NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

Bisbee Hospital Association, Inc , d/b/a Copper Queen Community Hospital (the “Hospital”), is a non-profit corporation organized under the laws of the State of Arizona in 1977. The Hospital primarily earns revenues by providing inpatient, outpatient, and emergency services to residents within the Bisbee, Arizona community and adjacent areas. The Hospital also operates a home health agency in the same geographic area and three rural health clinics located in Bisbee, Douglas, and Palominas, Arizona. Expenses relate to the provision of medical care and general and administrative costs.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of support and revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of all liquid investments, other than those limited as to use, with original maturities of three months or less.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include cash set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Hospital, if any, are included in current assets.

Certificates of Deposit

Investments in certificates of deposit are carried at cost, which approximates fair value.

(continued)

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Patient Accounts Receivable

The Hospital reports patient accounts receivable for services rendered at net realizable amounts from third-party payors, patients, and others. The Hospital provides an allowance for doubtful accounts based upon a review of outstanding receivables, historical collection information, and existing economic conditions. An allowance for contractual adjustments is based on expected payment rates from payors based on current reimbursement methodologies. As a service to the patient, the Hospital bills third-party payors directly and bills the patient when the patient's liability is determined. Patient accounts receivable are due in full when billed. These receivables are generally unsecured, are due from third-party payors and individuals, and arise from services provided to individuals geographically concentrated in Cochise County, Arizona. The maximum amount of potential loss due to credit risk that the Hospital could incur is the balance of patient accounts receivable as shown on the balance sheet.

Supplies

Supply inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method, or market.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost and are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of each asset (which range from 3 to 40 years). Assets under capital lease obligations are amortized over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives. Amortization of assets subject to capital leases is reported as part of depreciation expense. Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the asset is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as temporarily restricted. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable values and all investments in debt securities are stated at fair market value. The Hospital has classified substantially all of its investments in debt and equity securities as other-than-trading securities and are classified as non-current. Investment return is reflected in the statement of operations and changes in net assets as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted based on the existence and nature of any donor or legally imposed restrictions.

Intangible Assets

The Hospital amortizes intangible assets over the estimated life of the asset using straight-line amortization.

(continued)

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Basis of Presentation

The net assets and revenues, expenses, gains, and losses included in the financial statements are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets – Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets – Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met by actions of the Hospital and/or the passage of time. Temporarily restricted assets that are expended for the restricted purpose in the same fiscal year as received are reported as unrestricted items.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets – Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that will be maintained permanently by the Hospital. There were no permanently restricted net assets at June 30, 2014 and 2013.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at contractual amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered and include estimated retroactive adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known. The Hospital is a critical access hospital for Medicare reimbursement purposes, whereby its Medicare reimbursements are based on allowable costs. For uninsured patients who do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue based upon discounted rates, and records a significant provision for bad debts when services are provided. In 2014, 6% of net patient service revenue was from self-pay patients.

Charity Care

The Hospital provides charity care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. The Hospital operates a 24-hour emergency room that provides care to all patients regardless of ability to pay. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue. The estimated cost of charity care is determined based on a calculation using a cost to charge ratio of providing services. The Hospital also provides health-related programs and services to benefit the communities it serves.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Contributions

Contributions of cash and other assets are recorded at estimated fair value at the time the promise to give is received. The gifts are reported as temporarily restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when the restriction is met, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets.

Medical Malpractice Coverage and Claims

The Hospital pays fixed premiums for medical malpractice insurance under an occurrence basis policy. The Hospital also purchases excess coverage under a claims-made policy. The Hospital accrues the expense of its share of covered claims, if any, plus unasserted claims and unreported incidents occurring during the year by estimating the probable ultimate cost of any claim or incident. Estimates are based on the Hospital's own claims experience.

Income from Operations

The statement of operations and changes in net assets utilizes the term 'income from operations' as the performance indicator for its operating activities. It excludes investment income, grant revenue, and contributions.

Income Taxes

The Hospital is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Hospital received its letter of determination from the Internal Revenue Service in 1977. Certain unrelated business income may be subject to income tax.

The Hospital follows FASB Codification 740-10-50 for disclosure of income tax related matters. The standard sets a "more likely than not" criterion for recognizing the tax benefits of uncertain tax positions. The Hospital believes that its income tax filing positions and deductions will be sustained upon examination and, accordingly, have not recorded any reserves or related accruals for interest and penalties in the accompanying financial statements for uncertain income tax positions. Income tax related interest and penalties are reported in general and administrative expenses when incurred. No income tax examinations are currently underway or anticipated. The statute of limitations is three years for federal income tax purposes and four years for the state of Arizona.

Bad Debts

The Hospital provides an allowance for doubtful accounts based upon a review of outstanding receivables, the age of accounts, the payor mix, historical collection information, and existing economic conditions

Bad debts are monitored by management and are determined to be delinquent based upon review of aging reports coupled with correspondence with patients and third-party payors. Bad debts are written off when all reasonable attempts to collect the debt have been exhausted.

Advertising and Promotion Costs

The Hospital expenses advertising and promotion costs as incurred. Advertising and promotion totaled \$210,297 for 2014 (\$148,306 for 2013).

Electronic Health Records Incentive Payments

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 established funding in order to provide incentive payments to hospitals and physicians that implement the use of electronic health record technology by 2014. The Hospital may receive incentive payments for up to four years, provided it demonstrates meaningful use of the technology. The revenue for the incentive payments is recognized as the Hospital demonstrates compliance with the various meaningful use requirements and collection of the incentive payment is reasonably assured. The incentive payments are reported in non-operating revenue.

Presentation of Patient Service Revenue and Bad Debts

In 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board adopted Accounting Standards Update 2011-07, *Health Care Entities Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities*. This standard establishes accounting and disclosure requirements for healthcare entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time services are rendered even though they do not assess a patient's ability to pay. The update changes the presentation of the statement of operations and changes in net assets and adds new disclosures. The provision for bad debts is required to be presented on a separate line as a deduction from patient service revenue in the statement of operations and changes in net assets. The standard became effective for the Hospital for the year ended June 30, 2013 and was implemented during that year. Adoption of this standard did not result in any impact on beginning net assets.

Insurance Claims

In 2012, the Hospital adopted Accounting Standards Update 2010-24, *Health Care Entities Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries*. This standard requires that accrued liabilities for malpractice and similar claims be reported separately from related insurance recoveries receivable on the balance sheet. Prior guidance allowed those amounts to be netted against each other. There was no impact on beginning net assets related to the implementation of this standard nor was there a material impact on the Hospital's results of operations or cash flows for the year ended June 30, 2014, as a result of the adoption of this standard.

Comparative Information

Certain reclassifications have been made to the June 30, 2013 financial statements in order to conform to the June 30, 2014 presentation. Such reclassifications had no effect on reported income.

2. PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

- As a critical access hospital, the Medicare reimbursement is cost-based. The Hospital is reimbursed at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and subsequent audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Hospital records an estimated receivable or liability for the estimated settlement that it expects to result from the filing of the annual cost report. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2012.
- AHCCCS – Inpatient services are paid based upon predetermined per diem rates. Outpatient services rendered to AHCCCS program beneficiaries are paid based upon discounts from standard charges, which are established by the state of Arizona.

Approximately 47% of net patient service revenues are from participation in the Medicare and state-sponsored Medicaid (AHCCCS) programs. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near-term.

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Fair value is based upon quoted values when available and discounted cash flow analysis based on current investment rates for similar assets. The fair value of the certificates approximated the carrying value at June 30, 2014 and 2013.

Long-Term Debt

The carrying value of the long-term debt approximates fair value based on current rates available to similar entities with similar credit ratings.

Investments

U.S. generally accepted accounting principles establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels. Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority, Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets, and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority. The Hospital uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Hospital measures fair values using Level 1 input because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value.

Level 1 Fair Value Measurements are based on quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date. An active market for the assets is a market in which transactions for the asset occur with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

Level 2 Fair Value Measurements are based on inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset, either directly or indirectly. If the asset has a specified (contractual) term, a Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset.

Level 3 Fair Value Measurements are based on unobservable inputs for the asset. Unobservable inputs shall be used to measure fair value to the extent that relevant observable inputs are not available, thereby allowing for situations in which there is little, if any, market activity for the assets at the measurement date. However, the fair value measurement objective remains the same, that is, an exit price from the perspective of a market participant that holds the asset. Therefore, unobservable inputs shall reflect the reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the (including assumption about risk). Unobservable inputs shall be developed based on the best information available in the circumstances, which might include the reporting entity's own data.

9. ASSETS AND OBLIGATIONS UNDER CAPITAL LEASES

The Hospital leases various items of medical equipment that have been capitalized under the terms of the lease agreements and are included in equipment on the balance sheet. All of the capital leases ended in the current fiscal year. The cost of leased medical equipment capitalized was \$1,122,815 and \$1,122,815 at June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Accumulated amortization was \$776,747 and \$643,614 and as of June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Amortization expense totaled \$133,133 and \$136,820 on these assets in 2014 and 2013, respectively.

10. CHARITY CARE AND OTHER COMMUNITY BENEFITS

The Hospital is dedicated to providing services for the needy and accepts all patients regardless of their ability to pay. Such care is provided without charge or at amounts less than established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because these services are not expected to result in cash flows, charity care is not included in net patient service revenue. The costs incurred in providing these services are included in the Hospital's operating expenses.

The Hospital's approximate charity care, based upon standard rates, for the years ended June 30, 2014 and 2013 was \$1,123,000 and \$1,399,000, respectively. The estimated cost of the charity care was \$418,000 and \$428,000 for 2014 and 2013, respectively.

The Hospital also provides care for medically indigent patients covered under the AHCCCS program at rates substantially below its standard charge. Those discounts are not included in the amounts shown above. The Hospital provides wellness programs and health-related information to residents of the communities in which it operates.

11. PENSION PLAN

The Hospital has a defined contribution money purchase pension plan covering substantially all employees. Total pension cost is based on 3% of eligible salaries, less forfeitures, and was approximately \$207,000 and \$192,000 for 2014 and 2013, respectively.

12. CONTINGENCIES

Medical Malpractice Claims

The Hospital has been named as a defendant in malpractice claims arising out of the normal conduct of business. The reserve for professional liability claims was \$0 and \$150,000 at June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. The reserve is included in accrued expenses in the accompanying balance sheet. The Hospital's risks related to professional liability are insured through a claims-made policy. The estimated amount receivable under the insurance contract is \$0 and \$150,000 at June 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively, and is included in other receivables in the accompanying balance sheet.

Grants

The Hospital participates in federal and state assisted grant and contract programs that are subject to financial and compliance audits. The compliance with applicable grant and contract requirements may be established at some future date. The amount, if any, of audit assessments cannot be determined at this time. Such assessments, if any, resulting from such audits are recorded when they are determinable.

13. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

Cash

The Hospital maintains cash balances on deposit with financial institutions that, at times, exceed the insured limits. At June 30, 2014, the uninsured balance of cash in depository accounts and certificates of deposit approximated \$7,600,000.

Receivables

The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of who are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of net patient accounts receivable at June 30, 2014 and 2013 is as follows:

15. SIGNIFICANT ESTIMATES AND CONCENTRATIONS

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require disclosure of certain significant estimates and current vulnerability due to certain concentrations. Those matters include the following:

Allowance for Net Patient Service Revenue Adjustments

Estimates of allowances for adjustment and bad debts are included in net patient service revenue and are described in Notes 1 and 2 of the financial statements.

Receivables from Medicare and AHCCCS

Receivables from Medicare are estimated based upon preliminary cost reports prepared by the Hospital's cost report consultant and interim rate adjustments provided by the intermediary using unaudited data.

Receivables from AHCCCS are recorded based on an annual report and interim payments received and is subject to review and possible adjustment by AHCCCS.

Other Concentrations

At June 30, 2014, approximately 76% of the Hospital's labor force was covered by a collective bargaining agreement.

16. COMMITMENTS

Leases

The Hospital leases various equipment and facilities under operating leases expiring at various dates through July 2018. Total rental expense in 2014 and 2013 for all operating leases was approximately \$185,000 and \$84,000, respectively.

Other Commitments

The Hospital is in the midst of an expansion project of the rural health clinic in Douglas. The Hospital has executed contracts with an architect and a contractor for the project. The total estimated cost of the expansion is \$3,000,000. The clinic expansion is being principally self-financed with the Hospital's cash reserves. Construction on the expansion began in 2014 and is expected to be completed during 2015. As of June 30, 2014, construction in process included \$354,922 related to this project.

17. AVAILABLE LINE OF CREDIT

The Hospital also has a margin line of credit available from its brokerage firm with an interest rate of 4.75%. At June 30, 2014, there was no balance outstanding and the available credit capacity was approximately \$280,000.

18. PATIENT PROTECTION AND AFFORDABLE CARE ACT

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act ("PPACA") will substantially reform the United States health care system. PPACA will significantly affect consumers as well as health care providers. In 2014, health care exchanges will provide individuals without employer provided health care coverage the opportunity to purchase insurance. It is anticipated that the increase in the number of insured individuals will increase the demand for health care services. It is also anticipated that reimbursement rates paid by insurance carriers, Medicare and AHCCCS to providers will be impacted by PPACA.

While the PPACA is extremely complex and the overall impact on the Hospital cannot be predicted, it is possible that it will impact the Hospital's net patient revenue and provide operational challenges during the implementation period.

19. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events have been analyzed through October 24, 2014, the date the financial statements were available for release.
