Unity Medical Center is a 17 bed healthcare facility, which provides emergency care, acute care services, outpatient services and clinical medical services to the residents of Grafton, North Dakota and surrounding communities. The facility provides outreach services such as physical therapy, respiratory therapy, and flu vaccination clinics to other employers in the area as well. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2014 the medical center provided as part of its mission 440 acute days, 1396 swing bed days, 87 respite days and 9,612 clinic visits. The amount of charges foregone for services provided under the Organization's charity care policy was approximately \$45,000 for the fiscal year. Total direct and indirect costs related to these foregone charges was \$33,000, based on an average ratio of costs to gross charges.



Note 1 - Organization and Significant Accounting Policies

Organization

Christian Unity Hospital Corporation d/b/a Unity Medical Center (Medical Center) is a 17-bed acute care hospital and clinic located in Grafton, North Dakota. The Medical Center is the sole member of Unity Hospital Foundation (Foundation).

Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Medical Center and Foundation (referred to as the Organization). Significant inter-company accounts and transactions have been eliminated in the consolidation.

Income Taxes

The Medical Center and Foundation are organized as North Dakota nonprofit corporations and have been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The Medical Center and Foundation are annually required to file Returns of Organization Exempt from Income Tax (Form 990) with the IRS. In addition, the Medical Center and Foundation are subject to income tax on net income that is derived from business activities that are unrelated to their exempt purpose. The Medical Center and Foundation have determined they are not subject to unrelated business income tax and have not filed Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Returns (Form 990T) with the IRS.

The Medical Center and Foundation believe that they have appropriate support for any tax positions taken affecting their annual filing requirements, and as such, do not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements. The Medical Center and Foundation would recognize future accrued interest and penalties related to unrecognized tax liabilities in income tax expense if such interest and penalties are incurred.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Fair Value Measurements

The Organization has determined the fair value of certain assets and liabilities in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, which provides a framework for measuring fair value.

Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Valuation techniques should maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

A fair value hierarchy has been established, which prioritizes the valuation inputs into three broad levels. Level 1 inputs consist of quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date. Level 2 inputs are inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the related asset or liability. Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs related to the asset or liability.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding assets limited as to use.

Patient Receivables

Patient receivables are uncollateralized patient and third-party payor obligations. Payments of patient receivables are allocated to the specific claims identified on the remittance advice or, if unspecified, are applied to the earliest unpaid claim.

Patient accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Organization analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provisions for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Organization analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third party-pay or has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Organization records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates, if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The Organization's allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients increased from 38% of self-pay accounts receivable at June 30, 2013, to 54% of self-pay accounts receivable at June 30, 2014. The Medical Center does not maintain a material allowance for doubtful accounts from third-party payors, nor did it have significant write offs from third-party payors. The Medical Center has not significantly changed its charity care or uninsured discount policies during fiscal years 2014 or 2013.

Pledges Receivable – Fair Value Election

Unconditional promises to give are reported at net realizable value if, at the time the promise is made, payment is expected to be received in one year or less. Unconditional promises to give, less an allowance for estimated uncollectible amounts, are recorded as contributions receivable and temporarily restricted support in the year the promise is made, unless the donor explicitly states that the give is to support current activities. Unconditional promises that are expected to be collected in more than one year are reported at fair value initially and in subsequent period because the Organization has elected that measure in accordance with Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 825-10. Management believes that the use of fair value reduces the cost of measuring unconditional promises to give in periods subsequent to their receipt and provides equal or better information to the users of the financial statements than if those promises were measured using present value techniques and historical discount rates.

Supplies

Supplies are stated at lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market

Investments and Investment Income

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Investment income (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in expenses in excess of revenues unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from expenses in excess of revenues unless the investments are trading securities.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use are assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes, and assets limited as to use under bond indenture agreement. Assets limited as to use that are available for obligations classified as current liabilities are reported in current assets.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions in excess of \$5,000 are capitalized and recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each depreciable asset and is computed on the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. The estimated useful lives of property and equipment are as follows:

Land improvements	10-15 years
Buildings and fixed equipment	5-40 years
Equipment	3-20 years

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets and are excluded from expenses in excess of revenues unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted net assets. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when donated or when acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Deferred Financing Costs

Deferred financing costs are amortized over the period the related obligation is outstanding using the straight-line method. The straight-line method is a reasonable estimate of the effective rate method.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity. At June 30, 2014 and 2013, the Organization did not have permanently restricted net assets.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Organization has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Organization at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

The Organization recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered, as noted above. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Organization recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or proved by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Organization's uninsured and other self-pay patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Organization records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured and other self-pay patients in the period the services are provided.

Sales Tax Revenue

The Organization receives revenue from a 1% county sales tax on purchases in Walsh County, North Dakota. In addition, the Organization receives half of a 1% economic development sales tax assessed on purchases made in Walsh County, North Dakota. These funds are to be used to support operations. Sales tax revenue is recognized when the funds are received from Walsh County.

Expenses in Excess of Revenues

Expenses in excess of revenues excludes unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, transfers of assets to and from related parties for other than goods and services, contributions of long-lived assets, including assets acquired using contributions which were restricted by donors.

Charity Care

The Organization provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Because the Organization does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. The amount of charges foregone for services provided under the Organization's charity care policy were approximately \$45,000 and \$72,000 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013. Total direct and indirect costs related to these foregone charges were \$33,000 and \$54,000 at June 30, 2014 and 2013, based on average ratios of cost to gross charges.

Electronic Health Record Incentive Payments

The American Recovery and reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) amended the Social Security Act to establish incentive payments under the Medicare and Medicaid programs for certain hospital and professionals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified Electronic Health Records (EHR) technology.

To qualify for the EHR incentive payments, hospitals and physicians must meet designated EHR meaningful use criteria. In addition, hospitals must attest that they have used certified EHR technology, satisfied the meaningful use objectives, and specify the EHR reporting period. This attestation is subject to audit by the federal government or its designee. The EHR incentive payment to hospitals for each payment year is calculated as a product of (1) allowable costs as defined by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and (2) the Medicare share. Once the initial attestation of meaningful use is completed, critical access hospitals receive the entire EHR incentive payment for submitted allowable costs of respective periods in a lump sum, subject to a final adjustment on the cost report.

The Organization recognizes EHR incentive payments as revenue when there is reasonable assurance that the Organization will comply with the conditions attached to the incentive payments. The entire EHR incentive payment is received in a lump sum for critical access hospitals and the Organization must annually attest to increasingly stringent meaningful use criteria. EHR incentive payments are included in other operating revenue in the accompanying financial statements. The amount of EHR incentive payments recognized are based on management's best estimate and those amounts are subject to change with changes impacting the period in which they occur. The Organization recorded \$106,000 and \$0 of EHR incentive payments for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013.

Donor-restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When donor stipulated time restrictions or purpose restrictions are met or accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the statement of operations.

Advertising Costs

The Organization expenses advertising costs as they are incurred.

Note 2 - Net Patient Service Revenue

The Organization has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows.

Medicare The Organization is licensed as a Critical Access Hospital. The Organization is reimbursed for most inpatient and outpatient services at cost plus 1%, subject to sequestration reduction, with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Organization and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Organization's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2012. Clinical services are paid on a fixed fee schedule or on a cost basis, subject to various limits, for rural health clinic services.

Medicaid Inpatient and outpatient hospital services provided to the Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid on a cost related basis. Inpatient services are reimbursed using Medicare interim per diem rates, decreased by 1%, and outpatient services are paid at the Medicare interim payment rates. Final cost settlements are determined based on the audited Medicare cost report. Clinical services are paid on a fixed fee schedule.

Blue Cross Inpatient services rendered to Blue Cross subscribers are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services are reimbursed at outpatient payment fee screens or at charges less a prospectively determined discount. The prospectively determined discount is not subject to retroactive adjustment. Clinic services are paid on a fixed fee schedule.

The Organization has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and other organizations. The basis for payment to the Organization under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Revenue from Medicare, Medicaid, and Blue Cross Blue Shield programs accounted for approximately 50%, 9%, and 28% of the Organization's net patient service revenue for the year ended June 30, 2014 and 47%, 7% and 30% for the year ended June 30, 2013. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Net patient service revenue for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013 increased approximately \$59,500 and \$157,000. These fluctuations were due to changes in estimates and final settlements of prior year cost reports.

Under terms of the sales tax revenue bonds loan agreement, the Organization is required to maintain certain deposits with a trustee. Such deposits are included with assets limited as to use in the financial statements. The loan agreement also requires the Organization to meet certain compliance requirements.

Note Payable

The Organization has an arrangement with a bank for a line of credit not to exceed \$200,000. The line of credit has a variable interest rate of prime plus 1.25% with a provision that the interest rate will not be less than 4.5%. At June 30, 2014, the interest rate was 4.5%. Interest on the outstanding balance is due monthly and outstanding principal is due December 2014. The line of credit is secured by accounts receivable and inventory. There was no outstanding balance at June 30, 2014. The outstanding balance on the line of credit at June 30, 2013 was \$110,075. The Organization did not meet all compliance requirements required under the loan agreement.

During 2014, the Organization was approved for a \$300,000 note payable. The maturity date of the note is October 15, 2019 and has an interest rate of 3.95%. There have been no draws on the note as of June 30, 2014. The note payable is secured by all assets of Unity Hospital Foundation.

Litigation, Claims, and Disputes


