An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Opinion

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of HealthPartners, Inc. and subsidiaries as of December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013, and the results of their operations and their cash flows for the year ended December 31, 2013, in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.



#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

#### (1) Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### (a) Organization

HealthPartners, Inc. and subsidiaries (HP) is a integrated healthcare delivery system that provides healthcare services and coverage to approximately 832,000 members of HP insurance products as well as healthcare services to the general public throughout Minnesota and surrounding states. It provides these services through a network of 80 owned and leased primary and specialty care medical facilities and 22 dental facilities with over 1,100 full-time-equivalent medical and dental physicians and 5 owned hospitals with over 1,000 acute care beds, as well as contracting with various primary and specialty medical facilities and dental facilities, physician groups, hospitals, and related healthcare providers located primarily in the Twin Cities and Western Wisconsin areas.

HP and PNHS accounted for this transaction as a merger under Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Subtopic 958-805, *Not-for Profit Entities—Business Combination* and will therefore use the carryover basis of accounting. No consideration was paid by either HP or PNHS. PNHS is a nonprofit, integrated healthcare system located in St. Louis Park, Minnesota. PNHS provides care and support to the Minneapolis and surrounding communities through a 426 acute care bed hospital, 593 full-time-equivalent physicians practicing 45 specialties at 20 primary care clinics, 2 ambulatory surgery centers, 11 retail pharmacies, and 8 healthcare product retail stores.

PNHS is the parent company of Park Nicollet Methodist Hospital (Methodist), Park Nicollet Clinic (PNC) including PNMC Holdings a subsidiary of PNC, Park Nicollet Foundation (PNF), Park Nicollet Institute (PNI), Park Nicollet Health Care Products (PNHCP), Park Nicollet Enterprises (PNE), and Tria Orthopedic Center, LLC (TRIA).

GHI and HPI are not-for-profit corporations licensed as health maintenance organizations (HMO) in Minnesota.

GHI, PNHS, Regions, Methodist, Lakeview Health, HH, HHF, WH, WHF, PNC, PNF, PNI, PNHCP, PNBC, IHS, CVTCC, WEMS, HPI-Ramsey, RHW, RHSC, HPIER, and RHF are exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). HPI is exempt under Section 501(c)(4) of the IRC. HESH, HPDC, and TRIA are limited liability corporations. All other organizations are for-profit taxable organizations.

HPI-Ramsey is the parent organization of Regions, Lakeview Health, IHS, CVTCC, RHF, and RHW.

RHW is the parent organization of HH, HHF, WH, WHF, and WEMS.

#### (b) Basis of Accounting

The consolidated financial statements are prepared in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

#### (c) Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions, such as contractual allowances, allowances for doubtful accounts receivable, and charity care, due to third-party payors, postretirement benefit obligation, general and professional liability claims, estimated unpaid medical and dental claims, medical loss ratio (MLR) rebates, and workers' compensation claims liability, that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### (d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

HP considers investments with a maturity of three months or less to be cash and cash equivalents and are carried at cost, which approximates fair value. Cash and cash equivalents held for long-term or restricted as to use are classified as investments and are excluded from cash and cash equivalents.

#### (e) Investments

Investments consist of marketable equity securities and fixed income securities. The investments are carried at fair value and are not included as investments whose use is limited or other investments.

Fixed maturity securities, which may be sold prior to maturity, are classified as available-for-sale and are carried at fair value. Premiums and discounts are amortized or accreted using the interest yield method. Interest income is earned on an accrual basis.

Marketable equity securities are generally classified as available-for-sale and are carried at fair value. HP recognizes dividend income on equity securities upon the declaration of the dividend.

#### (f) Investments Whose Use is Limited and Other Investments

Investments whose use is limited that are intended to be used for current operations are classified as current assets and are carried at fair value based on quoted market prices.

Investments whose use is limited and other investments that are not intended to be used for current operations are, therefore, classified as noncurrent assets and are carried at fair value based on quoted market prices.

#### (g) Realized and Unrealized Gains and Losses

Realized and unrealized gains and losses are determined using the specific security identification method. HP regularly reviews each investment in its various asset classes to evaluate the necessity of recording impairment losses for other-than-temporary declines in fair value. During these reviews, HP evaluates many factors, including, but not limited to, the length of time and the extent to which the current fair value has been below the cost of the security, specific credit issues such as collateral, financial prospects related to the issuer, HP's intent and ability to hold or sell the security, and current economic conditions.

Other-than-temporary impairment (OTTI) is recognized in earnings for a fixed maturity security in an unrealized loss position when it is anticipated that the amortized cost will not be recovered. In such situations, the OTTI recognized in earnings is the entire difference between the fixed maturity security's amortized cost and its fair value only when either HP has the intent to sell the fixed maturity security or it is more likely than not that HP will be required to sell the fixed maturity security before recovery of the decline in the fair value below amortized cost. If neither of these two conditions exists, the difference between the amortized cost basis of the fixed maturity security and the present value of the projected future cash flows expected to be collected is recognized as an OTTI in earnings (credit loss). If the fair value is less than the present value of projected future cash flows expected to be collected, this portion of the OTTI related to other-than credit factors (noncredit

loss) is recorded in net assets as changes in net unrealized gains on investments for noncredit losses on investments. When an unrealized loss on a fixed maturity security is considered temporary, HP continues to record the unrealized loss in net assets as changes in net unrealized loss gains on investments and not in earnings. For equity securities which, when an OTTI has occurred, continue to be impaired for the entire difference between the equity security's cost and its fair value with a corresponding charge to earnings.

For nonstructured fixed maturity securities, an OTTI is recorded when HP believes that it is no longer probable that HP will recover all amounts due under the contractual terms of the security.

For structured fixed maturity securities, an OTTI is recorded when HP believes that based on expected future cash flows, HP will not recover all amounts due under the contractual terms of the security. The credit loss component considers inputs from outside sources along with managements' opinion of factors to develop inputs into the cash flow analysis. These inputs include, among other things, default assumptions on underlying loans, recovery assumptions once underlying loans are in default and a number of other economic inputs into the model.

For equity securities, an OTTI is recorded when HP does not have the ability and intent to hold the security until forecasted recovery, or if the forecasted recovery is not within a reasonable period. Mutual funds are reviewed by analyzing the characteristics of the underlying investments and the outlook for the asset class along with the ability and intent to hold investments.

All other material unrealized losses are reviewed for any unusual event that may trigger an OTTI. Determination of the status of each analyzed investment as other-than-temporary or not is made based on these evaluations with documentation of the rationale for the decision.

Upon recognizing an OTTI, the new cost basis of the security is the previous amortized cost basis less the OTTI recognized in investment income and net realized gains and losses. The new cost basis is not adjusted for any subsequent recoveries in fair value.

HP may, from time to time, sell invested assets subsequent to the balance sheet date that were considered temporarily impaired at the balance sheet date for several reasons. Conversely, HP may not sell invested assets that it asserted that it intended to sell at the balance sheet date. The rationale for the change in HP's ability and intent generally focuses on unforeseen changes in the economic facts and circumstances related to the invested asset subsequent to the balance sheet date, significant unforeseen changes in HP's liquidity needs, or changes in tax laws or the regulatory environment. HP had no material sales of invested assets in an unrealized loss position subsequent to December 31, 2013.

Certain organizations of HP have elected the "fair value option," in accordance with accounting guidance, for certain financial assets. For those financial assets, changes in unrealized gains and losses are recorded in investment income and net realized gains and losses within the consolidated statement of activities.

#### (h) Other Current Assets

Other current assets include pharmaceutical, medical and surgical supplies inventories, which are valued at the lower of average cost or market.

#### (i) Property, Plant, and Equipment, Net

Property, plant, and equipment, net is recorded at cost, and depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets as follows:

Land improvements	5–40 years
Buildings and building improvements	10–40 years
Equipment	3–15 years
Leasehold improvements	5–15 years

Equipment under capital lease is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation in the consolidated statement of activities.

Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of the underlying asset.

#### (j) Goodwill and Intangible Assets

Goodwill and intangible assets are assets representing the future economic benefits arising from business acquisitions. Goodwill and intangible assets are reviewed for impairment at least annually in accordance with the provisions of ASC Topic 350, Intangibles—Goodwill and Other, Goodwill is analyzed for impairment in a two step process. The first step compares the fair value of the reporting entity with the reporting entities carrying value, including goodwill. If the fair value of the reporting entity exceeds its carrying value, goodwill of the reporting entity is considered not impaired. If the carrying value of the reporting entity exceeds its fair value, the second step of the goodwill impairment test shall be performed to measure the amount of impairment loss, if any, to be recognized. Under step two, an impairment loss is recognized for any excess of the carrying amount of the reporting entity's goodwill over the implied fair value of that goodwill. The implied fair value of goodwill is determined by allocating the fair value of the reporting entity in a manner similar to a purchase price allocation and the residual fair value after this allocation is the implied fair value of the reporting entity's goodwill. Fair value of the reporting entity is determined using a discounted cash flow analysis. Intangible assets shall be reviewed for impairment and recognized if the carrying amount of an intangible asset is not recoverable and its carrying amount exceeds its fair value. After an impairment loss is recognized, the adjusted carrying amount of the intangible asset shall be its new accounting basis. Intangible assets that are deemed to have a finite useful life are amortized over their lives. HP did not recognize any impairment losses on goodwill or intangible assets in 2013.

#### (k) Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

Management periodically reviews the carrying value of long-lived assets for potential impairment by comparing the carrying value of these assets to the estimated undiscounted future cash flows expected to result from the use of these assets. Should the sum of the related, expected future net cash flows be less than the carrying value, an impairment loss could be recognized dependent upon other considerations. In 2013, HP analyzed the carrying value of certain properties where HP determined that a potential impairment could exist. As a result of this analysis, an impairment loss of \$2,972 was recognized in 2013, and recorded in health services and administrative services depreciation expense in the consolidated statement of activities.

In addition to consideration of impairment upon events or changes in circumstances described above, management regularly evaluates the remaining useful lives of is long-lived assets. If estimates are revised, the carrying value of fixed assets is depreciated or amortized over the remaining lives.

#### (1) Deferred Financing Costs

Financing and legal costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt are amortized over the life of the related indebtedness using the effective-interest method, and are included within other assets on the consolidated statements of financial position.

#### (m) Unpaid Medical Claims

The liability for unpaid medical claims for medical services purchased are developed using actuarial methods based upon historical submission and payment data, cost trends, customer and product mix, seasonality, utilization of healthcare services, contracted service rates, and other relevant factors. The estimates may change as actuarial methods change or as underlying facts upon which estimates are based change. HP did not change actuarial methods during the year ended December 31, 2013. Management believes the amount of unpaid medical claims is adequate to cover HP's liability for unpaid medical claims as of December 31, 2013; however, actual claim payments may differ from those established estimates. Adjustments to unpaid medical claims estimates are reflected in operating results in the period in which the change in estimate is identified. Medical claims also include the cost to establish new or expanded healthcare services to assist certain providers who provide acute charity care, safety net care, and disproportionate share of charity care services.

#### (n) Provider Payable

HP's contracts with hospitals, specialists, and primary care providers (Providers) include provisions for pay for performance and outcome recognition programs. These programs include goals such as generic drug use, optimal diabetes care, patient satisfaction, depression outcomes, colorectal screening, and others that are measured and reported on a quarterly and annual basis. If the Providers exceed the goals that were agreed upon, they will receive shared savings payouts from HP.

#### (o) Premiums Earned

Premiums earned revenue is recognized in the period for which services are covered. Unearned premiums received in advance of a coverage period are classified as deferred revenue in the consolidated statements of financial position.

Premium contracts are analyzed and losses recognized when it is probable that expected future healthcare costs and maintenance costs under a group of existing contracts exceeds anticipated future premiums and stop-loss insurance recoveries on those contracts. HP did not record a loss contract reserve in 2013.

#### (p) Net Health Service Revenue

Net health service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services in the period for which services are provided, including estimated retroactive adjustments, under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are provided and are adjusted in future periods as new data becomes available and as final settlements are determined.

The major portion of revenue from Medicare and Medicaid is based on preestablished payment rates based on patient diagnosis or clinical procedure.

HP utilizes a process to identify and appeal certain settlements with Medicare. Reimbursement is adjusted in the year the appeal is finalized. During 2013, appeals, cost report settlements, and other adjustments to prior year estimates resulted in a decrease in net health service revenue of \$1,607 in 2013 in the consolidated statement of activities.

#### (q) Other Revenue

Other revenue is recognized in the period in which services are rendered and consists primarily of administrative support fees from self-insured employer groups, retail sales revenue, grant revenue, cafeteria revenue, and parking ramp revenue.

#### (r) Uncompensated Care

Certain subsidiaries of HP provide medical care without charge or at a reduced cost to patients who were determined to be unable to pay (charity care) and provided medical care to patients who were determined to be able, but unwilling to pay (doubtful accounts). Upon determining that a patient meets the established HP charity care criteria, the charges for services provided to the patient are determined to qualify as uncompensated care and are not reported as revenue.

#### (s) Expenses

HP allocates certain direct support costs, including information systems and patient billing, to health services expenses in order to accurately reflect the cost of services provided. All allocations are eliminated in consolidation.

#### (t) Income Taxes

HPIC, HPSI, HPA, HPAI, HPCMC, PNE, DSI, and HPV (the Taxable Group) are subject to federal and state income taxes. Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are recognized for the differences between the financial and income tax reporting basis of assets and liabilities based on enacted tax rates and laws. The deferred income tax provision or benefit generally reflects the net change in deferred income tax assets and liabilities during the year. The current income tax provision reflects the tax consequences of revenues and expenses currently taxable or deductible on various income tax returns for the year reported.

Deferred tax assets of \$7,208 and \$8,729 have been recorded and included in other current assets in the consolidated statements of financial position at December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013, respectively. Income tax receivables of \$25,526 and \$12,471 at December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013, respectively, have been recorded and included in accounts receivable, net in the consolidated statements of financial position. Income tax payables of \$27 and \$0 at December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013, respectively, have been recorded and included in accrued real estate, income taxes, and interest in the consolidated statements of financial position. Income tax expense of \$1,402 has been recorded and included in income and other taxes in the consolidated statement of activities for the year ended December 31, 2013.

The consolidated tax return of HPAI, HPIC, HPSI, and HPA is currently under examination by the Internal Revenue Service for the tax years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009. HP believes that any additional taxes refunded or assessed as a result of this examination will not have a material impact on the financial position of HP or the Taxable Group.

HP's accounting policy provides that a tax benefit from an uncertain tax position may be recognized when it is more likely than not that the position will be sustained upon examination, including

resolutions of any related appeals or litigation processes, based on the technical merits. HP recorded no liabilities at December 31, 2013 or January 1, 2013 for unrecognized tax benefits.

#### (u) Risk Management

HP's investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, cash flow, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the values of investments, it is possible that changes in risks in the near term could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated statements of financial position and consolidated statement of activities.

HP is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of; damage to, and destructions of assets; errors and omissions, injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These risks are covered by commercial insurance purchased from independent third parties. There have been no significant changes in HP's insurance coverage's in 2013.

HP has established reserves for unpaid medical claims based on assumptions concerning a number of factors, including trends in healthcare costs, expenses, general economic conditions, and other factors. To the extent that actual claims experience is less favorable than estimated based on HP's underlying assumptions, HP's incurred losses would increase and future earnings could be adversely affected.

#### (v) Medical Loss Ratio

HP is subject to the minimum MLR rebate requirements of the Health Care Reform Act. Under the regulations of the Health Care Reform Act, insured plans will be required to make premium rebate payments to its enrollees that are enrolled under certain health insurance policies if a specific minimum annual MLR is not met in the prior year. The required minimum MLR, as defined by the Health Care Reform Act for insured plans is 85% for the large group market and 80% for the individual and small group markets. HP believes it will meet all minimum annual MLR requirements for the year ended December 31, 2013 and as such has recorded no liability.

#### (w) Recent Accounting Pronouncements

Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2011-06, "Other Expenses—Fees Paid to the Federal Government by Health Insurers a consensus of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Emerging Issues Task Force" (ASU 2011-06) addresses the recognition and classification of an entity's share of the annual health insurance industry assessment (the industry fee) mandated by Health Reform Legislation. The industry fee is levied on health insurers for each calendar year beginning on or after January 1, 2014 and is not deductible for income tax purposes. The amount of the industry fee for each health insurer is based on a ratio of the insurer's net health insurance premium written for the previous calendar year compared to the U.S. health insurance industry total net premiums. In accordance with the amendments in ASU 2011-06 on January 1, 2014, the liability for the industry fee payable will be estimated and recorded in full within HP's 2014 consolidated financial statements, with a corresponding deferred cost that will be amortized to expense using a straight-line method of allocation over the calendar year that it is payable. The estimated assessment for HP in 2014 is approximately \$34,000.

All investments in a gross unrealized loss position at December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013 were investment grade. The investments in a gross unrealized loss position at December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013 represent 30.63% and 9.06%, respectively, of the fair value of total investments in HP's portfolio.

The following paragraphs summarize HP's evaluation of investment categories with unrealized losses as of December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013.

Government agency securities are temporarily impaired due to current interest rates and not credit-related reasons. HP expects to collect all principle and interest on these securities.

Asset-backed securities, residential mortgage-backed securities, and commercial mortgage-backed securities are impacted by both interest rates and the value of the underlying collateral. HP utilizes thresholds and discounted cash flow models using outside assumptions to determine if an OTTI is warranted.

Corporate obligation valuations are impacted by both interest rates and credit industry specific issues. HP recognizes OTTI due to credit issues when HP determines the security will not recover in a reasonable

period of time. Unrealized losses are primarily due to the interest rate environment and certain industries falling out of favor.

Common stocks and mutual funds with unrealized losses primarily represent highly diversified, publicly traded equity securities that generally move up or down with the capital markets.

#### (3) Fair Value of Financial Instruments

All financial instruments are carried at fair value, with the exception of revenue bonds and long-term debt, which had a carrying value of \$795,551 and \$732,027, and a fair value of \$819,830 and \$779,552 as of December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013, respectively.

The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair value of each class of financial instruments:

#### (a) Cash and Cash Equivalents

The carrying amount approximates fair value due to the short duration of these financial instruments.

#### (b) Investments, Investments Whose Use is Limited, and Other Investments

The fair values are based on quoted market prices at the reporting date where available. For securities not actively traded, fair value is estimated based on investments with similar interest rates, credit quality, yield, and maturity.

#### (c) Revenue Bonds and Long-Term Debt

The fair values are estimated based on cash flows, discounted at current rates, for instruments of similar maturities and credit quality, or based on quoted market prices for similar issues, as advised by HP's investment bankers.

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). Considerable judgment may be required in interpreting market data used to develop the estimates of fair value. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under GAAP are described below:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that HP has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;

• Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the valuation methodologies used in 2013.

#### **Cash Equivalents**

Valued daily based on subscription and redemption activity at a stable \$1 net asset value (NAV). Redemptions can occur daily at NAV and there are no restrictions to redemption or unfunded commitments.

#### Mutual Funds, Common Stock, and Preferred Stock

Valued daily based on unadjusted quoted market prices from national exchanges.

#### Collective/Commingled Funds

Valued based on the underlying market value of securities held in the funds as determined by the common/collective trust fund manager. The underlying asset values are determined using various inputs; however, the accounts are valued using the NAV of each account. Redemptions can occur daily at NAV and there are no restrictions to redemption or unfunded commitments and these investments are classified as Level 2.

# Government Agency Securities, Asset-backed Securities, Residential Mortgage-backed Securities, Commercial Mortgage-backed Securities, Corporate Obligations, and Preferred Securities.

Valued based on the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded. For preferred securities classified as level three securities, the fair value is based on a bid evaluated price.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although HP believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Health service accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts or charity care, based on established guidelines for identifying uncollectible patient accounts and classifying these accounts as either doubtful accounts or charity care. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, HP's management periodically assesses the allowance for doubtful accounts and charity care by taking into consideration, by payor category, the expected net collections, accounts receivable aging, historical collections experience, economic conditions, trends in healthcare coverage, and other collection indicators. The primary source of the allowance for doubtful accounts is the patient responsibility portion of commercial accounts. The primary source of the allowance for charity care is charges for uninsured patients. Patients who are insured are assessed separately for collectibility from uninsured patients. The results of these assessments are used to establish the net realizable value of patient accounts receivable and the allowance for doubtful accounts and charity care. For premiums and other receivables, HP's policy is to set up allowances for all receivables over 90 days outstanding.

#### (a) Regions Hospital Campus

The majority of Regions' main campus is owned by Ramsey County and leased to Regions. The original lease agreement grants Regions use of the property through December 2066 and requires Regions to: (i) provide care to the indigent of Ramsey County throughout the lease term; (ii) pay all taxes, utilities, maintenance, and insurance costs with respect to the property; (iii) use its best efforts to continue providing, and consult with the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners before discontinuing, its major or unique services, including but not limited to, the trauma center, burn unit, graduate medical education, and research services; and (iv) not assign the lease to a for-profit corporation.

The property leased from Ramsey County is included in Regions' net property, plant, and equipment. Under the lease, Regions is required to provide a minimum dollar amount of charity care to Ramsey County residents. In the event the value of charity care does not meet the lease requirement, Regions can fulfill the requirement by making capital improvements to Regions' property. Regions' compliance with the charity care requirement of the lease is based on the value of charity care provided and reduced by Ramsey County's direct cash support, if any.

#### (b) Construction in Progress

Construction in progress at December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013 represents deposits on equipment purchases and costs incurred in connection with remodeling and building projects. At December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013, there was \$60 and \$26, respectively, of capitalizable interest included in construction in progress.

1) The Health Care Facility Revenue Bonds – Series 2003 were issued by the Housing and Redevelopment Authority of the City of Saint Paul (HRA) and the City of Minneapolis on behalf of GHI and the Obligated Group, which includes Regions, HPI, HPAI, and HPIC (collectively, the "Obligated Group"). The bonds are payable in semiannual installments through 2029 with interest rates ranging from 5.00% to 6.00% and are the sole obligation of GHI and the Obligated Group. The Obligated Group's gross revenues were pledged toward repayment of the bonds. Financing costs are

The bonds are payable in annual installments through 2036 with interest rates ranging from 4.625% to 5.25% and are the sole obligation of the Obligated Group. The bond proceeds were used primarily for hospital facility construction, general facility refurbishing, and equipment acquisition. The Obligated Group's gross revenues were pledged toward repayment of the bonds. The debt agreements include covenants enumerating minimum debt service coverage requirements, along with restrictions on the incurrence of additional debt, sales of assets, mergers and consolidations, transactions with affiliates, creation of liens, and certain other matters.
- 3) The Hospital Facility Revenue Bonds Series 1998 were issued by the HRA on behalf of Regions. The bonds are payable in annual installments through 2028 with interest rates ranging from 5.00% to 5.30% and are the sole obligation of the Obligated Group. The bond proceeds were used primarily for hospital facility construction, general facility refurbishing, and equipment acquisition. The Obligated Group's gross revenues were pledged toward repayment of the bonds. The debt agreements include covenants enumerating minimum debt service coverage requirements, along with restrictions on the incurrence of additional debt, sales of assets, mergers and consolidations, transactions with affiliates, creation of liens, and certain other matters.
- 4) The Health Care Facility Revenue Bonds Series 2009 were issued by the City of St. Louis Park, Minnesota on behalf of PNHS and the PNHS Obligated Group, which includes PNHS, Methodist, PNC, PNI, PNHCP, and PNMC Holdings (collectively, the "PNHS Obligated Group"). Proceeds were used to refund the series 2008A and series 2008B PNHS Obligated Group bonds. Principal payments are due annually in varying amounts beginning in 2024 and running through 2039. The series 2009 bonds are uninsured and were issued with interest rates ranging from 5.50% to 5.75%. Under terms of the bond indenture agreements, the PNHS Obligated Group is required to maintain certain deposits with a trustee. The PNHS Obligated Group has also mortgaged and pledged certain real and personal property as security for the obligations.
- 5) The Health Care Facility Revenue Bonds Series 2008C were issued by the City of St. Louis Park, Minnesota on behalf of PNHS and the PNHS Obligated Group. Proceeds were used to refund the series 2003A PNHS Obligated Group bonds. Principal payments are due annually in varying amounts through 2030. The Series 2008C bonds are uninsured and were issued with interest rates ranging from 5.50% to 5.75%. Under terms of the bond indenture agreements, the PNHS Obligated Group is required to maintain certain deposits with a trustee. with an interest rate of 4.61% and are the sole obligation of HP and the Obligated Group. The Obligated Group's gross revenues were pledged toward repayment of the bonds. Financing costs are amortized over the life of the bonds. The debt agreements provide for certain financial covenants and also limit the amount of additional debt that can be incurred.

- 7) Lakeview Health Health Care Revenue Bonds Series 2005 were issued through the City of Stillwater, Minnesota. The net proceeds from the bonds were used to fund construction of a new clinic in Stillwater, Minnesota and to reimburse Lakeview Health for prior project costs. The bonds are payable in semiannual installments through 2035 with interest rates ranging from 3.50% to 5.00% and are secured by future gross revenues of Lakeview Health.
- 8) Hudson Hospital Refunding Revenue Bonds Payable Series 2012 were issued by the Wisconsin Health and Educational Facilities on behalf of HH. The bonds are payable in monthly installments through 2029 with an interest rate of 3.61% with substantially all of the mortgaged property of the hospital campus pledged as collateral on the Revenue Bonds.
- 9) Westfields Mortgage Bonds Payable WH mortgage bonds payable consists of a \$7,000 Hospital Facilities Revenue Note, Series 1999A, and a \$6,990 Hospital Facilities Revenue Note, Series 1999B (collectively, the "Westfields Notes"). WH entered into this loan agreement with the Community Development Authority of the City of New Richmond, WI, and the Village of Star Prairie, WI. The Westfields Notes are payable in monthly installments through 2024 with an interest rate of 5.75% and are collateralized by land, land improvements, and the building.
- 10) HESH Loan Payable HESH entered into a loan arrangement with Prudential Insurance Company of America in connection with the building and equipping of the HealthPartners Specialty Center facility. The loan is payable in monthly installments through 2020 with an interest rate of 5.99% and is secured by the land, all buildings, structures, and improvements located in or on the land and all of the fixtures, and personal property owned by HESH but excluding all personal property owned by any tenant of the property.
- 11) Health Care Facility Revenue Note Series 2006 was issued by the City of Maplewood, MN, on behalf of Regions. The note is payable in monthly installments through 2026 with an interest rate of 5.39% and is the sole obligation of Regions. The bond proceeds were used primarily for the acquisition, construction, and equipping of the Maplewood Sleep Center.
- 12) Meadowbrook note payable In 1989, PNHS entered into a note obligation, the proceeds of which were used to construct the Meadowbrook building. The Meadowbrook obligation provides for monthly installments through 2014 at an interest rate of 10.50%.
- 13) Capital lease obligations In 2004, PNHS entered into a lease with 494 France Partnership, LLC for the Tria building. The lease term continues through 2025. PNHS also has another building capital lease that continues through 2031.

HP was in compliance with all debt covenants as of December 31, 2013.

#### (8) Operating Leases

HP leases clinics, office space, and medical equipment under noncancelable operating lease agreements that expire at varying dates with options for renewal. The leases provide for minimum monthly rental payments, plus additional rentals, based on HP's pro rata share of utilities, maintenance, taxes, insurance, and building management expenses.

Total rental expense, including operating expenses, for all operating leases during 2013 was \$56,826.

#### (9) Asbestos Abatement

ASC 410, Asset Returement and Environmental Obligations, requires companies to accrue for costs related to legal obligations to perform certain activities in connection with the retirement, disposal, or abandonment of assets. HP recorded asset retirement obligations in accordance with this interpretation for conditional asset retirement obligations related to the removal of asbestos contained within some of its buildings. The asset retirement obligation is adjusted each year for any liabilities incurred or settled during the period, accretion expense, and any revisions made to the estimated cash flows. At December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013, HP has asset retirement obligations recorded of \$5,253 and \$5,259, respectively.

#### (10) Retirement Plans

HP provides several retirement programs for its various groups of employees.

GHI, HPCMC, PNBC, RHSC, and HPA (the Group) have a noncontributory defined benefit cash balance plan covering their employees age 21 and over with a minimum of one year of service. Contributions to the plan are a function of the years of service, the level of compensation, and an interest rate credit. Plan assets are invested in a fund consisting of common stocks, bonds, and other marketable securities. The plan is funded in accordance with federal law and regulations.

Lakeview Health has a defined benefit pension plan covering substantially all of its employees. Pension benefits are based on years of service and the employees' compensation during their highest consecutive five-year compensation period. Lakeview Health funds contributions to the plan based on actuarial computations using the projected unit credit method.

HP uses a December 31 measurement date for the retirement plans.

#### (a) Plan Assets

HP has in place an Asset Allocation and Investment Policy Guidelines document that provides general oversight of the Plans' assets. The asset class investment return goals are broken down by the following asset classes: core fixed income, large cap equities, small cap equities, and international equities. In addition to the return objectives, each asset class has a minimum and maximum range and a targeted asset allocation percentage. In general, investment managers selected are expected to adequately diversify each portfolio in their efforts to maximize risk-adjusted performance. The Plans may use private placements, mutual funds, and commingled/collective funds periodically to gain exposure to certain asset classes.

## (d) Regions Plans

Substantially, all full-time employees of Regions are covered by Regions' defined contribution retirement plan or by the defined benefit plans administered by the Public Employees Retirement Association of the state of Minnesota (PERA).

Regions sponsors a defined contribution retirement plan covering all employees over the age of 21 who have completed one year of eligible service and are not covered by PERA. The plan provides for both a base contribution and a matching contribution funded by the employer based on the employees' participation in a qualifying 403(b) plan. The plan is a qualified plan under IRC Section 401(a) and satisfies the requirements of Section 401(m). Regions' contributions range from 4% to 6% of eligible employees' compensation. Total contributions to the plan were \$10,620 in 2013.

PERA is a contributory defined benefit retirement plan available to employees hired by Regions prior to September 3, 1986, who may, but are not obligated to, continue PERA participation under provisions of Minnesota Statutes. The PERA plan provides retirement benefits, as well as disability benefits to members, and benefits to survivors upon death of eligible members. Benefits are established by Minnesota State Statute and vest after three years of credited services. Contributions by Regions to this plan are based on a percentage of eligible employees' salaries. The contributory percentage is established by PERA. Contributions to PERA were \$265 in 2013. Regions' relative actuarial position and relative net assets available for benefits are not determinable.

### (e) GHI Plans

GHI sponsors two qualified defined contribution plans under various sections of the IRC, which are the GHI 403(b)(7) Plan and the GHI 401(k) Plan. Employee balances in the GHI 403(b)(7) Plan were frozen, effective July 3, 1996. Eligible employees of GHI can contribute 1.0% to 50.0% of annual compensation up to the maximum dollar limits established by the Internal Revenue Service with GHI matching the participants' contribution up to 7.5% of their salary. GHI made discretionary contributions to the GHI 401(k) Plan, for which GHI, HPCMC, RHSC, HPA, and PNBC are participants, of \$25,686 in 2013.

## (f) PNHS Plans

PNHS contributes to various multiemployer defined benefit pension plans under the terms of collective-bargaining agreements that cover its union-represented employees. The risks of participating in these multiemployer plans are different from single-employer plans in the following aspects:

- Assets contributed to the multiemployer plan by one employer may be used to provide benefits to employees of other participating employers.
- If a participating employer stops contributing to the plan, the unfunded obligations of the plan may be borne by the remaining participating employers.
- If PNHS chooses to stop participating in some if its multiemployer plans, PNHS may be required to pay those plans an amount based on the underfunded status of the plan, referred to as a withdrawal liability.

PNHS's participation in these plans for the annual period ended December 31, 2013, is outlined in the following table. The zone status is based on information that PNHS received from the plan and is certified by the plan's actuary. Among other factors, plans in the red zone are generally less than 65% funded, plans in the yellow zone are between 65% and 80% funded, and plans in the green zone are at least 80% funded.

PNHS was listed in both the Twin Cities Hospitals Minnesota Nurses Association and the Twin Cities Hospitals Workers Pension Plan Form 5500 as providing more than 5% of the total contributions for 2012.

In addition, PNHS participates in one other multiemployer pension plan. Total contributions to this plan were \$120 in 2013.

PNHS has a defined contribution pension plan covering all eligible noncontract employees under which PNHS makes contributions of 4.5% of a participant's compensation up to 100% of the social security wage base and 9.7% of any compensation in excess of 100% of the social security wage base up to a maximum wage base of \$255. Plan contribution expense for PNHS was \$22,046 in 2013.

PNHS also offers a 401(k) and a 403(b) contributory savings plan covering substantially all employees. Discretionarily, PNHS matches a specified percentage of each employee's contribution up to a maximum of 4% of the individual's compensation. For 2013, PNHS made contributory matches of 40%. Plan contribution expense for PNHS was \$6,339 in 2013.

### (g) WH Plans

WH has a defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all employees who meet the requirement set forth in the plan. The eligible employees can elect to contribute, up to the maximum dollar limits established by the Internal Revenue Service, of their annual salary to the plan with WH matching the participants' contributions up to 5% of their salary. Contributions to the plan were \$185 in 2013.

#### (h) HH Plans

HH has a defined contribution retirement plan for all its eligible employees. HH contributes 3% of annual compensation for those plan participants contributing a minimum of 1% of their annual compensation. For those employees attaining 15 or more years of continuous service, HH will contribute between 4% and 8% of the employees' annual compensation assuming the employee contributes an equal percentage. Contributions to the plan were \$425 in 2013.

#### (i) Lakeview Health Plans

LMHA has a defined contribution plan or 401(k) plan covering substantially all employees of LMHA who meet the requirements set forth in the plan. An employee becomes eligible to participate after completing one year of service, accumulating 1,000 hours of service, and attaining age 21. A participant may elect to defer compensation not to exceed a dollar limit, which is set by law. All employee contributions to the 401(k) plan are 100% vested. LMHA will make matching contributions to the 401(k) plan in the amount of 2% of the compensation that is contributed by the employee. Contributions to the 401(k) plan were \$762 in 2013.

SMG has a defined contribution 401(k) plan covering substantially all employees of SMG who meet the requirements set forth in the plan. A participant may elect to defer compensation not to exceed a

dollar limit, which is set by law. All employee contributions to the 401(k) are 100% vested. SMG also has a profit sharing plan, where SMG has the discretion to determine contribution amounts. A participant is eligible after completing 1,000 hours of service and if the participant is employed on the last day of the plan year. Contributions to both the 401(k) plan and the profit sharing plan were \$1,556 in 2013.

## (11) Postretirement Benefits

HP provides four postretirement benefit plans for its various groups of employees.

Regions sponsors a defined benefit plan that provides postretirement medical and dental benefits to substantially all of Regions' employees hired prior to January 1, 1993, and retired by December 31, 2000. The plan is contributory for retirees below age 65 and noncontributory for retirees age 65 and older. In 1994, the plan was amended to eliminate subsidized coverage after age 65 for participants who retired after July 1, 1994. In 1999, the plan was amended to eliminate coverage for active employees who retired after December 31, 2000.

GHI sponsors a defined benefit plan that provides postretirement medical and dental benefits to GHI employees. As of January 1, 2006, new early retirees (ages 55 to 64) will not be allowed to purchase two single policies. Instead, they must purchase family coverage if they elect coverage for spouse or dependent. As of January 1, 2008, new nonunion early retirees (ages 55 to 64) will pay rates that are based on the actual experience of the early retiree group (i.e., retiree group rates).

PNHS extends health insurance coverage to certain union contract labor who elect to retire and begin receiving pension benefits at age 55 or older, until such time as the retiree is eligible for Medicare. PNHS also has a defined benefit postretirement health care plan covering certain former employees and spouses who satisfied certain eligibility requirements. No other employees will be included in this plan.

HP uses a December 31 measurement date for the postretirement plans.

As an indicator of sensitivity, a 1% increase in the assumed healthcare cost trend rate for each year would increase the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation as of December 31, 2013, between approximately 6.4% and 9.7% and postretirement healthcare benefit expenses for 2013 between approximately 6.4% and 40.2%. In December 2003, the Medicare Prescription Drug Improvement and Modernization Act of 2003 (the Act) was signed into law. The provisions of the Act provide for a federal subsidy for plans that provide prescription drug benefits and meet certain qualifications and, alternatively, would allow prescription drug plan sponsors to coordinate with the Medicare benefit. HPI's retirement medical plan is not eligible for the Medicare subsidy under the Act; however, the Regions' postretirement plans provide prescription drug coverage for certain Medicare-eligible retirees.

## (12) Deferred Compensation Plan

HP offers certain employees nonqualified deferred compensation plans created in accordance with applicable provisions of the IRC. The plans permit qualifying employees to defer a portion of their salary until future years. The accumulated deferred compensation balance is not immediately available to employees until a certain criteria has been met depending on the specific deferred compensation plan.

All amounts of compensation deferred under the plans and all income attributable to those amounts (until paid or made available to the employee or other beneficiary) are solely the property and rights of HP (not restricted to the payment of benefits under the plan), subject only to the claim of general creditors. Participants' rights under the plans are equal to those of general creditors of HP in an amount equal to the fair market value of the deferred account for each participant. The related assets and liabilities are reported at fair value.

The liabilities for these plans at December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013 were \$47,427 and \$37,037, respectively, and are included in deferred employee benefits in the consolidated statements of financial position.

# (13) Self-Insured Programs

HP has various self-insured programs covering professional liability, workers' compensation, and certain health and dental claims. Provisions for related losses on incurred claims are included as liabilities.

GHI, Regions, WH, and HH have professional liability insurance programs providing coverage on a claims-made basis. GHI and Regions has coverages that have a self-insured retention (SIR) limit of \$5,000 per occurrence in 2013. GHI and Regions have purchased insurance policies with excess per claim and annual aggregate limits. GHI's and Regions per claim limits in excess of the SIR limits are \$55,000 in 2013. WH and HH have coverages that have a limit of \$1,000 per occurrence and \$3,000 aggregate in 2013. This coverage is purchased through Physicians Insurance Company of Wisconsin, Inc. WH and HH are insured against losses in excess of these amounts through its participation in the mandatory Patients' Compensation Fund of the state of Wisconsin. The professional liability insurance policy is renewable annually and has been renewed by the insurance carrier for the annual period extending to February 1, 2015.

PNHS is self-insured for claims made up to \$3,500 per claim and \$12,000 annual aggregate SIR in 2013. PNHS also has an aggregate excess umbrella coverage limit of \$50,000 annually to cover the excess SIR, as well as the excess of PNHS' other corporate insurance programs in 2013.

Lakeview Health's malpractice insurance is a claims made policy. Should this policy lapse and not be replaced with equivalent coverage, claims based upon occurrence during its term, but reported subsequent thereto, would be uninsured.

# (14) Related-Party Transactions

HP has a one-third ownership interest in St. Francis Regions Medical Center (St. Francis) with Allina Health System and Essentia each holding a one-third ownership interest in St. Francis as well. HP's

ownership interest is accounted for on the equity basis and is included in other assets in the consolidated statements of financial position and in other revenue in the consolidated statement of activities. At December 31, 2013, HP's ownership interest in St. Francis was \$32,744. HP's proportionate share in income of St. Francis was \$4,353 in 2013. Effective January 1, 2014, HP's and Allina Health System's ownership interest in St. Francis will increase to 47.5% with Essentia's ownership interest decreasing to 5%.

During 2013, a member of Western Wisconsin Medical Association (WWMA) was a board member of HP. WWMA was paid \$6,611 in 2013 to provide medical services to HPI and GHI's enrolled members.

## (15) Provider Tax

The legislature of the State of Minnesota passed a law in 1992 requiring all healthcare providers to pay a tax on healthcare services they provide to patients. The funds collected from this tax help provide health insurance coverage to individuals who otherwise could not afford health insurance. In 2013, the provider tax was 2% of healthcare services, which is included within health services on the consolidated statement of activities.

## (16) Minnesota Comprehensive Health Association

Minnesota Comprehensive Health Association (MCHA) was created as a nonprofit association that provides health insurance to residents of Minnesota who otherwise are unable to obtain coverage in the marketplace. Membership in MCHA is state mandated and composed of all insurers, HMOs, nonprofit health service corporations, and fraternal benefit societies transacting the business of health insurance in Minnesota. Contributing members are assessed amounts to reimburse MCHA for claims expenses in excess of revenues. Each contributing member's assessment is based on the ratio of its health insurance premiums earned to the total contributing members' annual premium revenues in Minnesota.

## (17) Medical Care Surcharge

The legislature of the State of Minnesota passed a law in 1992 requiring all healthcare providers to pay a medical care surcharge. The purpose of the surcharge was to maintain the federal matching funds the state receives for the Medicaid program and to improve reimbursement to providers for Medicaid patients.

# (18) Premium Tax

The legislature of the State of Minnesota passed legislation in 1992 requiring HMOs to pay 1% tax on premium revenue effective January 1, 1996. The funds collected from this tax help provide health coverage to individuals who otherwise could not afford health insurance. In 2013, the premium tax for HMOs was 1% as determined by the State Finance Commissioner based on funds available in the Health Care Access Fund. HPIC, a subsidiary of HP, was assessed a 2% premium tax in 2013.

#### (19) Minnesota Capitalization Requirements

The legislature of the State of Minnesota enacted a bill (the Bill) relating to HMOs requiring, among other things, that HMOs maintain positive working capital, make certain deposits, and comply with certain net worth requirements. The Bill requires that existing HMOs maintain cash deposits equal to the greater of

\$500 or 33% of their uncovered expenses in the preceding calendar year. The term "uncovered expenses" is defined as the costs of healthcare services that are covered by the HMO for which the enrollee would also be liable in the event of the organization's insolvency. The legislature of the State of Minnesota enacted a bill requiring that insurance companies maintain at least \$500 in securities as a guarantee that the obligations to policyholders will be performed. At December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013, the depository requirements were satisfied through statutory deposits with Wells Fargo Bank Minnesota, NA.

The Bill also requires that existing HMOs and Accident and Health Insurance Companies maintain a "total adjusted capital to risk-based capital," defined as total admitted assets less total liabilities at the regulatory action level, which is greater than 150% of the risk-based capital authorized control level. On a consolidated basis, all HP-affiliated HMOs and Accident and Health Insurance Companies are in compliance with the above provisions at December 31, 2013 and January 1, 2013.

#### (20) Charity Care, Taxes, and Assessments

In furtherance of its charitable purpose, HP provides a variety of benefits to the community. HP maintains records to identify, measure, and estimate the cost for community service programs.

HP also conducts medical research and provides medical education programs in furtherance of its commitment to improving the healthcare available to the community.

HP also provides medical care without charge or at reduced cost to low-income community residents, primarily through: (a) the services to patients who express a willingness to pay but who are determined to be unable to pay and (b) participation in public program payments (primarily Medicare and Medicaid).

HP reports net assets based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. The expiration of donor restrictions is recorded in the period in which the restrictions expire. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by HP in perpetuity.

#### (22) Contingencies

The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. Compliance with these laws and regulations can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. Government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of regulations by healthcare providers, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties as well as significant repayments of previously billed and collected revenues for patient services. HP has a corporate compliance plan designed in accordance with federal guidelines. As a part of this plan, HP performs periodic internal reviews of its compliance with laws and regulations, and investigates and attempts to resolve and remedy reported or suspected incidents of material noncompliance with applicable laws, regulations, or policies on a timely basis. Management of HP believes that HP's compliance programs and procedures lead to substantial compliance with current laws and regulations.

HP periodically identifies potential documentation and coding compliance issues. When this occurs, HP follows up with an investigation and, where warranted, initiates disclosure and repayment to the appropriate regulatory authorities. A provision would be made in HP's consolidated financial statements for possible fines, penalties, repayments, or adverse judgments in these matters to the extent the amount is reasonably determinable.

HP is involved in litigation and regulatory investigations and audits arising in the normal course of business. It is management's opinion that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on HP's consolidated financial position or results of activities.

### (23) Subsequent Events

Effective January 1, 2014, Amery Regional Medical Center (ARMC) joined the HP family of care. ARMC is a 25-bed critical access hospital, has four clinics, a dialysis center, a wound healing center, a geriatric mental health center and an assisted living facility. ARMC is located in Amery, Wisconsin. This transaction will be accounted for as an acquisition under ASC Subtopic 958-805, *Not-For Profit Entities—Business Combinations* 

HP has evaluated all other subsequent events from the consolidated statements of financial position date through March 28, 2014, the date at which the consolidated financial statements were issued, and determined that there are no other items to disclose.
