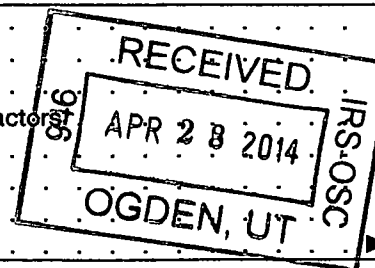

SurvivorVision (SV) is organized and operated to attract public support on a continuing basis. The organization maintains bona fide programs for obtaining funds from the public, including the solicitation of donations through its web site, networking, the mail, various public fundraising events, Paypal, and Amazon. In addition, the organization distributes periodic newsletters, maintains a presence on Facebook and participates in a number of public events, including 5k events for charitable causes.

SurvivorVision is a seven year old organization with a small staff that continues to identify ways to obtain public funds during difficult economic times. The organization continues to publicly solicit new donors, and to get members to make the public more aware of the organization and its mission. SV's fundraising efforts are reasonable in light of its charitable activities. Every year SV assists thousands of pediatric oncology patients and their families, directly, and indirectly through grants issued to a wide range of recipients and organizations who run or support programs and services aimed at improving the quality of life of pediatric cancer fighters and survivors. All funds raised by the organization are allocated to fulfilling SV's mission - the organization pays no salaries. In addition, SV generated only \$216 in investment income - less than 1% of total income.

SV's public support percentage for 2013 was 100%. While SV's five year public percentage is 11.4%, it should be noted that for several years, the organization was the beneficiary of one very generous donor. Without that single outlying donor, SV's public percentage would approach or be equal to 100%. Again, SV pays no compensation and has a very low cost structure with non-fundraising expenses equal to less than 5% of funds raised.

SV's governing body is made up of eight people with diverse personal and professional experiences, including financial professionals, attorneys, salesperson, nurse, administrative associate and business professional. These individuals also have various industry backgrounds, including business, professional services and financial services. In addition, multiple board members have medical knowledge - a key to understanding the organization's mission. And, the founder of SV is a pediatric cancer survivor - the target population of SV's core mission. SV assists thousands of children and families each year through a number of programs and grants distributed throughout the nation. This includes the Beads of Courage program where SV supports relationships with ?? hospitals in ?? states across the country. All of these participating or sponsoring organizations have specialized knowledge or expertise in the health care industry, and specifically, expertise in pediatric oncology or the effect cancer has on fighters and survivors. SV also administered a national textbook program that supported 47 students in five states.

Each year, over 12,000 American children are diagnosed with cancer. Recent advances in treatment and supportive care mean nearly 80% of these children will go on to become adult survivors. Today there are more than 270,000 survivors in the U.S. and that number is expected to rise. Survivors of childhood cancers often go on to live full and productive lives, but the treatments they've received and the disease itself put them at risk for future medical problems. Thirty years after diagnosis, as many as 68% will have at least one health problem, such as a secondary cancer, thyroid disorder or cardiac dysfunction; and 31% will have multiple complications. SurvivorVision was proud to support this program with a grant of \$10,000.

Line 30 - Anne and Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital HOT and Healthy Living Program

To promote wellness and support healthy weight management in children with blood disorders and cancer. This initiative allows for the coordination of services and activities that assist patients and their families in achieving their goals for health and wellness.

Treatment for cancer and blood disorders can create special challenges for patients and families. Intensive chemotherapy, including steroids, can have significant side effects that impact a patient's sense of well-being and healthy weight management. Some may have weight gain due to relative inactivity and poor diet while others, like children with sickle cell disease or certain cancers, may be underweight or easily become fatigued. Also, some children live in areas that are less safe or that have local parks with fewer options for outdoor play.

"HOT" stand for Hematology - Oncology - Transplantation, which are specialties within the Lurie Children's Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders. Our expert staff in the Division of Hematology, Oncology and Stem Cell Transplantation treats a wide-array of serious medical conditions, such as leukemia, lymphoma, brain tumors, sickle cell disease and hemophilia. SurvivorVision supported this important program with a grant of \$2,975.

Text book scholarships are available to any pediatric cancer patient or survivor pursuing post-secondary education, who was treated or resided in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan or Wisconsin. Students are eligible to receive up to \$2,000 per year for books or other course-related materials in order to make college or trade school more affordable. In 2013, 47 different cancer patients or survivors applied for and received text book scholarships totaling \$23,259.

Line 29 - Anne and Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital STAR Program

The STAR Program (Survivors Taking Action & Responsibility) is a comprehensive long-term follow-up program for adult survivors of pediatric cancer. The STAR Program follows survivors through adulthood focusing on their special medical and psychological needs. Services are provided in a clinical setting with an emphasis on patient care, education, and research. The program is directed by Aarati Didwania MD., and coordinated by Karen Kinahan, MS, RN, BC, who has expertise in pediatric oncology and the effects of treatment from childhood cancer. STAR patients are seen on an annual basis with special attention to health maintenance, screening and patient education issue, but may be seen more frequently if their condition dictates closer management. Patients in need of further expertise regarding the late effects of past treatment are directed to sub-specialists familiar with issues specific to survivors of childhood cancer.
