The mission of the Uncommon Individual Foundation (“UIF”) is to research, educate, activate, and encourage the use of mentoring in its original and most natural form. It is guided by the belief that every individual is singularly unique and has an identifiable *core strength*. Our research indicates that an individual’s self-defined success in life is ultimately realized by having *knowledge* of their core strength and *empowering* themselves with the *Passion* to use it in the development, pursuit and navigation of their self-defined *dreams*. We encourage each individual to engage in natural mentoring to “*Undertake the Enterprise of their Own Life*” to develop and pursue their *dreams* in order to accomplish their self-determined happiness

For over 25 years, the UIF has educated and trained individuals in scores of mentoring programs throughout the country. We originally used printed materials combined with in person instruction to educate train and encourage mentors, protégés and coordinators. We have produced over 50 training manuals, which have been distributed to thousands of participants who participate in ongoing training from the Foundation. We continue to do this work for organizations, governmental agencies and non-profit groups. About ten years ago, to supplement these efforts, we began planning, developing, and implementing technology applications to facilitate achievement of our core mission. High schools, universities, public and private foundations are utilizing our services by educating participants in the use of our web based applications. UIF is mentoring organizations and endowing them to utilize our self-developed resources with the goal being for each individual to become the “*Entrepreneur of the Enterprise of Their Own Life*” in order to achieve their self-defined success.

Based on our continuing research, we educate and actively stress, in contrast to conventional mentoring practice, that real mentoring is not limited to a one-to-one relationship with an assigned mentor. Successful protégés turn everyone and everything that can inspire and assist them into a mentoring resource. For mentoring relationships to have the best opportunity to succeed, they must ultimately become protégé-driven. We believe that it is imperative to encourage, educate and train both mentors and protégés on how to use this powerful understanding and application of mentoring for maximum success.

Our mentoring applications are designed to be tailored to the needs of the individual participant. Our methods are simple, should not require extensive staff time to implement, and yet will significantly increase the effectiveness of mentor/protégé relationships. Participants who use our applications are consistently enthusiastic about the mutual benefits received by both mentors and protégés. It is, in fact, this mutuality that brings success in implementing our mission.

Over the past ten years, the we have expended considerable time and money in planning, organizing, developing and beta-testing web based applications designed to achieve our core mission. This approach is designed to enable the UIF to continue to implement its mission using the Foundation's original concept of mentoring. Using all of our web-based tools (MentorSphere™, OnTrack™ to Post-Secondary Education, Discovery™, Happiness Pilot™ and Opti-Match™) each individual designs for themselves their own personal mentoring environment. Over the next several years we anticipate the need for a significant increase in our investment in this effort to meet our goal of having a fully standalone online mentoring environment.

Individual participants who desire to register and participate are endowed by the UIF to personally create their online mentoring environment and engage mentoring activity to identify and cultivate their mentoring resources. Participants are encouraged to engage these resources to form and focus their dreams and develop their passion to pursue them in their self-defined mentoring environment. Utilizing these tools, participants will have the ability to use personal inventory technology to identify their *core strength*, understand and engage their *value system*, *risk temperament*, *learning styles*, and other individual specific information to assist them in *forming, focusing and passionately pursuing their dreams* to achieve their *self defined personal success* (www.uif.org).

Our web-based approach is designed for individuals who wish to organize and use their self-designed mentoring environment. We do however continue to present in-person training sessions for groups that desire it. By continuing to implement its original in person mentoring education and training sessions together with its new web-based mentoring education and training applications, the UIF is positioned to be the most effective, modern, mentoring training organization in the United States.

With a firm belief in e-learning and mentoring education the UIF has engaged in significant development and investment in the following areas:

- (1) In November, 2011, we began investing heavily in human capital and technology to expand our programs to include entrepreneurial education in the form of open system and collaborative mentoring for aspiring entrepreneurs and future business owners.
- (2) In March of 2012,we began to invest resources in the development of the <http://dev.OnTrackpse.com/> web based platform that focuses on the importance of mentoring K-12 students towards the goal of post-secondary education as well as forming a lifelong plan. The OnTrack platform acts as a virtual mentoring environment that also relies heavily upon UIF consultants in the field and in the classroom to help students to understand how they can achieve the dream of post-secondary education and beyond.

- (3) We purchased state of the art E-learning and rich media based content development and delivery systems. We've produced over 300 online rich media based learning modules that are available to the public through the internet covering various mentoring and educational topics.
- (4) We have expanded our reach with regards to personal inventory technologies by investing heavily in the development and deployment of technology based personal assessment platforms. UIF is continuing this work with the development of <http://happinesspilot.com> which is a technology based platform consisting of several personal inventory technologies that assist individuals in understanding who they are and what makes them unique as individuals.
- (5) In addition to the development and implementation of our web-based education and mentoring platforms, we intend to invest heavily over the next several years in student based STEM education initiatives. Our first STEM initiative is based on aviation and all of the science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) that relates to aviation and the aviation industry. In 2013 students began the program by operating simulators and building a full scale aircraft kit.
- (6) We are also working to create an application for individuals to use Mentoring to develop their *brain* and *brain* activity in a positive way, to enable individuals to develop their own *dreams* and to then encourage them to pursue their own realistic personal success.
- (7) After a three year search we identified and purchased a building suitable to house our various activities. We anticipate the need to make modifications and improvements to the property in the coming years to adapt it to suitably house our numerous programs. This process began in 2014 and will continue for the next several years.

On May 9, 2013 we filed Form 8940 asking the IRS to approve the setting aside of funds sufficient to enable the purchase and renovation of a building in 2014. We were notified by letter dated July 31, 2014 that our request was approved. A building was purchased in March, 2014 and renovations have commenced. As of June 30, 2014 we have expended \$3,590,777 to purchase and renovate the facility. We will provide information regarding additional facility related expenditures as they are incurred by addendum to this mission statement or other attachments to be submitted with future tax returns.
