Note 1. Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of operations: Boone Memorial Hospital, Inc (the "Hospital") is a West Virginia private, not-for-profit corporation that was reorganized effective July 1, 2012 from the previously existing Boone Memorial Hospital (a Component Unit of Boone County Commission, Boone County, West Virginia) Boone Memorial Hospital was a governmental not-for-profit organization that was created by the Boone County Commission (the Commission) in 1964 to provide residents of Boone and surrounding counties acute short-term and outpatient care. The Hospital and the County Commission executed a reorganization and transfer agreement and related documents in order to achieve the reorganization. The Hospital was formed for the purpose of reorganizing the hospital and transitioning it from a county-owned governmental hospital facility to a nonprofit corporation. There have been no significant changes in the operations of the facility as a result of the transition.

A summary of significant accounting policies is as follows:

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates used in preparing these financial statements include those assumed in determining the allowance for uncollectible accounts and estimated third-party payor settlements. It is at least reasonably possible that the significant estimates used will change within the next year.

Basis of presentation Net assets and revenues, gains and losses are classified based on donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Hospital and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted - Unrestricted net assets include resources over which the Board of Trustees has discretionary control.

Temporarily restricted - Temporarily restricted net assets are those resources subject to donor-imposed restrictions which will be satisfied by actions of the Hospital or passage of time. There were no temporarily restricted net assets as of June 30, 2014 and 2013.

Permanently restricted - Permanently restricted net assets are those resources subject to a donor-imposed restriction that they be maintained permanently by the Hospital or for which perpetual trusts have been established. There were no permanently restricted net assets as of June 30, 2014 and 2013.

Cash and cash equivalents: For purposes of reporting the statement of cash flows, the Hospital considers all cash accounts, which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties, and all highly liquid investments purchased with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Patient accounts receivable: Patient accounts receivable are carried at the original charge less an estimate made for doubtful or uncollectible accounts. The allowance is based upon a review of the outstanding balances aged by financial class. Management uses collection percentages based upon historical collection experience to determine collectibility. Management also reviews troubled, aged accounts to determine collection potential.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely.) For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital, records a significant portion for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference

between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts. Recoveries of accounts previously written off are recorded as a reduction to the provision for bad debt when received. Interest is not charged on patient accounts receivable.

The Hospital's allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients was 85 percent and 89 percent of self-pay accounts receivable at June 30, 2014 and 2013 respectively. The Hospital's self-pay writeoffs have increased slightly from \$5,503,000 in fiscal year 2013 to \$5,726,000 in fiscal year 2014.

Supplies inventory: Inventories are stated at latest invoice cost, which approximates lower of cost or market using the first-in, first-out method.

Investments Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses unless the investments are classified as trading securities.

The Hospital invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the balance sheet.

Assets limited as to use: Assets limited as to use include self insurance trust funds, assets held by trustees, and assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for specified purposes, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes.

Property and equipment: Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. The Hospital calculates depreciation on the straight-line method based on the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the financial statements. Interest cost incurred on funds borrowed for the purposes of construction of capital assets is capitalized during the period of construction as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support, and are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used, and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or long-lived assets are placed in service.

Statement of operations: For purposes of display, transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major or central to the provision of healthcare services are reported as revenues and expenses. Peripheral or incidental transactions are reported as nonoperating gains and losses.

Excess (deficiency) of revenues over expenses: The statement of operations includes excess (deficiency) of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, when present, which are excluded from excess (deficiency) of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities.

Net patient service revenue: Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are

accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 31 percent and 23 percent and 34 percent and 20 percent, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

Charity care: The Hospital maintains a written charity care plan for which the purpose is the provision of health services to individuals who have demonstrated the inability to pay for all or part of the services. Records are maintained to identify and monitor the level of charity care provided by the Hospital. These records include the amount of regular charges foregone for services and supplies furnished under the charity care plan and the estimated cost of those services and supplies. The Hospital's policy is not to pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care if the patient has an annual income equal to or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Income levels. Accordingly, the Hospital does not report these amounts in net revenues or in the allowance for doubtful accounts. Charity care services, as measured by gross charges foregone were \$182,973 and \$373,530 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Of the Hospital's total expenses reported for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, an estimated \$86,000 and \$176,000, respectively, arose from providing services to qualified charity patients. The estimated costs of providing charity services are based on a calculation which applies a ratio of costs to charges to the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients. The ratio of cost to charges is calculated based on the Hospital's total expenses divided by gross patient service revenue.

Grants and contributions: From time to time, the Hospital receives grants and contributions from governmental organizations, private individuals and private organizations. Revenues from grants and contributions (including contributions of capital assets) are recognized when all eligibility requirements, including time requirements are met. Grants and contributions may be restricted for either specific operating purposes or for capital purposes. Amounts received that are used for activities related to the treatment of patients are reported in operating revenue. Amounts received for specific non-patient activities are reported in non-operating revenues. Amounts restricted to capital acquisitions are reported after non-operating revenues and expenses.

Estimated malpractice costs: The provision for estimated medical malpractice claims includes estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported.

Income taxes: The Hospital is exempt from Federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Hospital is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions, however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The management of the Hospital believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011.

New or recent accounting pronouncements: In May 2014, the FASB issued *Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606)*. This ASU will affect any entity that either enters into contracts with customers to transfer goods or services or enters into contracts for the transfer of nonfinancial assets unless those contracts are within the scope of other standards such as insurance or lease contracts, and will supersede the revenue recognition requirements in Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 605, *Revenue Recognition*, and most industry-specific authoritative accounting guidance. In addition, this ASU will amend the existing requirements for the recognition of a gain or loss on the transfer of nonfinancial assets that are not in a contract with a customer such as assets within the scope of ASC Topic 360, *Property, Plant, and Equipment*, and intangible assets within the scope of ASC Topic 350, *Intangibles—Goodwill and Other* to be consistent with the guidance on recognition and measurement of this ASU. Under the requirements of this ASU, financial reporting entities should recognize contractual revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. The ASU will require a step

process for contractual revenue recognition that will require financial reporting entities to identify contractual relationships that produce revenue, identify the performance obligations within those contracts, determine contractual transaction prices of those contracts, allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations of those contracts, and to recognize revenue as the financial reporting entity satisfies the contractual performance obligations. The amendments of this ASU are effective for public entities for annual and interim reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2016, with early application not permitted. For nonpublic entities, the amendments of this ASU are effective for annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2017, and interim periods within annual periods beginning after December 15, 2018, with earlier application permitted no earlier than the effective date for public entities. Once adopted, an entity should apply the amendments of the ASU by either retrospectively applying to all periods presented using practical expedients prescribed by the ASU, or retrospectively with the cumulative effect of initial application recognized at the date of initial application with disclosure of the impact that the cumulative effect would have had on individual financial statement line items for the prior periods presented before the initial application. The management of the Hospital has not yet concluded their evaluation of the potential effects of this new accounting and financial reporting standard update.

Reclassifications: Certain 2013 amounts have been reclassified to conform with the 2014 presentation.

Subsequent events: The Hospital has evaluated subsequent events through October 29, 2014, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2. Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables from patients and third-party payors at June 30, 2014 and 2013 are as follows:

Note 3. Cash Concentrations

The Hospital maintains cash in demand deposit accounts with a Federally insured bank. At times the balances in these accounts may be in excess of Federally insured limits. In management's opinion, the amounts in excess of Federally insured limits do not pose a significant risk.

Note 4. Investments**Equity Method Investment**

In 2008, the Hospital sold its home health care agency and retained 33% of the new agency, Boone Memorial Healthcare, LLC, valued at \$49,000 in its initial investment. To date, the home healthcare agency business has not been profitable. In 2013, the sale of the Hospital's remaining interest resulted in a gain of \$243,475, which is recorded in the Statements of Operations as nonoperating revenue/gains for the year ended June 30, 2013.

Note 5. Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures Topic of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value and expands disclosures about fair value measurements.

Investments and Assets Limited as to Use: Investment securities and assets limited as to use are recorded at fair value on a recurring basis. Fair value measurement is based upon quoted prices, if available. If quoted prices are not available, fair values are measured using independent pricing models or other model-based valuation techniques such as the present value of future cash flows, adjusted for the security's credit rating. Level 1 securities include those traded by dealers or brokers in active over-the-counter markets and money market funds.

The State of West Virginia Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH) State Plan was amended to provide for a settlement process among participating hospitals. The amounts are subject to audit and retroactive adjustments for differences in the interim payments received and the actual cost of uncompensated care provided to uninsured patients. The amounts received by the Hospital have been audited through June 30, 2010. For 2011 and future years settlement could result. The laws and regulations governing the DSH settlement process are complex, involving statistical data from all participating hospitals, and subject to interpretation.

Note 11. Net Patient Service Revenue and Medicaid Provider Tax Disallowance Contingency

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

- **Medicare:** The Hospital is a Critical Access Hospital and inpatient services and most outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology at 101% of allowable cost. Other outpatient services are paid based on fee schedules. Those outpatient services subject to a cost-based reimbursement methodology were paid at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary.

The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and review thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The appropriateness of the admission of Medicare program beneficiaries is subject to an independent review by a peer review organization.

- **Medicaid:** Inpatient and most outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology (100% of cost). The Hospital is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and review thereof by the state Medicaid office. Other outpatient services are reimbursed based upon the lesser of the Hospital's charge or predetermined fee schedule amounts.
- **Commercial Insurance Carriers:** The Hospital also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes various discounts from established charges.
- **West Virginia Health Care Authority:** The Legislature of the State of West Virginia has created the Health Care Authority to regulate the Hospital's gross patient revenue based on limitation orders compiled from rate schedules and budgets submitted by the Hospital on a periodic basis. If a hospital's charges are held to be excessive or unreasonable, the Health Care Authority may require rebates to consumers or adjustments to subsequent year revenue limits. Under current state regulations, Critical Access Hospitals are exempt from the rate setting process.

Medicaid Provider Tax Disallowance

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has recently directed some local intermediaries to disallow the cost of provider taxes claimed in cost reports. Hospitals claimed the tax assessment as an allowable cost under the applicable regulations and the Provider Reimbursement Manual (PRM) sections. Hospitals have relied upon the fact that CMS approved applicable State Plan Amendments relating to the Provider Tax Assessments. The Hospital paid the provider tax and included it as an allowable expense. The disallowance may be applied retroactively for several years and the impact could be significant, depending upon various factors. No provision for any potential liability has been recorded by the Hospital Management and various associations representing affected hospitals plan to appeal the disallowance. The ultimate outcome of the issue is unknown at this time.

The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for bad debts), recognized during the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013 from these major payor sources, is as follows:

Included in net patient service revenue is Medicaid disproportionate share revenues of approximately \$1,467,000 and \$1,164,000 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Starting February 1, 2004, the Hospital became eligible under West Virginia Medicaid regulations as a CAH, for full cost reimbursement of the cost of providing care to indigent patients. Future receipt of these funds will be strictly dependent upon the continuation of applicable Federal and state laws and regulations.

As disclosed in Note 10 to the accompanying financial statements, the Hospital has recorded assets and liabilities for cost report settlement amounts with Medicare and Medicaid. The net patient service revenue for the year ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, were increased by approximately \$0 and \$139,000, respectively, as a result of settlements at amounts different than originally estimated.

Note 12. Pension Plan and Post-Retirement Benefits

The Hospital maintains a defined contribution 401(k) and profit sharing plan for all eligible employees. Contributions are voluntary and are based on a percentage of participating employees' salaries in accordance with salary reduction agreements. The Hospital matches all employee contributions at 50% of the employees' contribution, up to 5% of eligible salaries. The Plan covers substantially all of the Hospital's employees after one year of service. Contribution amounts are at the discretion of the Hospital. The total expense related to this plan amounted to \$90,426 and \$85,275 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

The Hospital maintains a non-qualified deferred compensation arrangement under Section 457 of the Internal Revenue Code for certain administrative personnel. Pension expense related to the non-qualified plan amounted to \$83,973 for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013. Plan assets and related liabilities are reported in the balance sheet. These amounts, which are comprised of contributions and earnings thereon, totaled to \$992,285 and \$989,097 at June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Until paid to the participant, all amounts included in the plan remain the property of the Hospital, subject only to claims of general creditors.

Note 14. Risk Management**Medical Malpractice Claims**

The Hospital purchases professional and general liability insurance to cover medical malpractice claims. There are known claims and incidents that may result in the assertion of additional claims, as well as claims from unknown incidents that may be asserted arising from services provided to patients. The Hospital has employed independent actuaries to estimate the ultimate costs, if any, of the settlement of such claims. Accrued malpractice losses have been discounted at three percent and in management's opinion provide an adequate reserve for loss contingencies.

The Hospital is a member (0.07% ownership at June 30, 2014 and 2013) of Community Hospital Alternative for Risk Transfer (CHART), which provides the Hospital the initial insurance protection and excess coverage under a claims-made policy. CHART was formed as a reciprocal risk retention group, which is a form of a captive insurance company owned by its insureds (called "subscribers") domiciled in Vermont and approved to provide coverage in West Virginia. The Hospital's equity interest in the group is \$254,031 and \$188,736 at June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, and is recorded as an Other Asset in the accompanying balance sheets. Amounts accrued for estimated malpractice costs were approximately \$376,000 and \$210,000, at June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, and in the opinion of management provide an adequate reserve for loss contingencies. Management has also recorded an insurance receivable for expected settlement related costs that will be paid by the insurance protection policy. The insurance receivable as of June 30, 2014 and 2013 is \$75,000 and \$0, respectively and is grouped with prepaid and other assets on the accompanying balance sheet.

Employee Health Insurance

The Hospital is partially self-insured with respect to employee health insurance claims. To protect itself against extraordinary claims of its employees, the Hospital has purchased stop-loss insurance. The Hospital's cost is limited to \$50,000 per covered life. The Hospital maintains a reserve fund for payment of employee health insurance claims which at June 30, 2014 and 2013 were \$362,523 and \$370,810, respectively, and are included in the accompanying balance sheets as assets limited as to use. Amounts payable under this plan at June 30, 2014 and 2013, for actual claims and claims incurred but not reported, were approximately \$212,000 at June 30, 2014 and 2013. Total health insurance expense for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013 were approximately \$1,339,000 and \$1,180,000, respectively.

Note 15. Advertising Expense

The Hospital expenses costs for advertising as they are incurred. Advertising costs included in expenses for 2014 and 2013 were approximately \$27,000 and \$31,000, respectively.

Note 16. Health Care Legislation and Regulation

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of Federal, state and local governments. Government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of various statutes and regulations by health care providers. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time. Management believes that the Hospital is in compliance with fraud and abuse as well as other applicable government laws and regulations. If the Hospital is found in violation of these laws, the Hospital could be subject to substantial monetary fines, civil and criminal penalties and exclusion from participation in the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

Note 17. Electronic Health Records

The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (HITECH Act) was enacted into law on February 17, 2009 as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The HITECH Act includes provisions designed to increase the use of Electronic Health Records (EHR) by both physicians and hospitals. The Hospital is progressing towards compliance with the EHR meaningful use requirements of the HITECH Act and is expected to be in compliance with the meaningful use attestation requirements in the next year. The Hospital's compliance has required a significant investment including professional services focused on successfully designing and implementing EHR solutions along with costs associated with the hardware and software components of the project.

The Hospital intends to apply for eligible Medicare funds after meeting the attestation requirements. The Hospital has incurred and will continue to incur both capital expenditures and operating expenses in connection with the implementation of its EHR initiatives. No EHR funds were received in the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013.

Note 18. New Facility Construction and Subsequent Event

On September 24, 2005, the West Virginia Health Care Authority approved a certificate of need to the Hospital for the renovation and replacement of the Hospital's facilities. The new facility will allow the Hospital to better serve their community and meet the demands of the Hospital's service area.

On July 22, 2014, the Hospital entered into a note payable with the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Development (USDA) for \$31,800,000 to finance the construction of the new facility. The note entails three annual installments of interest only payment commencing on July 22, 2015 and monthly principal and interest payments of \$127,836 thereafter for the next 37 years. The interest rate is fixed at 3 ½ percent until maturity. The note is secured by substantially all of the Hospital's assets.

The Hospital has incurred and capitalized expenditures of approximately \$2.9 million included in property and equipment on the balance sheet as of June 30, 2014. The majority of the cost incurred to date relates to land improvements, architectural design and deferred financing costs. The projected completion date is estimated to be April 15, 2016.

In addition to the \$31.8 million loan from the USDA, the Hospital has a capital campaign goal of at least \$2.5 million to pay for the project costs. As of the date of this report approximately \$2.2 million of the USDA funds have been drawn down. Additionally, the Hospital has obtained capital campaign pledges of approximately \$800,000.
