferred Financing Costs

Financing costs incurred in connection with the issuance of Series 2011 Hospital Revenue and Refunding bonds in the amount of \$612,845 are being amortized over the life of the related bonds using the straight-line method which approximates the effective interest method. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, accumulated amortization was \$65,347 and \$22,960, respectively

In addition, unamortized issue costs of \$341,451 related to the refinanced Series 2001 Hospital Revenue Improvement and Refinancing Bonds were included as a component of the loss on bond refinancing on the accompanying consolidated statement of operations for the year ended June 30, 2012

Investment in Affiliates

The investments in affiliates are accounted for using the equity method. Under the equity method the Association recognizes the original investment in the affiliate adjusted by the Association's percentage of the affiliate's profit or loss and any contributions or distributions.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Association has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Association at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates, reimbursed costs, discounted charges and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payers. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and are adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

Charity Care

The Association provides care without charge to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Association does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

Professional Liability Claims

The Association recognizes an accrual for claim liabilities and costs associated with settling claims and a receivable to reflect the estimated insurance recoveries, if any Professional liability claims are described more fully in *Note 15*

Self-insurance

The Association has elected to self-insure certain costs related to employee health and accident benefit programs. Costs resulting from noninsured losses are charged to expense when incurred. The Association has purchased insurance that limits its exposure for individual claims.

Electronic Health Record Incentive Payments

As discussed in *Note 10*, the Association received funds under the Electronic Health Records (EHR) Incentive Program during 2013 and 2012. The Association recognizes revenue ratably over the reporting period starting at the point when management is reasonably assured the Association will meet all meaningful use objectives and when any other specific grant requirements that are applicable are met

Income Taxes

The Association has been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. However, the Association is subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

Jefferson Management Services, Inc. and Jefferson Regional Medical Center Development, Inc. are taxable entities and had no material deferred tax balances at June 30, 2013 and 2012

The Association's majority owned professional limited liability company, Jefferson Surgery Center, P L L C, is treated as a partnership for federal income tax purposes Consequently, federal income taxes are not provided for or payable by Jefferson Surgery Center, P L L C

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

The Association's income tax returns are subject to review and examination by federal, state and local authorities. The Association is not aware of any activities that would jeopardize its tax-exempt status. The Association is not aware of any activities that are subject to tax on unrelated business income or excise or other taxes that are not currently being recognized. The tax returns for tax years 2010 to 2012 are open to examination by federal, local and state authorities.

Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations includes excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments in other-than-trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, contributions and grants of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets), distributions to noncontrolling members of Jefferson Surgery Center, PLLC and purchases and sales of ownership interest in Jefferson Surgery Center, PLLC

Transfers Between Fair Value Hierarchy Levels

Transfers in and out of Level 1 (quoted market prices), Level 2 (other significant observable inputs) and Level 3 (significant unobservable inputs) are recognized on the ending date of the reporting period

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2012 financial statements to conform to the 2013 financial statement presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the change in net assets

Subsequent Events

In preparing these consolidated financial statements, the Association has considered events and transactions that have occurred through October 10, 2013, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were issued

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Association has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Association at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payers follows

- Medicare Inpatient acute care services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per inpatient discharge or outpatient visit. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Inpatient skilled nursing services are paid at prospectively determined per diem rates that are based on the patients' acuity. Certain inpatient non-acute services and defined medical education costs are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Association is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Association and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor. The Association's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare administrative contractor through June 30, 2009. Estimated amounts due to Medicare for settlement of annual cost reports is included in accrued expenses and other current liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.
- Medicaid Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology, subject to certain cost limitations. The Association is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Association and audits thereof by the Medicaid administrative contractor. Outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid based on defined allowable charges. The Association's Medicaid cost reports have been audited by the Medicaid administrative contractor through June 30, 2007. Estimated amounts due to Medicaid for settlement of annual cost reports is included in accrued expenses and other current liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

The Association receives supplemental Medicaid funds under the Arkansas Medicaid programs' Upper Payment Limit (UPL) provisions. Total funds awarded under this program were \$1,141,024 and \$1,232,575 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, which is included in net patient service revenue on the accompanying consolidated statement of operations. Amounts due to the Association under this program are included in other receivables in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

The Association participates in the provider assessment program as a part of the Arkansas State Medicaid Plan. This program assesses a fee of no more than 1% on the net patient service revenue of private hospitals and allocates the proceeds to supplement Medicaid payments. The federal government matches the assessment amount at a rate of approximately 3 to 1 and these amounts are allocated to private hospitals in Arkansas based on each hospital's share of the total of these hospitals' Medicaid discharges and outpatient Medicaid payments. Based on its status as a private hospital, the Association participates in this program and records the assessed fees and the supplemental payments as expenses and net patient service revenues in the period incurred or earned, respectively. Amounts recorded for expected assessment payments under this program for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, were approximately \$2,652,000 and \$2,443,000, respectively. Amounts recorded for expected receipts under this program for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, were approximately \$9,537,000 and \$8,908,000, respectively.

Assessment payments are reflected in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations as a component of other operating expenses and the assessment receipts are reflected in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations as a component of net patient service revenue. Amounts due to the Association under this program are included in other receivables in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

 Other – The Association has also entered into payment agreements with Blue Cross and Blue Shield and other commercial insurance carriers. The basis for reimbursement under these agreements includes discounts from established charges and prospectively determined rates.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term

Bank Balances

During the normal course of business, the Association maintains deposits in various financial institutions that exceed federally insured limits. At June 30, 2013, the Association's cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$300,000 Certain cash balances are routinely invested in overnight repurchase agreements that are not covered by FDIC insurance programs

The repurchase agreements are collateralized by securities held by the Association's financial institution in the Association's name. The securities purchased pursuant to the repurchase agreements must be direct obligations of the U.S. government or obligations fully guaranteed as to principal and interest by the U.S. government or agency

Management continually reviews its investment portfolio and evaluates whether declines in the fair value of securities should be considered other than temporary. Factored into this evaluation are the general market conditions, the issuer's financial condition and near term prospects, conditions in the issuer's industry, the recommendation of advisors and the length of time and extent to which the market value has been less than cost

Total unrealized losses at June 30, 2013 and 2012, amounted to approximately \$855,000 and \$1,157,000, respectively. Of these amounts, at June 30, 2013 and 2012, approximately \$0 and \$232,000, respectively, are related to unrealized loss positions determined to have experienced impairment in fair value and are therefore recorded as other-than-temporary declines in fair value of investments

At June 30, 2013, total unrealized losses of approximately \$855,000 are expected to be recovered in future periods as the Association has the intent and ability to hold these investments until further market recovery occurs

Physician Loan Agreements

Physician loan agreements consist of amounts advanced or loaned to certain physicians that are either being paid back or amortized as certain criteria are met. Amounts forgiven under the physician recruitment agreements were approximately \$221,000 and \$632,000 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Note Receivable - Sale of Fixed Assets

During fiscal year 2008, the Association sold certain fixed assets to an unrelated company in exchange for a note receivable of \$6,200,000 calling for certain principal and interest payments. The original agreement was extended a number of times as the debtor sought alternative financing.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

During the year ended June 30, 2011, an agreement was reached regarding settlement of the remaining debt for \$5,000,000 to cancel the note. During the year ended June 30, 2012, the debtor obtained alternative financing and, as a result, the Association received a cash payment of \$4,809,000 and approximately \$191,000 was placed in escrow, pending resolution of certain mortgage liens. In addition, other components of the debtor's indebtedness to the Association remain outstanding. Collectability, of the remaining debt under a continuing indebtedness agreement, net of unrecognized deferred gain on the sale of assets, is not reasonably assured, and an offsetting allowance has been recorded

The original sale in fiscal 2008 resulted in a gain of \$1,948,896. This gain was recorded as deferred gain on sale of fixed assets, and is being recognized as income as principal payments under the note agreement and subsequent agreements are received. For the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, approximately \$22,000 and \$805,000, respectively, was recognized.

Note Receivable - Construction Funding

Effective November 1, 2006, the Association entered into a note receivable agreement with an unrelated party to provide funding for the construction of an assisted living facility. The terms of the note call for 480 monthly principal and interest payments of \$7,747 at an annual rate of interest of 6 25%. Total interest income earned from the note receivable was approximately \$82,000 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The note is secured by real and personal property.

Refinancing Transaction

During the year ended June 30, 2012, the Association refinanced the Series 2001 Hospital Revenue Improvement and Refinancing Bonds with the proceeds from the issuance of Series 2011 bonds. The refinancing transaction resulted in a loss of \$422,030 due to the write-off of remaining unamortized deferred finance costs and discount related to issuance of the Series 2001 bonds.

Restrictive Covenants

Under the Series 2011 Bonds, the Association must meet certain operational and performance covenants and is limited in the amount of additional debt which can be incurred. Management believes the Association was in compliance with all debt covenants as of June 30, 2013 and 2012.

Optional Redemption

All of the Series 2011 Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Association's option on any interest payment date on or after December 1, 2019, at a redemption price of par plus accrued interest to the redemption date

Legal Ownership

The legal ownership of the Association premises is held by Jefferson County, Arkansas However, the cost of the premises is reflected on the accompanying consolidated financial statements in that the premises are leased to Jefferson Hospital Association, Inc. under a lease agreement expiring December 11, 2040. During the term of the lease, the Association is obligated to operate a general hospital for the residents of Jefferson County, have nonprofit status, establish a schedule of charges, admit patients, maintain the hospital and equipment and insure the facility. The payments required by the lease are in an amount required to pay for the cost of construction and debt retirement over the term of the lease. These payments are recorded as payments against indebtedness of the Association related to construction cost. This debt is also reflected on the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Under the terms of the Bond Indenture, all rights, title and interest of Jefferson County in the lease, including Jefferson County's right to receive payments of rent there under, is assigned to the Trustee to secure the repayment of the Series 2011 Bonds.

Software and Implementation Agreement

During the year ended June 30, 2010, the Association entered into an agreement with a software company to receive a suite of various integrated software products, related implementation services and maintenance provided to the Association at a cost lower than market value. In consideration, the Association has agreed to showcase the products to the software company's prospective customers. The agreement provides for specified minimum visits, calls and other related promotional performance for a term of seven years, ending September 29, 2016.

The value of software and services received through June 30, 2013 and 2012, in excess of payments made was \$2,006,159 Revenue recognized related to assets put into service during the year ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, was approximately \$368,000 and \$323,000, respectively, and is recognized as a capital contribution, which is a component of the changes in unrestricted net assets

Medical Equipment Agreement

During the year ended June 30, 2012, the Association entered into an agreement with a supplier under which it received medical equipment at no cost in exchange for a multiple year purchase commitment, see *Note 15* In consideration, the Association agreed to purchase related medical supplies used with the equipment from the supplier for a period of seven years, ending in April 30, 2019

The fair value of equipment and associated licensing received under the agreement is \$1,640,000, which was recorded as a deferred gain. The deferred gain is being recognized related to this agreement over the seven year purchase commitment period and, as a result, during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, approximately \$241,000 and \$40,000 was recognized, respectively

Note 10: Electronic Health Record Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Record (EHR) incentive program was enacted as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) and the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health (HITECH) Act. These Acts provided for incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified EHR technology. The incentive payments are made based on a statutory formula and are contingent on the Association continuing to meet the escalating meaningful use criteria.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

For the first payment year, the Association must attest, subject to an audit, that it met the meaningful use criteria for a continuous 90-day period. For the subsequent payment years, the Association must demonstrate meaningful use for the entire year. The incentive payments are generally made over a four year period. For hospitals that do not start receiving meaningful use payments until federal fiscal year 2014 or 2015, the base payment amount will reduce in subsequent years by $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{3}{4}$

The Association demonstrated meaningful use to the Stage 1 criteria for the initial 90-day reporting period during the year ended June 30, 2011. In addition, the Association demonstrated meaningful use criteria for the second payment year during 2012 and believes they are reasonably assured of meeting the meaningful use criteria for the third payment year and have elected to ratably recognize revenue during the year ended June 30, 2013, for payments expected after October 2013. As a result, the total of EHR incentive revenue recognized for both Medicare and Medicaid amounted to approximately \$1,572,000 and \$2,197,000. These amounts are included as other operating revenues in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

The final amount of these payments will be determined based on information from the Association's Medicare cost reports and audits thereof by the fiscal intermediary Events could occur that would cause the final payments to differ materially upon final settlement

Note 11: Defined Contribution Pension Plans

401(k) Contribution Plan

The Association has established a 401(k) retirement savings plan that permits eligible employees to contribute through salary deferral elections. Employee rollover contributions are also permitted under the plan. The Association makes matching contributions of 25% of employees' salary deferral amounts up to 6% of eligible compensation. In addition, the Association makes fixed contributions of 3% of eligible compensation, as well as certain discretionary contributions, which were approximately 1.2% and 1.5% of eligible compensation during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Contributions are subject to certain limitations. Forfeitures are used to offset the Association's cost under the plan. Total pension plan expense for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, was approximately \$2,516,000 and \$2,703,000, respectively

403(b) Contribution Plan

The Association also sponsors a tax deferred annuity plan (TDA or 403(b)) which allows employees to make pretax salary contributions in addition to their contributions to the 401(k) retirement savings plan, subject to certain legal limits. There was no match or other contribution to the TDA plan by the Association for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012.

457(b) Contribution Plan

The Association has a deferred compensation plan under which eligible employees receive payments of deferred compensation on retirement or severance from employment. The employee withholdings are invested in self-directed investments that are held in the Association's name. An investment in self-directed investments and a related liability are reflected on the Association's consolidated financial statements in the amounts of \$836,849 and \$736,257 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Note 12: Uncompensated Care

In support of its mission, the Association voluntarily provides care to patients that meet the Association's charity care criteria. Because the Association does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported in net patient service revenue. The Association's criteria is based on federal poverty guidelines and uses patients' income information to determine amounts of free or discounted care on a tiered scale. Primarily, this information is obtained from patients through an application process, but the Association also utilizes presumptive data to make assessments of patients' ability to pay in order to qualify individuals under the policy

Charges excluded from revenue under the Association's charity care policy were approximately \$71,231,000 and \$64,337,000 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Included in these amounts are gross charges of \$7,398,000 and \$10,353,000 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, from accounts previously considered to be uncollectible and written-off or reserved in provision for bad debts in a prior fiscal year. These patient accounts were subsequently qualified for charity care under the Association's financial assistance policy during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, causing a reclassification from current bad debt expense with an increase to the amount of charges excluded from gross revenue for charity care.

In addition, the Association provides services to other medically indigent patients under certain government-reimbursed public aid programs. Such programs pay providers amounts which are less than established charges for the services provided to the recipients and many times the payments are less than the cost of rendering the services provided.

Note 15: Significant Estimates, Concentrations and Commitments

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require disclosure of certain significant estimates and current vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations. Those matters include the following

Allowance for Net Patient Service Revenue Adjustments

Estimates of allowances for adjustments included in net patient service revenue are described in *Notes 1* and 2

Investments

The Association invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

General and Professional Liability Insurance Coverage and Claims

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require a health care provider to accrue the expense of its share of professional liability claim costs, if any, for any reported and unreported incidents of potential improper professional service occurring during the year by estimating the probable ultimate costs of the incidents. The Association relies on the doctrine of charitable immunity, which states that charitable, not-for-profit organizations are immune from liability for damages in tort, except to the extent that they may be covered by liability insurance

The Association has purchased commercial insurance coverage for general and professional liability claims under a claims-made policy on a fixed premium basis for claims not to exceed an individual limit of \$250,000 and an aggregate limit of \$750,000 annually (less applicable deductibles)

The Association records estimates of amounts in its financial statements to reflect the anticipated settlement of claims against it that is recorded as a component of other long-term liabilities less any current portion recorded as a component of accrued expenses and other current liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. It is reasonably possible that this estimate could change materially in the near term

Health Insurance

The Association maintains a self-funded health insurance plan that is administered by a third-party administrator. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Association has estimated a liability of approximately \$2,009,000 and \$2,510,000 for incurred but unpaid claims, respectively

The Association has recognized approximately \$6,947,000 and \$6,055,000 in total employer health insurance expense for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Workers' Compensation

The Association maintains a self-funded workers' compensation insurance plan that is administered by a third-party administrator that recommends current funding under the plan. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Association has estimated a liability of approximately \$92,000 and \$165,000 for incurred but unpaid claims, respectively. The Association has recognized approximately \$101,000 and \$244,000 in total workers' compensation insurance expense for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Association is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Association's insurance program (discussed elsewhere in these notes), for example, allegations regarding performance of contracts. The Association evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

Healthcare Legislations and Regulation

The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government healthcare program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Over recent years, government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by healthcare providers. Violation of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government healthcare programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed.

Management believes that the Association is in substantial compliance with fraud and abuse regulations, as well as other applicable government laws and regulations. While no regulatory inquiries have been made, compliance with such laws and regulations is subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time.

Supply Purchase Commitment

As discussed in *Note 9*, the Association has committed to purchase medical supplies from a supplier for a period of seven years, ending in April 30, 2019, in exchange for ownership of certain medical equipment at no cost Estimated purchase commitments under this agreement are as of June 30, 2013, are as follows

Asset Retirement Obligation

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that an asset retirement obligation (ARO) associated with the retirement of a tangible long-lived asset be recognized as a liability in the period in which it is incurred or becomes determinable (as defined by the standard) even when the timing and/or method of settlement may be conditional on a future event. The Association's hospital facility contains asbestos and other potential materials that will likely require special handling and disposition in the future. An ARO liability has not been recorded as such a liability has not been deemed determinable based on existing information.

Health Care Reform

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) will substantially reform the United States health care system. The legislation impacts multiple aspects of the health care system, including many provisions that change payments from Medicare, Medicaid and insurance companies. Starting in 2014, the legislation requires the establishment of health insurance exchanges, which will provide individuals without employer provided health care coverage the opportunity to purchase insurance. It is possible that some employers currently offering insurance to employees will opt to have employees seek insurance coverage through the insurance exchanges. The reimbursement rates paid by insurers participating in the insurance exchanges may be substantially different than rates paid under current health insurance products. Another significant component of the PPACA is the expansion of the Medicaid program to a wide range of newly eligible individuals. In anticipation of this expansion, payments under certain existing programs, such as Medicare disproportionate share, will be substantially decreased. Each state's participation in an expanded Medicaid program is optional.

The state of Arkansas is participating in the Medicaid expansion program through the use of private insurance exchanges

The PPACA is extremely complex and may be difficult for the federal government and each state to implement. While the overall impact of the PPACA cannot currently be estimated, it is possible that it will have a negative impact on the Association's net patient service revenue. Additionally, it is possible that the Association will experience payment delays and other operational challenges during PPACA's implementation.

Note 16: Disclosures About Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value.

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity and are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities



Summary Conclusions of the CHNA, Goals & Objectives, and Implementation Strategies

A number of community health needs were identified as a part of the community health needs assessment. An attempt has been made to list such in a prioritized manner

- 1 Availability and access to both primary care and specialty physicians
 - Analysis and qualitative input from the community groups indicated this was a critical need for the community
 - b JRMC intends on meeting these community health needs by
 - 1 Continuing to financially support the UAMS-AHEC Family Practice residency program at JRMC <u>and</u> working directly with residents to encourage them to locate and practice throughout Southeast Arkansas (by offering financial incentives, practice management and support, etc.)
 - Devote sufficient resources to identify, recruit and retain a sufficient number of specialists to provide care for Southeast Arkansas JRMC will follow the medical manpower plan developed and recruit physicians based on that analysis for the foreseeable future
 - Work with UAMS and explore the utilization of telemedicine throughout SEARK for specialty services and consultation not otherwise available
 - Where an insufficient number of primary care physicians exists, recruit APNs and PAs to provide primary care and support for Southeast Arkansas
 - v Develop networks throughout Southeast Arkansas to ensure coordination of care
 - vi Continue the implementation and deployment of electronic health record, exchange, and other technologies to aid with efficiency and availability of health information
 - vii JRMC will make efforts to develop specialty physician clinics in the outlying areas of Southeast Arkansas, thus providing specialty care closer to residents' homes
- 2 Healthcare workforce development (recruitment, education, training, retention and retooling) to ensure a sufficient number, and appropriately skilled and qualified, workforce is available to care for the residents of Southeast Arkansas
 - a Studies for UAMS projected significant workforce shortages throughout the State
 - b JRMC analysis and community groups identified certain disciplines, that in the short-term, may present significant challenges
 - c JRMC will continue to support and operate the Jefferson School of Nursing to add to the supply of nursing

- d. JRMC will continue to provide site support for clinical rotations for UAPB, UAM, SEARK, and other nursing programs
- e JRMC will work with several BSN programs to develop a diploma to BS path
- f JRMC will continue to serve as rotation site for SEARK and other teaching/ training programs in fields such as radiology, respiratory therapy, medical laboratory, etc
- g. JRMC will continue to provide tuition reimbursement for employees that elect to further their education and training
- 3 Availability of emergency services, including trauma, for residents of Southeast Arkansas
 - a Presently, JRMC is designated as a Level II Trauma Center
 - b. Emergency and trauma services were identified by the community groups as a critical service which JRMC must continue to provide
 - c JRMC incurs considerable cost in securing physician specialty coverage and support systems to provide Level II Trauma services and will continue to devote its resources to provide such services. While no level can be guaranteed, JRMC will make all reasonable attempts to maintain its Level II status and service level.
 - d. JRMC has established transfer and referral agreements with all critical access hospitals in Southeast Arkansas Likewise, JRMC has cooperative agreements with all EMS providers JRMC's Emergency Department Medical Director serves as a medical director for EMS providers JRMC will continue to encourage these cooperative arrangements
- 4 Availability of surgical services
 - a Surgical services is made up of facilities, equipment, technologies, physician specialists, and trained staff.
 - b. As indicated in the above manpower reference, having enough appropriately trained physician specialists will be a top priority, thus adding to the need to have robust surgical services available for Southeast Arkansas
 - c JRMC will continue to invest in the latest technologies to provide surgical services that are appropriately provided by a hospital the size and scope of JRMC
 - d. JRMC will continue to provide inpatient and outpatient facilities No need was identified for more or different facilities. The largest need was in the area of surgeon availability.
 - e JRMC will make efforts to develop specialty clinics in the outlying areas where pre-surgical assessments/workups and post-surgical care can be provided closer to home
- 5 Availability of advanced diagnostic and ancillary services
 - a JRMC currently provides advanced radiologic diagnostic services in three locations. No need was identified for additional diagnostic facilities. Rather community groups sought to ensure JRMC continued to operate existing facilities
- 6 Education, prevention, and general medical care for stroke and heart disease, including education and training on prevention and/or self-management of high cholesterol and high blood pressure Reduce mortalities as a result of heart disease
 - a The availability of primary care and specialty physicians is one of the larger hurdles to meeting the need of caring for stoke and heart disease. As indicated above in the top priority, JRMC will devote appropriate resources to recruiting and retaining primary care and specialty physicians.
 - b. JRMC will develop or partner with other healthcare providers to add to the current offering of education on prevention and/or self-management
 - c JRMC will continue to offer employer workplace screenings and outreach

- d JRMC will continue to offer education in the schools and churches
- 7 Education, prevention, self-management and general medical care for diabetes, with the goal of reducing complications and mortality rates
 - a JRMC currently provides education to diabetic patients and families on nutrition, exercise, medications, and self-management for free JRMC will continue to provide these programs.
 - b JRMC will look to expand these educational offerings
- 8 Education and prevention of obesity Increase nutritional knowledge and selfmanagement of weight
 - a JRMC currently operates two wellness centers in the Southeast Arkansas service area Discounts are provided to employer groups Group classes and individual instruction are offered
 - b JRMC will continue to provide wellness and fitness programs through its current wellness centers
 - c Exercise facilities were identified in the areas for those unable to pay
- 9 Increase knowledge of, and assistance with, self-management of chronic diseases with the goal of reducing health issues, complications and mortalities related to such chronic diseases
 - a Self-management of chronic diseases is an area that will require partnerships with physicians and other healthcare providers and JRMC
 - b JRMC has identified needs in hypertension, diabetes, and kidney failure
 - c JRMC will expand the role of its case management department to assist with coordination of care of post acute care episodes with primary care and specialty physicians
 - d JRMC will work with local home health agencies to ensure education and assistance is available and provided in the home
 - e JRMC will continue to provide health fairs and outreach programs to local businesses, churches and the general public
- 10 Increase education of youth regarding sexually transmitted diseases with the expressed desire to reduce the incidence and occurrence of STD
 - a Presently, this need is outside the scope of JRMC
 - b Other organizations, including the Department of Health, schools and other healthcare organizations have taken on the responsibility of education and prevention

In an economically depressed area such as Southeast Arkansas, the importance of making available and providing long-term inpatient and outpatient regional referral, acute care, and hospital services should not be overlooked. Given the socioeconomic challenges, levels of poverty, high-uninsured levels, etc., providing tertiary specialty care is a major community health benefit. This has not been highlighted as a "need" due to the existence of JRMC. However, given the challenges facing hospitals and in particular the economics of Southeast Arkansas, a number one priority of JRMC should be to ensure acute, hospital inpatient and outpatient services continue to be available to the residents of Southeast Arkansas
