

THE HOSPITAL OPERATES A 13-BED CRITICAL ACCESS HOSPITAL (CAH) AND 2 RURAL HEALTH CLINICS WHICH PROVIDE HEALTHCARE SERVICES TO PATIENTS IN THE TETON COUNTY AREA. THE HOSPITAL PROVIDED 293 DAYS OF INPATIENT SERVICES, 13,753 OUTPATIENT VISITS, 1,255 EMERGENCY ROOM VISITS, AND 514 SURGERIES FOR THE YEAR.

THE HOSPITAL PROVIDES CARE TO PERSONS COVERED BY GOVERNMENTAL PROGRAMS AT BELOW COST AND TO INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE UNABLE TO PAY. Report on the Financial Statements

1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

a. Organization

Effective January 11, 2012, Teton Valley Health Care, Inc. (the Hospital), a nonprofit corporation, was formed under the Idaho Nonprofit Corporation Act, Chapter 3, Title 30, of the Idaho Code. The Hospital is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Hospital has been set up to manage operations previously operated by Teton Valley Hospital, a component unit of Teton County, Idaho (the District). The Hospital is governed by a board of directors consisting of nine members.

The Hospital operates a 13-bed critical access hospital (CAH) and rural health clinic in Driggs, Idaho, and a rural health clinic in Victor, Idaho. The Hospital provides healthcare services to patients in the Teton County area. Services provided include acute care, emergency room, physicians' clinics and the related ancillary procedures (imaging, laboratory, etc.).

The reporting entity of the Hospital also includes the consolidated financial information of Teton Valley Health Care Foundation doing business as Teton Valley Hospital Foundation (the Foundation). The Foundation is organized as an Idaho nonprofit corporation and is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Foundation was organized to solicit and accept charitable contributions to support the Hospital.

In conjunction with formation of the Hospital, a Liquid Assets Transfer Agreement (LATA) was executed between the Hospital and Teton County, Idaho (the County), effective January 1, 2013. This agreement calls for all rights, title, and interest in the liquid assets of the County, relating to District operations, to be transferred to the Hospital in exchange for payment of a yearly fee of \$70,000 due annually in April, along with a yearly distribution equal to 5% of the Hospital's "Excess of Operating Revenues Over Expenses" as shown on the audited financial statements. This earnings distribution must be paid to the County within 150 days of the Hospital's fiscal year end. In addition, the Hospital shall assume the obligations and liabilities of the County related to the cash and liquid assets of the District. Liquid assets to be transferred shall include bank accounts, cash, tax levy and other liquid assets, and securities related to the operation of the District. Under this agreement, the County also has the option to reinvest all or a portion of such payments received into the Hospital. The Hospital may also make written funding requests for improvements to the Hospital.

In addition, a 99-year lease between the Hospital and the County has been signed, effective January 1, 2013. The agreement entitles the Hospital to lease from the County the hospital facilities, including any real or personal property leases, as well as the property, plant, and equipment currently used in the Hospital's operations. Annual consideration paid to the County will be \$1.

b. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Principles of consolidation – The Hospital consolidates activities of Teton Valley Health Care, Inc. and Teton Valley Health Care Foundation, doing business as Teton Valley Hospital Foundation. All material intercompany transactions and accounts have been eliminated in the consolidated financial statements.

Use of estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Income tax status – The Hospital and Foundation are not-for-profit corporations and are exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, no provision for income tax is necessary. The Hospital evaluates uncertain tax positions whereby the effect of the uncertainty would be recorded if the outcome were considered probable and reasonably estimable. As of September 30, 2013, the Hospital has no uncertain tax positions requiring accrual.

Cash and cash equivalents – Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding assets restricted as to use.

Fair value measurements – Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability (i.e., the “exit price”) in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The Hospital classifies its investments based upon an established fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments without quoted market prices, but for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly. The Hospital did not have any Level 2 investments in the nine-month period ended September 30, 2013.

Level 3 – Prices or valuations that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable. The Hospital did not have any Level 3 investments in the nine-month period ended September 30, 2013.

Investments in certificates of deposit – Investments in certificates of deposit are measured at fair value in the consolidated balance sheets based on quoted market prices (Level 1 input for fair value measurement).

Inventories – Inventories are stated at cost on the first-in, first-out method. Inventories consist of pharmaceutical, medical-surgical, and other supplies used in the operation of the Hospital.

Property, buildings, and equipment – The Hospital capitalizes assets whose costs exceed \$5,000 and have an estimated useful life of at least two years. Major expenses for capital assets, including leases that increase the useful lives, are capitalized. Maintenance, repairs, and minor renewals are accounted for as expenses as incurred. Capital assets are reported at historical cost or their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and computed using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives of capital assets are as follows:

Land improvements	3 to 15 years
Buildings and improvements	5 to 30 years

Major movable equipment	3 to 20 years

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets, and are excluded from revenues in excess of expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted net assets.

Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Compensated absences – The Hospital's employees earn paid time off at varying rates depending on years of service. Employees with up to five years of service are allowed to accrue a maximum of 160 hours, and employees with more than five years of service are allowed to accrue 240 hours. The estimated amount of paid time off is expensed and reported as a component of accrued compensation and related liabilities in the consolidated balance sheet as it is earned.

Employees also earn extended illness bank benefits based on a standard rate-per-hour worked up to a maximum of 480 hours. Unused extended illness bank hours are not paid upon termination of employment. Extended illness bank benefits are expensed when taken.

Excess of revenues, gains, and other support over expenses – The consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets includes excess of revenues, gains, and other support over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues, gains and other support over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets).

Functional expense allocation – The costs of providing various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of operations and changes in net assets. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Recent accounting pronouncements – In 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update 2011-07 that requires healthcare entities to report patient bad debt as a reduction from revenue instead of an operating expense. The amended requirement is effective for fiscal years ending after December 15, 2012, and must be applied retrospectively. The statement of operations and changes in net assets reflects the amended guidance. This guidance did not impact the Hospital's balance sheet or statement of cash flows.

Subsequent events – The Hospital has evaluated subsequent events through January 29, 2014, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. Patient Accounts Receivable:

Patient accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for uncollectible accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of patient accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for uncollectible accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for uncollectible accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for uncollectible accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for uncollectible accounts.

The Hospital's allowance for uncollectible accounts for self-pay patients has not changed significantly from prior years. The Hospital's provisions for bad debts and writeoffs have not changed significantly from prior years. The Hospital has changed its charity care and uninsured discount policies for the nine-month period ended September 30, 2013, to be in compliance with the Hospital's new status as a tax-exempt corporation formed under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Hospital does not maintain a material allowance for uncollectible accounts from third-party payors, nor did it have significant writeoffs from third-party payors. 5. Employee Health Self-insurance:

The Hospital participates in a self-insured health insurance plan administered by Boulder Administration Services, Inc. (the TPA). Full-time employees are eligible to participate after reaching 90 days of employment. The Hospital records plan expenses as incurred. The Hospital also has an agreement with Pan American Life Insurance Company (the Company) to provide excess loss insurance coverage. The calculation of loss coverage is based upon a set dollar amount per covered employee. Plan expenses were approximately \$460,000 for the nine-month period ended September 30, 2013. The Hospital accrues an incurred but not reported liability for plan claims that had been incurred but that have not yet been reported to the TPA. The Hospital's liability for claims incurred but not reported was \$75,000 as of September 30, 2013. Activity in the Hospital's accrued employee health claims liability is as follows:

7. Net Patient Service Revenue:

The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for bad debts), recognized in the period from these major payor sources, is as follows:

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

- *Medicare* – The Hospital is licensed as a critical access hospital and rural health clinic. The Hospital is reimbursed for most inpatient, outpatient, and rural health clinic services at cost with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital subject to audits thereof by the Medicare intermediary. Nonrural health clinic physician services are reimbursed based on fee schedules.
- *Medicaid* – Inpatient and outpatient services provided to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under cost reimbursement methodologies through the Hospital's Medicare cost report, or rates as established by the Medicaid program. Rural health clinic visits are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates. Nonrural health clinic physician services are reimbursed based on fee schedules. The Hospital is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined by the Medicaid program based on the Hospital's final Medicare cost report for non fee-schedule services.

7. Net Patient Service Revenue (continued):

The Hospital also has entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, fee schedule, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Net patient service revenue increased by approximately \$3,000 in the nine-month period ended September 30, 2013, due to differences between original estimates and final settlements or revised estimates.

The Hospital provides charity care to patients who are financially unable to pay for the healthcare services they receive. The Hospital's policy is not to pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care. Accordingly, the Hospital does not report these amounts in net operating revenues or in the allowance for uncollectible accounts. The Hospital determines the costs associated with providing charity care by aggregating the applicable direct and indirect costs, including salaries, wages and benefits, supplies, and other operating expenses, based on data from its costing Hospital. The costs of caring for charity care patients for the nine-month period ended September 30, 2013, were approximately \$34,000.

8. Retirement Plans:

403(b) plan – The Hospital provides retirement benefits through the Teton Valley Health Care, Inc. 403(b) Plan (the 403(b) Plan), a defined contribution plan. The 403(b) Plan was effective as of January 1, 2013. This plan covers all eligible employees who are employed by the Hospital. Contributions are based on a discretionary percentage of wages and salaries. Employees are eligible to participate in the plan after completing 1,000 hours of service in a twelve-month period and attaining the age of 21. The Hospital's contribution for the nine-month period ended September 30, 2013, was approximately \$104,000. The Hospital is the administrator for the plan.

457(b) plan – The Teton Valley Health Care, Inc. 457(b) Plan (the 457(b) Plan) is a deferred compensation pension plan and is offered to specific Hospital employees determined to be highly compensated employees. The 457(b) Plan was effective as of January 1, 2013. The Hospital does not contribute to this plan. The plan is administered by Randall & Hurley, Inc.

8. Retirement Plans (continued):

Defined benefit plan – Until 2004, the Hospital provided a defined benefit noncontributory pension plan (the Teton Valley Hospital Defined Benefit Plan) (the Plan) for all full-time employees who had completed one year of service and reached age 21. Benefits were based on years of service and career compensation and consisted of cash payments with a maximum possible benefit of \$15,000 per month. The Hospital does not maintain the accounting records, hold the investments, or administer the Plan. The Plan is a single employer Hospital administered by Randall and Hurley, Inc. Actuarial valuations for the Plan are performed annually. Benefit provisions and contribution requirements of Plan members and the Hospital were established by the Board of Trustees.

Effective December 31, 2003, the Hospital froze the defined benefit pension plan. Eligible employees will receive, upon retirement or termination, the benefits accrued on their behalf as of that date. This action is defined as a curtailment and eliminates accrual of additional benefits subsequent to the effective date.

Effective December 31, 2012, the Plan has been terminated. However, it has not yet been fully settled because there are still Plan participants that have received neither lump-sum nor annuity contracts in exchange for their rights to receive pension benefits. During the nine-month period ended September 30, 2013, the Hospital paid out \$93,240 to plan participants. As of September 30, 2013, the Hospital owed participants \$98,217 in settlement funds. Settlement is expected to be complete by the year ended September 30, 2014. There is no effect of projected future compensation levels to report as of September 30, 2013, 2012 or 2011.

10. Contingencies:

Medical malpractice claims – The Hospital has professional liability insurance with Lexington Insurance Company (Lexington). The Lexington policy provides protection on a “claims-made” basis whereby only malpractice claims reported to the insurance carrier in the current year are covered by the current policies. If there are unreported incidents which result in a malpractice claim in the current year, such claims would be covered in the year the claim was reported to the insurance carrier only if the Hospital purchased claims-made insurance in that year or the Hospital purchased “tail” insurance to cover claims incurred before but reported to the insurance carrier after cancellation or expiration of a claims-made policy. The malpractice insurance provides \$1,000,000 per claim of primary coverage with an annual aggregate limit of \$3,000,000. The policy does not have a deductible.

The Hospital also has excess professional liability insurance with Lexington on a “claims-made” basis. The excess malpractice insurance provides \$2,000,000 per claim of primary coverage with an annual aggregate limit of \$2,000,000. The policy does not have a deductible.

Industry regulations – The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as: licensure, accreditations, government healthcare program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Government activity continues with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by healthcare providers. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government healthcare programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed. Management believes that the Hospital is in compliance with fraud and abuse statutes, as well as other applicable government laws and regulations.

While no regulatory inquiries have been made, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions known or unasserted at this time.

10. Contingencies (continued):

Healthcare reform – As a result of recently enacted federal healthcare reform legislation, substantial changes are anticipated in the United States of America's healthcare organizations. Such legislation includes numerous provisions affecting the delivery of healthcare services, the financing of healthcare costs, reimbursement of healthcare providers, and the legal obligations of health insurers, providers, and employers. These provisions are currently slated to take effect at specified times over approximately the next decade. The federal healthcare reform legislation does not affect the 2013 financial statements.

11. Concentrations of Risk:

Patient accounts receivable – The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of who are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables from patients is as follows:

Physicians – The Hospital is dependent on local physicians practicing in its service area to provide admissions and utilize hospital services on an outpatient basis. A decrease in the number of physicians providing these services or change in their utilization patterns may have an adverse effect on the Hospital's operations.

Cash and cash equivalents – As of September 30, 2013, the Hospital maintained deposits in accounts with major financial institutions which exceeded the \$250,000 Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation limit. These financial institutions have strong credit ratings, and management believes that credit risk related to these deposits is minimal.

12. Subsequent Event:

In December 2013, the Hospital was awarded a grant from the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust, in the amount of \$125,000, to be used for the purchase of new imaging equipment.
