The mission, values, commitment to patient care excellence, and philosophy of nursing excellence provide the foundation that supports Bronson's organizational strategy, which is illustrated in the vision to be a national leader in healthcare quality and the four Cs, or corporate strategies: Clinical Distinction, Exceptional Customer Experiences, Corporate Vitality, and Community Health Catalyst Excellence is the thread that ties together the vision, mission, values, commitment to patient care excellence, philosophy of nursing excellence, and overall strategies. These elements, comprising the Plan for Excellence above, form the culture and guide decision-making.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2013 and 2012

Note I - Nature of Business

Bronson Battle Creek (the "Hospital") is a medical center providing acute care medical and surgical services. The Hospital, located in Battle Creek, Michigan, has 218 beds and provides services to the greater Battle Creek and surrounding communities. Admitting physicians are primarily practitioners in the local area. The Hospital is exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Prior to July 1, 2011, BCHS Community Partners of Battle Creek and Trinity Health each had a 50 percent membership interest in the Hospital, which was referred to as Battle Creek Health System. On July 1, 2011, Bronson Healthcare Group (the "Group") purchased a 51 percent interest in the Hospital, purchasing the 50 percent interest of Trinity Health and 1 percent interest from BCHS Community Partners of Battle Creek. At the time of acquisition, the name of the Hospital was changed to Bronson Battle Creek. The Group board of directors provides governance oversight of the Hospital's net assets and operations.

The Hospital owns 51 percent of Advanced Imaging Services of Battle Creek (AIS). The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital and AIS. Significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Consolidation - The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital and its majority-owned and controlled subsidiary. Significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Cash and Cash Equivalents - Cash and cash equivalents include cash and investments in highly liquid investments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding those amounts included in assets limited as to use.

Investments - The Hospital's cash equivalents and investments are maintained in a pooled investment fund held by the Group. Requests for withdrawals from the fund are generally honored on demand at the amount deposited, minus withdrawals, plus earnings credited while on deposit. The fund's investment policy allows for investments in such securities as U.S. government obligations, commercial paper, bankers' acceptances, certificates of deposit, marketable equity securities, money market funds, and privately held alternative investments. Earnings of the fund are credited to investment participants on a pro-rata basis when realized. Aggregate investment earnings and realized and unrealized losses from the fund for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012 were approximately \$5,658,000 and \$3,351,000, respectively.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2013 and 2012

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in excess of revenue (under) over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law.

In cases where quoted market prices are not available, fair values are based on estimates using present value or other valuation techniques. Those techniques are significantly affected by the assumptions used, including the discount rate and estimates on future cash flows. The aggregate fair value amounts presented do not represent the underlying value of the Hospital; instead, they represent point-in-time estimates that might not be particularly relevant in predicting the Hospital's future earnings on cash flows. All financial instruments held or issued by the Hospital are considered trading.

Accounts Receivable - Accounts receivable for patients, insurance companies, and governmental agencies are based on gross charges. An allowance for contractual adjustments and interim payment advances is based on expected payment rates from payors based on current reimbursement methodologies. Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data related to these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary. For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts in the period they are determined to be uncollectible.

Assets Limited as to Use - Assets limited as to use include funds held in trust for payment of employee benefits and amounts restricted by donors for specific purposes.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2013 and 2012

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Property and Equipment - Property and equipment amounts were recorded at fair value at the time of acquisition by the Group. Current year additions have been recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Right to Use of Information Technology - The Hospital has an agreement with Trinity Health for the right to use Trinity's information technology system for up to three years. The agreement was subsequently extended and the prepaid fees are recorded at cost and are being amortized over the remaining life of the agreement. Expected implementation date for EPIC is February 2015.

Classification of Net Assets - Net assets of the Hospital are classified as permanently restricted, temporarily restricted, or unrestricted depending on the presence and characteristics of donor-imposed restrictions limiting the Hospital's ability to use or dispose of contributed assets or the economic benefits embodied in those assets. Donor-imposed restrictions that expire with the passage of time or that can be removed by meeting certain requirements result in temporarily restricted net assets. Permanently restricted net assets result from donor-imposed restrictions that limit the use of net assets in perpetuity. Earnings, gains, and losses on restricted net assets are classified as unrestricted unless specifically restricted by the donor or by applicable state law.

Net Patient Service Revenue - Net patient service revenue is reported at estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered and include estimated retroactive revenue adjustments based upon audits, reviews, and adjustments by third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period such adjustments become known or as years are no longer subject to such audits, reviews, and adjustments. Management believes that adequate provisions have been made in the consolidated financial statements for any adjustments that may result from final settlements. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts, amounted to \$180,308,000 and \$170,534,000 for third-party payors, and \$27,117,000 and \$29,589,000 for self pay for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Retroactively calculated adjustments arising under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods, as final settlements are determined.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2013 and 2012

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. Management believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. Final determination of compliance of such laws and regulations is subject to future government review and interpretation.

Tax Status - The Hospital is a nonprofit, tax-exempt organization, and is exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, accordingly, no tax provision is reflected in the consolidated financial statements. The Hospital's tax returns are not subject to examination by taxing authorities for years beginning prior to July 1, 2011.

AlS is a for-profit limited liability company. AlS is treated as a partnership for federal income tax purposes and as such members are taxed individually on their pro-rata ownership share of AlS's earnings. There has been no current tax liability or assets recognized for estimated taxes payable or refundable.

The Hospital has adopted accounting standards related to uncertain tax positions and, accordingly, reviewed all tax positions. The evaluated potential exposure related to uncertain tax positions was found to be immaterial.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Payments - The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) established funding in order to provide incentive payments to hospitals and physicians that implement the use of electronic health record (EHR) technology by 2014. The Hospital may receive an incentive payment for up to four years, provided the Hospital demonstrates meaningful use of certified EHR technology for the EHR reporting period. The revenue from the incentive payments is recognized ratably over the EHR reporting period when there is reasonable assurance that the Hospital will comply with eligibility requirements during the EHR reporting period and an incentive payment will be received. The amounts are recorded within other operating revenue as the incentive payments are related to the Hospital's ongoing and central activities yet not critical to the delivery of patient service.

Subsequent Events - The consolidated financial statements and related disclosures include evaluation of events up through and including April 14, 2014, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair value of each class of financial instruments for which it is practicable to estimate that value:

Cash and Cash Equivalents - The carrying amount reported in the consolidated balance sheet approximates its fair value because of the short maturity of those instruments.

Accounts Receivable, Estimated Third-party Payor Settlements, Accounts Payable, and Accrued Liabilities - The carrying amount reported in the consolidated balance sheet approximates its fair value.

Marketable Securities - The fair value amounts of marketable securities, included in investments and assets limited or restricted as to use in the consolidated balance sheet, are based on quoted market prices, if available, or are estimated using quoted market prices for similar assets.

Long-term Debt - The carrying amount of the Hospital's long-term debt approximates fair value.

Note 4 - Fair Value Measurements

Accounting standards require certain assets and liabilities be reported at fair value in the financial statements and provide a framework for establishing that fair value. The framework for determining fair value is based on a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs and valuation techniques used to measure fair value.

The following tables present information about the Hospital's assets measured at fair value on a recurring basis at December 31, 2013 and 2012 and the valuation techniques used by the Hospital to determine those fair values.

In general, fair values determined by Level I inputs use quoted prices in active markets for identical assets that the Hospital has the ability to access.

Fair values determined by Level 2 inputs use other inputs that are observable, either directly or indirectly. These Level 2 inputs include quoted prices for similar assets in active markets, and other inputs such as interest rates and yield curves that are observable at commonly quoted intervals.

Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs, including inputs that are available in situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the related asset. These Level 3 fair value measurements are based primarily on management's own estimates using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques taking into account the characteristics of the asset.

Note 4 - Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

In instances whereby inputs used to measure fair value fall into different levels in the above fair value hierarchy, fair value measurements in their entirety are categorized based on the lowest level input that is significant to the valuation. The Hospital's assessment of the significance of particular inputs to these fair value measurements requires judgment and considers factors specific to each asset.

The Hospital's policy is to recognize transfers in and transfers out of Level 1, 2, and 3 fair value classifications as of the actual date of the event of change in circumstances that caused the transfer.

During the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, there were no significant transfers between Levels I and 2.

Note 6 - Estimated Third-party Payor Settlements

A significant amount of the Hospital's net patient service revenue is received from the Medicare, Medicaid, and Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan programs. Subsidiaries of the Hospital have agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement at amounts different from established rates. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with these third-party payors is as follows:

- Medicare Inpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid
 at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a
 patient classification system based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors.
 Outpatient and homecare services related to Medicare beneficiaries are reimbursed
 based on a prospectively determined amount per episode of care. Payments are
 also received for capital and medical education costs subject to certain limits.
- Medicaid Inpatient, acute care services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are also paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Capital costs relating to Medicaid patients are paid on a cost reimbursement method. Outpatient and physician services are reimbursed on an established fee-for-service methodology.
- Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan Inpatient, acute-care services are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services are reimbursed on fee-for-service and percentage-of-charge bases.

Note 6 - Estimated Third-party Payor Settlements (Continued)

• Other Third-party Payors - The Hospital has also entered into agreements with certain commercial carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The bases for reimbursement to the Hospital under these agreements are discounts from established charges, prospectively determined rates per discharge, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Cost report settlements result from the adjustment of interim payments to final reimbursement under the Medicare, Medicaid, and Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan programs that are subject to audit by fiscal intermediaries. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

The Medicare program has initiated a recovery audit contractor (RAC) initiative, whereby claims subsequent to October 1, 2007 will be reviewed by contractors for validity, accuracy, and proper documentation. The Hospital is unable to determine the extent of liability for overpayments or underpayments found in an audit. The potential exists for significant overpayments or underpayments of claims liability for the Hospital at a future date.

Note 7 - Charity Care

In support of its mission, the Hospital provides various health-related services, at a loss, to the indigent and other residents of its service area. Charity care is determined based on established policies, using patient income and assets to determine payment ability. The amount reflects the cost of free or discounted health services, net of contributions and other revenues received, as direct assistance for the provision of charity care. The estimated cost of providing charity services is based on a calculation which applies a ratio of cost to charges to the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients. The ratio of cost to charges is calculated based on the Hospital's total expenses divided by gross patient service revenue.

Equity in earnings or losses of such joint ventures is included in other revenue in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets and amounted to gains of approximately \$64,000 and \$24,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The Hospital also purchases certain services in the ordinary course of business, and maintains most insurance coverage from the Group. The Hospital's expenses related to these activities generally are based on costs incurred and are not material in relation to the Hospital's operations.

Note 13 - Pension Plan

Prior to July 1, 2011, the employees of the Hospital participated in the cash balance defined benefit pension plan sponsored by Trinity Health. As a result of the Group's acquisition of the Hospital during 2011, the defined benefit pension plan obligation specific to the Hospital's employees under the Trinity plan was determined and transferred to a new defined benefit pension plan, which was immediately frozen. A total of \$94 million of assets was transferred from the Trinity plan related to the obligation. As part of the acquisition, the former Trinity plan has been frozen and is being separately tracked.

Starting on July 1, 2011, all employees of the Hospital are eligible to participate in the existing BHG plan. Under this arrangement, the Hospital is charged for its share of costs incurred to provide pension benefits for its employees under the plan. Benefits are based on a participant's years of service and compensation during the last 10 years of employment. Expense recorded by the Hospital under the ongoing pension plan totaled approximately \$1,100,000 and \$900,000 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The liability related to the pension obligation was assumed by the Hospital at fair value.

The expected rate of return for the plans' total assets is based on the expected return of each of the categories of equities and fixed income. These categories are weighted based on the median of the target allocation for each class (equities - 60 percent and fixed income - 40 percent). Equity securities are expected to return 10 percent to 11 percent over the long term, while fixed income is expected to return between 4 percent to 6 percent. Based on historical experience, the committee expects that the plans' asset managers will provide a modest (0.0 percent to 1.0 percent per annum) premium to their respective market benchmark indices.

Investment Policies and Strategies

The plans' assets are invested in an actively managed diversified portfolio that integrates asset allocation strategies across the equity and debt market globally. The portfolio's objective is to maximize total return, consisting of current income and capital appreciation, without assuming undue risk. Active asset allocation strategies are followed, which increase or decrease investments in equity and debt markets based upon ongoing fundamental analysis. The active management process combines judgments about the value of the stock and bond markets and the relative value of a wide variety of securities within these markets. Consideration is given to various variables, including productivity, inflation, global competitiveness, and risk. The Hospital's objective is to have 60 percent invested in equity securities and 40 percent invested in fixed income.

Contributions

The Hospital expects to contribute \$220,000 to its pension plan in 2014.

Note 14 - Professional Liability Insurance

The Hospital participates in a self-insured, multiprovider, professional liability arrangement sponsored by the Group. This arrangement is designed to provide participating members with a specified level of primary professional liability coverage, with excess layers of insurance coverage provided by commercial insurers under claimsmade policies. The levels of excess coverage vary by year, depending upon the availability and cost of that insurance. Should the claims-made policies not be renewed or be replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on occurrences during its term and reported subsequently will be uninsured. Participating members of the self-insured arrangement are annually assessed amounts that reflect the level of professional liability risk subject to self-insurance for the participating entity. The expense assessed to the Hospital totaled approximately \$594,000 and \$322,000 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The Hospital is involved in certain legal actions arising from services provided to patients and, additionally, is aware of certain possible claims that presently are not the subject of judicial proceedings. Although the Hospital is unable to precisely estimate the ultimate cost of settlements of professional liability claims, a provision is made for management's best estimate of losses for uninsured portions of pending claims and for known incidents that may result in the assertion of additional claims. Management believes, after considering legal counsel's evaluations of all actions and claims, that insurance coverage and accruals recorded at the Group for estimated losses are adequate to cover expected settlements.

Community Health Needs Assessment Implementation Strategy 2014-2015 Bronson Battle Creek Hospital Not for Publication Final November 22, 2013

Based upon the findings of the 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment, Bronson Battle Creek Hospital (BBCH) has identified improving access to care as the focus of the Community Health Improvement strategic plan for the period from December 1, 2013 through December 31, 2016. This decision reflects a convergence of the health needs expressed by our community and the historic opportunity presented by Medicaid expansion and the launching of the Health Insurance Exchange in Michigan.

Adequate access is dependent not only on supply of providers but also on affordability, physical accessibility, acceptability of services, and removal of barriers. To address this need, Bronson Battle Creek Hospital will take a leadership role, collaborate with community partners across county boundaries and focus programming on issues related to reducing the number of uninsured in the region, ensuring residents have access to primary care services, and complex care coordination.

OBJECTIVE 1.

Reduce the number of uninsured in the region.

Implementation Strategies

- A. Convene stakeholders and lead a coalition to organize a coordinated community approach to enroll eligible residents in Medicaid and insurance exchanges. Many organizations are working on this issue but there remains little leadership, communication, or coordination. An assessment of ongoing activities and current gap analysis will be completed with community stakeholders. Outreach opportunities will be identified to engage uninsured persons prior to admission to hospital. (2014)
- B. Financial counselors and other staff as identified will be trained to facilitate enrollment in Medicaid and insurance exchanges. (2014-2015)
- C. Develop a communication plan and distribute informational materials and resource guides explaining Medicaid and insurance exchanges throughout the community. Assist community agencies when needed to explain insurance exchanges. (2014-2015)
- D. Continue support for Community Healthcare Connections including selected resources and direct financial support. (2014-2016)

Anticipated Impact & Measures

This programming will help to mitigate barriers associated with the affordability of receiving healthcare, increase awareness and knowledge associated with Medicaid Expansion and insurance exchanges, and reduce the number of uninsured in the region.

- B. Seek Patient-Centered Medical Home designation for all Bronson practices. (2014-2016)
- C. Develop community resource guide on providers open to new patients to include providers accepting Medicaid. (2015)
- D. Promote establishment of medical homes within recently insured population and promote use of medical homes throughout community. (2014-2016)
- E. Bronson Battle Creek Hospital will continue operation of an urgent care facility to ensure continued access to after-hours, night, and weekend health care. (2014)
- F. Promote and increase open-access availability in Bronson practices, the FHC, and within private practices. (2014-2016)
- G. Leverage 211 to become referral conduit for primary care. (2015-2016)
- H. Enhance collaborative partnerships with the Battle Creek Family Health Center (FHC) to improve open access and ensure quality primary care for the underserved. (2014-2016)
- I. Continue partnership with FHC and Community HealthCare Connections to provide dental health access. (2014-2016)

Anticipated Impact & Measures

This programming will mitigate barriers associated with accessing primary care services, increase the number of residents with medical homes, and improve after-hour access for non-emergent medical services.

- B. Organize, coordinate, and improve access to community transportation resources and promote the use of community resources with community partners and hospital staff. (2015)
- C. Develop collaborations to enhance health services coordination throughout the care continuum including medical, social, and behavioral care coordination. (2015-2016)
- D. Improve communication, coordination, and collaboration among agencies providing social service support, housing, healthcare, education, and mental health services. (2015-2016)
- E. Continue collaboration and partnership with the CentraCare Inc. Program for All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE); a community-based supplemental adult care service for Medicare and Medicaid "dual-eligible" seniors to provide physician, social worker and rehabilitation facilities, as well as dietitian and personal-care services in a single location. (2014-2016)
- F. Continue collaborative efforts and support for Healthy Babies, Healthy Start; Nurse Family Partnership; Great Start Collaborative; and the FHC to improve birth and learning outcomes for Calhoun County children. (2014-2016)
- G. Leverage Integrated Health Partners to facilitate community based care coordination activities. (2014-2016)
- H. Continue provision of a nurse navigator to assist in the coordination of care and act as a single point of contact with the medical team and community resources. (2014)
- I. Collaborate with and provide financial resources for Senior Health Partners; a community partnership providing healthcare, education, support services, and exercise programing to improve the health and well-being of older adults. (2014)

Anticipated Impact & Measures

This programming with enhance and improve coordination of care across the spectrum of care for Calhoun residents.

- 2. Number of referrals to navigator
- 3. Provider and patient satisfaction surveys
- 4. Other measures identified through establishment of programming throughout 2014-2016

NEEDS NOT ADDRESSED IN THIS IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

The 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment included a prioritization of health needs encompassing: magnitude of needs, measurable outcomes, Bronson capabilities, evidence for effective interventions, community commitment, and consistency with Bronson Strategy. At the conclusion of this prioritization process, Access to Care was selected for the focus of Community Health activities in 2014-2016. This

effort will require substantial financial and staffing resources as well as significant collaborations with community organizations. As such, other significant health needs identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment will not be a strategic priority at this time.

Bronson Battle Creek Hospital is committed to improving the health of our community and is meeting other identified community health needs through existing programs, by providing Board representation and leadership to local organizations, and as a partner in collaborative community efforts. BBCH acknowledges that in some circumstances the hospital is not the appropriate leader to address identified needs and where possible supports and partners with relevant community organizations which are better suited to addressing those needs.

Furthermore, while identified as a need, socio-economic drivers of health, such as poverty are not addressed within the implementation plan as BBCH staff determined that these needs were better aligned with the mission of other organizations within the community.

RESOURCES

In keeping with Bronson's strategic commitment to be a community leader and serve as a catalyst to improve the health of the Southwest Michigan region Bronson commits substantial resources to community health improvement efforts. These resources include but are not limited to; staffing for programs related to community health, the continuation of financial and charity care provisions for those in need, direct financial support for community health strategic initiatives, sponsorships for community organizations, and investment in activities and programs to increase healthcare capacity in the region. In addition, Bronson Healthcare Group has designated executive leadership and select staff including at least one full time position to develop and oversee the implementation of the Community Health Improvement Plan and to engage community organizations in collaborative efforts. Through community partnerships, our service with the Regional Health Alliance, The Coordinating Council, Integrated Health Partners, and our own BBCH Community Partners, we share in the work that is advancing to improve the health of Calhoun County.
