### **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Hegg Memorial Health Center (Center) which comprise the balance sheets as of June 30, 2014 and 2013, and the related statements of operations, changes in net assets, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### **Auditor's Responsibility**

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.


## **Opinion**

## Note 1 - Organization and Significant Accounting Policies

## **Organization**

Hegg Memorial Health Center (Center) operates a 25-bed acute care hospital, a 60-bed nursing home, a 25-unit condominium apartment complex, a medical clinic and a child daycare center located in Rock Valley, Iowa.

#### **Income Taxes**

The Center is organized as an Iowa nonprofit corporation and has been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The Center is annually required to file a Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax (Form 990) with the IRS. In addition, the Center is subject to income tax on net income that is derived from business activities that are unrelated to its exempt purpose. The Center files an Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return (Form 990T) with the IRS to report its unrelated business taxable income.

The Center believes that it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken affecting its annual filing requirements, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements. The Center would recognize future accrued interest and penalties related to unrecognized tax benefits and liabilities in income tax expense if such interest and penalties are incurred. The Center's federal Form 990T filings are no longer subject to federal tax examinations by tax authorities for years before 2011.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

## Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding assets limited as to use.

#### Patient and Resident Receivables

Patient and resident receivables are uncollateralized patient, resident and third-party payor obligations. Unpaid patient and resident receivables, excluding amounts due from third-party payors, with invoice dates over 90 days old have interest assessed at one percent per month. Due to the uncertainty of collecting private pay accounts, these interest charges are recognized as income when received. Payments of patient and resident receivables are allocated to the specific claims identified on the remittance advice or, if unspecified, are applied to the earliest unpaid claim.

Patient and resident accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third party coverage, the Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Center records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates, if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The Center's process for calculating the allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients has not significantly changed from June 30, 2013 to June 30, 2014. The Center does not maintain a material allowance for doubtful accounts from third-party payors, nor did it have significant write offs from third-party payors. The Center has not significantly changed its charity care or uninsured discount policies during fiscal years 2014 or 2013.

## **Supplies**

Supplies are stated at lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market.

#### Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets which are restricted by donors as well as assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements and debt redemption, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes and uncollected pledges from prior capital campaigns related to construction projects which have been completed.

## **Investments and Investment Income**

Investments in assets with readily determinable market values are stated at fair value. The fair value of all debt and equity securities with readily determinable fair values are based on quotations obtained from national and foreign securities exchanges. The fair value of certificates of deposit are recorded at historical cost, plus accrued interest. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in revenues in excess of expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from revenues in excess of expenses unless the investments are trading securities. The Center had no investments classified as trading securities as of June 30, 2014 and 2013.

#### Fair Value Measurements

The Center has determined the fair value of certain assets and liabilities in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, which provides a framework for measuring fair value.

Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Valuation techniques should maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

A fair value hierarchy has been established, which prioritizes the valuation inputs into three broad levels. Level 1 inputs consist of quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date. Level 2 inputs are inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the related asset or liability. Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs related to the asset or liability.

## **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment acquisitions in excess of \$5,000 are capitalized and recorded at cost. Depreciation of property and equipment is computed on the straight-line method over the useful lives of the assets which range from three to forty years as follows:

Land improvements	5 - 20 years
Buildings and improvements	6 - 40 years
Equipment	3 - 20 years

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets, and are excluded from revenues in excess of expenses unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted net assets. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when donated or when acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

## Interest in Net Assets of Avera Health Foundation

The Avera Health Foundation solicits contributions and holds funds on behalf of the Center. The Center's interest in these funds is recorded as an asset in the accompanying financial statements. Changes in the funds held by the Foundation are recorded as Change in Interest in Net Assets of Avera Health Foundation in the accompanying financial statements.

The Center through its affiliation with the Avera Health Foundation participates in the Avera Pooled Investment Fund, a fund administered by Avera Health. The Pooled Investment Fund has a portion of its holdings in alternative investments, which are not readily marketable. These alternative investments include partnerships and other interests that invest in hedge funds, real asset funds, and private equity/venture capital funds, among others. Many of these alternative investments have fair values that are determined using the net asset value (NAV) provided by the investment manager. NAV is a practical expedient to determine the fair value of investments that do not have readily determinable fair values and prepare their financial statements consistent with the measurement principles of an investment company or have the attributes of an investment company. Investment income, including interest, dividends, realized gains and losses, and unrealized gains and losses are allocated to participants of the Avera Pooled Investment Fund based upon their pro rata share of the investments.

#### Real Estate Held for Future Use

Real estate held for future use consists of property that is being held for potential use in future expansion projects of the Center.

## **Assets Held for Resale**

Assets held for resale consists of condominium units that were acquired and are in the process of being sold.

## **Deferred Financing Costs**

Deferred financing costs are amortized over the period the related obligation is outstanding using the straight-line method which approximates the effective interest method.

## **Investment in Affiliated Companies**

The amount reported as investment in affiliated companies as of June 30, 2014 and 2013 represents the Center's investment in Northwest Iowa Diagnostics, a joint investment with other health care organizations from Northwest Iowa. The investment is accounted for on the equity method of accounting that approximates the Center's equity in the underlying net book value of the company.

## **Collaborative Arrangement**

The Center operates provider based clinics under joint operating agreements with Avera McKennan and Osceola Community Center which falls under the scope of Accounting Standard Codification 808, *Collaborative Arrangements*. The Center has classified Avera McKennan's and Osceola Community Center's economic interest in these provider based clinics as a liability. The terms of the joint venture agreements generally provide for the equal allocation of profits and losses amongst the participants. The Center's statements of operations include the revenues and expenses of the provider based clinics as it is considered the principal in the operating activity.

The following table presents amounts attributable to these agreements which are reported in the Center's statements of operations for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013:

## **Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets**

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Center has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Center in perpetuity.

#### Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

The Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Center at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient and resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, residents, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

The Center recognizes patient and resident service revenue associated with services provided to patients and residents who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered, as noted above. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Center's uninsured patients and residents will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Center records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients and residents in the period the services are provided.

## Revenues in Excess of Expenses

Revenues in excess of expenses excludes unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, transfers of assets to and from related parties for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets, including assets acquired using contributions which were restricted by donors.

### **Charity Care**

The Center provides health care services to patients and residents who meet certain criteria under its Charity Care Policy without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Since the Center does not pursue collection of these amounts, they are not reported as patient service revenue. The estimated cost of providing these services was \$81,000 and \$113,000 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, calculated by multiplying the ratio of cost to gross charges for the Center by the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing charity care to its patients.

#### **Donor-Restricted Gifts**

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When donor stipulated time restrictions or purpose restrictions are met or accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the statements of operations.

## **Advertising Costs**

The Center expenses advertising costs as incurred.

#### **Promises to Give**

Pledges receivable are unconditional promises to give that are recognized as contributions when the promise is received. Pledges receivable that are expected to be collected in less than one year are reported at net realizable value. Pledges receivable that are expected to be collected in more than one year are recorded at fair value at the date of promise. The fair value is computed using a present value technique applied to anticipated cash flows. Amortization of the resulting discount is recognized as additional contribution revenue. The allowance for uncollectible pledges receivable is determined based on management's evaluation of the collectability of individual promises.

## Electronic Health Record (EHR) Incentive

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) amended the Social Security Act to establish incentive payments under the Medicare and Medicaid programs for certain hospitals and professionals that meaningfully use certified Electronic Health Records (EHR) technology.

To qualify for the EHR incentive payments, hospitals and physicians must meet designated EHR meaningful use criteria. In addition, hospitals must attest that they have used certified EHR technology, satisfied the meaningful use objectives, and specify the EHR reporting period. This attestation is subject to audit by the federal government or its designee. The EHR incentive payment to critical access hospitals is calculated as a product of (1) allowable costs as defined by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and (2) the Medicare share. Once the initial attestation of meaningful is completed, critical access hospitals receive the entire EHR incentive payment for submitted allowable costs in a lump sum, subject to a final adjustment on the cost report.

The Center recognizes EHR incentive payments as revenue when there is reasonable assurance that the Center will comply with the conditions attached to the incentive payments. As the entire EHR incentive payment is received in a lump sum for critical access hospitals and the Center must annually attest to increasingly stringent meaningful use criteria, the EHR incentive payment is first recognized as a deferred revenue with a ratable recognition of revenue over a specified time period. EHR incentive payments are included in other operating revenue in the accompanying financial statements. The amount of EHR incentive payments recognized are based on management's best estimate and those amounts are subject to change with such changes impacting the period in which they occur.

#### Reclassifications

Reclassifications have been made to the June 30, 2013 financial information to make it conform to the current year presentation. The reclassifications had no effect on previously reported operating results or changes in net assets.

### **Subsequent Events**

The Center has evaluated subsequent events through September 26, 2014, the date which the financial statement were available to be issued.

#### Note 2 - Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

The Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Center at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

Medicare. The Center is licensed as a Critical Access Hospital (CAH). The Center is reimbursed for most inpatient and outpatient services at cost with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Center and are subject to audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor. The Center's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare administrative contractor through the year ended June 30, 2012. The Center's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Center.

**Medicaid**. The Center is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Center and audits thereof by the Medicaid program. The Center's cost reports have been settled by the Medicaid program through June 30, 2012.

**Blue Cross**. Inpatient services rendered to Blue Cross subscribers are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services rendered to Blue Cross subscribers are paid at prospectively determined rates per ambulatory encounter or visit.

## Note 8 - Annuities Payable

The Center has entered into a gift annuity agreement, which provide that the Center shall pay periodic amounts to designated beneficiaries until their death. The Center recorded these gifts at market value with a corresponding liability recorded for the present value of payments to be made to the designated beneficiaries. #### Note 10 - Endowment

The Center's endowment consists of a portion of their interest in the net assets of the Avera Health Foundation and funds held by the Center which are restricted for nursing scholarships. The Avera Health Foundation includes endowment funds which have been established for a variety of purposes. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments (if any), are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. The Center's permanently restricted endowment funds are donor restricted and totaled \$261,947 and \$222,680 at June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

## Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Center has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Center classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA.

In accordance with UPMIFA, the Center and the Foundation considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- (1) The duration and preservation of the fund
- (2) The purposes of the Foundation and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- (3) General economic conditions
- (4) The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- (5) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- (6) Other resources of the Foundation
- (7) The investment policies of the Foundation.

#### **Funds with Deficiencies**

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor requires the Center to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, deficiencies of this nature are reported in unrestricted net assets. There were no such deficiencies as of June 30, 2014 and 2013.

## **Return Objectives and Risk Parameters**

The Center and Foundation have adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by their endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Center and Foundation must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period. Under these policies, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that meet the price and yield investment returns established by the Center and the Avera Pooled Investment Committee while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. The Center expects its endowment funds, over time, to provide an average rate of return of approximately 6%-8% annually. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount.

## **Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives**

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Foundation relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Foundation targets a diversified asset allocation including equity securities, fixed-income securities, hedge funds, and private equity to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

## Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

The Center and Avera Health Foundation Board of Directors determines the annual spending rate and distribution amounts based on a review of the average market value of the endowment funds over the most recent 20 quarters. Local governing boards review the spending rate and distribution information and determine if payouts that would invade the corpus would be fiscally responsible.

## Note 11 - Functional Expenses

## Note 12 - Malpractice Insurance

The Center has malpractice insurance coverage to provide protection for professional liability losses on a claims-made basis subject to a limit of \$1 million per claim and an annual aggregate limit of \$3 million. Should the claims-made policy not be renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on occurrences during its term, but reported subsequently, will be uninsured.

## Note 13 - Employee Pension Plan

The Center has a defined contribution pension plan under which employees become participants upon completing 832 hours of service and reaching the age of twenty. Currently, the Center's matching contribution is 3% of the employee's wages. Total pension expense for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, was \$145,269 and \$139,008.

### Note 14 - Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Center grants credit without collateral to its patients and residents, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables from third-party payors, patients and residents at June 30, 2014 and 2013, was as follows:


The Center's cash balances are maintained in various bank deposit accounts. At times during the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, the balances of these deposits were in excess of the federally insured limits.

#### Note 15 - Leases

The Center leases certain equipment under various operating leases with terms of less than one year or cancelable upon written notice. Total lease expense for all operating leases was \$38,554 and \$40,029 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

## Note 16 - Electronic Health Record Incentive Payments

During 2013, the Center was awarded a \$294,689 incentive from the Medicare program related to electronic health records. The Center reflected the award in the June 30, 2013 financial statements by recognizing the revenue ratably over 30 months, which corresponds to the underlying useful life of the equipment acquired to provide electronic health records. Accordingly revenue of \$109,278 and \$117,875 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, was recorded by amortizing the deferred revenue into other revenue. The Center has deferred revenue related to the electronic medical record incentive payments of \$67,535 remaining at June 30, 2014.
