	compassionate care. (In 2013, 40,135 meals were served to the hungry, and 1,112 people were given items of clothing.) People are
	connected to the resources they need through personal contact with a counselor. (Provided counseling services for 883 people.)
	Health barriers are overcome through access to a free health clinic. (682 patient visits) The Jobs for Life classes teach the
	unemployed and underemployed how to successfully find and keep employment. A search for jobs and housing is aided by the use
