	Consistent with our spiritual foundation, Baptist Health South Florida and its affiliates (Baptist Health) are dedicated to providing high-quality, cost-effective compassionate healthcare services to all, including, as permitted by our resources, charity care to those in need During the fiscal year ended September 33 Baptist Health provided patient services to the South Florida area with 71,681 adult admissions, 342,942 patient days, and 313,116 emergency room visits that same time period, urgent care visits totaled 242,177, outpatient surgery cases 48,441, and other outpatient visits were 482,315 system-wide. As of Sci 30, 2013 the system had 1,713 licensed beds comprised of 1,296 routine general medical surgical, 140 obstetrics, 85 meonatal intensive care unit, 57 pedia intensive care, 23 rehabilitation. In total Baptist Health provided more than \$364,445,084 in community benefit during its 2013 fiscal year. We provided chardward at \$104,488,000 as well as \$200,875,500 in uncompensated services. The estimated cost of providing charity services and uncompensated services on recent historical cost-to-charge ratios for charity patients and Medicaid patients from BHSF's cost accounting system, applied to the current period gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity and Medicaid patients. We also contributed \$24,946,000 to the indigent care fund and exp \$5,253,000 for educational programs, screenings, corporate sponsorships and donations. Free community health and wellness programs covered topics rain insomnia and food safety to diabetes and weight control. In addition, Baptist Health provided free screenings for cholesterol, blood pressure, body composit osteoporosis. Baptist Health also helped those in need of primary care services by donating approximately \$2,295,000 to neighborhood Not-For-Profit clinic. the Open Door Health Center in Homestead, the South Mami Children's Center in South Miami and the Good Health Clinic in Taveriner. ## NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEARS ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2013 AND 2012

#### 1 ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Baptist Health South Florida, Inc ("BHSF" or "Baptist Health"), a not-for-profit Florida corporation located in Miami-Dade County, Florida, is the parent of a system of not-for-profit hospitals and other not-for-profit and for-profit corporations

Mission - The mission of Baptist Health is to improve the health and well-being of individuals, and to promote the sanctity and preservation of life, in the communities it serves Baptist Health is a faith-based organization guided by the spirit of Jesus Christ and the Judeo-Christian ethic, and is committed to maintaining the highest standards of clinical and service excellence, rooted in the utmost integrity and moral practice. Consistent with its spiritual foundation. Baptist Health is dedicated to providing high-quality, cost-effective, compassionate healthcare services to all, regardless of religion, creed, race or national origin, including, as permitted by its resources, charity care to those in need

Organization - The not-for-profit hospitals comprising BHSF are Baptist Hospital of Miami, Inc ("Baptist Hospital"). Doctors Hospital, Inc ("Doctors Hospital"). Homestead Hospital, Inc ("Homestead Hospital"), South Miami Hospital, Inc ("South Miami Hospital") and West Kendall Baptist Hospital, Inc ("West Kendall Baptist Hospital"), all located in south Miami-Dade County, Florida, and Mariners Hospital, Inc ("Mariners Hospital") located in Monroe County, Florida (collectively, the "BHSF Hospitals") BHSF also includes Baptist Outpatient Services. Inc ("BOS"), a not-for-profit Florida corporation, which owns and operates two large diagnostic imaging centers, one located on the Baptist Hospital campus, and a second center located on the West Kendall Baptist Hospital campus, 13 satellite diagnostic imaging facilities in Miami-Dade and Broward counties, and a home health agency, and manages 16 urgent care centers, of which seven operate under the license of Baptist Hospital and nine under the license of South Miami Hospital, and Baptist Health South Florida Foundation. Inc (the "Foundation"), a Florida not-for-profit corporation, whose purpose is to raise funds for the BHSF Hospitals and BOS

Baptist Health Enterprises, Inc ("BHE") is a for-profit Florida corporation, which is wholly owned by BHSF BHE's lines of business include real estate, outpatient surgery centers, sleep diagnostic centers, collection services, and a network of physicians designed to promote quality care. BHE is the general partner and the owner of all the limited partnership interests in Kendall Professional Center, Ltd., doing business as Baptist Medical Arts Building ("BMAB"), a Florida limited partnership that owns a professional office building and parking garage, located adjacent to Baptist Hospital on land leased from Baptist Hospital BHE owns 100% of the stock of BMAB East Tower. Inc ("East Tower"), a for-profit Florida corporation which owns a second medical office building, located adjacent to Baptist Hospital on land leased from Baptist Hospital BHE also owns a medical office building and parking garage, located on the South Miami Hospital campus on land leased from South Miami Hospital Other wholly-owned subsidiaries of BHE include Kendall Credit and Business Service. Inc., an entity that provides collection services, Baptist Ancillary Services, Inc., Baptist Sleep Centers, LLC., Baptist Health Quality Network, LLC, and Baptist Medical Services, Corp., an entity that owns an interest in BHS Ambulatory Surgical Center at Baptist, Ltd., doing business as Medical Arts Surgery Center ("MASC at Baptist"), a free-standing, multi-specialty surgery center, of 67% and 68% as of September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Baptist Ancillary Services, Inc. is the corporate parent of Baptist Ambulatory Services, Inc ("BAS"), a wholly-owned subsidiary, which is the managing member of, and currently owns a 62% interest in. Baptist Surgery and Endoscopy Centers, LLC ("BSEC") BSEC is organized as a single partnership that holds investments in multiple ambulatory surgery center divisions, namely Medical Arts Surgery Center at South Miami ("MASC at South Miami"), a multi-specialty, ambulatory surgical center, Galloway Endoscopy Center ("GEC") and Baptist Endoscopy Center at Coral Springs, two free-standing, single-specialty surgery centers. specializing in outpatient endoscopy procedures. Baptist Sleep Centers, LLC, a Florida single-member limited liability company, owns a 60% controlling interest in two sleep diagnostic centers. Baptist Sleep Centers of South Florida, LLC and Baptist Sleep Center at Galloway, LLC Baptist Health Quality Network, LLC, ("BHQN") is a Florida single-member LLC. organizing a clinically integrated network of physicians designed to promote quality initiatives

In September 2002, BHSF formed Pineapple Insurance Company ("PIC"), a single-parent. Cayman Islands captive insurance company, to facilitate BHSF's professional and general liability, self-insurance and property insurance programs, including contracting for reinsurance (see Note 8). In January 2006, Samaritan Risk Retention Group, Inc. ("SRRG" and together with PIC, the "Insurance Companies") was licensed to transact business under the laws of the state of South Carolina. SRRG is also chartered as a risk retention group and is registered to conduct business in the state of Florida. SRRG was organized for the purpose of offering professional liability insurance to physicians who meet the company's underwriting requirements, are Florida-licensed, practicing physicians and have privileges to treat patients at BHSF facilities. In March 2006, SRRG issued a surplus note in the amount of \$5,000,000 to BHSF. Until the note is satisfied, the governing Board of Directors of SRRG is elected by proxy and controlled by BHSF.

In April 2005, Baptist Cardiac & Vascular Institute Management Company, LLC ("BCVI Management Company"), a Florida limited liability corporation, was formed. Baptist Hospital has a 50% interest in BCVI Management Company, which was established to provide management services for the Baptist Cardiac and Vascular Institute, in order to improve clinical performance and achieve operational efficiency. Baptist Hospital's investment in BCVI Management Company is accounted for using the equity method. At September 30, 2013 and 2012, Baptist Hospital's investment in BCVI Management Company was approximately \$1,507,000 and \$1,318,000, respectively, and is recorded in other assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

BHSF, certain BHSF Hospitals, and BOS control several affiliated physician practices ("Baptist Health Medical Group") as the sole member or through contractual arrangements. These physician practices provide a variety of specialty physician services.

<u>Basis of Presentation</u> - The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of BHSF, the BHSF Hospitals, BOS, Baptist Health Medical Group, the Foundation, BHE and subsidiaries, and Insurance Companies — All intercompany transactions have been eliminated in consolidation

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant estimates and assumptions are used for, but not limited to recognition of net patient service revenue, valuation of accounts receivable, including contractual allowances and provisions for doubtful accounts, reserves for losses and expenses related to employee healthcare and professional and general liability risks, asset impairments, including goodwill, and estimated third-party settlements. Future events and their effects cannot be predicted with certainty, accordingly, management's accounting estimates require the exercise of judgment. The accounting estimates used in the preparation of the accompanying consolidated financial statements will change as new events occur, as more experience is acquired, as additional information is obtained and as the operating environment changes. Management regularly evaluates the accounting policies and estimates it uses. In general, management relies on historical experience and on other assumptions believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, and may employ outside experts to assist in the evaluation, as considered necessary. Although management believes all adjustments considered necessary for fair presentation have been included, actual results may vary from those estimates.

<u>Community Benefits</u> - In pursuing its mission. BHSF provides services to the financially disadvantaged and to the broader community in which it operates, despite the lack or adequacy of payment for those services. These services are categorized as follows

<u>Charity Care</u> - BHSF provides a level of charity care that is consistent with the needs of the community it serves and the financial resources that are available. All or a portion of the charges incurred at established rates are classified as charity by reference to BHSF's established policies. Essentially, these policies define charitable services as those for which no payment is anticipated. In assessing a patient's ability to pay. BHSF utilizes generally recognized poverty income levels for the respective community, but also includes certain cases where incurred charges are considered to be beyond the patient's ability to pay. In addition, BHSF provides services to other indigent patients under various state and local programs which pay healthcare providers amounts which are less than the cost of the services provided. Because BHSF does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, such amounts are not reported as revenue in the accompanying consolidated financial statements (see Note 2)

Other Community Benefits - BHSF has entered into agreements to pay certain physician specialists for healthcare they provide to BHSF's charity care patients. In addition to the services that are provided to the financially disadvantaged. BHSF provides services to the broader community. These services include educational programs, community information on health services, donations and the cost of healthcare in excess of payments for patients under federal and state programs.

Treasury Policy - BHSF has a system-wide treasury policy, which recognizes its responsibility to oversee, manage, and coordinate all affiliate operations, including the treasury functions. BHSF serves as the centralized cash receipt and disbursing agent for all BHSF entities. The treasury policy provides that each BHSF affiliate's unrestricted cash and investments be transferred to BHSF, and that BHSF shall provide or arrange for advances and loans to its affiliates and will utilize the cash and investments held by it to provide financial support for the BHSF Hospitals and the other corporations comprising the system. These transfers have been eliminated in consolidation. Debt and related issuance costs are allocated to affiliates based on the use of debt proceeds.

New Accounting Pronouncements - Effective October 1, 2012. BHSF adopted the provisions of Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") 2011-07. Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Services Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities ("ASU 2011-07") ASU 2011-07 requires certain healthcare entities to change the presentation of their statement of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts). Additionally, those healthcare entities are required to provide enhanced disclosure about their policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. ASU 2011-07 also requires disclosures of patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts), as well as qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The accompanying consolidated statements of operations and Note 3 have been retrospectively restated to reflect the adoption of ASU 2011-07

Effective October 1, 2012, BHSF prospectively adopted the provisions of ASU 2011-04, *Amendments to Achieve Common Fair Value Measurement and Disclosure Requirements in U.S. G.I.AP and IFRS* ("ASU 2011-04") ASU 2011-04 provides clarifying guidance on how to measure fair value and requires additional disclosures regarding fair value measurements. The expanded disclosures required by this guidance are included in Note 16. The adoption of ASU 2011-04 did not have a significant impact on BHSF's consolidated financial condition, results of operations or cash flows.

Effective October 1, 2012, BHSF adopted the provisions of ASU 2010-26, Financial Services—Insurance (Topic 944) Accounting for Costs Associated With Acquiring or Renewing Insurance Contracts ("ASU 2010-26") ASU 2010-26 specifies which costs relating to the acquisition of new or renewal insurance contracts qualify for deferral. The guidance permits deferral of qualifying costs only when associated with successful contract acquisitions. Internal selling agent and underwriter salary and benefit costs allocated to unsuccessful contracts, as well as advertising costs, are excluded. The adoption of ASU 2010-26 did not have a significant impact on BHSF's consolidated financial condition, results of operations or cash flows.

In October 2012, the Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") issued ASU 2012-05, Statement of Cash Flows (Topic 230) Not-for-Profit Entities—Classification of the Sale Proceeds of Donated Financial Assets in the Statement of Cash Flows ("ASU 2012-05")—ASU 2012-05 requires not-for-profit entities to classify cash receipts from the sale of donated financial assets consistently with cash donations received in the statement of cash flows if those cash receipts were from the sale of donated financial assets that upon receipt were directed without any not-for-profit-imposed limitations for sale and were converted nearly immediately into cash—ASU 2012-05 is effective prospectively for fiscal years, and interim periods within those years, beginning after June 15, 2013, with early adoption permitted but not required—Retrospective application to all prior periods presented upon the date of adoption is permitted—BHSF has not determined the impact to its consolidated financial statements from the adoption of this standard

In February 2013, the FASB issued ASU 2013-04, Liabilities (Topic 405). Obligations Resulting from Joint and Several Liability Arrangements for Which the Total Amount of the Obligation Is Fixed at the Reporting Date ("ASU 2013-04"). ASU 2013-04 provides guidance for the recognition, measurement, and disclosure of obligations resulting from joint and several liability arrangements. The new guidance requires entities to measure these obligations as the sum of the amount the reporting entity agreed to pay on the basis of its arrangement among its co-obligors and any additional amount the reporting entity expects to pay on behalf of its co-obligors. The new guidance is effective for fiscal years ending after December 15, 2013. BHSF has not determined the impact to its consolidated financial statements from the adoption of this standard.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u> - Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and cash in depository accounts maintained with various commercial banks, which exceed federally insured limits. Nonetheless, management periodically evaluates the creditworthiness of those institutions. BHSF has not experienced any losses on such deposits.

<u>Inventories</u> - Inventories, totaling approximately \$25,713,000 and \$22,859,000 at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, consisting primarily of pharmaceutical, medical and surgical supplies, are stated at average cost, and are included in other current assets in the consolidated balance sheets

Assets Whose Use is Limited and Other Investments - Assets whose use is limited include assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements and education, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes, note proceeds designated for capital improvements, insurance surplus reserves and assets held by a trustee under bond indenture agreements. Assets whose use is limited that are required for obligations classified as current liabilities are reported in current assets. Other investments are held by the Foundation and include certain assets whose use is restricted by donors (see Note 3)

BHSF manages the investment function based upon a comprehensive written investment policy approved by the Board of Trustees that provides for a diversified investment portfolio based upon return, risk, social values and projected liquidity requirements. Investment results, portfolio allocations and investment policy compliance are regularly reviewed with the Investment Review Committee of the Board of Trustees.

BHSF holds certain financial instruments with derivative features, including forward foreign exchange contracts and short sales of equity securities. BHSF records these derivatives at fair value in its consolidated balance sheets and records the changes in fair value of the derivatives as investment income in the consolidated statements of operations. The change in fair value of derivative instruments held by BHSF resulted in investment gains of approximately \$1.327,000 for the year ended September 30, 2013, and losses of approximately \$6.668,000 for the year ended September 30, 2012. BHSF also holds various hybrid financial instruments with embedded derivative features, including convertible preferred stock and convertible bonds.

BHSF records a liability for short sales and forward foreign exchange contracts that are in a loss position. The obligations arising from such transactions are recorded on a trade-date basis and carried at current market values. The majority of forward foreign exchange contract transactions are settled on a short-term basis. Contracts that are not subject to a master netting agreement represent obligations to settle the contract at a rate above the current market exchange rate. At September 30, 2013, and 2012, forward foreign exchange contract obligations totaled approximately \$5.059.000 and \$3.495.000, respectively. Short sale positions are held as part of a long-short equity investment strategy. At September 30, 2013, short sale obligations totaled approximately \$4.905.000. Both short sale and forward foreign exchange contract obligations are recorded in accrued expenses and other liabilities in the accompanying balance sheets.

Derivatives may expose BHSF to market risk or credit risk in excess of the amounts recorded in the consolidated balance sheets. Market risk on a derivative or foreign exchange product is the exposure created by potential fluctuations in interest rates, foreign exchange rates and other values, and is a function of the type of product, the volume of transactions, the tenor and terms of the agreement, and the underlying volatility. Credit risk is the exposure to loss in the event of nonperformance by the other party to the transaction, where the value of collateral held, if any, is not adequate to cover such losses Management does not believe that there are significant market or credit risks associated with these transactions, given BHSF's investment strategies and the overall characteristics of its investment portfolio

BHSF holds alternative investment interests in two limited partnerships as of September 30, 2013 and 2012. One of the partnerships was established to invest in a broad range of infrastructure and infrastructure-related assets located in member countries of the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development with a primary focus on the United States. Canada, Western Europe and Australia. The second partnership was established to construct and manage a well-diversified portfolio of publicly-traded equity securities issued by real estate investment trusts and other publicly-held real estate companies in North America. Europe and Asia. During the year ended September 30, 2013, BHSF also held an alternative investment in two Cayman Islands exempt companies. Both of the Cayman Islands exempt companies are commodity funds designed to be market neutral and non-directional and focus on various commodity interests, including physical commodities, forwards, exchange-listed futures, options and over-the-counter derivatives. One of these commodity funds was newly acquired during 2013, while the other commodity fund interest, which was held at September 30, 2012, was redeemed during 2013 (see Note 3). These investments are accounted for using the equity method and reported at fair value. All changes in BHSF's ownership interests are reflected in investment income. The carrying value of BHSF's interests in these partnerships and the Cayman Islands exempt company, as of September 30, 2013, and 2012, was approximately \$181,017,000 and \$153,954,000, respectively (see Note 3).

Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements.

<u>Property and Equipment - Net - Property</u> and equipment are stated at cost or, if donated, at fair market value on the date of donation, less the allowance for depreciation. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method using estimated useful lives ranging from two to forty years. Expenditures that materially increase values, change capacities or extend useful lives are capitalized, in addition to interest cost, during the period of construction. For qualifying assets, BHSF capitalizes interest cost until the assets are ready for their intended use. Gains and losses on dispositions are recorded in the year of disposal

Gifts of long-lived assets, such as land, buildings or equipment, are reported as a direct addition to unrestricted net assets, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as additions to temporarily or permanently restricted net assets. Absent explicit donor stipulations about

how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service. Property and equipment are more fully described in Note 4.

BHSF management is responsible for evaluating long-lived assets for impairment by monitoring internal and external environments for events and circumstances that would indicate that the carrying value of an asset may not be recoverable. When these events occur, management measures impairment by comparing the carrying amount of the asset to future undiscounted cash flows expected to result from the use of the asset and residual value. If the undiscounted cash flows are less than the net book value of the asset, an impairment loss based on the fair value of the asset is recognized.

Determination of the fair value of acquired long-lived assets involves certain judgments and estimates. Fair value estimates are derived from appraisals, established market values of comparable assets or internal estimates of future cash flows. These fair value estimates can change by material amounts in subsequent periods. Many factors and assumptions can impact the estimates, including future financial trends, changes in healthcare trends and regulations, and the nature of the ultimate disposition of assets. In some cases, these fair value estimates assume the highest and best use of hospital assets in the future to a market place participant other than a hospital

Impairment tests are based on programs and initiatives implemented or to be implemented that are designed to achieve the most recent projections. If these projections are not met or if in the future negative trends occur that impact our future outlook, impairments of long-lived assets may occur

Malpractice Liability Claims - Provisions for losses related to malpractice liability risks are based upon actuarially-determined estimates and represent the estimated ultimate net cost of all reported and unreported losses incurred through the respective balance sheet dates. Those estimates are subject to the effects of trends in loss severity and frequency. The estimates are reviewed and adjustments are recorded as experience develops or new information becomes known.

<u>Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets</u> - Temporarily restricted net assets are those for which use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets are those for which use is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time nor can be fulfilled or otherwise removed by actions of BHSF or its affiliates (see Note 7)

Excess of Revenues Over Expenses - The consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets), changes in the value of split-interest agreements, transfers from temporarily restricted net assets, changes in accumulated postretirement benefit obligation other than periodic benefit cost, purchase and sale of limited partnership interests and partnership distributions

Donor-Restricted Gifts - Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to BHSF and its affiliates are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Contingent promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the contingency is met. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support, if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets. Net assets released from restrictions used for operations are included in excess of revenues over expenses. Net assets released from restrictions used to purchase property and equipment are reported as a change in net assets.

Goodwill - Goodwill represents the excess of purchase price and related costs over the value assigned to net tangible assets and identifiable intangible assets of businesses acquired and accounted for under the acquisition method of accounting Goodwill has arisen from various acquisitions by affiliates of BHSF (see Note 5)

<u>Deferred Bond Issue Costs and Bond Premium</u> - Deferred bond issue costs and bond premium are being amortized and accreted using the bonds-outstanding method. For the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, amortization of bond issue costs totaled approximately \$368,000 and \$371,000, respectively, and accretion of bond premium totaled approximately \$1,101,000 and \$1,186,000, respectively.

<u>Indigent Care Assessment</u> - The Healthcare Consumer Protection and Awareness Act of 1984 created a fund to provide for the treatment of indigent patients. Hospitals in the state of Florida are required to pay into the fund an amount equal to 1.5% of net inpatient revenue and 1% of net outpatient revenue. The indigent care assessment is included in administrative and general expenses in the consolidated statements of operations.

Income and Other Taxes - BHSF, BHSF Hospitals, BOS and the Foundation are not-for-profit corporations and are recognized as tax exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code The Baptist Health Medical Group affiliated physician practices are single-member limited liability companies, which are treated as disregarded entities for federal income tax purposes. BHE and the Insurance Companies provide for income taxes in accordance with the provisions of FASB Accounting Standards Codification ("ASC") 740. *Income Taxes* ("ASC 740") As required under ASC 740, deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognized under the balance sheet approach, which recognizes the future tax effect of temporary differences between the amounts recorded in the financial statements and the tax basis of these amounts. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using the enacted tax rates expected to apply to taxable income in the periods in which the deferred tax assets or liabilities are expected to be realized or settled (see Note 12). Taxes collected from patients, tenants, customers and others, concurrent with specific revenue-producing transactions and subsequently remitted to governmental authorities, are recorded on a net basis and excluded from revenues.

Asset Retirement Obligations - BHSF has various conditional asset retirement obligations for the removal of asbestos. The carrying amount of the obligations for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, totaled approximately \$1,235,000 and \$1,915,000, respectively. For the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, BHSF settled obligations of approximately \$481,000 and \$424,000, respectively.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Payment - The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 included provisions for implementing health information technology under the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act ("HITECH") These provisions were designed to increase the use of electronic health records ("EHR") technology and establish the requirements for a Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments program beginning in 2011 for eligible hospitals and providers that adopt and meaningfully use certified EHR technology. Eligibility for annual Medicare incentive payments is dependent on providers demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each period over a four-year period. Initial Medicaid incentive payments are available to providers that adopt, implement or upgrade certified EHR technology, but providers must demonstrate meaningful use of such technology in subsequent years to qualify for additional incentive payments. Medicaid EHR incentive payments are fully funded by the federal government and administered by the states, however, the states are not required to offer EHR incentive payments to providers.

During the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, BHSF recognized HITECH incentives related to certain of the BHSF's hospitals that have demonstrated meaningful use of, and completed attestations as to their adoption or implementation of, certified EHR technology. The Medicare and Medicaid incentives recognized during the year ended September 30, 2013, were \$7,419,000 and \$1,864,000, respectively. The Medicare and Medicaid incentives recognized during the year ended September 30, 2012, were \$8,700,000 and \$4,700,000, respectively. These incentive reimbursements are included in other operating revenue in the consolidated statement of operations. BHSF accounts for EHR incentive payments using the gain contingency model. As such, BHSF recognizes EHR incentive payments when the specified meaningful use criteria have been satisfied, and all contingencies in estimating the amount of the incentive payments to be received are resolved Medicare meaningful use attestations are subject to audit by the federal government or its designee.

#### 2 NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

Net patient service revenue is recorded based upon established billing rates less allowances for contractual adjustments Revenue is recorded during the period the healthcare services are provided, based upon the estimated amounts due from the patients and third-party payors, including federal and state agencies (under the Medicare and Medicaid programs), managed care health plans, commercial insurance companies and employers. Estimates of contractual allowances under managed care health plans are based upon the payment terms specified in the related contractual agreements. The bases for payment under these agreements include prospectively determined rates per diagnosis, per diem or per procedure rates, or discounts from established charges.

Mariners Hospital is a critical access hospital ("CAH") As such, it is certified to receive cost-based reimbursement for services provided to Medicare beneficiaries. Among other participation constraints, CAH status requires that Mariners Hospital operates no more than 25 beds and that its average length of stay does not exceed four days

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. Federal regulations require submission of annual cost reports covering medical costs and expenses associated with the services provided by each facility to program beneficiaries. Annual cost reports required under the Medicare and Medicaid programs are subject to routine audits, which may result in adjustments to the amounts ultimately determined to be due to BHSF under these payment programs. These audits often require several years to reach the final determination of amounts earned under the programs. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Such audits of the Medicare cost reports have been completed for Mariners Hospital for fiscal years through 2011 and for all other BHSF Hospitals for fiscal years through 2009. Medicaid audits have been completed for Mariners

Hospital for fiscal years through 2009 and for all other BHSF Hospitals through fiscal year 2008

BHSF provides charity care to patients who are financially unable to pay for the healthcare services they receive. Uninsured patients treated at BHSF facilities with household income at or below 300% of the federal poverty level are eligible for free care. In addition, uninsured patients may be eligible for charity care if incurred charges are considered beyond the patient's ability to pay. The federal poverty level is established by the federal government and is based on income and family size. BHSF provided charity care at a cost of approximately \$104.488,000 and \$95,229,000 for the years ended. September 30, 2013, and 2012, respectively. The estimated cost of providing charity services is based on recent historical cost-to-charge ratios for charity patients from BHSF's cost accounting system applied to the current period gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients.

BHSF receives payments for services rendered from government agencies (primarily the Medicare and Medicaid programs), managed care health plans, commercial insurance companies, employers and patients. During the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, approximately 12% of BHSF's net patient service revenue related to patients participating in the Medicare program. BHSF recognizes that revenues and receivables from the Medicare program are significant to its operations but does not believe that there are significant credit risks associated with this federal program. BHSF does not believe that there are any other significant concentrations of revenues from any particular payor that would subject it to any significant credit risks in the collection of its accounts receivable.

BHSF provides for accounts receivable that could become uncollectible in the future by establishing an allowance to reduce the carrying value of such receivables to their estimated net realizable value. Additions to the allowance for doubtful accounts are made by means of the provision for doubtful accounts. Accounts written off as uncollectible are deducted from the allowance and subsequent recoveries are added. BHSF estimates the allowance for doubtful accounts by reserving a percentage of accounts receivable based on historical and expected collections, business and economic conditions, trends in reimbursement, and other collection indicators. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, including receivables from government agencies. BHSF analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts. For all payor types, when BHSF can no longer reasonably estimate collectability of an account based on the aging of the balance due and the volatility and unpredictable nature of the amount. BHSF reserves substantially all amounts due. Recoveries on written-off accounts receivable are recorded in the period the recovery occurs as an increase in net patient service revenue through an adjustment to the provision for doubtful accounts.

Collections are impacted by the ability of patients to pay and the effectiveness of BHSF's collection efforts. Significant changes in payor mix, business office operations, economic conditions, or trends in federal and state governmental healthcare coverage could affect BHSF's collection of accounts receivable and the estimates of the collectability of future accounts receivable. The process of estimating the allowance for doubtful accounts requires BHSF to estimate the collectability of self-pay accounts receivable, which is primarily based on its collection history, adjusted for expected recoveries and, if available, anticipated changes in collection trends. BHSF also continually reviews its overall reserve adequacy by monitoring historical cash collections as well as by analyzing payor classification, aged accounts receivable by payor, days revenue outstanding, and business and economic conditions.

Net patient service revenue recognized for medical services rendered includes adjustments resulting from reviews and audits of prior-year Medicare and Medicaid cost reports and subsequent payment experience from patients and third-party payors. Such adjustments are considered in the recognition and estimation of revenue in the periods the adjustments become known or as cost report years are no longer subject to reviews and audits.

In 2012, the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services ("CMS") released revised rates related to the disproportionate share ("DSH") adjustment that is applied to eligible hospitals' diagnosis related groupings ("DRG") payments. The DSH adjustment is a percentage add-on to the basic DRG payments and is available to hospitals that serve a disproportionate number of indigent patients. All of the BHSF hospitals are considered disproportionate share hospitals, except Mariners, which is classified as a critical access hospital. The newly-released, revised rates substantially reduced the add-on percentage for each of the BHSF DSH hospitals, not only for current and prospective encounters but also for all Medicare discharges beginning in fiscal year 2006. The cumulative negative effect of the 2012 rate changes were reflected as a reduction in net patient service revenue of approximately \$22,500,000 in the fiscal year ended September 30, 2012. Subsequent CMS DSH rate adjustment in 2013 had no material impact.

The combined effects from changes in estimates related to the valuation of prior periods accounts receivable, primarily due to favorable payment experience from patients and third-party payors, was an increase in income from operations of approximately \$21,971,000 and \$49,400,000, for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Additionally, during the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, BHSF received approximately \$30,895,000 and \$4,500,000, respectively, related to favorable settlements of outstanding disputes with various commercial third-party payors. Third-party payor settlements are recorded as an increase to net patient service revenue when the disputes are settled and the cash settlements are received.

Interest costs incurred during fiscal years 2013 and 2012 were approximately \$47.960.000 and \$48.595.000, respectively Interest capitalized was approximately \$1.719.000 and \$3.496.000, during fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively Capitalized interest was net of approximately \$2.000 and \$5.000 of interest income earned on temporary investments of bond proceeds, during fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively. Depreciation expense on property and equipment, for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, amounted to approximately \$117.428.000 and \$112.707.000, respectively.

During fiscal year 2013, BHSF and certain BHSF Hospitals closed on several building and land purchases with a total cost of approximately \$128.674,000. These acquisitions are for use in BHSF's clinical and administrative operations.

#### 5 GOODWILL

Goodwill of approximately \$29.351.000 arose from the acquisition of Doctors Hospital by South Miami Hospital in October 2003. Goodwill has arisen from various acquisitions by BHE, including approximately \$17.554.000 from the acquisition of GEC on January 1, 2009. Doctors Hospital's and BHE's goodwill are subject to at least an annual assessment for impairment by applying a fair-value based test, which is conducted each year as of September 30 or more frequently, when events or other changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of goodwill may not be recoverable. There was no impairment of Doctors Hospital's or BHE's goodwill at September 30, 2013 or 2012. There were no transactions during the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, which resulted in additional goodwill.

#### 6 DEBT

Pursuant to a Master Trust Indenture, an obligated group was created, which at September 30, 2013 and 2012, consisted of BHSF, the BHSF Hospitals and BOS (the "BHSF Obligated Group") Each member of the BHSF Obligated Group is jointly and severally hable for all debt issued under the Master Trust Indenture

On May 16, 2007, the BHSF Obligated Group issued through the City of South Miami Health Facilities Authority ("SMHFA") \$800,000,000 of its Hospital Revenue Bonds. Series 2007 ("2007 Bonds") in accordance with the provisions of a new Master Trust Indenture dated as of May 1, 2007. The 2007 Bonds bear interest at rates ranging from 4 62% to 5 00%, payable semiannually each February 15 and August 15, and mature annually on August 15 through 2042. Payment of principal and interest on the 2007 Bonds is wholly dependent on the credit of the BHSF Obligated Group. Certain proceeds of the 2007 Bonds, together with other available funds, were used to refund outstanding bonds and pay expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the 2007 Bonds, and the remaining proceeds have been used for the costs of acquiring, constructing, renovating, rehabilitating and equipping certain healthcare facilities of BHSF.

On May 25, 2011, the BHSF Obligated Group issued \$250,000,000 of its Baptist Health South Florida Obligated Group Taxable Notes. Series 2011 (the "2011 Taxable Notes") The 2011 Taxable Notes were issued under the Master Trust Indenture, as amended and supplemented by a First Supplemental Master Trust Indenture. The 2011 Taxable Notes bear interest at 459% per annum and mature on August 15, 2021. Proceeds of the 2011 Taxable Notes may be used for any corporate purposes, however, BHSF has designated that the proceeds will be used to finance capital improvements to the healthcare facilities of the BHSF Obligated Group members.

On December 21, 2011, the BHSF Obligated Group implemented a commercial paper program that allows BHSF to issue up to \$150,000,000 of taxable commercial paper notes for general corporate purposes at an interest rate to be determined at the time of the commercial paper notes issuance. As of September 30, 2012, approximately \$30,000,000 had been drawn on the available commercial paper, all of which matured on November 2, 2012. Commercial paper borrowings had a weighted-average interest rate of 0.40% and 0.35%, during fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively. No new commercial paper notes were issued in the year ended September 30, 2013.

On September 16, 2013, BHSF assumed a mortgage note with an outstanding principal balance of \$20.411,006 as part of the purchase of an office building located in Coral Gables. Florida The mortgage note bears interest at 5 33% per annum, with monthly interest and principal payments, and a balloon principal payment of \$19,746,010 due at maturity on January 1, 2015. The mortgage note has a prepayment penalty which expires on October 1, 2014.

Under the Master Trust Indenture, as amended and supplemented by a First Supplemental Master Trust Indenture, the BHSF Obligated Group has certain restrictions on incurrence of additional debt and certain other covenants. At September 30, 2013, the BHSF Obligated Group was in compliance with all of its debt covenants.

The Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") routinely examines municipal debt to determine compliance with federal tax regulations. On January 24, 2011, the City of Coral Gables Health Facilities Authority received a letter from the IRS stating that the Hospital Revenue Bonds. Series 2004 had been selected for a routine examination. Upon conclusion of the audit, the IRS issued a no-change determination letter on November 10, 2011. On November 28, 2011, the SMHFA received a letter from the IRS stating that the 2007 Bonds have been selected for a routine examination. On August 12, 2013, BHSF and the SMHFA entered into a closing agreement with the IRS which fully resolved all issues.

BHSF's endowment consists of funds that have been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Endowment funds received are included in assets whose use is limited and invested in accordance with BHSF's investment policy (see Note 1).

Gifts donated to the permanently restricted endowments are classified as permanently restricted net assets at their original fair value. Gifts donated with temporary restrictions are classified as temporarily restricted net assets at their original fair value, until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the BHSF Hospitals or BOS in accordance with donors' wishes Income derived from permanently and temporarily restricted net assets is expendable to support the BHSF Hospitals and BOS, absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary

#### 8 MEDICAL MALPRACTICE AND GENERAL LIABILITY INSURANCE

BHSF is self-insured for professional and general liability coverage. Coverage in excess of the self-insurance limits, less coinsurance, is provided on a claims-made basis by PIC, which reinsures 100% of its professional and general liability risk with unrelated commercial insurance carriers. The adequacy of the coverage provided and the provisions for losses are reviewed quarterly by independent actuaries. Should the claims-made policies be terminated, or not renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on incidents during their term, but reported subsequently, will be uninsured. At September 30, 2013 and 2012, BHSF has accrued undiscounted estimates of approximately \$179,456,000 and \$154,248,000, respectively, which represents the cost to settle malpractice and general liability claims reported and claims incurred but not reported. Approximately \$45,180,000 and \$36,292,000 is included in accrued expenses and other current liabilities, and approximately \$134,276,000 and \$117,956,000 is included in other liabilities. In the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at September 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The fiscal year 2013 and 2012 consolidated statements of operations reflect a change in estimate in the accrued undiscounted cost to settle malpractice and general liability claims of approximately \$17.328.000 and \$14.156.000, respectively, primarily due to favorable development and settlement of historical outstanding claims

#### 9 EMPLOYEE BENEFITS PROGRAMS

BHSF subsidizes the cost of health insurance for its employees through a self-insured employee health plan. Under the self-insurance plan, all claims from employees and their dependents, less deductibles and coinsurance, as provided in the plan, are paid directly by BHSF to the plan administrators. BHSF has commercial insurance coverage for per-occurrence claims in excess of the self-insured limits. At September 30, 2013 and 2012, BHSF has recorded liabilities for outstanding and estimated unreported claims of its employees and their covered dependents under this plan of approximately \$15,115,000 and \$15,600,000, respectively, which are included in accrued wages, salaries and benefits in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

BHSF is self-insured for workers' compensation claims. BHSF purchases commercial insurance coverage for per-occurrence workers' compensation claims in excess of the self-insured limit. BHSF has recorded liabilities for outstanding and estimated unreported claims covered under this plan, which are included in accrued expenses and other current liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

#### 10 POSTRETIREMENT BENEFITS OTHER THAN PENSIONS

BHSF provides certain healthcare benefits for retired employees. Under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. BHSF is required to accrue the estimated cost of retiree benefit payments during the years the employee provides service.

The assumed healthcare cost trend rate used in measuring the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation of the medical plan at September 30, 2013, was 8.5% in 2013, declining gradually to 5.0% by the year 2022. The assumed healthcare cost trend rate used in measuring the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation of the medical plan at September 30, 2012, was 8.5% in 2012, declining gradually to 5.0% by the year 2020. The assumed discount rate used in determining the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation at September 30, 2013 and 2012, was 5.1% and 4.2%, respectively. A one-percentage point increase in the assumed healthcare cost trend rates would increase the total of service cost and interest cost components and the postretirement benefit obligation by approximately \$820,000 and \$4,144,000, respectively. A one-percentage point decrease in the assumed healthcare cost trend rates would decrease the total of service cost and interest cost components and the postretirement benefit obligation by approximately \$676,000 and \$3,512,000, respectively.

#### 11 RETIREMENT PLAN

BHSF sponsors a defined contribution retirement plan (the "Plan") in which participation is available to substantially all full-time employees. Under the terms of the Plan, BHSF provides a basic contribution of 3% of the employee's gross salary. In addition, BHSF matches 50% of the amount the participating employee has contributed through a voluntary salary reduction agreement with BHSF. The maximum matching contribution is limited to 2% of the employee's gross salary. Provisions of the Plan include 100% vesting of BHSF contributions after three years of continuous service. Upon a participant's retirement, death or disability, or as required by law, the participant's vested interest in his or her account can be distributed in either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or annual installments over the life expectancy of the participant. The funding levels for the Plan are subject to periodic determination by the Board of Trustees of BHSF. Costs incurred in connection with the Plan, for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, were approximately \$38,444,000 and \$36,723,000, respectively, and are included in wages, salaries and benefits expense in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations.

The current accounting standards require that deferred income taxes reflect the tax consequences on future years of differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their bases for financial reporting purposes. In addition, future tax benefits, such as minimum tax credit carry forwards, are required to be recognized to the extent that realization of such benefits is more likely than not. As of September 30, 2013 and 2012, BHSF had no material unrecognized tax positions

BHSF is periodically audited by federal and state taxing authorities. The outcome of these audits may result in BHSF being assessed taxes in addition to amounts previously paid. In September 2013, the IRS initiated an examination of Baptist Sleep Center at Galloway, LLC. Federal returns for fiscal years 2010 through 2012, remain open and subject to examination by the IRS.

#### 13 LEASE AGREEMENTS

BHSF and its affiliates have lease agreements that provide for terms of five to twenty years and for renewals at rents to be negotiated. Rents are adjusted annually for changes in the Consumer Price Index ("CPI")

#### 14 COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

<u>Construction</u> - BHSF has made certain commitments associated with its continuous construction programs BHSF's future construction expenditures related to these commitments in years subsequent to 2013 are currently estimated at \$142,462,000 Actual construction expenditures may vary from these estimates

Operating Leases - BHSF's operating leases are primarily related to its copy machines, miscellaneous medical equipment, and parking and office space. Copy machine and miscellaneous medical equipment leases are subject to automatic renewal at the end of their respective lease terms for successive one-year periods under renegotiated terms and conditions. BHSF leases parking and office space under agreements that provide for terms of three to thirty years and renewals at rates to be negotiated. Office space rents are adjusted annually for changes in the CPI. Total lease expenses charged to operations for the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, amounted to approximately \$18,450,000 and \$19,370,000, respectively.

Physician Income Guarantees - Baptist Hospital, South Miami Hospital, West Kendall Baptist Hospital, Mariners Hospital and Homestead Hospital provide income and revenue guarantee agreements to certain non-employee physicians and physician groups who agree to fill a community need in the hospitals' service areas and commit to remain in practice there for a specified period of time. Under such agreements, the hospitals are required to make payments to the physicians and physician groups in excess of the amounts earned or revenue collected in their practices up to the amount of the guarantees. The income and revenue collection guarantee agreements in effect at September 30, 2013, expire at various times through June 30, 2015.

At September 30, 2013, the maximum potential amount of future payments under the income and revenue collection guarantees was \$38,187,000. At September 30, 2013, a liability for future payments under the income and revenue collection guarantees in the amount of \$25,092,000 is included in accrued expenses and other current liabilities and other liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

<u>Litigation</u> - BHSF is subject to claims and suits, including malpractice allegations, arising in the ordinary course of business. It is management's opinion, based on consultation with legal counsel and prior experience with similar cases, that the ultimate resolution of such suits now pending will not have a material adverse effect on BHSF's future financial position, results from consolidated operations or its cash flows

Other Industry Risks - The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state and local governments, which are complex and subject to interpretation. Compliance with these laws and regulations, including those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to governmental review and interpretation. Federal government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of laws and regulations by healthcare providers. Unfavorable outcomes related to these regulatory investigations could result in the imposition of significant monetary fines, and civil and criminal penalties, as well as significant repayments of previously billed and collected revenue from patient services, and exclusion from participation in the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

In March 2010, the Patient Protection and Affordability Care Act (the "Act"), a comprehensive healthcare reform bill, was signed into law. The legislation is complex and will be phased in over several years, with the most significant parts taking effect in 2014. BHSF continues to assess the potential impact of this reform on its operations but does not have enough information or data to predict the effects with certainty. However, it is possible that the Act will have an adverse impact on the operations or financial results of BHSF.

#### 15 FUNCTIONAL EXPENSES

BHSF provides general healthcare services to residents within its geographic location. Expenses related to providing these services during the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, are as follows.

#### 16 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Assets Whose Use is Limited and Other Investments - BHSF has elected the fair value option for all investments in debt and equity securities. BHSF classifies investments according to a hierarchy of techniques used to determine fair value based on the types of inputs.

Level 1 inputs are unadjusted quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that are available as of the measuring date. Securities in this category are primarily cash and short-term investments. U.S. Treasury obligations, corporate equity instruments and foreign exchange contracts.

Level 2 inputs are quoted prices in markets that are not active or inputs that are observable either directly or indirectly. Level 2 inputs include quoted prices for similar assets other than quoted prices in Level 1 or other inputs that are observable or can be derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities. Investments classified as Level 2 primarily include debt securities such as U.S. Agency obligations, municipal bonds, domestic and foreign corporate bonds, and foreign government bonds. BHSF's bank custodians use independent pricing services to provide fair values for these securities. These pricing services use the market and income approaches and utilize pricing models that vary by asset class and incorporate available trade, bid and other market information. For securities that do not trade on a daily basis, these pricing services utilize available information through processes such as benchmark curves, benchmarking of like securities, sector groupings and matrix pricing. As of the September 30, 2013 and 2012, BHSF has recorded the valuations, without adjustment, which were provided by the pricing service. The Level 2 classification also includes BHSF's investment in the global properties securities fund. This fund is valued using the net asset value provided by the investment manager.

Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and are significant to the fair value of the asset or liability. Unobservable inputs reflect BHSF's own judgment about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. Level 3 assets and liabilities include financial instruments for which fair values are determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation. For the years ended September 30, 2013 and 2012, BHSF had alternative investments which are Level 3 on the fair value hierarchy, including the commodity and infrastructure funds. BHSF's Level 3 investments are valued using the net asset value provided by the investment manager.

Transfers between levels occur when there are changes in the determination of whether inputs are observable or not, as well as due to changes in market activity. At September 30, 2013, there were no changes to level classifications for securities held at September 30, 2012.

BHSF's investment policy provides for a diversified investment portfolio which considers return, risk, social values and BHSF's short-term and long-term liquidity needs, and supports its self-liquidity program. This policy allows participation in alternative investment funds. BHSF's investments in the global properties securities, infrastructure, and commodity funds are considered alternative investments and do not have readily determinable fair values. All of BHSF's alternative investments contain restrictions on an investor's ability to liquidate the investment. All funds may restrict redemptions if, in their respective determinations, it would be in the best interest of the fund to do so. Absent the fund manager's election to restrict, redemptions differ from each fund. BHSF is not aware of any redemption restrictions in place as of September 30, 2013. In addition, BHSF has no unfunded commitments to any fund as of September 30, 2013.

The global properties securities fund, with a fair value of \$65,329,647 at September 30, 2013, allows redemptions on a monthly basis with 15 days notice. The infrastructure fund, with a fair value of \$50,630,031 at September 30, 2013, has two redemption dates per year with 90 days notice required. The commodity fund, with a fair value of \$65,056,881 as of September 30, 2013, allows redemptions on a quarterly basis with 90 days notice.

<u>Debt</u> - The carrying amounts reported for BHSF's mortgage note payable and commercial paper notes approximate fair value because of the short maturity of these instruments (see Note 6). The combined carrying value and estimated fair value of BHSF's 2007 Bonds and 2011 Taxable Notes at September 30, 2013, were \$1,003,231,414 and \$1,028,175,000, respectively, and the combined carrying value and estimated fair value at September 30, 2012, were \$1,015,720,221 and \$1,101,643,000, respectively. The fair values of the 2007 Bonds and 2011 Taxable Notes are determined by an independent pricing service using observable inputs and are considered Level 2 on the fair value hierarchy. This pricing service primarily utilizes a market pricing approach that utilizes trade data, bid/ask data, institutional bids, comparable trades, dealer quotes and other information.

Other Assets and Liabilities - The carrying amounts reported in the consolidated balance sheets for cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, other assets, estimated third-party payor settlements and accrued expenses and other liabilities approximate fair value because of the short maturity of these instruments
