#### Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### Nature of Operations and Principles of Consolidation

Rutherford Hospital Inc and Affiliates (the "Hospital") is a network of not-for-profit operating affiliates located in Rutherfordton. North Carolina The activities of the principal entities comprising the Hospital are summarized below

Rutherford Hospital – Rutherford Hospital is a 143-bed acute care hospital providing inpatient, outpatient and emergency services primarily to the residents of Rutherford County. North Carolina

Carolina Community Care – Carolina Community Care provides comprehensive health care in the home environment primarily to the residents of Rutherford County. North Carolina, and surrounding counties. Services provided include home health care, companion services, alternative programs for disabled adults, case management and personal care.

Physician Practices – Physician Practices is comprised of eight physician practices specializing in family medicine, behavioral health services, general surgery, anesthesia, plastic surgery, urology and orthopedic surgery practice

Rutherford Hospital Auxiliary – Rutherford Hospital Auxiliary (the "Auxiliary") provides support to the programs, services and staff of Rutherford Hospital – The Auxiliary carries out this purpose by operating a gift shop within Rutherford Hospital

Rutherford Hospital Foundation – Rutherford Hospital Foundation (the "Foundation") supports the health and welfare of the people of Rutherford County. North Carolina, by promoting philanthropic contributions and public support for Rutherford Hospital

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of Rutherford Hospital and all wholly owned or controlled subsidiaries All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Hospital considers all liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At September 30, 2013 and 2012, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market accounts with brokers

## Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

At September 30, 2013, the Hospital's cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$2,050,000

#### Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and all debt securities are carried at fair value and are classified as trading securities. Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income, realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments carried at fair value, and realized gains and losses on other investments.

Investment return that is initially restricted by donor stipulation and for which the restriction will be satisfied in the same year is included in unrestricted net assets. Other investment return is reflected in the statements of operations and changes in net assets as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted based upon the existence and nature of any donor or legally imposed restrictions.

#### Assets Limited As To Use

Assets limited as to use include (1) assets restricted by donors and under deferred compensation arrangements and (2) assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes

#### Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for uncollectible accounts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for uncollectible accounts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payer has not yet paid, or for payers who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely)

For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated or provided by policy) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts

## Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

The Hospital's allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients increased from 87% of self-pay accounts receivable at September 30, 2012, to 88% of self-pay accounts receivable at September 30, 2013. In addition, the Hospital's write-offs decreased approximately \$3,074,000 from approximately \$20,560,000 for the year ended September 30, 2012, to approximately \$17,486,000 for the year ended September 30, 2013. Changes were the result of trends experienced in the collection of amounts from self-pay patients in fiscal year 2013.

#### Inventory

The Hospital states supply inventories at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method, or market

#### Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost and are depreciated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of each asset. Assets under capital lease obligations and leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives.

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

#### Long-Lived Asset Impairment

The Hospital evaluates the recoverability of the carrying value of long-lived assets whenever events or circumstances indicate the carrying amount may not be recoverable. If a long-lived asset is tested for recoverability and the undiscounted estimated future cash flows expected to result from the use and eventual disposition of the asset is less than the carrying amount of the asset, the asset cost is adjusted to fair value and an impairment loss is recognized as the amount by which the carrying amount of a long-lived asset exceeds its fair value. No asset impairment was recognized during the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012.

#### **Deferred Financing Costs**

Deferred financing costs represent costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt Such costs are being amortized over the term of the respective debt using the straight-line method

#### Goodwill

The Hospital acquired certain physician practices for prices in excess of the fair value of identifiable assets, thereby generating goodwill. The Hospital evaluates goodwill annually for impairment. If the implied fair value of goodwill is lower than its carrying amount, a goodwill

impairment is indicated and goodwill is written down to its implied fair value. Subsequent increases in goodwill value are not recognized in financial statements. No goodwill impairment was recognized in 2013 or 2012.

#### Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity

#### Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known

#### Charity Care

The Hospital provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

#### **Contributions**

Unconditional gifts expected to be collected within one year are reported at their net realizable value. Unconditional gifts expected to be collected in future years are initially reported at fair value determined using the discounted present value of estimated future cash flows technique. The resulting discount is amortized using the level-yield method and is reported as contribution revenue.

Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions. Conditional contributions are reported as liabilities until the condition is eliminated or the contributed assets are returned to the donor.

#### Professional Liabilities Claims

The Hospital recognizes an accrual for claim liabilities based on estimated ultimate losses and costs associated with settling claims and a receivable to reflect the estimated insurance recoveries, if any Professional liability claims are described more fully in  $Note\ 6$ 

#### Income Taxes

The Hospital has been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. However, the Hospital is subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

The Hospital files tax returns in the U S federal jurisdiction. With a few exceptions, the Hospital is no longer subject to U S federal examinations by tax authorities for years before 2009.

#### Deficiency of Revenues Over Expenses

The statements of operations include deficiency of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from deficiency of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include permanent transfers to and from affiliates for other than goods and services and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets)

#### Self-Insurance

The Hospital has elected to self-insure certain costs related to employee health and accident benefit programs. Costs resulting from noninsured losses are charged to income when incurred

#### Transfers Between Fair Value Hierarchy Levels

Transfers in and out of Level 1 (quoted market prices). Level 2 (other significant observable inputs) and Level 3 (significant unobservable inputs) are recognized on the period ending date

#### Electronic Health Records Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Records Incentive Program, enacted as part of the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009*, provides for one-time incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health records technology (EHR) Payments under the Medicare program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula. Payments under the Medicaid program are generally made for up to four years based upon a statutory formula, as determined by the state, which is approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Payment under both programs are contingent on the hospital continuing to meet escalating meaningful use criteria and any other specific requirements that are applicable for the reporting period. The final amount for any payment year is determined based upon an audit by the fiscal intermediary. Events could occur that would cause the final amounts to differ materially from the initial payments under the program

The Hospital recognizes revenue only after management meets all of the meaningful use objectives and any other specific grant requirements applicable for the reporting period

The Hospital has recorded revenue of approximately \$2,075,000 and \$650,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, which is included in other revenue within operating revenues in the consolidated statement of operations

#### Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2012 financial statements to conform to the 2013 financial statement presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the change in net assets

#### Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of the Independent Auditor's Report, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued

#### Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payer coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Hospital records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. This provision for uncollectible accounts is presented on the statement of operations as a component of net patient service revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. These payment arrangements include

Medicare Inpatient acute care services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Inpatient skilled nursing services are paid at prospectively determined per diem rates that are based on the patients' acuity. Certain inpatient nonacute services are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospital is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor.

Medicaid Inpatient Medicaid services are reimbursed by using a payment per discharge system with case-mix adjustments based on a Diagnosis Related Group (DRG) system Outpatient Medicaid services are reimbursed at a certain percentage of allowable costs, with certain cost being reimbursed based on a prescribed fee schedule

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

At September 30, 2013, construction in progress primarily represents costs incurred for the replacement of the Hospital's operating room HVAC system and various information technology upgrades, which are expected to be completed during 2014. The Hospital has estimated the remaining cost to complete these projects to be approximately \$75,000. The additional costs to complete will be funded through operating cash flows.

#### Note 6: Professional Liability and Other Claims

The Hospital purchases medical malpractice insurance under a claims-made policy. Under such a policy, only claims made and reported to the insurer during the policy term, regardless of when the incidents giving rise to the claims occurred, are covered. The Hospital also purchases excess umbrella liability coverage, which provides additional coverage above the basic policy limits up to the amount specified in the umbrella policy.

Based upon the Hospital's claims experience, an accrual had been made for the Hospital's estimated medical malpractice costs, including costs associated with litigating or settling claims, under its malpractice insurance policy, amounting to approximately \$471,442 and \$625,822 as of September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Based upon the Hospital's claims experience, an accrual had been made for the Hospital's estimated workers' compensation costs amounting to approximately \$430,992 and \$191,521 as of September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. An estimate of proceeds to be received from the Hospital's insurance providers of \$253,614 and \$346,801 for malpractice claims and \$430,922 and \$191,521 for workers' compensation claims as of September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, has been recorded in other assets. It is reasonably possible that this estimate could change materially in the near term

(A) In December 2010, the Hospital entered into an agreement with the North Carolina Medical Care Commission (the "Commission") whereby the Commission issued \$22,160,000 of North Carolina Medical Care Commission Health Care Facilities Revenue and Refunding Bonds. Series 2010 (Series 2010 Bonds) The Hospital used \$8,140,000 of the proceeds to advance refund the outstanding portions of the Series 2001 Bonds. The remaining proceeds of the bond issuance will be used to finance the capital projects and pay for the costs of issuance. The 2010 Bonds are variable rate bonds (1.58% and 1.61% at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively). The Bonds are payable in monthly installments of \$75,000 beginning December 1, 2012, with monthly payments increasing annually to \$135,000 through maturity on December 1, 2030. The Bonds are secured by the Hospital's net revenues, accounts receivable and general intangibles.

Upon issuance the Hospital entered into a Reimbursement Note with a financial institution that is due on demand with 180-day notice, however, a mandatory purchase cannot occur until December 16, 2017, or after At such time, the direct placement can be extended with the financial institution, an alternate financial institution could be obtained or the note could convert to a weekly, long-term or adjustable interest rate mode

The Series 2010 Bonds Loan Agreement and Revenue Note requires the Hospital to comply with certain restrictive covenants, including maintaining a debt service coverage ratio, unrestricted liquid asset ratio and debt to capitalization ratio among others

#### Note 8: Derivative Financial Instrument

As a strategy to maintain acceptable levels of exposure to the risk of changes in future cash flows due to interest rate risk, the Hospital entered into an interest rate swap agreement with a financial institution in conjunction with a portion of the \$22,160,000 Bonds (see *Note* 7 (A)) on December 16, 2010 The agreement provides for the Hospital to receive interest from the counterparty equivalent to the 30-day LIBOR rate times a multiplier of 0 68 plus the bank credit spread of 1 4625 and to pay interest to the counterparty at a fixed rate of 4 13% At September 30.

2013 and 2012, the notional amount was \$10,705,000 and \$11,042,500, respectively. Under the agreement, beginning on the effective date of December 1, 2012, the Hospital will pay or receive the net interest amount monthly, with the monthly settlements included in interest expense. The swap expires on December 1, 2017. Through a credit support agreement with the counterparty, the interest rate swap agreement is secured by the Hospital's net revenues, accounts receivable and general intangibles.

The fair value of the interest rate swap agreement was \$(807.753) and \$(1.085.621) at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, which is included as a noncurrent liability on the consolidated balance sheets. The change in fair value thereof for 2013 and 2012, which was a gain of \$277.868 and a loss of \$340.397, respectively, is included in other income (expense) in the consolidated statements of operations. The monthly cash flow settlements of the interest rate swap agreement were \$232.505 and \$0, for September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and are included within interest expense in the consolidated statement of operations.

#### Note 9: Employee Benefits

The Hospital sponsors a defined contribution retirement plan (the "Retirement Plan"), organized under Section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code, for all employees who work at least 1,000 hours per year. The Retirement Plan provides tax-deferred annuities to its participants. In January 2009, the Hospital amended the Retirement Plan and discontinued making matching contributions at that time

The Hospital also provides a 457(b) deferred compensation plan. The plan is eligible to certain key employees of the Hospital. The plans consist of salary reduction only and there are no contributions by the Hospital. Under the terms of the plans, the deferred compensation liability and related assets limited as to use are recorded by the Hospital and are subject to the general creditors of the Hospital. At September 30, 2013 and 2012, the investment balance in these plans is \$495,179 and \$326,731, respectively.

#### Note 14: Disclosures About Fair Value of Financial Instruments

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value.

#### Investments

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, securities are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using quoted prices of securities with similar characteristics or independent asset pricing services and pricing models, the inputs of which are market-based or independently sourced market parameters, including, but not limited to, yield curves, interest rates, volatilities, prepayments, defaults, cumulative loss projections and cash flows. Such securities are classified in Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, securities are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy.

#### Interest Rate Swap Agreement

#### Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Hospital is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Hospital's self-insurance program discussed elsewhere in these notes or by commercial insurance, for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The Hospital evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

#### Investments

The Hospital invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying balance sheets

#### Voluntary Disclosure of Regulator Matter

As a result of an internal investigation, the Hospital voluntarily disclosed a matter regarding billing of certain pathology services to the Office of Inspector General. The Hospital reached a final settlement during 2013 of \$706,000, of which \$261,500 was refunded in prior years, and final payment of \$444,500 made during 2013. As of September 30, 2013 and 2012, the Health System had \$0 and \$841,000 accrued within estimated amounts due to third-party payers. No loss related to this matter was recorded in 2013 or 2012.

#### **Economic Conditions**

The current protracted economic decline continues to present hospitals with difficult circumstances and challenges, which in some cases have resulted in large and unanticipated declines in the fair value of investments and other assets, large declines in contributions, constraints on liquidity and difficulty obtaining financing. The financial statements have been prepared using values and information currently available to the Hospital

Current economic conditions, including the high unemployment rate, have made it difficult for certain patients to pay for services rendered. As employers make adjustments to health insurance plans or more patients become unemployed, services provided to self-pay and other payers may significantly impact net patient service revenue, which could have an adverse impact on the Hospital's future operating results. Further, the effect of economic conditions on the state may have an adverse effect on cash flows related to the Medicaid Program

Given the volatility of current economic conditions, the values of assets and liabilities recorded in the financial statements could change rapidly, resulting in material future adjustments in investment values and allowances for accounts and pledges receivable that could negatively impact the Hospital's ability to meet debt covenants or maintain sufficient liquidity

#### Note 16: Medicaid Enhancement Programs

The Hospital participates in two voluntary North Carolina Medicaid programs designed to reduce the disparity between cost of providing service to Medicaid and the uninsured population and reimbursement received. The Hospital has historically participated in the Medicaid Reimbursement Initiative and recognized supplemental Medicaid reimbursement of approximately \$844,000 and \$906,000 in net patient services revenues for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, under this program

During 2011, the State of North Carolina enacted legislation (the "GAP Assessment Program") intended to implement a program such that the State can further supplement existing deficits in providing Medicaid and uninsured costs. The GAP Assessment Program was approved by CMS during 2012, retroactive to 2011. The Hospital paid assessments of approximately \$1,740,000 and \$2,764,000 in 2012, which are recorded as a component of supplies and other within the statement of operations. The Hospital receives approximately \$4,734,000 for 2013 and \$8,524,000 in 2012 of supplemental Medicaid funds, which was recorded as a component of net patient service revenue. Included within the 2012 amounts above are assessments of \$1,110,000 and supplemental Medicaid funds of \$3,970,000, related to retroactively applying the program to 2011.

Currently, management has estimated that no funds are expected to be repaid under these programs, however, it is reasonably possible that circumstances could change materially in the near term

#### Note 17: Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) will substantially reform the United States health care system. The legislation impacts multiple aspects of the health care system, including many provisions that change payments from Medicare, Medicaid and insurance companies. Starting in 2014, the legislation requires the establishment of health insurance exchanges, which will provide individuals without employer provided health care coverage the opportunity to purchase insurance. It is anticipated that some employers currently offering insurance to employees will opt to have employees seek insurance coverage through the insurance exchanges. It is possible that the reimbursement rates paid by insurers participating in the insurance exchanges may be substantially different than rates paid under current health insurance products. Another significant component of the PPACA is the expansion of the Medicaid program to a wide range of newly eligible individuals. In anticipation of this expansion, payments under certain existing programs, such as Medicare disproportionate share, will be substantially decreased. Each state's participation in an expanded Medicaid program is optional.


The state of North Carolina has initially indicated it will not expand the Medicaid program, which may result in revenues from newly covered individuals not offsetting the Hospital's reduced revenue from other Medicaid programs

## Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2013 and 2012

The PPACA is extremely complex and may be difficult for the federal government and each state to implement. While the overall impact of the PPACA cannot currently be estimated, it is possible that it will have a negative impact on the Hospital's net patient service revenue. Additionally, it is possible the Hospital will experience payment delays and other operational challenges during PPACA's implementation.

#### Note 18: Joint Venture with Duke LifePoint Healthcare, LLC

As of September 9, 2013, the Rutherford Hospital Inc. and Affiliates Board of Trustees has advanced efforts to strengthen the Hospital and enhance its ability to provide outstanding care to patients in Rutherford County and surrounding areas, by signing a memorandum of understanding to form a joint venture with Duke LifePoint Healthcare, LLC. Under the terms of the proposed joint venture, the Hospital will hold a 20 percent interest and Duke LifePoint will obtain an 80 percent interest to share in ownership of the hospital system. Governance would be shared equally between the Hospital and Duke LifePoint, giving the community a long-term voice in the Hospital's strategic direction. The Board of Trustees and management are activity working on a definitive agreement to be finalized in the near future.
