Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital, Inc is dedicated to improving the health of all people in the communities it serves, and to providing compassionate, palliative care. NVRH provides high quality healthcare services focused on community needs at the lowest cost consistent with excellent care. NVRH will cooperate with other organizations to provide medical, educational, preventive, and wellness services. NVRH will strive for the best possible outcomes, including effective pain management with the highest level of service that meets and exceeds expectations.

Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital, Inc is a full service, state of the art, Critical Access Hospital. The Hospital makes its services available to approximately 30,000 residents of the greater St. Johnsbury community. Inpatient services include medical and surgical, intensive care, pediatrics, and obstetrics. The emergency room at NVRH is fully staffed by full-time physicians and specialized nurses. A new Ambulatory Surgery Unit opened in October 2009. The new unit has space for 16 pre- and post-operative patients. Over 95% of our surgeries and procedures are conducted through day surgery. These services are supported by the laboratory, diagnostic imaging, MRI, CT scan, cardiac services, rehabilitation, respiratory, and other ancillary services. NVRH was chosen as the first Medical Home/Community Care Team in December of 2007 and created medical homes in 5 primary care practices and Community Care Teams. Surgical specialties include general surgery, neurosurgery, oral/maxillofacial, otolaryngology, obstetrics/gynecology, orthopedics, ophthalmology, and urology. NVRH is one of two Vermont hospitals to have been awarded the international baby-friendly designation by the World Health Organization. NVRH's charity care program is available to patients who are uninsured, underinsured, or have otherwise demonstrated they don't have the financial resources to fully pay for their hospital care. Patients with income levels below 200% of the federal poverty guideline for the applicable family size have their hospital bill discounted by 100%. Patients with income levels between 200% and 300% of the federal poverty guideline receive a discount on their hospital bill between 75% and 25%. Foregone charges, based on established rates, furnished under NVRH's free care program amounted to \$2,114,464 during the year ended September 30, 2013.

 The emergency room at NVRH is fully staffed by full-time physicians and specialized nurses who are trained to deal with all aspects of medical care. Emergency room staff provide pre-hospital provider training and support, participation in local education programs, hospital continuing medical education and quality assurance programs. Care provided by the emergency room is coordinated with appropriate local physician practices. The NVRH pharmacy provides pharmaceutical services for patients, including a complete patient medication profile and computerized monitoring. Our pharmacy staff is a vital component of the healthcare team, consulting with physicians and other health professionals to ensure that patients receive the appropriate drug therapies. NVRH owns Corner Medical, a family practice serving patients of the Northeast Kingdom since 1973. The practice includes nine healthcare providers: six M.D.'s, one D.O., a nurse practitioner, and a physician assistant. NVRH St. Johnsbury Pediatrics is also owned by the hospital, with four pediatricians and a nurse practitioner. Occupational Medicine at NVRH serves both the hospital community as well as local businesses and industry for work related medical needs. Staff of Occupational Medicine includes an M.D., as well as a nurse practitioner. The Women's Wellness Center provides OB/GYN care to women of all ages and health needs. Two certified nurse midwives, two women's health nurse practitioners and three MDs (OB/GYN) provide comprehensive health services. NVRH also employs a full-time MMHC (Masters in Mental Health Counseling) employee, as well as a hospitalist program, with one hospitalist overseeing the service. NVRH - Kingdom Internal Medicine is another NVRH-owned physician practice. Three physicians and one nurse practitioner staff this practice which is located in St. Johnsbury, VT.

Special attention was paid to include those who accurately represent our community as a whole, as well as those with special knowledge or expertise in public health, medical health, and mental health. Primary source data collection started on December 2011 and ended in April 2012. Those giving their input for this assessment included a representation of the general population, young adults, senior citizens, opinion leaders and the NVRH Medical Team. We started this process with Intercept Interviews at two popular businesses in St. Johnsbury and Lyndon, and Bingo in Danville. Customers entering or existing the business and Bingo were asked their town of residence and about their perceptions of the health of their communities. 		<p>Part VI, Line 2 Assessment of community needs is an ongoing process at Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital. Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital achieves openness, inclusiveness, and public participation in our strategic planning and decision making in a variety of ongoing and deliberate ways. NVRH governance structure includes the Northeastern Vermont Regional Corp (NVRC) Corporators. The over 250 Corporators, representing all the towns in our service area, are an invaluable source of wisdom and perspective for hospital leadership. They are key links in the essential communication system between members of our community and the Hospital. Because the Corporators represent the community, they act as our eyes and ears on the street. The quarterly Corporators meetings are an opportunity for two-way sharing of information. The Corporators share their needs and concerns, as well as the needs and concerns of their families, friends, and neighbors. In return, the Corporators are updated on hospital services, as well as state and national healthcare issues. The Hospital participates in formal community assessments that are conducted every few years by various community organizations including the Fit and Healthy Coalition, Together Works - Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition, the Tobacco Advisory Committee, Green Mountain United Way, the Housing Coalition, and the Vermont Departments of Health and Education. Hospital staff are active members and partners with these coalitions and organizations. Formal community assessments begin with identifying a problem or purpose. The purpose could be broad, such as "what are the top priorities in our community" or it could be more specific based on the missions of the organization. The local prevention coalitions have all recently conducted community assessments based on their missions to prevent substance abuse, prevent and end tobacco use, and prevent obesity related chronic conditions. The next step is developing a community profile using primary source data. Primary source data is primarily obtained from the Vermont Department of Health biannual Health Status of Vermonters report. This report compiles data from a variety of sources including the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), U.S. Census, the Department of Environmental Conservation data, the Vermont Health Care Cost and Utilization Project, and several other state and national data sources. Secondary data is gathered by identifying and getting input from key stakeholders including community leaders, relevant organizations, and community members. Input is gathered by using one on one interviews, surveys (including using online tools like Survey Monkey), and focus forums for all key stakeholder groups. Inventories of existing services, and gap and/or asset mapping are also typically part of the community assessment process. As primary and secondary data is gathered the analyzing phase kicks in. Sometimes the focus of an assessment may shift if data reveals a new or more urgent health priority. Reporting the results of the assessment is an important piece of the process. Every effort is made to get summaries and reports back to interested community members and organizations. More and more often, the Hospital and partner organizations are using Community Based Participatory Research (CBPR) principles when designing community interventions or deciding on which health services to add or enhance. CBPR starts with community engagement and buy in, but goes beyond to ensure that knowledge, power, credit, and results are shared fairly between "experts" and community members.</p>



### Organization

Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital, Inc (the Hospital) is a Critical Access Hospital located in St Johnsbury, Vermont. The Hospital is controlled by Northeastern Vermont Regional Corp (NVRC or Parent). A tax-exempt holding company, NVRC is the sole member of the Hospital.

### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, except for money market funds included with investments in assets limited as to use or temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

#### Patient Accounts Receivable

Patient accounts receivable are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a charge to operations and a credit to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of individual accounts and historical adjustments. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to patient accounts receivable.

In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes past results and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a provision for bad debts in the period of service based on past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay amounts for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated or eligible) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

During 2013, the Hospital increased its estimate from \$1,110,054 to \$1,440,396 in the allowance for doubtful accounts relating to self-pay patients and during 2012 the Hospital decreased its estimate from \$1,464,857 to \$1,110,054. During 2013 and 2012, self-pay write-offs increased from \$3,483,986 to \$3,918,626 and from \$1,850,494 to \$3,483,986, respectively. Such increases resulted from trends experienced in the collection of amounts from self-pay patients.

### Supplies

Supplies are carried at the lower of cost (average cost method) or market.

### Investments and Investment Income

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheets. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, other than temporary losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues, gains, and other support over expenses and losses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and temporary unrealized losses on investments are excluded from this measure. The cost of securities sold is based on the specific identification method.

### Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets designated by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes, assets designated by the Board of Trustees to fund depreciation, and assets restricted by bond agreement and held by a trustee.

Assets limited as to use also include \$236,537 and \$236,476 at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, which represent contributions from donors which are restricted for capital acquisitions.

### Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Hospital are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

### Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the financial statements. Interest costs incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets are capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support, and are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

### Interest Rate Swap

In 2008, the Hospital entered into an interest rate swap agreement. The interest rate swap agreement is designated as a cash flow hedge, used to offset the variability of expected future cash flows due to the variable interest rate of the Hospital's 2004 bonds. The swap had an initial notional amount of \$7,500,000. The swap terminates on October 1, 2018. The Hospital pays a fixed rate of 2.874% and receives a variable rate based on 68% of the 1-month USD-LIBOR-BBA Index. At September 30, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital recorded an interest rate swap liability of \$529,813 and \$773,106, respectively. The Hospital assesses the swap's effectiveness in offsetting the variability in cash flows on a quarterly basis. Unrealized gains of \$243,293 as of September 30, 2013 and unrealized losses of \$49,465 as of September 30, 2012 were included in unrestricted net assets to recognize the effective portion of the interest rate swap. There was no amount deemed to be ineffective in relation to this swap for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012.

### Accrued Self-Insurance

The Hospital has established a self-insured health care plan for substantially all of its employees. The Hospital has obtained reinsurance coverage to limit the Hospital's exposure associated with this plan individually of \$100,000 and the aggregate limit is determined by the greater of \$3,258,000, or 90% of the monthly aggregate deductible for the first month of the policy year, then multiplied by twelve months. The accompanying financial statements include an accrual for management's estimate of claims incurred, but not reported, of approximately \$841,000 and \$765,000 as of September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

### Benefit Plans

The Hospital sponsors a defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all of its employees. The Hospital's contributions are determined for, and allocated to, eligible participants based on a predetermined percent of compensation paid. Individual benefits at retirement are the amounts which can be provided by the sums contributed to each participant's account. The plan provides for immediate employee vesting upon the employee's effective date of participation. Under this plan, the Hospital contributes a non-elective contribution of 3% of a participant's eligible compensation and a matching contribution equal to 100% of a participant's elective deferral, up to 1.5% of the participant's eligible compensation. Retirement plan expenses charged to operations were \$1,164,131 and \$1,072,010 for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The Hospital provides the opportunity for certain members of management and employed physicians to contribute to a deferred compensation plan established under Section 457 of the Internal Revenue Code (Code). Contributions are voluntary on the part of qualifying employees and no contributions are made by the Hospital on their behalf. Contributions are recorded as other long-term assets and corresponding other long-term liabilities in the balance sheets and totaled \$147,258 and \$27,291 for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

### Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital have been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity.

### Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

### Charity Care

The Hospital provides services without charge, or at amounts less than its established rates, to patients who meet the criteria of its charity care policy. The criteria for charity care consider such factors as family income and net worth. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue.

**Excess of Revenues, Gains, and Other Support Over Expenses and Losses**

The statements of operations include excess of revenues, gains, and other support over expenses and losses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from this measure, consistent with industry practice, include net unrealized gains and temporary unrealized losses on investments, the portion of the change in value of the interest rate swap that is considered effective for hedge accounting purposes, and contributions of property and equipment.

**Income Taxes**

The Hospital is exempt from federal income taxes under Code Section 501(c)(3) whereby only unrelated business income, as defined by Section 512(a)(1) of the Code, is subject to federal income tax.

**Functional Expenses**

The Hospital provides general health care services to residents within its geographic location. Expenses related to providing these services were as follows for the years ended September 30:

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

**Medicare**

As a Critical Access Hospital, the Hospital is reimbursed allowable cost for its inpatient and outpatient services provided to Medicare patients. The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at tentative rates, with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through September 30, 2008.

**Medicaid**

Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors and are not subject to retroactive adjustment. The Hospital's Medicaid cost reports have been audited by the fiscal intermediary through September 30, 2008.

### Blue Cross

Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Blue Cross subscribers are reimbursed at submitted charges less a negotiated discount. The amounts paid to the Hospital are not subject to any retroactive adjustments.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 37% and 14%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient service revenue for the year ended September 30, 2013, and 35% and 14%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient service revenue for the year ended September 30, 2012. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Net patient service revenue increased approximately \$41,000 and \$1,250,000 during 2013 and 2012, respectively, due to settlements in excess of amounts previously estimated.

The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services rendered to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for such services. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). Based on historical trends, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services rendered. Thus, the Hospital records a provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are rendered. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for bad debts), recognized during fiscal years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012 totaled \$63,772,773 and \$60,755,336, respectively, of which \$58,455,673 and \$55,941,536, respectively, were revenues from third-party payors and \$5,317,100 and \$4,813,800, respectively, were revenues from self-pay patients.

### 3. Charity Care

The Hospital maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. These records include the amount of charges foregone for services and supplies furnished under its charity care policy, the estimated cost of those services and supplies, and equivalent service statistics. ### 4. Meaningful Use Revenues

The Medicare and Medicaid electronic health record (EHR) incentive programs provide a financial incentive for achieving "meaningful use" of certified EHR technology. The Medicare criteria for meaningful use will be staged in three steps from fiscal year 2012 through 2016. The meaningful use attestation is subject to audit by CMS in future years. As part of this process, a final settlement amount for the incentive payments could be established that differs from the initial calculation.

The Medicaid program will provide incentive payments to hospitals and eligible professionals as they adopt, implement, and upgrade or demonstrate meaningful use in the first year of participation and demonstrate meaningful use for up to five remaining participation years. There will be no payment adjustments under the Medicaid EHR incentive program.

During 2013, the Hospital installed a certified EHR system and demonstrated meaningful use, allowing the Hospital to be eligible to receive EHR incentive payments from Medicare and Medicaid. During 2013, the Hospital recorded meaningful use revenues of \$697,095 related to Medicaid and \$588,900 related to Medicare. During 2012, the Hospital recorded meaningful use revenues of \$821,722 from the Medicaid EHR program.

In the opinion of management, no individual unrealized loss as of September 30, 2013, represents an other-than-temporary impairment. Based on assessments of holdings of common stock and corporate bonds in individual companies, the Hospital believes losses for such securities are temporary in nature, and that it has both the intent and the ability to hold these securities for the time necessary to recover their cost.

**6. Fair Value Measurements**

FASB ASC 820 defines fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. FASB ASC 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The standard describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value.

**Level 1:** Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

**Level 2:** Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, and other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

**Level 3:** Significant unobservable inputs that reflect an entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

Depreciation expense for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, amounted to \$2,526,171 and \$2,171,225, respectively. Accumulated amortization for equipment under capital lease obligations was \$109,014 and \$115,438 at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

During 2012, the Hospital began installing an integrated information system package, including software, hardware, and training services. At September 30, 2012 the Hospital had approximately \$1.6 million of costs in construction in progress. The information system package was put into service during 2013. As of September 30, 2013 there were approximately \$300,000 related to renovations of various departments within the Hospital. The total project costs are estimated to be approximately \$1.5 million and will be completed in 2014.

**8. Beneficial Interest in Trust**

The Hospital was the beneficiary of a charitable remainder trust. The Hospital's interest in the split-interest agreements was reported as a contribution in the year in which it was notified of its interest. The present value of the Hospital's interest in the split-interest agreement approximated the fair value of the Hospital's proportional share of the asset of the trust.

The balance of the trust at September 30, 2012 was distributed to the Hospital in 2013.

**9. Borrowings**

In December 2004, the Vermont Educational and Health Buildings Financing Agency issued \$11,530,000 of tax-exempt variable rate demand bonds (Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital Project 2004 Series A Bonds). The bonds were issued for the purpose of providing funds to repay the balance of the 2000 Series A Bonds, to fund certain capital expenditures and to pay certain expenses incurred in connection with issuance of the bonds.

In February 2009, the Vermont Educational and Health Buildings Financing Agency issued \$4,500,000 of tax-exempt variable rate demand bonds (Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital Project 2009 Series A Bonds) The bonds were issued for the purpose of providing funds to pay certain capital expenditures and certain expenses incurred in connection with issuance of the bonds

The Agency has entered into loan agreements with the Hospital, under which the Hospital will make payments of principal and interest on the bonds under determined repayment schedules. The payments are deposited with a trustee until principal and interest are due to the Agency. Such deposits are included with assets limited as to use. Payment of principal and accrued interest on the bonds is secured by irrevocable direct pay letters of credit issued by TD Bank. The bonds are collateralized by the gross receipts of the Hospital. The revenue note indentures also place limits on the incurrence of additional borrowings and require that the Hospital satisfy certain measures of financial performance as long as the notes are outstanding.

The Hospital incurred various expenses in connection with the 2009 and 2004 bonds totaling \$166,229 and \$129,444, respectively. In addition, the Hospital is required to pay fees based on 1.5% and 1.75% of the face amount of the letters of credit for the 2004 and 2009 bonds, respectively, on a quarterly basis. The amount of the costs related to the 2009 and 2004 letters of credit at the time of issuance are being amortized over three and five years, respectively. The remaining amounts are being amortized over the respective lives of the bonds on a straight-line basis. Accumulated amortization as of September 30, 2013 and 2012 relating to the 2009 bond was \$50,550 and \$36,664, respectively, and accumulated amortization as of September 30, 2013 and 2012 relating to the 2004 bonds was \$69,511 and \$61,567, respectively.

### **12. Commitments and Contingencies**

#### **Medical Malpractice Claims**

The Hospital carries malpractice insurance coverage under a claims-made policy. Should the claims-made policy not be renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on occurrences during its term, but reported subsequently, will be uninsured. The Hospital intends to renew its coverage on a claims-made basis and has no reason to believe that it may be prevented from renewing such coverage. The Hospital is subject to complaints, claims and litigation due to potential claims which arise in the normal course of business. GAAP requires the Hospital to accrue the ultimate cost of malpractice claims when the incident that gives rise to the claim occurs, without consideration of insurance recoveries. Expected recoveries are presented as an asset. Amounts accrued under this provision are included in other accounts receivable and accounts payable and accrued expenses in the balance sheets.

The Hospital entered into an agreement with Northern Counties Health Care, Inc. (NCHC) on March 1, 2009, in which the Hospital agreed to provide NCHC the sum of \$440,900 over approximately a three-year period to maintain, increase the availability of, and enhance the quality of services to its medically underserved population. During 2013, the agreement was extended for one year and the Hospital made a payment of \$130,380 to satisfy the amended agreement.

#### **Operating Leases**

The Hospital leases equipment under an operating lease expiring February 2015. Total rental expense for years ended 2013 and 2012 was approximately \$279,036 and \$179,326, respectively.

**13. Related Party Transactions**

NVRC supports the activities and charitable purposes of the Hospital NVRC holds funds for purposes of the Hospital, which are reflected in these financial statements as "Beneficial interest in net assets of Parent "

NVRC leases office space to the Hospital under a continuing two-year lease effective through April 30, 2013, in the amount of \$58,448 per annum

During 2005, the Hospital transferred a building with a net book value of \$2,063,710 to NVRC to be used primarily as an cancer treatment center The costs of renovating the building were incurred by the Hospital and are payable by NVRC As of September 30, 2013 and 2012, the total amounts due from NVRC were \$2,609,331 and \$2,256,907, respectively

**14. Fair Value of Financial Instruments**

The Hospital's financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, marketable securities, trade accounts receivable and payable, estimated third-party payor settlements and long-term debt The fair values of all financial instruments approximate their carrying values at September 30, 2013.
