Program Achievement #1 - Subspecialty Physicians In keeping with Chmca's Mission to provide quality medical and surgical care for babies, children, adolescents, and burn victims of all ages, regardless of the ability to pay, CHMCA offers unique services in a broad range of pediatric subspecialties as described herein. Some of CHMCA's Subspecialty areas include Ambulatory services, Heart Center, Neurosurgery, Sedation Service, ENT, Maternal Fetal Medicine, Care Center, Gastroenterology, Urology, Sports Medicine, Neurology, Nephrology, Endocrinology, Adolescent Medicine, Infectious Diseases, Hematology Services, Pulmonary Medicine, Palliative Care Program, Oak Adoptive Health Center, Locust Pediatrics, Rheumatology, Clinical Pharmacology and Toxicology, Psychiatric Services, Genetics, Orthopedics and Skeletal Dysplasis CHMCA has earned Best Children's Hospital rankings by US News & World Report in 7 of the 10 specialties. These include cancer, diabetes and endocrinology, neonatology, neurology and neurosurgery, orthopedics, pulmonary and urology. The Showers Family Center for Childhood Cancer and Blood Disorders provides comprehensive care to children, teens and young adults with all types of childhood cancer, sickle cell disease. hemogloginopathies and bleeding/clotting disorders, as well as those who require stem cell/bone marrow transplants. The team includes board-certified pediatric hematologists-oncologists, advance practice nurses, physician assistants, certified pediatric oncology nurses, pharmacists, social workers, clinical research associates, child life specialists, counselors and educators. As a major teaching institution, CHMCA offers fellowship training in pediatric hematology-oncology and is a major pediatric teaching hospital affiliated with Northeast Ohio Medical University. The division of hematology-oncology also actively participates in national clinical trials for childhood cancer and blood disorders, and continues to explore the causes and treatments of these diseases through our basic science research program. As a member of the Children's Oncology Group (COG), we participate in the development of National Cancer Institute-approved treatment protocols and offer the most up-to-date cancer therapies Our cancer program in one of only 12 Pediatric Cancer Programs in the country as verified by the American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer CHMCA's Center for Diabetes and Endocrinology consists of a team of board-certified pediatric endocrinologists, certified nurse practitioners and pediatric nurses who diagnose and treat infants, children and teens Recognized by the American Diabetes Association for Quality Self-Management Education, our center is backed by a full-service lab, registered dietitians, social worker, child psychologist and others. The most common endocrine disorders we treat are diabetes, short stature, thyroid disease, metabolism disorders and pubertal disorders. In addition, we offer specialized care in bone health, endocrine disorders in cancer survivors and cystic fibrosis patients CHMCA's Neonatology department offers intensive care to sick and premature newborns. On any given day, there are 45 to 50 babies receiving care in the 59-bed neonatal intensive care unit (NICU). CHCMA's NICU team is committed to providing the most effective and efficient care for our tiny patients, as well as providing parents with the emotional and practical support they need. CHMCA is part of the Vermont Oxford Network, a datasharing collaboration of health professionals from 850 NICU's around the world who focus on research, education and projects that improve the quality and safety of medical care for newborns and their families. CHMCA's neonatal expertise expands beyond the Level III NICU at our Akron Campus. We also own and operate newborn special care nurseries at Akron General Medical Center and Summa's Akron City Hospital in Akron, Akron Children's Beeghly Campus in Boardman, and St Elizabeth Boardman Health Center. A specially equipped ambulance and pediatric transport team handles the transfer of the newborns requiring Level III neonatal intensive care provided at CHMCA's in downtown Akron Research, education and quality improvement projects are integral to the department of Neonatology CHMCA's NeuroDevelopmental Science Center (NDC) brings together 5 pediatric specialties - developmental-behavioral pediatrics, neurology, neurosurgery, physiatry, and behavioral neuropsychology, under one roof to deliver the best outcomes and quality of life for patients. CHMCA's NDC is dedicated to easing the circumstances each step of the way, from referral to diagnosis to treatment. Our goal is provide care that enriches the quality of life for children and families affected by neurological and developmental disorders. CHCMA's Division of Orthopedics specializes in the diagnosis and surgical and/or non-surgical treatment of all types of bone, joint, muscle and spine disorders and injuries in children, teens and young adults. Our experienced pediatric orthopedic surgeons offer complete care for conditions affecting the musculskeletal system, with the support of pediatric nurse practitioners, nurses and orthopedic technicians. This includes pediatric spine trauma and deformity, sports injury reconstruction, musculoskeletal neurology, congenital hand and musculoskeletal deformity, hip reconstruction, chest reconstruction, fragile bone evaluation and treatment, skeletal dysplasia, and brachial plexus treatment. CHCMA's Robert T. Stone Respiratory Center provides services for patients with all types of respiratory illnesses, including allergies, cystic fibrosis, bronchopulmonary dysplasia, and chronic respiratory failure. The Center has a team of doctors, nurse practitioners, nurse clinicians, pulmonary function technicians, dieticians, physical therapists and a social worker. We provide direct and consultative diagnosis and treatment, education, case management, and research. Our Center includes cystic fibrosis center, which treats patients from birth. through adulthood, asthma education program, pulmonary medicine, pulmonary function testing lab, sleep center, and cardiopulmonary exercise testing CHMCA's Pediatric Urology department diagnoses and treats children and teens with problems related to the genito-urinary systems. Services include laser, laparoscopy, lithotripsy and other minimally invasive techniques to treat diseases. Our staff also uses urodynamic tests to show how well the bladder and sphincter muscles work and to help explain various urinary diseases

Program Achievement #2 - Inpatient Services 2013 2012 Total Inpatient Days 70,418 71,099 CHMCA's philosophy of care is centered around the families we serve This means we respect each child and family's individual needs and strive to make the hospital experience as pleasant as possible. The routine care units, which consist of private rooms and accommodations for overnight stay by parents, are based upon the concept of family-centered care. The primary focus of the facility is to provide an environment conducive to pediatric patients, aiding their recovery in a modern hospital setting. Inpatient services include some of the following divisions Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, Psychiatric Care, Regional Burn Center, and Trauma Services A 59-bed Regional Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) was opened in 1993 The NICU is designated as a Level III tertiary neonatal unit in Ohio's Perinatal Region VI A neonatologist is present in-house and around the clock, seven (7) days a week for referral and consultation. A transport team from the NICU is also available at all times for transfer of patients by ambulance or helicopter from any one of the thirty-five (35) network hospitals in the area. The Level III unit is divided into two sections. (1) intensive care and (2) sub-intensive care. Sub-intensive care includes convalescent care for babies ready to go home, as well as transitional level care babies who have been here for an extended period of time 2013 2012 Total NICU patient days Neonatal at Akron 17,904 18,295 Neonatal at AGMC 3,477 3,893 Neonatal at St. E's 6,323 5,440 Neonatal at Beeghly 3,870 3,563 The Division of Pediatric Critical Care is responsible for overseeing and delivering care in the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) Each year, the PICU cares for about 1,500 children and teens in Northeast Ohio with life-threatening medical and surgical problems. The 25,200 square foot pediatric intensive care unit includes 23 private rooms with pull-out sofas to encourage parents to stay overnight. Total patient days were 20,045 and 19,435 in 2013 and 2012, respectively Since 1978, the Burn Institute has provided specialized care for burn victims of all ages throughout Northeastern Ohio CHMCA is one of only two pediatric hospitals in the country that treat adult burn patients. The Burn Institute is verified by the American Burn Association and The Committee on Trauma of the American College of Surgeons, which recognizes individual and institutional commitment to total burn care and a formal system for quality burn care delivery Each year, more than 250 burn victims are admitted to the Burn Center, which features 12 private patient rooms with bathrooms and accomodations for one parent or family member Each room is divided into zones designed to meet the needs of the patient, family and burn care team. The unit also has a treatment room, physical therapy room, operating room and tub room. The Burn Center comprehensively treats seriously burned victims by combining the skills of physicians, nurses, occupational therapists, physical therapists, dieticians, social workers, respiratory therapists, psychologists and psychiatrists. Besides providing expert treatment, the center's staff is actively involved in burn research and burn care training for professional and community groups. Total patient days for the burn center were 2,493 and 2,723 for 2013 and 2012, respectively. The Division of Emergency/Trauma Services supplies the emergency care needs of children from birth to twenty-one (21) years of age. As the sole pediatric institution in the area, the Division of Emergency/Trauma Services is the designated treatment center for all emergent pediatric problems. Children from Akron and the surrounding counties in Northeast Ohio accounted for the majority of the 95,676 visits during 2013. A fulltime attending pediatric emergency medicine specialist is on duty twenty-four (24) hours a day involved in the direct care of patients and teaching fellows, residents, and medical students. The Division of Emergency/Trauma boasts one of the nation's first and most successful suture programs using specially trained technicians and nurses to do most of the suturing of lacerations in the emergency setting. They see between 400-750 patients per month who need stitches. Rounding out the specialized medical care in the Emergency Department are child life specialists who are accustomed to explaining procedures to children and comforting parents, social workers trained to identify needs of families and point them to helpful services, and chaplains and bereavement staff who are always on call CHMCA is verified as a pediatric trauma center by the American College of Surgeons. The pediatric trauma verification is based on its ability to provide quality trauma care to trauma patients and their families from the time of injury, through the acute care phase, into the rehabilitation phase

Program Achievement #4 - Ancillary Some of the key departments of Ancillary include Centralized Core Lab, Microbiology/Virology labs, Cytogenetics, Radiology Diagnostic Imaging, Radiology MRI, Radiology CT, Radiology Ultrasound, Radiology Nuclear Medicine, Physical Therapy, Speech Pathology, Audiology, Occupational Therapy The Centralized Core Lab includes the Chemistry, Hematology, Coagulation, Urinalysis, Special Chemistry and Blood Bank laboratories. The chemistry analyzers tests for more than 60 different substances found in blood, urine and cerobrospinal fluid specimens. In addition to routine chemistries, testing is performed for therapeutic and immunosuppresive drug monitoring. Instruments are selected to use the smallest amounts of blood for testing in order to minimize blood loss for our pediatric patients. In addition to the CCL, laboratory services are provided by the Infectious Disease Laboratories (Microbiology, Virology, Immunology, and Molecular Diagnostics) The Radiology Division at CHMCA performs a full spectrum of diagnostic imaging procedures inclusive of Diagnostic/Fluoroscopic xrays, CT, Nuclear Medicine, Ultrasound, and MRI The Radiology division is staffed with licensed Diagnostic Imaging Technologists and all our Pediatric imaging procedures are read by qualified Pediatric Radiologists with Board Certification and CAQ credentials inclusive of expertise in specific radiology subspecialty areas of imaging. In 2008, CHMCA opened our 32-bed acute care Akron Children's Hospital of Mahoning Valley, serving the needs of pediatric patients in the Youngstown and surrounding areas. We opened a fully-equipped Radiology Department which includes all diagnostic imaging services that are offered on our main Akron campus. CHMCA's physical and occupational therapists are devoted to providing quality care in the hospital and to outpatients, schools and community programs. Our staff of pediatric therapists can provide specialized treatment from birth to age 21. We are affiliated with nine universities for teaching of students. Incorporating the support of families and skills of various medical professionals, the Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Speech, Audiology, and Social Services staffs strive to provide patients with the skills needed to overcome a variety of developmental, physical, and emotional disabilities. The Family Child Learning Center (FCLC), a cooperative effort of CHMCA and Kent State University, offers a host of therapy and educational services to handicapped infants, preschoolers and their families. Therapists and educators work together to significantly enhance the development of these children at an early age FCLC provides an educational training ground for graduate students in education, speech pathology, motor learning and physical and occupational therapy

The pediatric anesthesiologists are experienced at helping a child go to sleep with as little anesthesia as possible. They understand the medical differences between children and adults. In addition, child life specialists give pre-surgery tours once a week to prepare children (and parents) for what they expect to see, hear, feel, taste or smell. CHMCA has nine state-of-the-art operating rooms. Two are dedicated to minimally invasive surgery with a voice activated system to control the OR's. There are also operating suites dedicated to neurosurgery and heart surgery. Between 75-80% of surgeries are done on an outpatient basis, which has prove

1. Organization

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include Children's Hospital Medical Center of Akron (the Hospital), the parent organization and its affiliates, which include Akron Children's Hospital Foundation (the Foundation), Children's Home Care Group (CHCG), Child Dimensions Insurance Company (CDIC), and Children's Health Collaborative LLC, collectively referred to as Children's All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated

The Hospital has two campuses The Akron campus, located in Akron, Ohio, is an acute care pediatric hospital with a regional burn center for all ages. The Akron campus provides inpatient, observation, outpatient, surgical and emergency care services primarily for residents of Northeast Ohio. The Beeghly campus, located in Youngstown, Ohio, is an acute care pediatric hospital and provides inpatient, observation, selected outpatient, surgical and emergency care services for the residents of the Mahoning Valley, the geographic valley encompassing the area of Northeast Ohio and Northwest Pennsylvania.

The Foundation is not a private foundation, as it qualifies as an organization described in the Internal Revenue Code (Code) Sections 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(vi), but raises and provides funds solely for the Hospital and its tax-exempt affiliates

CHCG is a pediatric home health care provider primarily for residents of Northeast Ohio and the Mahoning Valley CHCG also provides a day-care program for sick children

CDIC is a Vermont-domiciled captive insurance company

Children's Health Collaborative LLC is a single member, Ohio limited liability company whereby the Hospital is the sole member Children's Health Collaborative LLC was organized to hold future Medicaid managed care contracts

The Hospital and most affiliates are not-for-profit organizations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Code, and are exempt from federal income tax on related income under Section 501(a) of the Code

Net Patient Service Revenue and Accounts Receivable

A. Policy for Determining the Timing and Amount of Net Patient Service Revenue to be Recognized

Children's serves certain patients whose medical care costs are not paid at established rates. These patients include those sponsored under government programs such as Medicare and Medicaid, those sponsored under private contractual agreements, charity care patients, and other uninsured patients who do not or are unable to pay. Children's recognizes net patient service revenue associated with patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, revenue is recognized on the basis of discounted rates in accordance with Children's policy.

B. Contractual Allowances and Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors (government programs, commercial insurance companies, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations), and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors, primarily Medicaid Children's policy is to bill for, and pursue collection of, all services rendered. An estimated provision for uncollectible accounts is recorded that results in net patient service revenue being reported at the net amount expected to be received. Children's has determined, based on an assessment at the consolidated level, that patient service revenue is primarily recorded prior to assessing the patient's ability to pay and as such, the entire provision for uncollectible accounts related to patient revenue is recorded as a deduction from net patient service revenue in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets. At the point in time that a charge is believed to be uncollectible, the related receivable is written off as an uncollectible account. Allowances are made for estimated uncollectible accounts.

Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined Retroactive adjustments increased (decreased) net patient service revenue by approximately \$253 in 2013 and (\$414) in 2012 While Medicare cost reports have been reviewed and the Hospital has received Notices of Program Reimbursement (NPRs), cost reports are subject to reopening and retroactive adjustment for a period of three years from the NPR date

Children's has also entered into payment agreements with commercial insurance carriers and preferred provider organizations The basis for payment to Children's under these nongovernment payor agreements is primarily discounts from established charges, except for physician services, which are generally paid under fee schedules with the third-party payors Medicaid reimburses Children's primarily on an All Patient Refined Diagnostic Related Group (APR-DRG) basis for inpatient cases and on a fee schedule for outpatient and physician services Total allowances and adjustments arising from reimbursement agreements with third-party payors, reported as a reduction of gross patient service revenue, amounted to \$486,896 and \$465,201 in 2013 and 2012, respectively Excluding Medical Mutual of Ohio (representing 15% and 14% of gross patient service revenue in 2013 and 2012), Anthem (representing 13% of gross patient service revenue in 2013 and 2012, respectively) and governmental programs, no one payor source represents more than 10% of Children's gross patient service revenue Concentration of credit risk relating to accounts receivable is limited to some extent by the diversity and number of Children's patients and payors Accounts receivable consist of amounts due from third-party payors and private pay patients Excluding Medical Mutual of Ohio (representing 11% and 10% of accounts receivable in 2013 and 2012, respectively), and Anthem (representing 13% and 10% of accounts receivable in 2013 and 2012, respectively), and governmental programs, no one payor source represents more than 10% of Children's accounts receivable

Children's recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, Children's recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy) Net patient service revenue before the provision for uncollectible accounts by major payor source for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, are as follows

Laws and regulations governing these programs are complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that reported estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Children's has received regulatory inquiries and regulatory reviews in the normal course of business. In addition, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action including fines, penalties, and exclusion from the Medicaid and Medicare programs. Management believes Children's is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

C. Charity Care

Children's has calculated charity care at cost by utilizing a ratio of cost to gross charges applied to gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients Charity care at cost was approximately \$4,615 and \$5,153 for 2013 and 2012, respectively

Children's participates in the Hospital Care Assurance Program (HCAP) Ohio created HCAP to financially support those Ohio hospitals that service a disproportionate share of low-income patients unable to pay for care HCAP funds basic, medically necessary hospital services for patients whose family income is at or below the federal poverty level, which includes patients without health insurance

Children's received gross amounts under HCAP of \$11,484 and \$10,482 in 2013 and 2012, respectively However, as shown in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets, Children's reported HCAP assessment expense of \$2,813 and \$2,512 in 2013 and 2012, respectively Total HCAP funds at the state level goes into a state formula with assessments from all participating hospitals which are then disbursed based on factors outside of Children's control HCAP revenue and assessments are recognized on the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets when Children's is entitled and obligated to them and payment is probable

Future HCAP funding is subject to annual governmental approval, and the program's continued existence is uncertain

D. Policy for Assessing Timing and Amounts of Uncollectible Accounts

Children's estimation of the allowance for uncollectible accounts is based primarily upon the payor and age of the patient accounts receivable and the effectiveness of Children's collection efforts Children's policy is to reserve a portion of all self-pay receivables, including amounts due from the uninsured and amounts related to co-payments and deductibles, as these charges are recorded On a periodic basis, Children's reviews its accounts receivable balances, the effectiveness of Children's reserve policies and various analytics to support the basis for its estimates These efforts primarily consist of reviewing the following

- Historical write-off and collection experience using a hindsight or look-back approach
- Revenue and volume trends by payor, particularly the self-pay components
- Changes in the aging and payor mix of accounts receivable, including increased focus on accounts due from the uninsured and accounts that represent co-payments and deductibles due from patients
- Trending of days revenue in accounts receivable
- Various allowance coverage statistics

E. Changes Within the Allowance for Uncollectible Accounts

Children's allowance for uncollectible accounts for insured and uninsured accounts receivable increased to 9% of accounts receivable at December 31, 2013, and was 7% of accounts receivable at December 31, 2012 In addition, Children's self-pay write-offs increased to \$13,016 for fiscal year 2013 from \$9,287 for fiscal year 2012 Overall net accounts receivable remained fairly consistent with the prior year However, the self-pay portion of insured and the uninsured patients accounts increased as a percentage of total accounts receivable, which increased the allowance for uncollectible accounts Children's has not changed its charity care or uninsured discount policies during fiscal year 2013 or 2012

Electronic Health Record (EHR) Incentive Payments

Under certain provisions of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, federal incentive payments are available to hospitals, physicians, and certain other professionals (Providers) when they adopt certified EHR technology or become "meaningful users" of EHR technology in ways that demonstrate improved quality, safety, and effectiveness of care Providers can become eligible for annual Medicare incentive payments by demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each period over four years Medicaid Providers can receive their initial incentive payment by adopting, implementing or upgrading (AIU) certified EHR technology, but must demonstrate meaningful use of EHR technology in subsequent years in order to qualify for additional payments Hospitals may be eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid EHR incentive payments, however, physicians and other professionals may be eligible for either Medicare or Medicaid incentive payments, but not both Medicaid EHR incentive payments to Providers are 100% federally funded and administered by the states

Management acquired certified EHR technology for Children's and certain of Children's employed physicians in 2011 Children's and certain of its employed physicians met meaningful use status again in 2013 and 2012, respectively Accordingly, Children's received Medicaid incentive payments for the hospital and its physicians for the adoption of certified EHR technology and meeting meaningful use criteria As a result, during the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, Children's recognized approximately \$3,662 and \$3,298 of hospital and physician incentive payments from Medicaid as revenue under the grant accounting model Also, as Children's satisfies specified meaningful use criteria in future periods, it may become entitled to additional Medicaid incentive payments EHR incentive payments are subject to audit

Supplemental Medicaid Reimbursement (SMR) and Children's Hospital Graduate Medical Education Program (CHGME)

Children's received \$12,414 and \$12,870 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, from SMR In 2013 and 2012, SMR includes a supplemental inpatient and outpatient hospital upper limit payment program for children's hospitals paid under the prospective payment system for inpatient hospital services, as well as a Medicaid Managed Care Incentive

Children's received \$2,770 and \$2,836 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, from CHGME CHGME provides funding to support the training of pediatric and other residents in graduate medical education programs

Medicaid Physician Enhanced Reimbursement

Children's received \$8,013 in 2013 from the Affordable Care Act for Medicaid Physician Enhanced Reimbursement Enhanced reimbursement provides improved professional fee reimbursement to those providers serving Medicaid patients

Future SMR, CHGME and Medicaid Physician Enhanced Reimbursement funding is subject to annual governmental approval, and the programs' continued existence is uncertain

Advertising Costs

Children's incurs advertising costs to educate Northeast Ohio of Children's services in the form of print, radio, television, and internet, which are expensed as incurred Advertising costs were approximately \$6,816 and \$5,892 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, and are classified within purchased services in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets

Contributions and Grants

Unconditional donor promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received Conditional donor promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or the purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are classified as contributions in the current years.

No amounts have been reflected in the consolidated financial statements for donated services Children's pays for most services requiring specific expertise However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist Children's with various programs

Grants received for research and development projects are reported as unrestricted revenue and as expenses in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets in the period in which expenditures for such projects are incurred. Funds received in advance of expenditures are invested and accounted for as temporarily restricted net assets. Research, development, and contracted education costs recognized as unrestricted revenue were \$4,370 and \$3,052 in 2013 and 2012, respectively

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as an addition to unrestricted net assets unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as contributions and other or as an addition to temporarily restricted net assets in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service

Excess of Revenue Over Expenses or Performance Indicator

The consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include the excess of revenue over expenses sometimes referred to as the performance indicator Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from the excess of revenue over expenses include contributions of capital (including assets acquired using governmental or donor contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets), and changes in pension plan and other postretirement obligations. This is consistent with industry practice

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by Children's has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose Funds restricted for specific operating purposes are classified as unrestricted contributions to the extent used within the current period Investment income including the net changes in fair value on investments of temporarily restricted net assets are added to or deducted from temporarily restricted net assets Investment income on temporarily restricted net assets of \$6,518 and \$2,904 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, include unrealized gains of \$5,386 and \$2,192 in 2013 and 2012, respectively Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by Children's in perpetuity while the investment earnings are reported as temporarily restricted net assets as stated above

Fair Value Measurements

Fair value measurements are defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date

Fair value estimates are made at a specific point in time based on relevant market information about the financial instrument. These estimates are subjective in nature and involve uncertainties and matters of significant judgment and, therefore, cannot be determined with precision. Changes in assumptions could significantly affect the estimates

The framework for measuring fair value is comprised of a three-level hierarchy based upon the transparency of inputs to the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date. The three levels are defined as follows

- Level 1 inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets
- Level 2 inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument
- Level 3 inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement

A financial instrument's categorization within the valuation hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while Children's believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different estimate of fair value at the reporting date

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts Actual results may differ from those estimates

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Children's considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased, including money market mutual funds, to be cash equivalents. However, cash and cash equivalents not designated for operations are classified in investments

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost (weighted-average method) or net realizable value

Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the December 31, 2013 and 2012 consolidated financial statements. All investments are classified as trading

Investment income (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) net of investment fees are reported as nonoperating gains (losses) in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law in which case the amounts are classified as increases in temporarily restricted net assets Realized gains and losses are recognized using the average cost method

Investments in alternative investments, which may include hedge funds, private equity/venture funds and real estate funds, are primarily limited partnerships that invest in marketable securities, privately held securities, real estate, and derivative products and are reported using the equity method of accounting based on net asset value information provided by the respective partnership or third-party fund administrators. Investments held by the partnerships consist of marketable securities as well as securities that do not have readily determinable values. The values of the securities held by the limited partnerships that do not have readily determinable values are determined by the general partner and are based on historical cost, appraisals, or other valuation estimates that require varying degrees of judgment. There is inherent uncertainty in such valuations, and the estimated fair values may differ from the values that would have been used had a ready market for the securities existed Generally, the equity method investment balance of Children's holdings in alternative investments reflects net contributions to the partnerships and Children's share of realized and unrealized investment income and expenses The investments may individually expose Children's to securities lending, short sales, and trading in futures and forward contract options and other derivative products Children's risk is limited to its carrying value Alternative investments can be divested only at specified times in accordance with terms of the partnership agreements. The financial statements of the limited partnerships are audited annually

Children's investments are exposed to a variety of risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that change could materially vary from the amounts reported in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment are reported at cost if purchased or fair value at date received, if donated Routine maintenance, repairs, renewals, and replacement costs are charged to expense as incurred Expenditures that substantially increase the useful lives or functionality of existing assets are capitalized Children's provides depreciation (including amortization of capital leases) using the straight-line method with half-year convention over the estimated useful lives (ranging from 3 to 40 years) of plant and equipment Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets Assets acquired under capital lease arrangements are excluded from the consolidated statement of cash flows

As required by *Topic 410 – Asset Retirement and Environmental Obligations* of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC), if an entity has sufficient information to reasonably estimate the fair value of an obligation in connection with the retirement of an asset, it is required to recognize a liability when the retirement occurs Management has considered this topic specifically as it relates to its asset retirement activities, such as asbestos removal, on its existing properties No liability is necessary at December 31, 2013 or 2012

Included in the financial statements are unamortized computer software costs of \$33,930 and \$36,786 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively Amortization of computer software costs totaled \$6,902 and \$4,412 in 2013 and 2012, respectively

Children's began construction of a new seven story Critical Care Tower in 2013, which is being constructed using an integrated project delivery (IPD) construction method. The Critical Care Tower is the first phase of Children's planned expansion of the Akron campus, and is estimated to cost \$180,000. The new building will include outpatient surgery, a new emergency department, and expanded neonatal intensive care services. Included in the IPD contract is an Incentive Compensation Layer (ICL) provision where the construction partners will share in savings resulting from the IPD method. At December 31, 2013, Children's has included \$3,646 in other long-term liabilities and construction-in-progress for estimated ICL.

Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

Children's evaluates the recoverability of long-lived assets and the related estimated remaining lives at each consolidated balance sheet date. If events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of long-lived assets may not be recoverable, Children's will perform an impairment analysis to determine if the carrying value may not be recoverable or the useful life has changed

Deferred Financing Costs

Other assets include other deferred financing costs for the Series 2012, Series 2013 and Series 2013B bonds, for the year ended December 31, 2013

Deferred financing costs and the cost of noncancelable municipal bond insurance on the Series 2003 Bonds were written off when these bonds were defeased, as noted in Note 6

For the year ended December 31, 2012, other assets included the cost of noncancelable municipal bond insurance insuring the payment of principal and interest on the Series 2003 Bonds and other deferred financing costs for the Series 2003 and Series 2012 Bonds

Deferred financing costs are being amortized over the period the obligation is outstanding using the bonds outstanding method

Other Assets

In December 2010, Children's consummated an agreement whereby as of December 31, 2010 (the acquisition date), Children's purchased the rights to own and operate the 21-bed special care nursery (Summa SCN) on the Akron City Hospital campus of Summa Health System (Summa) The fair value of the consideration received at the acquisition date included \$7,769 of intangible assets assigned to the right to conduct business, with a ten-year useful life Amortization of the intangible assets is expected to be \$777 per year over the next seven years The unamortized balance at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, is \$5,438 and \$6,215

Beneficial Interest in Charitable Remainder and Perpetual Trusts

Children's has irrevocable rights to receive a portion of the specified cash flows from certain perpetual and charitable remainder trusts. Due to the time restriction of Children's access to the assets held in these trusts, Children's interests in the charitable remainder and perpetual trusts are reported as temporarily and permanently restricted net assets, respectively. Adjustments to the fair value of the trusts are recognized as increases or decreases in temporarily and permanently restricted net assets. Distributions from these trusts are reported in net assets released from restrictions in accordance with the donors' restrictions.

Reclassification

Certain prior year amounts have been reclassified in the consolidated statements of cash flows to conform with the current year presentation

7. Reserve for General and Professional Liability

CDIC maintains Children's and its employed physicians' primary layer of professional liability insurance, and beginning June 1, 2003, general liability insurance on an occurrence coverage basis. In addition, CDIC provides excess liability coverage through a commercial insurance company on a claims-made basis to Children's Liability claims have been asserted against Children's by various claimants. These claims are in various stages of processing or are in litigation. There are known incidents and perhaps unknown incidents, which may result in assertion of additional claims. The ultimate cost of claims incurred for a specific time period is usually not known until several years after the close of that period. Therefore, loss development factors are used to project the additional cost expected on claims associated with current and past loss periods. These factors quantify the late developing aspects of certain losses, such as verdict values for litigated claims, which are different than the amount that was reserved to pay the claims. They also account for losses that occurred during the period but are not reported until a later date, commonly referred to as incurred but not reported losses, or IBNRs. The reserve for professional liability includes estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported and IBNR claims and is undiscounted for 2013 and 2012.

The reserve for professional liability includes case-basis estimates of reported losses, plus amounts provided for IBNR losses calculated based upon loss projections utilizing actuarial studies of historical and industry data. In establishing the liability for losses and loss adjustment expenses, CDIC utilizes the findings of an independent consulting actuary. The actuary has applied loss development techniques as well as the Bornhuetter-Ferguson Technique to evaluate reserves.

Management has recorded its reserves within the range of acceptable values provided by the actuary and believes that its aggregate liability for unpaid losses and loss adjustment expenses at year-end represents its best estimate, based upon available data, of the amount necessary to cover ultimate cost of losses. However, Children's professional liability coverage is characterized by considerable volatility in both claim frequency and claim severity. Such volatility is a function of demographic, social, legal, and other considerations, which are not directly quantifiable. Accordingly, the ultimate liability could vary significantly from the amount recorded in the consolidated financial statements. As adjustments to these estimates become necessary, such adjustments are reflected in current operations. Included in operating expenses in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets is professional liability (income) expense of (\$1,215) and \$8,473 in 2013 and 2012, respectively. Additionally, in 2013, Children's recognized a change in estimate of \$8,000 due to favorable experience in claims exposure

Children's has a 403(b) matching retirement savings plan, which covers employees who meet certain age, eligibility, and service requirements Children's matches 50% of the employee's contribution up to 4% of defined compensation Expense reported on the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets under this plan amounted to \$4,081 and \$3,824 in 2013 and 2012, respectively

Children's has a defined contribution plan, Children's Retirement Security Plan, covering employees hired January 1, 2007, and forward The plan is funded by Children's and the investments are controlled by each plan participant Expense reported on the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets was \$3,904 and \$3,217 in 2013 and 2012, respectively

Children's has a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan covering substantially all employees who were employed prior to January 2007. The plan provides benefits based on the participants' years of service and compensation or stated amounts for each year of service. Children's funding policy is to contribute amounts to the plan sufficient to meet minimum funding requirements of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 and the Pension Protection Act of 2006, and other such amounts as Children's may contribute

In addition to Children's pension plan, Children's sponsors a health care plan that provides other postretirement medical benefits to retirees who meet certain age and length of service requirements. The plan contains cost-sharing features such as deductibles and coinsurance Children's policy is to fund the cost of medical benefits on a pay-as-you-go basis. Children's has no plan assets designated for funding of its accrued postretirement benefit cost.

Effective January 1, 2013, Children's replaced the group healthcare plan offered to Children's Medicare retirees with individual Medigap supplement, prescription drug, and Medicare Advantage plans Because notice was given to participants in September 2012, the postretirement medical benefits plan liability was reduced by \$21,864 at December 31, 2012, for this change from a self-insured product

At December 31, 2013 and 2012, \$12,971 due to a third party, is classified as a long-term liability on the consolidated balance sheets, which may be payable if the Beeghly Campus were to be sold

Children's sold certain physicians' property suites, with an obligation to repurchase the property if certain circumstances were to occur Children's has recorded a long-term liability of \$3,286 and \$3,231 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, for future amounts payable to physicians if the buyback provisions are exercised

10. Endowments

Children's endowments consist of approximately 54 individual funds established for a variety of purposes Its endowments include donor-restricted endowment funds. Net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. All of the Children's endowment funds are deemed to be permanently restricted either by explicit donor stipulation or by law

Children's has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary As a result of this interpretation, Children's classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified as permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by Children's in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA

Children's follows the objectives of the Akron Children's Hospital Foundation Investment Policy Statement The objective of the investment program is to provide earnings from cash resources to be used to help support the business and mission of Children's This investment objective attempts to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain purchasing power of the endowment assets Endowment assets under UPMIFA include those assets of donor-restricted funds that Children's must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specific period(s) as well as board-designated funds

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, Children's relies on a total investment return strategy in which investment returns are the sum of realized gains or losses and income, plus unrealized capital appreciation or depreciation, net of fees that should outperform its respective benchmark, over a typical market cycle at volatility levels in line with the respective benchmark Children's targets a diversified asset allocation to achieve its long-term objective within prudent risk constraints. Actual returns in any given year may vary

Children's policy is to record the annual income as temporarily restricted and expend upon meeting donor stipulations. If donor stipulations are broad, the annual income is recognized as unrestricted. Children's objective is to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment returns.
