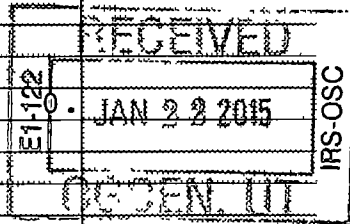

Young People Need a Strong Educational Foundation to Become Healthy, Resilient Adults

Located in NW Pasadena, Muir is the lowest performing of four public high schools in the Pasadena Unified School District.

Muir's enrollment is slightly less than 1,000 with a student population that is 70% Latino and 27% African American. More than three-fourths qualify for the federal free and reduced lunch program, an indicator of family poverty.

These students face numerous socio-economic challenges that present obstacles to school achievement.

20+ Educational and Enrichment Programs and a Safe Place to Go When School is Out

Programs are offered before, during and after-school hours, Monday through Thursday, and on weekends during the school year.

Our wide range of activities includes college preparation, leadership development, art, dance, music, theatre, sports, yoga, cooking, life skills, mentoring, homework assistance and credit recovery classes. We utilize a project-based approach that connects to in-school learning.

These programs broaden skills and knowledge, foster healthy personal development and provide critically needed remedial academic support, enabling students to graduate on time.

A family literacy component for parents and other relatives of students includes continuing education, financial literacy and parenting workshops.

We Get Results

MOTM serves more than 80% of Muir students.

Weekly program attendance typically exceeds 250 students, and a total of 988 students were served in the 2012-2013 school year.

A total of 482 students benefitted from MOTM's homework assistance program with Occidental College students during 2012-2013.

Students who regularly participate in MOTM have better school attendance.

MOTM programs have contributed to the steady growth of Muir's Academic Performance Index (API). Base scores have risen from 569 in 2006/07 to 618 in 2012/13.

651 students have completed at least one course for credit through MOTM since 2007.

Equipping teens with skills and knowledge

Since 2010, 263 students (32% of graduates) have graduated on schedule due to MOTM's credit recovery classes.

Of the 66 seniors accepted into four-year universities in 2013, 60 attended MOTM programs during the 2012/13.

Each program has a student advisor. In this role, students develop valuable leadership experience and earn community service hours.

MOTM has been meeting students' needs for educational and enrichment activities since 2003. Flintridge and local youth-serving agencies work together to provide the programming. This cost-effective and practical strategy enables MOTM to offer its wide range of quality programs.

A high percentage of students who regularly participate report plans to pursue post-secondary education. They also affirm that adults on campus are available for personal support and that their community is interested in helping them succeed.

Cody, a foster teen with a mother in jail, lived in five cities over eight years and was behind in school units as a senior. On the verge of dropping out, he sought help from MOTM and, through staff's encouragement, he completed MOTM's credit recovery classes and graduated with his class. He now attends Mt. San Antonio College.

Helping ex-offenders make a successful transition to a productive community life

A Network of Coordinated Services

- Flintridge Center, the Pasadena Police Department and numerous local nonprofit organizations formed the Pasadena/Altadena Reintegration Council in 2010 to help formerly incarcerated individuals transition back into our community.
- Coordinated by Flintridge, the Council—a coalition of 50+ public agencies and local service providers—conducts monthly resource fairs where the formerly incarcerated learn about available services and programs.
- Referrals are provided for transitional housing, sober living facilities, family services, drug and alcohol treatment programs, homeless shelters, medical/dental/mental health services, tattoo removal, job preparation, child support and transportation assistance.
- The resource fairs offer a free lunch and door prizes in a welcoming atmosphere. They typically draw some 20-30 clients and 15-20 service providers.
- In addition to the fairs, Flintridge staff and partner agencies provide one-to-one counseling and case management assistance. California Drug Counseling hosts a monthly ex-offender peer support group.
- By connecting formerly incarcerated men and women to a network of comprehensive, community-based services, we provide the critical support that helps to reduce recidivism.

By Breaking the Cycle of Incarceration, Public Safety is Improved

- California has one of the largest prison populations in the United States and a recidivism rate that is among the highest.
- Ordered by the U.S. Supreme Court to reduce its overcrowded prisons, the State of California passed a bill (AB109) in March 2011, which releases some 33,000 low-risk offenders to county supervision.
- 9,000-11,000 inmates, formerly supervised by state parole officers upon release, will now be under LA County Probation supervision. State parole agents will continue to supervise the more high risk individuals.
- The Reintegration Council helps to meet the service needs of individuals returning to Pasadena/Altadena neighborhoods upon release. Many have mental health and substance abuse issues. With few skills and little means of support, they face significant challenges, including finding housing and a job with a steady paycheck.
- By providing appropriate support structures and assistance, we can help them make a fresh start and become contributing members of society.

We Get Results

- The Council began coordinating the resource fairs in June 2011 after the Pasadena Parole Office could no longer fund the program.
- The Council expanded the monthly events, bringing in new service providers and offering on-site health screenings.
- The Council conducts extensive outreach to the reentry population and created a brochure listing local resources. Prison Fellowship trains partner agencies to work inside correctional settings.
- Over a 12-month period, more than 350 ex-offenders attended the Council-run fairs (approx. 60% from the Pasadena/Altadena area).
- 47 individuals received specialized case management services through Friends Outside in Los Angeles County, funded by The Ahmanson Foundation. Of these, only three have been rearrested.
- The program's effectiveness is enhanced by involving the formerly incarcerated in all aspects of the program—planning, outreach, helping clients access services and giving motivational speeches at the resource fairs. Their input has proved invaluable and strengthens the sense that we are all working together as a community.

The Reintegration Council has been called a model program for parolee reintegration by Pasadena's Police Chief Phillip Sanchez.

Since 2010, the city's overall crime rate has dropped 9.8%.

Anton's Story

Anton (not real name) is 31 and covered with tattoos. A former gang member, he'd had a rough life and served a third of it behind bars for robbery. After his release, he went to live with relatives in Pasadena. That's when a family member called Flintridge's office in tears. She'd seen an article about the reintegration services in the "Pasadena Weekly" and hoped we could help. A meeting was arranged with Flintridge's Outreach Coordinator. Though skeptical at first, Anton warmed up when the Coordinator shared his own story of overcoming similar challenges. Anton was helped with his résumé and referred to Flintridge's Apprenticeship Preparation Program for the construction trades. He completed the course, took his GED tests to obtain a high school equivalency certificate, and is now on the wait list to be an apprentice in the Laborers' Union.

Ruben's Story

It's hard for many in today's economy to find a job, but for men and women returning home from prison, it's even more difficult. Ruben (not real name) was released from prison and lives in a residential treatment center for substance abuse. Despondent about not finding work, he attended the Council resource fair and met with Flintridge's Outreach Coordinator. The Coordinator told Ruben about a construction company looking for general laborers. He walked Ruben through the online application process and helped him create an email address. Ruben was called in for an interview and subsequently hired. Now, he has a job with a decent wage and is on the path to continued recovery.

A Positive Force (APF) is a group of men and women, many with current or former gang ties, who are committed to role modeling positive behavior and using their influence to steer local youth out of and away from gangs.



- The grassroots movement started with five former gang leaders who wanted to mentor youth and local homeboys and create positive change in their neighborhoods. They approached Flintridge Center's staff, Ricky Pickens, for ideas and assistance.
- Flintridge provided encouragement and support and has convened and facilitated weekly meetings during which the group developed a name, structure and focus. From the five original "brothers," the brotherhood quickly increased to 25 and is still growing. APF now has a "sisters", youth and mothers group – in all more than 50 community members have joined in solidarity to deter gang activity in our community.
- APF works to empower and change the lives of neighborhood brothers and sisters and the lives of those close to them. Its mission is to empower, educate and mentor by building positive relationships and promoting community unity.
- APF's efforts include: (1) brokering four peace agreements between gang members from rival neighborhoods; (2) bringing together gang leaders and members from six different neighborhoods to create a unified strategy for establishing community harmony; (3) volunteering at community events and making presentations to youth groups; and (4) engaging with youth and families at local housing projects through sports, movie nights and field trips.
- As part of their mission to set a positive example, APF members work on improving their own lives, whether it's pursuing continuing education and better employment opportunities or fulfilling family responsibilities.
- This grassroots, community-based effort is directly aligned with Flintridge Center's holistic approach to community violence prevention and intervention. It also adheres to best practices identified by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention regarding the use of former gang members in prevention and intervention efforts.

Creating Opportunities for Meaningful Employment

The free Apprenticeship Preparation Program (APP) is a pathway to careers in the construction trades for unemployed and under-employed men and women, age 17-1/2 and up.

The certificate course, taught by instructors from Pasadena City College, is offered three times a year at two local community centers. Daytime and evening sessions are available, except during summer.

Over a 16-week period (ten during summer), we cover basic safety, construction math, blueprints, rigging, hand and power tools, "green" building concepts and other topics, including employability skills, to help students successfully apply for paid union apprenticeships.

Students also go on field trips to union apprenticeship training facilities, construction sites and LEED-certified buildings.

In addition, we provide case management and peer-to-peer support services to help individuals overcome challenging life issues that are barriers to employment.

Economic Self-Sufficiency Transforms Lives

California's high unemployment rate (over 10%) is even higher for African Americans and Latinos.

Chronic joblessness affects community well-being as much as families. A loss of hope can lead to crime and gang involvement.

Flintridge launched the Apprenticeship Preparation Program in 2008 in partnership with an alliance of community stakeholders to provide high-risk individuals with a chance for productive and rewarding lives.

The construction trades offer health insurance, retirement options and opportunities for advancement. Prior gang connections, tattoos or a criminal record are not deterrents to career success.

We Get Results

As of summer 2012, more than 230 students have completed the 240-hour course.

Eighty-three graduates have enrolled in apprenticeship programs or been placed in jobs, six are continuing their education, and two have started their own businesses (solar installation and painting).

Flintridge works with a variety of agencies and contractors to identify jobs for graduates, including the City of Pasadena's First Source Local Hiring Program, Clark Construction Company and B&P Painting, and has established strong relationships with more than a dozen trade unions.

More than two dozen graduates were hired to assist the city's cleanup crews after a hurricane-force windstorm downed over a thousand trees in December 2011.

Thirteen graduates have been hired to work on Pasadena's Rose Bowl renovations.



In assessment surveys at the end of the course, most all students report that they have learned useful skills, gained confidence in obtaining future employment and increased their knowledge of the construction trades. They also report improved life skills, particularly with career planning, goal setting and workplace communication.

Growing up wasn't easy for Sean Davis. With a mother suffering from lupus and a father addicted to heroin, he lacked support from caring adults. Living on his own at age 21, he was arrested after a domestic dispute and served time in prison. Upon release, Sean was ready to turn his life around, but with a criminal record, he found few opportunities. Then, an APP graduate referred him to the program. After completing the course, Sean applied for an apprenticeship. He was sponsored into the Tile, Marble & Terrazzo Union and is now working on the Rose Bowl renovation project for an area contractor. "We all make mistakes," he says, "but it's important to see them as a chance for change." He gives thanks to Flintridge, "Flintridge gave me the ability to be a loving father and to provide for my children. My life is falling into place ... finally."

Changing Lives, One Match at a Time

Washington Middle School students, identified as high-need and high-risk, are paired with volunteer mentors from the Pasadena Police, Fire and City Departments.

We focus on youth with grade point averages well below 2.0, high truancy and absentee rates and youth who are gang-impacted.

All Youth Need Guidance and Support from Caring Adults

Located in NW Pasadena, Washington is the lowest performing middle school in the Pasadena Unified School district with a 2012 API score of 694. (The state target is 800.)

More than three fourths of the student population is Latino and 90% qualify for the federal free and reduced lunch program, an indicator of poverty.

These youngsters face numerous socio-economic challenges that present obstacles to school achievement.

We Work Closely with Families

Parents and caregivers of mentees participate in support groups led by MSW interns from CA State University Northridge.

Since many parents are Spanish speakers, our bilingual interns introduce them to the concept of mentoring and facilitate communication about family issues.

Mentor Requirements

- Mentors provide support and guidance and serve as positive role models, connecting weekly with the youngsters, either one-on-one or in small groups, for a minimum of five hours a month.
- Mentors make a one-year minimum commitment. However, for greatest impact, we encourage matches to continue through high school graduation.
- All mentors undergo a screening process that includes an application, interview, program orientation and reference checks.
- Prior to being matched, mentors must attend a mentor training. Flintridge provides ongoing sessions in mentoring best practices throughout the year.

Mentoring Works

At 15, Carlos is at a crossroads. Drugs and gangs have claimed relatives, and some have paid a deadly price. His mentor, a Pasadena Police Officer, is doing all he can to help Carlos pursue his dreams of a better life. But the challenges are huge. Carlos is doing poorly in high school. Home is a cramped apartment where he sleeps in the living room with two younger brothers. When his father disappears for weeks, Carlos worries that his mother won't be able to make ends meet. Sometimes, to escape, he'll run away. But through the help of his mentor, Carlos has found stability and support. For a year now, they have connected each week for lunch, an activity or just to talk. The officer encourages Carlos to keep up with his studies and was a major influence in his graduating from middle school. He has introduced Carlos to local business leaders and has taken him to I-Hop for his first waffle. At some point, Carlos will choose a direction. Mentoring tilts the odds that he will make the right one.
