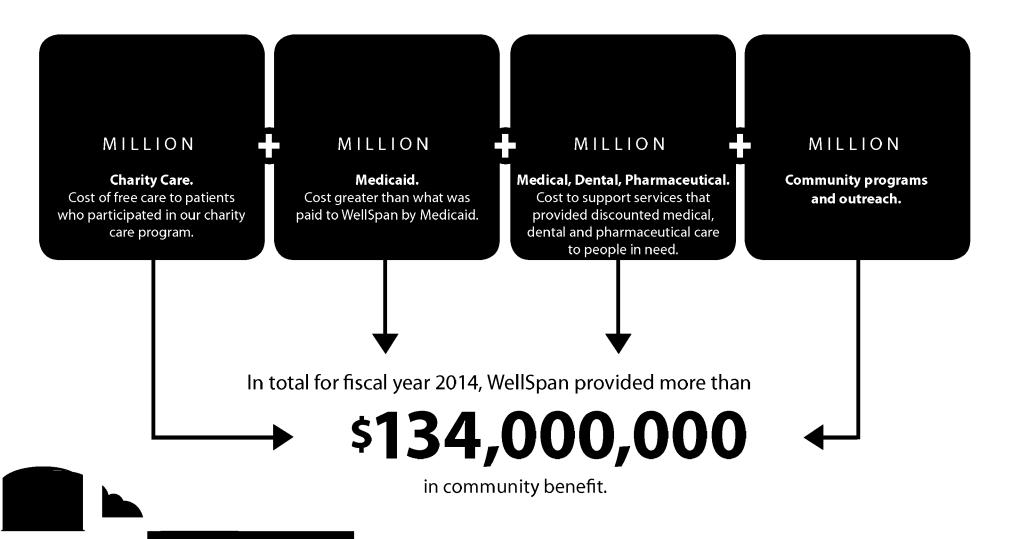

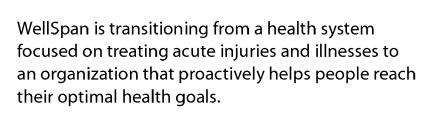

By doing so, WellSpan will make a difference in the health and quality of life of the individuals and communities it serves for generations to come.

In the near future, WellSpan will measure success by improving health outcomes, patient satisfaction and quality while simultaneously managing costs among three major patient



segments: those who are well, those who are chronically ill, and those who are acutely ill or injured.

This type of change requires a new approach to caring for individuals that includes redesigning components of the health system to assess the health of the individual and community, optimally treat chronic disease and efficiently treat people with acute illnesses and injuries. At the same time it encourages and empowers consumers to improve their own health through information, selfcare and a relationship with a primary care provider that assumes accountability for their health across the lifespan.

From 'my' patient to 'our' patient: How new models are transforming care

Improving the health of individuals and communities across Central Pennsylvania, WellSpan Health has established patient-centered medical homes (PCMHs) in its primary care practices.

The PCMH model engages providers to partner with patients to help them achieve their health goals — rather than merely treat patients when they have illnesses or injuries.

"This is a paradigm shift in health care," noted Karen Jones, MD, FACP, vice president and chief medical officer of the WellSpan Medical Group. "It's very different from the way we practiced medicine in the last century. Before, physicians concentrated on patients who came to the office seeking care, and there wasn't much focus on patients who weren't present. Now, WellSpan Health is transforming care delivery to optimize the health of individual patients and populations. Patients and families are engaged with a care team led by the primary care provider to optimize their health during the visit and between office visits. For example, if a patient is overdue for needed care, we'll send them a letter or give them a call.

We take every opportunity to make sure patients are up-to-date on their medical care."

In today's evolving healthcare landscape, the PCMH model allows for better care delivery than traditional methods.

"I've been in primary care for 30 years, and the days when a primary care physician could provide all necessary services are gone," said Thomas McGann, MD, senior vice president of clinical practice at WellSpan Health and president "... the days when

of the WellSpan Medical Group. "Innovations and regulatory measures associated with seeing patients are being introduced at an increasingly rapid pace, and one physician can't do everything alone. WellSpan's philosophy incorporates other providers and staff members who can ease the burden on the physician and distributes responsibility for patient health across all members on the care team."

Everyone is on board

Although the PCMH model differs in some key respects from traditional healthcare practices, it maintains the bedrock principle of strong relationships between primary care provider and patient. However, the provider has more in-office resources to facilitate better care delivery.

For example, when a patient signs in for an appointment, frontdesk personnel provide patients with a personalized patient report generated from their electronic health record (EHR). This report identifies any necessary preventive screenings, immunizations or

blood tests. The clinical staff then discusses the information with patients before the provider goes into the exam room.

After the appointment, the same personnel gauge patient reactions to provider recommendations. Patients are frequently concerned about expensive medications, and if staff members believe a prescription may go unfilled, they introduce patients to social workers who can help find solutions.

Within the past two years, WellSpan has introduced care coordination teams made up of health coaches, case managers and social workers to support the work of the Patient Centered Medical Home. Health coaches are embedded in a primary care practice to help physicians coordinate the various services that patients require. If, for example, family members feel they can no longer care for an ill loved one, the care coordination team will work with the family to arrange the necessary in-home services or placement in an extended care facility.

When this situation arises in the office setting, it can be the most challenging kind of patient visit you can have," Dr. McGann noted. "It has traditionally been our responsibility as physicians to mobilize resources and information for the patient. This might mean organizing hospital admissions, finding nursing homes or making referrals — all while your waiting room is packed with other patients. In the old days, these situations ended with hospital admissions, where further care could be arranged. In these situations, WellSpan's health coaches and their connections to hospital-based care coordinators are a tremendous advantage. They make all the arrangements seamlessly without the need for admission."

Putting the pieces together

According to a patient's needs, a healthcare team is assembled to help the patient manage their care in an efficient and effective manner. As a result, chronic conditions are treated optimally, and the need for emergency room visits and readmissions is sharply reduced.

While the primary care office serves as the patient's medical home, this team engages with highly skilled specialists and other essential providers across the system in a coordinated fashion.

"Healthcare often requires a multidisciplinary approach, and the next ring of services outside the primary care office is the patient-centered medical neighborhood," Dr. McGann said. "Across our health system, we've improved the connection between the home and neighborhood models."

The medical neighborhood may include cardiologists, orthopedists, endocrinologists, surgeons or other specialists, and WellSpan ensures smooth patient transitions from one provider to another.

"In the past, each specialist had a separate chart," Dr. McGann said. "This created a lack of consensus in the overall care plan and could cause complications if, for instance, medications interacted. By bringing each WellSpan physician onto the same EHR and instituting a messaging system on which physicians can communicate asynchronously, we've significantly improved communication among specialties."

Providers in WellSpan's Patient Centered Medical Home and Neighborhood also coordinate vital, community-based services that patients may require.

"The idea of partnership extends beyond the provider and patient relationship," Dr. Jones said. "We have forged strong relationships with multiple agencies and organizations to enhance the quality of local healthcare."

As part of its PCMH initiative, WellSpan has established a broad network, including partnerships with the Area Agency on Aging, local nursing homes, and other hospitals and emergency rooms. Independent physicians are also invited to integrate their services into the patient-centered medical neighborhood.

"Transforming to a PCMH is a journey," Dr. Jones said. "We've made stepwise progress in transitioning to this model. One of the basic tenets of the PCMH is a philosophical adjustment, in which 'my' patient becomes 'our' patient. We realize this requires a team effort, and since 2009, we've added components from across the health care continuum to achieve our vision."

Patient engagement

WellSpan physicians encourage patients to take ownership of their health and actively participate in decision-making.

"We emphasize the idea of healthcare as a partnership," Dr. Jones explained.

"Traditionally, physicians have been perceived as the sage leaders who know precisely what's needed to cure an ailment. While a physician's understanding of medical science is clearly an integral part of care, we also realize that no one knows the patient better than the patient."

Along with the responsibility that accompanies being the center of the care team, patient partners take part in shaping the processes and approach to continuous improvement that are integral to the delivery of care. They volunteer their time to attend meetings to improve quality measures and workflows, and as the "customers," their input has led to the institution of several changes to improve the patient experience across our organization.

For example, WellSpan physicians care for a large number of people with diabetes. In large endocrinology practices, previously only a few exam rooms had blood glucose meters, which caused a delay while nurses searched for one. Patients identified this as an area for improvement; now, there's a meter in every exam room.



"That's a great example of why the patient perspective is so important," said Dr. McGann. "It identifies little things that we as physicians can miss because we're focused on the medicine."

Making a difference

By engaging patients and aligning the resources of the care team, WellSpan's PCMH and neighborhood helps physicians concentrate on doing what they do best: caring for patients.

"This is an exciting new approach to delivering healthcare," Dr. Jones said. "Physicians and their care team are now able to manage patients and broader populations to improve the health of our communities."

WellSpan's efforts to transform care in 2014

WellSpan's efforts to transform care have resulted in redesign of the health experience of our patients. The Patient Centered Medical Home/Neighborhood (PCMH/N) model has supported the redesign of primary care in the practice and is beginning to transform the care of a larger "neighborhood" to soon include specialty and acute services. The following illustration outlines our progress:

Recognition

27 WellSpan Medical Group practices achieved recognition as National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA) Level 3 PCMH practices.

Coordinated

To support the transformation of care and advance care coordination, WellSpan has created several programs:

Care Coordination Teams (CCTs) to re-deploy hospital-based Case Management staff to a PCMH orientation;

Transitional Care Management (nurse practitioner) Home Visit Program for vulnerable patients with medical conditions on discharge from the hospital.

Bridges to Health, focusing on the extremely vulnerable patient population.

Performance

Performance improvement efforts are organized in a Learning Collaborative that consists of monthly webinar calls on key topics, performance improvement efforts and quarted educational and improvement dinners where activities are shared and celebrated.

Volunteerism

WellSpan worked with Aligning Forces for Quality to increase the presence of volunteer patient partners in WellSpan Medical Group practices. More than 70 trained Patient Partners throughout Adams, York and Lancaster are working directly with WellSpan primary, specialty and inpatient care providers in care improvement activities system-wide.

Grants

Working to expand the scope of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's grant-sup, PCMH collaborative to actively engaging specialty services (like Emergency care, Hospitalist, Endocrinology) and community services (like Area Agency on Aging) in evolution of the PCMH/N model.

Specialities

WellSpan is working to advance this care model across our regional system of care and to include other new practices, such as pediatrics. Additionally, we are incorporating other specialty services into a PCMH/N model such as behavioral health, home care and rehabilitation services.

MyWellSpan

Supporting care transformation, clinical technology improvements, such as the MyWellSpan secure, online patient portal, have made significant advances in patient health care self-management. Our progress includes:

More than 95,000 patients enrolled on MyWellSpan patient portal with access to medical records, online appointment scheduling, direct and secure physician messaging, test result reviewing and prescription refill orders.





Committed: How We Can Help

Every member of our community deserves the care they need

At WellSpan, it is our core belief that access to health care is one of the keys to a healthy community. Yet, in our region, there are still thousands of individuals who fall through coverage gaps and live without adequate health insurance.

This community health challenge cannot be ignored and requires careful planning and forethought. Fortunately, WellSpan has done both. We take measures to care for those who have no insurance and are unable to pay. We offer discounted care to individuals whose income falls within 300

percent of federal poverty guidelines. Additionally, all uninsured patients, regardless of whether they qualify for charity care, receive discounts similar to those offered by private insurance companies. We offer free care to patients who participate in our charity care program.

Together with our community partners, we support programs to take primary care and other outpatient services into urban and rural communities, improve access to oral health care and help people establish a "medical home" with a primary care physician.

Healthy Options program seeks to close the food gap

Low-income households receive vouchers for fresh fruits, vegetables and more

Experts call it the food gap. It affects families who earn too much for food stamps, but too little to shop nutritiously. The result is a diet of highly processed, unhealthy food.

A whopping 26 percent of Adams County families with children are caught in the food gap, reports the Adams County Food Policy Council, a task force of Healthy Adams County.

"When families are struggling to pay their bills for the month, the food budget is usually the first thing to get cut," explained Kathy Gaskin, executive director of Healthy Adams County. "At the grocery store, instead of buying fresh fruits and vegetables they're looking at canned food, which costs a little less."

Three years ago, WellSpan's Gettysburg Hospital Foundation began funding an innovative program called Healthy Options. It seeks to close the food gap, and support local farmers in the process.

Through Healthy Options, low-income households receive vouchers for fresh fruits, vegetables, breads and meats at participating Adams County farmers' markets. The program targets families who do not qualify for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), more commonly known as food stamps. They receive \$40 in vouchers each month to use at the farmers' markets.

Healthy Options also educates. Participants learn to grow and prepare their own food through a series of gardening classes, farm tours, and healthy cooking classes. Judy Alder, manager of community philanthropy at the Gettysburg Hospital Foundation, said her board of directors did not hesitate to approve funding for Healthy Options. "We are pleased to support a program like this because of the direct impact it is having on families, not only with the vouchers, but through the educational programs," Alder said.

This past year, Healthy Options helped 74 needy families. The program runs from June through September. Kathy Glahn, president of the Adams County Farmers' Market Association, said that few farmers' markets across the country participate in food assistance programs. Her group, however, views it as a special opportunity to not only serve the community, but also gain new customers.

Healthy Options and SNAP combine for more than 10 percent of sales, Glahn said. "Hopefully, after these families get through the rough patch in their lives, they will continue to think of the farmers' market as part of their weekly routine for shopping for fresh produce," she said.

Collaboration is vital to making an impact on our community health

At WellSpan, we wholeheartedly agree with the World Health Organization's assessment that health is "a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being, not merely the absence of disease or infirmity." WellSpan and York County Community Foundation create new EMS fund

WellSpan Emergency Services Fund intended to support regionalization efforts

WellSpan Health and the York County Community Foundation have partnered to create the WellSpan Emergency Services Fund, which is intended to encourage Emergency Medical Services (EMS) providers in York County to work toward a more coordinated, regional EMS system.

WellSpan donated \$500,000 to establish a fund at the foundation for this purpose. WellSpan hopes to grow the fund to \$1 million by encouraging new donations through an additional \$250,000 match.

"York County Community Foundation and WellSpan Health aim to facilitate and nurture a strong regional emergency medical response system in York County," said Keith Noll, president of WellSpan York Hospital and senior vice president, WellSpan. "We believe the best EMS model for York County is one that is led by the community," he added. "WellSpan has committed to ongoing support of regional solutions for EMS services."

The foundation's well-established and community-led grant process will serve as the funding mechanism for community providers of EMS that agree to collaborate toward a more regional EMS system for York County. The community foundation will solicit grant applications from eligible organizations. Those applications will be reviewed by a committee and approved by the foundation board of directors.

Grants will be made for purposes such as professional services, for start-up resources, and/or for the development of new and innovative collaborative projects in order to meet the emergency service needs of the community. Applicants and their proposed partner organizations must be either a non-profit and tax-exempt organization, or a unit of government or a public agency.

Applicants must demonstrate an interest in collaboration, the capacity to expand their core of service, and the ability to sustain the project post-grant.

In Adams County, WellSpan continues to provide Advanced Life Support services until a sustainable community model is developed and implemented. WellSpan is committed to supporting community leaders to ensure the high quality delivery of EMS services throughout Adams County now and into the future.

Community health initiatives WellSpan supported in 2014:

Healthy Adams County

Healthy Adams County is a partnership of community members dedicated to continuing assessment, development and promotion of efforts toward improving physical, mental and social well-being. The issues our efforts address include health literacy, healthy lifestyles, oral health, depression, children's health and nutrition, end of life planning and many more. Our progress in 2014:

- Held the first "Preparing through Life for End of Life" interactive resource fair in Adams County to increase awareness of end of planning and available community resources;
- Developed a "Healthy Choices for Kids" menu program for local restaurants to address obesity;
- Began a sub-committee of the Behavioral Health Task Force to focus on suicide prevention primarily targeting adult males;
- Successfully completed the third annual "Healthy Options" program, a voucher program for qualified residents to shop at the Adams County Farmers Market Association Markets; and
- Held the seventh annual Adams County Health Summit focused on understanding your health care for more than 100 health and human services professionals and community residents.



Healthy York County Coalition

Sometimes healthier living starts with simple behavior changes

At WellSpan, we recognize that unhealthy behaviors can harm an individual, a family and an entire community. We also recognize that simple behavior changes and access to the right information can make all the difference in promoting lifelong wellness. That's why we create, support and contribute to numerous programs designed to lay the groundwork for healthier living.



Smoking-cessation efforts prove to be life-saving

Steve Colamarino of Sinking Spring, Pa. smoked for 40 years. His wife, Sarah, smoked for 30. They tried to quit in the past and failed. This time would be different, they said.

They enrolled in the tobacco cessation program at WellSpan Ephrata Community Hospital's Wellness Center. Then came an unexpected turn.

Each week, while tobacco treatment specialist Sharon Czabafy addressed the class, CPR coordinator Tracy Van Marter sat in the back and recorded vital signs. Van Marter took Steve's blood pressure. "She told me, 'You've got to get to the doctor,'" he said. He began immediate treatment for a variety of cardiovascular problems, the byproducts of a lifetime of smoking. "Everything was coming to a head," Czabafy remembered. "He was a walking time bomb."

The critical situation was all too familiar to Czabafy. She's seen it many times during her 12 years of tobacco counseling. "People just don't realize that smoking is interrelated with every other chronic disease," she said. "Nicotine is the most addictive drug known to humankind. It's more addictive than heroin and cocaine."

Steve and Sarah continued the seven-week program. When it came time to bid a final farewell to tobacco, Sarah chose the help of a nicotine patch. Steve couldn't use any aids because of his health.

The Ephrata program follows CDC guidelines for effective tobacco cessation. Roughly half of all participants remain smoke free three months later. Steve struggled, but he remembered the tips from class: Avoid situations that trigger urges. Focus on alternate activities. Eat right.

In January, the retired truck driver underwent an open-heart procedure by Larry Shears, II, MD, of WellSpan Cardiothoracic Surgery. It was a complete success.



Today, Steve and Sarah are still tobacco free. Steve's health improves a little more each day. He has begun a vigorous walking regimen, and he revels in the strength returning to his body. He credits the program with saving his life, and for finally making it smoke free. "If it wasn't for the class, I don't think I would have succeeded," he said. "The classes are awesome," Sarah echoed. The urge creeps up occasionally, she admits, but now she knows how to defeat it.

"The average smoker quits seven times before they stay quit," noted Czabafy. She said Steve and Sarah offer further proof that even lifelong smokers can win. "It's never too late, and there is always help available," she said. "You don't have to do it alone."

Injury Prevention

Pregnancy

WellSpan Ephrata Community Hospital participates in Healthy Beginnings Plus, a state-funded program that assists pregnant women who are eligible for Medical Assistance to have a positive prenatal care experience. Healthy Beginnings Plus blends comprehensive clinical care with group learning sessions, and it includes a care team of obstetricians, nurses and midwives, a social worker, a dietitian and a dental hygienist. The program also receives regular support from hospital employees and area residents, who donate baby supplies and handmade items.

Tobacco

Tobacco education and cessation activities at WellSpan York Hospital and WellSpan Gettysburg Hospital.

Our progress:

Managed: Chronic Care

Living better with a chronic illness

For 125 million Americans, chronic illness is a never-ending problem that in many cases limits their lives, their sense of freedom and joy. Yet, with prevention, education, detection, treatment and care, many of these chronic conditions can be managed and even alleviated.

Clearly, a better life is a better plan. To help achieve it, WellSpan works with individuals across south central Pennsylvania and northern Maryland on a variety of services and programs conceived and designed to improve the lives of those with chronic illness.

Innovative program bridges patients' gaps in health care

Historically, the American health care system focused on treating acute illnesses and injuries, most often in a hospital setting.

The new emphasis, however, is on managing the health of populations. That requires a very different approach and new skills. WellSpan's Bridges to Health is a cutting-edge program for "high utilizers," people with more ED visits and hospitalizations than others with similar problems.

"These patients are consuming more health care resources than appear to be in their—or the community's—best interest," said Chris Echterling, M.D., the Bridges to Health medical director.

His team seeks out high utilizers, tries to learn the circumstances that have led to this situation and works with the patient to figure out a better plan moving forward.

Determining the patient's goals and how those goals can be addressed as opposed to seeing the patient as simply "non-compliant" is a foundational principal of the Bridges to Health's approach.

"Our patients have legitimate medical problems, but it usually becomes pretty clear that other issues are complicating their ability to deal with those medical problems," said Echterling, who is also the WellSpan Medical Group's associate medical director for quality and innovation, and medical director of the Healthy York Network.

"Often there is a history of loss or trauma in their lives, which has made it difficult for them to build trusting relationships," he explained. "Sometimes their priority is not their diabetes, but other issues like the grandchild for whom they have sole responsibility."



High utilizers typically share a common thread: they've fallen into a health care gap. "In almost every situation it seems that despite our best efforts, we as a health system have not communicated very clearly with the patient, or with one another," Echterling said.

Bridges to Health spans those gaps. Its physicians, nurses, and social workers do whatever is necessary to restore effective care. They visit patients' homes. They solve transportation and insurance problems. They sit in on specialist appointments, ensuring good communication. It's slow, arduous work, but it can help interrupt the cycle of high utilization.

Most patients, since joining the program, have significantly reduced their ED visits and hospital stays. Some patients have been transitioned back to their previous patient-centered medical home practice and the care of their primary care provider.

Bridges to Health shares space with the York Hospital Community Health Center at 605 S. George St. in York.

In addition, 24 screening event participants engaged in healthy eating cooking classes as a part of the For Heart Sake initiative. This initiative is led by a strong network of lay health leaders representing York City residents.





WellSpan Ephrata Community Hospital offers a 10-hour group instruction for patients diagnosed with diabetes. Recognized by the American Diabetes Association, this course meets national standards for diabetes self-management education and is covered by most insurance plans.

Care for the next generation of our community starts today

At WellSpan, we believe in the power of new ideas, new approaches, new discoveries and new people. That's why we sponsor programs that train the next generation of physicians, nurses and other clinical professionals. These programs allow us to stay abreast of new techniques to prevent, detect, diagnose and treat medical problems, and ensure an adequate supply of essential clinicians for the future.

Breast cancer patient glad to help others through clinical trial

New drug compared to the current standard treatment

This time last year, Vicki Wilson of Lititz had completed six months of chemotherapy for breast cancer, and she was preparing for a grueling regimen of 34 radiation therapy treatments.

Today, however, she's energetic and positive. She gardens, rides her quarter horse and trains two miniature horses to be therapy horses. Wilson, who was diagnosed with breast cancer in November 2012, visits Dr. Wilfred Layne and her radiation oncologist at WellSpan's Ephrata Cancer Center every three months. Her prognosis is good.

Prior to receiving chemotherapy, Layne asked Wilson if she would be interested in participating in a phase III clinical trial, which compares a new drug to the current standard treatment. Patients must meet specific criteria and give their consent to participate in a clinical trial. The clinical trial compares chemotherapy regimens with and without Anthracycline for patients with certain pathology testing results, according to Diane Noll, RN, clinical trials coordinator for the Ephrata Cancer Center.

The clinical trial program is part of WellSpan Ephrata Community Hospital's affiliation with Thomas Jefferson University Hospital. "If I could advance medicine, save sisters, help mothers and daughters, I felt I had an obligation to participate in the clinical trial," said Wilson, a 53-year-old mother of two. "I didn't feel that I would receive a lesser medication, or I was putting myself at risk," she added. "Participating in the clinical trial gave me a good feeling."

Wilson is one of approximately 700 patients who participate in nearly 250 clinical trials throughout WellSpan, according to Tara Moore, quality assessment specialist for research. WellSpan clinical trials are currently being conducted in the areas of oncology, cardiology, neurosciences, orthopedics, emergency medicine and medicine. "Clinical trials help us to develop better treatments," said Noll. "Without clinical trials, we wouldn't have the medications we do."



Each clinical trial goes through four phases before it can receive approval for general use. With the different phases and information review necessary for each trial, it is often years before a procedure, treatment, or therapy receives final approval.

WellSpan has a strong track record of conducting sponsored projects and participating in clinical trials. The Emig Research Center at WellSpan York Hospital provides comprehensive central administrative services for all of WellSpan. A research team works with physicians, nurses and patients to help facilitate enrollment in clinical trials, provide protocol therapy and detail collection of research data. Patients should check with their insurance companies to see if they cover clinical trials.

Wilson encourages other patients to participate in clinical trials, if they meet the criteria. "It's a great way to help others, and advance the field of medicine," she said. Wilson also praised the treatment she received at the Ephrata Cancer Center. "It sounds strange to say, but it was almost worth it to get breast cancer for the chance to know all the people who cared for me at the Ephrata Cancer Center. They are wonderful, caring and professional people."

The foundation board of directors has been meeting regularly since November 2013, and the foundation received its official tax-exempt status from the federal Internal Revenue Service in August 2014.

The Ephrata Community Health Foundation's mission statement is: "Working as one to improve health through exceptional care for all, lifelong wellness and healthy communities by growing philanthropy for WellSpan's charitable initiatives within Ephrata Community Hospital's service areas."

Gettysburg Hospital Foundation

In fiscal year 2014, Gettysburg Hospital Foundation participated in securing donations, grants and bequests totaling \$751,700. \$212,424 of these gifts came from grants. \$87,537 came from fundraising events, and the remainder came from individuals, corporations and organizations in the community. Our generous donors supported a range of projects and programs, including funds to support local patients in financial distress, such as the Adams Cancer Patient Help Fund and Mammography Help Fund; the purchase of METIman, an advanced patient simulator for clinical training; programs that

support children and their families through the Children's Health Fund; and an annual educational lectureship for clinicians and leadership conference for local youth.

York Health Foundation



Through the community support of events such as the hospital's annual Spirit of Hope Gala, the auxiliary is playing a lead role in funding the garden that will offer a beautiful new space for respite and restoration for those who gather or need to find time for solitude.



In fiscal year 2014, the York Hospital Auxiliary made their most generous pledge in history by pledging \$1 million to WellSpan York Hospital's Emergency Department Project for the creation of a Behavioral Health Unit. The Auxiliary raised more than \$50,000 at the Book Nook Bonanza to support the grants program. It also sponsored the 33rd annual Children's Wellness Days with more than 1,600 York County third graders in attendance. The Auxiliary awarded more than \$69,000 to WellSpan Health to support programs and equipment in York County, including the Women's Heart Program, the Young Women's Leadership Conference, Breast Cancer Awareness, Nursing Research, infant supplies for the York Hospital Community Health Center & Ob/Gyn Clinic, celling lifts, Cardiac Rehabilitation and the Perinatal Bereavement program to name just a few.



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


July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014

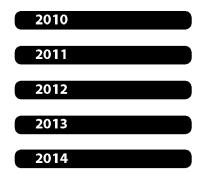

FREE CARE: BAD DEBT*



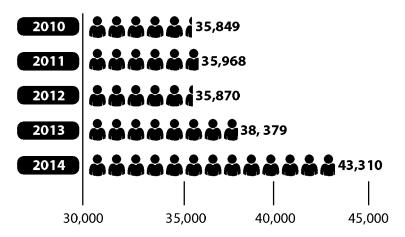

TOTAL HOSPITAL ADMISSIONS





(WellSpan Medical Group. 2014 included Northern Lancaster County Medical Group visits)




TOTAL SURGERY CASES*
