With a goal of promoting healthy outcomes for folks in our community, we partnered with the Dane County Health Council and other health care organizations to create the Healthcare Access Program in 2005. The Healthcare Access Program gave uninsured individuals a place to call their medical home and access to a compassionate medical provider - all at no cost. Patients were also able to receive needed medications that many had gone years without. In 2013 GHCSW delivered over \$39,000 in health care, including medications to uninsured individuals living in our community.</p> <p>PRIMARY ACCESS FOR KIDS Parents should spend time helping their kids grow and learn, not worrying about how to get their kids needed health care. Unfortunately, there are hundreds of kids in our schools that do not have insurance to get basic care for checkups, immunizations, or medications. To tackle this issue head-on, the Dane County Health Council helped to bring together a network of health care organizations in the Madison-area and the Primary Access for Kids program was born. In 2013, we were proud to continue providing health care services to uninsured kids in the Madison Metropolitan School District. We worked with eleven of Madison's schools to connect these kids to the health care they deserved. GHCSW provided 118 children with \$72,393 in primary care services and medications, and over \$1,000 in eyewear through this program in 2013.</p> <p>REFUGEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM Fewer things in life are more challenging than escaping your home country in search of a better life, let alone trying to navigate a new health care system. To help ease the burden, GHCSW created the Refugee Assistance Program. Through the program, our new neighbors receive hours of one-on-one assistance from GHCSW staff whose help connected them to needed care. We served as their advocates in 2013 by setting up numerous appointments for care and follow-up care. Working with our partners from the public health department, we helped 25 refugees establish roots here in our community.</p> <p>STAY HEALTHY Without proper insurance coverage, folks can't get the most basic health services like access to a regular doctor and medications. It's the kind of preventive care that would otherwise help avoid a trip to the hospital or help manage expensive and damaging illness. So in 2009, GHCSW created the Stay Healthy program to invest in our members who have fallen on hard times so their health issues could be detected and addressed sooner, rather than later. The Stay Healthy Program covered one physical exam, lab work, follow-up appointments, and medications related to the physical - all at no cost for qualified, uninsured adults who had lost their insurance coverage because of unemployment or other reasons. GHCSW provided primary care for uninsured individuals in our community, amounting to \$25,833 in medical services and medications.</p> <p>WISCONSIN WELL WOMAN Breast and Cervical Cancer screenings are too important to go unchecked for women with little or no health insurance. Through the Wisconsin Well Woman Program, our health care advocates connected women to preventive care services and helped guide them through their medical appointments. Breast and Cervical Cancer screenings were done at no charge to women in the program.</p>

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	Statement of Program Service Accomplishments (Continued)	<p>Form 990, Part III, Line 4 II SPREAD HEALTH KNOWLEDGE ADOPT A SCHOOL As an avid promoter of health know ledge, we adopted five local schools in need of health resources in 2013 Ou r commitment to schoolchildren was demonstrated in many ways throughout the year To help build up the future leaders of our community, we provided medical supplies to school nurse offices, we donated new gym mats for physical education classes, we hosted Zumba sessions to get kids and their parents fit while having fun, and we organized field trips centered around physical activity We also bought new snow pants to keep kids warm, gift cards to promote healthy activities, and gift baskets full of healthy food and educational books fo r local families For nine years we've worked together with the Foundation for Madison's Public Schools to bring this service to our community ALPHA KAPPA ALPHA, WALK IT OUT Walk It Out, a community event held at Madison College promotes physical activity among African American women The event was focused around a 2-mile walk and we provided health educati on opportunities for healthy cooking and variety of healthy activities like Zumba, Yoga, a nd Cardio Kickboxing For five years we've worked together with the Alpha Kappa Alpha Soro rity and the 100 Black Men organization to bring this service to our community ENGLISH FO R HEALTH Literacy skills are a strong predictor of an individual's health status In fact, low literacy may contribute to serious health problems - problems that tend to compound f or those with English as their second language To improve health literacy, we co-sponsore d the "English for Health" course for adults in our community Students learned from our h ealth care professionals about a variety of health topics, from how to use emergency rooms and urgent care clinics to healthy lifestyle choices Then they practiced communicating h ealth care decisions in a mock clinic staffed by health care professionals For the past t hree years GHCSCW has worked with the Literacy Netw ork to bring this service to our commun ity FARM FRESH PRODUCE We all know that locally grow n food makes sense But too often, lo w-income kids don't get the fresh fruits and vegetables they need on their plates And get ting kids to eat those vegetables can be tricky So we brought a regular supply of fresh, nutritious, and locally grow n organic vegetables to kids at three community centers We al so taught them about where their food comes from through fun gardening activities In tota l, more than 2 tons of fresh produce was distributed in 2013 And our commitment didn't st op there We helped provide technical assistance with meal preparation so the centers were trained on how to handle and store fresh foods For six years we've worked together with Community GroundWorks, the Fair Share CSA Coalition, the Public Health Department of Madis on and Dane County, and Second Harvest to bring this service to our community HEALTHCARE ADMINISTRATIVE TRAINING We believe in helping people succeed through education That's why we gave financial backing to the Healthcare Administrative Training Program, a 12-week co urse designed to provide real-w orld job training for people seeking employment Our health care staff trained students on EPIC medical softw are, medical terminology, health insuran ce concepts, and basic work skills Graduates of the program have enjoyed job placement in the health care community for positions like clinic reception and medical billing For ov er six years we've worked together with the Urban League of Greater Madison to bring this service to our community HEALTHY COMMUNITIES AWARDS 23 2% of Dane County students (grades 7-12) were overw eight or obese in 2013 It was clear we needed to do something for our ki ds So we funded grants through the Health Communities Awards, which gave money to area co mmunity centers that demonstrated sustainable practices with their physical activity progr ams and healthy eating education for the youth they served Awarding healthy communities - it's just one way we stood up to help combat childhood obesity in 2013 For six years we' ve worked together with Public Health of Madison and Dane County to bring this service to our community HEALTHY SELF OLYMPICS Being healthy can be fun and rewarding! That's the me ssage behind the Healthy Self Olympics, an innovative program first introduced by GHCSCW f or kids in our community Dr Steven Lo, GHC-SCW Pediatrician, community school nurses, an d recreational specialists used active learning to teach kids the importance of healthy ea ting, positive self-esteem, and fun exercise The year-long program culminated at Madison' s Marlborough Park, where kids from area schools were invited to compete in a variety of " Olympic" games, including an obstacle course race, parachute games, a jump rope contest an d more For the past 11 years we've worked together with the Madison School & Community Re creation (MSCR) department and the Madison Metropo</p>

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	Statement of Program Service Accomplishments (Continued)	<p>litan School District to bring this service to our community Kids from MSCR's Safe Haven after-school program at Emerson, Falk, and Glendale Elementary schools, along with children from the Allied Learning Center, participated in 2013 HMONG NEW YEAR Each year, members of the local Hmong community gather for a weekend celebration during the Hmong New Year Members of the Hmong community donned their traditional dress, enjoyed delicious food, and had the opportunity to receive health check screenings for blood pressure and asthma from our health care staff For four years GHCSW has worked together with the Southern Wisconsin Hmong Association to bring this event to our community INFOSHARE We understand how difficult end of life conversations are for families and friends That's why we were glad to help foster an honest dialog centered on this issue at a community InfoShare event in 2013 At the event, 150 participants were able to talk through topics relating to end of life care, death and dying, along with love and loss of friends and family Participants also listened, shared, and learned from one another about their personal experiences Topics were led by several of our health care professionals, along with leaders from Agrace Hospice Care, UW Graduate School, Cress Funeral Home, the Natural Path Sanctuary, the Waisman Center, and others For two years we've worked together with the UW-Madison Waisman Center Community Training and Consultation Program, the Dane County Human Services department, and other community organizations to bring this event to our community JUNETEENTH DAY OF CELEBRATION During Juneteenth, an annual festival that commemorates the ending of slavery, our team was on-hand to answer questions about insurance topics and our community care programs To help empower people with knowledge about their own health, we provided diabetes education and health screenings for blood pressure and asthma For over six years GHCSW has worked together with local African American community leaders to bring this service to our community LATINO HEALTH COUNCIL We helped promote the health and wellbeing of our Latino neighbors by serving on the Latino Health Council in 2013 Along with our participation on the council, we were deeply involved in efforts throughout the year to spread health knowledge to the community we sponsored Zumba classes to encourage fun and fitness, we were present at health fairs to give health checks and screenings for skin cancer, we co-hosted a nutrition class in Spanish at Centro Hispano, Madison's Latino community center, and we sponsored an event to educate Latino teens about mental health and other health topics For eight years we've served on the Latino Health Council in our community REACH OUT AND READ Fewer things are more important to a child's cognitive, emotional, and social health than the simple act of reading In fact, research clearly proves how important the first years of a child's life are for healthy child development and their long-term success So GHCSW has embraced the Reach Out and Read Program, championed by local pediatrician, Dr Dipesh Navsaria Our medical staff made substantial time commitments towards the program, making it a standard part of our pediatric primary care At each primary care visit, they used reading as a way to assess childhood development They also gave families a free book at each primary care visit (totaling 10 books from six months of age through age 5), and encouraged parents to read aloud to their kids at home In 2013, we proudly paid for 5,600 age and culturally appropriate books to be given away at these appointments 2013 was the second year that GHCSW participated in the Reach Out and Read Program We value this initiative as it aligns with the United Way's Born Learning Agenda focusing on early childhood literacy and preparing children for entering kindergarten in our community schools BLACK WOMEN'S WELLNESS DAY Black Women's Wellne</p>
