NOTE 1: DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting and financial reporting policies of Hendrick Medical Center ("Hendrick") conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and are based upon accounting practices generally followed by hospitals The more significant accounting policies are summarized as follows

Organization

Hendrick Medical Center, located in Abilene, Texas, is a not-for-profit acute care hospital. The primary business of the Hospital includes inpatient, outpatient and emergency care services for residents of Taylor and surrounding counties. Admitting physicians are primarily practitioners in the local area.

Basis of Presentation

Hendrick has adopted ASC 958-210, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations This standard has been applied on a retroactive basis—ASC 958-210 requires Hendrick to classify net assets based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. These classifications of net assets are described as follows.

Unrestricted - All resources over which the governing board has discretionary control

<u>Temporarily Restricted</u> - Resources that have donor imposed restrictions that permits Hendrick to expend the assets as specified and is satisfied either by the passage of time or by actions of Hendrick

<u>Permanently Restricted</u> - Resources that include a donor imposed restriction that stipulates that resources be maintained permanently but permits Hendrick to use or expend part or all of the income (or other economic benefit) derived from the donated assets

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by Board designation or other arrangements under trust agreements or with third-party payors

Hendrick routinely invests its surplus operating funds in money market mutual funds. These funds generally invest in highly liquid U.S. government and agency obligations

Method of Providing for Uncollectible Accounts

The provision for uncollectible accounts, including Medicare, Medicaid and Champus contractuals, bad debts, charity and other third-party contractual deductions, is made using the reserve method and is based upon management's continuing review of accounts receivable

Inventories

The inventories of Hendrick are valued at amounts which, in the aggregate, approximate the lower of cost or market on a first-in, first-out method. Inventories consist primarily of medical supplies and related ancillary products to be utilized for various healthcare and supporting operations of the hospital

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements, designated assets set aside for self insurance reserves, and board designated funds for various purposes over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of Hendrick have been reclassified in the Statements of Financial Position at August 31, 2014 and 2013.

Interest in Net Assets of Hendrick Medical Center Foundation

Hendrick Medical Center Foundation ("HMCF") is a financially interrelated organization to Hendrick. It also serves as a fundraising organization for the benefit of Hendrick and related affiliates. In compliance with ASC 958-605, Transfers of Assets to a Not-for-Profit Organization or Charitable Trust that Raises or Holds Contributions for Others. Hendrick reports its interest in the net assets of HMCF on its Statements of Financial Position and any increase or decrease in HMCF's net assets as "Change in interest in net assets of Hendrick Medical Center Foundation" on the Statements of Operations

Investments and Investment Income

Donated investments are recorded at fair value at the date of receipt. Marketable equity securities included in investment portfolios are carried at their fair value, when readily available, at the statement of financial position date. Alternative investments are valued primarily by the respective fund managers based on the underlying investments. Investments in corporate joint ventures are accounted for using the equity method.

Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law

Repurchase Agreements

Hendrick has entered into purchases of securities under agreements to resell substantially identical securities (repurchase agreements). Securities purchased under agreements to resell at August 31, 2014, consist of U.S. agencies and bonds. The amounts advanced under these agreements represent short-term securities and are reported in the accompanying Statements of Financial Position as each and each equivalents. The securities underlying the agreements are book entry securities. The securities are held in a third-party custodian's account designated under a written custodial agreement that explicitly recognizes Hendrick's interest in the securities. At August 31, 2014, these agreements matured within ninety days and no material amount of agreements to resell securities purchased was outstanding with any individual dealer.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset (4-50 years) and is computed using the straight-line method. Interest cost incurred net of interest income earned on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings or equipment are reported as unrestricted support, and are included in the excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained,

expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service

Other Assets

Other assets including the current and non-current portions in the amount of \$22,987,325 as of August 31, 2014 consisted of the following \$5.091,574 of prepaid expenses, \$2,395,841 of bond insurance, \$2,933,287 in notes receivable from third-parties, net of allowances, \$1,482,648 of bond issuance costs, and other miscellaneous billings and receivables of \$11,083,975

Other assets including the current and non-current portions in the amount of \$19,279,742 as of August 31, 2013 consisted of the following \$5,054,537 of prepaid expenses, \$2,575,670 of bond insurance, \$1,961,063 in notes receivable from third-parties, net of allowances, \$1,113,618 of bond issuance costs, and other miscellaneous billings and receivables of \$8,574,854

Agreement with Continue Care Hospital

Hendrick Medical Center and Hendrick Center for Extended Care entered into an agreement and plan of merger on December 31, 2013 to merge the operations of Hendrick Center for Extended Care into Continue Care Hospital at Hendrick Medical Center. Inc ("CCHHMC") a subsidiary of CHC Community Care. L.L.C. As part of this agreement. Hendrick Medical Center has extended a line of credit to CCHHMC in the amount of \$2,000,000 with monthly interest only payments at 6% and final payment due at maturity. As of August 31, 2014, the balance of the line of credit was \$500,000 and is included in "Other assets" on the Statements of Financial Position. After the line of credit has been paid in full, Hendrick Medical Center is entitled to receive eighty percent (80%) of the distributable cash generated by the business. Hendrick has also entered into an ancillary services agreement and management agreement with CCHHMC with an initial term of three years. The agreement also granted Hendrick a right of purchase option at fair market value to purchase all of CHC Community Care's interest in CCHHMC with appropriate written warning. Hendrick and CCHHMC entered into a lease agreement effective January. 1, 2014 and expiring on December 31, 2016 with an initial lease amount of \$19,000 per month. The accounts receivable related to ancillary services and lease payments due from CCHHMC as of August 31, 2014 was \$854,631 and is included in "Other current assets" on the Statements of Financial Position.

Goodwill

Goodwill represents the excess of the cost over the fair market value of the net assets acquired of a cardiology practice and an imaging center. The cardiology practice was acquired on January 1, 2012 in conjunction with affiliates Hendrick Provider Network and Hendrick Medical Office Buildings, L. L. C. at a total purchase price of \$11,309,227. Hendrick received tangible assets in the amount of \$322,270, and intangibles including use of the trade name of \$142,953 and goodwill of \$2,553,216. Other assets received in the transaction were recorded on the books of the related entities noted above. The imaging center was acquired on December 1, 2012 at a total purchase price of \$2,286,720, including goodwill of \$1,018,330.

In accordance with ASC 350-10, *Goodwill and Other Intangible Assets*, goodwill is not amortized, but tested for impairment on an annual basis, or more often if indicators of potential impairment exist, by determining if the carrying value of the practice exceeds its estimated fair value. Factors that could trigger an interim impairment test include, but are not limited to, underperformance relative to historical or projected future operating results, significant changes in the manner of use of the acquired assets or the practice's overall business, significant negative industry or economic trends and a sustained period where market capitalization, plus an appropriate control premium, is less than net assets. See **NOTE** 7 for further details regarding changes in carrying value of goodwill

Estimated Professional, Employee Injury and General Liability Costs

The provision for estimated self-insured professional, employee injury and general liability claims includes estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported

Funds Held For Others

"Funds held for others" consist of amounts held for the benefit of others The earnings from the balances (if any) are disbursed to recipients designated by the third party

In accordance with ASC 958-605, Transfers of Assets to a Not-for-Profit Organization or Charitable Trust that Raises or Holds Contributions for Others, Hendrick holds all contributions to be used for the benefit of other organizations as a liability on the Statements of Financial Position

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by Hendrick has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by Hendrick in perpetuity.

Hendrick has adopted ASC 958-205, Endowments of Not-for-Profit Organizations Net Asset Classification of Funds Subject to an Enacted Version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act, and Enhanced Disclosures for All Endowment Funds, which provides guidance on the net asset classification of donor-restricted endowment funds for a not-for-profit organization that is subject to an enacted version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act of 2006 (UPMIFA) ASC 958-205 also improves disclosures about an organization's endowment funds (both donor restricted endowment funds and board designated endowment funds) whether or not the organization is subject to UPMIFA. The Board of Trustees determined that the majority of Hendrick's net assets do not meet the definition of endowment funds under UPMIFA.

Temporarily restricted net assets consist of restricted contributions for specific purposes, and the remaining portion of donor-restricted endowment funds that are not classified as permanently restricted net assets including earnings off permanently restricted net assets. When donor restrictions expire, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or a purpose restriction is fulfilled, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions

Permanently restricted net assets represent the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date and the original value of subsequent gifts to donor-restricted endowment funds

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to Hendrick are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Unconditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported as temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

Charity Care

Hendrick provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. See **NOTE 12** for further disclosure of Hendrick's charity care policy

Net Patient Service Revenue

Hendrick has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to Hendrick at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors.

Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined

Electronic Health Records Implementation

The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act ("HITECH Act") was enacted into law on February 17, 2009 as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) The HITECH Act includes provisions designed to increase the use of electronic health records ("EHR") by both physicians and hospitals Hendrick intends to comply with the EHR meaningful use requirements of the HITECH Act in time to qualify for the maximum available Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments Hendrick's compliance will result in significant costs including professional services focused on successfully designing and implementing EHR solutions along with costs associated with the hardware and software components of the project During the year ended August 31, 2014 and 2013. Hendrick recognized \$0 and \$3,307,206, respectively, in other operating revenues related to Medicaid EHR incentive payments Hendrick has incurred and will continue to incur both capital expenditures and operating expenses in connection with the implementation of its EHR initiatives. The timing of these expenditures does not necessarily correlate with the timing of receipt of the incentive payments and the recognition of revenues For the year ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, Hendrick estimates that they capitalized approximately \$760,000 and \$392,000 and incurred approximately \$5,219,372 and \$5,075,028 of additional operating expenses including depreciation related to implementation of EHR initiatives, respectively. Hendrick currently estimates that, at a minimum, total costs incurred to comply will be recovered through improved reimbursement amounts over the projected lifecycle of this initiative

Income Taxes

Hendrick is a not-for-profit corporation as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is exempt from Federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code Unrelated business income of Hendrick is considered taxable. In accordance with ASC 740-10 FASB Interpretation (FIN) No. 48, Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes, management evaluated Hendrick's tax positions and concluded that Hendrick had taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements to comply with the provisions of this guidance. With a few exceptions, Hendrick is no longer subject to income tax examinations by the U.S. federal, state or local tax authorities for years before 2011.

Medicaid Supplemental Payments

For the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, Hendrick posted \$9,632,071 and \$10,250,505, respectively, in supplemental Medicaid payments revenue through the upper payment limits guidance. These amounts are included in "Other operating revenue" on the "Statements of Operations". Due to a changing regulatory environment, it is uncertain that these funds will continue in subsequent periods. Hendrick expects to collect all amounts currently owed under the upper payment limits guidance, but collection of these amounts is expected to be delayed.

Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The statement of operations includes excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, normally include permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

Subsequent Events

Hendrick has evaluated subsequent events through November 25, 2014, the date the financial statements were available to be issued

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

ASU 2014-09

In May 2014, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) and International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) issued substantially converged final standards on revenue recognition. The FASB's Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2014-09, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers*, was issued in three parts. (1) Section A. "Summary and Amendments That Create Revenue from Contracts with Customers and Other Assets and Deferred Costs – Contracts With Customers". (2) Section B. "Conforming Amendments to Other Topics and Subtopics in the Codification and Status Tables", and (3) Section C. "Background Information and Basis for Conclusions"

ASU 2014-09 provides a robust framework for addressing revenue recognition issues and, upon its effective date, replaces almost all existing revenue recognition guidance, including industry-specific guidance, in current U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). This standard will help with improved comparability of revenue recognition practices across entities, industries, jurisdictions, and capital markets. Given the broad applicability and potentially significant ramifications of the guidance in the ASU, the ASU is not effective until 2017 for calendar end public entities, which includes not-for-profit entities that have issued, or are conduit bond obligors for, securities that are traded, listed or quoted on an exchange or an over the count market and in 2018 for all other entities. Upon the effective date, virtually all of the revenue recognition-related guidance previously applied by health care organizations is superseded. The only health care specific revenue-related guidance that has been retained in legacy GAAP relates to loss contracts for continuing care retirement communities and prepaid health care services, charity care, and contributions from related fundraising entities. Applying the new guidance to the Hospital could significant affect the timing and amount of revenue recognized.

ASU 2013-06

In April 2013, the FASB issued accounting guidance related to not-for-profit entities regarding *Services Received from Personnel of an Affiliate* This guidance is in regard to revenue recognition for not-for-profit entities that requires that contributed services be recognized at fair value if employees of separately governed affiliated entities regularly perform services (in other than an advisory capacity) for and under the direction of the donee that should be utilized. This amendment applies to not-for-profit, business-oriented health care entities, that receive services from personnel of an affiliate that directly benefit the recipient not-for-profit entity. The amendments are effective prospectively for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2013. The guidance was adopted for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2014 and was not determined to be material to the financial statements.

Other recent accounting pronouncements issued by the FASB (including its Emerging Issues Task Force) and the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants did not or are not believed by management to have a material impact on Hendrick's present or future financial statements

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Reclassifications

The accompanying financial statements for the year ended August 31, 2013, reflect reclassifications of certain balances or amounts from one category to another to conform with classifications implemented by management in the fiscal year ended August 31, 2014. The reclassifications do not affect excess of revenues over expenses or net assets.

The Tarrant County Cultural Educational Facilities Finance Corporation Variable Rate Hospital Revenue Bonds Series 2009C were issued on September 9, 2009 in the amount of \$25,000,000 with a maturity date of September 1, 2026. The Series 2009 bond proceeds were used to refinance the Abilene Health Facilities Development Corporation Hospital Refunding and Improvement Bonds Series 1995A, 1995B and 1995C, and to finance construction projects. Prior to maturity, Hendrick redeemed the Series 2009C bonds on December 5, 2013 in the amount of \$23,350,000 in principal and \$24,030 in interest.

The Tarrant County Cultural Education Facilities Finance Corporation Hospital Revenue Bonds Series 2013 were issued on December 5, 2013 in the amount of \$63,830,000 with a maturity date of September 1, 2044. The Series 2013 bonds were issued to finance and reimburse the costs of constructing and equipping health facilities for Hendrick, refund the Series 2009C bonds and to fund a debt service reserve fund.

Under the terms of the Series 2009 and 2013 bond trust indentures. Hendrick is required to maintain certain deposits with a trustee—Such deposits are included with assets limited as to use—The bond indentures also place limits on the incurrence of additional borrowings and require that Hendrick satisfy certain measures of financial performance as long as the bonds are outstanding

NOTE 10: EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT PLANS

Hendrick sponsors a defined contribution pension plan with Guidestone available to substantially all employees. Hendrick's contributions to the plan match the employee's contribution to the plan up to either 3% or 5% (depending on the date of employment) of the covered employee's annual salary depending upon the employee's contribution. Pension expense for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, was \$2,592,179 and \$2,726,888, respectively. Hendrick funds pension plan requirements to the fiduciary monthly

Hendrick has entered into deferred compensation contracts with certain officers to provide compensation benefits to the officers after retirement at the age of fifty-five (55) years or older. Employees benefit expense related to these agreements was \$520,636 and \$425,024 in 2014 and 2013, respectively

Hendrick also provides a 457B and 457F plan for the benefit of their executives. The balance of the 457B plan totaled \$4,391,963 and \$1,220,248 at August 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively. The balance of the 457F plan totaled \$543,142 and \$492,897 at August 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Both of the plans are funded entirely by the employees and are included on the Statements of Financial Position under "Assets Limited As To Use" with a corresponding liability included in "Other liabilities"

NOTE 11: NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE AND THIRD PARTY SETTLEMENTS

Hendrick has agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement to Hendrick at amounts different from its established rates. The basis for reimbursement under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, fee schedules, per diems, discounts from established charges and prompt payment discounts. Contractual adjustments under third-party reimbursement programs represent the difference between Hendrick's established rates for services and amounts reimbursed by third-party payors. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with major third-party payors follows.

Services rendered to Medicare recipients are primarily reimbursed according to prospectively determined rates on both inpatient and outpatient services. These rates vary according to patient classification systems which are based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Hendrick is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by Hendrick and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary which can take several years to completely settle.

Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid recipients are primarily reimbursed according to prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system which is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Outpatient services are reimbursed through various payment systems including fee schedules, prospective rates, and a cost based method. Hendrick is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by Hendrick and audits thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary which can take several years to completely settle.

Hendrick has also entered into contractual agreements with certain other commercial insurance carriers, preferred provider organizations, and major Abilene region employers. The basis for payment to Hendrick under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, per diems, fee schedules, discounted feefor-service rates and other similar contractual arrangements. These revenues are also subject to review and audit by the payors

Retroactively calculated contractual adjustments arising under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors are recognized on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined

Revenue from the Medicare program accounted for approximately 51 and 51 percent of Hendrick's net patient service revenue for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Revenue from the Medicaid program accounted for approximately 10 and 10 percent of Hendrick's net patient service revenue for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

The laws and regulations under which the Medicare and Medicaid programs operate are complex, subject to frequent change and subject to interpretation. As part of operating under these programs, there is a possibility that governmental authorities may review Hendrick's compliance with these laws and regulations. Such review may result in adjustments to reimbursement previously received and subject Hendrick to fines and penalties. Management believes they have complied with the requirements of the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

Hendrick recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, Hendrick analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debt. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources or revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage. Hendrick analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debt, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid)

For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care. Hendrick recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill). Hendrick records a significant provision for bad debt in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts

NOTE 12: CHARITY SERVICES

Hendrick provides total and partial income based discounts through its charity program. A patient may qualify for 100% assistance or a lesser percentage based on application criteria. The policy is primarily based on the household income of the applicant with respect to the Federal Poverty. Income Levels (FPIL) as published by the Department of Health and Human Services. Hendrick utilizes a charity discount sliding scale to determine assistance amounts where applicants with household income below 250% of the FPIL could be eligible for full assistance and those with household income of 500% or higher of the FPIL will not be eligible for charity assistance. Applicants for the charity program are also required to provide complete and accurate information regarding their financial circumstances by completing a *Request for Assistance* form. Misrepresentation of these facts may be cause for denial of assistance. Charity assistance is only considered after all efforts to obtain third party coverage have been exhausted. The charity program does not discriminate based on race, creed, religion, sex, or national origin

Hendrick maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity services it provides. These records include the amount of charges foregone for services and supplies furnished without regard to the patient's ability to pay. The estimated direct and indirect costs and expenses incurred to provide charity services for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013 were \$16,651,275 and \$15,531,296, respectively. These direct and indirect costs are based on management's estimate of the ratio of cost to gross charges of providing charity services. Costs were estimated by taking total costs incurred in providing patient care, less direct known costs that were not associated with patient care such as indirect marketing, bad debt, and other items unrelated to patient care. This ratio was applied to the provisions for charity care, which is based on gross charges.

Charity care totaled \$85,344,322 and \$75,550,637 for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively

There were no contributions restricted solely for the purposes of providing charity services during the year

NOTE 13: ESTIMATED PROFESSIONAL, EMPLOYEE INJURY AND GENERAL LIABILITY

Hendrick has established a self-insurance plan for the purpose of providing professional and general liability insurance. Professional insurance actuary consultants have been retained to determine funding requirements. The amounts funded have been placed in a self-insurance trust account that is being administered by a trustee. The self-insurance trust account is reported in "Assets Limited As To Use". In addition to the self-insurance trust, Hendrick purchased professional and general liability insurance to cover losses in excess of \$3,000,000 per occurrence.

Hendrick has established an employee injury program known as ProCare ProCare demonstrates Hendrick's active stance in keeping a safe and healthy workplace and providing adequate reimbursement when workplace injury or illness does occur. Hendrick no longer subscribes to the Workers Compensation Act of the State of Texas, and Hendrick provides the ProCare program on a voluntary basis. A ProCare trust has been established to fund losses resulting from employee injury. The trust account is reported within self-insurance trusts in "Assets Limited As To Use". Excess employee injury coverage has been obtained for losses in excess of \$1,000,000 per occurrence.

Hendrick is involved in litigation arising in the ordinary course of business. Claims alleging malpractice have been asserted against Hendrick and are currently in various stages of litigation. Additional claims may be asserted against Hendrick arising from services provided to patients through August 31, 2014. Hendrick is unable to determine the ultimate cost of the resolution of such potential claims. It is the opinion of management and an independent actuarial consultant that estimated professional liability costs accrued at August 31, 2014, are adequate to provide for potential losses resulting from pending or threatened litigation.

There was no charge to operating expenses for professional, employee injury and general liability costs for fiscal years 2014 and 2013

Hendrick Health Network is consolidated in the accompanying financial statements. The resulting affect is not material to the financial presentation of Hendrick Medical Center. Hendrick Center for Extended Care was transferred to Hendrick Medical Center during the year ended August 31, 2014.

If the wholly owned and controlled subsidiaries were consolidated in the accompanying financial statements, total assets would be stated at \$662,108,493 and \$534,900,279 as of August 31, 2014 and 2013 Total liabilities would be stated at \$225,775,079 and \$164,596,431, and net assets at \$436,333,414 and \$370,303,848 as of August 31, 2014 and 2013 The increase in net assets for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013 would total \$66,029,566 and \$34,413,485, respectively

Related Party Transactions

Hendrick made equity transfers to Hendrick Provider Network. Hendrick Anesthesiology Network. Hendrick Center for Extended Care, and Hendrick Medical Development Corporation during the year ended August 31, 2014 totaling \$12,494,019, \$1,799,397, \$580,034, and \$274,099, respectively. Hendrick made equity transfers to Hendrick Provider Network and Hendrick Anesthesiology Network during the year ended

August 31, 2013 totaling \$10,495,344 and \$1,971,842, respectively Hendrick received equity transfers from Hendrick Medical Development Corporation during the year ended August 31, 2013 totaling \$11,090

At various times during the year, Hendrick had note receivable balances from affiliates. These balances were \$0 at August 31, 2014 and 2013. Interest income related to notes receivable from affiliates totaled \$127.642 and \$132,917 for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively

NOTE 16: NEW MARKET TAX CREDIT

Hendrick has worked with Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center (TTUHSC) to build a facility to house the TTUHSC School of Nursing and has executed agreements with two Community Development Entities (CDE) and an Investor for the School of Nursing Project to qualify as a New Markets Tax Credit (NMTC) project. The new market tax credit related to the School of Nursing Project closed during fiscal year 2014. Hendrick Medical Center Foundation made a leveraged loan to a transaction-specific investment fund. The investment fund then used the proceeds of the leveraged loan, plus the amount of any

equity contributed to the investment fund by the NMTC Investor, to make a Qualified Equity Investment (QEI) in the CDE, and the CDE used the proceeds of the QEI to make Qualified Low-Income Community Investment loans for the School of Nursing Project to Hendrick Provider Network (HPN), as the borrower for the School of Nursing Project and as a Qualified Active Low-Income Community Business

Hendrick has leased the facilities to HPN in exchange for a one time ground lease payment of \$11,429,432 which was paid during the fiscal year ended August 31, 2014 as well as \$10 a month for the term of the lease, which is December 31, 2058 HPN sub-leases the facilities to TTUHSC School of Nursing

Cost related to providing TTUHSC a building (including depreciation) and any operational costs provided will be released from temporarily restricted net assets each year by Hendrick as long as the property is being utilized by TTUHSC. The amount of depreciation expense released from temporarily restricted net assets for the year ended August 31, 2014 was \$544,529. If the School of Nursing Project is transferred to TTUHC during any period then the amount of the reduction in net book value will be offset in temporarily restricted assets.

NOTE 17: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Hendrick enters into contractual commitments for certain construction projects As of August 31, 2014, the outstanding commitments on the contracts amount to \$22,858,059

Minimum rental payments incurred under operating leases for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, were \$6,038,833 and \$5,379,126, respectively. Payment requirements for operating leases for the fiscal years ending 2015 through 2019 and thereafter are \$12,122,397, \$6,618,551, \$2,920,235, \$623,368, and \$508,518

Hendrick has entered into contractual commitments with certain physicians to provide guaranteed levels of income. As of August 31, 2014, the outstanding commitments on the contracts amount to \$1,144,556. The balance is included in "Other assets" on the Statements of Financial Position.

Funds Held for Others

Hendrick was previously acting as an agent to facilitate construction for the Texas Tech School of Nursing project and, as such, reported a liability under "Funds held for others" totaling \$10,770,466 as of August 31, 2013. Upon obtaining the new market tax credit in fiscal year 2014 and modifying the existing development agreement with donors, the building is to be held by Hendrick Medical Center for a period of no less than seven years to satisfy the new market tax credit requirements at which time the property may be conveyed to Texas Tech University. At the time the new market tax credit was obtained, funds held for others in the amount of \$8,850,878 was transferred to "Temporarily restricted net assets" of Hendrick Medical Center due to a modification of the initial development agreement and Hendrick no longer acting as an agent but restricted by the agreement as to the use of the funds to provide a building and operational funds for the Texas Tech School of Nursing. See **NOTE 22** for the remaining amount of temporarily restricted net assets remaining for the School of Nursing Project.

Debt Guarantees

Hendrick guarantees up to \$4,000,000 in debt obligations for Texas Healthcare Linens, L L C in which Hendrick Southwestern Health Development Corporation owns a 33% interest

Should Hendrick be required to pay any portion of the total amount of loans it has guaranteed, the organization could attempt to recover some or all of the amounts from guaranteed parties. Hendrick holds no collateral in respect to the guarantees. The fair value of the guaranty as of August 31, 2014 was determined to be immaterial.

Hendrick has guaranteed up to \$12,880,000 in debt obligations for Hendrick Provider Network, an affiliate These funds are partially offset by a receivable held by Hendrick Medical Center Foundation in the amount of \$9,522,600. Due to the affiliates being under common control, the default on these notes by Hendrick Provider Network is low and therefore any value of guaranty is immaterial.

Compliance

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of Federal, state, and local governments. Government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of various statues and regulations by health care providers.

During the year ended August 31, 2011, the Office of the Inspector General (OIG) identified certain billing errors related to specific drug charges resulting in the repayment of \$349,349. Hendrick then conducted an internal review to determine that an additional \$986,662 of charges were at risk and will be paid back to the respective payors. A payable was recorded in the amount of \$1,336,011 as of August 31, 2011 and throughout the year ended August 31, 2012 amounts were paid and settled reducing the liability to \$712,751. The balance of \$712,751 was reversed as of August 31, 2014 as no payment was determined to be necessary.

NOTE 18: CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

Hendrick maintains cash balances at several financial institutions. Accounts at each institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. Hendrick also maintains accounts at a stock brokerage firm. The accounts contain cash and securities. Cash and security balances are insured up to \$100,000 and \$500,000, respectively by the Securities Investor Protection Corporation. At various times during the year, Hendrick may have balances at the financial institutions and stock brokerage firms in excess of insured limits.

Hendrick grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of gross receivables from patients and third-party payors at August 31, is as follows

NOTE 20: FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Cash and cash equivalents: The carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position for cash and cash equivalents approximates its fair value

Pledges receivable: The carrying amount has been discounted to its present value less allowance for uncollectibles. This amount approximates its fair value.

Assets limited as to use: These assets consist primarily of cash, U.S. Treasury obligations, notes and bonds. Fair market values are obtained from independent brokers

Long-term investments: Fair values are based on quoted market prices, if available, or estimated using quoted market prices for similar securities

Notes receivable from affiliates: The notes receivable from affiliates bear interest at variable rates and therefore the carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position approximates its fair value

Accounts payable, accrued expenses and reserves for self-insurance: The carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position for these categories approximates its fair value

Estimated third-party payor settlements: The carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position for estimated third-party payor settlements approximates its fair value

Long-term debt: Fair values of Hendrick's Series 2009 and 2013 bonds are based on current traded value. The fair value of Hendrick's remaining long-term debt is estimated using discounted cash flow analysis, based on Hendrick's current incremental borrowing rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements.

NOTE 21: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

ASC 820-10, Fair Value Measurements, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). ASC 820-10 applies to all financial instruments that are being measured and reported on a fair value basis.

As defined in ASC 820-10, fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, Hendrick uses various methods including market, income, and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, Hendrick often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. Hendrick utilized valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques Hendrick is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories.

Level 1 – Valuations for assets and liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange Level 1 also includes U.S. Treasury and federal agency securities and federal agency mortgage-backed securities, which are traded by dealers or brokers in active markets. Valuations are obtained from readily available pricing sources for market transactions involving identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Valuations for assets and liabilities traded in less active dealer or broker markets Valuations are obtained from third party pricing services for identical or similar assets or liabilities

Level 3 – Valuations for assets and liabilities that are derived from other valuation methodologies, including option pricing models, discounted cash flow models and similar techniques, and not based on market exchange, dealer, or broker traded transactions. Level 3 valuations incorporate certain assumptions and projections in determining the fair value assigned to such assets or liabilities.

For fiscal years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013, the application of valuation techniques applied to similar assets has been consistent. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value.

Pledges receivable: Pledges receivable are valued at the actual amount pledged by the donor discounted to account for their estimated present value using a discount rate of the prime rate for the years ended August 31, 2014 and 2013 Pledges have also been reduced by an allowance for uncollectible accounts as determined by management

Equity and fixed income securities including municipal and U.S. government agencies: valued at the close price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded. If listed prices or quotes are not available, fair value is based upon externally developed models that use unobservable inputs to the limited market activity of the instrument.

Mutual and exchange traded funds: value at the net asset value of shares held at year end at the closing price reported on the active market

Corporate joint ventures: valued at cost which approximates fair value. Cost is obtained from company prepared financial statements. Significant unobservable inputs include capital contributions, distributions, and earnings or losses on the joint venture. The valuation of the corporate joint venture is at 100% of the reported cost based on the entity's financial statements.

Alternative investments: valued at net asset value ("NAV") per unit as determined by the fund administrator using observable and unobservable inputs as of August 31, 2014 and 2013. Alternative investments primarily include private equity and mezzanine funds, which are valued at the underlying investments including convertible debt and warrants. Real estate funds are valued based on the values of underlying real estate holdings. All are considered to be limited liability entities therefore values are determined using capital contributions, distributions, and other related information. Alternative investments and their underlying quantitative factors to derive the unobservable input values are not considered to be material to the financial statements.

Contract Termination with Major Carrier

Hendrick terminated a contract with a commercial insurance carrier during the year ended August 31, 2014 which represented a material portion of the Hospital's commercial insurance revenues. Hendrick has been in negotiation with the insurance carrier but, as of the report date, had not executed a contract. The effect on future revenues cannot be reasonably estimated by management at this time due to employers and individuals shifting to other insurance carriers, but a material reduction in commercial revenues could occur
