Part IX-A - Summary of Direct Charitable Activities

Since its inception in 2000, the Highmark Foundation has made a lasting impact in the communities Highmark served by taking the steps necessary to improve the overall health and well-being of its residents. Throughout 2013, the Foundation continued to stand behind its mission by awarding a series of grants, sponsorships and educational support, totaling more than \$5.4 million, and since 2000 awarding over \$100 million to charitable organizations and hospitals across Pennsylvania.

Highmark Foundation approaches grant making proactively, engaging the health care community and utilizing research to identify areas of need in which Foundation funding will make a profound difference. The Foundation has also created urgency around many public health issues facing the region. It is achieving its mission by funding strategic and evidence-based health care initiatives that educate, protect and ultimately improve the overall well-being of the large population it serves.

A major portion of the Foundation's history is its unparalleled dedication to improving children's health throughout the region. The Foundation was a catalyst in addressing the childhood obesity epidemic facing our region and, ultimately, our nation. In 2006, the Foundation introduced Highmark Healthy High 5, a children's health promotion initiative that supported lifelong good health for children and adolescents ages 6-18. Two major focus areas from that initiative — bullying prevention and childhood obesity — still remain an integral part of the Foundation's work.

The Foundation also funds innovative health care programs for diverse populations. Whether the population is located in an urban, suburban or rural area, it supports programs that reach vulnerable or at-risk individuals such as the elderly, the poor, individuals with special needs and minority populations. These programs have included pilot projects, model programs, expansion plans and well-established initiatives.

Currently, the Highmark Foundation has four key funding categories in place for its grant making efforts

- Service Delivery Systems.

Proposal Process

The Foundation awards programmatic grants in the area of health to non-profit organizations and hospitals. The Foundation defines health broadly to include social, behavioral and other dimensions beyond illness or disease. The grant making process is performed primarily through invited proposals or requests for proposals. The Foundation awards grants in two ways:

- Invited Proposals are target specific audiences and activities identified by the Foundation Unlike request for proposals (RFPs), these proposals involve the participation of a specific entity and may represent a longer-term commitment from both the grant recipient and the Foundation. All phases of the project must be acceptable to the Foundation prior to funding, including estimated costs, timelines and expected results.
- 2. Request for Proposals will be issued periodically related to specific health topics. Organizations with demonstrated capacity or evidence of strong potential to mount successful projects with respect to the target health topics will be invited to submit a proposal in response to the RFP. A limited number of grants will be awarded based upon a competitive analysis of the proposals submitted. Grants will be awarded to the applicants deemed to be the most responsive to the RFP requirements.

Proposal Guidelines

To respond to an invited proposal, the following information is required:

- 1. Organizational overview (history, mission and contact information)
- 2 A brief statement of the problem
- 3. A description of the proposed project, including why it is important, its objectives, the target population(s), qualifications of staff, the impact on the community, project start and completion date and a timeline.
- 4 A statement of how the project fits into other work being done in the community, region and/or field.
- 5. A description of what constitutes success and how the organization plans to measure it
- 6 A description of how the program outcomes will be communicated to relevant audiences.
- 7 The requested amount of funding, an itemized budget of the overall project and an indication of other prospective funding sources.
- 8. General information, including contact person and telephone number
- 9. A statement declaring that the organization is a public charity as described in sections 501(C)(3) and 509(a)(1),(2) or (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

Upon receipt and review of the letter of inquiry, the Highmark Foundation will notify the applicant of the status of the request. If it is determined that the request is applicable and/or meets the criteria, the second step is the invitation to submit a formal grant application/proposal.

Part XV Line 2d

The Highmark Foundation also makes multi-year grants to non-profit agencies and organizations in western and central PA; and West Virginia communities served by Highmark Inc. defined as tax exempt under section 501(c)(3) and as public charities under section 509 (a). The Highmark Foundation has focused its attention on a variety of health issues including but not limited to: dental/oral health care, health disparities, nursing shortage, and health literacy. In 2013, the Highmark Foundation awarded approximately \$4,212,000 to 152 non-profit organizations for traditional grants. Traditional grants are awarded in four priority areas listed below along with examples of grant funded programs.

A Chronic Disease - Grants funded programs

- Community Health Clinic of Butler County To provide support of a multifaceted diabetes management program that provides high-quality education, medical and dental services to uninsured individuals in Butler County.
- Erie County Diabetes Association, Inc., To support diabetes prevention and intervention programming for 550 uninsured and underinsured preand diabetic individuals.

B Family Health - Grants funded programs:

- Highlands Hospital To support a planning grant to assist with the creation of the Women's Center of Excellence
- Pittsburgh Community Services, Inc. To establish the Healthier Communities pilot program to address physical activity and nutrition behaviors in 100 seniors residing in senior residences in Allegheny County.
- West Virginia University Foundation To support McDowell County CHOICES, an integrated approach to childhood and adolescent health.

C. Healthy Communities - Grants funded programs

- Lancaster General Hospital to address hypertension using the Hypertension Protocol Project, an evidence-based protocol for screening, treatment and control of hypertensive patients.
- Pinnacle Health To reduce repeat emergency room visits to Pinnacle Healthy by Hamilton Health Center patients by helping them to learn to manage chronic conditions through patient navigation as a System Care coordination team.
- St. Joseph Regional Health Network Support of the Diabetes Wellness program, will help improve the health of this community by providing support to help our patients understand and manage this chronic disease.

D. Service Delivery Systems - Grant funded programs:

- Allegheny County Emergency Medical Services Council To create an innovative EMS-based pilot program for vulnerable patients in the City of Pittsburgh and surrounding neighborhoods to ensure communities receive high-quality medical services through the CONNECT Community Paramedic program.
- Allegheny Health Network To establish Oncology navigation and community outreach coordination to improve access to care for high-risk patients.
- Catholic Charities Diocese of Pittsburgh, Inc. To increase access to primary health, dental and specialty care for underserved populations in Southwestern Pennsylvania
- Lancaster Cleft Palate Clinic To support staffing costs for the delivery of integrated oral health care for children with cleft palates and craniofacial abnormalities in Central PA.
- Penn State University To support "improving Rural Geriatric Care through Education," a program designed to provide geriatric education and training for rural health care providers practicing in eight critical access hospitals.

The Foundation also considers numerous factors in deciding whether to fund a specific proposal, including but not limited to the following criteria:

1. Description of Business

Nature of Organization

The Highmark Foundation (the "Foundation") is a not-for-profit affiliate of Highmark Inc. ("Highmark") The Foundation was incorporated on December 14, 2000 under the Nonprofit Corporation Law of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

The Foundation exists exclusively for charitable, scientific and educational purposes, and undertakes charitable endeavors of Highmark, including but not limited to, providing grants to organizations to promote the health and well-being of the communities served by Highmark.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP")

Basis of Financial Presentation

Net assets and revenues are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Foundation and changes therein are classified and reported as unrestricted net assets.

Revenues are reported as increases to unrestricted net assets. Expenses are reported as decreases to unrestricted net assets.

Net investment income and net realized gain on investments are reported as changes in unrestricted net assets as the terms of gifts do not impose restrictions on the use of the income or gains or losses

New Accounting Pronouncements

In June 2013, FASB issued amended guidance that requires a not-for-profit entity to recognize in its standalone financial statements all personnel services received from an affiliate that directly benefit the recipient. The new guidance is effective for not-for-profit entities in fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2014. The Foundation does not expect adoption of the new guidance to have a material impact on the financial position, results of activities and cash flows.

In October 2012, Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") amended current guidance to require Not-for-Profit entities to classify cash receipts from the sale of donated financial assets consistently with cash donations received in the statement of cash flows if those cash receipts were from the sale of donated financial assets that were converted nearly immediately into cash. The new guidance is effective for Not-for-Profit entities in fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2013. The Foundation does not expect adoption of the new guidance to have a material impact on the financial position, results of activities and cash flows.

In December 2011, FASB issued amended guidance that requires an entity to disclose information about offsetting and related arrangements to enable users of its financial statements to understand the effect of those arrangements on its financial position. The adoption of this guidance on January 1, 2013 did not have an impact on the financial position, results of activities and cash flows

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the Foundation's financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Foundation considers all highly liquid investments with maturities of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. A substantial portion of cash and cash equivalents is held with one financial institution.

Investments

All debt securities are classified as available-for-sale investments and are carried at fair value (based on quoted or estimated market prices), and unrealized gains and losses are reported in net unrealized loss on investments. Realized gains and losses are based on amortized cost.

In determining if a debt security is other-than-temporarily impaired, the Foundation considers whether it has intent to sell the debt security or whether it is more likely than not that the Foundation will be required to sell the debt security before recovery of its amortized cost basis, which may be at maturity. If the Foundation intends to sell the debt security or it is more likely than not that the Foundation will be required to sell the debt security before recovery of its cost basis, an other-than-temporary impairment is recorded as a realized loss in the statements of activities and changes in net assets for the difference between fair value and amortized cost.

If the Foundation does not have the intent to sell and it does not believe that it is more likely than not that it will be required to sell the debt security before recovery of its amortized cost, the Foundation performs a detailed review to determine the underlying cause of the unrealized loss and whether an other-than-temporary impairment is warranted. At the time a debt security is determined to be other-than-temporarily impaired, the credit component of the other-than-temporary impairment is recorded as a realized loss in the statements of activities and changes in net assets and the non-credit component of the other-than-temporary impairment is recorded in net unrealized loss on investments.

The Foundation's assets are invested in a variety of financial instruments. Accordingly, the related values as presented in the financial statements are subject to various market fluctuations, which include changes in the interest rate environment, equity markets and general economic conditions

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

In accordance with the FASB Accounting Standards Codification ("ASC") fair value measurements guidance, financial assets and liabilities recorded at fair value in the statements of financial position are categorized based upon the level inputs used to measure their fair value

Equipment, net

Equipment is recorded at cost, net of accumulated depreciation. Maintenance, repairs and minor improvements are expensed as incurred. Depreciation is computed under the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of 10 years

Prepaid expenses

Certain contracts are paid for in advance of the time the services will be received. The expense for these services will be recognized during the period in which the contracted services are completed

Revenue recognition

Contributed services support from Highmark were recorded at fair value using Highmark's cost as the basis.

Interest and dividend income is recorded on the accrual basis

Grants

Grants are recorded when approved by the Board of Directors. The Foundation approves certain grants with various conditions—If, however, the probability is remote that the grantees will not meet the conditions, these conditional grants are accounted for as grants payable when approved by the Board of Directors

Subsequent Events

In connection with the preparation of the financial statements, the Foundation evaluated events subsequent to the balance sheet date of December 31, 2013 through the Independent Auditor's Report date, which is also the date the financial statements were available to be issued, and has determined that all material transactions have been recorded and disclosed properly

4. Fair Value of Financial Instruments

Input levels, as defined by ASC fair value measurements guidance, are as follows.

Level 1 – Pricing inputs are based on unadjusted quoted market prices for identical financial assets in active markets. Active markets are those in which transactions occur in sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis

Level 2 – Pricing inputs are based on other than unadjusted quoted prices in active markets included in Level 1 and include observable unadjusted quoted market prices for similar financial assets or liabilities in active markets or quoted market prices for identical assets in inactive markets.

Level 3 – Pricing inputs include unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that reflect management's best estimate of what market participants would use in pricing the asset at the measurement date

The following methods and assumptions were used to determine the fair value of each class of the following assets and liabilities recorded at fair value in the statements of financial position

Cash equivalents. Cash equivalents consisted primarily of highly rated money market funds with maturities of three months or less and bank deposits, and are purchased or deposited at par value with specified yield rates. Due to the high ratings and short-term nature of the funds, all cash equivalents are designated as Level 1.

Debt securities, available-for-sale: Fair values of available-for-sale debt securities are based on quoted market prices, where available. These fair values are obtained primarily from a third party pricing service, which generally use Level 1 or Level 2 inputs, for the determination of fair value to facilitate fair value measurements and disclosures. Level 2 securities include corporate securities, obligations of states and political subdivisions of the U.S. and mortgage-backed securities. For securities not actively traded, the third party pricing service may use quoted market prices of comparable instruments or discounted cash flow analyses, incorporating inputs that are currently observable in the markets for similar securities. Inputs that are often used in the valuation methodologies include, but are not limited to, broker quotes, benchmark yields, credit spreads, default rates and prepayment speeds.

The Foundation uses a third party pricing service to obtain quoted prices for each security. The third party service provides pricing based on recent trades of the specific security or like securities, as well as a variety of valuation methodologies for those securities where an observable market price may not exist. The third party service may derive pricing for Level 2 securities from market corroborated pricing, matrix pricing, and inputs such as yield curves and indices. The Foundation performs an analysis of reasonableness of the prices received for fair value by monitoring month-to-month fluctuations and determining reasons for significant differences, selectively testing fair values against prices obtained from other sources, and comparing the combined fair value of a class of assets against an appropriate index benchmark. The Foundation did not make adjustments to the quoted market prices obtained from third party pricing services during the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012 that were material to the financial statements

6. Federal Excise Taxes

The Foundation has been determined to be an organization which is exempt from federal income taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code"), however, a 2% federal excise tax is imposed on net taxable investment income. The Code provides for a reduction in excise tax to 1% if certain conditions are achieved. The Foundation did not meet these conditions in 2013 and 2012 and recorded excise tax expense of \$664 and \$22,844, respectively. The expense is subject to a formula which considers tax basis adjustments. Net investment income differs between tax and financial statement reporting.

8. Related Party Transactions

The Foundation receives primarily all of its administrative services for its programs from Highmark. For the year ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, the Foundation recognized \$573,166 and \$753,491, respectively, in contributed services support from Highmark. These contributed services were recorded at fair value and consisted of salaries and benefits, facilities maintenance, and other office and administrative expenses incurred by Highmark in performing program and supporting services. Highmark's cost was the basis for the estimated fair value of these contributed services.
