# **Basis of Presentation**

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of entities owned and controlled by the Corporation. All material intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated.

Transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major, or central to the provision of health care services are reported as operating revenues and expenses in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets. Other transactions are reported as nonoperating gains and losses.

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

### Reclassifications

Certain amounts in 2012 have been reclassified to conform with the 2013 presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the financial position, results of operations or cash flows of the Corporation as previously presented.

# **Net Patient Service Revenue**

Net patient service revenue is recorded at the estimated net realizable amounts for services rendered. Estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payers are accrued in the year the related services are rendered and adjusted in future years as final settlements are determined. Amounts due to/from third parties are based on estimates by management. Any adjustments to these amounts are treated as a change in estimate and are included in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets in the year the adjustment is made. The change in estimate for 2012 net patient service revenue includes a group appeal settlement with CMS to recover funds lost over the period of 2004 through 2011 as a result of CMS' flawed methodology in the application of the rural floor budget neutrality adjustment during this time period. The net amount of the settlement totaled \$5,400,000.

# **Charity Care and Bad Debt Expense**

The Corporation provides health care services to all patients, regardless of their ability to pay. The Corporation does not pursue collection from those patients who meet certain criteria under its charity policy. Therefore, those amounts are not reported as revenues.

Forgone charges for charity care amounted to \$146,830,000 and \$129,778,000 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. These amounts as a percentage of gross patient revenues were 5.2% and 4.7% at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Estimated costs related to providing charity care were \$28,490,000 and \$24,932,000 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. These costs were estimated by multiplying the percentage of gross patient revenues attributable to charity care patients by the total operating expenses.

The Corporation records bad debt expense as its estimate of the amount of gross charges due from patients that will not ultimately be collected. Bad debt expense as a percentage of gross patient charges was 3.6% and 3.8% for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The allowance for bad debts is established for accounts deemed potentially uncollectible by management based on contract terms and historical collection experience. Accounts are written off once collection efforts have been exhausted.

# **Other Operating Revenue**

Other operating revenue includes certain investment earnings and net gains on the sale of investments of certain affiliates, investment income related to escrow and indenture agreements held in trust, government incentive payments related to implementation of inpatient electronic medical records, and other activities related to the provision of health care services.

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

# **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by board designation or other arrangements, such as trust agreements. The Corporation classifies book overdrafts, representing outstanding checks in excess of funds on deposit, in accounts payable, except where the legal right of offset exists with the same bank. Such amounts totaled \$1,290,000 and \$1,244,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

# Inventory

Inventory, which consists principally of medical and other supplies, is valued at the lower of cost or market on the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method.

# **Other Current Assets**

Other current assets include notes receivable, prepaid expenses, and other nonpatient accounts receivable.

# **Assets Whose Use Is Limited**

Assets whose use is limited represent funds designated by the Corporation's Board of Trustees for future capital expenditures and for debt service as required by bond indentures, escrow, and loan agreements (Note 3).

These assets consist of cash and cash equivalents, U.S. government obligations, fixed income securities, and fixed income, equity, and multistrategy mutual funds and are recorded at market plus accrued interest. Realized gains and losses are determined on the specific identification method for securities with fixed maturities and the average cost method for equity securities.

# Other Long-Term Investments

Other long-term investments, which consist of cash and cash equivalents, U.S. government obligations, and fixed income, equity, and multistrategy mutual funds, are stated at market plus accrued interest. Investment income is recognized when earned.

### **Investments in Others**

Investments in others are recorded using the equity method. The Corporation's share of the results of unrestricted operations of these entities is recorded as other operating revenue, nonoperating gains (losses), or changes in unrestricted net assets, depending on the nature of the related investment. The Corporation's share of the changes in temporarily and permanently restricted net assets of these entities is recorded as changes in the Corporation's temporarily and permanently restricted net assets

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

# **Property and Equipment, Net**

Property and equipment is stated at cost if purchased or market value at date received if donated. Upon sale or retirement of property and equipment, the cost and related accumulated depreciation are eliminated from the respective accounts, and the resulting gain or loss, if any, is included in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The estimated useful lives are in accordance with American Hospital Association guidelines.

During periods of construction, the Corporation capitalizes interest expenditures, net of any related interest earnings, as part of the costs of acquiring qualifying assets. The Corporation capitalized \$1,840,000 and \$2,365,000 of interest on projects under construction during the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The net capitalized interest is added to the asset's cost and is depreciated over the asset's estimated useful life.

Costs incurred for the development of computer software are capitalized and amortized over five years or less.

# **Impairment of Long-Lived Assets**

The Corporation evaluates the carrying value of long-lived assets to be held and used when events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable. The carrying value of a long-lived asset is considered impaired when the total projected undiscounted cash flows are less than its carrying value. In that event, a loss is recognized based on the amount by which the carrying value exceeds the fair value of the long-lived asset. Impairments totaled \$1,186,000 and \$-0- for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and are included in loss (gain) on disposal of assets and in discontinued operations in the consolidated statements of operations.

# **Unamortized Bond Issue Expenditures**

Bond issue expenditures are amortized over the period the bonds are outstanding on the straight-line method.

### Goodwill

Goodwill represents the excess of the purchase price paid over net assets acquired. Management evaluates goodwill to determine if it is more likely than not that impairment exists. If there is a greater than 50% likelihood of impairment, the Corporation assesses the recoverability of goodwill by determining whether the amounts can be recovered through undiscounted cash flows of the business acquired, excluding interest. If impairment is indicated by this analysis, measurement of the loss would be based on the market value of the business acquired. Management considers external factors, including local market developments, regional and national trends, regulatory developments, and other pertinent factors in making its assessments. No goodwill was considered impaired during the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012. This analysis includes management estimates that are susceptible to significant changes from economic or other factors. Changes in these estimates could result in future goodwill impairments.

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

### Other Assets

Other assets primarily include notes receivable, vendor deposits, and the cash surrender value of life insurance policies.

### Insurance

The Corporation, through ASI and ARS, maintains a self-insurance program related to its general, professional, and workers' compensation liabilities. These liabilities are funded with marketable securities. Provision is made in the consolidated financial statements for estimates of the value of reported claims and claims incurred but not reported under these programs (Note 11).

ARS was established in December 2013 to replace ASI, which will be dissolved during 2014.

In addition, the Corporation maintains a self-insurance program for its employees' health and dental insurance. Provision is made in the consolidated financial statements for estimates of the claims incurred but not reported under this program.

# **Other Current Liabilities**

Other current liabilities primarily include deferred revenue related to Medicaid disproportionate share payments.

### **Other Noncurrent Liabilities**

Other noncurrent liabilities primarily include the noncurrent portion of reserves for general, professional, and workers' compensation liabilities, defined benefit pension plan, BHC physician life insurance retirement plan, and inpatient electronic medical records software license agreement.

# **Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets**

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Corporation has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets are those which are restricted by donors to be held by the Corporation in perpetuity.

### **Tax Status**

Baptist Health System, Inc. is an Alabama not-for-profit corporation and is exempt from income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). BHSA, a for-profit holding company, was organized in 1994 to coordinate the activities of the for-profit subsidiaries of the Corporation.

Deferred taxes are recorded for temporary timing differences between amounts reported for federal and state tax purposes and amounts recorded in the consolidated financial statements. The primary timing difference is due to the recognition of net operating loss carry forwards. The Corporation has established an allowance offsetting the balance of deferred taxes.

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the dates of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

The estimates susceptible to significant changes include those used in determining the collectability of receivables, the reserves for general and professional liability claims, the reserves for workers' compensation claims, the reserves for employee group health care claims, pension assumptions, the reserves for pending litigation and regulatory audits, estimated third-party payer settlements, and the useful lives and recoverability of certain long-lived assets and intangible assets. Although some variability is inherent in these estimates, management believes that the amounts recorded are reasonable.

# **Subsequent Events**

Management has evaluated subsequent events and their potential effects on these consolidated financial statements through April 29, 2014, the date the consolidated financial statements were issued.

### Fair Value Measurements

Generally accepted accounting principles define fair value for financial reporting purposes as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly market transaction between market participants at the measurement date (reporting date). Fair value is based on an exit price in the principal market or most advantageous market in which the reporting entity could transact.

Financial Instruments Measured at Fair Value – For each asset and liability required to be reported at fair value, management has identified the unit of account and valuation premise to be applied for purposes of measuring fair value. The unit of account is the level at which an asset or liability is aggregated or disaggregated. The valuation premise is a concept that determines whether an asset is measured on a stand-alone basis or in combination with other assets. The Corporation measures its assets and liabilities on a stand-alone basis then aggregates assets and liabilities with similar characteristics for disclosure purposes. Generally accepted accounting principles establish a hierarchy for inputs used in measuring fair value that maximizes the use of observable inputs and minimizes the use of unobservable inputs by requiring that the observable inputs be used when available. Observable inputs are inputs that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability developed based on market data obtained from sources independent of the Corporation.

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

Unobservable inputs are inputs that reflect the Corporation's assumptions about the factors market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability developed based on the best information available in the circumstances. The hierarchy is broken down into three levels based on the reliability of inputs as follows:

Level 1 – Valuations based on quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Corporation has the ability to access. Since valuations are based on quoted prices that are readily and regularly available in an active market, valuation of these products does not entail a significant degree of judgment.

Level 2 – Valuations based on observable inputs, including quoted prices (other than Level 1) in active markets for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, such as interest rates, yield curves, volatilities, and default rates, and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3 – Valuations based on inputs that are unobservable and significant to the overall fair value measurement.

If the determination of fair value measurement for a particular asset or liability is based on inputs from different levels of the fair value hierarchy, the level in the fair value hierarchy within which the entire fair value measurement falls is based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. Management's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and considers factors specific to the asset or liability measured.

The fair value of common stock, equity pools, registered mutual funds, and other equity investments is based on quoted market prices in an active market for identical assets and liabilities as of the reporting date. The fair value of common stock, equity pools, and other equity investments is categorized within Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

The fair value of fixed maturity securities, fixed income pools, and real estate investment trusts is estimated using recently executed transactions and market price quotations (where observable). These securities are generally categorized in Level 1 or Level 2 of the fair value hierarchy; in instances where significant inputs are unobservable, they are categorized in Level 3 of the hierarchy.

Financial Instruments Not Measured at Fair Value – Some of the Corporation's financial instruments are not measured at fair value on a recurring basis but, nevertheless, are recorded at amounts that approximate fair value due to their liquid or short-term nature. Such financial assets and financial liabilities include accounts receivable, accounts payable, accrued expenses, and lines of credit. The Corporation's long-term debt is carried at cost. See Note 7 for disclosure of the fair value.

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

# **Discontinued Operations**

In previous years, the Corporation has divested several facilities, some of which qualified for discontinued operations treatment. The amounts reflected as loss from discontinued operations in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets represent the residual revenues and expenses from those discontinued operations.

# **Recent Accounting Developments**

Management considers the applicability and impact of all accounting standards updates (ASUs) issued by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB). There were no ASUs determined to either be applicable or to have a more than minimal impact on the consolidated financial statements.

# 2. NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

The hospitals contributed 91% of the Corporation's net patient service revenue in 2013 and 2012. The hospitals have agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments at amounts which differ from the established rates. Following is a summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payers:

### **Medicare**

Most inpatient acute care services, most outpatient services and home health services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries, and certain medical education and capital costs are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Inpatient acute care rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Certain medical education costs, bad debt reimbursement, and disproportionate share payments are paid based on tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Corporation and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary.

Cost reports have been audited by the fiscal intermediary through 2009 for one hospital, and through 2010 for the remaining hospitals. The Corporation's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Corporation, as well as a postpayment review by the Recovery Audit Contractor (RAC) program (Note 11). Approximately 32% and 33% of the hospitals' gross patient revenues were derived from Medicare beneficiaries in 2013 and 2012, respectively.

### **Medicare HMO**

Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicare-eligible beneficiaries enrolled in Medicare Advantage programs are generally paid at rates which mirror traditional Medicare. Approximately 22% and 21% of the hospitals' gross patient revenues were derived from Medicare HMO subscribers in 2013 and 2012, respectively.

# 2. NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE – CONTINUED

### **Blue Cross**

Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to most Blue Cross subscribers are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates or based on a cost reimbursement methodology. For cost reimbursed services, the Corporation is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Corporation and audits thereof by Blue Cross. Cost reports have been audited for one hospital through 2011 and three hospitals through 2012. Approximately 22% of the hospitals' gross patient revenues were derived from Blue Cross subscribers in 2013 and 2012.

### Medicaid

For patient services rendered to Medicaid-eligible beneficiaries, hospitals receive enhanced disproportionate share payments and quarterly supplemental access payments in addition to fee-for-service payments for inpatient and outpatient services with inpatient service fees paid on a per diem rate and outpatient service fees paid on a fee schedule. In addition, private hospitals, such as the hospitals operated by the Corporation, are assessed a revenue tax. Approximately 11% of the hospitals' gross patient revenues were derived from Medicaid beneficiaries in 2013 and 2012.

# **Other Third-Party Payers**

The Corporation has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payments to the Corporation under these agreements includes discounts from established charges and prospectively determined rates.

# **BHF**

BHF exists to support the activities of the Corporation. BHF is managed by an independent board of directors. Upon its dissolution, any net assets remaining would revert to the Corporation. As a result, the accompanying consolidated financial statements for 2013 and 2012 include the net assets of BHF.

# 4. INVESTMENTS IN OTHERS - CONTINUED

Prior to December 31, 2012, BHF financial statements included the results of its eight controlled affiliates Baptist Hospitals Foundation Service Corporation (BHFSC), Cherokee Housing Corporation, Shelby Senior Housing, Inc., Cullman Senior Housing, Inc., DeKalb Senior Housing, Inc., Limestone Senior Housing, Inc., Oxford Senior Housing, Inc., and Coosa Valley Senior Housing, Inc.

On October 1, 2012, BHFSC entered into a Conditional Purchase and Sale Contract (Contract) with Princeton Towers, L.P. (Partnership) to transfer Princeton Towers I and II to the Partnership in consideration for the payment of \$1,400,000 (Purchase Price). Closing was originally scheduled to occur by December 31, 2013, contingent upon certain financing conditions being met. If closing did not occur by December 31, 2013, the Partnership would pay annual extension fees of \$200,000. As of December 31, 2013, closing had not occurred and BHFSC received the \$200,000 extension fee and distributed the funds to BHF.

During 2013, BHF received permission from the United States Secretary of Housing and Urban Development to transfer to East Lake Community Development, Inc. sponsorship of its eight affiliates. Additionally, effective December 31, 2012, BHF terminated each of the nine Housing Management Agreements related to its eight affiliates. As a result of the Contract and transfer of board control, the net assets of the eight affiliates are no longer included in BHF's net assets as of December 31, 2012.

Also, as a result of this transaction, \$7,400,000 of temporarily restricted net assets were released which resulted in nonoperating gains in the Corporation's consolidated statement of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets for the year ended December 31, 2012.

BHF was audited by other auditors as of and for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, and a summary of those audited financial statements are as follows:

The Corporation recorded depreciation expense of \$30,830,000 and \$27,099,000 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. These amounts include depreciation expense included in discontinued operations for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, totaling \$339,000 and \$414,000, respectively. At December 31, 2013, the estimated cost to complete construction in progress was approximately \$3,790,000.

### 6. LINES OF CREDIT

The Corporation has lines of credit of \$500,000, \$25,000,000, and \$50,000,000, which expire in March 2015, April 2015, and June 2014, respectively. The \$500,000 line was increased to \$750,000 when renewed in March 2014. The \$500,000 line is collateralized by all business assets of Shelby ASC; all other lines are unsecured.

As of December 31, 2013 and 2012, the Corporation had \$15,888,000 and \$53,402,000, respectively, outstanding under its available lines of credit. As of December 31, 2013, \$10,000,000 of the amount outstanding was subject to interest at LIBOR plus a margin (2.82%), \$5,783,000 was subject to interest at LIBOR plus 2.40% (2.57%), and \$105,000 was subject to interest at LIBOR plus 2.75% (2.92%). As of December 31, 2012, \$42,497,000 of the amount outstanding was subject to interest at LIBOR plus 2.40% (2.61%), and \$10,905,000 was subject to interest at LIBOR plus a margin (2.86%).

# 7. LONG-TERM DEBT - CONTINUED

In November 2005, the Special Care Facilities Financing Authority of the City of Birmingham-Baptist Medical Centers issued tax-exempt Revenue Bonds in the principal amount of \$249,260,000 for the benefit of the Corporation. The Corporation agreed to make payments equal to debt service on the Series 2005-A Bonds and, as evidence of its promise to pay, the Corporation issued its note under its Master Trust Indenture dated November 1, 2005, between the Corporation and BPHI (together, the Obligated Group) and the Bank of New York Trust Company, N.A., as master trustee. Proceeds of the Series 2005-A Bonds were used to refund certain outstanding bonds, pay costs of issuance, fund a reserve fund for the Series 2005-A Bonds, and provide additional funds for capital improvements.

On June 25, 2009, the Corporation executed a bond tender transaction, issuing \$11,373,000 in 2009-A and 2009-B Tax-Exempt Bonds to purchase \$14,580,000 of the 2005-A Bonds at a discounted rate and issued \$25,000,000 of 2009-B Bonds for a refunding of 2007-A outstanding bonds. The bonds were secured under the Corporation's Master Trust Indenture dated November 1, 2005. These bonds were refunded on December 20, 2012.

On May 18, 2012, the Special Care Facilities Financing Authority of the City of Birmingham-Baptist Medical Centers issued tax-exempt Revenue Bonds in the principal amount of \$26,965,000 for the benefit of the Corporation. The Corporation entered into a \$26,965,000 tax-exempt financing agreement (Series 2012-A Bond) with Siemens Public, Inc. The bond is secured under the Corporation's Master Trust Indenture dated November 1, 2005. Interest on the 2012-A Bond is fixed with interest payments due May 15 and November 15 of each year and amortized principal payments due November 15 of each year, beginning November 15, 2012, through the maturity date of November 15, 2024. Proceeds of the Series 2012-A Bond, along with the 2001-A Reserve Fund of \$3,950,000 were used to refund the Corporation's Series 2001-A Revenue Bonds, which were outstanding in the aggregate principal amount of \$30,465,000. These refunded bonds were retired on June 18, 2012. On December 4, 2013, Capital One Public Funding, LLC purchased the Series 2012-A Bonds and assumed all rights and obligations of Siemens as bondholder.

On December 20, 2012, the Special Care Facilities Financing Authority of the City of Birmingham-Baptist Medical Centers issued tax-exempt Revenue Bonds in the principal amount of \$36,408,000 for the benefit of the Corporation. The Corporation entered into a \$36,408,000 tax-exempt financing agreement (Series 2012-B Bond) with Regions Capital Advantage, Inc. The bond is secured under the Corporation's Master Trust Indenture dated November 1, 2005. Proceeds of the 2012-B Bond were used to refund the Corporation's 2009-A and 2009-B Tax-Exempt Bonds discussed above. Interest on the 2012-B Bond is variable and payable monthly beginning January 1, 2013, with principal due January 1, 2016.

# 7. LONG-TERM DEBT - CONTINUED

On October 31, 2013, the Corporation entered into a \$15,000,000 credit agreement (2013 Term Loan) with Regions Bank. The 2013 Term Loan was issued for working capital and/or capital expenditures of the Corporation arising in the ordinary course of business. The term loan is secured under the Corporation's Master Trust Indenture dated November 1, 2005. Interest on the 2013 Term Loan is fixed and payable semi-annually commencing May 15, 2014, with principal due semi-annually commencing November 15, 2015. A final principal payment of \$12,302,230 is due at maturity, October 31, 2020.

On December 6, 2013, the Special Care Facilities Financing Authority of the City of Birmingham-Baptist Medical Centers issued a tax-exempt Revenue Bond in the principal amount of \$30,000,000 for the benefit of the Corporation. The Corporation entered into a \$30,000,000 tax-exempt financing agreement (Series 2013-A Bond) with Siemens Public, Inc. The bond is secured under the Corporation's Master Trust Indenture dated November 1, 2005. Proceeds of the 2013-A Bond were used to retire certain obligations of the Corporation incurred pursuant to Master Loans between the Corporation and People's Capital and Leasing Corp. and to reimburse the Corporation for capital expenditures previously made with respect to certain of the Corporation's facilities. Interest on the 2013-A Bond is fixed and payable semi-annually beginning May 15, 2014, with principal due annually commencing November 15, 2015. A final principal payment of \$14,780,000 is due at maturity, November 15, 2025.

The Obligated Group granted to the master trustee, for the benefit of the holders of outstanding bond series 2005-A, 2012-A, 2012-B, 2013-A, and the Regions 2013 Term Loan, a security interest in pledged revenues of the Obligated Group and a mortgage on the Princeton and Walker hospitals.

Under the Master Trust Indenture, the Corporation has covenanted that it will not create or grant a lien or mortgage on any of its property now owned or subsequently acquired (except for certain permitted encumbrances) or pledge any of its revenues as collateral for any of its indebtedness subsequently incurred, unless all notes issued pursuant to the Master Trust Indenture are collateralized equally and ratably with such indebtedness.

Additionally, the Corporation has agreed to maintain a debt service coverage ratio of not less than 1 to 1. However, if the debt service coverage ratio is less than 1.1 to 1, the Corporation has agreed to retain an independent consultant to make recommendations to increase such debt service coverage ratio. The Corporation's debt service coverage ratio under the Master Trust Indenture for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, was 1.87 to 1 and 1.68 to 1, respectively.

# 7. LONG-TERM DEBT - CONTINUED

On October 14, 2011, under the terms and conditions of the New Markets Tax Credit Program, the Corporation and BPHI entered into financing agreements for a net borrowing of \$3,695,000 with Wells Fargo — Baptist Health System Investment Fund, LLC (WF), Wells Fargo Community Development Enterprise Round 8 Subsidiary 3, LLC, and Empowerment Reinvestment Fund XVII, LLC. Proceeds of the borrowing were used for capital improvements to the Princeton campus. Current payments on all notes are interest only, with principal payments beginning January 1, 2019, through the maturity date of October 1, 2041. Subsequent to a seven-year compliance period and pursuant to an Investment Fund Put and Call Agreement between the Corporation and Wells Fargo Community Investment Holdings, LLC, either party may exercise the right and option to sell/purchase the membership interest in WF. If this option is exercised by either party, the Corporation then would have the right to cause the indebtedness under the New Market Tax Credit Program to be cancelled.

On February 29, 2012, the Corporation borrowed \$12,600,000 from People's Capital and Leasing Corp. These funds were used to finance a portion of the inpatient electronic health record system implementation. On February 28, 2013, the Corporation borrowed an additional \$17,500,000. These loans were repaid in December 2013.

On October 31, 2011, the Corporation entered into a loan agreement with Sunbelt BHS-Princeton, LP. The loan agreement provided for advances of a construction loan in the principal amount of up to \$25,000,000. The loan is a general obligation of the Corporation advanced in \$500,000 increments as funds are received by Sunbelt BHS-Princeton, LP. The Corporation received a \$15,000,000 loan on October 22, 2013, a \$6,500,000 loan on November 20, 2013, and a \$2,500,000 loan on December 30, 2013. Interest is fixed and payable quarterly with the principal of each loan due at maturity, five years from the date of the loans, October 22, 2018, November 20, 2018, and December 30, 2018.

The fair value of the Corporation's fixed-rate debt is based on quoted dealer prices, or if quoted prices are not available, discounted cash flows based on the borrowing rates currently available to the Corporation for bank loans with similar terms and maturities. The fair value of the Corporation's variable rate debt is the carrying value due to the variable rates associated with the borrowings. The estimated fair value of the Corporation's total long-term debt was approximately \$324,939,000 and \$294,984,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. This fair value was determined using a combination of Level 1 inputs in the form of quoted dealer prices (\$192,444,000), Level 2 inputs in the form of variable borrowing rates (\$36,424,000), and Level 3 inputs based on discounted cash flows using current borrowing rates (\$96,071,000).

### 8. RETIREMENT PLANS AND OTHER POSTRETIREMENT BENEFITS

The Corporation froze its noncontributory defined benefit pension plans effective December 31, 2005. The plan benefits are based on the employees' years of service and compensation through the plan freeze date.

The accumulated net actuarial loss or additional minimum liability is \$97,396,000 and \$138,611,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively; changes in these amounts are recognized as changes in unrestricted net assets and resulted in an increase in unrestricted net assets of \$41,215,000 for the year ended December 31, 2013, and a decrease of \$26,619,000 for the year ended December 31, 2012.

The rate of increase in compensation levels is no longer applicable due to the pension plan freeze effective December 31, 2005.

The investment policy of the frozen defined benefit plan is to preserve principal while providing reasonable returns. The assets of the funds are invested in accordance with all relevant legislation in a manner consistent with applicable fiduciary standards. The asset allocation target for investments in the pension plan portfolio, excluding the group annuity contract, is 65% equity/multistrategy funds, 25% fixed income mutual funds, and 10% real estate fund.

During 2013, the Corporation offered a lump-sum payout to certain former employees who participated in the defined benefit pension plan. There were 379 payout elections, totaling approximately \$8,786,000 paid in December 2013. As a result, the pension plan experienced a gain of \$4,606,000. The transaction amount did not trigger pension settlement accounting.

In addition to providing pension benefits for retirees, the Corporation provides retirement benefits for certain of its current and retired employed physicians. Liabilities recognized in the consolidated financial statements related to these benefits totaled \$7,368,000 and \$7,845,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The Corporation typically purchases insurance policies to fund these liabilities. The cash surrender value of the policies is included in other assets in the consolidated balance sheets and totaled \$7,408,000 and \$8,635,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

# 9. INCOME TAXES

The Corporation has adopted guidance relating to uncertainty in income taxes which requires entities to assess their uncertain tax positions for the likelihood that they would be overturned upon Internal Revenue Service (IRS) examination or upon examination by state taxing authorities. In accordance with this guidance, the Corporation has determined that it does not have any positions at December 31, 2013 and 2012, that it would be unable to substantiate.

The Corporation has filed its tax returns for all years through December 31, 2012. The tax returns for 2010 and subsequent periods are subject to audit by taxing authorities.

The Corporation's for-profit affiliate, BHSA, and its subsidiaries are subject to federal and state income taxes. There was no current provision for income taxes for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012.

At December 31, 2013, BHSA had federal net operating loss carryforwards of approximately \$51,733,000 expiring in years 2014 to 2033. Since recoverability of the net operating loss carryforwards is unlikely, the Corporation has provided a 100% valuation allowance for the estimated deferred tax assets of approximately \$19,644,000 at December 31, 2013.

# 10. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Corporation paid \$1,211,000 and \$1,169,000 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, for certain support services of BHF, including salaries and benefits of the staff dedicated to BHF. The payments of these support services are considered a donation of services and are not required to be reimbursed to the Corporation.

In addition, the Corporation received donations from BHF of approximately \$3,293,000 and \$4,383,000 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. These donations were primarily used for capital equipment acquisitions and charity care reimbursement.

### 11. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Citizens is subject to an agreement with the previous owner, which restricts the Corporation's ability to unilaterally sell the facility. Under this agreement, the Corporation may be required to commit additional funding prior to the transfer of the facility if the Corporation ceases to operate the facility as a not-for-profit hospital.

The Corporation purchases insurance for exposures related to its general, professional, and workers' compensation liabilities from its wholly owned captive insurance company. It provides professional liability coverage for claims up to \$5 million, general liability coverage for claims up to \$1 million. The Corporation purchases umbrella liability insurance for any claims exceeding these amounts.

A number of lawsuits have been filed naming the Corporation as a defendant. The lawsuits allege damages of various amounts related to the general and professional liability of the Corporation. While the amount of the ultimate losses cannot be determined, in the opinion of management, the losses will not differ materially from the liabilities recorded in the consolidated financial statements for such losses.

The Corporation is self-insured for its employee health and dental insurance claims. The Corporation uses a third-party administrator to process claims under the plan. Reserve estimates are included in accrued expenses and include the estimate for claims incurred but not reported under this program.

The Tax Relief and Health Care Act of 2006 made the RAC program permanent and mandated its nationwide expansion by 2010. This program was established by CMS to conduct postpayment reviews to detect and correct improper payments in the fee-for-service Medicare program. CMS has awarded contracts to four RACs that have implemented the permanent RAC program on a nationwide basis. Each RAC has discretion over the types of reviews and record requests it conducts as long as it follows the CMS defined statement of work. The RAC conducting audits in the state of Alabama is Connolly Healthcare. The Corporation has evaluated the potential impact of reviews under the RAC program and believes the estimated amounts accrued in the accompanying consolidated financial statements are sufficient based on current information available.

# 11. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES - CONTINUED

In April 2011, the Corporation's board approved a plan to implement an inpatient electronic health record system. As part of the project, the Corporation entered into an enterprise license and support agreement payable as follows:

At December 31, 2013, the Corporation, through its affiliate, WBA, was contingently liable as guarantor of 30% of the bank loan owed by SSG Real Estate totaling \$1,192,000. This guarantee is in effect as long as there is a balance owed to the lender.

During 2012, the Corporation registered with the Medicare/Medicaid Electronic Health Records (EHR) Incentive Program, federally funded programs which provide financial incentives to health care facilities meeting new federally mandated EHR requirements. The Corporation received approximately \$9,169,000 and \$2,895,000 from the Medicare/Medicaid EHR Incentive Programs in 2013 and 2012, respectively. These amounts are included in other operating revenues in the 2013 and 2012 consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets. Future incentive awards are contingent on the Corporation being able to successfully meet the additional EHR requirements for subsequent years.

In recent years, there has been increasing pressure on Congress and some state legislatures to control and reduce the cost of health care at the national and state levels. In 2010, legislation was enacted, which included cost controls on hospitals, insurance market reforms, delivery system reforms, and various individuals and business mandates, among other provisions. The costs of certain provisions will be funded in part by reductions in payments by government programs, including Medicare and Medicaid. There can be no assurance that these changes will not adversely affect the Corporation. Health care reform will likely impact the Corporation significantly in 2014 and future years.

# 12. LEASES

The Corporation is obligated, as lessee, under certain noncancelable operating leases, primarily for buildings and equipment. Future minimum lease payments under noncancelable operating leases at December 31, 2013, are as follows:
