

A. Description of Organization

Organization

TriHealth exists under a Joint Operating Agreement (the Agreement) between Bethesda Hospital, Inc. and Subsidiaries (Bethesda), and The Good Samaritan Hospital of Cincinnati, Ohio (Good Samaritan) The Agreement provides for, among other things, the creation of TriHealth to operate and jointly manage Bethesda, Good Samaritan, and TriHealth, Inc. (the Affiliates) Good Samaritan and Bethesda each own 50% of TriHealth, Inc. The Good Samaritan Hospital Foundation and Bethesda Center Reproduction Health and Fertility, legally consolidated subsidiaries of Good Samaritan and Bethesda, respectively, are excluded from the combined TriHealth financial statements in accordance with the Agreement Bethesda Healthcare Inc., a subsidiary of Bethesda Inc., parent company to Bethesda, is included in the combined TriHealth financial statements in accordance with the Agreement

The combined financial statements include the results of the Affiliates and their respective subsidiaries, except as defined in the Agreement Within these notes, TriHealth will refer to all of the Affiliates, respectively, and altogether, unless the context indicates otherwise Discussions or areas of these notes that specifically pertain to only Bethesda, Good Samaritan, or TriHealth, Inc will be noted in the applicable note

TriHealth

Bethesda

Bethesda is an Ohio nonprofit corporation, a subsidiary of Bethesda, Inc, an Ohio nonprofit corporation recognized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) as a charitable organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC The mission of Bethesda is to provide health care and related services through its inpatient, outpatient, and community-based facilities and programs Bethesda has a long-term commitment to medical education through its support of the physician residency program and health care training programs for technicians, as well as patient education in disease management and awareness

The consolidated financial statements of Bethesda include the accounts of Bethesda Hospital, Inc., Senior Services, a division of Bethesda Hospital, Inc., and Hospice of Cincinnati Inc. and Subsidiary, and Bethesda Properties, Inc., subsidiaries of Bethesda Hospital, Inc.

Good Samarıtan

Good Samaritan is an Ohio nonprofit corporation Good Samaritan is a direct affiliate of Catholic Health Initiatives (CHI), a Colorado nonprofit corporation recognized by the IRS as exempt from income taxation under Section 501(a) of the IRC as a charitable organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC The mission of CHI is to nurture the healing ministry of the Catholic Church, bringing it new life, energy, and viability in the 21st century CHI is committed to fidelity to the Gospel, with emphasis on human dignity and social justice in the creation of healthier communities CHI is sponsored by a lay-religious partnership, calling on other Catholic sponsors and systems to unite to ensure the future of Catholic health care

The mission of Good Samaritan is to provide health care and related services through its inpatient, outpatient, and community-based facilities and programs Good Samaritan has a long-term commitment to medical education through its support of the physician residency program, health care training programs for technicians, and The Good Samaritan Hospital College of Nursing, as well as patient education in disease management and awareness

CHI, established in 1996, is a tax-exempt Colorado corporation, and has been granted an exemption from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC CHI sponsors market-based organizations and other facilities operating in 18 states, and includes 92 hospitals, including 4 academic medical centers, and 24 critical access facilities, community health service organizations, accredited nursing colleges, home health agencies, and other facilities that span the inpatient and outpatient continuum of care CHI also has an offshore captive insurance company, First Initiatives Insurance, Ltd (FIIL)

The consolidated financial statements of Good Samaritan include the accounts of The Good Samaritan Hospital of Cincinnati, Ohio, The Good Samaritan Hospital College of Nursing, The Good Samaritan Hospital Medical Office Building (a department of Good Samaritan), Community Limited Care Dialysis Center, The Good Samaritan Hospital Foundation, and The Good Samaritan Hospital Special Funds

Tr1Health, Inc.

TriHealth, Inc owns several physician corporations, TriHealth Hospital, Inc, and other health care-related entities TriHealth, Inc is comprised of primarily Ohio-based nonprofit corporations recognized by the IRS as exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(a) of the IRC as charitable organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC TriHealth Hospital, Inc has not yet been recognized as a Section 501(c)(3) organization by the IRS

The consolidated financial statements of TriHealth, Inc include the accounts of TriHealth Physician Enterprise Corp, TriHealth Physician Institute (collectively, TriHealth Physician Partners), TriHealth Hospital, Inc, and TriHealth Physician Solutions

B. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Principles of Combination

TriHealth prepares the combined financial statements and prepares consolidated financial statements at each of the Affiliates in accordance with US generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP), and records them on the accrual basis of accounting All material intercompany accounts and transactions are eliminated between the Affiliates upon combination of the TriHealth combined financial statements

Acquisitions

During 2014, TriHealth acquired certain assets of an endoscopy center, and a surgery center, for \$16,651 of cash paid at the time of closing These acquisitions were accounted for using the purchase method of accounting The purchase price was allocated to the assets acquired based on their determined fair value. There were no liabilities assumed with either transaction

On December 31, 2012, TriHealth, Inc acquired Evendale Medical Center, LLC (Evendale), an Ohio limited liability corporation, and placed its operations under the name TriHealth Hospital, Inc to further its geographic presence in the greater Cincinnati area. The main campus consists of ten operating rooms, twenty-nine inpatient rooms, and a complete imaging and diagnostic facility. Services range from inpatient surgery to orthopedics, gynecology, and outpatient imaging.

TriHealth, Inc paid cash of \$104,000 at the time of closing This business combination was accounted for using the purchase method of accounting The purchase price was allocated to the assets acquired based on their determined fair value. There were no liabilities assumed as of this transaction

The financial position of Evendale (subsequently recognized as TriHealth Hospital, Inc) is included in the combined TriHealth financial statements as of June 30, 2014 and 2013, and the results of its operations and its cash flows are included for the period from January 1, 2013 to June 30, 2013, and the year ended June 30, 2014 For the period from January 1, 2013 through June 30, 2013, the operations of Evendale contributed \$12,539 in operating revenue and \$(1,422) of excess of expenses over revenue to the TriHealth combined results of operations For the year ended June 30, 2014, the operations of Evendale contributed \$37,751 in operating revenue and \$3,381 of excess of revenue over expenses to the TriHealth combined results of operations

On an unaudited pro forma basis, had TriHealth owned Evendale at the beginning of fiscal year 2013 (July 1, 2012), Evendale would have contributed \$33,437 of operating revenue and \$6,415 of excess of revenue over expenses. However, unaudited pro forma information is not necessarily indicative of the historical results that would have been obtained had the transaction actually occurred on those dates, or of future results

Fair Value Measurements

TriHealth follows the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standard Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, (ASC 820), which defines fair value as the price that would be reached to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date and establishes a framework for measuring fair value ASC 820 defines a three-level hierarchy for fair value measurements based upon the transparency of inputs to the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date

ASC 820 emphasizes that fair value is a market-based measurement, not an entity-specific measurement. Therefore, a fair value measurement should be determined based on the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability. As a basis for considering market participant assumption in fair value measurements, and as noted above, ASC 820 defines a three-level fair value hierarchy that distinguishes between market participant assumptions based on market data obtained from sources independent of the reporting entity and the reporting entity's own assumptions about market participants. The fair value hierarchy is based upon the transparency of inputs to the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date.

The three levels are defined as follows

- Level 1 inputs utilize quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that TriHealth has the ability to access
- Level 2 inputs may include quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, as well as inputs that are observable for the asset and liability (other than quoted prices), such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates, and yield curves, that are observable at commonly quoted intervals
- Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability, which is typically based on an entity's own assumptions, as there is little, if any, related market activity

In instances where the determination of the fair value measurement is based on inputs from different levels of the fair value hierarchy, the level in the fair value hierarchy within which the entire fair value measurement falls is based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety TriHealth's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgment and considers factors specific to the asset or liability

In order to meet the requirements of ASC 820, TriHealth utilizes three basic valuation approaches to determine the fair value of its assets and liabilities required to be recorded at fair value. The first approach is the cost approach. The cost approach is generally the value a market participant would expect to replace the respective asset or liability. The second approach is the market approach. The market approach looks at what a market participant would consider an exact or similar asset or liability to that of TriHealth, including those traded on exchanges, to be valued at. The third approach is the income approach. The income approach uses estimation techniques to determine the estimated future cash flows of TriHealth's respective asset or liability expected by a market participant and discounts those cash flows back to present value (more typically referred to as a discounted cash flow approach)

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include all deposits with banks and investments in interest-bearing securities with maturity dates of 90 days or less from the date of purchase

Net Patient Accounts Receivable and Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient accounts receivable and net patient service revenue have been adjusted to the estimated amounts expected to be collected. These estimated amounts are subject to further adjustments upon review by third-party payors

The provision for bad debt is based upon management's assessment of historical and expected net collections, considering historical business and economic conditions, trends in health care coverage, and other collection indicators Management periodically assesses the adequacy of the allowances for uncollectible accounts based upon historical write-off experience. The results of these reviews are used to modify as necessary the provisions for bad debt, and to establish appropriate allowances for uncollectible net patient accounts receivable. Significant provision is made for self-pay patient accounts receivable in the period of service based upon historical write-off experience.

After satisfaction of amounts due from insurance, TriHealth follows established guidelines for placing certain patient balances with collection agencies, subject to the terms of certain restrictions on collection efforts as determined by TriHealth

Overall, the total write-offs of uncollectible accounts and allowances on self-pay patient accounts receivable has not significantly changed since June 30, 2013 TriHealth has not experienced significant changes in write-off trends, and has not changed its charity care policy since June 30, 2013 The overall allowance percentage for uncollectible accounts went from 52% at June 30, 2013 to 37% June 30, 2014, as a result of changes in payor mix due to the Affordable Care Act

Financial instruments that potentially subject TriHealth to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of nongovernmental patient accounts receivable TriHealth grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. TriHealth has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. The basis for payment under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates, cost reimbursement, negotiated discounts from established rates, and per diem payments. Patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party, payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments due to future audits, reviews, and investigations. The differences between the estimated and actual adjustments are recorded as part of net patient service revenue in future periods, as the amounts become known, or as the years are no longer subject to such audits, reviews, and investigations. TriHealth recognizes a significant amount of patient service revenue at the time the services are rendered even though it does not assess the patient's ability to pay

As a result, the provision for bad debt is presented as a deduction from patient service revenue, net of contractual provisions and discounts

Inventories

Inventories, primarily consisting of pharmacy drugs and medical and surgical supplies, are stated at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or market

Assets Limited as to Use and Investments

Investment income (including realized gains on investments, interest and dividends, and changes in net unrealized gains on investments designated as trading) is included in excess of revenue over expenses unless the income is restricted by donor or by law Investment income is distributed to participants of the respective investment programs based on earnings per pool unit or relative percentage allocation

The global financial markets and banking systems are subject to volatility, which could adversely impact TriHealth Certain of TriHealth's assets and liabilities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks

Good Samarıtan

Substantially all of Good Samaritan's assets limited as to use are held in the CHI Investment Program (the CHI Program) The CHI Program is structured under a Limited Partnership Agreement between CHI, as managing general partner, and each participant All assets limited as to use in the CHI Program are professionally managed under the administration of CHI Good Samaritan's investments in the CHI Program are represented by pool units rather than specific securities Investments in the CHI Investment Program are accounted for similarly to the equity method of accounting

The CHI Investment Committee of the Board of Stewardship Trustees (CHI Investment Committee) is responsible for determining asset allocations among cash and cash equivalents, marketable debt securities, marketable equity securities, and alternative investments Alternative investments consist of hedge funds, private equity funds, and other securities organized as limited liability companies and partnerships At least annually, the CHI Investment Committee reviews targeted allocations and, if necessary, makes adjustments to targeted asset allocations

Bethesda

Substantially all of Bethesda's assets limited as to use are held in the Bethesda Master Trust (the Trust) which is professionally managed under the administration of Bethesda, Inc (and the Bethesda Investment Committee) Bethesda's investments are represented by percentage allocation rather than specific securities Investments in the Trust are accounted for similarly to the equity method of accounting

Assets limited as to use and investments held outside the CHI Program and the Trust include cash and cash equivalents, marketable equity securities, and marketable debt securities

TriHealth's assets limited as to use and investments include assets set aside for future long-term purposes, including capital improvements, amounts contributed by donors with stipulated restrictions, and trustee-held funds under professional liability funding arrangements

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at historical cost or, if donated or impaired, at fair market value at the date of receipt or determination Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable assets, which range from 2 to 40 years, and is computed using the straight-line method. For property and equipment under capital lease, amortization is determined over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the property and equipment, and is included in depreciation and amortization expense. Interest cost, if any, incurred during the period of construction of major capital projects is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. Depreciation expense was \$72,007 and \$63,833 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, and is included in depreciation and amortization expense.

The cost and related accumulated depreciation of property and equipment that is sold or retired are removed from the respective accounts, and the resulting gain or loss is recorded in other revenue, net Select property and equipment of \$1,467 and \$1,822, respectively, as of June 30, 2014 and 2013, purchased prior to year end, is excluded from the additions to property and equipment, net in the combined statements of cash flows, as cash payment was not made as of the end of the year

Investments in Unconsolidated Organizations

TriHealth maintains an ownership percentage of 50% or less in various joint ventures and other companies that do not require consolidation. These investments are accounted for using the equity method of accounting

Goodwill and Intangible Assets, Net

Net Assets

Unconditional promises to receive cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received Conditional promises and indications of donors' intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the conditions are met or the gifts are received All unrestricted contributions are included in the excess of revenue over expenses as other revenue, net Other gifts are reported as temporarily restricted if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as donation revenue when restricted for operations or as unrestricted net assets when restricted for property and equipment Temporarily restricted net assets are primarily restricted for strategic capital projects, and in support of TriHealth's mission

Charity Care

As an integral part of its mission, TriHealth accepts and treats all patients without regard to the ability to pay Services to patients are classified as charity care in accordance with established criteria Charity care represents services rendered for which partial or no payment is expected and, as such, is not included in net patient service revenue in the combined statement of operations and changes in net assets. The estimated direct and indirect costs of charity care, quantified as the cost of free or discounted health services provided to persons who cannot afford to pay, was \$25,079 and \$37,900 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively Charity care costs are estimated based on multiplying the ratio of costs to gross charges for all payments not attributable to other community benefits programs by the revenue recognized and written off for health services provided to persons who cannot afford to pay. The Ohio Hospital Care Assurance Program (HCAP) provides some reimbursement to TriHealth for services provided to qualified persons who cannot afford to pay. The amount of net HCAP reimbursements was \$5,019 and \$5,150 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013

Other Revenue, Net

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 established incentive payments under the Medicare and Medicaid programs for certain professionals and hospitals that meaningfully use certified electronic health record technology Payments under the program are calculated based upon estimated discharges, charity care, and other input data, and are predicated upon TriHealth's attainment of program and attestation criteria and are subject to regulatory audit TriHealth has opted to follow a grant accounting method, which provides for ratable recognition over the respective attestation period As a result, TriHealth estimated and recognized revenue of \$7,111 and \$18,677 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively This amount is included in other revenue, net in the accompanying combined statement of operations and changes in net assets The amount recognized is subject to change, with such changes impacting operations in the period in which they occur

Other revenue, net includes meaningful use revenue, cafeteria revenue, rental income, auxiliary and gift shop revenue, gains and losses on the sale or disposal of property and equipment, and revenue from other miscellaneous sources

Excess of Revenue Over Expenses

The combined statements of operations and changes in net assets includes the line titled excess of revenue over expenses which represents the operating indicator for TriHealth Consistent with industry practice, changes in net assets which are excluded from the excess of revenue over expenses include the change in plan assets and benefit obligation of its pension plans, transfers to parent organizations, temporarily restricted contributions and investment income, and other changes in net assets

Federal Income Taxes

Bethesda, excluding Bethesda Properties, Inc , is comprised of entities that have been recognized by the IRS as exempt from income taxation under Section 501(a) of the IRC as charitable organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC Bethesda Properties, Inc is recognized by the IRS as exempt from income taxation under Section 501(a) of the IRC as a title-holding corporation described in Section 501(c)(2) of the IRC

TriHealth, Inc , excluding TriHealth Physician Solutions, Inc and certain entities of TriHealth Physician Institute, is comprised of entities that have been recognized by the IRS as exempt from income taxation under Section 501(a) of the IRC as charitable organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC TriHealth Physician Solutions, Inc and certain entities of TriHealth Physicians Institute are treated as corporations for federal income tax purposes, and thus are directly subject to income taxation TriHealth Hospital, Inc has not yet been recognized by the IRS as tax exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) The provision for federal income taxes is not significant to TriHealth

Litigation

During the normal course of business, TriHealth may become involved in litigation Management assesses the probable outcome of unresolved litigation and records estimated settlements. After consultation with legal counsel, management believes that any such matters will be resolved without material adverse impact to the combined financial position or results of operations of TriHealth

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the combined financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported and disclosed amounts of assets, liabilities, revenue, and expenses Actual results could vary from those estimates

Healthc are Regulatory Environment

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, and government health care program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Management believes TriHealth is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations of the Medicare and Medicaid programs. Compliance with such laws and regulations is complex, and can be subject to future governmental interpretation, as well as significant regulatory action, including fines, penalties, and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications were made to the 2013 combined financial statement presentation to conform to the 2014 presentation

C. Community Benefit (Unaudited)

In accordance with its mission and philosophy, TriHealth commits substantial resources to sponsor a broad range of services to both the poor, as well as the broader, community Community benefit provided to the poor includes the cost of providing services to persons who cannot afford health care due to inadequate resources and/or who are uninsured or underinsured This type of community benefit includes the costs of traditional charity care, unpaid costs of care provided to beneficiaries of Medicaid and other indigent public programs, services such as free clinics and meal programs for which a patient is not billed or for which a nominal fee has been assessed, and cash and in-kind donations of equipment, supplies, or staff time volunteered on behalf of the community

Community benefit provided to the broader community includes the costs of providing services to other populations who may not qualify as poor, but may need special services and support This type of community benefit includes the costs of services such as health promotion and education, health clinics, and screenings, all of which are not billed or can be operated only on a deficit basis, unpaid portions of training health professionals such as medical residents, nursing students, and students in allied health professions, and the unpaid portions of testing medical equipment and controlled studies of therapeutic protocols

D. Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is derived from services provided to patients who are directly responsible for payment, or are covered by various insurance or managed care programs TriHealth receives payments from the federal government on behalf of patients covered by the Medicare program, from state governments for Medicaid and other state-sponsored programs, from certain private insurance companies and managed care programs, and from the patients themselves A summary of payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

Medicare – Inpatient acute care and certain outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge or procedure These rates vary according to patient classification systems based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors

Medicaid – Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are primarily paid under the traditional Medicaid plan, and are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge Certain outpatient services are reimbursed based on a cost reimbursement methodology, fee schedules, or discount from established charges

Managed Care, Commercial, and Other – TriHealth has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to TriHealth under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates

As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. TriHealth recognized an increase in net patient service revenue for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, by \$7,578 and \$9,120, respectively, due to favorable changes in estimates related to prior years' cost report settlements and other third-party payor activity

The carrying value of hedge funds, limited liability companies, private equity funds, real estate investment trusts, other limited partnerships, and commingled funds, collectively, alternative investments, are based on valuations provided by the administrators of the specific financial instruments. Alternative investments are accounted for similar to the equity method of accounting based on the net asset value (NAV) provided by the respective administrators of the individual alternative investments. The underlying investments in these financial instruments are unknown, and could include marketable debt and equity securities, commodities, foreign currencies, derivatives, and private equity instruments. The underlying investments themselves are subject to various risks, including market, credit, liquidity, and foreign exchange risk. TriHealth believes the value of these financial instruments in the combined balance sheets is a reasonable estimate of its ownership interest in the alternative investment NAV. Because these financial instruments are not readily marketable, the carrying value is subject to uncertainty and, therefore, may differ from the value that would have been used had a market for such financial instruments existed. Such differences could be material. TriHealth's risk related to alternative investments is limited to its carrying value, plus any amounts committed to private equity.

Good Samaritan and Bethesda participate in a unified CHI credit governed agreement under a Capital Obligation Document (COD) Under the COD, CHI is the sole obligor on all debt Bondholder security resides both in the unsecured promise by CHI to pay its obligations, and in its control of direct affiliates Good Samaritan, as a direct affiliate, and Bethesda as a designated affiliate of CHI, are defined as participants under the COD Debt under the COD is evidenced by promissory notes individually between Good Samaritan and CHI, and Bethesda and CHI, which include monthly installments of interest, and may be repaid in advance without penalty Good Samaritan and Bethesda are only responsible for debt evidenced under the executed promissory notes as of June 30, 2014 and 2013

Good Samaritan has agreed to certain covenants with CHI related to corporate existence, maintenance of insurance, and exempt use of bond-financed facilities Bethesda has agreed to certain financial and nonfinancial covenants Good Samaritan and Bethesda were in compliance with all covenants at June 30, 2014 and 2013

Good Samaritan has three separate loan agreements which assisted in financing the construction of a new medical office building on its campus. The loans were obtained through subsidiaries of Uptown Consortium, Inc., an Ohio nonprofit corporation. Two of the loans were from the subsidiary, UNIF, LLC, for \$10,866 and \$3,950, respectively, both with a maturity in 2042 and a fixed interest rate of 1.25 % at June 30, 2014. The final loan was from the subsidiary Uptown Cincinnati Development Fund for \$8,911, with a maturity in 2017, and a fixed interest rate of 4% at June 30, 2014. Good Samaritan is subject to certain nonfinancial restrictive covenants under the loan agreements. Management is of the opinion that Good Samaritan was in compliance with all restrictive covenants at June 30, 2014.

K. Retirement Plans

TriHealth maintains three noncontributory defined benefit retirement plans, Bethesda Retirement Plan, The Good Samaritan Hospital Retirement Plan, and TriHealth, Inc Retirement Plan (collectively, the Plans), covering substantially all employees Under the Plans, employee benefits are based on employees' years of service, retirement age, and compensation Vesting occurs over a three-year period. The Bethesda Retirement Plan and the TriHealth, Inc Retirement Plan both adhere to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) and Pension Benefit Guarantee Corporation premium and coverage regulations. The Good Samaritan Hospital Retirement Plan has received an IRS private letter ruling that states that The Good Samaritan Hospital Retirement Plan qualifies as a church plan and, accordingly, is exempt from certain provisions of both ERISA and Pension Benefit Guarantee Corporation premium and coverage regulations. While The Good Samaritan Hospital Retirement Plan is exempt from ERISA, the funding policy is consistent with the Bethesda Retirement Plan and TriHealth, Inc Retirement Plan to annually contribute an amount at least equal to the minimum funding requirement of ERISA as determined by consultation with an independent actuary

The Plans' were approved to be frozen in the year ended June 30, 2014, effective December 31, 2014, resulting in a net reduction in the projected benefit obligation of \$5,308. The Plans' freeze had an immediate impact on the combined statement of operations and changes in net assets of \$1,011 of expense, included in employee benefit expense.

TriHealth recognizes the funded status (that is, the difference between the fair value of plan assets and the projected benefit obligations) of the Plans in the combined balance sheets, with a corresponding adjustment to unrestricted net assets. Actuarial gains and losses that arise and are not recognized as net periodic pension expense in the same periods will be recognized as a component of unrestricted net assets. Those amounts will be subsequently recognized as a component of net periodic pension expense on the same basis as the amounts recognized in unrestricted net assets.

Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No 2010-24, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954): Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries*, clarifies that a health care entity may not net insurance recoveries against related claim liabilities. Under ASU 2010-24, Good Samaritan recognizes a liability of, and expected recovery for, professional liability, as determined by CHI. The professional liability recognized under ASU 2010-24 is included in accrued professional liability, and the corresponding asset is included in other long-term assets. Good Samaritan believes the asset is fully realizable at June 30, 2014 and 2013.

Amounts paid by Good Samaritan for professional, employment practices, and general liability coverage were \$3,680 and \$3,697 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, and are included in insurance expense Amounts paid by Good Samaritan for workers' compensation coverage were \$1,712 and \$1,751 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, and are included in employee benefits expense

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
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BETHESDA HOSPITAL COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

Overview

This Community Health Needs Assessment Implementation Strategy ("Strategy") addresses each significant community health need identified in the Bethesda Hospital ("BH") Community Health Needs Assessment Report (the "CHNA Report" or "Report"). The CHNA Report identified certain health needs relating to Birth Outcomes, Obesity, Chronic Health Conditions in the Low-income Latino Population, and Substance Abuse/Mental Health issues within the four counties served by BH. This Strategy describes (i) how BH intends to meet each health need (to the extent BH can meet such needs, and whether BH intends to attempt to do so), (ii) the programs and resources BH plans to commit to meeting any needs identified in (i) above, and (iii) the anticipated impact of such programs and resources on the particular health needs of the community served by BH.

Strategy

A. BH Efforts to Address Certain Significant Community Health Needs

The significant health needs below were identified in the CHNA Report, and will either be addressed or not addressed by BH's implementation strategy as follows:

<u>Birth Outcomes</u> – BH will continue its focus on this health need through its health system's sponsorship of multiple programs in its four county service area in collaboration with other existing community service organizations.

<u>Obesity</u> – BH will address this need in Hamilton and Butler counties. It will not at this time enter Warren or Clermont counties as the population is significantly smaller and less dense than Hamilton or Butler counties.

<u>Latino – Low Income – with Chronic Health Conditions</u> – BH will address this need by starting a Parish Nurse program at the hospital that will focus on Butler County, where there is a concentration of this underserved population.

<u>Substance Abuse/Mental Health</u> — This need will not be addressed by Bethesda North Hospital as it has a sister hospital, Good Samaritan Hospital, which is in the TriHealth, Inc. system providing care. It will not address mental health needs otherwise as there is a comprehensive outpatient program for substance abuse elsewhere in the TriHealth system.

B. Programs and Resources BH will Commit to Meeting Identified Needs

The significant health needs below were identified in the CHNA Report, and the following programs and resources will address each, as follows:

Birth Outcomes

Pregnancy Pathways: In home visits, TriHealth Community Health Workers and Parish Nurses help referred pregnant women meet prenatal goals and visits, and assist the client in overcoming challenges to a healthy pregnancy such as safe housing.

Prematurity Initiative: The Prematurity Initiative is a collaboration of the entire Greater Cincinnati community, initiated by Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center and TriHealth in 2009, to reduce prematurity. The goals of the Prematurity Initiative are to:

- Align people, organizations, and efforts to reduce prematurity and infant mortality;
- Implement collaborative efforts targeting awareness and prevention at systems and grassroots levels, community-wide and in specific neighborhoods; and
- Bring new partners together with a common purpose: to improve the health of our community for future generations.

PuRPLe (Preventing Repeat Pregnancy Loss): TriHealth's PuRPLe Project provides support to women who have suffered pregnancy or infant loss by offering grief- and loss-related resources, nutrition information and preconception education. These services are provided at no cost and can be conducted in the privacy of a woman's home or place of choice for the period of one year following the loss.

B4 (Before, Between, and Beyond Pregnancy for Your Baby and You): The B4 project is a prematurity prevention program that provides interconception health education, targeted case management, and support to mothers whose infants are born at less than 32 completed weeks of gestation and receive care in Good Samaritan Hospital's Neonatal Intesive Care Unit. The goal of the program is to promote a continuum of wellness care for women in order to improve their own health and reduce their risk for recurring poor birth outcomes, including prematurity and neonatal mortality.

HOPE (Helping Opiate-Addicted Pregnant Women Evolve): Through the HOPE Program, TriHealth provides safe and non-judgmental care to chemically dependent women throughout Greater Cincinnati. The goal of HOPE is to have better birth outcomes and reduce preterm labor through developing personalized care plans for each patient. The HOPE Postpartum Care Enhancement Project is funded by the March of Dimes and builds on the capacity of the HOPE program and TriHealth's Parish Nurse Ministry and Community Health Worker (CHW) program infrastructure, to ensure the development of a postpartum care plan for

mother and infant, increase compliance with postpartum care, and support the addiction recovery process established during pregnancy.

Bethesda North OB Clinic is open to any pregnant woman needing care regardless of ability to pay.

The Ohio Collaborative to Prevent Infant Mortality, Ohio Perinatal Quality Collaborative (OPQC), Fetal and Infant Mortality Review (FIMR), and the Perinatal Community Action Team (PCAT) are four additional programs targeted to supporting positive Birth Outcomes. These are all collaborative and multicounty initiatives.

Obesity

BH will address this need with the Healthy Women | Healthy Lives screening and referral program that already covers Hamilton County and Butler County.

Latino – Low Income – with Chronic Health Conditions

Bethesda North Hospital will address this need through the expansion of the Healthy Women | Healthy Lives program and the start of a Parish Nurse program to serve the low income and underserved Latino population in Butler County.

C. Anticipated Impact of Programs and Resources on the Needs Identified

The significant health needs below were identified in the CHNA Report. BH believes the programs and resources identified in Section B will have the following anticipated impact on the health needs of its community served.

<u>Birth Outcomes</u>: The anticipated impact of the programs addressing these needs is two-fold: A) to expand access to care for pregnant women, and B) to educate them about appropriate prenatal care. BH believes these impacts will lead to a long-term increase in the health of the overall population with regard to this particular need.

Obesity: BH's Parish Nurse program currently does in-home health education for its clients – all of whom are in socioeconomically-challenged environments – and refers them as needed to a network of service providers. The anticipated impact of the expansion into Butler County for the first several years is the assembly of a "partner" collaborative network comprising providers of services to the underserved. BH believes this expansion will ultimately lead to a long-term increase in the health of the overall population with regard to this particular need.

BETHESDA BUTLER HOSPITAL COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

Overview

This Community Health Needs Assessment Implementation Strategy ("<u>Strategy</u>") addresses each significant community health need identified in the Bethesda Butler Hospital ("<u>Bethesda Butler</u>") Community Health Needs Assessment Report (the "<u>CHNA Report</u>" or "<u>Report</u>").

Established in 2000 as a physician owned, multi-specialty surgery center, Bethesda Butler was acquired by Bethesda Hospital, Inc. and brought into the TriHealth system in March of 2012. In February 2013, a seventeen-bed, twenty-four hour emergency department was added to Bethesda Butler and it now comprises full hospital services including an inpatient unit, surgery, cardiology, imaging, physical therapy and laboratory. TriHealth, Inc. was formed in 1995 as a partnership of Bethesda Hospital, Inc. and Good Samaritan Hospital of Cincinnati, Ohio. This partnership has grown into a local health system with many sites and services. The mission of Bethesda Butler and TriHealth, Inc. is to improve the health status of the community through a full range of health related services—prevention, wellness and education. A core value, Response to Community Need, supports the growth in services provided to the Bethesda Butler community.

The CHNA Report identified certain health needs relating to Birth Outcomes, Obesity, Chronic Health Conditions in the low-income Latino Population, and Substance Abuse/Mental Health issues within Butler County, the primary service area of Bethesda Butler. This Strategy describes (i) how Bethesda Butler intends to meet each health need (to the extent Bethesda Butler can meet such needs, and whether Bethesda Butler intends to attempt to do so), (ii) the programs and resources Bethesda Butler plans to commit to meeting any needs identified in (i) above, and (iii) the anticipated impact of such programs and resources on the particular health needs of the community served by Bethesda Butler.

Strategy

A. Bethesda Butler Efforts to Address Certain Significant Community Health Needs and Related Divisions.

The significant health needs below were identified in the CHNA Report will either be addressed or not addressed by Bethesda Butler's implementation strategy as follows:

<u>Obesity</u> – Bethesda Butler will address this need in Butler County. It will do this by supporting and partnering with the Healthy Women Healthy Lives program already providing an annual health screening event in Butler County.

<u>Hypertension, Diabetes and Obesity Among Low Income Latinos</u> - Bethesda Butler will address this need by providing resources to be used by two nurses in the TriHealth Outreach Ministries (formerly Parish Nurse) program.

<u>Substance Abuse/Mental Health</u> – This need will not be addressed by Bethesda Butler as it has a sister hospital, Good Samaritan Hospital, which is in the TriHealth, Inc. system providing care. It will not address mental health needs otherwise as there is a comprehensive outpatient program for substance abuse elsewhere in the TriHealth system serving a broad community that includes Butler County.

<u>Access to Dental Health Services</u> – This need will not be addressed by Bethesda Butler as dental services are not a core of hospital competency and Bethesda Butler does not have the capacity to serve this need in Butler County. TriHealth recently opened a free dental clinic in Hamilton County, which can serve Butler County residents.

<u>Homelessness</u> – This need will not be addressed by Bethesda Butler hospital because it is not a core hospital competency and Bethesda Butler does not have the capacity to serve this health need in Butler County.

B. Programs and Resources Bethesda Butler will Commit to Meeting Identified Needs

The significant health needs below were identified in the CHNA Report, and the following programs and resources will address each, as follows:

Obesity

Bethesda Butler will address this need with the Healthy Women Healthy Lives screening and referral program that provides screening events and follow up service in selected sites in Hamilton County and Butler County. Healthy Women Healthy Lives will analyze and report aggregate data from its Butler County health screening, compile resources for referrals, refer to available providers for indicated follow up service.

Chronic health conditions (hypertension, diabetes, obesity) among low income Latinos

Bethesda Butler will address this need through providing in-kind support to the Healthy Women Healthy Lives program and the TriHealth Outreach Ministries program, as both will serve the low income and underserved Latino population in Butler County. The TriHealth Outreach Ministries nurses will focus on areas within Butler County with the highest concentration of this underserved population.

C. Anticipated Impact of Programs and Resources on the Needs Identified

The significant health needs below were identified in the CHNA Report. Bethesda Butler believes the programs and resources identified in Section B will have the following anticipated impact on the health needs of its community served.

<u>Obesity</u>: The anticipated impact of the Healthy Women Healthy Lives health screening program for minority women for the first several years is the assembly of a "partner" collaborative network comprising providers of services to the Butler County underserved, particularly in the City of Hamilton and the area immediately surrounding Bethesda Butler. Aggregate health information from the participants in the annual Butler County health screening event (in the City of Hamilton) will inform further hospital and system strategy for the underserved population experiencing the challenge of obesity.

Chronic health conditions (hypertension, diabetes, obesity) among low income Latinos

Because the TriHealth Outreach Ministries initial effort will be to establish realistic area for referrals and set processes for this new expansion of the service, the impact will be measured. That is, one anticipated impact of the TriHealth Outreach Ministries program nurses will be to compile a more detailed report of the health needs and challenges experienced by this population. Another impact will be respectful integration into and collaboration with the existing network of providers and community resources, with potential for joining in local efforts to promote healthy lifestyles.
