1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

T. J. Samson Community Hospital (the Hospital) was established in 1929, as a not-for-profit corporation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Hospital serves the city of Glasgow, Barren County, and surrounding counties

To facilitate the implementation of its strategic plan of becoming a regional provider and increased participation in physician practice ownership, the Organization was reorganized on January 1, 2011

As part of this reorganization, two new entities were formed T J Regional Health, Inc , (TJRH) and T. J. Health Partners, LLC TJRH was formed as a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization and serves as the parent organization of the Hospital and the LLC T J. Health Partners, LLC (Partners) is considered a pass-through entity to TJRH, the sole member of the LLC. Partners is the company that operates all physician-related practices

Basis of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of T J. Regional Health, Inc., and its wholly-owned subsidiaries, T J Samson Community Hospital (a not-for-profit corporation) and T. J. Health Partners, LLC (a limited liability company). All significant intercompany transactions and account balances have been eliminated in consolidation.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements, as well as reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investments

Certificates of deposit, demand deposits, money market funds, and similar negotiable instruments that are not reported as cash and cash equivalents are reported as investments at contract value, which approximates fair value

Mutual funds are reported at fair value based on the fund's market price. Other investments are generally reported at fair value. See Note 6 for fair value information.

Investment income, including changes in the fair value of investments, is reported as nonoperating income in the consolidated statement of activities. Due to the nature of these investments, substantially all of the investment income is interest income.

Patient Accounts Receivable

Patient accounts receivable are stated at net realizable value. The Hospital and Partners maintain allowances for uncollectible accounts and for estimated losses resulting from a payor's inability to make payments on accounts. Management estimates the allowance for uncollectible accounts based on their assessment of historical and expected net collections considering historical and

current business and economic conditions, trends in healthcare coverage, and other collection indicators. Accounts receivable are charged to the allowance for uncollectible accounts when they are deemed uncollectible.

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost or market with cost being determined on the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method. Inventory consists of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals

Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment are stated at cost, or donor's basis if donated. The assets are depreciated on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets, in accordance with American Hospital Association guidelines. The useful lives are as follows

Buildings 10-50 Years Improvements 10-20 Years Equipment and Fixtures 5-10 Years

Costs for repairs and maintenance that do not add to an asset's value or estimated useful life are expensed as incurred. When items are disposed of, the cost and accumulated depreciation are removed, and any gain or loss is included in the results of operations

Intangibles

All intangibles are indefinite-lived assets. No amortization is recorded.

Asset Impairment

Management considers whether indicators of impairment are present and performs the necessary tests to determine if the carrying value of an asset is appropriate. Impairment write-downs are recognized in operating income at the time the impairment is identified. There was no impairment of long-lived assets recognized in 2013 or 2012.

Bond Issuance Cost and Bond Discount

Management provides for the amortization of costs incurred for the issuance of bonds over the life of the bonds. Management also amortizes the bond discounts using the effective interest method over the life of the related debt.

Income Taxes

- T. J. Regional Health, Inc., is a not-for-profit corporation, determined as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- T. J. Samson Community Hospital is also a not-for-profit corporation and has been recognized as tax-exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3).
- T. J. Health Partners, LLC, is a single member limited liability company organized in Kentucky. The sole member is T. J. Regional Health, Inc

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - CONCLUDED

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital and Partners have agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from their established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per admission or visit, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net amount due from patients and third-party payors for services rendered, including estimated adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors, certain of which are subject to audit by administering agencies. These adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis and are adjusted, as needed, in future periods.

Advertising

The Organization's advertising consists of media promotion and human resource opportunities. The expense is recognized as incurred, or the first time the advertising takes place. Total advertising costs expensed for years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, was \$652,643 and \$641,176.

Consolidated Statements of Cash Flows

For the purpose of consolidated statements of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include demand deposits and highly liquid short-term investments with maturities of ninety days or less from date of purchase.

Charity Care

T J Samson Community Hospital provides care to patients regardless of their ability to pay. The Hospital developed a Charity Care Policy for both the uninsured and the underinsured. Under the policy, patients are offered discounts of up to 100% of charges on a sliding scale, which is based on income as a percentage of the Federal Poverty Level guidelines (up to 200%). Since the Hospital does not pursue collection of these amounts, they are not reported as net patient revenue, and the cost of providing such care is recognized within operating expenses.

The Hospital estimates the direct and indirect cost of providing charity care by applying a cost to charge ratio to the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing charity care to patients. The cost of providing charity care was \$1,866,143 and \$2,379,680 for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012.

2. NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

The Organization provides care to patients under payment arrangements with Medicare, Medicaid, Anthem, other managed care programs, and other third-party payors. Services provided under those arrangements are paid at predetermined rates and/or reimbursable costs, as defined Reported costs and/or services provided under certain of the arrangements are subject to retroactive audit and adjustment. Changes in Medicare and Medicaid programs and reduction of funding levels could have an adverse effect on the Organization.

Provision has been made in the accompanying consolidated financial statements for contractual adjustments, which represent the difference between the standard charges for services and the actual or estimated payment.

2. NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE - CONCLUDED

The Organization grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix by payor source of patient accounts receivable, before deducting estimated uncollectibles, for 2013 and 2012, was as follows

6. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The carrying values of cash and cash equivalents, patient accounts receivable, estimated receivables from third-party payors as well as accounts payable, accrued expenses, other current liabilities, and short-term borrowings are reasonable estimates of their fair values due to the short-term nature of these financial instruments. The estimated fair value of the long-term debt portfolio, including the current portion, approximates the carrying amount.

The methodologies used to determine fair value of assets and liabilities reflect market participant objectives and are based on the applications of a three-level valuation hierarchy that prioritizes observable market inputs over unobservable inputs. The three levels are defined as follows:

- Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets
- Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument
- Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable but reflect the assumptions market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability.

A financial instrument's categorization within the valuation hierarchy is based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

8. BONDS PAYABLE

In April 2012, the Hospital refinanced its remaining Series 1998 bonds. The principal amount of \$7.65 million was refinanced with JP Morgan Chase, maturing over the next six years, with a variable interest rate, currently between 1.00% to 2.00%. Closing costs in the amount of \$132,000 are being amortized over the life of the indenture.

In August 2011, the Hospital issued \$30 million of revenue bonds. The rates of interest vary and range from 3 85% to 6 45%. The proceeds of the bonds have been used to acquire, construct, renovate, and/or equip a healthcare facility for various outpatient services as well as a medical office building. Principal on the bonds is paid annually with interest paid semi-annually. Payment on this issue began February 1, 2013, and ends February 1, 2041.

The bonds are collateralized by real property carried at an approximate amount of \$35 million. Discount and bond issue costs in connection with the bonds in the amount of \$950,004 are being amortized over the life of the bonds

Interest during the construction period has been capitalized, in the amount of \$1,166,711 and \$1,940,080 for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012.

9. RETIREMENT PLANS

Defined Benefit Plan

In March 2011, the Hospital approved a soft freeze for its defined benefit pension plan, effective October 2011. No new participants will be admitted to the plan; however, current participants will stay in the plan and accrue benefits. At their September 2013 board meeting, the plan sponsor's directors approved a hard freeze of the plan, effective January 1, 2014. Further accumulation of benefits ceased, as other retirement benefits are now available to employees. The Hospital's funding policy is to contribute funds to a trust as necessary to provide for current service and for any unfunded projected benefit obligation over a reasonable period. Employer contributions for the year ended September 30, 2013, were \$2,771,017; benefits paid out were \$2,745,369. The expected contributions for the year ending September 30, 2014, are \$3,260,000. There are no expected refunds of previously made contributions.

Basis Used to Determine Expected Long-Term Return on Plan Assets - The expected long-term return on plan assets assumption was developed as a weighted average rate based on the target asset allocation of the plan and the long-term capital market assumptions. Plan Assets - The Hospital's overall investment strategy for the plan is to provide a regular and reliable source of income to meet the liquidity needs of the pension plan and minimize reliance on plan sponsor contributions as a source of benefit security. The Hospital's investment policy includes various guidelines and procedures designed to ensure assets are invested in a manner necessary to meet expected future benefits earned by participants. The target allocation ranges by major asset classes are central to the investment policy. The objective of the target allocations is to ensure assets are invested with the intent to protect pension plan assets so that such assets are preserved for the provision of benefits to participants and their beneficiaries and such long-term growth as may maximize the amounts available to provide such benefits without undue risk. Also considered are the weighted average return of a capital markets model and historical returns on comparable equity, debt, and other investments. Defined Contribution Plans

The Organization also sponsors a 403(b) plan covering substantially all full-time employees of Regional and the Hospital For the year ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital made contributions in the amount of \$368,058 and \$354,434.

Partners sponsor a 401(k) Plan covering substantially all of its employees. The plan includes an employer matching contribution of up to 5% of compensation. Employer and employee contributions are self-directed by plan participants. Employer contributions to the plan for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, were \$343,044 and \$253,539.

10. SELF-INSURANCE ACCRUALS

The Organization is self-insured up to certain limits for employee healthcare benefits. At September 30, 2013, the estimated liability accrued is \$1,154,461. The Organization accounts for these costs through measurement of claims outstanding and projected payments. Such measurement requires the consideration of historical cost experience and judgments about the present and expected levels of cost per claim. The Organization believes the use of this method provides a consistent and effective way to measure this accrual. However, the use of any estimation technique is inherently sensitive, given the claims involved and the length of time until the ultimate cost is known. Changes in healthcare costs and other factors can materially affect the estimates for this liability

12. JOINT VENTURES

T J. Samson Community Hospital, Inc , and Bowling Green-Warren County Community Hospital Corporation entered into a 50% ownership agreement in the Barren River Regional Cancer Center, Inc., on February 13, 2003. The Barren River Regional Cancer Center, Inc , is organized exclusively as a charitable organization, currently providing radiation oncology services for residents of Barren and surrounding counties.

The Ambulance Service Corporation, Inc , a non-stock, non-profit corporation, is a joint venture involving the following entities: Barren County, Kentucky, City of Glasgow, Kentucky; Metcalfe County, Kentucky, and T J Samson Community Hospital. A joint venture is a legal entity or other

organization that results from a contractual arrangement and that is owned, operated, or governed by two or more participants as a separate and specific activity subject to joint control in which the participants retain an ongoing financial interest or an ongoing financial responsibility. The purpose of this joint venture is to provide emergency medical care service and transportation to the citizens of Barren County, City of Glasgow, and Metcalfe County

13. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Organization to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of temporary cash investments and accounts receivable. The Hospital places its temporary cash investments with various financial institutions and limits the amount of credit exposure to any one financial institution. Concentrations of credit risk with respect to receivables are limited due to the large number of accounts comprising the Hospital's patient base and their dispersion across different demographic and geographic groups. However, approximately 74% and 78% of inpatient days for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, were for Medicare and Medicaid recipients.

14. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

From time to time, the Hospital is named as a defendant in court cases involving various claims. According to correspondence from the Hospital's legal counsel, there are several cases pending at this time. The Hospital and its insurance carriers are defending the claims. It is impossible to predict if the Hospital will have any liability beyond its policy limits.

The Hospital is committed under various agreements from time to time in the normal course of business. One significant commitment at September 30, 2013, is for anesthesiology services. A contract with Anesthesiology Associates of Glasgow, PSC, requires annual payments of \$300,000 for the primary term, which expired August 31, 2009, and is renewable from year-to-year.

The Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has contracted with four Recovery Audit Contractors (RACs) to conduct recovery audits for improper Medicare payments from healthcare providers throughout the United States. A demonstration project from 2005 - 2008 covering six states resulted in \$900 million in improper payments being returned to Medicare, while \$38 million in underpayments were refunded to healthcare providers. CGI is the RAC for Region B, which includes Kentucky. Healthcare providers have had some automated reviews and requests for medical records. Reviews may take place of any Medicare services paid as of October 1, 2007. At this time, there is no definitive way to estimate the potential financial risk to T. J. Regional Health, Inc. Policies and procedures are in place to accept and respond to requests and to prepare appeals on denied claims. Various risk areas already evaluated have not revealed significant weaknesses.

The Hospital has received notification from the Office of Inspector General (OIG) of a potential civil monetary penalty following an administrative action and subsequent resolution by Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). The Hospital's attorneys are negotiating with OIG. The amount of any penalty is undetermined at this time; however, it is not expected to be a material amount.

14. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES - CONCLUDED

The Hospital has entered into a contract with Siemens Medical Solutions USA, Inc. Under the agreement, Siemens provides information systems operations managed services, including equipment, software, and support, as well as personnel. As a part of the transition, the managed services have replaced the Hospital's HIS department. The contract requires equipment and software costs in the approximate amount of \$5.7 million. In addition, the Managed Services Agreement will require payments over the next ten years of \$2 - \$3 million annually. The new system will enable the Hospital to comply with recent changes in Medicare requirements. Upon timely completion and approval, the Hospital has been compensated by Medicare for approximately \$3 million, and expects another \$400,000 after the next attestation period

15. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management has evaluated subsequent events through March 21, 2014, the date the financial statements were available to be issued
