The organization has entered zero on Schedule H, Part III, Line 3; however, based on prior experience and certain demographics and other information obtained during admission, the organization believes a portion of the bad debt expenses (estimated to range from 1-5%) would be attributable to patients that would otherwise qualify for charity care. Despite all of the effort and ways the organization educates patients about qualifying for its charity care program as demonstrated in Part VI, question 3 below, many uninsured patients either refuse or fail to complete a charity care application or provide sufficient information at the time of admission, during their stay or after being discharged to qualify for assistance under the organization's charity care policy.

benefits, including for example Medicare, is an indication that the

hospital operates for the promotion of health in the community.

Second, the organization provides care to Medicare patients regardless of this shortfall, i.e., loss, and thereby relieves the state and federal government of the burden of paying the full cost for the care of Medicare beneficiaries. Medicare does not provide sufficient reimbursement to cover the entire cost of providing care to these patients causing the organization to use other surplus funds to cover the shortfall. It is expected that reimbursement under the Medicare program will continue to decline and therefore may further limit access to care due to the anticipated reduction of participating Medicare providers in the community. As a result, the care for these patients will likely continue to increase, and rest on the shoulders of, nonprofit hospitals and/or county hospital districts.

Third, many of the Medicare participants have low fixed incomes and therefore would qualify for charity care or other means tested government programs absent being enrolled in the Medicare program.

Fourth, Texas nonprofit hospitals must provide a minimum level of community benefit in order to obtain exemption from state and local taxes. According to the current Texas Health and Safety Code, the unreimbursed cost of Medicare is considered to be a community benefit in determining these state statutory requirements as it helps relieve a governmental burden of providing this care that would otherwise be provided through the county hospital system in Texas.

The communities and people of Williamson County reflect recent dramatic economic and business growth, unique environment and geography, and the county's history of perseverance and resiliency in the face of natural

disasters and other events. Over the past ten years, the population of the county grew 69%. The most recent population estimate for the county was 442,782 in 2011. With the exception of Liberty Hill, population has increased in the incorporated areas of cities throughout the county since 2000.

The eastern region of the county has many areas still considered rural, but is transitioning away from an economy dominated by agriculture. Strong support of farmer's markets throughout the county may help sustain some level of diversified agriculture. Overall, growth has occurred in eastern Williamson but at a slower pace than in western Williamson. The notable exception to this is the City of Hutto, which grew 1075% from 2000 to 2010 according to the US Census. Outside of Hutto, the population in eastern Williamson tends to be older and medically underserved.

Demographic Profile

Significant demographic changes countywide include growth of the Hispanic,
Non-White population, which grew from 17% of the population in 2000 to 23%
of the population in 2010. Countywide, the median age increased from 30 to
32 from 2000 to 2010. Approximately 25,000 individuals in the county speak
English less than "very well."

When considering the countywide measures that can affect health, it is important to understand demographic, educational and income variations across our county:

The City of Georgetown has the highest median age at 44 years, while Hutto

The Organization provides financial assistance in the form of charity care to patients who are indigent and satisfy certain requirements. Additionally, the Organization is committed to treating patients who are eligible for means tested government programs such as Medicaid and other government sponsored programs including Medicare, which is provided regardless of the reimbursement shortfall, and thereby relieves the state and federal government of the burden of paying the full cost of care for these patients. Often, patients are unaware of the federal, state and local programs open to them for financial assistance, or they are unable

to access them due to the cumbersome enrollment process required to receive these benefits. The organization offers assistance in enrollment to these government programs or extends financial assistance in the form of charity care through the Organization's Financial Assistance Policy which can be located on the Organization's website at sw.org/patient-tools/financial-assistance.

The Organization provides access to quality medical services including areas of excellence such as cardiology, orthopedics, women's services and outpatient care. SWRR serves it patients through their primary care clinics, 19-bed emergency department and physical medicine and rehabilitation.

Under the guidance of an independent community board, the System follows one single mission, vision and values focusing on quality patient centered care while meeting the demands of health care reform, the changing needs of patients and extraordinary recent advances in clinical care.

Notes to Combined Financial Statements

For the Ten Months Ended June 30, 2014

1. ORGANIZATION

Scott & White Healthcare (SWH) is a Texas nonprofit corporation exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC. SWH controlled entities and noncontrolled affiliate entities include over 1,300 licensed hospital beds, approximately 80 clinic locations, and a health maintenance organization, Scott & White Health Plan, and its subsidiary, Insurance Company of Scott & White (collectively referred to as the "Health Plan" or "SWHP") primarily serving the central region of Texas. The Health Plan, SWH and its consolidated affiliates are collectively referred to herein as Scott & White. The equity method of accounting is used for investments in entities in which Scott & White has significant influence and a financial interest, but not control. Entities in which Scott & White has control but not sole membership are included in the combined financial statements, with a noncontrolling interest reported in the balance sheet and in the excess of revenues and gains over expenses and losses. All entities in which Scott & White has sole membership are included in the combined financial statements. All significant intercompany accounts and transactions among entities included in the combined financial statements have been eliminated in consolidation.

Effective October 1, 2013, Baylor Health Care System (BHCS) a Texas nonprofit corporation, and SWH, consummated their affiliation pursuant to an Affiliation Agreement dated June 19, 2013. BHCS and SWH formed BSW Health, a Texas nonprofit corporation now known as Baylor Scott & White Holdings (BSW Holdings), and BSW Health Service, a Texas nonprofit corporation now known as Baylor Scott & White Health (BSW Health).

While the receipt of Internal Revenue Service (IRS) tax-exempt and public charity determination letters for BSW Holdings and BSW Health was pending, BHCS and SWH formed two Texas limited liability companies, Baylor Scott & White Health LLC (BSW Holdings LLC) and Baylor Scott & White Health Service LLC (BSW Health LLC). On December 31, 2013, BSW Holdings and BSW Health each received a favorable determination letter from the IRS regarding their tax-exempt and public charity status. Effective March 1, 2014, BSW Holdings LLC was merged into BSW Holdings and BSW Health LLC was merged into BSW Health. BSW Holdings is now the sole member of BHCS and SWH and has control and substantial reserved powers over all BHCS and SWH material affiliates. BSW Holdings and its affiliates are referred to collectively as the "System" or "BSWH".

BSW Holdings has accounted for the combination as a merger of not-for-profit entities under Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958-805, "Not-for-Profit entities: Business Combinations." Transition and integration are on-going with Scott & White incurring

approximately \$15,364,000 in costs during the ten months ended June 30, 2014, as a result of the transaction which are included in merger costs in the combined statement of operations and changes in net assets. The combined financial statements reflect the results of operations and financial position of Scott & White only.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying financial statements of Scott & White have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States. The following is a summary of the significant accounting and reporting policies used in preparing the financial statements.

Adoption of New Accounting Pronouncements

In December 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-11, "Balance Sheet (Topic 210): Disclosures about Offsetting Assets and Liabilities." This ASU amends the disclosure requirements on offsetting as stated in Section 210-20-50 in order to more closely align the presentation of the financial statements prepared under the United States Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (US GAAP) and those prepared under the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS). The amendments under this update require entities to disclose both gross and net information related to instruments and transactions subject to an agreement similar to a master netting arrangement. The scope of this ASU applies to derivatives, sale and repurchase arrangements, reverse sale and repurchase arrangements, securities borrowing and securities lending arrangements. Scott & White applied the provisions of ASU 2011-11 in 2014.

In October 2012, FASB issued ASU 2012-05, "Statement of Cash Flows (Topic 230) – Not-for-Profit Entities: Classification of the Sale Proceeds of Donated Financial Assets," including an amendment to 230, "Statement of Cash Flows." The amendment requires, with certain exception, a not-for-profit entity to classify in the statement of cash flows cash received from donated financial assets as an operating activity if those donated financial instruments were donated without any imposed limitations for sale and were converted nearly immediately into cash. Scott & White applied the provisions of ASU 2012-05 in 2014.

In January 2013, FASB issued ASU 2013-01, "Balance Sheet (Topic 210) - Clarifying the Scope of Disclosures about Offsetting Assets and Liabilities." This ASU clarifies that the scope of ASU 2011-11 is limited to derivatives accounted for in accordance with Topic 815, including bifurcated embedded derivatives, repurchase agreements and reverse repurchase agreements, and securities borrowing and securities lending transactions that are either offset in accordance with Section 210-20-45 or Section 815-10-45 or subject to an enforceable master netting arrangement or similar agreement. Scott & White applied the provisions of ASU 2013-01 in 2014.

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

In March 2014, FASB issued ASU 2014-06, "Technical Corrections and Improvements Related to Glossary Terms." The amendments in this ASU relate to glossary terms and cover a wide range of topics in the codification. These amendments are presented in four sections; Deletion of Master Glossary Terms (Section A), Addition of Master Glossary Term Links (Section B), Duplicate Master Glossary Terms (Section C), and Other Technical Corrections Related to Glossary Terms (Section D). This ASU is limited to those amendments related to the Master Glossary, including technical corrections related to glossary links, glossary term deletions and glossary term name changes. Scott & White applied the provisions of ASU 2014-06 in 2014.

Other Accounting Pronouncements

In October 2012, FASB issued ASU 2012-04, "Technical Corrections and Improvements." The amendment clarifies multiple elements of the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) and corrects unintended application of guidance which is not expected to have a significant effect on current accounting practice. Additionally, the ASU includes amendments identifying when the use of fair value should be linked to the definition of fair value in ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements. Scott & White has not evaluated all of the updated provisions which are effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2013.

In February 2013, FASB issued ASU 2013-04, "Obligations Resulting from Joint and Several Liability Arrangements for Which the Total Amount of the Obligation is Fixed at the Reporting Date." The ASU requires measurement of obligations resulting from joint and several liability arrangements for which the total amount of the obligation is fixed at the reporting date, as the sum of (a) the amount the reporting entity agreed to pay on the basis of its arrangement among its co-obligors and (b) any additional amount the reporting entity expects to pay on behalf of its co-obligors. Additionally, the amendment requires an entity to disclose the nature and amount of the obligation as well as other information about those obligations. The amendments are to be applied retrospectively to all prior periods presented for those obligations within the scope of the ASU that exist at the beginning of an entity's fiscal year of adoption. Scott & White has not evaluated all of the updated provisions, which are effective for fiscal years ending after December 15, 2014.

In April 2014, FASB issued ASU 2014-08, "Reporting Discontinued Operations and Disclosures of Disposals of Components of an Entity." This ASU amends the requirements for reporting discontinued operations by removing the following conditions in the current reporting requirements of discontinued operations: elimination of the operations and cash flows of the component from ongoing operations and the entity will not have any significant continuing involvement in the operations of the component after the disposal transaction. Additionally, only, if the disposal represents a strategic shift, having a major effect on an entity's operations and financial results will the disposal of components be reported as

discontinued operations. This amendment also adds that the disposal of an equity method investment that meets the definition of discontinued operations or a business or nonprofit activity that, on acquisition, meets the criteria to be classified as held for sale is to be reported in discontinued operations. Scott & White has not evaluated all of the provisions of ASU 2014-08, which are effective for fiscal years beginning on or after December 15, 2015.

In May 2014, FASB issued ASU 2014-09, "Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606)." The core principle of the guidance is that an entity should recognize revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. Scott & White has not evaluated all of the provisions of ASU 2014-09, which are effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2016.

In August 2014, FASB issued ASU 2014-15, "Disclosure of Uncertainties about an Entity's Ability to Continue as a Going Concern." This ASU amendment requires management to assess an entity's ability to continue as a going concern. Management should evaluate whether conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, exist that raise substantial doubt about the entity's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued. Scott & White has not evaluated all of the provisions of ASU 2014-15, which are effective for fiscal years ending after December 15, 2016.

Cash Equivalents

Scott & White considers all undesignated highly liquid investments with maturities of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

Investments

Scott & White has designated all of its investments as trading except for those investments held by Hillcrest Baptist Medical Center (Hillcrest) and SWHP. For all trading investments, the interest and dividends, realized gains and unrealized gains (losses) are included in gains on investments, net, in the accompanying combined statement of operations and changes in net assets, unless restricted by donor. For other than trading investments, interest and dividends and realized gains (losses) are included in gains on investments, net, unless restricted by donor. Unrealized gains (losses) on other than trading investments are included in other changes in unrestricted net assets, unless restricted by donor.

Receivables from government-related programs (i.e., Medicare and Medicaid) represent the only concentrated group of payors for Scott & White's receivables, and management does not believe that there is any unusual level of collectability risks associated with these government programs. Commercial and managed care receivables consist of receivables from various payors involved in diverse activities and subject to differing economic conditions and do not represent any concentrated collectability risks to Scott & White.

Scott & White maintains allowances for uncollectible accounts for estimated losses resulting from a payor's inability to make payments on accounts. Scott & White assesses the reasonableness of the allowance account based on historical write-offs, cash collections, the aging of the accounts and other economic factors. Accounts are written off when collection efforts have been exhausted. Management continually monitors and adjusts its allowances associated with its receivables.

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

Premiums Receivable

Premium revenue is recognized as income in the period that members are entitled to receive services, as specified by the provisions of the arrangement. Premiums billed or received in advance of the service period are reported as unearned premiums. Premiums receivable generally are not collateralized. Premiums receivable also include annual settlements under the cost contract established between SWHP and the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. At June 30, 2014, the settlement amounts receivable under this contract were \$31,281,000 (cost years 2007 - 2013).

Significant concentrations of premiums receivable were 96% from local, state and federal government-related programs at June 30, 2014. Premium revenue from local, state and federal agencies accounted for 52% of total premium revenue for the ten months ended June 30, 2014.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition or estimated fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method using the estimated economic lives of the depreciable assets, generally ranging from 2 to 40 years. The amortization related to assets recorded under capital leases is included within depreciation and amortization expense in the combined statement of operations and changes in net assets.

Expenditures that materially increase values, change capacities, or extend useful lives are capitalized. Routine maintenance and repair items are charged to operating expenses.

Scott & White evaluates whether events and circumstances have occurred that would require a revision to the remaining estimated useful life of long-lived assets or would indicate that the remaining balance of an asset is not recoverable. The assessment of possible impairment is

based on whether the carrying amount of an asset exceeds the expected total undiscounted value of cash flows expected to result from the use of the asset and its eventual disposition. No impairment charges were recorded for the ten months ended June 30, 2014.

Property and equipment financed under capital leases totaled approximately \$28,120,000 at June 30, 2014, and related accumulated amortization was approximately \$10,105,000 at June 30, 2014. Amortization expense is included in depreciation and amortization expense in the combined statement of operations and changes in net assets.

The amounts of total capitalized software costs, including purchased and internally developed software, at June 30, 2014, were approximately \$206,962,000 less accumulated depreciation of approximately \$117,709,000. Depreciation of these software costs was approximately \$19,694,000 for the ten months ended June 30, 2014.

Scott & White accounts for asset retirement obligations under the provisions of ASC 410, "Asset Retirement and Environmental Obligations," regarding accounting for conditional asset retirement obligations. The asset retirement obligation as of June 30, 2014 was approximately \$10,180,000, which is recorded in other liabilities in the combined balance sheet and relates to required future asbestos remediation.

Derivative Financial Instruments

Scott & White accounts for its derivatives under ASC 815, "Derivatives and Hedging," regarding accounting for derivative instruments and hedging activities. Scott & White utilizes interest rate swap agreements (derivative agreements) to mitigate interest rate exposures. Scott & White's derivative agreements are measured at fair value and are reflected in the consolidated balance sheets as either a long-term asset or long-term liability. None of Scott & White's derivative financial instruments qualify for hedge accounting at June 30, 2014. Changes in the fair value of the derivative agreements and the expense or income, representing the net of the payments made or received under the derivative agreements, are recorded as interest rate swap activity in the combined statement of operations.

Interest in Net Assets of Related Foundations

Scott & White accounts for its interest in the net assets of related foundations under ASC 958-605, "Not-for-Profit Entities - Revenue Recognition," regarding transfers of assets to a not-for-profit organization or charitable trust that raises or holds contributions for others. At June 30, 2014, Scott & White's interest in the net assets of related foundations not eliminated upon consolidation was approximately \$4,217,000.

Equity Investments in Unconsolidated Entities

In fiscal year 2008, Scott & White acquired a 32% membership interest in Metroplex Adventist Hospital (MAH), a Texas nonprofit corporation, located in Killeen, Texas. Scott & White accounts for its interest in MAH under the equity method of accounting.

At June 30, 2014, the difference between the amount at which the investment in MAH was carried and Scott & White's interest in the underlying net assets of MAH was approximately \$4,399,000. The excess cost over interest in the underlying net assets of MAH is being amortized over ten years, which was determined to be the lesser of the approximate remaining life of the assets to which the excess cost over carrying value relates or the period of time from the consummation of the membership interest agreement to the point at which the membership interest agreement may be terminated without cause. Scott & White's interest in the losses of MAH was approximately \$475,000 for the ten months ended June 30, 2014, and is reported as equity in losses in unconsolidated entities in the combined statement of operations and changes in net assets.

Medical Claims Payable

Medical claims payable represent management's best estimate of the ultimate net cost of all reported and unreported claims and claim adjustment expenses incurred through June 30, 2014 and are included in other accrued liabilities. Reserves for unpaid claims are actuarially estimated using individual case-basis valuations and statistical analysis. These estimates are subject to the effects of trends in claim severity and frequency. Although considerable variability is inherent in such estimates, management believes that reserves for unpaid claims are adequate. The estimates are continually reviewed and adjusted as necessary as experience develops or new information becomes known. Such adjustments are included in operations when determined. There were no material adjustments to these estimates recorded during the ten months ended June 30, 2014.

Contributions, Gifts, and Bequests

Scott & White records contributions, gifts, and bequests of cash or other assets at estimated fair value on the date of receipt. If a contribution, gift, or bequest of cash or other assets is received by Scott & White with a time or purpose restriction, Scott & White records the contribution, gift, or bequest as a temporarily or permanently restricted contribution.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

When a time or purpose restriction is fulfilled, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets. Scott & White's temporarily restricted net assets are primarily restricted for research, education, capital projects, and medical care programs.

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

Scott & White's permanently restricted net assets are primarily restricted for educational and research purposes. Unless explicitly restricted by donors, income from permanently restricted net assets is recorded as temporarily restricted until appropriated for expenditure.

Revenue and Gains (Losses) in Excess (Deficit) of Expenses and Losses

The combined statement of operations and changes in net assets include revenue and gains (losses) in excess (deficit) of expenses and losses. Other changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from revenue and gains (losses) in excess (deficit) of expenses and losses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains on investments other than trading securities and net assets released from restrictions for capital expenditures.

Income Taxes

Scott & White evaluates its income tax positions in accordance with ASC 740, "Income Taxes," regarding accounting for uncertainty in income taxes. ASC 740 prescribes a recognition threshold and measurement attribute for the financial statement recognition and measurement of a tax position taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. There are no material uncertain income tax positions as of June 30, 2014.

Insurance

Scott & White self-insures a large amount of its professional liability (malpractice) risk and general liability through its wholly-owned captive Scott & White Assurance, Ltd. (SWAL). However Scott & White does retain a claims-made captive reinsurance program for claims exceeding \$7,000,000 individually or \$35,000,000 in aggregate. In accordance with policy, Scott & White will pay the first \$7,000,000 of an individual claim, and no more than an aggregate total of \$35,000,000 on all claims in a given year. Insurance policies are current through July 1, 2014. In addition, SWAL provides excess re-insurance coverage to Scott & White in the amount of \$100,000,000. The excess liability policies are reinsured 100% by ACE American Insurance Company and various other reinsurers.

Reserves for Losses and Loss Adjustment Expenses

The reserve for losses and loss adjustment expenses are based on management's best estimate of the ultimate liability for outstanding losses and loss adjustment expenses determined in comparison with historical and industry loss statistics. Management uses case basis evaluations and actuarial analysis to develop their best estimate. Management believes that the reserves for losses and loss adjustment expenses are adequate. However, because of the extended period of time over which losses are settled and the general uncertainty surrounding the estimates, the ultimate settlement cost of the losses and the related loss adjustment expenses could vary and these differences could be material. The estimate is continuously

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

reviewed and, as adjustments to the liability become necessary, they are reflected in current operations.

Liabilities for outstanding claims, including estimates for claims incurred but not reported, as well as reported claims pending settlement, are actuarially determined and discounted using an interest rate of 2.0% in 2014. Total undiscounted reserves for losses and loss adjustment expenses were approximately \$28,589,000 at June 30, 2014. Discounted reserves for losses and loss adjustment expenses including a risk margin at an approximate seventy percent confidence level were approximately \$29,319,000 at June 30, 2014.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

3. FAIR VALUES OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (an exit price). ASC 820, "Fair Value Measurement," establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. A financial instrument's categorization within the valuation hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy defined by ASC 820 are listed below in order of priority:

Level 1 – Fair value is based on unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in an active market that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date.

Level 2 – Fair value is based on quoted prices in markets that are not active, quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Fair value is based on prices or valuation techniques that require inputs which are both significant to the fair value measurements and unobservable. These inputs reflect management's judgment about the assumptions that a market participant would use in pricing the investment and are based on the best available information, some of which may be internally developed.

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

Scott & White estimates the values of its U.S. government agency securities, certain corporate fixed income securities, collateralized debt obligations, and interest rate swap agreements using Level 2 inputs. These investments are valued primarily using a market approach using inputs such as evaluated bid prices provided by third-party pricing services when quoted market values are not available. Interest rate swaps are valued using an income approach that utilizes present value techniques which are affected by inputs such as interest rate curves and credit rating.

a) Equity long/short strategy involves managers buying long equities that are expected to increase in value and selling short equities that are expected to decrease in value. Typically, equity long/short investing is based on stock by stock fundamental analysis of the individual companies, in which investments are made. There may also be an overall analysis of the risks and opportunities offered by industries, sectors, countries, and the macroeconomic situation. Long/short covers a wide variety of strategies. There are generalists, and managers who focus on certain industries and sectors or certain regions. Managers may specialize in a category - for example, large cap or small cap, value or growth. There are many trading styles, with frequent or dynamic traders and some longer-term investors. Returns are generally more correlated with the direction of the equity markets, although reduction in market risk exposure through shorting is expected to enhance the absolute and risk-adjusted returns relative to the overall performance of the

asset class. The fair values of the investments in this class have been estimated using the net asset value per share of the funds.

- b) Event-driven investing is a strategy which seeks to exploit pricing inefficiencies that may occur before or after a corporate event, such as an earnings call, bankruptcy, merger, acquisition, or spinoff. Returns are less correlated with the general direction of market movements primarily due to the idiosyncratic nature of individual events. Several investment managers include quarterly % redemption limits. The fair values of the investments in this class have been estimated using the net asset value per share of the funds.
- c) This class currently includes two unique private equity limited partnerships that each invest in a variety of mostly private companies. These investments have a drawdown structure where a portion of commitments (which are made upon entering the partnership) are called gradually over the first 3-6 years of the partnership's life. It is expected that most of the unfunded commitments should be called within the next 6 years. These partnerships are illiquid and therefore do not have a redemption feature. Instead, the nature of the investments in this class is that distributions are received as the investment in the underlying companies are sold. It is estimated that the current underlying assets of these partnerships should be liquidated within the next 10 years. The investments are valued based on each partnership's valuation policy which is then subject to annual third party financial audits. Financial audits are available approximately 90 days following year end. Therefore, the valuation at year end reflects the latest reported manager valuation with adjustments for new capital calls and distributions.

Long-Term Debt

Scott & White's long-term debt obligations, excluding capital leases, are reported in the accompanying combined balance sheets at carrying value which totaled approximately \$1,109,475,000 at June 30, 2014. The fair value of these obligations is estimated based primarily on quoted market prices for related bonds and is therefore classified as Level 2. The fair value of Scott & White's long-term debt obligations, excluding capital leases totaled approximately \$1,177,417,000 at June 30, 2014.

4. ENDOWMENTS

Scott & White's endowments consist of donor-restricted and board-designated endowment funds for a variety of purposes. The net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions.

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

Scott & White has interpreted the Texas enacted version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, Scott & White classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by Scott & White in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by Texas law. In accordance with Texas law, if relevant, the organization considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- (1) The duration and preservation of the endowment fund
- (2) The purposes of the institution and the endowment fund
- (3) General economic conditions
- (4) The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- (5) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- (6) Other resources of Scott & White and
- (7) The investment policy of Scott & White.

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

Scott & White has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include donor-restricted assets that Scott & White must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period as well as board-designated funds. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Trustees, the endowment assets are invested among various asset classes to produce investment returns that exceed the price and yield results of the respective benchmark asset classes and peer groups while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. Actual returns in any given year vary.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, Scott & White relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). Scott & White oversees its investment portfolio through an Investment Committee of BSWH, and uses the recommendations of an independent investment consultant to manage the funds within the portfolio and review asset allocations.

Relationship of Endowment Spending Policies to Investment Objectives

The appropriation for expenditure in any year will not exceed BSWH's approved appropriation and spending rate. BSWH's approved appropriation and spending rate takes into account Scott & White's historical long-term rate of return on investments and Scott & White's policy of acting to preserve the purchasing power of the endowment fund. As such, BSWH's Board of Trustees has resolved that each fiscal year the lesser of 75% of an endowment fund's investment return or 5% of the invested fund balance of an endowment fund (as of the end of the previous fiscal year) may be appropriated for expenditure.

In establishing this policy, BSWH considered the long-term expected return on its endowment. Accordingly, over the long term, BSWH expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment to grow at a rate comparable to annual inflation. This is consistent with BSWH's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets.

On February 21, 2014, BHCS and SWH completed the substitution of each of their existing master trust indentures (the "Old MTIs") with a new Master Indenture of Trust and Security Agreement, dated February 1, 2014 (the "New MTI"), among BHCS, SWH, and other affiliates from time to time obligated thereunder, and the Bank of New York Mellon Trust Company, National Association, which secures all outstanding notes previously issued by BHCS and SWH under the Old MTIs. At the time of its execution and delivery the New MTI formed a single obligated credit group consisting of the following entities as Obligated Affiliates: BHCS, SWH, the Baylor University Medical Center (BUMC), a Texas nonprofit corporation, Baylor All Saints Medical Center, a Texas nonprofit corporation, Baylor Regional Medical Center at Grapevine, a Texas nonprofit corporation, Waxahachie, Baylor Regional Medical Center at Plano, a Texas nonprofit corporation, Scott & White Memorial Hospital, a Texas nonprofit corporation (SWMH), Scott & White Clinic, a Texas nonprofit corporation, Scott & White Hospital - Round Rock, a Texas nonprofit corporation, Scott & White Continuing Care Hospital, a Texas nonprofit corporation, and Hillcrest, a Texas nonprofit corporation.

Effective April 1, 2014, BSW Holdings was admitted as an Obligated Affiliate under the New MTI. In addition, effective April 8, 2014, BSW Holdings was appointed as the Combined Group Representative under the New MTI, replacing SWH in that role.

In March 2013, SWH issued Series 2013A Revenue Bonds with an aggregate principal of \$176,690,000. Simultaneous to the issuance of its Series 2013A bonds, SWH issued

Series 2013B Revenue Bonds. The Series 2013B bonds were issued as direct placement variable rate bonds. Proceeds of the Series 2013B bonds along with the majority of proceeds for the Series 2013A bonds were used to advance refund Series 2006 FHA Revenue Bonds. The remaining portion of the Series 2013A bonds were used to fund development and construction costs of various expansion and construction projects.

In March 2013, SWH issued the Series 2013C Revenue Bonds to refinance the Series 2008-2 bonds. Series 2013C bonds were issued as direct placement variable rate bonds.

In June 2010, SWH issued Series 2010 Revenue Bonds with a total par amount of \$345,775,000. The majority of the proceeds are being used to fund development and construction costs of various expansion and construction projects.

In June 2008, SWH issued \$236,395,000 of variable rate demand bonds in three subseries. In October 2010, the Series 2008-3 bonds were refunded with a tax-exempt note in the amount of \$56,225,000. In March 2013, the Series 2008-2 bonds were refunded with the Series 2013C bonds. The direct-pay letters of credit associated with the Series 2008-2 and 2008-3 bonds were terminated at the time of the 2013 refunding. The irrevocable direct-pay letter of credit associated with the Series 2008-1 bonds was replaced in April 2011 and is scheduled to expire on April 11, 2015.

In August 2008, SWH issued the Series 2008A Revenue Bonds with a total par amount of \$172,425,000. Proceeds were used to advance refund the outstanding principal of the Series 2000B and Series 2001 Revenue Bonds and pay costs of issuance of the Series 2008A Revenue Bonds.

6. INTEREST RATE SWAP AGREEMENTS

At June 30, 2014, Scott & White has interest rate swap agreements with a total notional amount of \$480,475,000. Five of the seven fixed payer interest rate swap agreements are associated with the Series 2008-1 bonds, the Series 2013C bonds, and a variable rate tax-exempt note executed in October 2010.

At June 30, 2014, a letter of credit, for an amount not to exceed \$50,000,000, was available for collateral support related to the three fixed forward swap agreements outstanding at that date. The counterparty holds the undrawn letter of credit, and an actual draw would only be initiated if an event of default or a termination event occurs and is continuing. As of June 30, 2014, no amounts have been drawn on the letter of credit. The letter of credit expires on August 25, 2014.

Net settlement payments on interest rate swap agreements totaled approximately \$10,838,000 for the ten months ended June 30, 2014. Net settlement payments and the change in fair value on interest rate swap agreements are reported in interest rate swap activity in the nonoperating section of the consolidated statements of operations. The fair value of interest rate swap agreements is reported in long-term liabilities on the consolidated balance sheet. The change in the fair value of interest rate swap agreements is included as a line item on the consolidated statement of cash flows.

7. NET PATIENT CARE REVENUE

Scott & White has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to Scott & White at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per case, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient care revenue (exclusive of charity care – see Note 8) is recognized at the time service is rendered and is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated contractual adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors.

Contractual adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. These contractual adjustments are related to the Medicare and Medicaid programs and managed care contracts. Scott & White offers a 25% discount to uninsured patients and an additional 25% discount for prompt payment.

Net patient care revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 41% of total net patient care revenue for the ten months ended June 30, 2014. Net patient care revenue from managed care contracts accounted for approximately 41% of total net patient care revenue for the ten months ended June 30, 2014. Net patient care revenue from other payors accounted for approximately 18% of total net patient care revenue for the ten months ended June 30, 2014.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and are subject to interpretation. Federal regulations require the submission of annual cost reports covering medical costs and expenses associated with services provided to program beneficiaries. Medicare and Medicaid cost report settlements are estimated in the period services are provided to beneficiaries. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. For the ten months ended June 30, 2014, patient service and premium revenue increased approximately \$13,876,000, due to changes in allowances previously estimated as a result of the final settlements for years that are no longer subject to audits, reviews, or investigations. Scott & White believes that it is in compliance with all applicable Medicare and Medicaid laws and regulations and is not aware of any pending or threatened investigations involving allegations of potential wrongdoing.

During the ten months ended June 30, 2014, SWH and certain other Scott & White hospitals individually participated in the Section 1115 Demonstration entitled "Texas Healthcare Transformation and Quality Improvement Program" (Waiver Program). Scott & White hospitals participated in the Waiver Program through certain indigent care affiliation agreements, the Bell County Health Collaborative, Williamson County and Cities Heath District, Coryell County Memorial Hospital Authority, Washington County, Llano County and Llano Hospital Authority. SWH, on behalf of Scott & White Memorial Hospital is a party to the Bell County Health Collaborative Affiliation. Hillcrest Baptist Medical Center is a party to the Coryell County Memorial Hospital Authority Affiliation.

During the ten months ended 2014, certain Scott & White hospitals participated in the Medicaid Section 1115 waiver program entitled "Texas Healthcare Transformation and

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

Quality Improvement Program" (Waiver Program). The Waiver Program provides for two pools of Medicaid supplemental funding (an uncompensated care pool and a delivery system reform incentive pool).

SWH, on behalf of Scott & White Memorial Hospital, is a party to the Bell County Healthcare Collaborative and under this agreement participates in the Waiver Program.

Hillcrest Baptist Medical Center is a party to the McLennan Area Clinical Services Affiliation and under this agreement participates in the Waiver Program.

Round Rock Hospital is a party to the Williamson County and Cities Services Affiliation and under this agreement participates in the Waiver Program.

Brenham Hospital is a party to the Washington County Affiliation and under this agreement participates in the Waiver Program.

As recipients of Waiver Program payments, these Scott & White hospitals are subject to extensive federal and state laws, regulations, conditions of participation, and certification requirements.

For the ten months ended 2014, Scott & White hospitals received Waiver Program payments totaling approximately \$15,301,000, which amount is recognized as net patient care revenue. Any anticipated additional amounts are recorded as other receivables in the accompanying balance sheet.

Scott & White hospitals also voluntarily participate in nonprofit corporations (established by the Scott & White hospitals and other private hospitals) to provide professional services to indigent and other needy patients under certain services agreements, with compensation set in advance, consistent with fair market value, and commercially reasonable for the services performed. For the ten months ended June 30, 2014, Scott & White hospitals provided approximately \$4,958,000 to the nonprofit corporations for services performed under the various services agreements, which amount is recorded as other operating expenses in the combined statement of operations and changes in net assets.

In a letter dated September 30, 2014 to the Texas Health and Human Services Commission ("THHSC"), the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services ("CMS") announced that it is deferring the federal share (Federal Financial Participation ("FFP")) of Waiver Program uncompensated care payments to hospitals that are parties to indigent care affiliation agreements in certain counties. While Scott & White Hospital – Llano and Scott & White Hospital – Round Rock were included in CMS's original deferral list of private hospitals,

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

THHSC reports that these hospitals were erroneously included and have been removed from the deferral list. CMS reserves the right to include other hospitals and affiliation agreements in the deferral process.

8. CHARITY CARE

Scott & White provides care for patients who lack financial resources and are deemed medically or financially indigent. Because Scott & White does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts have been removed from net patient care revenue as described in Note 7. The charges related to this care along with estimates for possible future charity care write-offs related to current accounts receivable totaled approximately \$197,877,000. The estimated direct and indirect cost of providing these services, calculated using the ratio of patient care cost to gross patient charges, was approximately \$49,330,000 for the ten months ended June 30, 2014. In addition, Scott & White provides services through government-sponsored indigent health care programs (such as Medicaid) to other indigent patients.

Scott & White also commits time and resources to endeavors and critical services which meet otherwise unfilled community needs. Many of these activities are entered into with the understanding that they will not be self-supporting or financially viable. The expenditures for medical research activities and direct medical education are reported in Note 10.

9. EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLANS

Defined Contribution Plans

Scott & White provides defined contribution plans to eligible employees. There are three types of primary contributions to these plans: employer automatic contributions, employee contributions, and employer matching contributions. Employer automatic contributions are based on a percentage of each participant's compensation and can vary based on years of service.

Employer matching contributions are based on each participant's contribution to his or her plan account each payroll period. Scott & White's contribution expense to its defined contribution plans was approximately \$47,728,000 for the ten months ended June 30, 2014.

Defined Benefit Plans

Scott & White has two defined benefit retirement plans at June 30, 2014. These two defined benefit retirement plans are collectively referred to herein as the Pension Plans. The Pension Plans were frozen as of March 31, 2009 and June 30, 2010. Benefits under the Pension Plans are based on each employee's years of service and compensation computed as of the date the Pension Plans were frozen.

Notes to Combined Financial Statements - continued

ASC 715, "Compensation – Retirement Benefits, " requires Scott & White to recognize the funded status (i.e., the difference between the fair value of plan assets and the benefit obligation) of its defined benefit pension and other postretirement benefit plans in the accompanying combined balance sheet with a corresponding adjustment to unrestricted net assets. The net unrecognized actuarial losses and unrecognized prior service benefits are recognized as a component of future net periodic cost pursuant to Scott & White's policy for amortizing such amounts. Further, actuarial gains and losses that arise in subsequent periods and are not recognized as net periodic pension cost in the same periods are recognized as other changes in unrestricted net assets. Those amounts are recognized as a component of net periodic cost.

Other Postretirement Benefits

Certain Scott & White employees participate in Scott & White's medical postretirement benefit plan. This plan provides medical and dental benefits to retirees who meet specific eligibility requirements upon retirement. The plan is unfunded and requires covered retirees to contribute a portion of the cost of benefits based on age at retirement and years of service. Scott & White uses an incremental cost approach in estimating the annual accrued cost related to the postretirement benefit plan, which is based on estimates by independent actuaries. Such an approach is considered appropriate since substantially all of the health care benefits are provided by Scott & White to retirees, using SWHP to manage the care provided.

The Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement, and Modernization Act of 2003 introduced a prescription drug benefit under Medicare (Medicare Part D), as well as a federal subsidy to sponsors of retiree health care benefit plans that provide a benefit that is at least actuarially equivalent to Medicare Part D. Scott & White has not made the determination that the prescription drug benefit provided by its medical postretirement benefit plan is actuarially equivalent to the benefit provided by Medicare Part D. Therefore, the measures of the accumulated benefit obligation or net periodic benefit cost do not reflect any amounts associated with the federal subsidy.

The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government healthcare program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, physician ownership and self-referral, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Government activity has continued with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statues and regulations by healthcare providers. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government healthcare programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed.

Management believes that Scott & White is in compliance with applicable fraud and abuse laws and regulations as well as other applicable federal and state laws and regulations.

12. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Baylor Scott & White Assurance SPC

On July 1, 2014, (i) Health Care Insurance Company of Texas, Ltd. (HCICT), a Cayman Islands company whose sole shareholder was BHCS, merged into Scott & White Assurance Ltd. (SWAL), a Cayman Islands company whose sole shareholder was acting by and through its Board of Trustees and in connection with such merger, the shares of HCICT held by BHCS were cancelled; (ii) following which SWAL was re-registered as a Cayman Islands segregated portfolio company and changed its name to Baylor Scott & White Assurance SPC (BSWA); (iii) following which SWMH distributed the shares of BSWA held by it to its sole member SWH, following which SWH distributed such shares to its sole member BSW Holdings, following which BSW Holdings contributed such shares to BHCS, following which BHCS contributed such shares to BUMC which, as a result of such transactions, became the sole shareholder of BSWA.

Interest Rate Swaps

Effective July 30, 2014, BSWH consolidated its separate International Swaps and Derivatives Association (ISDA) agreements with Goldman Sachs Bank USA (Goldman) and related swap portfolios at BHCS and SWH under a single BSWH ISDA. This required the negotiation and development of a new BSWH ISDA and the subsequent novations of each of the Goldman swaps under the legacy BHCS and SWH ISDA's to the new BSWH ISDA with an aggregate notional amount of \$250,155,000.

Effective August 29, 2014, SWH novated a portion (cash flows through August 15, 2022) of two swaps with JP Morgan to Wells Fargo. The residual remaining cash flows (from September 15, 2022 through August 15, 2045) remain at JP Morgan.

Effective October 23, 2014, BHCS novated the two SWH swaps with Wells Fargo (originally novated from JP Morgan to Wells Fargo on August 29, 2014) from the SWH ISDA to the BHCS ISDA. Concurrent with this novation, the Wells Fargo collateral thresholds under the BHCS CSA were increased to accommodate the novated swaps.

Management has evaluated subsequent events through November 12, 2014, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.
