NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- 1 Organization - Livingston Memorial Hospital, Inc., DBA Livingston Healthcare (the Hospital) is a not-for-profit 25-bed acute care hospital providing inpatient, outpatient, clinical, and emergency services in Livingston, Montana, and the surrounding area. Livingston Healthcare Foundation (the Foundation) is a not-for-profit organization with the purpose of soliciting and receiving gifts and distributing them to the Hospital.
- 2 Basis of Accounting - The consolidated financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP), and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payable, and other liabilities.
- 3 Basis of Presentation - Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards FASB ASC 958-205, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under those provisions, net assets and revenues, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions as follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that can be fulfilled by actions of the Hospital pursuant to those stipulations or that expire by the passage of time.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Hospital.

- 4 Basis of Consolidation - The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital and its subsidiary Livingston Healthcare Foundation. All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation. The Hospital consolidates subsidiaries in which it exercises control.
- 5 Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.
- 6 Cash and Cash Equivalents - Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with a maturity of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by board designation or other arrangements under trust agreements or with third-party payors.

- 7 Restricted Cash - Restricted cash consists of funds restricted for the use of building a new hospital
- 8 Inventories - Inventories are stated at the lower of cost (average cost) or market
- 9 Assets Whose Use is Limited - Assets whose use is limited include assets set aside by the board of directors for future capital improvements and deferred compensation, over which the board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes and assets held by trustees for management and endowment purposes
- 10 Investments - The Hospital carries investments in marketable equity securities and all debt securities with readily determinable fair values at their fair market values. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law
- 11 Accounts Receivable - Accounts receivable are stated at unpaid balances, less an allowance for doubtful accounts. The Hospital provides for losses on accounts receivable using the allowance method. The allowance is based on experience, third-party contracts, and other circumstances, which may affect the ability of patients to meet their obligations. Receivables are considered impaired if full principal payments are not received in accordance with the contractual terms. It is the Hospital's policy to charge off uncollectible accounts receivable when management determines the receivable will not be collected
- 12 Property and Equipment - Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Property and equipment donated for Hospital operations are recorded as unrestricted support and are included in the excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. The Hospital capitalizes long-lived assets with a cost in excess of \$5,000

Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable assets and is computed on the straight-line method. Equipment under capital leases is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the financial statements

- 13 Statements of Activities and Changes in Net Assets - For purposes of display, transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major, or central to the provision of health care services are reported as revenues and expenses. Peripheral or incidental transactions are reported as gains and losses

14 Net Patient Service Revenue - Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

15 Charity Care - The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. Since the Hospital does not expect payment, estimated charges for charity care are not included in revenue. The Hospital calculates the amount of charity care based on an estimate of the cost of providing the services using a cost to charge ratio.

The total amount of charity care provided by the Livingston Healthcare Financial Assistance Program for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013 totaled \$599,102 and \$905,179, respectively.

16 Contributions - The Hospital accounts for contributions in accordance with the recommendations of the FASB ASC 958-605-15, *Revenue Recognition for Contributions Received*. Contributions, including unconditional promises to give, are recognized as revenues in the period received. Conditional promises to give are not recognized until they become unconditional, that is, when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met. Contributions of assets other than cash are recorded at their estimated fair value. An allowance for uncollectible contributions receivable is provided based upon management's judgment, including such factors as prior collection history, types of contribution, and nature of fund-raising activity. Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions.

Support that is restricted by the donor is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is recognized. All other donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets, depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the Statement of Net Assets as net assets released from restrictions.

17 Costs of Borrowing - Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. Deferred financing costs are amortized over the period the obligation is outstanding using the interest method. Amortization of deferred financing costs is capitalized during the period of construction of capital assets.

- 18 Income Taxes - The Hospital and the Foundation are not-for-profit corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code. Certain income considered unrelated to their exempt purpose may be subject to tax.

As a matter of law, the Hospital and the Foundation are subject to examination by federal and state taxing authorities for the year. Although management believes that the amounts reflected in their tax returns substantially comply with the applicable federal and state tax regulations, both the IRS and the various state taxing authorities can take positions contrary to their position based on IRS interpretation of the law. The Hospital and the Foundation have determined that they are subject to examination of their federal information return filings in the United States for the 2011 through 2013 tax years. A tax position that is challenged by a taxing authority could result in an adjustment. In the event that the Company is assessed penalties and/or interest, penalties will be charged to other operating expense and interest will be charged to interest expense.

- 19 Subsequent Events - Management has performed an analysis of the activities and transactions subsequent to June 30, 2014 to determine the need for any adjustments to and/or disclosures within the audited financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2014, see Note X. Management has performed this analysis through January 21, 2015, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE B - BUSINESS COMBINATION

On May 31, 1998, the Hospital entered into several agreements with Park Clinic, P.C., the essence of which was a business combination accounted for by the purchase method. The Hospital agreed to lease the physician's office building from the Park Clinic Building Partnership. The Partnership includes one physician employed by the Hospital under employment agreements. The lease was effective June 1, 1998 for a five-year period, was renewed twice and since June 30, 2007 the lease has been month to month with no long term agreement.

The Foundation has discounted the pledges receivable to recognize the long-term nature of anticipated collections. The discount rate used for collections was 3.8%. Management has evaluated the collectability of outstanding pledges and has estimated that \$349,952 and \$36,550 is uncollectable, and has recognized an allowance in that amount as of June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

NOTE D - NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

Medicare and Medicaid - Effective March 1, 2001, the Hospital qualified as a critical access hospital (CAH). As a CAH, inpatient services are paid based on a cost of care reimbursement system for Medicare and Medicaid patients. On May 6, 2001, Park Clinic qualified as a rural health clinic (RHC), and as such, physician services are reimbursed under a cost-based formula for Medicare and Medicaid rather than on a schedule of approved fees. On February 13, 2012, the West Crawford Clinic qualified as a provider based clinic (PBC). As a PBC, the technical components of services are reimbursed under a cost-based formula for Medicare and Medicaid, and the physician component of services continues to be reimbursed under a schedule of approved fees.

Inpatient non-acute services, certain outpatient services, and defined capital costs related to beneficiaries are paid based upon a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary.

NOTE G - INVESTMENT IN LIVINGSTON IMAGING CENTER, LLC

In May 2004, the Hospital entered into a joint venture agreement with Billings Clinic (BC) to purchase a CT scanner and operate it at the Hospital. Each party has a 50% ownership interest in the initial capitalization of \$500,000. Profits and losses are split 50% to each party.

The Hospital's interest in the net assets of the joint venture is reported as part of other assets in the Statements of Financial Position. The Hospital entered into an affiliation agreement with Billings Clinic January 2013 (see Note P). As part of this agreement, Livingston Imaging Center, LLC was dissolved effective December 30, 2013. The Hospital established a line of credit with First Interstate Bank on August 28, 2008. Under the terms of the financing agreement, the Hospital was granted a \$600,255 revolving line of credit with interest at 75% over prime. The interest rate at June 30, 2014 and 2013 was 4.0%. NOTE L - MEDICAL MALPRACTICE CLAIMS

The Hospital is insured under a medical malpractice insurance policy. Losses from asserted claims and from unasserted claims identified under the Hospital's incident reporting system are accrued based on estimates that incorporate the Hospital's past experience, as well as other considerations including the nature of each claim or incident and relevant trend factors. No accrual for possible losses attributable to incidents that may have occurred but that have not been identified under the incident reporting system has been made because the amount is not reasonably estimable. Based on the Hospital's malpractice experience, no liability has been accrued.

NOTE M - RETIREMENT PLAN

Effective November 1, 1983, the Hospital established a defined contribution retirement plan. Employees must meet certain age and length of service requirements to be eligible to participate in the plan. Contributions by the employer are discretionary.

Employer contributions and administrative fees to the plan were \$149,197 and \$111,762 during the years ending June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

NOTE N - DEFERRED COMPENSATION PLAN

The Hospital entered into an agreement with an employee providing deferred compensation for that employee. The plan grants the employee deferred compensation based on the Hospital's work performance formula. The agreement was entered into on April 16, 2005. The agreement states that the employee will become 50% vested after five years and will gain an additional 10% of vesting each year after that until they become 100% vested at the end of year ten. The plan terminated and the final distribution of \$88,600 was made during the year ending June 30, 2013.

NOTE O - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Hospital is located in Livingston, Montana. The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are regional residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables and revenues from patients and third-party payors at June 30 is as follows:

The Hospital maintains its cash balances in various financial institutions. The balances are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000 per institution. At June 30, 2014, the Hospital's uninsured bank balances totaled \$1,818,325.

NOTE P - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Hospital leased a physicians' office building for \$15,840 per month for the year ending June 30, 2014, from a partnership that includes a physician member of the Hospital board (see Note B).

The Hospital entered into a management agreement with Billings Clinic. Fees paid for the year ending June 30, 2014 related to this agreement were as follows: CEO reimbursement, \$242,332, clinic practice manager reimbursement, \$132,085, management fees, \$60,000, software, \$47,095, CIS project, \$161,786, 360 project \$6,600, radiology administration fee, \$40,200 and other, \$127,628. Fees paid for the year ending June 30, 2013 related to this agreement were as follows: CEO reimbursement, \$210,424, Interim CEO Eagle Health Care \$38,271, clinic practice manager reimbursement, \$131,369, management fees, \$60,000, software, \$82,062, CIS project, \$100,470, 360 project \$6,300, radiology administration fee, \$38,413 and other, \$109,399.

The Hospital entered into an affiliation agreement with Billings Clinic on March 26, 2014. The purpose of the transaction is for Billings Clinic to assume a 25% minority role in the governance of the Hospital, with certain defined rights and obligations. It is the objective of the parties, among other things, to work cooperatively in the development and operation of a new hospital and clinic facility in Livingston, Montana (the "Replacement Facility") to replace the existing hospital, with a view to creating a new model for the delivery of high quality health care services in rural communities.

NOTE Q - SPLIT-INTEREST AGREEMENT

Donors established two identical trusts with a trustee, naming the Hospital as the beneficiary of the charitable remainder unitrusts. Under the terms of the split-interest agreements, the donors will receive quarterly payments from the trusts for a period of ten years or until the deaths of the donors, whichever occurs later, at which time the balance will be distributed to the Hospital. Based on the minimum ten-year distribution period and the use of a six percent discount rate, the present value of future benefits expected to be received by the Hospital was estimated to be \$143,510, which was reported in 1999 as a temporarily restricted contribution and a contribution receivable from the charitable remainder unitrusts and was included in other assets. The Hospital also recorded an adjustment in the estimated fair market value of future benefits of \$2,910 and \$2,345 in 2014 and 2013, respectively.

NOTE S - ENDOWMENT NET ASSETS

The endowment consists of numerous individual funds established for a variety of purposes. The Hospital's endowment includes both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments. As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments, are classified and reported based upon the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of Directors of the Hospital has interpreted the Montana Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (MUPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary.

As a result of this interpretation, the Hospital classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund.

The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Hospital in a manner consistent with the standard of the prudence prescribed by the MUPMIFA.

In accordance with the MUPMIFA, the Hospital considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- 1 The duration and preservation of the fund.
- 2 The purposes of Hospital and the donor-restricted endowment fund.
- 3 General economic conditions.
- 4 The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments.
- 5 Other resources of the Hospital, and
- 6 The investment policies of the Hospital.

Funds with Deficiencies

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or MUPMIFA requires the Hospital to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with GAAP, deficiencies of this nature that are reported in unrestricted net assets were \$6,860 as of June 30, 2013. These deficiencies resulted from unfavorable market fluctuations that occurred shortly after the investment of net permanently restricted contributions and appropriation for certain programs that was deemed prudent by the Board of Directors.

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Hospital has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Hospital must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period(s) as well as board-designated funds.

Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to preserve endowment capital. Funds shall be invested such that no less than 30% and no more than 70% of such funds shall be invested in equities, with the balance invested in fixed income securities, while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. The Hospital expects its endowment funds, over time, to provide a reasonable rate of return.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Hospital relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized gains) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Hospital targets a diversified asset allocation including cash equivalents, fixed income, and equity securities to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy and How Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

Ough Trust – The Hospital Board of Directors, based on recommendations by a committee comprised of Hospital and community members, approves appropriations for distribution limited to the accumulated income of the fund.

Stafford Hospice Endowment - The Hospital Board of Directors, based on recommendations by Hospital administration, approves appropriations for distribution limited to 7% of the total fund value in any given year.

In establishing this policy, the Hospital considered the long-term expected return on its endowment. This is consistent with the Hospital's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment return.

NOTE T - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1

Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Hospital has the ability to access.

Level 2

Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3

Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There were no changes in valuation techniques used at June 30, 2014 and 2013.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value:

- *Equity Securities* Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.
- *Corporate Bonds* Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities. This includes basing value on yields currently available on comparable securities of issuers with similar credit ratings.
- *Government Securities* Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities.

- *Mutual funds* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

NOTE V - MANAGEMENT SERVICES AGREEMENT

On June 20, 2002, the Hospital entered into a management services agreement with Billings Clinic (BC) for a period of three years, and renewable annually after June 19, 2005, unless terminated by either party. The agreement authorizes BC to operate and manage Livingston Healthcare subject to certain conditions and limitations. BC is compensated for a chief executive officer, a clinic practice manager and a general management fee for its services.

NOTE W - CONTINGENCIES

The Hospital has potential claims pending arising in the normal course of business. While it is impossible to estimate the ultimate liability, if any, with respect to these matters, management believes the Hospital maintains adequate insurance coverage and there will be no material adverse effect on the financial position of the Hospital.

Note 1 – Basis of Presentation

The Livingston Healthcare and Subsidiary maintains insurance coverage that provides for replacement of all capital assets purchased with federal funds. Furthermore, the Hospital has maintained certain deposits in a bond reserve fund. The Fund is required to be maintained at an amount equal to the maximum annual debt service of the bonds. The Hospital has also maintained certain measures of financial performance during the period as required by the indenture.
