

#### 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### **Organization**

Cottage Health System (the System) was organized in 1996 as a not-for-profit California corporation to provide health care services through three acute care hospitals (collectively, the Hospitals) and related organizations in Santa Barbara, California The System is affiliated with the following not-for-profit entities, each of which shares a common Board of Directors (Board)

- Santa Barbara Cottage Hospital (Santa Barbara Cottage) an accredited 450-bed acute care facility offering inpatient and outpatient services
- Santa Ynez Valley Cottage Hospital (Santa Ynez Cottage) an accredited 10-bed acute care facility offering inpatient and outpatient services
- Goleta Valley Cottage Hospital (Goleta Valley Cottage) an accredited 122-bed acute care facility offering inpatient and outpatient services
- Goleta Valley Professional Buildings, Inc (the Professional Building) a corporation for medical office buildings which leases office space to medical providers and others
- Santa Barbara Cottage Hospital Foundation (the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation) a charitable foundation which solicits funds for the benefit of Santa Barbara Cottage

The System is the sole corporate member of the above entities except for the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation (see Note 5) The System is also affiliated with the following not-for-profit entities, which are governed by separate Boards of Directors

- Santa Ynez Valley Cottage Hospital Foundation (Santa Ynez Cottage Foundation) a charitable foundation which solicits funds for the benefit of Santa Ynez Cottage
- Goleta Valley Cottage Hospital Foundation (Goleta Valley Cottage Foundation) a charitable foundation which solicits funds for the benefit of Goleta Valley Cottage
- Rehabilitation Hospital Foundation (Rehabilitation Foundation) a charitable foundation which solicits funds for the benefit of rehabilitation programs performed at Santa Barbara Cottage

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

#### 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Santa Barbara Cottage is the sole corporate member of Pacific Diagnostic Laboratories, LLC (Pacific Diagnostic), a reference laboratory

#### **Basis of Presentation**

The accompanying financial statements consolidate all not-for-profit organizations controlled by the System through sole corporate membership status, and all for-profit organizations for which the System holds a controlling financial interest, including the accounts of Santa Barbara Cottage, Goleta Valley Cottage, Santa Ynez Cottage, the Professional Building, and Pacific Diagnostic Laboratories All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated

#### Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation

The System accounts for the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation under the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standard Codification (ASC) 958, Not-for-Profit Entities FASB ASC 958 addresses situations in which the recipient organization and the specified beneficiary meet the criteria defining them as financially interrelated organizations. If the organizations are financially interrelated, the recipient organization reports an asset and contribution revenue when it receives assets from the donor, and the specified beneficiary reports its interest in the net assets of the recipient organization. The System periodically adjusts its interest for its share of the change in net assets of the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation.

Santa Barbara Cottage and the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation's Board of Directors have historically been made up of the same individuals. However, neither the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation's bylaws nor its articles of incorporation give Santa Barbara Cottage, its Board of Directors, or any other party the power to appoint or select members of the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation's Board of Directors. As a result, Santa Barbara Cottage does not control Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation through the power to select Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation's directors. Thus, Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation is not consolidated in these financial statements. Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation solicits funds for the sole benefit of Santa Barbara Cottage. As such, the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation and Santa Barbara Cottage are financially interrelated organizations as defined under FASB ASC 958. The interest in the net assets of the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation is included in the accompanying

consolidated balance sheets The System records Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation's change in unrestricted net assets above the performance indicator because Santa Barbara Cottage has access to Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation's assets at will because of their common board of directors

The Rehabilitation Foundation solicits funds for the sole benefit of rehabilitation services performed at Santa Barbara Cottage As such, the Rehabilitation Foundation and Santa Barbara Cottage are financially interrelated organizations as defined by FASB ASC 958 The interest in the net assets of the Rehabilitation Foundation is included in the consolidated balance sheets

#### Goleta Valley Cottage Foundation

Goleta Valley Cottage and Goleta Valley Cottage Foundation are financially interrelated organizations as defined by FASB ASC 958 due to Goleta Valley Cottage's ability to influence the operating and financial decisions of Goleta Valley Cottage Foundation and Goleta Valley Cottage's ongoing economic interest in the net assets of the Goleta Valley Cottage Foundation The interest in the net assets of the Goleta Valley Cottage Foundation is included in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets

#### Santa Ynez Cottage Foundation

Santa Ynez Cottage and Santa Ynez Cottage Foundation are financially interrelated organizations as defined by FASB ASC 958 due to Santa Ynez Valley Cottage's ability to influence the operating and financial decisions of Santa Ynez Cottage Foundation and Santa Ynez Cottage's ongoing economic interest in the net assets of the Santa Ynez Cottage Foundation The interest in the net assets of the Santa Ynez Cottage Foundation is included in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with US generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period Actual results could differ from these estimates

#### **Community Benefit and Charity Care (Unaudited)**

In furtherance of their charitable purpose, the Hospitals provide a wide variety of benefits to the community A large number of prevention and wellness programs are provided by the Hospitals, including low cost immunizations, wellness fairs, health screenings, health education classes, and the donation of space for use by community groups Additionally, the Hospitals and the Foundations provide multiple health care-related grants to local nonprofit organizations and support educational programs to increase the supply of health care professionals

A patient is classified as a charity patient by reference to certain established policies of the Hospitals Essentially, these policies define charity services as those services for which no payment is anticipated and includes patients who are unable to pay deductible and coinsurance amounts as determined by the insurance plan These charges are not included in accounts receivable or net patient service revenue The costs and expenses incurred in providing charity care are included in the Hospitals' operating expenses. It is the Hospitals' policy to treat emergency patients regardless of their ability to pay Charity care, uncompensated care to Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries, and community benefits provided for the years ended December 31 were as follows

#### **Net Patient Service Revenue**

The Hospitals have agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospitals at amounts different from their established rates Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments Net patient service revenue is reported on the accrual basis in the period in which

services are provided, net of third-party contractual allowances for Medicare, Medicaid, managed care, and other programs and insurers Contractual allowances include differences between established billing rates and amounts estimated by management as reimbursable under various cost reimbursement formulas and contracts in effect In 2013, the Hospitals recorded a change in estimate of \$8,500,000 in 2012 accounts receivable, benefiting net patient service revenue and excess of revenues over expenses in 2013

The administrative procedures related to the cost reimbursement programs in effect generally preclude final determination of amounts due to or payable by the Hospitals until cost reports are audited or otherwise reviewed and settled upon by the applicable administrative agencies Normal estimation differences between final settlements and amounts accrued in previous years are reported as adjustments of net patient service revenue in the settlement year In 2013 and 2012, the Hospitals settled several previously filed Medicare and Medicaid cost reports and recorded changes in estimates benefiting net patient service revenue and excess of revenues over expenses totaling \$3,313,000 and \$4,721,000, respectively In the opinion of management, adequate provision has been made for adjustments, if any, that might result from subsequent reviews

#### 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

The Hospitals are reimbursed for services provided to patients under certain programs administered by governmental agencies. The Medicare program accounted for approximately 21% and 21% of the System's net patient service revenue in 2013 and 2012, respectively. The Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 8% of the System's net patient service revenue in 2013 and 2012.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. The Hospitals believe that they are in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations and are not aware of any pending or threatened investigations involving allegations of potential wrongdoing. While no such regulatory inquiries have been made, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action, including fines, penalties, and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs

#### **Provision for Uncollectible Accounts**

Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts, is reduced by the provision for bad debts, and accounts receivable is reduced by an allowance for uncollectible accounts. The System establishes an allowance for uncollectible accounts based on many factors, including payer mix, age of receivables, historical cash collection experience, and other relevant information. A significant portion of the System's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for services provided and a significant portion of the System's insured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for co-payments and deductibles. Thus, the System records a significant provision for bad debts related to these insured and uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. The System writes down the expected reimbursement after reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted.

#### Hospital Medi-Cal Supplemental Payment and Quality Assurance Fee

The California Hospital Fee Program (the Program) was signed into law by the governor of California and became effective on January 1, 2010 Amending legislation, to conform to changes requested by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) during the approval process, was signed into law by the governor of California and became effective September 8, 2010 The primary legislation (AB 1383) and amending legislation (AB 1653) contain two components the Quality Assurance Fee Act, which governs the "hospital fee" or "Quality Assurance Fee" (QA Fee) paid by participating hospitals, and the Medi-Cal Hospital

Provider Stabilization Act, which governs supplemental Medi-Cal payments (Supplemental Payments) made to providers Hospital participation is mandatory, with limited exceptions In December 2010, CMS gave final approval of the program

On May 9, 2011, CMS completed its preliminary review of the major components for a sixmonth extension of the Program for the period January 1, 2011 through June 30, 2011 (Six-Month Program) On December 29, 2011, CMS approved the Six-Month Program CMS approved a 30-month extension of the Program (30-Month Program) for the period July 1, 2011 through December 31, 2013 The legislation governing the 30-Month Program was amended to allow for the fee-for-service portion to be administered separately from the managed care portion In June 2012, CMS approved the fee-for-service portion of the 30-Month Program In May 2013 CMS approved the managed care portion of the program, but only up to June 30, 2013

Accordingly, during the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, the System recorded \$43 0 million and \$15 7 million in Supplemental Payments and \$29 7 million and \$22 7 million in QA Fees as Hospital Fee Program revenues and expenses, respectively, in the accompanying consolidated statements of income

#### **Electronic Health Records Incentive Payments**

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 included provisions for implementing health information technology under the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (HITECH) The provisions were designed to increase the use of electronic health record (EHR) technology and establish the requirements for a Medicare and Medicaid incentive payment program beginning in 2012 for eligible providers that adopt meaningfully use certified EHR technology Eligibility for annual Medicare incentive payments is dependent on providers demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each period over a four-year period Initial Medicaid incentive payments are available to providers that adopt, implement, or upgrade certified EHR technology Providers must demonstrate meaningful use of such technology in subsequent years to qualify for additional Medicaid incentive payments

For the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, the System recognized \$706,800 and \$1,178,000, respectively, of Medicaid meaningful-use revenues and \$0 and \$3,156,000, respectively, of Medicare meaningful-use revenues Such revenues are included in other operating revenues in the accompanying consolidated statements of income The System accounts for EHR incentive payments under the grant accounting method

#### **Investments**

The System participates with other affiliates in a custodial account (Custodial Account) The System records its share of the income, expenses, gains, and losses of the Custodial Account based on its pro rata share (units) of the Custodial Account's total fair value The System's share of the Custodial Account's assets was 69% and 65% at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

The Custodial Account invests in equity securities, debt securities, mutual funds, and alternative investments, including funds-of-funds, limited partnerships, real estate, and private equity funds. These alternative investments implement a range of strategies, including, but not limited to, long/short equity positions, arbitrage investment activities, emerging markets investments, and real estate. Some of these partnership/funds have a specific industry focus in their investment assets or specific asset investments in their strategy focus. At the investment manager's discretion, the fund may invest in marketable equity and fixed-income securities denominated in both U.S. and foreign currency with exposure to both emerging markets and developed markets. Alternative investments, other than real estate and private equities, are redeemable monthly, quarterly, or annually, with a short-notice period of usually 60 days or less. Certain private equity funds and real estate funds are subject to lock-up provisions of ten years.

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets based on quoted prices from recognized securities exchanges. Management determines the appropriate classification of all marketable securities at the date of purchase and reevaluates such designations at each balance sheet date. Such investments have been designated as trading securities at December 31, 2013 and 2012.

Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on trading securities, interest, dividends, and equity interests in gains and losses of alternative investments) is reported as excess of revenues over expenses in unrestricted net assets unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law Realized and unrealized gains and losses with respect to disposition of investments are based on the specific-identification method

The gain or loss from the alternative investments is included in investment income in the accompanying consolidated statements of income As of December 31, 2013 and 2012, these alternative investments comprised approximately 31% and 35%, respectively, of the Custodial Account's total investments, including assets limited as to use

#### **Derivatives and Hedging Activities**

The System follows FASB ASC 815, *Derivatives and Hedging*, which requires derivative financial instruments, such as interest rate swaps, to be recognized as assets or liabilities in the consolidated balance sheets at fair value Derivatives that do not qualify for hedge accounting are adjusted to fair value in the consolidated statements of income, above the performance indicator At December 31, 2013 and 2012, the System's derivative instruments did not qualify for hedge accounting and were limited to interest rate swap agreements with a current notional amount totaling \$227 2 million and \$232 2 million, respectively (see Note 6) The System entered into interest rate swap agreements to manage its interest rate risk

#### **Inventories**

Inventories are recorded at cost (using the first-in, first-out method), which is not in excess of market

#### **Assets Limited As to Use**

Assets limited as to use include unrestricted resources designated by the Board for replacement and acquisitions of property, plant, and equipment, and self-insurance trust funds for medical malpractice claims

#### Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets Leasehold improvements and equipment under capital lease obligations are amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter of the lease term or the estimated useful life and are included in depreciation and amortization expense Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds net of interest income on proceeds from bonds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets (see Note 6) Repairs and maintenance are charged to expense as incurred

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support at fair market value at the date of donation, and are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions on use and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as temporarily restricted support Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service

#### **Real Estate**

Santa Barbara Cottage Hospital transferred five buildings with a net book value of \$18 6 million to the Goleta Valley Professional Buildings, Inc during 2013 The transfer includes buildings which support certain hospital programs as well as leases medical office space to physicians The transfer did not impact the consolidated financial statements at December 31, 2013, but did reduce the assets of the obligated Group by an amount permitted by the Master Trust Indenture See Note 6 for discussion of Obligated Group and Master Trust Indenture

# Accounting for the Impairment of Long-Lived Assets and Long-Lived Assets to be Disposed of

The System reviews long-lived assets for impairment when events or changes in business conditions indicate that their carrying value may not be recoverable. The System considers assets to be impaired and writes them down to fair value if expected associated undiscounted cash flows are less than the carrying amounts. Fair value is the present value of the associated discounted cash flows. The System has determined that no long-lived assets are impaired at December 31, 2013.

#### **Donations and Donor-Restricted Net Assets**

Donations are generally made to the Santa Barbara Cottage Foundation, Rehabilitation Foundation, Goleta Valley Cottage Foundation, and Santa Ynez Cottage Foundation (collectively, the Foundations) for the benefit of the Hospitals To the extent expenditures are made for the purpose intended, funds are transferred from the Foundations Unrestricted donations received directly by the Hospitals are included in other operating revenues Resources restricted by donors to specific time periods or operating purposes are recorded as temporarily restricted net assets Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospitals in perpetuity

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted net assets if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets used in operations are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions (other operating revenue) in the accompanying consolidated statements of income Resources temporarily restricted by donors for additions to property, plant, and equipment whose purpose has been met are recorded as an increase in unrestricted net assets in the accompanying consolidated statements of income

Donor-restricted resources are invested in cash, marketable equity securities, and mutual funds until expended Donor-restricted resources held by the Foundations are included in the System's interest in net assets and amounts due from affiliates. Assets held by the System which are temporarily restricted by donors for operational uses are included in cash and cash equivalents and short-term investments. Resources held by the System, which are restricted by donors for capital acquisitions and permanently restricted assets, are included in other assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets

#### **Accrued Self-Insurance Claims**

The System is self-insured for certain employee health care claims. Employee health care claims, including an estimate for incurred but not reported claims, are estimated by management based on historical experience. Total accruals were \$2,960,000 and \$2,299,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

#### 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

The System is self-insured up to \$750,000 per workers' compensation claim. Claims in excess of these amounts are commercially insured. Accruals for the self-insurance portion of claims liabilities, including an estimate for claims incurred but not reported, are estimated by an actuary based on the Hospitals' claims experience and are discounted by an interest factor of 2% in 2013 and 2012. Total accruals at December 31, 2013 and 2012, were \$21,836,000 and \$20,284,000, respectively. The System's self-insurance obligations are guaranteed by the state of California through an alternative security program in the amount of \$20,085,000 and \$15,907,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The System is self-insured for general and professional liability claims up to \$500,000 per claim Individual claims in excess of \$500,000 are covered by claims-made insurance policies. An irrevocable trust fund has been established for the self-insurance program. Accruals for the self-insured portion of claims liabilities, including an estimate for claims incurred but not reported, are estimated by an actuary based upon the System's claims experience and are discounted by an interest factor of 2% in 2013 and 2012. Total liabilities were \$11,176,200 and \$8,952,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Estimated claims payable are continually monitored and reviewed, and, as settlements are made or accruals adjusted, differences are reflected in current operations. Self-insurance accruals expected to be paid in the following year are included in accrued expenses and other liabilities. The remaining self-insured accruals are reported in noncurrent liabilities.

Consistent with Accounting Standards Update 2010-24, *Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries*, the System calculates and records insurance claims irrespective of insurance recoveries. The related insurance recoveries of \$9,105,000 and \$7,521,000 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, are recorded as assets and reviewed for collectibility at period-end

#### **Cash Equivalents and Short-Term Investments**

The System considers all highly liquid debt instruments with remaining maturities, at acquisition date, of three months or less, to be cash equivalents Financial instruments, including debt securities with maturities over 90 days at the time of purchase, and marketable securities are included in short-term investments. Cash and cash equivalents and short-term investments exclude amounts which are limited as to use and resources which are permanently restricted by donors or temporarily restricted by donors for capital purchases

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

#### 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

#### **Concentrations of Credit Risk**

Financial instruments which potentially subject the System to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents, investments, and accounts receivable. The investment portfolio and Custodial Account are managed by the System within the guidelines established by the Board of Directors, which, as a matter of policy, limit the amounts which may be invested in any one issue. Concentrations of credit risk with respect to accounts receivable are limited, except with respect to programs under contract with the federal and state governments, due to the large number of payors comprising the System's patient base.

#### Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The System's consolidated balance sheets include the following financial instruments cash and cash equivalents, investments, accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, and long-term obligations. Investments are stated at fair value based primarily on quoted market prices (the composition of which is described elsewhere in Notes 1 and 4). The System considers the carrying amounts of all other current assets and liabilities to approximate their fair value because of the relatively short period of time between origination of the instruments and their expected realization or settlement. The carrying amount of Fixed-Rate Demand Revenue bonds Series 2003. B is \$47,980,000 and for Series 2010 is \$280,230,000, while the fair value is \$47,936,000 and \$284,795,000 as of December 31, 2013, respectively. The fair value was determined using a discounted cash flow analysis and is considered to be Level 2 inputs

#### **Income Taxes**

The System and its affiliates, except for Pacific Diagnostic Laboratories, are not-for-profit corporations and are tax-exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and are exempt from income taxation under (IRC) Section 501(a) and corresponding provisions of the California Revenue and Taxation Code, except to the extent of income derived from taxable unrelated business activities Unrelated business income is not material to the financial statements

### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

#### 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

The System completed an analysis of its tax positions, in accordance with FASB ASC 740, *Income Taxes*, and determined that there are no uncertain tax positions taken The System has recognized no interest or penalties related to uncertain tax positions. The System is subject to routine audits by the taxing jurisdictions, however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The System believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2009.

#### **Performance Indicator**

Management considers excess of revenues over expenses to be the System's performance indicator Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include items such as change in pension liability, cumulative effect of changes in accounting principle, reclassification of endowment net assets, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

#### **Physician Guarantees**

The System has agreements with nonemployed physicians that guarantee a certain level of income to the physicians. The physicians are expected to practice in the System's defined area for a defined period. Amounts paid to the physician during the guarantee period are ratably forgiven, resulting in income to the physician in the years of forgiveness. The carrying amounts of the asset and liability for the System's obligation under these guarantees are \$5,193,000 and \$4,222,000, respectively, at December 31, 2013, and \$4,370,000 and \$3,311,000, respectively, at December 31, 2012, and are included in other assets and other liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Recourse provisions in the contracts provide for recovery of amounts paid if all terms of the contract are not fulfilled.

#### Fair Value Measurement

As defined in FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In order to increase consistency and comparability in fair value measurements, FASB ASC 820 establishes a fair

value hierarchy that prioritizes observable and unobservable inputs used to measure fair value into three broad levels, which are described below

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for assets or liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs

Level 2 – Observable prices that are based on inputs not quoted on active markets, but corroborated by market data

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs are used when little or no market data is available. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs

Assets and liabilities measured at fair value are based on one or more of three valuation techniques noted in the tables below

- a) Market approach Prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or comparable assets or liabilities
- b) Cost approach Amount that would be required to replace the service capacity of an asset (replacement cost)
- c) Income approach Techniques to convert future amounts to a single present amount based on market expectations (including present value techniques, option-pricing, and excess earnings models)

In determining fair value, the System utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs to the extent possible as well as considers counterparty credit risk in its assessment of fair value

The fair values of the instruments included in Level 1 were determined through quoted market prices. Level 1 instruments include cash and short-term investments such as money market funds. The fair values of Level 2 instruments were determined through evaluated bid prices based on recent trading activity and other relevant information, including market interest rate curves and referenced credit spreads, estimated prepayment rates, where applicable, are used for valuation purposes and are provided by third-party services where quoted market values are not available. As discussed earlier, the investments in the Custodial Account are comprised of cash, short-term investments, equity securities, debt securities, mutual funds, and alternative investments. The fair values of these underlying investments are determined using a variety of sources, including direct quoted prices for identical assets in active market or quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets or other inputs that are observable for the asset, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the financial asset. The investments in the Custodial Account have been designated in its entirety in Level 2, after considering the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement

The fair value of the System's interest rate swap contracts is determined by calculating the value of the discounted cash flows of the difference between the fixed interest rate of the interest rate swaps and the counterparty's forward London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR) curve, which would be the input used in the valuations The forward LIBOR curve is readily available in public markets or can be derived from information available in public quoted markets Therefore, the System has categorized the interest rate swaps as Level 2

#### **Subsequent Events**

The System has evaluated subsequent events occurring between the end of the most recent fiscal year and April 30, 2014, the date the consolidated financial statements were available for issuance

#### Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications were made to the 2012 consolidated financial statement presentation to conform to the 2013 presentation

#### 3. Pension and Other Post-Retirement Benefit Plan

The System sponsors the Cottage Health System Cash Balance Retirement Plan (the Plan) The Plan is a contributory defined benefit pension plan covering substantially all of the employees of the Hospitals The Plan calls for a minimum contribution by the System to the participant's account equal to 2% of salary and an additional voluntary contribution by the participants up to 3% of the participant's salary, which will be matched 100% by the System

#### **Supplemental Executive Retirement Program**

The System provides certain executives a supplemental retirement program. The program is defined as deferred compensation under the IRC Section 457(f). The annual contribution is 6.95% of base year's salary with the contributions vesting five years from crediting date, or at age 62, or immediately in the event of death, disability, or involuntary termination without cause. The unvested account balances are assets of the System and are included in other assets and the accrued expense is included in pension liability and other in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

In addition to providing pension benefits, the System provides certain health care benefits (OPEBs) for retired employees who elect to continue care under the Medi-Gap Retiree Health Coverage Plan Substantially all of the System's employees who retire upon reaching age 60 (with 25 or more years of service) may become eligible for these benefits until they reach age 65 These and similar benefits for active employees are provided through the System's self-insurance program The System pays health care claims as they come due

The primary objective is to achieve the highest possible total return commensurate with safety and preservation of capital in real (inflation adjusted) terms. The overall investment strategy does not follow the conventional weighted-average target asset allocations, but rather targets a return as required by current and future plan liabilities. Investments are broadly diversified to mitigate the specific risk of any particular asset class. Investments are diversified among common stocks, fixed-income instruments, cash equivalents, real estate, and alternative investments. In addition, investments are diversified within asset classes by style and size.

The overriding long-term objective is to ensure that the Plan is able to meet its distribution requirements while growing the assets to meet future liability expenditures, adjusted for inflation The return on the assets should meet or exceed the sum of the distribution rate, inflation rate, and growth of the assets to accommodate current and future liabilities

The System Investment Subcommittee (the Investment Committee) of the Board of Directors is responsible for recommending asset allocations among fixed-income, equity, and alternative investments. At least annually, the Investment Committee reviews targeted allocations and, if necessary, recommends adjustments to targeted asset allocations. Given the diversity of the underlying securities in which the Custodial Account invests, management does not believe there is a significant concentration of credit risk. Direct expenses of the Custodial Account are less than 0.5% of total assets.

The Master Trust Indentures (Indentures) govern the disposition and repayments of the Series 2003B Bonds and Series 2010 Bonds The terms of the Indentures require the Obligated Group to pledge all of the revenues or any other amounts held in any fund or account established pursuant to the Indentures for the terms of the Series 2003B and Series 2010 Bonds The Indentures and Agreement contain restrictions, which, among other things, require maintenance of certain financial ratios, limit the disposal of assets, and restrict certain additional indebtedness At December 31, 2013 and 2012, the Obligated Group complied with these covenants In 2013 and 2012, interest costs incurred were \$16,103,000 and \$16,229,000, respectively, of which \$4,838,000 and \$3,743,000, respectively, was capitalized as part of the costs of construction-in-progress The amounts capitalized are reduced by investment income earned on tax-exempt financings borrowed for specific qualifying projects For the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, there was no investment income earned that was capitalized as part of construction-in-progress

#### **Interest Rate Swaps**

The System has three interest rate swap contracts (the Swaps) with a combined current notional amount of \$157,650,000 and termination date of November 1, 2036 Under the terms of the Swaps, the System has agreed to pay to Morgan Stanley Capital Services, Inc (the Swap Counterparty) fixed rates of interest ranging from 3 592% to 3 667% and the Swap Counterparty has agreed to pay the System 68% of one-month LIBOR, based on the notional amounts of the Swaps In March 2011, the System entered into an additional interest rate swap contract with the Swap Counterparty, effectively reversing an existing swap contract Under the terms of the Swap contract, the Swap Counterparty agreed to pay the System a fixed rate of interest of 2 53% The current notional value of the interest rate swap is \$69,500,000

A benefit of \$11,982,000 and \$1,630,000 for 2013 and 2012, respectively, has been recorded as a component of other income in the accompanying consolidated statements of income related to the interest rate swaps. The fair value of three of the Swaps totaled \$22,681,000 and \$40,440,000 as of December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The fair value of the fourth swap is recorded in other assets and totaled \$1,502,000 and \$7,280,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively. Payments to the Swap Counterparty of \$4,098,000 and \$4,140,000 were recorded as interest expense for the years ended December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Each of the interest rate swap agreements has collateral posting thresholds when the mark-to-market in total exceeds \$40 million. The System has a cash collateral balance with the Swap Counterparty of \$0 at December 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

### **Funds With Deficiencies**

The fair value of assets associated with individual donor restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor requires the System to retain as a fund of perpetual duration Deficiencies of this nature are reported in unrestricted net assets unless the income from such endowment funds is restricted as to use, in which case such amounts are reflected in temporarily restricted net assets. There were no such deficiencies as of December 31, 2013 and 2012

### **Return Objectives and Risk Parameters**

The System has investment policies that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by operations as well as endowment donations. Assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that exceed the respective benchmark while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount

### **Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives**

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the System relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends) The System targets a diversified asset allocation to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints

### **Interpretation of Relevant Law**

The System has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary As a result of this interpretation, the System classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until the donor's restriction is met and the funds are appropriated

### **Construction Projects**

The Hospitals are required to comply with the Hospital Seismic Safety Act (SB 1953), which regulates the seismic performance of all aspects of hospital facilities in California SB 1953 imposes near-term and long-term compliance deadlines for seismic safety assessments, submission of corrective plans, and the retrofitting or replacement of the Hospitals' facilities to comply with current seismic standards. These requirements are expected to result in significant operational changes and capital outlays. Based on preliminary estimates, total costs for the Hospitals' Facilities Master Plan are estimated to be \$814 million (unaudited) for Santa Barbara Cottage. Actual amounts could differ from these estimates. The City of Santa Barbara and the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development have approved the plans for Santa Barbara Cottage. The project consists of eight phases. Construction for phases one through four are complete. Phase five, which includes demolition of existing buildings began in June 2012 and will continue through June 2015.

The plan for Goleta Valley Cottage received approval from the City of Goleta and the Office of Statewide Planning and Development Construction began in early 2011 and is anticipated to be completed in late 2014 This plan has an estimated cost of \$125 million (unaudited) Completion of the new wing at Santa Ynez Valley Cottage was completed in early 2011 and the remodel of the existing space is anticipated to be completed by the end of 2014 The total project cost is estimated at \$15 million (unaudited)

### **Asset Retirement Obligations**

In 2006, the System adopted FASB ASC 410, Asset Retirement and Environmental Obligations, which clarifies that the term "conditional asset retirement obligations" (ARO) and refers to a legal obligation to perform an asset retirement activity in which the timing and/or method of settlements are conditional on a future event that may or may not be within the control of the entity. The guidance indicates that an entity must record a liability for a conditional asset retirement obligation if the fair value of the obligation can be reasonably estimated and also clarifies when an entity should have sufficient information to reasonably estimate the fair value of an asset retirement obligation. The System is subject to state requirements to retrofit certain buildings to current seismic standards by as early as 2013. Management has evaluated and estimated costs by which such facility will be brought into compliance with the current code (through replacement or retrofit), the settlement date and costs involved, including cost for asbestos abatement. A liability of \$1,326,000 and \$1,190,000 has been recorded in the December 31, 2013 and 2012, consolidated balance sheets

### **Legal Proceedings**

A lawsuit was filed by a single person (on behalf of a proposed class) in early 2014 alleging release of confidential medical information and seeking to establish the lawsuit as a class action Plaintiffs seek statutory nominal damages of \$1,000 for the plaintiff and each member of the putative class plus attorney's fees and damages The System does not believe there is merit to the lawsuit

The System and its affiliates are defendants in various other legal actions arising from the normal conduct of business Management believes that the ultimate resolution of these various proceedings will not have a material adverse effect upon its consolidated financial position, results of operations, or cash flows
