Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

Duncan Regional Hospital, Inc. (the Hospital) is located in Duncan, Oklahoma. The Hospital is licensed to operate 132 acute care, 16 skilled nursing and 19 rehabilitation beds. The Hospital primarily earns revenues by providing inpatient, outpatient, emergency, skilled nursing, rehabilitation and home health care services to patients in Stephens County, Oklahoma.

Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital, Solutions Physician Practice Management, L L C (Solutions), Advanced Medical Supply, L L C (AMS), DRH Imaging, LLC (Imaging), and Duncan Healthcare Realty, LLC (Realty).

Solutions is a wholly owned taxable subsidiary of the Hospital. Solutions provides physician practice management services as well as operates physician clinics in Stephens County.

AMS is a wholly owned taxable subsidiary of the Hospital. AMS operates a durable medical equipment company in the Duncan, Oklahoma, area.

The Hospital owns a majority interest in Imaging, which was developed to provide outpatient radiology and imaging services for the residents of southwest Oklahoma.

The Hospital owns a minority interest in Realty. However, the Hospital maintains control of Realty and, therefore, continues to include Realty in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Realty was developed to construct and own a building to house the operations of Imaging.

The other members' interest in Imaging and Realty is accounted for as noncontrolling interest in the Hospital's consolidated financial statements. All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Noncontrolling Interest

Noncontrolling interest represents the other members' interest in Imaging and Realty owned by outside investors. Effective July 1, 2010, the Hospital adopted the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958-810-45, *Not-for-Profit Entities - Mergers and Acquisitions*. Upon adoption, minority interest previously presented in the mezzanine section of the balance sheet has been retrospectively reclassified as noncontrolling interest within net assets. In addition, the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets have been retrospectively revised to include the changes in net assets attributable to the noncontrolling interest. Beginning July 1, 2010, losses attributable to the noncontrolling interest will be allocated to the noncontrolling interest even if the carrying amount of the noncontrolling interest is reduced below zero. Any changes in ownership after July 1, 2010, that do not result in a loss of control will be prospectively accounted for as net asset transactions.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Hospital considers all liquid investments, other than those limited as to use, with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market accounts with brokers.

At June 30, 2013, the Hospital's and consolidated entities' cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$4,301,000.

Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are carried at fair value. The investment in equity investees is reported on the equity method of accounting. Other investments are valued at the lower of cost (or fair value at time of donation, if acquired by contribution) or fair value. Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income, realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments carried at fair value, and realized and unrealized gains and losses on other investments. Investment return that is initially restricted by donor stipulation and for which the restriction will be satisfied in the same year is included in unrestricted net assets.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include 1) assets held by trustee and 2) assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements and health insurance payments over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Hospital are included in current assets.

Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payer has not yet paid, or for payers who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely).

For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which include both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated or provided by policy) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

In 2013, the Hospital's allowance for doubtful accounts decreased by 16% primarily due to a decrease in overall gross patient accounts receivable of approximately \$10,720,000 or 23% at June 30, 2013, compared to June 30, 2012.

Supplies

Supply inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method, or market

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost and are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of each asset

The estimated useful lives for each major depreciable classification of property and equipment are as follows

Land improvements	10–25 years
Buildings and improvements	5–40 years
Fixed equipment	5–20 years
Major moveable equipment	3–15 years

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair market value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

Deferred Financing Costs

Deferred financing costs represent costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt. Such costs are being amortized over the term of the respective debt using the straight-line method and are included in other assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Interest in Net Assets of DRH Health Foundation

DRH Health Foundation (the Foundation) and the Hospital are financially interrelated organizations. The Foundation seeks private support for and holds net assets on behalf of the Hospital. The Hospital accounts for its interest in the net assets of the Foundation (the Interest) in a manner similar to the equity method. Changes in the Interest are included in change in net assets. Transfers of assets between the Foundation and the Hospital are recognized as increases or decreases in the Interest.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital had no permanently restricted net assets.

Goodwill

In 2007, the Hospital acquired a majority ownership in Advanced Medical Supply, LLC (AMS), a durable medical equipment company based in Duncan, Oklahoma, for a total cost of \$996,000, which was paid in cash. Goodwill of approximately \$790,000 was recognized as part of this transaction and, through June 30, 2010, was being amortized over five years. In 2011, the Hospital acquired the remaining ownership interest in AMS for a total cost of approximately \$1,691,000, which was paid in cash. Goodwill of approximately \$1,267,000 was recognized as part of this 2011 transaction. Other assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at June 30, 2013 and 2012, include approximately \$1,583,000 of goodwill, net of amortization.

Effective July 1, 2010, goodwill is tested annually for impairment. If the implied fair value of goodwill is lower than its carrying amount, a goodwill impairment is indicated and goodwill is written down to its implied fair value. Subsequent increases in goodwill value are not recognized in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. No impairment was recognized in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known.

Charity Care

The Hospital provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

Contributions

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are accrued at estimated fair value at the date each promise is received. Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions. Conditional contributions are reported as liabilities until the condition is eliminated or the contributed assets are returned to the donor.

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Excess of Revenues over Expenses

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets)

Income Taxes

The Hospital has been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. However, the Hospital is subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

AMS, Solutions, Imaging and Realty members elected to have each company's income taxed as a partnership under provisions of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar section of the state income tax law. Therefore, taxable income or loss is reported to the individual members for inclusion in their respective tax returns and no provision for federal and state income taxes is included in these statements.

The Hospital, AMS, Solutions, Imaging and Realty file tax returns in the U.S. federal jurisdiction. With a few exceptions, these entities are no longer subject to U.S. federal or state examinations by tax authorities for years before 2010.

Transfers Between Fair Value Hierarchy Levels

Transfers in and out of Level 1 (quoted market prices), Level 2 (other significant observable inputs) and Level 3 (significant unobservable inputs) are recognized on the period ending date.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of the Independent Auditor's Report, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Records Incentive Program, enacted as part of the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009*, provides for one-time incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health records technology (EHR). Payments under the Medicare program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula. Payments under the Medicaid program are generally made for up to four years based upon a statutory formula, as determined by the state, which is approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). Payment under both programs are contingent on the Hospital continuing to meet escalating meaningful use criteria and any other specific requirements that are applicable for the reporting period. The final amount for any payment year is determined based upon an audit by the administrative contractor. Events could occur that would cause the final amounts to differ materially from the initial payments under the program.

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The Hospital recognizes revenue ratably over the reporting period starting at the point when management is reasonably assured it will meet all of the meaningful use objectives and any other specific grant requirements applicable for the reporting period

In 2012, the Hospital completed the first-year requirements under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs. The Hospital plans to complete the second-year requirements during 2014. During 2013 and 2012, the Hospital had recorded revenue of approximately \$1,268,000 and \$1,737,000, respectively, which are included in other revenue within operating revenues in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations

Change in Accounting Principle

In 2012, the Hospital changed its method of presentation and disclosure of patient service revenue, provision for uncollectible accounts and the allowance for doubtful accounts in accordance with Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-07, *Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities*. The major changes associated with ASU 2011-07 are to reclassify the provision for uncollectible accounts to a deduction from patient service revenue and to provide enhanced disclosures around the Hospital's policies related to uncollectible accounts. The change had no effect on prior year net income.

Supplemental Hospital Offset Payment Program

On January 17, 2012, CMS approved the State of Oklahoma's Supplemental Hospital Offset Payment Program (SHOPP). The SHOPP program is retroactive back to July 1, 2011, and is currently scheduled to sunset on December 31, 2017. The SHOPP program is designed to assess Oklahoma hospitals a supplemental hospital offset fee which will be placed in pools after receiving federal matching funds. The total fees and matching funds will then be allocated to hospitals as directed by legislation.

The SHOPP revenue is recorded as part of net patient service revenue and the SHOPP assessment fees are recorded as part of other expenses on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations. The amounts noted in the table below for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, represent the approximate annual amounts to be received and paid by the Authority over the term of the SHOPP program.

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Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payer coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Hospital records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. This provision for uncollectible accounts is presented on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations as a component of net patient service revenue.

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. These payment arrangements include:

- **Medicare** – Inpatient acute care services, inpatient skilled nursing services, inpatient rehabilitation services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to patient classification systems that are based on clinical, diagnostic, acuity and other factors. The Hospital is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare administrative contractor through June 30, 2009.
- **Medicaid** – Inpatient services provided to the state's Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed on a prospective per discharge method with no retroactive adjustments. Outpatient services are reimbursed on a fee schedule basis with no retroactive adjustments. These payment rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term.

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

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Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for uncollectible accounts), recognized in the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, was approximately

Note 6: Interest in Net Assets of DRH Health Foundation

DRH Health Foundation (the Foundation) was established in 2005 to solicit contributions principally for funding a portion of the Hospital's capital improvements, debt service and operating expenses. Funds are distributed to the Hospital as determined by the Foundation's Board of Directors. The Hospital's interest in the net assets of the Foundation is accounted for in a manner similar to the equity method. Changes in the interest are included in change in net assets. Transfers of assets between the Foundation and the Hospital are recognized as increases or decreases in the interest in the net assets of the Foundation with corresponding decreases or increases in the assets transferred and have no effect on change in net assets. The Hospital's interest in the net assets of the Foundation is reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets as \$6,823,773 and \$6,046,885 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

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Note 7: Medical Malpractice Claims

The Hospital purchases medical malpractice insurance under a claims-made policy on a fixed premium basis. Under such a policy, only claims made and reported to the insurer are covered during the policy term, regardless of when the incident giving rise to the claim occurred. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require a health care provider to accrue the expense of its share of malpractice claims cost, if any, for any reported and unreported incidents of potential improper professional service occurring during the year by estimating the probable ultimate cost of the incidents. Based upon the Hospital's claims experience, an accrual for medical malpractice claims of approximately \$400,000 had been made as June 30, 2013 and 2012. It is reasonably possible that this estimate could change materially in the near term.

In 2012, the Hospital adopted the provisions of ASU 2010-24, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries*, which eliminates the practice of netting claim liabilities with expected insurance recoveries for balance sheet presentation. Claim liabilities are to be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries and expected recoveries are to be presented separately. Prior to the adoption of ASU 2010-24, accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America required a health care provider to accrue only an estimate of the malpractice claims costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported where the risk of loss had not been transferred to a financially viable insurer. There was no material impact of the ASU adoption to the Hospital's financial statements.

- (A) Series 2003A Hospital Revenue Bonds (2003A Bonds) consist of Hospital Revenue Bonds in the original amount of \$30,000,000 dated December 1, 2003, which bear interest at 2.5% to 5.25%. The 2003A Bonds are payable in annual installments through December 1, 2023. The Hospital is required to make monthly deposits to the debt service fund of approximately \$227,000. All of the 2003A Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after December 1, 2013. The redemption price is 102% decreasing to 100% on or after December 1, 2015.

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The Oklahoma Development Finance Authority (the Authority) issued the 2003A Bonds on behalf of the Hospital . The 2003A Bonds are secured by the net revenues and accounts receivable of the Hospital and the assets restricted under the bond indenture agreement . The 2003A Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Authority

The indenture agreement requires that certain funds be established with the trustee . Accordingly , these funds are included as assets limited as to use held by trustee in the accompanying consolidated financial statements . The indenture agreement also requires the Hospital to comply with certain restrictive covenants, including maintaining minimum insurance coverage, maintaining a maximum annual debt service coverage ratio of at least 1.1 to 1.0 and restrictions on incurrence of additional debt

When the 2003A Bonds were issued, \$14,425,000 was sold at a premium of approximately \$685,000 while the remaining \$15,575,000 was sold at a discount of approximately \$315,000 . The outstanding balance of the 2003A Bonds at June 30, 2013 and 2012, is as follows

- (B) Series 2008 Variable Rate Demand Health Facilities Revenue Bonds (2008 Bonds) consist of Variable Rate Demand Health Facilities Revenue Bonds in the original amount of \$20,000,000 dated October 1, 2008 . Revolving Line of Credit

The Hospital had a revolving line of credit that expires on July 31, 2013, which provides for borrowing up to \$5,000,000. At June 30, 2012, the balance of the line of credit was \$0. The line was collateralized by certain property and equipment.

Note 9: Self-Insured Plans

The Hospital sponsors a health care plan for its employees. This plan is self-insured to the extent of the deductible amounts under the excess risk insurance policies the Hospital has obtained. Accruals for unpaid claims in the amounts of approximately \$790,000 and \$610,000 are included in other accrued expenses in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The Hospital also sponsors a workers' compensation plan that is self-insured to the extent of the deductible amounts under the excess risk insurance policies the Hospital has obtained. Accruals for unpaid claims in the amounts of approximately \$650,000 and \$825,000 are included in other accrued expenses in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Note 10: Charity Care and Other Community Benefits

In support of its mission, the Hospital voluntarily provides free care to patients who lack financial resources and are deemed to be medically indigent. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported in net patient service revenue. In addition, the Hospital provides services to other medically indigent patients under certain government-reimbursed public aid programs. Such programs pay providers amounts which are less than established charges for the services provided to the recipients, and many times the payments are less than the cost of rendering the services provided.

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During the year ended June 30, 2012, the Hospital changed its method of disclosure of charity care in accordance with ASU 2010-23, *Health Care Entities - Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure*. The ASU had no impact on changes in net assets and requires that cost be used as the measurement basis for charity care disclosures.

The cost of charity care is estimated by applying the ratio of cost-to-gross charges from the Hospital's June 30, 2012, Medicare cost report to the gross uncompensated charges. Uncompensated costs relating to these services for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, are summarized below:

In addition to uncompensated charges, the Hospital also commits significant time and resources to endeavors and critical services which meet otherwise unfilled community needs. Many of these activities are sponsored with the knowledge that they will not be self-supporting or financially viable. Such programs include health screening and assessments, prenatal education and care, community educational services and various support groups.

Note 11: Functional Expenses

The Hospital provides health care services primarily to residents within its geographic location, including acute inpatient, emergency care, outpatient diagnostic, skilled nursing, outpatient surgery and home health care. Expenses related to providing these services are summarized as health care services.

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Note 12: Retirement Plans

The Hospital has three retirement plans. Two of the plans are defined contribution retirement plans that cover all full-time employees who have at least one year of service and are age 21 or older. Through December 31, 2008, the Hospital made nondiscretionary contributions equal to 3% of covered wages of eligible employees into one plan. Effective January 1, 2009, the plan was amended to change contributions to a discretionary amount to be determined annually by the Hospital. The other plan allows employees to defer a portion of their compensation into a tax-sheltered annuity program. Through December 31, 2008, for eligible employees, the Hospital could contribute an amount equal to 25% of the employee's contribution to a maximum of 2% of the covered employee's annual compensation. Effective January 1, 2009, the plan was amended to change contributions to a discretionary amount to be determined annually by the Hospital. Retirement expense for all three plans for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, was approximately \$831,000 and \$779,000, respectively.

The Hospital also has a 457(b) deferred compensation plan that covers certain key employees of the Hospital.

Note 14: Investments in Joint Ventures

Cancer Centers of Southwest Oklahoma, LLC

The Hospital is an approximate 26% ownership member of Cancer Centers of Southwest Oklahoma, LLC (CCSO). The Hospital's investment in CCSO amounted to approximately \$1,237,000 and \$1,048,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and is included in other assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. CCSO was formed to develop and operate three facilities specializing in providing cancer treatment services for the residents of southwest Oklahoma.

DRH Imaging, LLC

During 2007, the Hospital became an approximate 80% member of Imaging. Imaging began operations in October 2008. The investment in Imaging by the Hospital is included in the Hospital's accompanying consolidated balance sheets as other assets and was approximately \$0 as of June 30, 2013 and 2012. Imaging is consolidated in the accompanying financial statements, and the investment by the Hospital is eliminated in consolidation.

Duncan Healthcare Realty, LLC

During 2007, the Hospital became an approximate 83% member of Realty. Realty began leasing operations in October 2008 with the start of operations by Imaging. During 2011, the Hospital sold a portion of their units and reduced their ownership interest to approximately 36%. The investment in Realty by the Hospital is included in the Hospital's accompanying consolidated balance sheets as other assets and was approximately \$585,000 and \$703,000 as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Realty is consolidated in the accompanying financial statements, and the investment by the Hospital is eliminated in consolidation.

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Advanced Medical Supply, LLC

During 2007, the Hospital became a 60% member of AMS. During 2011, the Hospital became the sole corporate member by purchasing the remaining 40% of AMS. AMS operates a durable medical equipment company in the Duncan, Oklahoma, area. AMS is consolidated in the accompanying financial statements, and the investment by the Hospital is eliminated in consolidation.

Solutions Physician Practice Management, LLC

During 2008, Solutions was created. Solutions is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Hospital. Solutions acquired the operations and property of a freestanding physician practice in March 2008. Solutions is consolidated in the accompanying financial statements, and the investment by the Hospital is eliminated in consolidation.

Note 15: Disclosures about Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level 1** Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2** Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity and significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies and inputs used for assets measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets as well as the general classification of such assets pursuant to the valuation hierarchy:

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Investments

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, investments are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 investments include money market mutual funds and certain mutual funds, including corporate bond funds, asset-backed securities funds, hedge funds, commodity linked funds, U S government and agencies securities funds, domestic equity funds, foreign equity funds and fixed income funds. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of investments with similar characteristics or discounted cash flows and are classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 2 investments include certain mutual funds, including U S government and agencies securities funds, hedge funds, domestic equity funds and foreign equity funds. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, investments are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy and include limited partnerships, which are valued using the net asset value of shares provided by the partnership.

Investments in limited partnerships (the Partnerships) are valued based on the net asset value of the Partnerships as published or otherwise reported by the Partnerships' administrators, excluding any penalties or early withdrawal fees on investments subject to lockup. The Partnerships in which the Hospital invests generally value investments traded on a national securities exchange or reported on a national market at the last reported sales price on the day of the valuation. The estimated fair value of investments by Partnerships in underlying investment companies, which may include investments that are not readily available, are determined by the underlying investment companies' administrators and may not reflect amounts that could be realized upon immediate sale, nor amounts that may be ultimately realized. Accordingly, the estimated fair values may differ significantly from the values that would have been used had a ready market existed for these investments.

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Level 3 investments consist of the Makena Liquid Endowment Fund (the Fund) which is a limited partnership with a fair value of \$8,224,297 at June 30, 2013. The objective of these investments is to allow the portfolio to achieve superior investment returns with less volatility and risk than conventional portfolios through the use of a multi-manager, multi-strategy investment approach. The redemption frequency of the Fund is quarterly and the redemption notice period is 95 days. Underlying strategies of the investments of the Fund are to invest in a diversified portfolio that includes stocks, bonds and alternative investments including hedge funds.

The following methods were used to estimate the fair value of all other financial instruments recognized in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at amounts other than fair value:

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The carrying amount approximates fair value.

Short-Term Investments and Assets Limited as to Use

These categories include investment securities for which the fair value determination is described above and also includes cash, interest-bearing cash accounts, certificates of deposit and accrued interest receivable for which the carrying amount approximates fair value.

Assets Held by Third Party

This category includes pooled investments held by a community foundation for which the carrying amount approximates fair value.

Interest in Net Assets of DRH Health Foundation

This category includes the net assets of the Foundation, which primarily consists of pooled investments. The carrying value of the net assets approximates fair value.

Long-Term Debt

Fair value is estimated based on recent trading activity and yield rates for the Hospital's Series 2003A Bonds and on borrowing rates currently available to the Hospital for bank loans with similar terms and maturities for all other long-term debt.

Note 16: Significant Estimates and Concentrations

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require disclosure of certain significant estimates and current vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations. Those matters include the following:

Allowance for Net Patient Service Revenue Adjustments

Estimates of allowances for adjustments included in net patient service revenue are described in *Notes 1 and 2*.

Medical Malpractice Claims

Estimates related to the accrual for medical malpractice claims are described in *Note 7*.

Self-Insured Health Care and Workers' Compensation Claims

Estimates related to the accrual for self-insured health care and workers' compensation claims are described in *Note 9*.

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Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Hospital is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Hospital's self-insurance program (discussed elsewhere in these notes) or by commercial insurance, for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The Hospital evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

Investments

The Hospital invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

In partnership with the Stephens County Health department, United Way of Stephens County, and numerous other organizations, Duncan Regional Hospital participated in the Pathways to a Healthy Stephens County committee to complete the Community Health Needs Assessment for Stephens County, Oklahoma, in early 2012. From the data and analysis, the county at large had four key areas of health concern:

1. Healthy living and the lack of exercise opportunities, fruit and vegetable consumption, increasing obesity rate, increasing cardiovascular disease, diabetes, sexual health and the dental health needs of the community.
2. Mental Health/Substance Abuse Services and the lack of trained, qualified, mental health/substance abuse programs and access in Stephens County.
3. Safety/Injury prevention education and opportunities for providing better shelter, safety and options during inclement weather, after tornado effects, safety at local schools and other needs of the community during adverse situations.
4. Prevention, education, and needs of the community around cancer and the need to decrease the number of preventable cancer deaths in our county.

Pathways to a Healthy Stephens County discussed the four areas and selected two (2) main areas of focus for the next three (3) years. Pathways, as a whole, selected to concentrate on the two heaviest areas of concern reported by our citizens: (1) Healthy Living and (2) Mental Health/Substance Abuse.

The Pathways group approved tackling these two areas instead of all four areas so the organizations and community could focus on the two greatest areas of concern. The plan has been to work on our key areas and as momentum increases and the community sees sustainable results, come back to the other two areas for re-evaluation within our county.

The areas identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment that will not be tackled are (3) Safety/Injury prevention and (4) Cancer. While we feel both areas need to be worked on, the limitations available to us as a community and within DRH limit the number of items we can effectively tackle at one time. DRH and the Pathways group both plan to work together in support of these two areas at a later date but cannot effectively manage these within the scope of what is available to us at this time.

As part of the Pathways group, Duncan Regional Hospital has been extremely supportive of taking on the two key areas of citizen concern only. Duncan Regional Hospital has committed resources, both human and financial, meeting space, food, advertising, and numerous other items to the Pathways group in support of programs to improve the two key areas of focus. At this time, DRH is one of the main

partners in the Pathways group and has two of our top executives serving as committee chairs over working task forces over both major areas of focus. Duncan Regional Hospital is committed to working with the Pathways group to help formalize, fund, and monitor results in both major areas for the improvement of health in Stephens County.
