

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

August 31, 2013

1. Organization

Scott & White Healthcare (SWH) is a nonprofit corporation exempt from federal taxes under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC Scott & White Healthcare controlled entities and noncontrolled affiliate entities include over 1,700 licensed hospital beds, approximately 80 clinic locations, and a health maintenance organization primarily serving the central and eastern regions of Texas

Scott & White Healthcare and subsidiaries are collectively referred to herein as Scott & White

2. Significant Accounting Policies

Principles of Consolidation

The equity method of accounting is used for investments in entities in which Scott & White has significant influence and a financial interest, but not control Entities in which Scott & White has control but not sole membership are included in the consolidated financial statements, with a noncontrolling interest reported in the balance sheet and in the excess or deficiency of revenues and gains over expenses and losses All entities in which Scott & White has sole membership are consolidated in the consolidated financial statements All significant intercompany accounts and transactions among entities included in the consolidated financial statements have been eliminated in consolidation

Cash Equivalents

Scott & White considers all undesignated highly liquid investments with maturities of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents

Inventory

Inventory is stated at average cost, which is not in excess of market value

Accounts Receivable

Patient accounts receivable are stated at estimated net realizable value Scott & White maintains allowances for uncollectible accounts for estimated losses resulting from a payer's inability to make payments on accounts Scott & White uses a balance sheet approach to establish the allowance based on historical payments, payer type, and the aging of the accounts Accounts are

written off when collection efforts have been exhausted Management continually monitors and adjusts, as necessary, allowances associated with its receivables. The majority of uncollectible accounts are from uninsured patients and patient copays and deductibles.

Significant concentrations of gross patient accounts receivable from state and federal government-related programs were 25% and 32% at August 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Premiums receivable are established for medical premium revenue and generally are not collateralized Premiums receivable also include annual settlements under the cost contract established between Scott & White's health maintenance organization and the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) At August 31, 2013 and 2012, the settlement amounts receivable under this contract were \$37,868,000 (cost years 2007–2013) and \$30,775,000 (cost years 2009, 2011, and 2012), respectively

Significant concentrations of premiums receivable were 99% from state and federal government-related programs at August 31, 2013 and 2012

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets held for donor or other restricted purposes, assets designated by the Scott & White Board of Trustees for specific purposes such as facility replacement and initiatives that promote the Scott & White mission, and assets held in trust under bond agreements

Assets limited as to use primarily consist of cash, cash equivalents, debt securities, equity securities, and alternative investments Assets limited as to use are classified as trading or other than trading based on the manner in which Scott & White manages its investment portfolio Investments in cash equivalents, debt securities, and equity securities are stated at fair value

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition or estimated fair value at the date of donation Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method using the estimated economic lives of the depreciable assets, generally ranging from 2 to 40 years. The amortization related to assets recorded under capital leases is included within depreciation expense.

Expenditures that materially increase values, change capacities, or extend useful lives are capitalized Routine maintenance and repair items are charged to operating expenses. The estimated useful lives of the classes of depreciable assets are as follows

Scott & White evaluates whether events and circumstances have occurred that would require a revision to the remaining estimated useful life of long-lived assets or would indicate that the remaining balance of an asset is not recoverable. The assessment of possible impairment is based on whether the carrying amount of an asset exceeds the expected total undiscounted value of cash flows expected to result from the use of the asset and its eventual disposition. No impairment charges were recorded in 2013 or 2012.

Scott & White accounts for asset retirement obligations under the provisions of Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 410, Asset Retirement and Environmental Obligations, regarding accounting for conditional asset retirement obligations. The asset retirement obligation as of August 31, 2013 and 2012, was \$9,622,000 and \$9,317,000, respectively, which is recorded in other liabilities in the consolidated balance sheets and relates to required future asbestos remediation

Derivative Financial Instruments

Scott & White accounts for its derivatives under ASC 815, Derivatives and Hedging, regarding accounting for derivative instruments and hedging activities Scott & White utilizes interest rate swap agreements (derivative agreements) to mitigate interest rate exposures Scott & White's derivative agreements are measured at fair value and are reflected in the consolidated balance sheets as either a long-term asset or long-term liability None of Scott & White's derivative financial instruments qualify for hedge accounting at August 31, 2013 or 2012 Changes in the fair value of the derivative agreements and the expense or income, representing the net of the payments made or received under the derivative agreements, are recorded as interest rate swap activity in the consolidated statements of operations

Interest in Net Assets of Supporting Foundations

Scott & White accounts for its interest in the net assets of supporting foundations under ASC 958-605, *Not-for-Profit Entities – Revenue Recognition*, regarding transfers of assets to a not-for-profit organization or charitable trust that raises or holds contributions for others At August 31, 2013 and 2012, Scott & White's interest in the net assets of supporting foundations not eliminated upon consolidation was approximately \$7,235,000 and \$6,983,000, respectively

Medical Claims Payable

Medical claims payable represent management's best estimate of the ultimate net cost of all reported and unreported claims and claim adjustment expenses incurred through August 31, 2013 and 2012 Reserves for unpaid claims are actuarially estimated using individual case-basis valuations and statistical analysis These estimates are subject to the effects of trends in claim severity and frequency Although considerable variability is inherent in such estimates, management believes that reserves for unpaid claims are adequate The estimates are continually reviewed and adjusted as necessary as experience develops or new information becomes known Such adjustments are included in operations when determined There were no material adjustments to these estimates recorded during the years ended August 31, 2013 or 2012

Contributions, Gifts, and Bequests

Scott & White records contributions, gifts, and bequests of cash or other assets at estimated fair value on the date of receipt If a contribution, gift, or bequest of cash or other assets is received by Scott & White with a time or purpose restriction, Scott & White records the contribution, gift, or bequest as a temporarily or permanently restricted contribution

When a time or purpose restriction is fulfilled, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as research, education, and other nonoperating activity or in the consolidated statements of changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions for capital expenditures

Scott & White's temporarily restricted net assets are primarily restricted for research, education, capital projects, and medical care programs

Scott & White's permanently restricted net assets are primarily restricted for educational and research purposes Unless explicitly restricted by donors, income from permanently restricted net assets is recorded as temporarily restricted until appropriated for expenditure

Pledges and grants receivable are reported as assets limited as to use on the consolidated balance sheets. They are further classified as either for restricted purposes or internally designated for specific purposes based on presence or absence of donor restrictions.

Net Patient Service and Premium Revenue

Net patient service revenue is recognized in the period in which services are performed Net patient service revenue is reported at estimated net realizable amounts due from patients, third-party payers, and others for services rendered and includes estimated revenue adjustments due to audits, reviews, investigations, and bad debts Revenue adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue in the period the related services are rendered, and such amounts are adjusted in future periods as better information becomes known or as years are no longer subject to such audits, reviews, or investigations

Premium revenue is recognized during the period in which members are entitled to receive covered health care benefits Unearned premiums are determined on a daily pro rata basis For the years ended August 31, 2013 and 2012, net patient service and premium revenue included premium revenue of \$571,877,000 and \$572,196,000, respectively Premium revenue from local, state, and federal agencies accounted for 40 2% and 45 8% of total premium revenue in 2013 and 2012, respectively

Charity Care

Scott & White provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity policy Because Scott & White does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue In 2013, prior to application of disproportionate share funds of approximately \$19,594,000 received from the state of Texas, the cost of charity care provided to patients was approximately \$50,052,000 In 2012, prior to application of disproportionate share funds of approximately \$12,621,000 received from the state of Texas, the cost of charity care provided to patients was approximately \$77,817,000 The cost basis of charity care was determined using a cost-to-charge ratio methodology defined by the American Hospital Association In 2013, Scott & White amended its charity care policy, which resulted in a decrease in the amount of presumptive charity recognized in 2013 as compared to 2012

Health Insurance Program Reimbursement

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and are subject to interpretation Federal regulations require the submission of annual cost reports covering medical costs and expenses associated with services provided to program beneficiaries Medicare and Medicaid cost report settlements are estimated in the period services are provided to beneficiaries. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. The 2013 and 2012 net patient service and premium revenue increased approximately \$9,824,000 and \$6,536,000, respectively, due to changes in allowances previously estimated as a result of the final settlements for years that are no longer subject to audits, reviews, or investigations. Scott & White believes that it is in compliance with all applicable Medicare and Medicaid laws and regulations and is not aware of any pending or threatened investigations involving allegations of potential wrongdoing

Certain payments for services provided under the Medicare and Medicaid programs and other organizations are subject to review of the medical necessity of admission and propriety of discharge, diagnosis, and coding As part of the Tax Relief and Health Care Act of 2006, Congress directed the expansion of the Recovery Audit Contractors (RAC) reviews Management believes adequate allowance has been provided for possible adjustments that might result from retrospective billing reviews, including the ongoing or future RAC reviews

Medicare cost reports filed by Scott & White for all years before 2009 have been audited and settled as of August 31, 2013 Certain years prior to 2009 are under appeal

Amounts due to the Medicare and Medicaid programs totaled approximately \$16,047,000 and \$10,428,000 at August 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and are reported in due to third-party payers in the consolidated balance sheets

During 2012, the proposed changes to Medicaid in Texas under the Medicaid Transformation and Quality Improvement Program and the March 2012 legislatively-mandated expansion of Managed Medicaid resulted in the discontinuation of the Upper Payment Limit (UPL) supplemental payment program in the state The new programs created to continue these supplemental payments are Uncompensated Care (UC) and Delivery System Reform Incentive Payments (DSRIP) During 2013, Scott & White began to participate in these programs through 3 regional health partnerships For the years ended August 31, 2013 and 2012, Scott & White recognized revenue of approximately \$23,061,000 and \$2,747,000, respectively, under these programs and these amounts are reflected as an increase in net patient service revenue

Nonoperating Gains and Losses

Nonoperating gains and losses include unrestricted contributions, gifts and bequests, investment income, research and education expenditures net of assets released from restrictions for research and education expenditures and related grant income, interest rate swap activity, income from investment in unconsolidated entity, and other income, gains, and losses unrelated to Scott & White's primary operations

Performance Indicator

The performance indicator is (deficiency) excess of revenues over expenses in the consolidated statements of operations, which includes all changes in unrestricted net assets other than net assets released from restrictions for capital expenditures, change in pension and other postretirement benefit liabilities, and unrealized gains and losses on other-than-trading investment securities

Income Tax

Scott & White evaluates its income tax positions in accordance with ASC 740, *Income Taxes*, regarding accounting for uncertainty in income taxes ASC 740 prescribes a recognition threshold and measurement attribute for the financial statement recognition and measurement of a tax position taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. There are no material uncertain income tax positions as of August 31, 2013 or 2012.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States requires management of Scott & White to make assumptions, estimates, and judgments that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements, including the notes thereto, and related disclosures of commitments and contingencies, if any Scott & White considers critical accounting policies to be those that require more significant judgments and estimates in the preparation of its consolidated financial statements, including the following recognition of net patient receivables and related revenues, including contractual allowances and provisions for bad debt, settlements with state and federal government programs, reserves for losses and expenses related to health care professional and general liabilities, determination of fair values of certain financial instruments, risks and assumptions for measurement of medical claims incurred but not reported, and defined benefit liabilities Management relies on historical experience and on other assumptions believed to be reasonable under the circumstances in making its judgments and estimates Actual results could differ materially from these estimates

New Accounting Pronouncements

In July 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-07, Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities, which is intended to increase transparency about a health care entity's net patient service revenue and related allowance for doubtful accounts. This update requires certain health care entities to change the presentation of their statement of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue Additionally, these health care entities are required to provide enhanced disclosures about their policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. Scott & White adopted the provision of ASU 2011-07 beginning September 1, 2011

Scott & White continually monitors the allowances established for its patients accounts receivable During fiscal year 2013, Scott & White determined the historical collection trends on which its accounts receivable allowances are based was not indicative of actual collections and recorded a \$52,000,000 increase in these allowances in May 2013 This adjustment was determined to be a change in estimate and is reflected in 2013 operating results and is a result of enhancements to its revenue recognition process in response to ongoing changes and increased complexities in the healthcare industry

4. Investment in Unconsolidated Entity

In fiscal year 2008, Scott & White acquired a 32% membership interest in Metroplex Adventist Hospital (MAH), a Texas nonprofit corporation, located in Killeen, Texas Prior to execution of the membership interest agreement, Adventist Health System Sunbelt Healthcare Corporation was the sole member of MAH Scott & White accounts for its interest in MAH under the equity method of accounting

At August 31, 2013 and 2012, the difference between the amount at which the investment in MAH was carried and Scott & White's interest in the underlying net assets of MAH was \$5,754,000 and \$7,038,000, respectively. The excess cost over interest in the underlying net assets of MAH is being amortized over 10 years, which was determined to be the lesser of the approximate remaining life of the assets to which the excess cost over carrying value relates or the period of time from the consummation of the membership interest agreement to the point at which the membership interest agreement may be terminated without cause. Scott & White's interest in the (losses) income of MAH was \$(52,000) and \$3,871,000 for fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively, and is included as a component of research, education, and other nonoperating activity on the statements of operations

5. Self-Insured Liabilities

Scott & White self-insures substantially all of its professional liability risk through a wholly owned insurance subsidiary Commercial insurance policies are maintained to insure claims exceeding \$7,000,000 individually or \$35,000,000 in the aggregate during 2013 on a claims-made basis Self-insured liabilities are recorded for incurred but not reported claims and reported claims based on estimates by independent actuaries Assets have been designated to satisfy professional and general liabilities and are reported in the consolidated balance sheets as assets limited as to use for restricted purposes

6. Reinsurance of Health Maintenance Organization Medical Claims

Scott & White's health maintenance organization cedes certain premium revenues and medical claims under reinsurance agreements. The ceded reinsurance agreements provide Scott & White with increased capacity to write larger risks and maintain its exposure to loss within its capital resources. Scott & White's health maintenance organization is currently a party to reinsurance contracts under which it is reimbursed for a percentage of claim expenses incurred in excess of a deductible and up to a maximum benefit per member per year.

Under these contracts, Scott & White is not relieved of its primary obligation to provide health care coverage to members. The annual deductible ranged from \$150,000 to \$700,000 per member for the year ended August 31, 2013, and ranged from \$100,000 to \$700,000 per member for the year ended August 31, 2012. The maximum benefit per member ranged from \$3,000,000 to \$10,000,000 for the years ended August 31, 2013 and 2012. Coinsurance benefits for the years ended August 31, 2013 and 2012, vary by type of service

Certain entities within Scott & White are members of the Scott & White Obligated Group (Obligated Group) Obligated Group members are jointly and severally liable under a Master Trust Indenture (MTI) to make all payments required with respect to obligations secured under the MTI Obligated Group members have pledged and assigned to the Master Trustee a security interest in all of their rights, title, and interest in their pledged revenues and proceeds thereof Under the MTI, the Obligated Group was obligated to pay \$926,525,000 and \$675,680,000 at August 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

In March 2013, Scott & White issued Series 2013A Revenue Bonds with an aggregate principal of \$176,690,000 Series 2013A bonds mature on various dates through August 2043, and interest is payable semiannually in February and August of each year Simultaneous to the issuance of its Series 2013A bonds, Scott & White issued Series 2013B Revenue Bonds The Series 2013B bonds were issued as direct placement variable rate bonds. The Series 2013B bonds mature in 2045, with an initial put date in 2023. Interest is payable monthly. Proceeds of the Series 2013B bonds along with the majority of proceeds for the Series 2013A bonds were used to advance refund Series 2006 FHA Revenue Bonds. With the advance refunding of the Series 2006 bonds, Scott & White recognized a \$66,172,000 loss on extinguishment of debt. The loss was due to the write-off of a significant discount associated with the 2006 bonds as well as the escrow funding required to make future interest payments on the 2006 bonds. The remaining portion of the Series 2013A bonds were used to fund development and construction costs of various expansion and construction projects.

In March 2013, Scott & White also issued Series 2013C Revenue Bonds to refinance the Series 2008-2 bonds Series 2013C bonds were issued as direct placement variable rate bonds. The Series 2013C bonds mature in 2046, with an initial put date in 2022.

In June 2010, Scott & White issued Series 2010 Revenue Bonds with a total par amount of \$345,775,000 The majority of the proceeds are being used to fund development and construction costs of various expansion and construction projects The Series 2010 bonds mature on various dates through August 2045

Scott & White's Series 2008 Revenue Bonds were issued as variable rate demand bonds in June 2008. They were originally issued in three subseries with a total par amount of \$236,395,000. In October 2010, the Series 2008-3 bonds were refunded with a tax-exempt note in the amount of \$56,225,000 as part of a strategy to manage maturities of the irrevocable

direct-pay letters of credit used to support the payment of principal and interest on the Series 2008 bonds. In March 2013, the Series 2008-2 bonds were refunded with the Series 2013C bonds. The direct-pay letters of credit associated with the Series 2008-2 and 2008-3 bonds were terminated at the time of refunding. The irrevocable direct-pay letter of credit associated with the Series 2008-1 bonds was replaced in April 2011 in advance of its stated expiration. Unless it is extended, terminated early, or replaced, the letter of credit supporting the Series 2008-1 bonds will expire April 11, 2015.

In August 2008, Scott & White issued the Series 2008A Revenue Bonds with a total par amount of \$172,425,000 Proceeds were used to advance refund the outstanding principal of the Series 2000B and Series 2001 Revenue Bonds and pay costs of issuance of the Series 2008A Revenue Bonds The Series 2008A bonds mature on various dates through August 2031 Interest is paid semiannually in February and August of each year

As of August 31, 2013 and 2012, Scott & White has \$137,309,000 and \$115,173,000, respectively, in additional long-term debt, which includes capitalized leases, notes payable to others, and lines of credit drawn

Total interest expense incurred during fiscal 2013 and 2012 was approximately \$23,165,000 and \$27,163,000, respectively, net of approximately \$18,340,000 and \$17,149,000 of capitalized interest costs in 2013 and 2012, respectively. Interest paid during fiscal years 2013 and 2012 was approximately \$50,798,000 and \$44,116,000, respectively, including amounts capitalized

The estimated fair value of Scott & White's debt is \$1,122,915,000 and \$1,144,224,000 at August 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively Fair values were derived from market quotes obtained from an independent financial advisor and are considered Level 2 fair value measurements

The bond indentures and other interim financing agreements, including the revolving lines of credit, each contain certain restrictive covenants, including minimum levels of cash and debt service coverage Management believes Scott & White is in compliance with all financial covenants

8. Interest Rate Swap Agreements

Interest rate swap agreements (derivative agreements) between Scott & White and third parties (counterparties) provide for the periodic exchange of payments between the parties based on changes in a defined index and a fixed rate Derivative agreements expose Scott & White to market risk and credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that contractual obligations of the counterparties will not be fulfilled Concentrations of credit risk relate to groups of counterparties that have similar economic or industry characteristics that would cause their ability to meet contractual obligations to be similarly affected by changes in economic or other conditions Counterparty credit risk is managed by requiring high credit standards for Scott & White's counterparties. The counterparties to these contracts are financial institutions that carry investment-grade credit ratings. The interest rate swap agreements contain certain collateral provisions applicable to Scott & White and counterparties to mitigate credit risk. Scott & White does not anticipate nonperformance by its counterparties.

Market risk is the adverse effect on the value of Scott & White's swap agreements that results from a change in interest rates. The market risk associated with interest rate changes is managed by establishing and monitoring parameters that limit the types and degrees of market risk that may be undertaken. Management also mitigates market risk through periodic reviews of its

derivative positions in the context of its blended cost of capital Scott & White can terminate any of the swap agreements at any time and would make or receive a payment depending on the fair value of the swap agreements on the date of termination

At August 31, 2013, Scott & White has interest rate swap agreements with a total notional amount of \$480,475,000, as compared to \$566,285,000 at August 31, 2012 Five of the seven fixed payer interest rate swap agreements are associated with the Series 2008-1 bonds, the Series 2013C bonds, and a variable rate tax-exempt note executed in October 2010

In February 2011, Scott & White entered into two fixed receiver interest rate swap agreements with the intent to offset the cash flows of the two fixed payer swaps that were not associated with outstanding debt. In anticipation of associating one of the forward fixed payer swaps with the 2013 bonds, Scott & White terminated the forward fixed receiver swap with a notional amount of \$82,230,000 in February 2013. The termination resulted in a payment of \$4,431,000 from the counterparty to Scott & White In March 2013, Scott & White issued its Series 2013B bonds and associated the fixed payer interest rate swap agreement with a notional amount of \$82,715,000 with the bonds

Scott & White has experienced negative mark-to-market valuations in its swap positions resulting in liabilities to the counterparties that exceeded contractually established thresholds Since Scott & White's credit rating determines the required collateral threshold amount related to the majority of swap agreements, a downgrade in credit rating could have significant impact on collateral posting requirements. To manage the collateral posting requirements, Scott & White amended all swap agreements with the counterparties to increase or remove minimum threshold collateral posting requirements, or to allow letters of credit to become a form of eligible collateral. At August 31, 2013, a letter of credit for an amount not to exceed \$50,000,000 was available for collateral support related to the three fixed forward swap agreements outstanding at that date. The counterparty holds the undrawn letter of credit, and an actual draw would only be initiated if an event of default or a termination event occurs and is continuing. As of August 31, 2013, no amounts have been drawn on the letter of credit.

Net settlement payments on interest rate swap agreements totaled \$6,715,000 and \$11,516,000 for the years ended August 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively Net settlement payments and the change in fair value on interest rate swap agreements are reported in interest rate swap activity in the nonoperating section of the consolidated statements of operations. A total return investment approach is used, whereby a mix of equities and fixed income investments is used to maximize the long-term return of plan assets for a prudent level of risk Risk tolerance is established through careful consideration of plan liabilities, plan funded status, and corporate financial condition. The investment portfolio contains a diversified blend of equity and fixed income investments. Furthermore, equity investments are diversified across U.S. and non-U.S. stocks, as well as growth, value, and small and large capitalizations. Other Postretirement Benefits

Certain Scott & White employees participate in Scott & White's medical postretirement benefit plan This plan provides medical and dental benefits to retirees who meet specific eligibility requirements upon retirement The plan is unfunded and requires covered retirees to contribute a portion of the cost of benefits based on age at retirement and years of service Scott & White uses an incremental cost approach in estimating the annual accrued cost related to the postretirement benefit plan, which is based on estimates by independent actuaries Such an approach is considered appropriate since substantially all of the health care benefits are provided by Scott & White to retirees, using Scott & White's health maintenance organization to manage the care provided

In August 2013, the benefits under the plan were modified such that future retirees (current and future employees) who have not earned access to the plan as of December 31, 2013, will have fewer benefits. They will no longer be eligible for retiree medical benefits before age 65 but will still earn the right to benefits after age 65. This is considered a "negative plan amendment" under ASC 715, Compensation – Retirement Benefits, and not a curtailment as some level of benefits is still available to all employees who become eligible. As a result of the plan amendment, the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation decreased by approximately \$7 million and is reflected within other changes in net assets on the consolidated financial statements. The

amendment has appropriately been reflected as of August 31, 2013, as it was approved by the appropriate governance in August 2013 and communicated to the employees in a reasonable period of time

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (an exit price) ASC 820, Fair Value Measurement, establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value A financial instrument's categorization within the valuation hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy defined by ASC 820 are listed below in order of priority

Level 1 – Fair value is based on unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in an active market that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date

Level 2 – Fair value is based on quoted prices in markets that are not active, quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the asset or liability

Level 3 – Fair value is based on prices or valuation techniques that require inputs which are both significant to the fair value measurements and unobservable. These inputs reflect management's judgment about the assumptions that a market participant would use in pricing the investment and are based on the best available information, some of which may be internally developed

Scott & White estimates the values of its U S government agency securities, certain corporate fixed income securities, collateralized debt obligations, and interest rate swap agreements using Level 2 inputs. These investments are valued primarily using a market approach using inputs such as evaluated bid prices provided by third-party pricing services when quoted market values are not available. Interest rate swaps are valued using an income approach that utilizes present value techniques which are affected by inputs such as interest rate curves and credit rating Valuation of Scott & White's Level 3 asset at August 31, 2012, is based on redemption value

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of Trustees of Scott & White has interpreted the Texas enacted version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary As a result of this interpretation, Scott & White classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by Scott & White in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by Texas law. In accordance with Texas law, if relevant, the organization considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds

- (1) The duration and preservation of the endowment fund
- (2) The purposes of the institution and the endowment fund

- (3) General economic conditions
- (4) The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- (5) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- (6) Other resources of the institution
- (7) The investment policy of the organization

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

Scott & White has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets Endowment assets include donor-restricted assets that Scott & White must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period as well as board-designated funds. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Trustees, the endowment assets are invested among various asset classes to produce investment returns that exceed the price and yield results of the respective benchmark asset classes and peer groups while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. Actual returns in any given year vary

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, Scott & White relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends) Scott & White oversees its investment portfolio through an Investment Committee of the Scott & White Board of Trustees, and uses the recommendations of an independent investment consultant to manage the funds within the portfolio and review asset allocations

Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

The appropriation for expenditure in any year will not exceed the Board of Trustees' approved appropriation and spending rate The Board of Trustees' approved appropriation and spending rate takes into account Scott & White's historical long-term rate of return on investments and Scott & White's policy of acting to preserve the purchasing power of the endowment fund As

such, Scott & White's Board of Trustees has resolved that each fiscal year the lesser of 75% of an endowment fund's investment return or 5% of the invested fund balance of an endowment fund (as of the end of the previous fiscal year) may be appropriated for expenditure

In establishing this policy, Scott & White considered the long-term expected return on its endowment Accordingly, over the long term, Scott & White expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment to grow at a rate comparable to annual inflation. This is consistent with Scott & White's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets

15. Subsequent Events

Effective October 1, 2013, SWH and Baylor Health Care System, a Texas nonprofit corporation (BHCS), consummated their affiliation (the Affiliation) pursuant to an Affiliation Agreement (the Agreement) dated June 19, 2013 The Affiliation was accomplished through the creation of a new Texas limited liability company, Baylor Scott & White Health LLC (Baylor Scott & White Health) SWH and BHCS are equal members in Baylor Scott & White Health, which has control and substantial reserved powers over all SWH and BHCS material affiliates

Management has evaluated subsequent events through January 15, 2014, the date the financial statements were available to be issued
