(1) Organization

Nebraska Methodist Health System. Inc. and affiliates (the Health System) is a not-for-profit corporation providing a variety of healthcare, education, and related services to communities in Eastern Nebraska and Western Iowa. Healthcare services include inpatient, outpatient, emergency care, home healthcare, and physician services. The Health System is the sole corporate member of the following affiliated entities.

- The Nebraska Methodist Hospital (including Methodist Women's Hospital campus)
 - The Nebraska Methodist College of Nursing and Allied Health
 - Heart Services, LLC
- Jennie Edmundson Memorial Hospital
 - Jennie Edmundson Memorial Hospital Foundation
- Physicians Clinic, Inc.
- The Nebraska Methodist Hospital Foundation
- Shared Service Systems, Inc
- Nebraska Methodist Hospital Self-Insured Trust
- Methodist Health Partners

(2) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies of the Health System These policies are in accordance with U S generally accepted accounting principles (U S GAAP)

(a) Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with US GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include allowances for uncollectible accounts and contractual adjustments, estimated third-party payor settlements, liability for pension benefits, self-insurance liabilities, and other contingencies.

(b) Principles of Consolidation

The Health System consolidates all wholly owned affiliated entities and all entities in which it has greater than 50% ownership interest with commensurate control. All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

(c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding those amounts included as part of the investment portfolio

(d) Provision for Uncollectible Accounts

The provision for uncollectible accounts is based upon management's assessment of expected net collections considering the accounts receivable aging, historical collections experience, economic conditions, trends in healthcare coverage, and other collection indicators. Management periodically assesses the adequacy of the allowances for uncollectible accounts and contractual adjustments based upon historical write-off experience by payor category. The results of these reviews are used to establish the net realizable value of patient accounts receivable. The Health System follows established guidelines for placing certain patient balances with collection agencies Self-pax accounts are charged against the allowance for uncollectible accounts at the time of transfer to the collection agency Deductibles and coinsurance are classified as either third-party or self-pay receivables on the basis of which party has the primary remaining financial responsibility, while the total gross revenue remains classified based on the primary payor at the time of service. There are various factors that can impact collection trends, such as changes in the economy, which in turn may have an impact on unemployment rates and the number of uninsured and underinsured patients, the volume of patients through the emergency departments, the increased burden of copayments and deductibles to be made by patients with insurance, and business practices related to collection efforts These factors continuously change and can have an impact on collection trends and the estimation process. Net patient accounts receivable have been adjusted to the estimated amounts expected to be collected and do not bear interest

The Health System does not maintain an allowance for doubtful accounts from third-party payors, nor did it have significant write-offs from third-party payors

(e) Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market Cost is determined principally using the first-in, first-out method

(f) Investments and Assets Limited as to Use

Investments are measured at fair value in the consolidated balance sheets. Investment income (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses unless the investments are trading securities or the Health System has elected the fair value option. The Health System periodically reviews its investment portfolio to determine whether any unrealized losses are other than temporary. Impairments are recognized for financial reporting purposes and a new cost basis for the security is established. To determine whether impairment is other than temporary, the Health System considers whether it has the ability and intent to hold the investment until the market price recovers and considers whether evidence indicating the cost of the investment is recoverable outweighs evidence to the contrary. Evidence considered in the assessment includes reasons for the

impairment, the severity and duration of the impairment, changes in value subsequent to year-end, forecasted performance of the investee, and the general market condition of the industry in which the investee operates Based on this evaluation, the Health System recognized other-than-temporary impairment losses of approximately \$128 in 2013 and \$77 in 2012 Other-than-temporary impairment losses are included in investment income in the consolidated financial statements

Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements, donor-restricted gifts, and designated assets set aside by the Board of Directors (the Board) for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes

(g) Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives of property and equipment are as follows: land improvements – two to 25 years, buildings and improvements – five to 40 years, and equipment and furnishings – three to 20 years. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized using the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation in the consolidated financial statements. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. During 2013 and 2012, \$1,030 and \$733 of interest was capitalized, respectively.

Gifts of long-lived assets, such as land, buildings, or equipment, are reported as an increase to unrestricted net assets, and are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

(h) Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

The Health System reviews the carrying amount of long-lived assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. Measurement of any impairment would include a comparison of the present value of the estimated future operating cash flows anticipated to be generated during the remaining life of the long-lived assets to the net carrying value of the assets. No assets were impaired during 2013 and 2012.

(i) Deferred Financing Costs

Certain expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt have been deferred and are being amortized using the effective interest method over the term of the related obligation

(j) Asset Retirement Obligations

The Health System recognizes the fair value of liabilities for legal obligations associated with asset retirements in the period in which they are incurred, if a reasonable estimate of the fair value of the obligation can be made. Over time, the obligation is accreted to its present value each period. Upon settlement of the obligation, any difference between the cost to settle the asset retirement obligation and the liability recorded is recognized as a gain or loss in the consolidated statements of operations. The Health System has recorded a conditional asset retirement obligation related to estimated asbestos abatement costs in the amount of \$7,104 and \$7,312 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

(k) Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Health System has been limited by donors to a specific time period, purpose, or by law Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Health System in perpetuity

(l) Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations.

(m) Net Patient Service Revenue Before the Provision for Uncollectible Accounts

Net patient service revenue before the provision for uncollectible accounts is recognized in the period in which the services are performed and consists of gross patient service revenue less estimated contractual adjustments and discounts. The discount offered to uninsured patients is recognized as a contractual adjustment, which reduces net patient service revenue. The uninsured patient accounts, net of contractual adjustments, are further reduced to their net realizable value through the provision for uncollectible accounts. The Health System has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Health System at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, per diem, per visit, or per procedure, and discounted charges plus cost reimbursement for certain costs under governmental programs. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

(n) Meaningful Use of Electronic Health Record (EHR) Incentive Payments

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 included provisions for implementing health information technology under the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health

Act (HITECH) The provisions were designed to increase the use of EHR technology and establish the requirements for a Medicare and Medicaid incentive payment program beginning in 2011 for eligible providers that adopt and meaningfully use EHR technology. Eligibility for annual Medicare incentive payments is dependent on providers demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each period over a four-year period. Initial Medicaid payments are available to providers that adopt, implement, or upgrade certified EHR technology. Providers must demonstrate meaningful use of such technology in subsequent years to qualify for additional Medicaid incentive payments.

In 2013, the Health System recorded meaningful use incentive revenue of \$6.635 related to the Medicare and Medicaid programs. These incentive payments have been recognized in cafeteria, rental, and other in the consolidated statements of operations based on the grant accounting model whereby the incentive revenue is recorded when management becomes reasonably assured of meeting the required criteria.

(o) Financial Assistance

The Health System provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its financial assistance policy without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Because the Health System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as financial assistance, they are not reported as revenue. The cost of services and supplies furnished under the Health System's financial assistance policy are estimated based on the ratio of net costs to gross charges aggregated to \$11.455 and \$10.859 in 2013 and 2012, respectively

Patients meeting the guidelines for financial assistance frequently are uninsured and therefore qualify for the uninsured discount, which reduces the amount that they are responsible for to the equivalent of commercial reimbursement rates. This discount is applied prior to the financial assistance discount.

(p) Insurance Reserves

The provision for self-insurance reserves includes an estimate of the ultimate cost of reported claims as well as claims incurred but not reported. See note 10

(q) Investment in Unconsolidated Entities

Investments in unconsolidated entities are accounted for under the cost or equity method of accounting, as appropriate, based on the relative percentage of ownership or degree of influence over the organization. The equity income or loss on these investments is recorded in the consolidated statements of operations as income from unconsolidated entities.

(r) Income Taxes

The Health System and all affiliates, except for Shared Service Systems. Inc., and Methodist Health Partners, have been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as tax-exempt organizations, as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code), and are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code. The estimated federal and state income tax expense for the taxable entities and certain activities of the tax-exempt organizations that are unrelated to their exempt purpose was \$808 and \$396 for 2013 and 2012.

respectively. The United States is the major tax jurisdiction for the Health System and 2010 is the earliest tax year subject to examination.

The Health System recognizes the effect of income tax positions only if those positions are more likely than not of being sustained Recognized income tax positions are measured at the largest amount that is greater than 50% likely of being realized. Changes in recognition or measurement are reflected in the period in which the change in judgment occurs. In 2013 and 2012, management determined there are no material income tax positions requiring recognition in the financial statements.

(s) Excess of Revenues over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, include the change in unrealized gains and losses on investments other-than-trading securities, change in value of charitable remainder unitrusts and annuities payable, change in net liability for pension benefits, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions, which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

(3) Net Patient Service Revenue and Accounts Receivable

The Nebraska Methodist Hospital and Jennie Edmundson Memorial Hospital (collectively, the Hospitals) and the Physicians Clinic (the Clinic) have agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospitals and the Clinic at amounts different from their established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors is as follows

(a) Medicare

Inpatient acute care services and outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Medical education costs are paid based on a cost-reimbursement methodology. The Hospitals are reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospitals and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. Physician services are paid based on fee schedules.

(b) Nebraska Medicaid

Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Certain outpatient services are reimbursed based on a percentage rate representing the average ratio of cost to charges discounted by 24% and 26% at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

(c) Iowa Medicaid

Medical and surgical inpatient services and outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are primarily paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Inpatient psychiatric stays are paid on a prospectively determined per diem. Physician services are paid based on fee

schedule amounts Iowa Medicaid implemented a provider assessment program in order to increase federal funding In 2013 and 2012, the net impact was not significant

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 29% and 5%, respectively, of the Health System's net patient service revenue for the year ended December 31, 2013, and 28% and 5%, respectively, for the year ended December 31, 2012. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Net patient service revenue increased \$777 and \$444 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, as a result of changes in estimates due to prior year cost report settlements. In 2012, the Health System also prevailed on the appeal of a cost report settlement from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) related to the calculation used by CMS for the rural floor wage index. The settlement amount is included in net patient service revenue and totaled \$3,630. The appeal spanned years from 1997 through 2011.

The Hospitals and the Clinic have also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment under these agreements includes discounts from established charges, fee schedules, and prospectively determined rates per discharge.

The governmental payors, as well as most commercial payors, have developed programs to review paid claims on a retroactive basis for accuracy and medical necessity. The Health System is subject to these post payment audits, which may result in the return of payments previously received. The determination of net patient service revenue includes consideration of these audits on net realizable revenue.

Patient accounts receivable, net of contractual adjustments and discounts, was \$99,817 and \$117,620 as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, or 16% and 19% of patient service revenue, net of contractual adjustments and discounts, for the fiscal years then ended. The related allowance for uncollectible accounts was \$17,412 and \$22,652, or 17% and 19% of the related patient accounts receivable, net of contractual adjustments and discounts, as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The provision for uncollectible accounts in 2013 and 2012, respectively, was \$3,703 and \$7,048. The decrease in the provision is primarily related to a 10% decrease in patient accounts receivable, higher than expected recoveries, and the refinement of the processes to identify patients eligible for financial assistance.

The Health System and all affiliates, except for Shared Service Systems, Inc., Nebraska Methodist Hospital Self-Insured Trust, and Heart Services, LLC, have entered into a Master Trust Indenture (Indenture), which provides, among other things, for certain covenants related to the incurrence of additional indebtedness, the sale, lease, or disposition of property, and the maintenance of certain financial ratios. The Indenture also requires the Health System to satisfy financial performance measures as long as the debt is outstanding

In the event of a Rating Agency downgrade to a rating of BBB (or its equivalent) or lower, the initial purchasing banks of the 2009 and 2010 series bonds and the reinsurer of the 1997 series bonds may elect to have the Health System repurchase the 2010, 2009, and 1997 bonds. In the event of this election, the Health System would have 90 days to refinance the then outstanding bonds, which total \$61,615 at December 31, 2013

In March 2014, Jennie Edmundson Memorial Hospital redeemed the Series 1997 Iowa Finance Authority Health Facilities Refunding Revenue Bonds, which were included under the Indenture

In March 2014, Hospital Authority No 2 and Hospital Authority No 3 of Douglas County Nebraska issued \$40,000 of Series 2014 fixed rate nonbank qualified tax-exempt bonds on behalf of the Health System under the Indenture. The proceeds will be used to refund the Series 2009 bonds and finance certain capital projects. The bonds were purchased directly by a bank, mature in 2044, and are subject to mandatory tender in 2022. During the initial term, the bonds will bear interest at a fixed rate equal to the bank cost of funds plus applicable spread.

The Health System has available a \$10,000 unsecured revolving line of credit with an interest rate of one-month LIBOR plus 1.5% The line of credit expires on August 1, 2014. As of December 31, 2013 and 2012, no amounts have been advanced on the line of credit

The Health System has available a \$10.000 unsecured revolving line of credit in connection with a vendor payment program with an interest rate of three-month LIBOR plus 1 75% Interest on the line of credit is paid by the program vendor. The line of credit expires on May 1, 2014. As of December 31, 2013 and 2012, \$4,535 and \$4,232, respectively, have been advanced on the line of credit.

(6) Investments and Assets Limited as to Use

Investments and assets limited as to use are stated at fair value and consist of

(a) Long-Term Investments Including Securities on Loan

Long-term investments will be used to provide liquidity, retire long-term debt, replace existing facilities, expand the present facilities as necessary in the future, and continue the health services currently provided by the Health System Additionally, certain of these funds have been designated

to fund self-insurance reserves. Long-term investments are held in a variety of different investment vehicles. See note 7 for a description of investments held.

(b) Construction Funds

Proceeds from the 2010 bonds were deposited with a trustee for construction, improvement, equipping, and furnishing of the Methodist Hospital pathology building, employee parking garage, and surgery remodel project. There were no remaining construction funds at December 31, 2013. Constructions funds held at December 31, 2012 were comprised mainly of money market funds.

(c) Bond Trust Fund Investments

In connection with certain debt obligations, the Health System is required to make periodic deposits into bond sinking and interest funds with the trustee to provide for scheduled interest and principal payments. Bond trust fund investments held at December 31, 2013 were comprised mainly of money market funds. Bond trust fund investments held at December 31, 2012 were comprised mainly of U.S. government and agency obligations.

Total unrealized losses from historical cost at December 31, 2013 were \$3,283, of which \$762 relates to securities that have been in an unrealized loss position for greater than a year. Management reviewed the securities with unrealized losses at December 31, 2013 and determined that the securities were not other than temporarily impaired. Management reached this conclusion by applying its other-than-temporary loss policy, as well as discussions with its investment consultants and portfolio managers, who relied on industry analyst reports, credit ratings, current market conditions, and other information they deemed relevant to this assessment.

Securities Lending

The Health System participates in a securities lending program operated by Clearlend, a division of Wells Fargo. Under this program, equity and fixed income investment securities are loaned on a temporary basis to investment brokers for a fee. The Health System retains the right to the equivalent of all distributions of the securities while on loan, including but not limited to, dividends, interest, and other cash distributions.

Securities so loaned are fully collateralized by short-term domestic securities that are high grade and quality at the time of investment. The Health System receives the aggregate income derived from the investments net of any tax, rebate, fees paid to borrowers, and other certain expenses.

All securities loans can be terminated by the lender, the borrower, or the lending agent Upon termination of a loan, the securities loaned are returned to the lending agent and the associated collateral is returned to the borrower

The fair market value of securities on loan under the securities lending program was \$3.374 and \$3.461 as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The fair market value of the collateral received for the loaned securities was \$3.613 and \$3.725 as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. None of the collateral was sold or repledged during 2013 or 2012.

(7) Fair Value Measurements

Fair Value Hierarchy

The fair value of financial instruments is the amount that would be received from the sale of an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date

The Health System follows a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows.

Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date. Financial instruments classified in this level generally include pooled short-term investment funds, exchange traded equity securities, and mutual funds.

Level 2 Inputs are based on quoted prices for similar instruments in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active, and model-based valuation techniques for which all significant assumptions are observable in the market or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities. Financial instruments classified in this level generally include fixed income government obligations, asset-backed securities, and corporate and municipal bonds.

Level 3 Inputs are unobservable for the asset or liability. The inputs into the determination of fair value require management's judgment or estimation of assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. Financial instruments classified in this level generally include alternative investments, limited partnerships, and private equity investments.

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which a fair value measurement in its entirety falls is based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The following is a description of the fair value of financial instruments held and the methods and assumptions that were used to estimate the fair value of each class of financial instrument

Cash and cash equivalents, patient accounts receivable, other receivables, accounts payable, accrued salaries, wages and benefits, other accrued liabilities, collateral on securities loaned, and estimated

third-party payor settlements – the carrying amount approximates fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments

Contributions receivable, liability for charitable remainder unitrusts and annuities payable, and liability under self-insured programs – the carrying amount approximates fair value. The fair value is determined using the income approach by estimating the present value of expected future cash flows based on the best information available.

Conditional asset retirement obligation – the carrying amount approximates fair value. The fair value is determined using the income approach by estimating the present value of expected future cash flows based on the best information available. The conditional asset retirement obligation utilizes Level 3 measurements in determining the fair value.

Debt and capital lease obligations – The fair value of long-term debt and capital lease obligations is \$275,782 and \$301,755 as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The fair value of the Health System's long-term debt is measured using quoted offer-side prices when quoted market prices are available. If quoted market prices are not available, the fair value is determined by discounting the future cash flows of each instrument at rates that reflect, among other things, market interest rates and the Health System's credit standing. In determining an appropriate spread to reflect its credit standing, the Health System considers bond yields of other long-term debt offered by the Health System, and interest rates currently offered to the Health System for similar debt instruments of comparable maturities by the Health System's bankers as well as other banks that regularly compete to provide financing to the Health System Debt and capital lease obligations utilize Level 2 measurements in determining the fair value

observable inputs to the income approach include data points for benchmark constant maturity curves and spreads

Marketable debt securities – The fair value of investments in marketable debt securities is primarily determined using techniques that are consistent with the market approach. Significant observable inputs include benchmark yields, reported trades, observable broker/dealer quotes, issuer spreads, and security specific characteristics, such as early redemption options.

Funds held in trust by others – Funds held in trust by others represent the Health System's beneficial interest in certain assets held by third parties. The valuation of these funds is based on fair value information received from external trustees and is calculated based upon information received from the trustee times the Health System's percentage of ownership. These interests are classified as Level 3 investments as the reported fair values are based on a combination of Level 2 inputs and significant unobservable inputs as determined by the trustees.

Real estate funds – The fair value of investments in real estate funds is valued based on the funds net asset value, or its equivalent, as supplied by the fund administrator and these valuations are used by management as a practical expedient to fair value. The Health System has the ability to liquidate its interest in the funds by providing 90 days written notice. The Health System has committed an additional \$5,690 to these funds in 2014.

(9) Retirement Plans

(a) Nebraska Methodist Health System Tax Sheltered Account Plan

The Health System sponsors a 403(b) savings plan Participating employees may make voluntary salary deferrals up to 100% of their recognized compensation as defined by the plan, up to the maximum dollar amounts allowed by law Employer matching contributions are made in various amounts based on years of service up to 100% of the participant's elective deferral up to 2% of the participant's compensation. The Health System's expense related to the plan was \$3.331 and \$2.793 in 2013 and 2012, respectively

(b) Shared Service Systems, Inc. 401 (k) Salary Reduction Plan and Trust

Shared Service Systems. Inc (SSS) sponsors a 401 (k) salary reduction plan Participants may make salary deferrals up to 100% of their recognized compensation as defined by the Plan, up to the maximum dollar amount allowed by law Employer matching contributions are made in various amounts based on years of service up to 100% of the participant's elective deferral up to 2% of the participant's compensation SSS may also make employer discretionary contributions SSS's expense related to the plan was \$68 and \$67 in 2013 and 2012, respectively

(c) Nebraska Methodist Health System Retirement Account Plan

The Health System sponsors a noncontributory defined-benefit pension plan (the Plan) covering substantially all employees (except for employees covered under the Jennie Edmundson Memorial Hospital Employee Retirement Plan) who have completed one year of eligible service, as defined in the Plan, and have attained the age of 21 Benefits are determined based upon years of service and the employee's compensation during the final 15 years of employment or during all years of service if employed less than 15 years. The Health System's funding policy is to contribute annually an amount that satisfies the funding standard account requirements of the Employee Retirement Income Security. Act of 1974 (ERISA) The annual costs were calculated using the projected-unit-credit-actuarial cost method.

Effective May 1, 2012, the Plan was frozen to new entrants, the crediting interest rate percentage was reduced to 3%, and active employees who are vested and become totally disabled will no longer remain as active Plan participants. On April 25, 2013, the Plan was amended to provide for an early distribution date to vested participants who terminated after December 31, 2003, and prior to January 1, 2007. To qualify for the early distribution date on October 1, 2013, the participant was required to elect to take the early distribution during an election period beginning July 15, 2013, and ending August 31, 2013. (10) Insurance Coverage

The Health System manages its professional liability risks through a combination of third-party insurance coverage and self-insurance General and professional liability and employed physician professional liability coverage are provided under a self-insured retention of \$2,000 per occurrence with an annual aggregate of \$9,000. In addition, a \$50,000 umbrella policy is maintained with third-party insurance carriers for claims in excess of any applicable self-insured retention. In the event of insolvency, the Health System maintains a fronting policy with the insurance carrier to pay claims. In turn, the insurance carrier requires the Health System to maintain a letter of credit as collateral for open claims. At December 31, 2013, the amount available under the letter of credit was \$3,427. There were no amounts drawn as of December 31, 2013.

The Health System has established reserves for possible losses on both asserted and unasserted claims based upon an independent actuarial analysis. The reserves were not discounted in 2013 or 2012. The Health System has recognized \$2,489 and \$1,802 of expense related to these self-insured risks during 2013 and 2012, respectively

Management of the Health System is presently not aware of any incidents, which would result in probable losses materially in excess of amounts provided by insurance policies and established reserves for claims

The Health System similarly provides for health insurance and workers' compensation coverage through a combination of self-insurance and third-party insurers. Estimated reserves have been established for reported claims and claims, which have been incurred but not reported.

(12) Contingencies

The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, security and privacy of protected data, government healthcare program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse Government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by healthcare providers. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government healthcare programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed Medicare started a post payment audit program in 2009 with retroactive application to October 1, 2007 Refund requests of \$1,709 and \$1,659 have been repaid during fiscal years ending December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. In the opinion of management, the Health System is in compliance with fraud and abuse regulations, as well as other applicable government laws and regulations While no regulatory inquiries have been made, which are expected to have a material effect on the Health System's consolidated financial statements, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulators actions unknown or unasserted at this tıme

The Health System has guaranteed a portion of the performance of an unrelated entity to a third party on a revolving line of credit loan. The term of the guarantee is equal to the term of the related debt. At December 31, 2013 and 2012, \$400 has been recorded as a liability for this guarantee and is included in other accrued liabilities on the consolidated balance sheet.

(13) Commitments

Certain equipment and property are being leased under long-term noncancelable operating leases. In most cases, management expects that, in the normal course of operations, the leases will be renewed or replaced by other leases or capital purchases. The total rent expense under operating leases for 2013 and 2012 was \$6,451 and \$6,466, respectively.
