SCHEDULE OF NONCASH INVESTING AND FINANCING ACTIVITIES:

The Medical Center purchased \$7,118,629 and \$4,885,006 of land, building, and equipment at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, which was included in accounts payable.

Note 1 – Description of Operations

Kadlec Regional Medical Center (the Medical Center) is a not-for-profit corporation located in Richland, Washington. Kadlec Health System (KHS), a Washington not-for-profit corporation, is the sole corporate member of the Medical Center. Note 14 describes transactions between the Medical Center, KHS, and its affiliates. The Medical Center is a licensed 270-bed acute-care facility providing both inpatient and outpatient medical services for citizens of Richland, Kennewick, and Pasco, Washington as well as surrounding communities and Northeast Oregon.

The Medical Center has an agreement with Quorum Health Resources, LLC (QHR). Under the terms of the agreement, QHR provides management services through an employment arrangement with the Chief Executive Officer, and special consulting services which enhance the strategic, operational, and financial direction of the Medical Center. The agreement is effective through May 31, 2016. Both parties have the right to terminate the agreement.

The Kadlec Health System physician practice limited liability companies of Kadlec Clinic LLC, Kadlec Medical Associates LLC, Kadlec Neuroscience Center LLC, and Tri-Cities Nephrology converted from community based reimbursement to provider based reimbursement effective January 1, 2013. Kadlec Health System modified its corporate structure and its operations for the four above named physician practice limited liability companies to become part of Kadlec Regional Medical Center. The operations of the limited liability companies were merged into Kadlec Regional Medical Center and have been reflected in the 2013 balances. This transaction has been accounted for as a transaction between entities under common control in accordance with authoritative guidance issued by the Financial Accounting Standards Board. Accordingly, the net assets were recognized in the financial statements at their carrying amounts in the accounts of Kadlec Regional Medical Center at the transfer date and the results of operations of Kadlec Regional Medical Center are included as though the transaction had occurred at the beginning of the period. Therefore, the 2012 balances were restated to include the operations of the limited liability companies.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial statement estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, if any, at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and cash equivalents – For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Medical Center considers all highly liquid investments with initial maturity dates of three months or less as cash and cash equivalents, except for amounts limited as to use by Board designation or trust agreements.

Temporarily restricted net assets – Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Medical Center has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose.

Donor-restricted gifts – Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Medical Center are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Excess of revenues over expenses – The statement of operations includes excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, the effective portion of the gain or loss on derivative instruments designated and qualifying as cash flow hedging instruments, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets).

Net patient service revenue – Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Charity care – The Medical Center provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its financial assistance policy, without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue.

Derivative instruments – In an effort to stabilize financing rates, the Medical Center is participating in an interest rate swap. The interest rate swap, which qualifies as a cash flow hedge, expires November 14, 2036 and effectively fixes the interest rate paid on the Series 2006B Bonds at 4.116%. The outstanding balance on the Series 2006B Bonds as of December 31, 2013 is \$46,350,000 and the variable rate was .11% at December 31, 2013, which was 70% of LIBOR. The derivative financial instrument is reported at fair market value on the balance sheet in other long-term liabilities. Changes in the fair market value of the derivative are recorded each period on the statement of operations below the excess of revenues over expenses line. During the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, the Medical Center incurred a gain on the interest rate swap of \$6,508,217 and \$605,379, respectively.

During the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, the derivative resulted in an increase in interest expense of \$1,873,139\$ and \$1,890,975\$, respectively.

Estimated malpractice costs – The provision for estimated medical malpractice costs includes estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported.

Deferred financing costs – Costs of bond financing are capitalized and amortized using the effective interest method over the life of the bonds. Deferred financing cost amortization expense was \$263,843 and \$232,438 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Patient accounts receivable – Patient accounts receivable arising from revenue for services to patients are reduced by an allowance for uncollectible accounts and contractual allowances based on experience, third-party contractual reimbursement arrangements, and any unusual circumstances which may affect the ability of patients to meet their obligations. Accounts deemed uncollectible are charged against this allowance.

Supplies inventory – Supplies inventory, comprised primarily of medical supplies, surgical supplies, and pharmaceuticals, is stated at the lower of replacement cost or market.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Land, buildings, and equipment – Land, buildings, and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Donated property is stated at fair market value at the time of donation. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable assets and is computed on the straight-line method. Depreciation expense from operating and non-operating activities totaled \$18,940,216 and \$17,773,397 for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The costs of normal maintenance, repairs, and minor replacements are charged to expense when incurred.

Investments – Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses.

Assets limited as to use – Assets limited as to use include assets set aside by the Board of Directors for use in future expansion over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Assets limited as to use also include assets held by a trustee under an indenture agreement and assets held for professional liabilities. These investments are stated at fair market value as determined by reference to quoted market prices. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Medical Center have been reclassified in the balance sheet at December 31, 2013 and 2012.

Investments in joint ventures – The Medical Center has investments in joint ventures that provide health care services. The Medical Center accounts for these investments using the equity method under which the Medical Center's share of net income is reported in non-operating income.

Federal income tax – The Medical Center is a not-for-profit corporation and has been recognized as tax exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Medical Center is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code except to the extent of unrelated business taxable income as defined under IRC Sections 511 through 515. The Medical Center adopted the income tax standard relating to accounting for uncertain tax positions. The accounting standard prescribes a recognition threshold and measurement process for uncertain tax positions. As of December 31, 2013 and 2012, the Medical Center had no uncertain tax positions requiring accrual. The Medical Center files a U.S. federal income tax return and is no longer subject to U.S. federal tax examinations by tax authorities for years before 2010.

Functional expenses – The Medical Center provides general healthcare services to residents within its geographic location. Expenses related to providing these services are as follows:

Donated services – A substantial number of volunteers donate significant amounts of their time for the Medical Center's program activities. These donated hours are a necessary part of the Medical Center's activities. No dollar amounts have been reflected in the accompanying statements for these services since the services do not require specialized skills and would typically not be purchased if not provided by donation.

Subsequent events – Subsequent events are events or transactions that occur after the balance sheet date but before financial statements are issued. The Medical Center recognizes in the financial statements the effects of all subsequent events that provide additional evidence about conditions that existed at the date of the balance sheet, including the estimates inherent in the process of preparing the financial statements. The Medical Center's financial statements do not recognize subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that did not exist at the date of the balance sheet but arose after the balance sheet date and before financial statements are issued.

The Medical Center has evaluated subsequent events through March 31, 2014, which is the date the financial statements are to be issued, and concluded that there were no events or transactions that need to be disclosed.

Note 3 - Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

- Medicare Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Certain outpatient services to Medicare beneficiaries are reimbursed on a prospective payment system. The Medical Center's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through 2007. The Medical Center's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization. Estimated net revenue under the Medicare program totaled approximately \$116,581,466 and \$106,722,938 for 2013 and 2012, respectively.
- **Medicaid** Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries and Healthy Options Medicaid participants are paid primarily on an APDRG based system similar to Medicare. Estimated net revenue under the Medicaid program totaled approximately \$40,589,477 and \$46,478,700 for 2013 and 2012, respectively.
- Other third-party payors Inpatient services rendered to certain third-party payors are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates per admission under a Preferred Hospital Agreement. The prospectively determined rates are not subject to retroactive adjustment. Generally, outpatient services are paid on an agreed-upon percentage of the Medical Center's established rates. However, certain outpatient services are paid on an agreed-upon fee schedule.

The Medical Center has also entered into payment agreements with other commercial insurance carriers and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

The Medical Center recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Medical Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Medical Center's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Medical Center records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. As a result of information systems conversion during 2012, the Medical Center reclassified certain contractual expenses related to Medicaid and self-pay, which increased the provision for uncollectible accounts. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for uncollectible accounts), recognized in the period from these major payor sources, is as follows.

Note 4 - Charity Care

The Medical Center maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. These records include the amount of charges forgone for services and supplies furnished under its charity care policy and the estimated cost of those services and supplies. Management estimates charity care costs by calculating a ratio of gross charges, and then multiplying that ratio by the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients. The following information measures the level of charity care provided.

Note 5 - Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Medical Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for uncollectible accounts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have thirdparty coverage, the Medical Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for uncollectible accounts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Medical Center records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The Medical Center's allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients decreased from 70% of self-pay accounts receivable at December 31, 2012, to 66% of self-pay accounts receivable at December 31, 2013. In addition, self-pay write-offs decreased \$348,429 from \$1,289,718 for fiscal year 2012 to \$941,289 for fiscal year 2013. These changes were the result of trends experienced in the collection of amounts from self-pay patients in fiscal year 2013. The Medical Center has not changed its charity care policy during fiscal years 2013 or 2012. During 2012, the Medical Center added a policy for discounts for uninsured patients. The Medical Center does not maintain a material allowance for doubtful accounts from third-party payors, nor did it have significant write-offs from third-party payors.

Tri-City Regional Surgery Center, LLC (the Surgery Center) leased the Surgery Center building from the Medical Center. The terms of the lease required monthly payments of \$20,879 through April 2028. During 2012, the Medical Center sold their ownership interest in the Surgery Center.

The Medical Center leases property under various other real estate agreements at various rates. Lease revenue of \$588,686 and \$602,973 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, was included in non-operating income in the statement of operations and net assets.

Note 8 - Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Medical Center in estimating the fair value of its financial instruments.

- a) Cash and cash equivalents The Medical Center maintains its cash and cash equivalent accounts at financial institutions which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The carrying amount reported in the balance sheet for cash and cash equivalents approximates fair value.
- b) **Assets limited as to use** The carrying amount reported in the balance sheet approximates fair value as determined by reference to quoted market prices at December 31, 2013 and 2012.
- c) Accounts payable and other accrued liabilities The carrying amount reported in the balance sheet for accounts payable and other accrued liabilities approximates its fair value.
- d) **Estimated third-party payor settlements** The carrying amounts reported in the balance sheet for estimated third-party payor settlements approximates its fair value.

e) Long-term debt – Fair value of the Medical Center's revenue bonds are based on current traded value. The fair value of the Medical Center's remaining long-term debt is estimated using a discounted cash flow analysis on the Medical Center's current incremental borrowing rates for a similar borrowing arrangement. Long-term debt is considered a Level 2 within the fair value hierarchy as described in Note 9 below.

Note 9 - Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

The Medical Center adopted fair value accounting which establishes a framework for measuring fair value and expands disclosures about fair value measurements.

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value accounting also establishes a fair value hierarchy which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- **Level 1** Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in active markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities.
- **Level 3** Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying balance sheet, as well as the general classification of such instruments pursuant to the valuation hierarchy.

Trading and Available-for-Sale Securities

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, securities are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of securities with identical characteristics, or discounted cash flows and are classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, securities would be classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy.

Interest Rate Swap Agreement

The fair value is estimated by a third party using inputs that are observable or that can be corroborated by observable market data and, therefore, this security is classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy.

Regulation and litigation – The Medical Center is involved in litigation and regulatory investigations arising in the course of business and of a nature that is routine to the industry. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the Medical Center's future financial position or results from operations.

The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations from federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government healthcare program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Government activity continues with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by healthcare providers. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government healthcare programs, together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed. Management believes that the Medical Center is in compliance with the fraud and abuse regulations as well as other applicable government laws and regulations. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time.

Note 12 - Line of Credit

The Medical Center has a revolving line of credit totaling \$5,000,000 from KeyBank. This note was entered into on June 11, 2013, expires on May 14, 2014, is unsecured as defined by the loan agreement, and bears interest at the bank's prime rate (3.25% at December 31, 2013).

There was a balance of \$5,000,000 owed at December 31, 2013 and 2012. Interest of \$3,160 and \$84,047 was paid on the loan during the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The Series 2006A, Series 2006B, Series 2010, and Series 2012 Revenue Bonds were issued through the Washington Health Care Facilities Authority (the Authority). As security for the payment of the bonds, the Medical Center has granted the Authority a security interest in gross revenues and liens against certain Medical Center facilities, the monies in trust funds, and a mortgage against the main building.

The related Bond Loan and Security Agreements and Trust Indentures contain restrictive covenants which require, among other matters, that the Medical Center maintain minimum debt service coverage, capitalization ratio, and liquidity ratios. In management's opinion, the Medical Center is in compliance with all of its restrictive covenants.

In July 2008, the Medical Center's Series 2006B Bonds were reoffered. In conjunction with the reoffering, the related auction rate securities were converted to variable rate demand bonds and the auction rate mode of interest was converted to a variable weekly rate.

Note 13 - Long-Term Debt (continued)

In connection with the issuance of the Series 2006B Bonds, the Medical Center entered into an interest rate swap agreement (the Swap) with a Swap Counterparty, which qualifies as a cash flow hedge and is a derivative financial instrument. The Swap was amended and restated on July 7, 2008 in conjunction with the reoffering of the Series 2006B Bonds. The purpose of the Swap is to place the aggregate net obligation of the Medical Center on an approximate fixed-rate basis and provide protection against rising interest rates. Payments made by the Medical Center under the Swap will be made on the basis of a notional principal amount equal to the then outstanding principal amount of the Series 2006B Bonds and the difference between an agreed-upon fixed rate of 4.14% from January 1, 2008 to July 7, 2008 and 4.116% from July 7, 2008 through December 31, 2008, and a variable rate equal to 70% of LIBOR (LIBOR was .161% at December 31, 2013), which may, depending on market conditions, be different than the interest rate actually owed on the Series 2006B Bonds. The Swap will expire in 2036, but is subject to termination by the Medical Center or the Swap Counterparty. If early termination occurs, the Medical Center may be required to pay the Swap Counterparty for its loss of the value of the Swap.

Under the terms of the Series 2006A, 2006B, 2010, and 2012 Revenue Bond indentures, the Medical Center is required to maintain certain funds with a trustee. At December 31, 2013, the balances in these trust funds, including interest receivable, were as follows:

Note 14 - Related Parties

Kadlec Foundation (the Foundation) supports KHS and its affiliates through representation of the KHS mission and financial needs to the public and through solicitation of funds to benefit KHS. KHS has agreed to provide funds for the operations of the Foundation and to provide space without charge. The Medical Center has guaranteed a note payable that the Foundation has outstanding to KeyBank for \$700,000 as of December 31, 2013.

Kadlec Neurological Resource Center (KNRC) is a not-for-profit subsidiary of KHS. The Medical Center provided \$284,026 and \$283,148 of financial support in 2013 and 2012, respectively. In May 2005, the Medical Center increased its contributions by agreeing to cover the salaries, benefits, and building lease expense of KNRC. These contributed amounts are for annual funding as a part of its service to the community.

The Medical Center has investments in the following related entities:

Tri-Cities Cancer Center (the Cancer Center) – The Cancer Center is a joint venture with the Medical Center, Kennewick Public Hospital District #1 dba Trios Health, and Lourdes Medical Center as one-third owners each. The Cancer Center was formed to establish, maintain, and operate a coordinated regional system of cancer prevention and care.

Tri-City Regional Surgery Center, LLC (the Surgery Center) – The Surgery Center provides outpatient and ambulatory services. The Medical Center constructed a building on Medical Center property, which it leased to the Surgery Center as the sole occupant. The Medical Center's interest in the Surgery Center was 30% at December 31, 2011. The Medical Center's ownership interest in the Surgery Center was sold in September 2012.

Tri-Cities Laboratory, LLC (TCL) – TCL is a joint venture with the Medical Center, Kennewick Public Hospital District #1 dba Trios Health, Lourdes Medical Center, and Pathology Associates Medical Laboratories as one-fourth owners each. TCL provides outreach laboratory medical testing services to hospitals, clinics, and physicians primarily in Franklin and Benton Counties in Washington, and Umatilla and Morrow Counties in Oregon.

Richland MOB, LLC (Richland MOB) – In 2001, the Medical Center entered into an agreement with other parties to form Richland MOB, LLC, a medical office building providing the Medical Center additional space to perform outpatient imaging services.

The Medical Center occupies 38.8% of the space in the building and owns a corresponding 38.8% interest in Richland MOB. The LLC holds a loan which is collateralized by a mortgage on the building.

Tri-Cities Home Health (TCHH) – TCHH is a joint venture with the Medical Center and Amedisys, each 50% owners. TCHH was formed to provide home health services to the Tri-Cities community.

Note 15 - Retirement Plan

The Medical Center has a 403(b) group annuity retirement plan with two insurance companies for the benefit of certain employees. There are no unfunded costs or liabilities relating to the plan. The total retirement plan expense to the Medical Center was approximately \$3,731,000 and \$4,520,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Note 16 - General and Professional Liability Insurance Coverage and Estimated Costs

On October 1, 2003, Kadlec Regional Medical Center initiated a program to self-insure its hospital general and professional liability risks. A liability tail policy was purchased that covered the years 1985 through October 1, 2002. The Medical Center self-insures for liability claims up to \$1,000,000 per incident. An excess policy with coverage on a claims-made basis is maintained for claims over the self-insured limits of \$1,000,000 per claim and aggregate of \$3,000,000. This insurance provides umbrella liability coverage through Admiral Insurance Company for \$20,000,000 per claim and \$20,000,000 aggregate. The Medical Center maintains a trust account based on a yearly actuarial estimate of the anticipated losses and related expenses for current claims and for incurred but not reported claims. In calculating the 2013 estimated general and professional liability, the Medical Center's actuaries used a 3% discount rate for determining the present value of future claims.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Kadlec Regional Medical Center, which comprise the balance sheet as of December 31, 2013, and the related statement of operations and net assets, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 31, 2014.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Kadlec Regional Medical Center's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Kadlec Regional Medical Center's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Kadlec Regional Medical Center's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Kadlec Regional Medical Center's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Report on Compliance for the Major Federal Program

We have audited Kadlec Regional Medical Center's compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the *OMB Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement* that could have a direct and material effect on the Kadlec Regional Medical Center's major federal program for the year ended December 31, 2013. Kadlec Regional Medical Center's major federal program is identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs.

Management's Responsibility

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to its federal programs.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance for Kadlec Regional Medical Center's major federal program based on our audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about Kadlec Regional Medical Center's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion on compliance for the major federal program. However, our audit does not provide a legal determination of Kadlec Regional Medical Center's compliance.

Opinion on the Major Federal Program

In our opinion, Kadlec Regional Medical Center complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on its major federal program for the year ended December 31, 2013.

Report on Internal Control Over Compliance

Management of Kadlec Regional Medical Center is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above. In planning and performing our audit of compliance, we considered Kadlec Regional Medical Center's internal control over compliance with the types of requirements that could have a direct and material effect on the major federal program to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance for the major federal program and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Kadlec Regional Medical Center's internal control over compliance.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.



Note 1 - Basis of Presentation
