Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

The consolidated financial statements of Trinity Mother Frances Health System and Subsidiaries (the Health System) include the accounts of Trinity Mother Frances Health System (the System) and its wholly owned subsidiaries. Entities included in the consolidated financial statements of the Health System are

- Mother Frances Hospital Regional Health Care Center and Subsidiaries (the Consolidated Hospital Group)
- Trinity Clinic (the Clinic)
- Mother Frances Hospital Jacksonville (Jacksonville)
- Mother Frances Hospital Winnsboro (Winnsboro)
- The Regional Healthcare Alliance (TRHA)
- Tri-State Financial, L L C (Tri-State)
- TrınCare, Inc (TCI)
- HealthPlan of Texas, Inc (HOT)

The sole member organization of the System is the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth, a religious order of the Roman Catholic Church

Mother Frances Hospital Regional Health Care Center (the Hospital) is an acute care facility whose operations consist primarily of inpatient and outpatient acute care medical services to residents of Tyler, Texas, and surrounding areas. Wholly owned subsidiaries included in the consolidated financial statements of the Consolidated Hospital Group include Texas Health Facility. Insurance Corporation, Ltd. (THFIC) and Regional Medical Services Association (RMSA). THFIC is a captive insurance company incorporated in the Cayman Islands for the purpose of providing primary excess professional liability coverage for the Hospital, which is then ceded to a reinsurance company. RMSA is a nonprofit corporation that recruits and employs physicians to serve the Hospital.

The Hospital also owns approximately 50% of HealthSouth Rehabilitation Hospital – Tyler d/b/a/Trinity Mother Frances Rehabilitation Hospital (HealthSouth) Because the Hospital does not exercise control of HealthSouth, this investment is accounted for using the equity method of accounting

The Hospital also owns a 51% interest in Tyler Radiation Equipment Leasing, LLC (TREL), which is also accounted for using the equity method of accounting due to a lack of the Hospital's control

The Health System owns a 50% interest in Champion EMS (Champion), a joint venture with an unrelated medical center to provide ambulance services in northeast Texas. This investment is accounted for under the equity method of accounting. During 2012, the Health System contributed

property and equipment with a net book value of \$815,951 to Champion, which was accounted for as an increase in the investment

The Clinic, a nonprofit corporation, is a multi-specialty physician group organized to own and operate outpatient medical clinics serving residents of Tyler. Texas, and surrounding areas

Jacksonville is a tax-exempt critical access hospital providing services to residents in and around Jacksonville. Texas As a critical access hospital, Jacksonville's acute length of stay may not exceed 96 hours and its total acute care beds cannot exceed 25

Winnsboro is a tax-exempt acute care hospital providing inpatient and outpatient medical and psychiatric services to residents in and around Winnsboro. Texas Winnsboro is also designated as a critical access hospital

TRHA, a nonprofit, taxable corporation, is a preferred provider organization. The System appoints the governing body of TRHA

Tri-State is a taxable limited liability company organized to serve as a collection agency for health care providers. Tri-State is wholly owned by the System. Tri-State is a dormant company as operations ceased in February 2001.

TrinCare, Inc (TCI) is a taxable corporation organized to provide various clinical and management services. TCI is wholly owned by the System. TCI currently operates a reference laboratory which began operations during 2010, and two optical shops which began operations in 2011.

HOT is a taxable, for-profit corporation organized primarily to create new health care resources and health care arrangements to be offered to the general public and third-party payers. HOT was originally licensed to operate as a health maintenance organization in Texas in accordance with Article 20A of the Texas Insurance Code, but was re-licensed as a third-party administrator in December 2005. HOT is wholly owned by the System.

The System holds a nonvoting membership interest in Continue CARE Hospital of Tyler. Inc (CCHT), a long-term acute care hospital. In accordance with the terms of the membership agreement, 80% of the annual cash dividends from CCHT are distributed to the System. During 2013 and 2012, CCHT distributed approximately \$982,000 and \$3,415,000, respectively, in cash dividends under this arrangement, which are recognized as other operating revenues by the System

Principles of Consolidation

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the System, the Consolidated Hospital Group, the Clinic, Jacksonville, Winnsboro, TRHA, Tri-State, TCI and HOT. All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Cash Equivalents

The Health System considers all liquid investments other than those limited as to use, with maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market accounts with brokers

At June 30, 2013, the Health System's cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$579,000

Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are carried at fair value. Other investments, other than those previously disclosed as accounted for using the equity method of accounting, are valued at the lower of cost (or fair value at time of donation, if acquired by contribution) or fair value, if determinable

The Health System also invests in alternative investments, including hedge funds. The fair value of these investments is estimated using the net asset value per share of the investment based on information provided by the investment managers.

Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income, realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments stated at fair value, and realized gains and losses on other investments. Investment return is reflected in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted based upon the existence and nature of any donor or legally imposed restrictions.

Assets Limited As To Use

Assets limited as to use include (1) assets held by trustees under bond indenture agreements. (2) assets set aside by the Board of Directors (the Board) and held by trustees under self-insurance, deferred compensation and supplemental retirement plan trust agreements. (3) assets set aside by the Board for future capital improvements over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Health System are included in current assets.

Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Health System analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and the provision for uncollectible accounts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Health System analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for uncollectible accounts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payer has not yet paid, or for payers who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely)

The Hospital records an automatic discount of its standard charges for uninsured patients. For the remaining receivables associated with self-pay patients, which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill, the Health System records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the reduced standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated or provided by policy) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts

The Health System's allowance for doubtful accounts was approximately 98% of self-pay accounts receivable at June 30, 2013 and 2012. The current year increase in allowance for doubtful accounts is primarily the result of changes in the age and payer mix of accounts receivable at June 30, 2013, as compared to 2012.

Inventories

The Health System states inventories at the lower of cost, determined using the weighted-average cost

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of each asset. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives.

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such

restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service

The Health System capitalizes interest costs as a component of construction in progress, first based on interest costs of borrowing specifically for the project, net of interest earned on investments acquired with the proceeds of the borrowing and then based on the weighted-average interest expense incurred on other funds expended for the project

Long-lived Asset Impairment

The Health System evaluates the recoverability of the carrying value of long-lived assets whenever events or circumstances indicate the carrying amount may not be recoverable. If a long-lived asset is tested for recoverability and the undiscounted estimate future cash flows expected to result from the use and eventual disposition of the asset is less than the carrying amount of the asset, the asset cost is adjusted to fair value and an impairment loss is recognized as the amount by which the carrying amount of long-lived asset exceeds its fair value. No asset impairment was recognized during the year ended June 30, 2013. An asset impairment of approximately \$1,383,000 was recognized during the year ended June 30, 2012, related to a decline in the fair value of certain real estate owned by the Health System.

Interest in Net Assets of the Foundation

The Foundation and the Health System are financially interrelated organizations. The Foundation seeks private support for and holds net assets on behalf of the Health System. The Health System accounts for its interest in the net assets of the Foundation (interest) in a manner similar to the equity method. Changes in the interest are included in change in net assets. Transfers of assets between the Foundation and the Health System are recognized as increases or decreases in the interest.

The Foundation was established to solicit contributions principally to support the operations of the Health System. Funds are distributed to the Health System as determined by the Foundation's Board. The Health System's interest in the net assets of the Foundation is reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets and was \$8,401,035 and \$12,065,376 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Deferred Financing Costs

Deferred financing costs represent costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt Such costs are being amortized over the term of the respective debt using the interest method

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Health System has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. The interest in the net assets of the Foundation includes permanently restricted net assets, which have been restricted by donors to the Foundation to be maintained in perpetuity.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital, the Clinic, Jacksonville and Winnsboro have agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the entities at amounts different from their established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known

Charity Care

The Hospital, the Clinic, Jacksonville and Winnsboro provide care without charge or at amounts less than established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under their charity care policies. Because the Health System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, those amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

Contributions

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are accrued at estimated fair value at the date each promise is received. Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions. Conditional contributions are reported as liabilities until the condition is eliminated or the contributed assets are returned to the donor.

Estimated Malpractice Costs

An annual estimated provision is accrued for the self-insured portion of medical malpractice claims and includes an estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported

Income from Operations

The Health System considers investment income from assets held by trustee under bond indenture agreements and trust accounts established to fund physician deferred compensation agreements as operating income. In addition, the Health System considers earnings from its investment in equity method investments as operating income and considers donations to community service organizations as nonoperating expense. All other investment return is included in nonoperating income.

Income Taxes

The System, the Hospital, RMSA, the Clinic, Jacksonville and Winnsboro have been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and a similar provision of state law. However, these entities are subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

THFIC is not considered to be engaged in a United States trade or business and, therefore, is not subject to United States income taxes. If THFIC were to be considered engaged in a United States trade or business, it could be subject to federal income tax. THFIC is currently exempt from income taxes in the Cayman Islands. Accordingly, no provision for taxes has been made.

With a few exceptions, the Health System is no longer subject to U S $\,$ federal examinations by tax authorities for years before 2010

Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include certain changes in defined benefit pension liabilities, permanent transfers to and from affiliates for other than goods and services and contributions of long-lived assets with no donor restrictions (including assets acquired using contributions, which, by donor restriction, were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets). Contributions of long-lived assets with donor-imposed restrictions that were not met in the same year are included in the change in temporarily restricted net assets

Self-Insurance

The Health System has elected to self-insure certain costs related to employee health and accident benefit programs. Costs resulting from noninsured losses are charged to income when incurred. The Health System has purchased insurance that limits its exposure for individual claims for health insurance and that limits its exposure per claim to \$375,000 for non-physician employees and \$120,000 for physician employees. The Health System has purchased insurance that limits its exposure for individual claims for workers' compensation that limits its exposure per claim to \$500,000.

Transfers Between Fair Value Hierarchy Levels

Transfers in and out of Level 1 (quoted market prices). Level 2 (other significant observable inputs) and Level 3 (significant unobservable inputs) are recognized at the end of the reporting period following the transfer date

Electronic Health Record Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Records Incentive Program, enacted as part of the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009*, provides for one-time incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health records technology (EHR). For hospitals paid under the prospective payment system, payments under the Medicare program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula. Critical access hospitals (CAH) are eligible to receive incentive payments for up to four years under the Medicare program for its reasonable costs of the purchase of certified EHR technology multiplied by the hospital's Medicare utilization plus 20%. limited to 100% of the costs incurred. The Clinic may also receive incentive payments of up to \$44,000 per eligible physician over five years. Payments under the Medicaid program are generally made for up to four years based upon a statutory formula, as determined by the state, which is approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Payments to the Clinic under the Medicaid program are up to \$63,750 per eligible physician over six years. Payment under both programs are contingent on the hospitals and Clinic continuing to meet escalating meaningful use criteria and any other specific requirements that are applicable for the reporting period.

The Health System recognizes revenue using the cliff recognition approach at the point when management is reasonably assured it has met all of the meaningful use objectives and any other specific grant requirements applicable for the reporting period

In 2013, the Health System completed the first-year requirements under the Medicare program In 2012, the Health System completed the first-year requirements under the Medicaid program Approximately \$8,250,000 and \$2,117,000 of revenue has been recorded and included in other revenue within operating revenues in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets. The final amount for any payment year is determined based upon an audit by the fiscal intermediary. Events could occur that would cause the final amounts to differ materially from the initial payments under the program

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2012 financial statements to conform to the 2013 financial statement presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the change in net assets

Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital, the Clinic. Jacksonville and Winnsboro (the System providers) recognize patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the service rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the System providers recognize revenues on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the System providers uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the System providers record a significant provision for uncollectible accounts related to uninsured patients in the period services are provided. This provision for uncollectible accounts is presented on the consolidated statements of operations as a component of net patient service revenue.

The System providers have arrangements with third-party payers that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. These payment arrangements include

• Medicare – Inpatient and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries of the Hospital are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge or occasion of service. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. The Hospital is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports, which are subject to audits by the Medicare administrative contractor.

Jacksonville and Winnsboro have been classified as CAH by the Medicare program As a CAH, payments for inpatient and outpatient services are made based on the reasonable costs of providing care to Medicare program beneficiaries CAH status places certain operating constraints on Jacksonville and Winnsboro, including limitations on patient census and average length of stay

Services to Medicare beneficiaries provided by the Clinic are primarily reimbursed under a fee schedule methodology

• Medicaid – Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a mixture of prospective and cost-based methodologies. Outpatient and physician services are reimbursed under a mixture of cost reimbursement and fee schedule methods. The Hospital, Jacksonville and Winnsboro are reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports, which are subject to audits by the Medicaid administrative contractor.

During 2012, the Health System participated in the state of Texas' private Upper Payment Limit (UPL) program. Under the private UPL program, various governmental agencies made intergovernmental transfers (IGT) on behalf of the Health System. These transfers were used by the state of Texas Medicaid program to draw down federal funding for the Hospital based on its UPL gap, which is approximately equal to the difference in what Medicare would have paid for the Hospital's Medicaid charges and what Medicaid actually paid. During 2013, the Health System's participation in the private UPL program was largely replaced by funding received through the Medicaid section 1115(a) demonstration described below. Total UPL funds received during the year ending June 30, 2012, was approximately \$9,318,000.

The Health System also participates in the state of Texas' disproportionate share (DSH) program. This funding program is also designed to compensate hospitals for the UPL gap described above and is also funded through IGT made by governmental agencies on behalf of the Health System. Total DSH revenue recognized during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 were approximately \$4,607,000 and \$4,907,000, respectively. This funding program has been impacted by the demonstration project discussed in the following paragraph and historical funding received may not be representative of future funding from this program.

On December 12, 2011, the United States Department of Health & Human Services approved a new Medicaid section 1115(a) demonstration entitled "Texas Health Transformation and Quality Improvement Program" This demonstration expands existing Medicaid managed care programs and established two funding pools that will assist providers with uncompensated care costs and promote health system transformation. The demonstration is effective from December 12, 2011 to September 30, 2016. During 2013, the Health System received approximately \$13,575,000 and \$2,301,000 in funding from the uncompensated care funding pool and health system transformation pool, respectively. This funding is subject to recoupment based on future audits of the data used to allocate the funding pools and is not necessarily representative of funding the Health System will receive in future years.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. Settlements under reimbursement agreements with Medicare and Medicaid programs are estimated and recorded in the period the related services are rendered and are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known or as the service years are no longer subject to audit, review or investigation. Annual cost reports required under the Medicare and Medicaid programs are subject to routine audits, which may result in adjustments to the amounts

ultimately determined to be due to the Medical Center under the reimbursement programs. These audits often require several years to reach their final determination of amounts earned under the programs. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term.

The System providers have also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and other plans, which provide for payments at discounted rates, per diem amounts or predetermined amounts per case or encounter

Note 5: Risk Management

The Health System is self-insured for the first \$3,000,000 of each medical malpractice claim. The Health System purchases commercial insurance coverage above the self-insurance limits. Losses from asserted and unasserted claims identified under the Health System's incident reporting system are accrued based on estimates that incorporate the Health System's past experience, as well as other considerations, including the nature of each claim or incident and relevant trend factors. Accrued malpractice losses have been estimated by professional insurance consultants. Claim liabilities are determined without regard for recoveries and presented at gross. Expected recoveries are presented separately. The Health System currently does not estimate any losses will exceed self-insured limits.

The Health System is also self-insured for employee health care and workers' compensation claims. A reserve has been established for unpaid claims and claims incurred, but not received, is reflected in estimated self-insurance costs in the consolidated balance sheets.

A provision is accrued for self-insured claims, including both claims reported and claims incurred but not yet reported. The accrual is estimated based on consideration of prior claims experience, recently settled claims, frequency of claims and other economic and social factors. It is reasonably possible that the Health System's estimate will change by a material amount in the near term

Proceeds of the 2011 Bonds are being used primarily to fund the construction of the Owen Heart Hospital, as well as funding certain other projects and to refinance existing bank debt.

The Corporation issued the 2011 Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The 2011 Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture The 2011 Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation

(D) Series 2007A Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (the 2007A Bonds) in the original amount of \$65,550,000 with a premium of \$1,239,990 dated May 16, 2007, interest ranging from 4 25% to 5 25%. The 2007A Bonds are payable in annual installments through July 1, 2033. All of the 2007A Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after July 1, 2017, at face value

The Corporation issued the 2007A Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The 2007A Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture, and a mortgage lien on the land and buildings constituting the main campus of the Hospital

The 2007A Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation The 2007A Bonds were issued to advance refund \$20,000,000 of outstanding 2003 Bonds and all of the outstanding 2001 Bonds, which totaled \$40,000,000 at the time of the advance refunding

(E) Series 2007B Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (the 2007B Bonds) in the original amount of \$23,000,000 with a premium of \$53,130 dated May 16, 2007, bearing interest at 5 00%. The 2007B Bonds are payable in annual installments from 2034 – 2037. All of the 2007B Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after July 1, 2017, at face value.

The Corporation issued the 2007B Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The 2007B Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture, and a mortgage lien on the land and buildings constituting the main campus of the Hospital The 2007B Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation

- (F) Series 2003 Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Bonds (the 2003 Bonds) in the original amount of \$59,550,000 with a premium of \$1,203,954 dated May 8, 2003, interest ranging from 2 00% 5 75% The 2003 Bonds are payable in annual installments through July 1, 2033 All of the 2003 Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after July 1, 2013, at face value
 - The Corporation issued the 2003 Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The 2003 Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues, the reserve funds established with the bond trustee pursuant to the loan agreement and bond indenture, and a mortgage lien on the land and buildings constituting the main campus of the Hospital The 2003 Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Corporation As mentioned previously, \$20,000,000 of the outstanding 2003 Bonds were advanced refunded through the issuance of the 2007A Bonds

As previously mentioned, the 1997B Bonds were refunded through the issuance of the 2012B Bonds. The Health System recognized a loss on the refunding of approximately \$95,000.
- (H) Series 1992 Tyler Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Revenue Bonds (the 1992 Bonds) in the original amount of \$45,000,000 dated April 15, 1992, bore interest at 5 00%. The 1992 Bonds were due in varying amounts including mandatory sinking fund payments through July 1, 2022. As previously mentioned, the Series 1992 Bonds were refunded through the issuance of the 2012A Bonds. The Health System recognized a loss on the refunding of approximately \$810,000.
- (I) Note payable to bank for the System, due in equal monthly installments of \$67,855 including interest at 5 25% from April 1, 2011 through April 1, 2029. Any outstanding principal balance and accrued interest is due in full on April 1, 2029. The note is secured by certain property and equipment.
- (J) Note payable to bank for the Clinic, due in equal monthly installments of \$100,000 plus interest at varying rates of LIBOR plus 0 85% During 2013, the outstanding principal balance and unpaid interest were paid in full
- (K) Note payable to bank for the Clinic, due in equal monthly installments of \$100,000 plus interest at varying rates of LIBOR plus 0 85% During 2013, the outstanding principal balance and unpaid interest were paid in full
- (L) Note payable to vendor for software, due in equal monthly installments of \$160,434, including interest at a rate of 0%, through March 31, 2016

The agreements also require the Hospital to comply with certain restrictive covenants, including minimum insurance coverage, maintaining a historical debt-service coverage ratio of at least 1.25, minimum days cash on hand, restrictions on transfers of assets out of the obligated group and restrictions on the incurrence of additional debt and disposition of assets

Note 7: Derivative Financial Instruments

In 2008, as a strategy to take advantage of the lower variable interest rates available in the market and to more closely correlate its fixed and variable rate debt to its fixed and variable rate investments, the Hospital entered into a total return swap agreement for its fixed rate debt related to the 1992 Bonds issue (the Total Return Swap). The Total Return Swap agreement included two components, the first of which provides for the Hospital to receive interest from the counterparty of between 6.0% and 6.1% on an amortizing notional amount of \$26,450,000 and to pay interest to the counterparty at a floating rate tied to the Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association Municipal Swap Index (SIFMA). On April 15, 2011, an amendment to the agreement changed the amount paid by the Hospital to SIFMA, plus between 65 and 200 basis points depending on the Hospital's bond rating on an amortizing notional amount of \$25,095,000. The monthly settlements included in interest expense in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets. The Total Return Swap was terminated upon the refunding of the 1992. Bonds in 2013

As a strategy to lower the overall interest expense incurred on its existing long-term debt, the Hospital entered into a nonamortizing basis swap during 2007 (the Basis Swap). The Basis Swap agreement provides for the Hospital to receive interest from the counterparty of 67% of LIBOR, plus 0 274% on a notional amount of \$75,000,000 and to pay interest to the counterparty at a floating rate tied to SIFMA. Under the Basis Swap agreement, the Hospital pays or receives the net interest amount monthly, with the monthly settlements included in interest expense. The Basis Swap agreement was amended on April 12, 2012, reducing the notional amount from \$75,000,000 to \$37,500,000. In conjunction with this reduction in the notional amount, the Hospital paid a termination fee of \$1,137,000.

The Basis Swap does not qualify for hedge accounting treatment. Therefore, the change in the fair value of the swap is recognized as a gain or loss in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets, as a component of excess of revenues over expenses

The agreement terminates on June 7, 2027, but can be terminated by the Hospital on any business day provided that the Hospital has given prior written notice of at least five days to the counterparty

The Basis Swap requires the Hospital to post collateral to the extent the swap liability exceeds \$5,000,000

Note 9: Charity Care

In support of its mission, the Health System voluntarily provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established charges to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Health System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to be charity care, such amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

In addition to these uncompensated costs, the Health System also commits significant time and resources to endeavors and critical services, which meet otherwise, unfilled community needs Many of these activities are sponsored with the knowledge that they will not be self-supporting or financially viable. Such programs include

- Health screening and assessments
- Community education activities
- Pediatric center to provide immunizations and support a child abuse intervention program
- Women's center to provide prenatal and postnatal care, along with bilingual parenting education
- Various support groups

The costs of charity care provided under the Health System's charity care policy were approximately \$19,575,000 and \$20,808,000 for 2013 and 2012, respectively. The cost of charity care is estimated by applying the ratio of cost to gross charges to the gross uncompensated charges

Note 11: Pension and Other Post-Retirement Benefit Obligations

Defined Contribution Pension Plans

The System has two defined contribution pension plans that cover substantially all full-time employees. One plan is organized under section 403(b) of the IRC, which receives employee pretax and elective employer contributions for the Health System employees.

The other defined contribution plan is organized under Section 401(a) of the IRC. All employees are eligible and are automatically enrolled in the plan. Employees become fully vested after three years of service. Employer contributions vary by years of service. The System contributes 1 25% for employees with less than five years of service. 1 75% for five to ten years of service and 2 25% for over ten years of service. Service Based Employer Contributions (SBEC) varies by years of service. The System also makes a matching contribution to this plan, equal to 50% of an employee's elective deferral into the 403(b) plan, up to a maximum of 2% of the employees' eligible compensation.

Pension expense related to these plans was \$6,202,152 and \$8,249,858 for 2013 and 2012, respectively

Defined Benefit Pension Plans

The System also has a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan covering all employees who meet the eligibility requirements (the Employee Plan). The System's funding policy is to make the minimum annual contribution that is required by applicable regulations, plus such amounts as the System may determine to be appropriate from time to time. This plan was frozen as of December 31, 2009.

The System expects to contribute approximately \$9,000,000 to the Employee Plan in 2014

The System also has a supplemental executive retirement plan (SERP) covering certain members of management. The System's funding policy is to contribute the amount of pension benefit payments at the time the benefit is paid. The System expects to contribute approximately \$455,000 to the SERP in 2014, with funds already designated for that purpose

Distributions were made to certain SERP beneficiaries that resulted in a settlement charge of \$81.886 for that plan in 2012

Level 2 plan assets include interest in a pooled investment trust fund. Level 2 inputs include the net asset value reported by fund managers. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, plan assets are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. The Health System did not hold any Level 1 or Level 3 securities in pension plans at June 30, 2013 and 2012.

A nonqualified plan trust has been created for the purpose of funding SERP-obligations. However, certain rights are retained by general creditors of the System with respect to assets held in trust and, therefore, the trust assets would not be treated as sufficiently separated from the employer to constitute plan assets under Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 715, Compensation – Retirement Benefits. The assets held in this trust are reported on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets as a component of assets limited as to use (see Note 4)

Other Post-retirement Obligations

The Health System has entered into agreements with certain current and former employees to pay for health insurance and long-term care insurance in retirement. The estimated cost of these obligations was approximately \$1,100,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively and has been recorded in other liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Deferred Compensation Plans

The Health System offers a nonqualified deferred compensation plan organized under section 457(b) of the IRC for certain physicians and executives of the Clinic and RMSA. Benefits generally vest immediately. The assets of the plan are recorded in assets limited as to use, internally designated and held by trustee, deferred compensation plan in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets and are approximately \$9,324,000 and \$7,222,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. There is an offsetting liability recorded in accrued expenses in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Investment income related to the plans and corresponding changes in the offsetting liability are recorded as a component of employee benefits in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets

The Health System offers a nonqualified deferred compensation plan organized under section 457(f) of the IRC for certain physicians and executives of the Clinic Benefits generally vest 24 months after termination of employment subject to certain limitations. The assets of the plan are recorded in assets limited as to use, internally designated and held by trustee, deferred compensation plan in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets and are approximately \$7.182,000 and \$7.038,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. There is an offsetting liability recorded in other long-term liabilities in the consolidated balance sheets. Investment income related to the plans and corresponding changes in the offsetting liability are recorded as a component of employee benefits in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

Note 12: Deferred Payments

The Clinic acquired the assets of various physician practices between 1996 and 2004. The purchase of assets included intangible assets representing the value of physician's covenants not to compete executed in connection with the physician's employment agreements. The value of the noncompete agreements depends on the length of time the physician complies with the restrictions on competition.

The amounts allocated to each physician will only be paid if the physician remains an employee of the Clinic for five years from the date of the agreement and complies in full with the restrictions on competition. After termination, payments are made in equal annual installments over four to seven years based on the specific provisions of each agreement.

Interest accrues on the unpaid balance of the amount due to physicians from the date of the agreement at 8% annually. The interest accrued is due and payable annually each December 31, except at the election of the physician employees to defer receipt. The related liability is included in other liabilities on the consolidated balance sheets and totaled \$1,707.840 at both. June 30, 2013 and 2012.

The Health System leases space and provides various services to CCHT The annual rent from CCHT is \$987.360 The Health System also has a management agreement with CCHT to provide management services with an original term of 14 years, expiring in 2018 The annual management fee is \$300.000, paid monthly Amounts due the Health System pursuant to these agreements were \$345,588 and \$1,299,471 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

The Health System holds a noncontrolling membership interest in the Pineywoods Service Organization and the Service Organization of North and East Texas (collectively, the Service Organizations) The primary purpose of the Service Organizations is to improve the health care of residents in east Texas through multiple means. A member of management of the Health System serves on the Board of Directors of the Service Organizations. During 2013 and 2012, the Health System contributed approximately \$10.759,000 and \$6.982,000, respectively, to the Service Organizations. These contributions have been included as a component of other nonoperating expenses in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

The System has provided an unlimited guarantee of substantially all of the long-term debt of Champion Champion has entered into notes payable with a bank with a principal balance of \$3.638.148 and \$2.676.493 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively The Health System, along with the other member of Champion, has jointly and severally guaranteed this debt on behalf of Champion

During 2013, the Hospital transferred operations of its family care clinics to Tyler Family Circle of Care (TFCC), a federally qualified health center. The Hospital provides various general and administrative services to TFCC and makes contributions to TFCC to assist in covering operating losses. Contributions to TFCC during 2013 were approximately \$4,198,000, which primarily consisted of services provided to TFCC at a reduced cost. This contribution has been included as a component of other nonoperating expenses in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

There were members of the Board of Directors that received consulting fees totaling \$103,000 and \$110,000 during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Note 14: Significant Estimates and Concentrations

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require disclosure of certain significant estimates and current vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations. Those matters include the items listed as follows.

Allowance for Net Patient Service Revenue Adjustments

Estimates of allowances for adjustments included in net patient service revenue are described in *Notes 1* and 2

Malpractice Claims

Estimates related to the accrual for medical malpractice claims are described in *Notes 1* and 5

Admitting Physicians

Over 60% of the Hospital's revenue is generated from patients referred by the Clinic and its physicians

Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Health System is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Health System's self-insurance program (discussed elsewhere in these notes) or by commercial insurance, for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The Health System evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

Deferred Compensation Agreement

As discussed in *Note 11*, the amount of annual expense accrued for deferred compensation is based on an estimate of the total amounts payable under the contracts over the lifetimes of the beneficiaries

Self-insured Employee Health Care and Workers' Compensation

Estimates related to the accrual for self-insured employee health care claims and workers' compensation claims are discussed in *Note 5*

Defined Benefit Pension Plan

Estimates related to the Health System's obligation for its defined benefit pension plan are described in *Note 11*

Investments

The Health System invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets

Healthcare Reform Legislation

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) will substantially reform the United States health care system. The legislation impacts multiple aspects of the health care system, including many provisions that change payments from Medicare, Medicaid and insurance companies. The legislation has established health insurance exchanges, which will provide individuals without employer provided health care coverage the opportunity to purchase insurance. It is possible that some employers currently offering insurance to employees will opt to have employees seek insurance coverage through the insurance exchanges. The reimbursement rates paid by insurers participating in the insurance exchanges may be substantially different than rates paid under current health insurance products. Another significant component of the PPACA is the expansion of the Medicaid program to a wide range of newly eligible individuals. In anticipation of this expansion, payments under certain existing programs, such as Medicare disproportionate share, will be substantially decreased. Each state's participation in an expanded Medicaid program is optional.

The state of Texas has chosen not to expand the Medicaid program, which may result in revenues from newly covered individuals not offsetting the Health System's reduced revenue from other Medicare/Medicaid programs

The PPACA is extremely complex and may be difficult for the federal government and each state to implement. While the overall impact of the PPACA cannot currently be estimated, it is reasonably possible that it will have a negative impact on the Health System's net patient service revenue. Additionally, it is possible that the Health System will experience payment delays and other operational challenges during PPACA's implementation.

Note 15: Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value.

- **Level 1** Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies and inputs used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying balance sheets, as well as the general classification of such assets and liabilities pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no significant changes in the valuation techniques during the year ended June 30, 2013. For assets classified within Level 3of the fair value hierarchy, if any, the process used to develop the reported fair value is described below.

Investments

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, securities are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 securities include investments in money market mutual funds, equities and mutual funds. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using quoted prices of securities with similar characteristics or independent asset pricing services and pricing models, the inputs of which are market-based or independently sourced market parameters, including, but not limited to, yield curves, interest rates, volatilities, prepayments, defaults, cumulative loss projections and cash flows. Such securities are classified in Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 2 securities include investments in U.S. Treasury and Agency obligations, corporate bonds and alternative investments. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, securities are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. The Health System did not hold any Level 3 securities at June 30, 2013 and 2012.

The value of certain investments, classified as alternative investments, is determined using net asset value (or its equivalent) as a practical expedient. Investments for which the Health System expects to have the ability to redeem its investments with the investee within 12 months after the reporting date are categorized as Level 2. Investments for which the Organization does not expect to be able to redeem its investments with the investee within 12 months after the reporting date are categorized as Level 3.

Interest Rate Swap Agreements

The fair value is estimated using forward-looking interest rate curves and discounted cash flows that are observable or that can be corroborated by observable market data and, therefore, are classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy

Mother Frances Hospital - Tyler Implementation Plan

A comprehensive Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) was conducted for Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler from February 2013 to June 2013. The hospital's study area was defined as Smith County. The analysis included a careful review of the most current health data available and input from numerous community representatives with special knowledge of public health. Findings indicated that there were seven significant needs in the community served by Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler.

Hospital leadership prioritized those seven needs and decided to address the top six of the seven prioritized health needs. Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler decided not to specifically address the need for "access to dental services," largely due to its position (last) on the prioritized list and the hospital's capacity to address that need. Dental services are not a core business function of the hospital and the leadership team felt that resources and efforts would be better spent addressing the first six prioritized needs. Furthermore, there are organizations in the community serving this need, such as St. Paul Children's dental clinic, Dentistry from the Heart, and Bethesda Health Clinic.

The final list of prioritized needs, in descending order, is listed below:

- 1. Fragmented continuum of care
- 2. Access to health services for specific populations
- 3. Access to specialty providers and services
- 4. Prevention, education and services to address high mortality rates, chronic conditions and unhealthy lifestyles
- 5. Access to mental health services
- 6. Transportation barriers

Mother Frances Hospital - Tyler leadership has developed the following implementation plan to identify specific activities and services which directly address these priorities. The objectives were identified by studying the prioritized health needs, within the context of the hospital's overall strategic plan, and the availability of finite resources. The plan includes a rationale for each priority, followed by objectives, specific implementation activities, and anticipated impact and evaluation.

PRIORITY 1: Fragmented continuum of care

Rationale: Findings suggest that various challenges in Smith County cause the continuum of care to become fragmented and less effective. Interviewees acknowledged a communication breakdown among providers which results in fragmented care. Communication at the hospital level was noted as positive, but repetitive testing can be an issue after discharge if patients have multiple providers.

Objective #1: Participate in initiatives that improve the patient's experience as he or she transitions through the continuum of care.

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to provide care management for discharged patients. At Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler, funds are utilized as designated by the Care Management Department to assist patients with continuity of care needs from the time of hospital discharge. These funds are used for transportation costs to home, home health visits, durable medical equipment, walkers, crutches, medications, as well as minimal days in a skilled nursing home. Funds are targeted for the indigent population.
- As a part of Trinity Mother Frances Health System, Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will
 participate in the electronic health record (EHR), which is powered by Epic. The EHR
 brings an integrated and unified patient centered database. Patients will benefit by
 having online access to much of their clinical information.
- The EHR also has a new cell phone application, "My Chart," which allows the patient to view pertinent health statistics on their phone.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to collaborate with the Louis and Peaches
 Owen Heart Hospital, which is the first and only heart hospital in the region. This facility
 offers integrated care by bringing all aspects of heart care, from diagnostic testing to
 surgery and recovery, into one building and is adjacent to Mother Frances Hospital –
 Tyler.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue its partnership with Children's Medical Center Dallas, which is expected to bring several pediatric subspecialties and educational services to Tyler and the surrounding area. This relationship improves the patient experience, by allowing children to get the care they need closer to home, as they navigate the continuum of care.
- Trinity Mother Frances Health System's Family Practice, Internal Medicine and Pediatric clinics are NCQA Level III certified. The Patient Centered Medical Home is a health care setting that facilitates partnerships between individual patients, and their personal

physicians, and when appropriate, the patient's family. Trinity Mother Frances Health System's clinics are the only clinics in Regional Healthcare Partnership 1 that are Medical Home designated. These clinics are undergoing recertification in the fall of 2013.

Impact and Evaluation

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the funds designated by the Care
 Management Department that assist patients with continuity of care needs.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the progress of the EHR.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the number of patients served by the Heart Hospital.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the pediatric subspecialty visits.

PRIORITY 2: Access to health services for specific populations

Rationale: Mother Frances Hospital and Trinity Clinic serves as the most significant provider for Medicaid, commercial insurance, and Medicare in Smith County. The demand for growth in both inpatient and outpatient services are very strong. Trinity Mother Frances Health System's charity care programs are open to all who seek care within the walls of the system. All service lines are included in options to receive payments using charity care.

Findings indicate that there are disparities among certain populations with regard to accessing healthcare services. Interviewees specifically mentioned the indigent, minority and senior populations in Smith County. Interviewees discussed the need for increased access to affordable medications, as well as primary and specialty services and providers for the indigent population. There is a local clinic that serves the working poor, but residents who don't meet the clinic's criteria continue to fall between the cracks. Access to prenatal care was also noted as difficult among indigent residents.

Interviewees mentioned language barriers, fear and unawareness of resources as a particular concern in the Hispanic population. Some also referred to high rates of domestic violence in the Hispanic population, which may indicate a need for increased access to mental health services for this group. Interviewees discussed that the African American population tends to access the system less frequently, which may result in higher rates of disease. Targeted health education and preventive care were suggested to meet the needs of these residents. Interviewees noted that the senior population has a difficult time accessing care. Barriers include limited finances, transportation and difficulty navigating the system. Many said that elderly residents are in need of assistance with nutrition, medication and chronic disease management. In a survey of Tyler Family Circle of Care – Primary Care and Tyler Family Circle of Care – Women's Services

patients, many respondents cited not having insurance, limited insurance or cost as the main barriers for not seeing a doctor.

Objective #1: Provide access to healthcare and services to vulnerable populations, such as indigent, minority and elderly populations.

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler offers the Special Needs Program. The Program believes
 that all children should have access to health care services; a medical home: which are
 continuous, comprehensive, coordinated, compassionate and culturally competent.
 Medical and social services are provided to children with special needs.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue its partnership with Lifeline-Personal Emergency Response System. Lifeline provides independence to patients needing quick access to emergency assistance in their home. Customers wear a waterproof button on their wrist or around their neck that they can press to activate the Lifeline Call Center in case of incapacitating event such as a fall or stroke. The Lifeline Call Center will attempt to speak to the patient via the Lifeline speakerphone or send out a predetermined contact such as a friend or neighbor or activate emergency personnel to assist the caller.
- As mentioned under Priority 1, Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to utilize
 funds designated by the Care Management Department to assist patients with
 continuity of care needs from the time of hospital discharge. These funds are used for
 transportation costs to home, home health visits, durable medical equipment, walkers,
 crutches, medications, as well as minimal days in a skilled nursing home. Funds are
 targeted for the indigent population.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to support local clinics that provide care to underserved populations, such as the working poor, uninsured populations and children. Examples include:
 - Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to support Bethesda Clinic, a "free" medical clinic, which is supported financially, with staffing including physicians, and by support services from the community. Mother Frances Hospital Tyler provides support in all areas, such as supplies, staff volunteers, monetary gifts, and lab services and on special projects as requested.
 - Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to support St. Paul Children's medical and dental clinics.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to operate the Ross Breast Center, which
 is a mobile unit that provides charity mammograms and bone density screenings at
 community, religious, and business events. The goal is to make screenings available to

- all women who qualify. Payments are made through governmental funding, insurance, private pay, grants, and charity care.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to provide direct financial support to notfor- profit organizations and community supported rural hospitals within the region to help provide needed services to the community. Priority is given to agencies or organizations that provide support or direct health related services or benefits and have a mission to serve the underinsured and uninsured.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler employs bilingual staff members throughout the hospital. These staff members are available to assist patients who face language barriers.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to purchase durable medical devices on an as needed basis as is financial support for prescriptions.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will provide some support for the Tyler Family Circle of Care – Primary Care. The Center serves a patient population with a high percentage of at-risk ethnic groups, and it is the largest provider of services to Medicaid and CHIP services for children in east Texas. A special reach out and read program with book distribution and mentors is also provided.
 - Tyler Family Circle of Care (TFCC) is a freestanding not for profit entity that provides prenatal and women's services, pediatric, and adult care. While they serve primarily Medicaid and underinsured patients, the clinic is open to anyone and accepts all payers. Prior to October 1, 2012, the women's services and pediatric services were a part of Mother Frances Hospital Tyler.
 - O However, in anticipation of national health care reform and a need to expand the service access, these clinics are currently in the process of becoming a Federally Qualified Health Clinic. It is anticipated the certification could be approved as early as July 2013. Over the next 3 years, these clinics will operate as a separate entity with their own board, but will seek grant funding from Trinity Mother Frances Health System and others to cover some of the costs of the clinic services. Additionally, the OB providers currently serve as laborists for Mother Frances Hospital - Tyler.

 Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler will track its efforts to provide services to vulnerable populations, such as the indigent, minority and elderly populations.

PRIORITY 3: Access to specialty providers and services

Rationale: Interviewees consistently noted the need for increased access to specialty providers and services in the Smith County. While they did acknowledge that there is an impressive amount of specialties represented in the community, additional needs include: endocrinology, neurology, oncology, burn care and pediatric subspecialties including pediatric endocrinology, neurology and gastroenterology.

Objective #1: Increase access to additional specialist services and providers in the community.

- As mentioned under Priority 2, Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to provide direct financial support to not-for-profit organizations and community supported rural hospitals within the region to help provide needed services to the community. Priority is given to agencies or organizations that provide support or direct health related services or benefits and have a mission to serve the underinsured and uninsured.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to operate the first Level IIIA Neonatal Intensive Care Unit in Smith County, making it possible to offer technology, facilities and skilled staffed to provide quality care to both the babies born too sick or too soon and their families. These services allow the entire family to stay close to home with their support group and the ability to continue to work while still engaging in what can sometimes be a long process to have their baby ready to go home.
 - Mother Frances Hospital Tyler plans to develop a telemedicine program that will allow specialists not located in Tyler to evaluate the needs of the baby.
 - Trinity Clinic will continue to provide the pediatric retinopathy services for the patients of the Mother Frances Hospital Tyler NICU. The NICU now provides care for babies at 26 weeks which requires more on site and available pediatric retinopathy services. It is unusual for a community the size of Tyler to be able to have these services on site and a part of their system. The care and cost savings for both the payers and the families is substantial by having that service in Tyler. The only other option would be to travel to Dallas or Houston.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will engage in recruitments efforts to attract the following providers to the community:
 - As part of the Medicaid Waiver project, specialty care will expand by 11
 providers over the next 3 years. Providers will be primarily in Smith County but
 will be in outlying communities as well as Tyler. This will expand access for the
 region as well as the specialty care in Tyler. It also includes expanding hours of
 clinics to increase access.

- Other specialties that will be recruited include:
 - Cardiology, Neurology, Gastroenterology, Urology, Sleep Medicine,
 Pulmonary, Endocrinology, and General Surgery.
- As mentioned under Priority 1, Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to collaborate with the Louis and Peaches Owen Heart Hospital, which is the first and only heart hospital in the region. This facility offers integrated care by bringing all aspects of heart care, from diagnostic testing to surgery and recovery, into one building and is adjacent to Mother Frances Hospital Tyler.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue its partnership with Children's Medical Center Dallas and UT Southwestern, which is expected to bring additional specialist services to the community, such as:
 - Pediatric cardiology
 - Pediatric urology
 - Telemedicine (as mentioned above)
 - Other subspecialties
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to focus efforts on reducing the wasted time and delay in coordinating the transfer of patients from outside facilities to Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler provides the areas only pediatric trauma surgeons. In addition, trauma surgeons are also available to patients with acute surgical needs.
- Trinity Mother Frances Health System helps to develop skills children need to learn and become interested in healthcare careers. Through our volunteer services programs training, job shadowing, student programs, etc. are offered to individuals, schools, community colleges and four year institutions not only in our main hospitals but in clinics throughout our service area.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler employees contribute to the United Way annual campaign in which the funds are used for many different community services needs of the indigent, minority and elderly residents.

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the number of patient deliveries at the NICU.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the monetary contributions to not-for-profit organizations and community supported rural hospitals.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the number of physicians it recruits to the community.
- Mother Frances Hospital will track the number of referrals to the new specialty care providers.

PRIORITY 4: Prevention, education and services to address high mortality rates, chronic conditions and unhealthy lifestyles

Rationale: Findings indicate that Smith County has higher mortality rates than Texas in the following conditions: cancer, chronic lower respiratory disease, accidents and Alzheimer's disease. According to the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), nearly 62% of respondents in Smith County are overweight or obese and 7.8% have diabetes. Smith County also has higher chlamydia and gonorrhea rates (459.1 per 100,000 and 188.1 per 100,000 respectively) than Texas (419 per 100,000 and 116.1 per 100,000 respectively). Finally, according to the BRFSS, almost 20% of respondents in Smith identify as current smokers.

Objective #1: Provide opportunities for prevention, education and services that aim to reduce mortality rates and the prevalence of chronic conditions and unhealthy lifestyles in the community.

- In an effort to improve the ability of people to respond to an emergency situation regardless of
 where it occurs, Mother Frances Hospital Tyler offers emergency education. Detailed
 instruction and hands on participation is offered for certification in areas including CPR,
 first aid, and AED use. Courses are offered to school district and sponsors for UIL
 programs on an as needed basis.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to participate in the largest annual senior event (Senior Symposium) and provides free blood pressure and glucose screenings.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to engage in community partnerships. The
 goal of these partnerships is to provide assistance and support and to educate the
 public on programs offered by Komen Foundation, American Heart Association,
 American Cancer Society, Alzheimer Association, Bethesda Health Clinic, Special
 Olympics, Boy Scouts, Children's Advocacy Center, UT Tyler Nursing, and public and
 private schools.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler provide leadership, such as board representation, and monetary donations to a variety of foundations and organizations. Examples include:
 - Literacy Council
 - Alzheimer's
 - o American Heart Association
 - Cancer Foundation For Life
 - o American Cancer Society
 - Hospice of East Texas
 - o Health Fitness Programs

- Samaritan Counseling Center of Tyler
- Texas Palliative Care
 - Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to provide space for the Palliative Care Program, which is offered by the Texas Palliative Care Providers. The program provides end of life and crisis care counseling to patients and their families through direct requests and physician referrals.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to participate in Trinity Mother Frances
 Health System's annual fundraising campaign, Share the Spirit. It is organized and
 implemented by employees with all proceeds going to help with health related
 programs such as heart care, cancer care, Children's Miracle Network, diabetes
 education and services, and the employee CrisisCare Fund.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will offer health education and screening programs, including the Fit City Tyler Program and various walks.
- Trinity Mother Frances Health System collaborates with Live Line to provide over 50 different screenings to targeted high risk individuals and the general public, averaging 90 individuals for each screening annually. This service is provided at a significant discount to participants. Additionally, anyone can go on to the TMFHC website and participate in an online risk assessment free of charge to determine an individual's risk for heart and vascular disease and strokes.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to participate in Trinity Mother Frances
 Health System's efforts to provide open sports pre-participation exams for the high
 schools and colleges in the area. All programs are open to anyone to participate
 provided they have parental approval. Support for on-site trainers is also provided on
 an as needed basis.
 - An average of 2,100 pre-participation physicals have been provided to students across East Texas at no charge to the individual, their families, or the school.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to offer youth fitness programs, which
 include sports training programs, injury prevention and healing, running classes, walking
 programs, and nutritional programs to educate youth and young adults on the potential
 for injuries and the long term effects of not caring for the body.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to address preventive health among its employees. For example, Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler:
 - o Requires all staff members to get a flu vaccination
 - Is not hiring current smokers, and smoking cessation is offered to current employees
 - Offers an employee initiative called Live Well. The program encourages employees of Mother Frances Hospital - Tyler to take responsibility for their

health. Free events such as biometric screenings and physicals are offered each year to employees as well as educational programs on exercise, smoking cessation, and nutrition.

• As mentioned under Priority 2, Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler will continue to operate the Ross Breast Center, which is a mobile unit that provides charity mammograms and bone density screenings at community, religious, and business events.

Impact and Evaluation

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track participation in classes, screenings, and programs that address diseases, chronic conditions and unhealthy lifestyles in the community.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the number of patients served by the Ross Breast Center.

PRIORITY 5: Access to mental health services

Rationale: Findings suggest that there is a need for increased access to mental health services. According to BRFSS, slightly more than 16% of respondents in Smith County report poor mental health. Interviewees mentioned cultural stigmas and limited funds as major barriers to care. Interviewees also said that patient-related challenges, such as lack of insurance and/or jobs among persons with mental illness combined with lack of access makes affordability and access difficult. Mental health services for children and adolescents were specifically mentioned.

Objective #1: Provide a point of access for mental health services, and support area organizations and initiatives that address access to mental health services in the community.

- When a patient with a mental or behavioral health condition comes through the Emergency Department at Mother Frances Hospital - Tyler they are stabilized and transferred, when appropriate, to a facility that can more adequately treat their mental or behavioral health condition.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will develop a list of available services to patients who come through the Emergency Department with a mental health condition.
- Pediatric psychiatry is offered on an outpatient basis through Trinity Clinic and supported by Mother Frances Hospital.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to provide free ambulance transportation for psychiatric patients to the approved faculty for care from the hospital.

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler is a collaborating partner in the Regional Healthcare Partnership 1 initiative. The hospital will participate in educational programs that are offered.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will support organizations that address access to mental health services in the community. Examples include:
 - Samaritan Counseling Center of Tyler
 - Andrews Center

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track its involvement in the Regional Healthcare Partnership 1 initiative.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track its relationships with community organizations.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track its progress in creating a list of available mental health services in the community.

PRIORITY 6: Transportation barriers

Rationale: Interviewees indicated that the widespread layout of Smith County makes transportation a major stumbling block for the senior population.

Objective #1: Increase access to transportation to health care services for those without access in the community.

- As mentioned under Priority 1, Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to utilize funds designated by the Care Management Department to assist patients with continuity of care needs from the hospital discharge time. These funds are used for various types of assistance, including transportation costs to the patient's home. Funds are targeted at the indigent population.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler provides access to many visiting specialists that help eliminate the need for patients to travel out of the community to get health care services.
- As mentioned under Priorities 2 and 4, Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to operate the Ross Breast Center. The Ross Breast Center is a mobile unit that provides charity mammograms and bone density screenings at community, religious, and business events. This mobile unit takes these services to the patients, many of whom are underserved, and eliminates the need for transportation to the hospital.

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler provides limited funds for the MediCab program, which
 provides transportation home from the hospital when a patient has no other means of
 transportation. Cab rides are provided to patients who do not have any way to return
 home even on occasion when it requires up to a distance of 90 miles each way.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler partners with Champion EMS, which provides several ambulance stations throughout East Texas including two Flight For Life locations.
- As mentioned under Priority 5, Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will continue to provide free ambulance transportation for psychiatric patients to the approved faculty for care from the hospital. Mother Frances Hospital – Tyler provides the vehicle and a trained officer to transport these patients.
- Transportation provided to and from the Tyler ContinueCARE for patients needing attention at Mother Frances Hospital Tyler.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler employees contribute to the United Way annual campaign in which the funds are used for many different community services including some transportation needs.

- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the funds designated by the Care
 Management Department that assist patients with continuity of care needs.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the number of visiting specialists.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the number patients served by the Ross Breast Center.
- Mother Frances Hospital Tyler will track the number of patients utilizing the MediCab program.
