#### 1. Organization and Mission

### **Organizational Structure**

Ministry Health Care, Inc. (Ministry or the Health Ministry) is a member of Ascension Health. In December 2011. Ascension Health Alliance, doing business as Ascension, became the sole corporate member and parent organization of Ascension Health, a Catholic, national health system consisting primarily of nonprofit corporations that own and operate local health care facilities, or Health Ministries, located in 23 of the United States and the District of Columbia. In addition to serving as the sole corporate member of Ascension Health, Ascension serves as the member or shareholder of various other subsidiaries. Ascension, its subsidiaries, and the Health Ministries are referred to collectively from time to time hereafter as the System.

Ascension is sponsored by Ascension Sponsor, a Public Juridic Person. The Participating Entities of Ascension Sponsor are the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, St. Louise Province, the Congregation of St. Ioseph, the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet, the Congregation of Alexian Brothers of the Immaculate Conception Province - American Province and the Sisters of the Sorrowful Mother of the Third Order of St. Francis of Assist—

118/Caribbean Province.

The Health Ministry is a Wisconsin non-stock, tax-exempt corporation that manages, promotes, and supports health care and related ministries in Wisconsin and Minnesota. The Health Ministry provides inpatient, outpatient, and emergency care services for the residents of Wisconsin and Minnesota. Admitting physicians are primarily practitioners in the local area. The Health Ministry is related to Ascension Health's other sponsored organizations through common control. Substantially all expenses of the Health Ministry are related to providing health care services.

#### Mission

The System directs its governance and management activities toward strong, vibrant, Catholic Health Ministries united in service and healing and dedicates its resources to spiritually centered care that sustains and improves the health of the individuals and communities it serves. In accordance with the System's mission of service to those persons living in poverty and other vulnerable persons, each Health Ministry accepts patients regardless of their ability to pay. The System uses four categories to identify the resources utilized for the care of persons living in poverty and community benefit programs:

- Traditional charity care includes the cost of services provided to persons who cannot
  afford health care because of inadequate resources and/or who are uninsured or
  underinsured.
- Unpaid cost of public programs, excluding Medicare, represents the unpaid cost of services provided to persons covered by public programs for persons living in poverty and other vulnerable persons.
- Cost of other programs for persons living in poverty and other vulnerable persons
  includes unreimbursed costs of programs intentionally designed to serve the persons
  living in poverty and other vulnerable persons of the community, including substance
  abusers, the homeless, victims of child abuse, and persons with acquired immune
  deficiency syndrome.
- Community benefit consists of the unreimbursed costs of community benefit programs
  and services for the general community, not solely for the persons living in poverty,
  including health promotion and education, health clinics and screenings, and medical
  research.

Discounts are provided to all uninsured patients, including those with the means to pay. Discounts provided to those patients who did not qualify for assistance under charity care guidelines are not included in the cost of providing care of persons living in poverty and other community benefit programs. The cost of providing care to persons living in poverty and other community benefit programs is estimated using internal cost data and is estimated by reducing charges forgone by a factor derived from the ratio of total operating expenses to billed charges for patient care.

The amount of traditional charity care provided, determined on the basis of cost, was approximately \$18,380 for the year ended June 30, 2014. The amount of unpaid cost of public programs, cost of other programs for persons living in poverty and other vulnerable persons, and community benefit cost are reported in the accompanying supplementary information.

### 2. Significant Accounting Policies

### **Principles of Consolidation**

All corporations and other entities for which operating control is exercised by the Health Ministry or one of its member corporations are consolidated, and all significant interentity transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Investments in entities where the Health Ministry does not have operating control are recorded under the equity method of accounting. The following reflects the Health Ministry's interest in unconsolidated entities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet, as well as income or loss for such entities included in the excess of revenues and gains over expenses and losses in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets:

The net income (loss) from unconsolidated entities represents income (loss) from providing health services; therefore, the Health Ministry has recorded the net income (loss) as part of the operating revenue in the accompanying statement of operations and changes in net assets.

#### **Affiliations**

The Health Ministry is the sole corporate member of Howard Young and Door County. If Ministry and Howard Young or Door County were to dissolve or terminate their affiliations upon the occurrence of certain specified events, the net assets of Howard Young or Door County as of the original affiliation dates plus one-half of the increase in the net assets since the affiliation dates or the net assets as of the date of termination, whichever is less, would either remain with the former affiliate or be distributed to a not-for-profit entity designated by the Howard Young Board of Directors or to the Door County Memorial Hospital Foundation, and such entities may not be related to the Health Ministry. Similar provisions apply to Calumet Medical Center; however, the net assets remaining with Calumet or distributable to an unrelated entity are limited to the net assets in existence on the original affiliation date or date of termination, whichever is less. Howard Young and Door County represent 10.0% and 5.3% of consolidated unrestricted net assets, respectively, at June 30, 2014.

#### **Use of Estimates**

Management has made estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of certain assets, liabilities, revenues, and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Fair Value of Financial Instruments

Carrying values of financial instruments classified as current assets and current liabilities approximate fair value. The fair values of other financial instruments are disclosed in the Fair Value Measurements note and the Long-Term Debt note.

#### **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and interest-bearing deposits with original maturities of three months or less.

#### **Short-Term Investments**

Short-term investments consist primarily of investments with original maturities exceeding three months and up to one year.

### Interest in Investments Held by Ascension, Investments, and Investment Return

As of June 30, 2014, the Health Ministry has an interest in investments held by Ascension, which is reflected in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet, and represents the Health Ministry's pro rata share of Ascension's investment interest in the Ascension Alpha Fund, LLC (Alpha Fund). Ascension has an investment interest in the Alpha Fund, as a member of the Alpha Fund, and invests funds in the Alpha Fund on behalf of the Health Ministry. Ascension Investment Management, LLC (AIM), formerly known as Catholic Healthcare Investment Management Company, LLC, a wholly owned subsidiary of Ascension, acts as manager and serves as the principal investment advisor for the Alpha Fund, overseeing the investment strategies offered to the Alpha Fund's members. AIM provides expertise in the areas of assets allocation, selection, and monitoring of outside investment managers, and risk management. Certain Health Ministry assets continue to be held through the Ascension Legacy Portfolio.

The Health Ministry also invests in equity and debt securities, which are locally managed. Most of these funds are held in locally managed foundations in which the Health Ministry exercises control over foundation assets.

The Health Ministry reports its interest in investments held by Ascension in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet as long-term based on liquidity. The Health Ministry's interest in investments held by Ascension are classified based on whether such investments are restricted by law or donors or designated for specific purposes by a governing body of the Health Ministry. The Health Ministry reports its other investments in the accompanying balance sheet based upon the long or short-term nature of the investments and whether such investments are restricted by law or donors or designated for specific purposes by a governing body of the Health Ministry.

The Health Ministry's investments are measured at fair value and are classified as trading securities. The Alpha Fund's and the Ascension Legacy Portfolio's investments include pooled short-term investment funds; U.S. government, state, municipal, and agency obligations;

corporate and foreign fixed income securities; asset-backed securities; and equity securities. The Alpha Fund's and the Ascension Legacy Portfolio's investments also include alternative investments and other investments, which are valued based on the net asset value of the investments. In addition, the Alpha Fund participates, and the Ascension Legacy Portfolio participated, in securities lending transactions whereby a portion of its investments is loaned to selected established brokerage firms in return for cash and securities from the brokers as collateral for the investments loaned.

Purchases and sales of investments are accounted for on a trade-date basis. Investment returns consist of dividends, interest, and gains and losses on the Health Ministry's investments, as well as the Health Ministry's return on its interest in investments held by Ascension, and are reported as non-operating gains (losses) in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets, unless the return is restricted by donor or law.

#### **Beneficial Interest in Trust**

Howard Young is the sole beneficiary of the Howard Young Medical Center Trust (Trust). The corpus of the Trust is permanently restricted. Realized and unrealized gains on investments are retained in the Trust corpus. Interest and dividend income earned on Trust investments will be received in perpetuity at least annually for use in operations by Howard Young. The Health Ministry measures its beneficial interest in the trust using the fair value of the Trust assets. The Trust assets were \$47,484 at June 30, 2014.

#### **Inventories**

Inventories, consisting primarily of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals, are stated at the lower of cost or market value utilizing first-in, first-out (FIFO), or a methodology that closely approximates FIFO.

### **Intangible Assets**

Intangible assets primarily consist of goodwill and capitalized computer software costs, including internally developed software. Costs incurred in the development and installation of internal use software are expensed or capitalized depending on whether they are incurred in the preliminary project stage, application development stage, or post-implementation stage. Intangible assets are included in other non-current assets on the accompanying consolidated balance sheet and are comprised of the following:

Intangible assets whose lives are indefinite, primarily goodwill, are not amortized and are evaluated for impairment at least annually, while intangible assets with definite lives, primarily capitalized computer software costs, are amortized over their expected useful lives of between three and ten years. Amortization expense in 2014 was \$11,834.

#### **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment are stated at cost or, if donated, at fair market value at the date of the gift. A summary of property and equipment at June 30, 2014, is as follows:

Depreciation is determined on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Depreciation expense in 2014 was \$63,851.

Estimated useful lives by asset category are as follows: land improvements – 5 to 25 years; buildings – 10 to 40 years; and equipment – 3 to 15 years. Interest costs incurred as part of related construction are capitalized during the period of construction. Net interest capitalized in 2014 was \$1.382.

Several capital projects have remaining construction and related equipment purchase commitments of approximately \$21,500 as of June 30, 2014.

The Health Ministry recognizes the fair value of asset retirement obligations, including conditional asset retirement obligations, if the fair value can be reasonably estimated, in the period in which the liability is incurred. Asset retirement obligations include, but are not limited to, certain types of environmental issues that are legally required to be remediated upon an asset's retirement, as well as contractually required asset retirement obligations. Conditional asset retirement obligations are obligations whose settlement may be conditional on a future event and/or where the timing or method of such settlement may be uncertain. Subsequent to initial recognition, accretion expense is recognized until the asset retirement liability is estimated to be settled.

The Health Ministry's most significant asset retirement obligation relates to required future asbestos remediation. Asset retirement obligations of \$1,769 as of June 30, 2014, are recorded in other non-current liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet. The fair value of assets that are legally restricted for purposes of settling asset retirement obligations are \$54 as of June 30, 2014, and are recorded in property and equipment in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet. During 2014, no retirement obligations were incurred and settled. Accretion expense of \$25 was recorded in 2014.

#### **Non-controlling Interest**

The consolidated financial statements include all assets, liabilities, revenue, and expenses of less than 100% owned or controlled entities the Health Ministry controls in accordance with applicable accounting guidance. Accordingly, the Health Ministry has reflected a non-controlling interest for the portion of net assets not owned or controlled by the Health Ministry separately on the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

### **Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets**

Temporarily restricted net assets are those assets whose use by the Health Ministry has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets consist of gifts with corpus values that have been restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity, which include endowment funds. Temporarily restricted net assets and earnings on permanently restricted net assets, including earnings on endowment funds, are used in accordance with the donor's wishes, primarily to purchase equipment and to provide charity care and other health and educational services. Contributions with donor-imposed restrictions that are met in the same reporting period are reported as unrestricted.

#### **Performance Indicator**

The performance indicator is excess of revenues and gains over expenses and losses. Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from the performance indicator primarily include pension and other postretirement liability adjustments, transfers to or from sponsors and other affiliates, net assets released from restrictions for property acquisitions, and contributions of property and equipment.

#### **Operating and Non-operating Activities**

The Health Ministry's primary mission is to meet the health care needs in its market area through a broad range of general and specialized health care services, including inpatient acute care, outpatient services, long-term care, and other health care services. Activities directly associated with the furtherance of this purpose are considered to be operating activities. Other activities that result in gains or losses peripheral to the Health Ministry's primary mission are considered to be non-operating, consisting primarily of realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments.

### Net Patient Service Revenue, Accounts Receivable, and Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services provided and include estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. The Health Ministry recognizes patient service revenue at the time services are rendered, even though the patient's ability to pay may not be completely assessed at that time. Revenue under certain third-party payor agreements is

subject to audit, retroactive adjustments, and significant regulatory actions. Provisions for third-party payor settlements and adjustments are estimated in the period the related services are provided and adjusted in future periods as additional information becomes available and as final settlements are determined.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Adjustments to revenue related to prior periods decreased net patient service revenue by approximately \$6,100 for the year ended June 30, 2014.

The provision for doubtful accounts is based upon management's assessment of expected net collections considering economic conditions, historical experience, trends in health care coverage, and other collection indicators. Periodically throughout the year, management assesses the adequacy of the allowance for doubtful accounts based upon historical write-off experience by payor category, including those amounts not covered by insurance. The results of this review are then used to make any modifications to the provision for doubtful accounts to establish an

appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts. After satisfaction of amounts due from insurance and reasonable efforts to collect from the patient have been exhausted, the Health Ministry follows established guidelines for placing certain past-due patient balances with collection agencies, subject to the terms of certain restrictions on collection efforts as determined by Ascension Health. Accounts receivable are written off after collection efforts have been followed in accordance with the Health Ministry's policies.

The methodology for determining the allowance for doubtful accounts and related write-offs on uninsured patient accounts has remained consistent with the prior year. The Health Ministry has not experienced material changes in write-off trends and has not materially changed its charity care policy in the current year.

### **Medicaid Third-Party Reimbursement**

During the year ended June 30, 2014, the State of Wisconsin enacted a hospital assessment under which hospitals were assessed a percentage of their revenue. In turn, the State of Wisconsin revised the level of Medicaid reimbursement to those hospitals, improving Medicaid reimbursement for most hospitals. Ministry's assessment for the year ended June 30, 2014, was \$25,867 and is included in other expenses in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets. Ministry management estimates that \$49,417 of additional Medicaid reimbursement was recognized during the year ended June 30, 2014, as a result of the new assessment.

#### **Electronic Health Record Incentive Payments**

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) included provisions for implementing health information technology under the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (HITECH). The provisions were designed to increase the use of electronic health record (EHR) technology and establish the requirements for a Medicare and Medicaid incentive payment program beginning in 2011 for eligible providers that adopt and meaningfully use certified EHR technology. Eligibility for annual Medicare incentive payments is dependent on providers demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each period over a four-year period. Initial Medicaid incentive payments are available to providers that adopt, implement, or upgrade certified EHR technology. Providers must demonstrate meaningful use of such technology in subsequent years to qualify for additional Medicaid incentive payments.

The Health Ministry accounts for HITECH incentive payments as a gain contingency. Income from Medicare incentive payments is recognized as revenue after the Health Ministry has demonstrated that it complied with the meaningful use criteria over the entire applicable compliance period and the cost report period that will be used to determine the final incentive payment has ended. Incentive payments totaling \$14,806 for the year ended June 30, 2014, are included in total operating revenue in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets. Income from incentive payments is subject to retrospective adjustment as the incentive payments are calculated using Medicare cost report data that is subject to audit. Additionally, the Health Ministry's compliance with the meaningful use criteria is subject to audit by the federal government.

### Impairment, Restructuring, and Nonrecurring Gains (Losses), net

Long-lived assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or business conditions indicate the carrying amount of such assets may not be fully recoverable. Initial assessments of recoverability are based on estimates of undiscounted future net cash flows associated with an asset or group of assets. Where impairment is indicated, the carrying amount of these long-lived assets is reduced to fair value based on discounted net cash flows or other estimates of fair value.

During the year ended June 30, 2014, the Health Ministry recorded total impairment, restructuring, and nonrecurring losses of \$1,620, which comprised of long-lived asset impairments of \$988 and restructuring and nonrecurring expenses of \$632.

#### **Income Taxes**

The member health care entities of the Health Ministry are primarily tax-exempt organizations under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(2), and their related income is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(a). The Health Ministry accounts for uncertainty in income tax positions by applying a recognition threshold and measurement attribute for financial statement recognition and measurement of a tax position taken or expected to be taken in a tax return.

### **Subsequent Events**

The Health Ministry evaluates the impact of subsequent events, which are events that occur after the balance sheet date but before the financial statements are issued, for potential recognition in the financial statements as of the balance sheet date. For the year ended June 30, 2014, the Health Ministry evaluated subsequent events through October 24, 2014, representing the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued. During this period, there were no material subsequent events that required recognition or disclosure in the financial statements, other than those disclosed in the Subsequent Event note.

#### **Adoption of New Accounting Standards**

In December 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2011-11, *Disclosures about Offsetting Assets and Liabilities*, an amendment to the accounting guidance for disclosures of offsetting assets and liabilities. In January 2013, the FASB issued ASU No. 2013-01, *Clarifying the Scope of Disclosures about Offsetting Assets and Liabilities*. These ASUs expand the disclosure requirements in that entities will be required to disclose both gross and net information about instruments and transactions eligible for offset in the balance sheet. This new guidance is effective for fiscal years and interim periods within those fiscal years beginning after January 1, 2013. The adoption of this guidance did not have a material impact on the Health Ministry's consolidated financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2014.

In July 2011, the FASB issued ASU No. 2011-06, Fees Paid to the Federal Government by Health Insurers. This ASU clarifies how health insurers should recognize and classify, in their income statements, fees mandated by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act as amended by the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act. #### 3. Network Health

#### **Insurance Claims Liability and Medical Claims Expense**

Medical claims expense includes health care services costs for fees charged by non-affiliated physicians, hospitals, and other providers for health care services provided to NH and NHIC members. NH and NHIC reimburse non-affiliated hospitals at fee for service or percent of charges if contracted with a national preferred provider organization (PPO) network, and other non-affiliated providers using fee for service, percent of charges, or usual and customary fee schedules.

At June 30, 2014, the insurance claims liability to non-affiliated entities totaled \$60,299. This liability represents the estimated ultimate net cost of all reported and unreported claims incurred through June 30 and is based on historical experience. Those estimates are subject to the effects of trends in claim severity and frequency. Although considerable variability is inherent in such estimates, management believes that the liability for medical claims payable is adequate. The estimates are continually reviewed and adjusted as necessary as experience develops or new information becomes known; such adjustments are included in income from operations.

#### Reinsurance

Reinsurance premiums are reported as expenses when incurred. Reinsurance recoveries are reported as reductions to expense when received or accrued as a receivable. NH recorded reinsurance premiums expense of \$3,563 and reinsurance recoveries of \$4,808 during the year ended June 30, 2014.

#### **Loss Contracts**

NH enters into contracts to provide identified healthcare services to group members for specified periods (generally one year) in return for fixed insurance premiums. NH recognizes, in the year of contractual commitment, any losses on these contracts when it is probable that expected future health care costs and maintenance costs under a group of existing contracts will exceed anticipated future premiums and recoveries on those contracts. At June 30, 2014, no losses on such contracts were determined to be probable; therefore, no loss was accrued.

#### **Premium Revenue**

Premiums are due to NH and NHIC in advance of their respective coverage periods and are recognized as revenue in the period in which NH and NHIC are obligated to provide services to members. Membership contracts are on a yearly basis subject to cancellation by the subscriber or NH/NHIC upon 90 days written notice. Premiums received in advance are included in other current liabilities in the consolidated balance sheet and totaled \$3,363 at June 30, 2014.

#### 4. Cash and Investments

At June 30, 2014, the Health Ministry's investments are comprised of its interest in investments held by Ascension and certain other investments. Board-designated investments represent investments designated by resolution to put amounts aside primarily for future capital expansion and improvements. Assets limited as to use primarily include investments restricted by donors. The Health Ministry's cash and cash equivalents, short-term investments, interest in investments held by Ascension, and assets limited as to use and other long-term investments are reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet as presented in the following table:

#### 5. Fair Value Measurements

The Health Ministry categorizes, for disclosure purposes, assets and liabilities measured at fair value in the financial statements based upon whether the inputs used to determine their fair values are observable or unobservable. Observable inputs are inputs that are based on market data obtained from sources independent of the reporting entity. Unobservable inputs are inputs that reflect the reporting entity's own assumptions about pricing the asset or liability, based on the best information available in the circumstances.

In certain cases, the inputs used to measure fair value may fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In such cases, an asset's or liability's level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement of the asset or liability. The Health Ministry's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgment and considers factors specific to the asset or liability.

The Health Ministry follows the three-level fair value hierarchy to categorize these assets and liabilities recognized at fair value at each reporting period, which prioritizes the inputs used to measure such fair values. Level inputs are defined as follows:

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) that are readily available in active markets or exchanges for identical assets or liabilities on the reporting date.

Level 2 – Inputs other than quoted market prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. Level 2 pricing inputs include prices quoted for similar investments in active markets or exchanges or prices quoted for identical or similar investments in markets that are not active. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, a Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Significant pricing inputs that are unobservable for the asset or liability, including assets or liabilities for which there is little, if any, market activity for such asset or liability. Inputs to the determination of fair value for Level 3 assets and liabilities require management judgment and estimation.

There were no significant transfers between Levels 1 and 2 during the year ended June 30, 2014.

As of June 30, 2014, the assets and liabilities listed in the fair value hierarchy tables below utilize the following valuation techniques and inputs:

Cash and Cash Equivalents and Short-term Investments

Cash and cash equivalents and certain short-term investments include certificates of deposit, whose fair value is based on cost plus accrued interest. Significant observable inputs include security cost, maturity, and relevant short-term interest rates. Other short-term investments designated as Level 2 investments are primarily comprised of commercial paper, whose fair value is based on amortized cost. Significant observable inputs include security cost, maturity, and credit rating, interest rate and par value.

U.S. Government, State, Municipal, and Agency Obligations

The fair value of investments in U.S. government, state, municipal, and agency obligations is primarily determined using techniques consistent with the income approach. Significant observable inputs to the income approach include data points for benchmark constant maturity curves and spreads.

Corporate and Foreign Fixed Income Securities

The fair value of investments in U.S. and foreign fixed income securities including commingled funds that invest primarily in such bonds, and foreign government bonds is primarily determined using techniques that are consistent with the market approach. Significant observable inputs include benchmark yields, reported trades, observable broker/dealer quotes, issuer spreads, and security specific characteristics, such as early redemption options.

### Private Equity

The fair value of private equity is primarily determined using techniques consistent with both the market and income approaches, based on the Health Ministry's estimates and assumptions in the absence of observable market data. The market approach considers comparable company, comparable transaction, and company-specific information, including but not limited to restrictions on disposition, subsequent purchases of the same or similar securities by other investors, pending mergers or acquisitions, and current financial position and operating results. The income approach considers the projected operating performance of the portfolio company.

#### Equity Securities

The fair value of investments in U.S. and international equity securities is primarily determined using techniques consistent with the market and income approaches. The values for underlying investments are fair value estimates determined by external fund managers based on quoted market prices, operating results, balance sheet stability, growth, dividend, dividend yield, and other business and market sector fundamentals.

#### Alternative Investments

Alternative investments consist of hedge funds, private equity funds, commodity funds, and real estate partnerships. The fair value of hedge funds, private equity funds, commodity funds, and real estate partnerships is primarily determined using net asset values, which approximate fair value, as determined by an external fund manager based on quoted market prices, operating results, balance sheet stability, growth, and other business and market sector fundamentals.

#### Interest Rate Swaps

The fair value of interest rate swaps is primarily determined using techniques consistent with the market approach. Derivative contracts include fixed payer and basis swaps. Significant observable inputs to valuation models include interest rates, Treasury yields, volatilities, credit spreads, maturity, and recovery rates.

#### Beneficial Interest in Trust

The Health Ministry measures its beneficial interest in the Howard Young Trust using the fair value of the Trust assets. The Health Ministry has classified this interest as a Level 3 investment because the Health Ministry does not have the ability to redeem its interest in the Trust at the fair value of the trust assets.

As discussed in the Significant Accounting Policies and the Cash and Investments Notes, the Health Ministry has an interest in investments held by Ascension. As of June 30, 2014, 21%, 38%, and 41% of total Alpha Fund assets that are measured at fair value on a recurring basis were measured based on Level 1, Level 2 and Level 3 inputs, respectively, while all of Alpha Fund liabilities that are measured at fair value on a recurring basis were measured at such fair values based on Level 2 inputs.

### 6. Long-Term Debt

#### **Ascension Senior Credit Group**

Certain members of Ascension formed the Ascension Health Credit Group (Senior Credit Group). Each Senior Credit Group member is identified as a senior obligated group member, senior designated affiliate, or senior limited designated affiliate. Senior obligated group members are jointly and severally liable under a Senior Master Trust Indenture (Senior MTI) to make all payments required with respect to obligations under the Senior MTI and may be entities not controlled directly or indirectly by Ascension. Though senior designated affiliates and senior limited designated affiliates are not obligated to make debt service payments on the obligations under the Senior MTI, Ascension may cause each senior designated affiliate to transfer such amounts as are necessary to enable the obligated group to comply with the terms of the Senior MTI, including repayment of the outstanding obligations. Additionally, each senior limited designated affiliate has an independent limited designated affiliate agreement and promissory note with Ascension with stipulated repayment terms and conditions, each subject to the governing law of the senior limited designated affiliate's state of incorporation. The Health Ministry is a senior obligated group member under the terms of the Senior MTI.

Pursuant to a Supplemental Master Indenture dated February 1, 2005, senior obligated group members, which are operating entities, have pledged and assigned to the Master Trustee a security interest in all of their rights, title, and interest in their pledged revenues and proceeds thereof.

The borrowing portfolio of the Senior Credit Group includes a combination of fixed and variable rate hospital revenue bonds, commercial paper and other obligations, the proceeds of which are in turn loaned to the Senior Credit Group members subject to a long-term amortization schedule of 1 to 39 years.

# Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued) (Dollars in Thousands)

#### 6. Long-Term Debt (continued)

Certain portions of Senior Credit Group borrowings may be periodically subject to interest rate swap arrangements to effectively convert borrowing rates on such obligations from a floating to a fixed interest rate or vice versa based on market conditions. Additionally, Senior Credit Group borrowings may be, from time to time, refinanced or restructured in order to take advantage of favorable market interest rates or other financial opportunities. Any gain or loss on refinancing, as well as any bond premiums or discounts, are allocated to the Senior Credit Group members based on their pro rata share of the Senior Credit Group's obligations. Senior and Credit Group refinancing transactions rarely have a significant impact on the outstanding borrowings or intercompany debt amortization schedule of any individual Senior Credit Group member.

The Senior Credit Group financing documents contain certain restrictive covenants, including the maintenance of a minimum debt service coverage ratio.

As of June 30, 2014, the Senior Credit Group has a line of credit of \$1,000,000, which may be used as a source of funding for unremarketed variable rate debt (including commercial paper) or for general corporate purposes, toward which bank commitments totaling \$1,000,000 extend to November 9, 2014. As of June 30, 2014, there were no borrowings under the line of credit.

The outstanding principal amount of all hospital revenue bonds of Senior and Subordinate Credit Group members is \$5,119,505, which represents 36% of the combined unrestricted net assets of the Senior and Subordinate Credit Group members at June 30, 2014.

Guarantees are contingent commitments issued by the Senior Credit Groups, generally to guarantee the performance of a sponsored organization or an affiliate to a third party in borrowing arrangements such as commercial paper issuances, bond financing, and similar transactions. The term of the guarantee is equal to the term of the related debt, which can be as short as 30 days or as long as 26 years. The maximum potential amount of future payments the Senior Credit Groups could be required to make under its guarantees and other commitments at June 30, 2014, is approximately \$380,000.

#### **Ministry Restricted Group**

Ministry and certain of the solely sponsored hospitals have formed a Restricted Group under a Master Trust Indenture (Indenture). The related revenue bonds have been issued by the Wisconsin Health and Educational Financing Authority on behalf of the Restricted Group.

Pursuant to the Indenture, the Restricted Group's participating hospitals have executed contribution agreements with Ministry and have pledged their accounts receivable as security for the bonds. Those agreements provide that, in the event they receive written direction from Ministry to do so, the Restricted Group hospitals will transfer to Ministry, by loan or contribution, a portion of their revenue and assets as necessary to enable Ministry to make debt service payments on the bonds issued under the Indenture and to comply with the Indenture's other provisions.

The Indenture contains various covenants and restrictions including provisions limiting the amount of additional liens and indebtedness, which may be incurred and requirements for maintenance of certain financial ratios by the Restricted Group.

#### **Howard Young**

The Howard Young bonds are collateralized by substantially all revenue of the issuing entities and by a mortgage on certain assets. In addition, the loan documents contain various covenants and restrictions including the maintenance of certain financial ratios.

#### **Door County**

The Door County bonds are collateralized by the acquired interest in real estate and construction of buildings, structures, fixtures, and all other improvements constructed upon the property. In addition, the loan documents contain various covenants and restrictions including the maintenance of certain financial ratios.

#### 7. Derivative Instruments

The Health Ministry uses interest rate swaps to minimize significant, unanticipated earnings fluctuations caused by interest-rate volatility.

The Health Ministry has a fixed payer swap, for which it pays a fixed rate and receives a variable rate, in the notional amount of \$72,950, which expires on August 1, 2029. The Health Ministry also has a basis swap, for which it pays a tax-exempt variable rate and receives a percentage of a taxable variable rate, to hedge against rising interest costs on Ministry's variable rate debt. As of June 30, 2014, the basis swap has a notional amount of \$120,000, which expires on February 17, 2028.

The net fair value of the swap agreements of \$14,479 has been reflected as an other non-current liability in the accompanying balance sheet with the offsetting valuation change impact included in other non-operating gains (losses). The Health Ministry received net swap payments of \$1,348 during the year ended June 30, 2014, which are recorded in other non-operating gains (losses) in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets.

The Health Ministry's swap agreements contain various collateralization provisions, affecting both Ministry and the swap counterparty, with collateral posting levels that are dependent on the magnitude of the value of the swaps and the credit ratings on the parties. At June 30, 2014, the Health Ministry had posted \$16,218 as collateral pursuant to the fixed payer swap, which is included in the assets limited as to use in the consolidated balance sheet.

#### 8. Endowments

The Health Ministry's endowments consist of approximately \$16,548 funds established for a variety of purposes. These endowments consist of both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Board of Trustees to function as endowments. Net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Trustees to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on donor-imposed restrictions.

The Health Ministry's Board of Trustees has interpreted the Wisconsin Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA), as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor restricted endowment funds, absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Health Ministry classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and, if applicable (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the related gift's donor instructions. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Health Ministry in a manner consistent with the standard for expenditure as proscribed by Wisconsin's UPMIFA. In accordance with Wisconsin UPMIFA the Health Ministry considers the following factors in making determinations to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- (1) The duration and preservation of the fund
- (2) The purposes of foundation and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- (3) General economic conditions
- (4) The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- (5) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- (6) Other resources of the foundation
- (7) The investment policies of the foundation

#### **Endowment Funds With Deficiencies**

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or Wisconsin UPMIFA requires the Health Ministry to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, there are no deficiencies of this nature as of June 30, 2014.

#### **Return Objectives and Risk Parameters**

The Health Ministry Board of Trustees has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowments while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Health Ministry must hold in perpetuity or for donor-specified period, as well as amounts set aside by the Health Ministry board to function as endowments. Under these policies, endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce a real return, net of inflation and investment management costs, of approximately 8% over the long term. Actual results in any given year may vary from this amount.

#### **Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives**

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Health Ministry relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Health Ministry targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

#### Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

The Health Ministry has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year, 4% of its endowment fund's average fair value over the prior three years through the calendar year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Health Ministry considered the long-term expected return on its endowment. Accordingly, over the long term, the Health Ministry expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment to grow at an average of 5% annually. This is consistent with the Health Ministry's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment return.

#### **Ministry Plan**

The Health Ministry and certain solely sponsored hospital affiliates participate in a pension plan (the Ministry Plan). The plan provides defined benefits to employees of participating hospital affiliates, who began employment prior to January 1, 2006. The Health Ministry and the participating hospitals' employees become participants in the Ministry Plan upon the attainment of age 21 and the completion of 1,000 hours of service. Benefits under the Ministry Plan are based on employee years of credited service and compensation, as defined, paid either in lump sum or annuity form. Contributions to the Ministry Plan, which are also the amounts expensed in the financial statements, are intended to provide for benefits attributed to service to date and for those expected to be earned in the future. Upon termination of the Ministry Plan or withdrawal of

#### **Affinity Plan**

Affinity, a solely sponsored affiliate of the Health Ministry, sponsors the Affinity Health System, Inc. Retirement Plan (the Affinity Plan) and a related trust to provide defined retirement benefits for employees of Affinity with the exception of CMC. Employees become participants in the Affinity Plan upon the attainment of age 21 and the completion of 1,000 hours of service. Benefits under the Affinity Plan are based on the employee's years of credited service and covered compensation, as defined. Contributions to the Affinity Plan are intended to provide not only for benefits attributed to service to date, but also for those expected to be earned in the future.

#### Other Retirement Plans

Ministry's expense relating to employer matching for that plan was \$6,765 for the year ended June 30, 2014.

The Health Ministry also participates in various other pension plans and supplemental compensation plans, which are primarily defined contribution plans. Expense under these plans amounted to \$11,966 for the year ended June 30, 2014.

#### 11. Self-Insurance Programs

The Health Ministry participates in pooled risk programs to insure professional and general liability risks and workers' compensation risks to the extent of certain self-insured limits. In addition, various umbrella insurance policies have been purchased to provide coverage in excess of the self-insured limits. Actuarially determined amounts, discounted at 6% annually, are contributed to the trusts and the captive insurance company to provide for the estimated cost of claims. The loss reserves recorded for estimated self-insured professional, general liability, and workers' compensation claims include estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported and are discounted at annual interest rate of 6% at June 30, 2014. In the event that sufficient funds are not available from the self-insurance programs, each participating entity may be assessed its pro rata share of the deficiency. If contributions exceed the losses paid, the excess may be returned to participating entities.

#### **Professional and General Liability Programs**

The Health Ministry participates in Ascension's professional and general liability self-insured program. Professional liability coverage is provided on a claims-made basis through a commercial policy with limits of \$1,000 per occurrence and \$3,000 in aggregate in compliance with participation in the Patient Compensation Fund. The Patient Compensation Fund applies to claims in excess of the primary limit. General liability coverage is provided on a claims-made basis through a wholly owned on shore trust and offshore captive insurance company, Ascension Health Insurance, Ltd. (AHIL), with a self-insured retention of \$10,000 per occurrence with no aggregate. Excess coverage is provided through AHIL with limits up to \$205,000. AHIL retains a 20% quota share of the first \$25,000 of umbrella excess. The remaining excess coverage is reinsured by commercial carriers.

Included in operating expenses in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets is professional and general liability expense of \$3,020 for the year ended June 30, 2014. Included in current and long-term self-insurance liabilities on the accompanying consolidated balance sheet are liabilities for deductibles and reserves for claims incurred but not yet reported of \$11,513 and \$4,341, respectively, at June 30, 2014.

#### Workers' Compensation

The Health Ministry participates in Ascension's workers' compensation program, which provides occurrence coverage through a grantor trust. The trust provides coverage up to \$1,500 per occurrence with no aggregate. The trust provides a mechanism for funding the workers' compensation obligations of its members. Excess insurance against catastrophic loss is obtained through commercial insurers. Premium payments made to the trust are expensed and reflect both claims reported and claims incurred but not reported. Included in operating expenses in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets is workers' compensation expense of \$4,380 for the year ended June 30, 2014. Included in current self-insurance liabilities on the accompanying consolidated balance sheet are liabilities for claims incurred but not yet reported of \$3,412.

#### 13. Related-Party Transactions

The Health Ministry uses various centralized programs and overhead services of the System or its other sponsored organizations including risk management, retirement services, treasury, debt management, executive management support, administrative services, and information technology services. The charges allocated to the Health Ministry for these services represent both allocations of common costs and specifically identified expenses that are incurred by the System on behalf of the Health Ministry. Allocations are based on relevant metrics such as the Health Ministry's pro rata share of revenues, certain costs, debt, or investments to the consolidated totals of the System. The amounts charged to the Health Ministry for these services may not necessarily result in the net costs that would be incurred by the Health Ministry on a stand-alone basis. The charges allocated to the Health Ministry were approximately \$6,400 for the year ended June 30, 2014.

#### 14. Contingencies and Commitments

In addition to professional liability claims, the Health Ministry is involved in litigation and regulatory investigations arising in the ordinary course of business. In the opinion of management, after consultation with legal counsel, these matters are expected to be resolved without material adverse effect on the Health Ministry.

In March 2013, Ascension and some of its subsidiaries were named as defendants to litigation surrounding the Church Plan status of the Ascension Plan. On May 9, 2014, the United States District Court, Eastern District of Michigan, Southern Division, issued its Decision and Order Granting Defendants' Motion to Dismiss, which effectively dismissed the case against the System. While the plaintiff in the case could appeal the decision, in such event, the Health Ministry does not believe that this matter would have a material adverse effect on the Health Ministry's financial position or results of operations.

In September 2010, Ascension Health received a letter from the U.S. Department of Justice (the DOJ) in connection with its nationwide review to determine whether, in certain cases, implantable cardioverter defibrillators (ICDs) were provided to certain Medicare beneficiaries in accordance with national coverage criteria. In connection with this nationwide review, the Health Ministry will be reviewing applicable medical records for response to the DOJ. The DOJ's investigation spans a time frame beginning in 2003 and extending through the present time.

The Health Ministry enters into agreements with non-employed physicians that include minimum revenue guarantees. The guarantee is a minimum income loan to a neurology group, to recruit and retain an additional neurologist to meet the identified market demand. This guaranteed income loan covers a two-year period, commencing on August 30, 2015. The guaranteed income loan will be forgiven if the physician continues to practice for a three-year period following the two-year guaranteed period. The neurology group and recruited physician are jointly and severally liable for the loan repayment, should either party fail to meet the terms of the agreement. The agreement also includes support in the form of a loan for recruiting expenses, relocation costs, and a signing bonus. The carrying amount of the liability for the Health Ministry obligation under these guarantees was \$1,320 at June 30, 2014, and is included in other current liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet. The maximum amount of future payments that the Health Ministry could be required to make under these guarantees is \$1,320.

Under the regulations and statutes of the Wisconsin Office of the Commissioner of Insurance (OCI), NH is required to maintain surplus reserves, or total minimum net assets, determined as a percentage of subscriber premiums. The compulsory surplus requirement for NH is approximately \$59,000 at June 30, 2014. In certain cases, the OCI also requires organizations to maintain an additional security surplus reserve that, if required of NH, would be approximately an additional \$15,700 at June 30, 2014. Management believes NH's net asset balance at June 30, 2014, determined in accordance with accounting practices prescribed by the OCI, is sufficient to meet the compulsory and security reserve requirements.

NH has reinsurance agreements with an unaffiliated insurance company that limit NH's losses on individual claims. Under terms of these agreements prior to January 1, 2009, the insurance company reimburses NH for a percentage of eligible inpatient hospital and medical costs and an additional umbrella policy for catastrophic coverage in excess of a deductible, up to a lifetime limit of \$5,000 per member. From January 1, 2009 to December 31, 2013, NH entered reinsurance agreements, under which the insurance company reimburses NH for a percentage of all eligible service costs in excess of a deductible, up to a \$5,000 lifetime limit. As of January 1, 2014, NH entered into a reinsurance agreement, under which the insurance company reimburses NH for a percentage of all eligible service costs in excess of a deductible, with no lifetime limit. Union groups with contracts that have no lifetime limit are grandfathered in with no limits.

#### 15. Subsequent Event

The Health Ministry has signed a letter of intent, dated September 30, 2014, to sell 50% of NH to an unrelated health system. A definitive sale date has not been determined.

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## Calumet Medical Center Community Benefit Implementation Strategy

Fiscal Years 2013 - 2016

Calumet Medical Center has been meeting the health needs of Calumet County residents for more than 57 years Founded by the residents of Calumet County in 1956 to provide local residents with quality, cost-effective patient care. Today, the mission of Calumet Medical Center is "to further the healing ministry of Jesus by continually improving the health and well-being of all people, especially the poor, in the communities we serve "

Calumet Medical Center is a critical care access hospital located in Chilton, Wisconsin, it is a member of Ministry Health Care Calumet Medical Center primarily serves Calumet County and outlying rural communities such as Kiel and Reedsville as identified by 80 percent of inpatient hospital discharges

This report summarizes the plans for Calumet Medical Center to sustain and develop new community benefit programs that 1) address prioritized needs from the Fiscal Year 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) conducted by Calumet Medical Center and 2) respond to other identified community health needs

## Description of Community Served by the Hospital

The overarching goal of Calumet Medical Center's community benefit and outreach is to respond to identified community health needs, increase access and improve health status, especially for the most vulnerable and underserved individuals and families in our community, and to be a leader and serve as an example to others in community service

Calumet Medical Center's approach to community benefit and outreach is to target the intersection of documented unmet community health needs and our organization's key strengths and mission commitments. We take prudent risks in developing innovative ideas and implementing responsive programs. We emphasize primary health care services, health screenings and promotion, and chronic disease prevention and management, especially for vulnerable and underserved persons, seniors, and racial, ethnic and linguistic minorities

Calumet Medical Center seeks out and nurtures relationships with a broad range of collaborative partners to build community and organizational capacity. We strive to sustain an effective community benefit and outreach ministry by thoughtfully linking areas in which the hospital has a demonstrated clinical competence with unmet community needs

For more than 57 years, Calumet Medical Center has been a leader in providing quality health care to the residents of Calumet County, especially the medically underserved In 1956, the residents of Calumet County opened Calumet Memorial Hospital in Chilton, later renamed Calumet Medical Center, as a secular, not-for-profit facility The hospital's mission was to provide local residents with quality, cost-effective patient care. The 36-bed hospital included emergency, surgical, medical, pediatric and obstetrical services, plus a 10-bassinet nursery With a history rich in hope and compassion, Calumet Medical Center's mission to further the healing ministry of Jesus by continually improving the health and well-being of all people, especially the poor, in the communities we serve is as relevant today as ever

As the community changed and grew, so did Calumet Medical Center In 1964, the hospital expanded to 60 beds and raised funds to expand surgical services, physical therapy, radiology and pathology services and supporting departments

Today, this 25-bed, critical-access hospital meets a broad variety of patient needs through general care, surgical services and numerous medical specialties including cardiology, dermatology, pulmonology, neurology, urology and walk-in care With more than 80 skilled medical staff and 180 employees, Calumet Medical Center offers complete, compassionate, quality health care for the entire family

## Target Areas and Populations

While there is no precise definition of vulnerability, the work of Calumet Medical Center focuses on people who don't have the same kind of opportunities to make healthy decisions as others, and whose opportunities for good health are compromised by insufficient education, inadequate housing, racism or low income Examples include the homeless, limited income families and children, the uninsured, and ethnic minority groups

Calumet Medical Center utilized a breakthrough approach to assess their community need and strategically allocate resources, as one means to identify disparities. The Community Need Index (CNI) assisted Calumet Medical Center in understanding the public health needs of every zip code served in Calumet County and outlying rural communities, such as Kiel and Reedsville, which in turn helped to guide Calumet Medical Center in the development of community benefit programming

The CNI demonstrates the link between community need, access to care, and preventable hospitalization for conditions that, if effectively diagnosed and managed, should be treatable in an outpatient setting Residents of communities with the highest CNI scores are twice as likely to be hospitalized for manageable conditions — such as asthma, pneumonia or congestive heart failure — as communities with the lowest CNI scores

The CNI for Calumet County was used to further validate the identification of communities (by ZIP codes) that are the most socio-economically disadvantaged and thus most in need Residents of these communities tend to have Disproportionate Unmet Health-Related Needs (DUHN) lack of education, lack of health care insurance, homelessness or transient lifestyles, no or limited access to quality health care, high prevalence of conditions such as diabetes, heart disease, obesity, and substance abuse

With this tool, we can focus quickly on the areas of most need and devote more time and resources to planning interventions that can assure health issues are addressed in sufficient time, and in the most cost effective settings

#### How the Implementation Strategy Was Developed

Calumet Medical Center identifies unmet community health care needs in our community in a variety of ways. We used a range of quantitative and qualitative information based on review of health and quality of life data and interviews with community members and representatives of local agencies We primarily utilized the following to assess community needs and the effectiveness of their response to these challenges Community Commons, community forums, Community Need Index, County Health Rankings, Fox Cities LIFE Study, hospital and clinic utilization, Calumet County Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, Calumet County, Workforce Profile, and other published data from reliable secondary sources

Calumet Medical Center participated in the CHNA processes that gathered input from both private and public Outagamie, Calumet and Winnebago County organization members including medical staff, nurses and administrators, clinic personnel, public health nurses and educators, behavioral health staff and leaders, health insurance-health management staff, elementary, high school and post high school educators, nurses and administrators,

police and emergency personnel, child, women's, family and senior social services, as well as community members interested in the health needs assessment process

As an adjunct to the organization's Strategic Planning Process, community benefit and outreach planning derives input and guidance from the Community Benefit Council, as well as executive, management and employees of the hospital As a result, adjustments are made to programs and services

Other stakeholders involved in the selection of priorities are those organizations with which our hospital provides support to for community benefit programs and outreach activities Some include the Calumet County Public Health Department, Healthiest Calumet County Steering Committee, and U-CAN (Calumet Action Now)

Coalitions composed of individuals and groups committed to improving the identified health issues have been organized. Many coalition members were drawn from local committees and/or organizations engaged in the process to date, and other community residents are encouraged to step forward.

A Community Health Improvement Project (CHIP) form is completed for each strategy, relating to a health priority The CHIP form consists of a program description, measurable outcome/metrics, budget information, the hospital's contribution/program expense, as well as strategies and asset inventory. An example of the CHIP form can be found in Appendix 1

## Identified Needs and How Priorities Were Established

Calumet Medical Center strives to fulfill every element of our Mission Statement through actions, not just our words Three community benefit and outreach themes, which emerged from the FY2013-2016 planning process, framed the selected annual initiatives. They are 1) Play a lead role in building a better system of care for those without insurance and with limited access to health care, 2) Target low income and/or disadvantage populations, and 3) Demonstrate value of community-based programs, processes and outcomes and strengthen our leadership position in community benefit and outreach

Calumet Medical Center recognizes that to have a meaningful effect on the populations we hope to help, we must consider how complex social factors such as poverty, education and housing affect people's health These factors that lead to poor health are often referred to as the social determinants of health and are documented by a significant body of research

The focus of Calumet Medical Center's community health implementation strategies are therefore based on overall determinants of health. The hospital is committed to developing partnerships with community-based organizations who share the hospital's goals to improve health, as well as advocating for policies that improve the health of whole populations equitably

Calumet Medical Center in collaboration with a variety of internal and external stakeholders undertook a structured approach to review public health data and conduct interviews of city and county residents and public health officials. This assessment resulted in a list of 23 health needs which were reviewed and discussed

Community health leaders came to an agreement on a set of criteria (below) to evaluate the list of health needs identified through the CHNA process. Each member voted on their top three focus areas

- Addresses/Impact "multi" health issues
- Addresses Disproportionate Unmet Health-Related Needs (DUHN)\*
- Number of persons impacted by health issue (magnitude)

- To what extent (severity)
- Aligned with Healthy Wisconsin 2020
- Organizational "burning platform" to address the issue
- Community "burning platform" to address the issue
- Is it already being worked on? (i.e. Who else is working on this? What is our role? Is it meaningful? How can we best complement/enhance an existing effort?)
- Likelihood of success (i.e. What is the track record to date on this approach? Are there
  adequate resources to implement this intervention strategy?)
- Evidence-based practice (EVB)\*\*
- Is it measurable?
- \*Disproportionate Unmet Health-Related Needs (DUHN) seeks to accommodate the needs of communities/neighborhoods with socio-economic barriers that increase resident vulnerability to poorer health/health disparities
- \*\*Evidence based practices (EVB) the practice of health care in which the practitioner systematically finds, appraises, and uses the most current and valid research findings as the basis for clinical decisions

In addition to the above criteria, Calumet Medical Center assessed the congruency and relevance of the health need to our Mission, Promise, Values and Strategic Goals. The results of the prioritization processes identified six priority issues Calumet Medical Center would need to address in order to create a healthier community, they are

- 1 Mental/Behavioral Health
- 2 Alcohol Consumption (excessive drinking)
- 3 Diabetes Prevention
- 4 Hyperlipidemia
- 5 Hypertension
- 6 Obesity-Nutrition and Physical Activity

The members of the Calumet Medical Center Community Health Advisory Team met on Wednesday, February 13 and made a unanimous decision to address all six of the identified community health needs going forward, in collaboration with its community partners

## Description of What Calumet Medical Center Will Do to Address Community Needs

It is clear that the communities served by Calumet Medical Center have many health and quality-of-life areas that need attention and concerted effort to improve The FY2013-16 Calumet Medical Center Implementation Plan is the beginning effort to address the most pressing needs. These needs will be addressed by the individual hospital, health and human service organizations within the community, as well as the collaborative efforts by the organizations gathered to prioritize the most significant needs summarized in the needs assessment.

Calumet Medical Center seeks to improve the health of our community by empowering people with information, knowledge and awareness. While we cannot realistically address every issue, we strive to resolve those that most heavily affect our local community.

Using the results of the 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment, Calumet Medical Center has thoughtfully linked areas in which the hospital has a demonstrated clinical competence with unmet community needs

Working collaboratively with community partners, Calumet Medical Center provides leadership and advocacy, stewardship of resources, assistance with local capacity building, and participation in community-wide health planning Employees and leaders participate and chair

a variety of collaborative committees throughout their service area, such as the Fox Valley Regional Community Health Improvement Coalition, Community Health Action Team (C H A T), Catalpa Health, Health Weight of the Fox Valley, Northeastern Wisconsin Mental Health Connection, S A N E (Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner) team, Healthiest Calumet County Steering Committee and Calumet Action Now (U-CAN) Our participation as a collaborative partner provides an opportunity to share information, resources and ideas, solve problems, identify options, and evaluate the success of our efforts

In addition, Calumet Medical Center is committed to providing financial assistance to persons who have health care needs and are uninsured, underinsured, ineligible for a government program, or are otherwise unable to pay for medically necessary care based on their individual financial situations Consistent with our mission "to further the healing ministry of Jesus by continually improving the health and well being of all people, especially the poor, in the communities we serve." Calumet Medical Center strives to ensure that the financial capacity of people who need health care services does not prevent them from seeking or receiving care.

Calumet Medical Center offers financial assistance to patients in Northeast Wisconsin because the hospital believes all patients deserve high-quality health care, regardless of their ability to pay Financial assistance is not considered to be a substitute for personal responsibility, and patients are expected to cooperate with the hospitals' procedures for obtaining financial assistance and contribute to the cost of their care based on individual ability to pay

Brochures announcing financial assistance are located in each emergency department, patient registration area and at various locations throughout each facility for patient and family review Every patient is given a financial assistance brochure upon admission. If admitted in an emergent manner, the patient information binder contains the financial assistance information Each facility also has financial counselors on site to assist patients and their families upon discharge with bill resolution and applications for government sponsored insurance services Individuals with financial capacity to purchase health insurance shall be encouraged to do so as a means of assuring access to health care services

#### **Action Plans**

This important work is a fulfillment of our mission, which calls us to advocate for the underserved and partner with others in the community to improve the quality of life. Therefore, the implementation strategy is a collaborative effort by Calumet Medical Center, Affinity Medical Group, Menasha City Health Department, Calumet County, Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health, Fox Valley Regional Community Health Coalition, and other community partners

Calumet Medical Center strives to sustain an effective community benefit and outreach ministry by thoughtfully linking areas in which the hospital has a demonstrated clinical competence with unmet community needs Below are the priority areas of focus and key community based programs of Calumet Medical Center These needs will be addressed by the hospital itself and/or in collaboration with other community partners

No single organization has the depth of resources needed to raise community health to an optimal level or even to maintain it at its current level. However, in collaboration with our community partners, Calumet Medical Center plans to address three of the identified community health needs by

#### Improve Access to/Affordability of Health Care

Calumet Medical Center strives to ensure that all community residents have timely and ready access to the full array of medical and behavioral health services required to maintain and improve their health, regardless of their ability to pay Additionally, Calumet Medical Center

continues to work on improving access to medical, social and mental health services while improving transitions of care across health care delivery system. Some of the ways we plan on doing this are

- Catalpa Health, a new joint venture between Affinity, ThedaCare and Children's Hospital of Wisconsin, reaffirms its promise to provide comprehensive outpatient pediatric mental health services
- Calumet Medical Center Financial Advocates
- Transition of Care
- Fox Valley Community Health Center
- 24/7 Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE)

## Mental/Behavioral Health and Substance Abuse

Calumet Medical Center is committed to improving access to mental and behavioral health services, especially in the area of child and adolescent and the uninsured. Calumet Medical Center will continue its' collaboration with existing community providers and agencies to increase access, along with providing effective case management to link patients and their families to necessary resources Some of the ways we plan on doing this are

- Northeastern Wisconsin Mental Health Connection, community coalition strengthening 24/7 crisis response, No Wrong door, support school-based mental health and primary care support
- Calumet Medical Center Medical Home Social Worker

Addressing the impacts of alcohol overconsumption requires a holistic, multifaceted approach to the behavior and choices that individuals make related to alcohol Calumet Medical Center, in collaborations with local community partners, is committed to reducing overconsumption of alcohol in the community A community working group composed of stakeholders within the community will begin convening to discuss overconsumption of alcohol in Calumet County and formulating potential solutions In addition to:

- Group being formed by U-CAN, community coalition
- Calumet Medical Center Medical Home RN Specialist & Social Worker

## **Diabetes Prevention**

- Walking with Ease Program UW extension, CMC & community members
- CMC Medical Home RN Specialist and Social Worker

These key strategies will be continually monitored for performance and quality with ongoing improvements to facilitate their success. The Affinity Board of Directors, Calumet Medical Center Board of Directors, hospital leadership and Affinity Community Benefit Council will receive quarterly updates on program performance

## **Next Step for Priorities**

For each of three priority areas listed above, Calumet Medical Center will work with community coalitions and partners to.

- Identify any related activities being conducted by others in the community that could be built upon
- Develop measurable goals and objectives to measure that the effectiveness of their efforts can be measured
- Build support for the strategies within the community and among other health care
- Develop detailed work plans Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)

## Priority Needs Not Being Addressed and the Reasons

Fourteen other health issues were identified by the Community Health Needs Assessment process Given the reasons indicated below, Calumet Medical Center will not be focusing on these health needs at this time

- Access to dental care Already being addressed by others in the community
- Low birth weights Issue is not a priority for community members and therefore approach is unlikely to succeed
- Teen birth rate up Need is not as likely to be resolved as other problems
- High cost of child care Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the
- Increased gaps in care management for people with disabilities of all ages need is not as likely to be resolved as other problems
- Increase in low income students Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the need
- Decreased water quality Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the
- Increased elder abuse Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the
- Increase in violent crime especially drug-related- Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the need
- Increased homelessness related to unemployment (more children)- Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the need
- Increased FoodShare recipients Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the need
- Increased food insecurity and hunger Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the need
- Transportation challenges Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the
- Availability of jobs with health care benefits Hospital does not have the expertise to effectively address the need

While we will focus the majority of our efforts on the identified needs that are outlined in the prior section that are obvious for Calumet Medical Center to address, we will review the complete set of priorities defined by the FY2013 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) process as they emerge to determine our response and make any adjustments in our plans. In addition, we will seek the advice of our external review group as we determine our FY2014 plans

By definition the Community Health Needs Assessment and Planning process is a cyclical progression toward community health improvement. With the completion of the Community Health Implementation Plan (CHIP), Calumet Medical Center will move to the Action Phase This part of the cycle consists of Implementing and Evaluating initiatives and interventions to reach measurable objectives

Members of Calumet Medical Center have already joined community coalitions and taskforces that will focus on each of the six priority health issues. Their next step will be to bring more community members "to the table" who will help set measurable objectives and select strategies to reach them

Evaluation will remain foremost so that progress toward goals can be quantified

We are committed to improving the health, well-being and quality of life of the communities we serve The CHIP process is an ambitious and bold effort at community engagement for a common good. No single organization has the depth of resources needed to raise community health to an optimal level or even to maintain it at its current level The CHIP process is based on the idea that through collaboration and synergy two plus two will equal a great deal more than four Another important feature of CHIP is that the plan arises out of the community, which then has a greater investment in its implementation
