(1) Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following is a summary of the organization and significant accounting policies of the Grinnell Regional Medical Center and Affiliates (Medical Center) These policies are in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America

A Organization

The Medical Center is located in Grinnell, Iowa, and is a not-for-profit corporation chartered under the laws of the State of Iowa and is exempt from income tax under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Medical Center is an acute care hospital which provides inpatient, outpatient, emergency care and physician clinic services for residents of the Grinnell, Iowa area. The Medical Center was incorporated in Iowa in 1967 and is governed by a fourteen member Board of Directors appointed for three year terms. The Medical Center is the sole corporate member of the Grinnell Regional Medical Center Foundation and has the ability to appoint or remove the Board of Directors of this organization. The Medical Center is the sole owner of Health Advantage Plus, Inc. The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of these organizations. All material related party balances and transactions have been eliminated in the consolidated financial statements.

Grinnell Regional Medical Center Foundation (Foundation) is a not-for-profit organization established to provide financial support to the Medical Center

Health Advantage Plus, Inc (HAP) is a wholly-owned taxable corporation of the Medical Center, the activities of which include the operation of Deer Creek Health Center and physician billing services

B Industry Environment

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursements for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government health care programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed.

Management believes that the Medical Center is in compliance with government laws and regulations as they apply to the areas of fraud and abuse. While no regulatory inquiries have been made which are expected to have a material effect on the Medical Center's consolidated financial statements, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time

As a result of recently enacted federal healthcare reform legislation, substantial changes are anticipated in the United States healthcare system. Such legislation includes numerous provisions affecting the delivery of healthcare services, the financing of healthcare costs, reimbursement of healthcare providers and the legal obligations of health insurers, providers and employers. These provisions are currently slated to take effect at specified times over approximately the next decade

C Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

D Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less

E Patient Receivables, Net

The Medical Center reports patient accounts receivable for services rendered at net realizable amounts from third-party payors, patients and others. Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Medical Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Medical Center analyzes contractually due amounts. The Medical Center records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

Payment for services is expected within thirty days of receipt of the billing. Accounts considered past due are sent to collection agencies when internal collection efforts have been unsuccessful. Any amounts deemed uncollectible are written off on a monthly basis. The Medical Center does not charge interest on outstanding balances owed.

The Medical Center also maintains a charity care policy as described in Note 1(O)

F Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out valuation method) or market Market value is determined by comparison with recent purchased or realizable value

G Investments

Investments in debt or equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the consolidated balance sheets. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in excess of revenue over (under) expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenue over (under) expenses, unless the investments are trading securities.

H Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets restricted by donors for endowment or specific purposes, assets held for annuity payment obligations, and assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements and debt service, over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes Amounts required for obligations classified as current liabilities are reported in current assets

I Property and Equipment, Net

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based upon useful lives set forth using general guidelines from the American Hospital Association Guide for Estimated Useful Lives of Depreciable Hospital Assets. Equipment under capital leases is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the consolidated financial statements.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted net assets and are excluded from the excess of revenue over (under) expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted net assets. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

The Medical Center's long lived assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. If the sum of expected cash flows is less than the carrying amount of the asset, a loss is recognized

Bond issuance costs are amortized on a straight-line basis over the period of their respective bond issuance. Amortization expense amounted to \$10,807 and \$11,788 for the years ending December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

K Annuity Payment Liability

The Foundation has received several charitable gift annuities for which the Foundation is required to make specified payments in accordance with gift annuity agreements. The Foundation recognizes the agreements in the period in which the contract is executed. Assets received are recorded at fair value and an annuity payment liability is recognized at the present value of future cash flows expected to be paid. The present value of the estimated future payments is calculated using discount rates of 4.0% to 7.8%. The difference between the fair value of the assets received and the liabilities to the donors are recorded in the consolidated statements of operations as unrestricted contributions, as the donors have not placed any restrictions on the assets transferred Adjustments to the annuity liability to reflect changes in the discount rate for life expectancy are recognized as changes in the value of split-interest agreements.

L Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received or the condition has been satisfied. Contributions are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released due to satisfaction of program restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Pledges receivable are unconditional promises to give that are recognized as contributions when the promise is received. Pledges receivable that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Pledges receivable that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at fair value, measured at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using an interest rate commensurate with risk applicable to the years in which the promises are received. Amortization of the discounts is recognized as contribution revenue. The allowance for uncollectible pledges receivable is determined based on management's evaluation of the collectability of individual promises to give

M Net Assets

The Medical Center maintains the following classes of net assets

Unrestricted - Represents net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions

Temporarily Restricted - Represents net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met either by actions of the Medical Center and/or the passage of time

Permanently Restricted - Represents net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Medical Center

N Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

O Charity Care

The Medical Center provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. Management's disclosure of charity care costs are described in Note 3.

The Medical Center is dedicated to providing comprehensive health care services to all segments of society, including the aged and otherwise economically disadvantaged. In addition, the Medical Center provides a variety of community health services at or below cost

P Group Health Insurance Costs

The Medical Center is self-insured under its employee group health program, up to certain limits included in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations is a provision for premiums for excess coverage and payments for claims, including estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not yet reported at year end

Q Income Taxes

The Medical Center and Foundation are not-for-profit corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code
The Medical Center and Foundation have received a determination letter that they are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code
The Internal Revenue Service has established standards to be met to maintain tax exempt status

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2013 and 2012

HAP is a for-profit corporation subject to federal and state income taxes. HAP did not recognize any federal and state income tax expense in 2013 due to operating losses incurred during the year

The Medical Center accounts for uncertainties in accounting for income tax assets and liabilities using guidance included in FASB ASC Topic 740, *Income Taxes* The effect of income tax positions are recognized only if those positions are more likely than not of being sustained. At December 31, 2013 and 2012, there were no uncertain tax positions accrued. With few exceptions, the Medical Center is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years ended prior to December 31, 2010.

R Medical Malpractice Insurance

Medical malpractice insurance is purchased under claims-made policies. Under these policies, only claims made and reported to the insurer are covered during the policy term

The Medical Center accrues the expense of its share of asserted and unasserted claims occurring during the year by estimating the probable ultimate cost of any such claim. Such estimates are based on the Medical Center's own claims experience. The Medical Center's management does not expect any claim to exceed the insurance coverage limits. However, because of the risk involved in providing health care services, it is possible an event has occurred that will be the basis of a future material claim.

S Fair Value of Financial Instruments

Financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, receivables, assets limited as to use, current liabilities and long-term debt obligations. Management's estimates of fair value of assets limited as to use are described in Note 6. The carrying amounts reported in the consolidated balance sheets for cash and cash equivalents, receivables and current liabilities approximate fair value due to the short-term nature of these financial instruments. The carrying value of long-term debt obligations approximates fair value since the interest rates closely reflect current market rates for obligations with similar maturities and credit quality.

T Excess of Revenue Over (Under) Expenses

The statements of operations include excess of revenue over (under) expenses as a performance indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from the performance indicator, consistent with industry practice, include change in value of split interest agreements, change in unrealized gains and losses on other than trading securities, and contributions of long lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which, by donor restriction, were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

U Reclassification

Certain amounts in the 2012 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2013 reporting format

V Subsequent Events

The Medical Center considered events occurring through May 13, 2014 for recognition or disclosure in the consolidated financial statements as subsequent events. That date is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

(2) Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. See summary of payment arrangements below. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Medical Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Medical Center's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Medical Center records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for bad debts), recognized during the year from these major payor sources, is as follows.

A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors are as follows

Medicare. Inpatient acute care and swing-bed services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid based on Medicare defined costs of providing the services pursuant to the terms of the Rural Community Hospital Demonstration Program. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Outpatient, physician clinic and home health and hospice services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per service. The Medical Center is reimbursed for some items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports and audits thereof by the Medicare Administrative Contractor.

The Medical Center's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Medical Center The Medical Center's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare Administrative Contractor through December 31, 2009

The "Budget Control Act of 2011" requires, among other things, mandatory across-the-board reductions in Federal spending, also known as sequestration. The "American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012" postponed sequestration for two months. As required by law, President Obama issued a sequestration order on March 1, 2013. In general, Medicare claims with dates of service or dates of discharge on or after April 1, 2013, incur a two percent reduction in Medicare payment.

Medicaid. Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services related to Medicaid beneficiaries are paid based on ambulatory patient classifications or fee schedule amounts.

Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS) and Other Commercial Insurance. The Medical Center has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements includes discounts from established charges or fee schedule amounts.

The Medical Center reports net patient service revenue at estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments due to future audits, reviews, and investigations. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such amounts are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known or as years are no longer subject to such audits, reviews, and investigations

Net patient service revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 29% and 9%, respectively, of the Medical Center's net patient service revenue for the year ended December 31, 2013, and 31% and 8%, respectively, for the Medical Center's net patient service revenue for the year ended December 31, 2012 Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term

(3) Charity Care

The Medical Center provides charity care to patients who are financially unable to pay for the health care services they receive. Patients who qualify for charity care are given a percentage discount from established charges based on a sliding scale using poverty guidelines. It is the policy of the Medical Center not to pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care. Accordingly, the Medical Center does not report these amounts in operating revenue or in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The Medical Center determines the costs associated with providing charity care by aggregating the direct and indirect costs, including salaries, benefits, supplies, and other operating expenses, based on the overall cost to charge ratio for the Medical Center. The costs of caring for charity care patients for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012 was approximately \$388,000 and \$304,000, respectively.

(4) Pledges Receivable

The Medical Center is in the midst of an approximately \$7.5 million comprehensive capital campaign called, *Moving at the Speed of Life* While it commenced in 2013, the goal is to complete the effort by 2017. All pledges are to be used to enhance various areas of the Medical Center, including but not limited to modernizing the emergency department, create an urgent care clinic, purchase state-of-the-art robotic surgery equipment and various renovations. (6) Fair Value

Fair Value Hierarchy

The Medical Center applies FASB ASC Topic 820 for fair value measurements of financial assets and financial liabilities that are recognized or disclosed at fair value in the consolidated financial statements on a recurring basis FASB ASC Topic 820 establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows

- **Level 1** Inputs are quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date
- **Level 2** Inputs are other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability either directly or indirectly through either corroboration or observable market data
- Level 3 Inputs are unobservable for the asset or liability. Therefore, unobservable inputs shall reflect the entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability (including assumptions about risk) developed based on the best information available in the circumstances

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which a fair value measurement in its entirety falls is based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety

The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair value for each class of financial instrument measured at fair value

Cash and cash equivalents – The fair value of cash and cash equivalents, consisting primarily of money market funds, are classified as Level 1 as these funds are valued using quoted market prices

Certificates of deposit – Investments in certificates of deposit are classified as Level 2 based on multiple sources of information, which may include market data and/or quoted market prices form either markets that are not active or are for the same or similar assets of active markets

Mutual funds – The fair value of mutual funds are classified as Level 1 as the market value is based on quoted market prices, when available, or market prices provided by recognized broker dealers

Corporate stocks – The fair value of corporate stocks are classified as Level 1 as the market value is based on quoted market prices, when available, or market prices provided by recognized broker dealers

- (A) On December 23, 2013, the city of Grinnell, Iowa issued Series 2013 Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (Bonds) and entered into loan agreement with the Medical Center for the proceeds of the bonds to refund the Series 2001 Variable Rate Demand Hospital Revenue Bonds and the remaining balance of the Note Payable, Deer Creek. The Bonds require monthly principal and interest payments commencing February 2, 2014 with a final lump sum payment of \$2,947,620 (principal and interest) due January 1, 2017. The Bonds carry a fixed interest rate of 3 50%. The bonds are secured by an assignment of the Loan Agreement to Grinnell State Bank and a Mortgage and Security Agreement and Fixture Financing Statement between the Medical Center and Grinnell State Bank.
- (B) On December 23, 2013, the Medical Center entered into a Note Payable with Grinnell State Bank along with the Loan Agreement in (A) to refund the Series 2001 Variable Rate Demand Hospital Revenue Bonds and the remaining balance of the Note Payable, Deer Creek. The note requires monthly principal and interest payments of \$10,251, commencing February 1, 2014, with a final lump sum payment of \$724,592 (principal and interest) due on January 1, 2017. The loan carries a fixed interest rate of 5 385%. The loan is secured by the Mortgage and Security Agreement and Fixture Financing Statement between the Medical Center and Grinnell State Bank and a guarantee of the obligations of the Medical Center by the Foundation.
- (C) The Medical Center has entered into various capital leases obligations for medical equipment. The lease obligations are at various rates of imputed interest, secured by leased assets with varying maturity dates through June 2018.

The Loan Agreement (A) and Note Payable (B) are subject to meeting certain financial and other covenants including maintenance of an average minimum deposit balance with Grinnell State Bank, maintenance of a minimum debt service coverage ratio, limits on future borrowings, and the ability for Grinnell State Bank to appoint a representative to serve on the Medical Center's Board of Directors. Failure to maintain compliance with the average minimum deposit and minimum debt service coverage ratio requirements results in increases in the stated interest rate on the debt for a period of time as defined by the agreements

Meaningful Use of Certified Electronic Health Record Technology Incentive Payments

The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act contains specific financial incentive payments beginning in 2011 to certain hospitals and professionals that implement and achieve meaningful use of certified electronic health record (EHR) technology in ways that demonstrate improved quality and effectiveness of care. Specific criteria is set by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). Eligibility for annual Medicare incentive payments is dependent on providers demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each period over a four-year period. An initial Medicaid incentive payment is available to providers that adopt, implement, or upgrade certified EHR technology. However, in order to receive additional Medicaid incentive payments in subsequent years, providers must demonstrate continued meaningful use of EHR technology.

The Medical Center accounts for meaningful use incentive payments under the grant accounting model, cliff recognition. Medicare EHR incentive payments are recognized as revenue when eligible providers demonstrate meaningful use of certified EHR technology and data is available to estimate the incentive payments for each period (a 365 day period after the initial 90 day attestation period). Medicaid EHR incentive payments are recognized as revenue when an eligible provider demonstrates meaningful use of certified EHR technology for each period. For the years ending December 31, 2013 and 2012, the Medical Center recognized \$123,856 and \$1,040,336, respectively, of Medicare meaningful use grant revenue. For the years ending December 31, 2013 and 2012, the Medical Center recognized \$-0- and \$155,133, respectively, of Medicaid meaningful use grant revenue in other operating revenue in its consolidated statements of operations.

(11) Professional Liability Insurance

The Medical Center carries a professional liability policy (including malpractice) which provides \$1,000,000 of coverage for injuries per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate coverage. In addition, the Medical Center carries an umbrella policy which also provides an additional \$5,000,000 of professional liability coverage per occurrence and aggregate coverage. These policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis covering only the claims which have occurred and are reported to the insurance company while the coverage is in force. The Medical Center could have exposure on possible incidents that have occurred for which claims will be made in the future should professional liability insurance not be obtained, should coverage be limited and/or not available.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require a healthcare provider to recognize the ultimate costs of malpractice claims or similar contingent liabilities, which include costs associated with litigating or settling claims, when the incidents that give rise to the claims occur. The Medical Center does evaluate all incidents and claims along with prior claims experienced to determine if a liability is to be recognized. For the years ending December 31, 2013 and 2012, management determined no liability should be recognized for asserted or unasserted claims. Management is not aware of any such claim that would have a material adverse impact on the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

(12) 403(b) Retirement Plan

The Medical Center has a defined contribution retirement plan which covers all employees who meet the eligibility requirements. To be eligible, an employee must have completed one year of service equal to 1,000 hours. The plan allows for contributions by employees as well as contributions by the Medical Center. The Medical Center may contribute additional amounts from time to time. In 2009, the Medical Center reduced its base contribution to 1% and the match was eliminated. In April 2010, the Medical Center suspended the 1% base contribution.

(13) Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Medical Center is located in Grinnell, lowa The Medical Center grants credits without collateral to its patients, most of who are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables from patients and third-party payors was as follows
