Independent Auditors' Report

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

(1) Reporting Entity

Organization

Maine Medical Center and Subsidiaries consists of Maine Medical Center (MMC) and its wholly owned subsidiaries, which include Maine Medical Partners (MMP) and MMC Realty Corporation (MMCRC). These entities are collectively referred to as the "Medical Center." The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of MMC and its controlled subsidiaries. Upon consolidation, intercompany transactions and balances have been eliminated.

MMC is a wholly owned subsidiary of MaineHealth, Inc. (MaineHealth). The purpose of MaineHealth, a tax-exempt corporation, is to lead a community care network that provides a broad range of integrated health care services for populations in Maine and northern New England. Through MaineHealth's subsidiaries and affiliated organizations, the network's mission is to provide services along the full continuum of care as necessary to improve the health status of the population it serves in a cost-effective manner.

MMC is a 637-bed, not-for-profit, major teaching hospital providing community and tertiary health care services. It is affiliated with the Tufts University School of Medicine undergraduate medical education program. MMC also supports clinical, translational, and bench research programs, but focuses on translational research due to its more immediate benefit to patients.

MMP is a multispecialty physician group, which includes a variety of primary care and specialty disciplines. In addition to providing clinical care, the practices develop and promote educational and teaching programs and research activities.

MMCRC was formed for the purpose of acquiring, holding, managing, maintaining, developing, and disposing of real property for the benefit of and in support of MMC.

(2) Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Presentation

The accompanying consolidated financial statements have been presented in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) consistent with the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 954, *Health Care Entities*, and other pronouncements applicable to health care organizations.

(b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates are made in the areas of patient accounts receivable, the fair value of financial instruments, amounts receivable and payable under reimbursement regulations, asset retirement obligations (AROs), retirement benefits, and self-insurance reserves.

(c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt securities with a maturity at the date of purchase of three months or less, excluding amounts classified as investments whose use is limited.

(d) Investments

Investments are stated at fair value. The recorded value of investments in hedge funds and limited partnerships is based on fair value as estimated by management using information provided by external investment managers. As a practical expedient, the Medical Center measures the fair value of these investments on the basis of the net asset value (NAV) per share (or its equivalent). The Medical Center believes that these valuations are a reasonable estimate of fair value as of September 30, 2014 and 2013, but are subject to uncertainty and, therefore, may differ from the value that would have been used had a market for the investments existed. Such differences could be material. Certain of the hedge fund and limited partnership investments have restrictions on the withdrawal of the funds, see note 7. Investments are classified as current assets based on the availability of funds for current operations. Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in the excess of revenue and nonoperating gains – net over expenses, unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. The accounting for the pension plan assets is disclosed in note 7.

As provided for under ASC Topic 825, *Financial Instruments*, the Medical Center made the irrevocable election to report investments and investments whose use is limited at fair value with changes in value reported in the excess of revenue and nonoperating gains – net over expenses. As a result of this election, the Medical Center reflects changes in the fair value, including both increases and decreases in value whether realized or unrealized, in its excess of revenue and nonoperating gains – net over expenses.

Investments, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. As such, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the consolidated financial statements.

(e) Investments Whose Use is Limited

Investments whose use is limited primarily include investments held by trustees under debt agreements, self-insurance trust agreements, and designated investments set aside by the Board of Trustees (the Board) for purposes over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. In addition, investments whose use is limited include investments restricted by donors for specific purposes or periods, investments restricted by donors to be held in perpetuity by the Medical Center, and the related appreciation on those investments. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Medical Center have been classified as current assets.

(f) Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment are recorded at cost. The carrying value is reviewed if facts and circumstances suggest that an impairment may exist. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable assets and is computed using the straight-line method. Interest costs incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets are capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. The Medical Center recorded capitalized interest of approximately \$168,000 and \$130,000 for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

Gifts of long-lived assets, such as land, building, or equipment, are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets and are excluded from the excess of revenue and nonoperating gains – net over expenses. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

(g) Other Assets

Other assets include investments in joint ventures, goodwill and intangible assets, prepaid capital costs, estimated insurance recoveries, noncurrent receivables, and the Medical Center's beneficial interest in a charitable remainder trust.

(h) Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

Long-lived assets to be held and used are reviewed for impairment whenever circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. Long-lived assets to be disposed of are reported at the lower of carrying amount or fair value, less cost to sell.

(i) Asset Retirement Obligations (ARO)

AROs are legal obligations associated with the retirement of long-lived assets. These liabilities are initially recorded at fair value and the related asset retirement costs are capitalized by increasing the carrying amount of the related assets by the same amount as the liability. Asset retirement costs are subsequently depreciated over the useful lives of the related assets. Subsequent to initial recognition, the Medical Center records period-to-period changes in the ARO liability resulting from the passage of time, increases and decreases in interest expense, and revisions to either the timing or the amount of the original expected cash flows to the related assets.

(j) Accounting for Defined Benefit Pension and Other Postretirement Plans

The Medical Center recognizes the overfunded or underfunded status of its defined benefit and postretirement plans as an asset or liability in its consolidated balance sheets. Changes in the funded status of the plans are reported as a change in unrestricted net assets presented below the excess of revenue and nonoperating gains – net over expenses in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets in the year in which the changes occur.

The measurement of benefit obligations and net periodic benefit cost is provided by third-party actuaries based on estimates and assumptions approved by the Medical Center's management. These valuations reflect the terms of the plans and use participant-specific information, such as compensation, age, and years of service, as well as certain assumptions, including estimates of discount rates, expected long-term rate of return on plan assets, rate of compensation increases, interest crediting rates, and mortality rates.

(k) Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Medical Center has been limited by donors or law to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets reflect the original value of gifts that have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Medical Center in perpetuity.

(1) Excess of Revenue and Nonoperating Gains – Net over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenue and nonoperating gains – net over expenses as the performance indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenue and nonoperating gains – net over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include the effective portion of changes in the fair value of cash flow hedge instruments, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, retirement benefit plan adjustments, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets).

(m) Consolidated Statements of Operations

For purpose of display, transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major, or central to the provision of health care and related services are reported as operating revenue and expenses. Peripheral or incidental transactions are reported as nonoperating gains and losses.

(n) Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered and includes estimated future adjustments that will be retroactive due to future audits, reviews, and investigations. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis, and such amounts are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known or as years are no longer subject to such audits, reviews, and investigations. Contracts, laws, and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

(o) Free Care

The Medical Center provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients who meet certain criteria under its Board-established free care policy. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as free care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

(p) Bad Debts

The Medical Center recognizes a provision for bad debts in establishing an allowance for services provided which may ultimately be uncollectible. The amount of the allowance for bad debts is based on historical trends and current market conditions.

(q) Direct and Indirect Research Revenue and Related Expenses

Revenue related to research grants and contracts is recognized as the related costs are incurred. Indirect costs relating to certain government grants and contracts are reimbursed at fixed rates negotiated with the government agencies. Research grants and contracts are accounted for as exchange transactions. Amounts received in advance of incurring the related expenditures are recorded as unexpended research grants and are included in current liabilities.

(r) Other Revenue

Revenue, which is not related to patient medical care but is central to the day-to-day operations of the Medical Center, is included in other revenue. This revenue includes cafeteria sales, medical school revenue, administrative shared services revenue, grant revenue, meaningful use incentive payments, Medicare shared savings revenue, rental revenue, net assets released from restrictions for operations, and other support services revenue.

(s) Meaningful Use

The Medical Center is in the process of fully implementing Electronic Health Record Technology (EHR). The Medical Center qualified and applied for meaningful use incentive payments from Medicare and Medicaid related to the implementation of EHR as provided for under the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act. As a result, the Medical Center recognized \$4,408,000 and \$8,449,000 of other revenue associated with these payments for years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

(t) Gifts and Donations

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Medical Center are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using a risk-free rate applicable to the year in which the promise is received. Amortization of the discount is included in contribution revenue. Conditional promises to give are recognized when the conditions are substantially met. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted net assets if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions which is included in other revenue. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

(u) Self-Insurance Reserves

The liabilities for outstanding losses and loss-related expenses and the related provision for losses and loss-related expenses include estimates for losses incurred, but not reported as well as losses pending settlement. Such liabilities are necessarily based on estimates and, while management believes the amounts provided are adequate, the ultimate liability may be greater than or less than the amounts provided. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. The methods for making such estimates and the resulting liability are actuarially reviewed on an annual basis, and any necessary adjustments are reflected in current operations.

(v) Income Tax Status

The Internal Revenue Service has previously determined that MMC and its subsidiaries (except MMP) are organizations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the IRC. MMP had significant net operating loss carryovers at September 30, 2014 and 2013. A valuation allowance has been provided for the entire deferred tax benefit for the net operating losses, due to uncertainty of realization. MMP did not have taxable income in 2014 or 2013. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

The Medical Center recognizes the effect of income tax positions only if those positions are more likely than not of being sustained. Recognized income tax positions are measured at the largest amount of benefit that is greater than fifty percent likely to be realized upon settlement. Changes in measurement are reflected in the period in which the change in judgment occurs. The Medical Center did not recognize the effect of any income tax positions in either 2014 or 2013.

(w) Reclassification

Certain amounts in the 2013 consolidated financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the to the 2014 presentation.

(x) Subsequent Events

In January 2015, Maine Health and Higher Educational Facilities Authority (MHHEFA) issued tax exempt revenue bonds for MaineHealth Issue, Series 2014, and totaling \$85,105,000. The MMC portion of this issuance is \$79,675,000 to finance renovations and equipment for the Bean Building and to refinance a portion of MHHEFA Revenue Bonds, Series 2008A totaling \$42,760,000. The bond issue includes \$27,865,000 of serial bonds with maturities from 2015 through 2034 and carries interest rates from 2.0% to 5.0%. The bond issue also includes term bonds of \$24,290,000 due in 2039 and \$27,520,000 due in 2044 with interest rates of 5.0% and 4.0%, respectively. The balance of the proceeds \$5,430,000 will be used by Stephens Memorial Hospital Association, a subsidiary of Western Maine Health Care Corporation, to finance construction of and equipment for a new medical office building. These bonds were issued under the MaineHealth Master Trust Indenture and Obligated Group.

The Medical Center has evaluated subsequent events through February 11, 2015, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were issued.

(3) Community Benefit Programs

As a nonprofit institution dedicated to community service, the Medical Center provides many health-related services that benefit the community. These services include coordinating access to care, free care programs, teaching programs, and research activities. Examples of these programs include CarePartners, a health care program for those who cannot afford to buy insurance but are above the guidelines for government programs; the Ah! Asthma Health program, which improves the care of children with asthma; Raising Readers, a MaineHealth initiative, which aims to provide all Maine children between ages zero and five years with books; and Vocational Services programs that leverage approximately \$1,372,000 in federal funds in 2014 to integrate people with physical and psychological disabilities into the community. The Medical Center also operates an International Clinic for Portland's growing immigrant and refugee population, the AIDS Consultation Service, and the Northern New England Poison Center.

The Medical Center provides free care to anyone whose income falls below 175% of the federal poverty level, a 50% discount for patients falling within 176% to 200%, and a 25% discount for those within 201% to 225%.

The Medical Center has an active teaching program that teaches medical students, resident physicians, practicing physicians, nursing students, allied health professions students, and the public. These programs develop and support health care resources for the State of Maine as well as providing a higher level of patient care. The Medical Center has entered into a partnership with the Tufts University School of Medicine to train medical students focusing on Maine residents and providing them with a rural, integrated experience in order to encourage them ultimately to practice in Maine. The Medical Center provides a free Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) program that produces much needed CNAs for health care providers throughout the State of Maine including the Medical Center. Maine Medical Center sponsors a number of programs from childbirth education to heart health to smoking cessation in order to improve overall community health.

The research programs of Maine Medical Center Research Institute (MMCRI), which operates within MMC, are focused around three specialties: cardiovascular disease, cancer, and bone and mineral disease. Core strengths are molecular biology and genetics, outcomes and health services, cytometry, and clinical research. Research at MMCRI has a strong connection to clinical problems through a translational approach. MMCRI's goal is to apply the latest scientific advances to the problems that patients and physicians face in Maine. The state-of-the-art equipment and facilities at MMCRI enable highly technical research and provide services for other academic and research centers throughout Maine. In cooperation with the University of Maine and The Jackson Laboratory, graduate degree programs have been established to provide rigorous basic research training to students in Maine. MMCRI also provides a summer student internship to a number of pre-college and college students who are interested in an opportunity to explore biomedical research as a possible career. All of these programs are done in an effort to enhance advanced educational activities in Maine.

Most of the support for MMCRI is derived from sources outside the State of Maine. This positive flow of funds into Maine is expended on salaries and services that directly support the local economy. MMCRI produces biomedical technology that is used to develop new companies, and its scientists serve as magnets to attract other biomedical technology companies, thereby encouraging additional local economic development.

(4) Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

(a) Medicare and MaineCare

Inpatient acute care services rendered to each program's beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical diagnosis and other factors. Outpatient services are paid based on a prospective rate per ambulatory visit/procedure. The Medical Center is reimbursed for cost-reimbursable items at an interim rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Medical Center and audits thereof by the Medicare Administrative Contractor and the State of Maine.

In 2004, the State of Maine, facing significant budget deficits, passed legislation establishing several health care provider taxes (State taxes). The enactment of the State taxes allowed the State of Maine to add revenues to the State of Maine General Fund, while minimizing the potential of lost federal matching funds in the MaineCare program. The hospital-specific portion of the State taxes for 2013 is based on a percentage of MMC's net patient service revenue in 2008 for the period from October 1, 2012, to June 30, 2013, and is based on a percentage of MMC's net patient service revenue in 2012 for the period from July 1, 2013, to September 30, 2014. On July 1, 2012, the State of Maine passed a special onetime tax assessment of 0.39% which was assessed in 2013 on MMC's net patient service revenue. For the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Medical Center recorded State taxes of approximately \$18,244,000 and \$17,218,000, respectively. The 2013 State taxes were inclusive of the onetime special assessment. Concurrent with the implementation of the State taxes, the State of Maine increased the MaineCare reimbursement rates. Management estimates that the changes in the MaineCare reimbursement rates yielded payments to the Medical Center for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, of approximately \$16,212,000 and \$13,322,000, respectively. The net impact of the State taxes and the change in reimbursement rates were a decrease in income from operations of \$2,032,000 and \$3,896,000 for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

The consolidated balance sheets at September 30, 2014 and 2013, include amounts due to the State of Maine under the MaineCare program of approximately \$14,000,000 and \$19,500,000, respectively.

(b) Nongovernmental Payors

The Medical Center has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, fee schedules and prospectively determined daily rates.

(c) Uninsured Patients

For uninsured patients that do not qualify for free care, the Medical Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). Based on historical experience, a significant portion of uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided.

(d) Allowance for Bad Debts and Free Care

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for bad debts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Medical Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for bad debts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for bad debts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Medical Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for bad debts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary. For receivables associated with self-pay patients, the Medical Center records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is written off against the allowance for bad debts.

The Medical Center establishes an allowance for bad debts and free care based on the amount and age of self-pay and commercial accounts. As of September 30, 2014, the allowance for bad debts and free care was \$61,551,000 which compares to \$53,706,000 as of September 30, 2013. The increase in the allowance results from a negative trend experienced in collections of amounts due from patients or patients eligible for free care. The Medical Center has not changed its free care or uninsured discount policies during fiscal years 2014 or 2013. The Medical Center does not maintain a material allowance for bad debts from third-party payors nor did it have significant write offs from third-party payors.

The Medical Center provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients who meet certain criteria under its Board-established free care policy. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as free care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue. The Medical Center estimates the costs associated with providing

charity care by calculating a ratio of total cost to total gross charges, and then multiplying that ratio by the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to patients eligible for free care. The estimated cost of caring for charity care patients for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, was \$21,612,000 and \$22,608,000, respectively. Funds received from gifts and grants to subsidize charity services provided for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, were \$243,000 and \$265,000, respectively.

Net patient service revenue in 2014 and 2013 included approximately \$8,959,000, and \$23,000,000, respectively, primarily as a result of favorable settlements with third-party payors regarding prior years.

(7) Fair Value of Financial Instruments

(a) Fair Value Measurements

The Medical Center classifies its investments into Level 1, which refers to securities valued using quoted prices from active markets for identical assets; Level 2, which refers to securities not traded on an active market, but for which observable market inputs are readily available; and Level 3, which refers to securities valued based on significant unobservable inputs. Assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

(b) Asset Valuation Techniques

Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at September 30, 2014 and 2013.

The carrying value of temporary cash investments approximates fair value as maturities are less than three months and/or include money market funds that are based on quoted prices and are actively traded.

Certain corporate bonds are valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the bond is traded. Other corporate bonds are valued based on yields currently available on comparable securities of issuers with similar credit ratings. When quoted prices are not available for identical or similar bonds, the bond is valued under a discounted cash flow approach that maximizes observable inputs, such as current yields of similar instruments, but includes adjustments for certain risks that may not be observable, such as credit and liquidity risks.

Foreign currencies held are translated into U.S. dollars at the prevailing rate of exchange at each period end.

The fair value of marketable equity securities are principally based on quoted market prices.

The fair value of common collective trusts are based on the NAV of the fund, representing the fair value of the underlying investments, which are generally securities traded on an active market. The NAV as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. Such investments are classified as Level 2 when the Medical Center has the ability to redeem its investment in the fund at the NAV (or its equivalent) at the measurement date or within the near term and there are no other potential liquidity restrictions. Common collective trusts categorized as Level 3 are subject to a minimum holding period and a redemption period in excess of 90 days.

Exchange-traded funds and closed-end funds are valued at the last sale price or official closing price on the exchange or system on which they are principally traded. Investments in mutual funds are valued at their NAV at year-end. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held are deemed to be actively traded.

The estimated fair values of limited partnerships and hedge funds, for which quoted market prices are not readily available, are determined based upon information provided by the fund managers. Such information is generally based on NAV of the fund, which is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The Medical Center has classified certain of its investments reported at NAV as Level 2 because the Medical Center has the ability to redeem its investment in the fund at the NAV per share (or its equivalent) at the measurement date or within the near term and there are no other potential liquidity restrictions. Funds categorized within Level 3 are subject to a minimum holding period or lockup, cannot be redeemed at the measurement date or within 90 days thereof, are subject to redemption notice periods in excess of 90 days, or have the ability to limit the aggregate amount of shareholder redemptions. The limited partnerships and hedge funds invest primarily in readily marketable securities. The limited partnerships and hedge funds allocate gains, losses, and expenses

to the partners based on the ownership percentage as described in the respective partnership or hedge fund agreements.

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Medical Center in estimating the fair value of the Medical Center's financial instruments in the consolidated financial statements:

Interest Rate Swaps — The Medical Center uses inputs other than quoted prices that are observable to value the interest rate swaps. The Medical Center considers these inputs to be Level 2 inputs in the context of the fair value hierarchy. The fair value of the net interest rate swap liabilities was \$8,992,000 and \$8,158,000 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. These values represent the estimated amounts the Medical Center would receive or pay to terminate agreements, taking into consideration current interest rates and the current creditworthiness of the counterparty. The fair values of the interest rate swap agreements are reported in other long-term liabilities.

Pledges Receivable – The current yields for 1 to 10-year U.S. Treasury notes are used to discount contributions receivable. The Medical Center considers these yields to be a Level 2 input in the context of the fair value hierarchy. Pledges received were discounted at rates ranging from 0.11% to 1.78% in fiscal year 2014. Pledges received were discounted at rates ranging from 0.17% to 4.00% in fiscal year 2013. Outstanding pledges receivable in 2014, which have been recorded within other long-term assets at fair value, totaled approximately \$2,570,000 (\$2,883,000 in 2013).

Receivables and Payables – The carrying value of the Medical Center's receivables and payables approximately fair value, as maturities are very short term.

Long-Term Debt –The fair market value of the Medical Center's long-term debt payable at September 30, 2014 and 2013 approximates the recorded value. The fair value of the bonds and notes payable is estimated based on discounted cash flow with interest at current rates based on similar issues, which are significant observable inputs and are categorized as Level 2 for purposes of valuation disclosure.

- (a) The Pension Plan invests in the Weatherlow Offshore Fund II L.P., and the endowment and operating funds invest in the Weatherlow Offshore Fund I L.P. The Weatherlow Offshore Fund I L.P. invests predominately in limited partnerships and similar investment vehicles. Under a master-feeder structure, the Weatherlow Offshore Fund II L.P. seeks to achieve its objective by investing all or substantially all of its assets in the Weatherlow Fund I L.P.
- (b) The Emerging Markets Fund of the Genesis Group Trust for Employee Benefit Plans is a tax-exempt pooled trust designed to permit qualified employee benefit plans and certain government plans to commingle a portion of their investment. The objective of the fund is to achieve growth over the medium to long term, primarily through investment in equity securities of companies quoted on emerging markets.
- (c) The Genesis Emerging Markets, Limited Partnership Endowment objective is to achieve capital appreciation over the medium to long term through investments in securities emerging markets. The objective of the fund is to provide participants with a broadly diversified means of investing in developing countries and immature stock markets, and thus to provide access to superior returns offered by high rates of economic and corporate growth, while limiting individual country risk.
- (d) The fund's objective is long-term total return in excess of a customized blended benchmark over a full business cycle. The index is defined as 40% MSCI Energy \$3 billion and above/15% MSCI Metals and Mining \$3 billion and above/25% Equal Sector Weighted S&P GSCI/and 20% Barclays Capital TIPS one to 10 years index.
- (e) The purpose of the partnership is to seek capital appreciation and income by investing its assets in investment pools, investment partnerships, and similar entities, which in turn, invest in publicly traded equity and debt securities of U.S. and foreign issuers and may also invest in some illiquid investments including, but not limited to, real estate and derivatives.
- (f) The fund's investment objective is to provide investors with attractive, absolute, and relative returns that exhibit moderate volatility and a low correlation to overall stock and bond markets. The fund attempts to achieve this objective by investing primarily with a diversified group of hedge fund managers that Nyes Ledge Capital Management, LLC believes to be the best available, while carefully diversifying across varying styles and strategies.
- (g) The fund seeks to provide a reasonable rate of return by investing in securities that are either issued or guaranteed by the U.S. Treasury and/or U.S. government agencies.
- (h) The fund seeks to achieve attractive risk-adjusted returns, primarily by focusing on the distressed debt and undervalued securities of U.S. companies. In addition, the fund may invest in real estate debt or equity.
- (i) The investment objective of the fund is to achieve favorable income-oriented returns from a globally diversified portfolio of primarily debt and debt-like securities, and the preservation and enhancement of principal.
- (j) There are no unfunded commitments for additional investments.

- (k) The fund's objective is to seek over a three to five year time horizon, a attractive absolute return and to outperform the U.S. markets while minimizing the likelihood of permanent impairment of the fund's capital. Its preferred method for doing so will be to invest capital for the long-term in a concentrated portfolio of high quality businesses. The fund also expects to commit capital to other types of investment opportunities.
- (l) The fund's investment objective is to generate attractive absolute returns over the long term with limited downside risk. The master fund will focus on event-driven value investing in a wide variety of corporate debt equity securities and other investments. In certain circumstances the Intermediate Fund may make investments directly rather than through the Master Fund for tax or regulatory reasons or to facilitate participation in certain types of investments.
- (m) The fund seeks to achieve its objective by investing all of its assets in the Onshore Fund. The Onshore Fund expects to invest in a relatively large number of common stocks of companies across multiple industries. Holdings of the Onshore Fund will generally favor smaller capitalization stocks, but are expected to include a range of companies from micro-capitalization to large capitalization. The investment manager will make both "growth" and "value" oriented investments in companies that it believes to be attractive businesses with favorable valuations, based on its analysis of company fundamentals.
- (n) The partnership's investment objective is to seek capital appreciation. The partnership seeks to achieve its objective by investing primarily in equity and equity-related securities of companies having market capitalizations between \$300 million and \$1.5 billion. These companies are commonly referred to as Small Cap companies. Emphasizing value characteristics, the advisor utilizes fundamental and qualitative research and analysis in selecting such equity securities.
- (o) The company will seek long-term capital appreciation by investing primarily in common stocks of emerging markets issuers. The fund's performance benchmark is MSCI Emerging Markets.

Depreciation expense for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013 was approximately \$57,960,000 and \$58,828,000, respectively. The remaining commitment on construction contracts at September 30, 2014 and 2013 approximated \$17,931,000 and \$270,000, respectively. The value of property, plant, and equipment acquisitions in accounts payable at September 30, 2014 and 2013, was approximately \$2,121,900 and \$337,000, respectively. The Medical Center's investments in joint ventures are approximately \$8,213,000 and \$9,429,000 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. The Maine Heart Center and the MMC Physician Hospital Organization, Inc., ventures are physician and hospital collaborations, which manage risk and provide incentives to deliver high-quality, cost-effective patient care. New England Rehabilitation Hospital of Portland is an acute care rehabilitation facility. Maine Molecular Imaging, LLC provides mobile PET/CT imaging services. The MaineGeneral Cardiac Cath Lab, LLC provides cardiac catheterization services to the population of central Maine. This joint venture was dissolved during 2014. The Medical Center's investments in these joint ventures are accounted for using the equity method of accounting as its ownership in each joint venture is greater than 20% and less than or equal to 50%.

The Series 2008A bondholders have the option to put the bonds back to the Medical Center. Such bonds would be subject to remarketing efforts by the remarketing agent. To the extent that such remarketing efforts were to be unsuccessful, the nonmarketable bonds would be purchased from the proceeds of a letter of credit agreement with a bank, which expires on October 3, 2018. If the letter of credit agreement is not extended or replaced, the bonds must either be tendered or converted to long-term fixed-rate bonds. If tendered, MMC, pursuant to the loan agreement, would be precluded from instructing the remarketing agent to conduct an auction with the bonds to be sold on a variable rate basis, and the bonds would be purchased from the proceeds of the letter of credit agreement. Bonds purchased from the proceeds of the

letter of credit agreement is converted to "Bank Bonds" and are payable over ten years. The Series 2008A bonds have been classified in accordance with the scheduled maturities contained in the bond agreements in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

The Board adopted a System Funding Agreement and a Corporate Model Master Trust Indenture (the Indenture) and the Board of Trustees of MaineHealth adopted a System Funding Agreement and a Parent Model Master Trust Indenture. These actions resulted in the creation of an Obligated Group for the MaineHealth system. MaineHealth subsidiaries that are Designated Affiliates of the Obligated Group have access to lower cost capital and less restrictive debt covenants. The Designated Affiliates are indirectly liable for the debt service on the obligations issued under the Indenture for each participant. The Medical Center must remain a part of the Obligated Group, but has approval authority over new subsidiaries of MaineHealth requesting participation in the Obligated Group. On September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Obligated Group has obligations totaling approximately \$173,256,000 and \$171,788,000, respectively, that are covered under the Master Trust Indenture. The Medical Center is indirectly liable for debt service payments on obligations of approximately \$77,005,000 and \$68,500,000 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

The fair values of the interest rate swap agreements are reported in other long-term assets and liabilities. The change in fair value of the effective portion of the interest rate swap agreements that qualify for hedge accounting are reported as a change in unrestricted net assets. The change in fair value of the interest rate swap agreements that do not qualify for hedge accounting (including any ineffective portion of qualifying hedge instruments) are reported as a nonoperating activity. The Medical Center has reported the net periodic interest rate settlement on the interest rate swaps as a component of interest expense in the consolidated statements of operations.

The primary risk managed by the Medical Center's derivative instruments is interest rate risk. The Medical Center uses interest rate swaps to modify its exposure to interest rate risk by converting a portion of its variable rate borrowings to a fixed-rate basis, thus reducing the impact of interest rate changes on future interest expense. The Medical Center also uses other interest rate swaps to restructure its interest rate exposure by utilizing swaps with different maturity and basis techniques.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

These interest rate, basis, and constant maturity swaps involve counterparty credit risk exposure. The counterparties are major financial institutions that at one time met the Medical Center's criteria for financial stability and creditworthiness. In each interest rate swap agreement, the counterparty is required to provide a credit support amount. If the counterparty's debt is rated below certain levels and there is a counterparty liability, the counterparty is required to post collateral.

Certain of the Maine Health and Higher Educational Facilities Authority Revenue Bonds and Revenue Refunding Bonds were issued under the terms of a Master Trust Indenture Agreement. Under the terms of the bonds, the Medical Center is required to maintain certain deposits with a trustee. Such deposits are included with investments whose use is limited in the consolidated balance sheets. The bonds also require that the members of the Obligated Group satisfy certain measures of financial performance (including a minimum debt service coverage ratio) as long as the bonds are outstanding. Management is not aware of any noncompliance with such covenants at September 30, 2014.

Deferred financing costs of \$541,000 in 2014 and \$601,000 in 2013 are reported as a component of other assets and represent the costs incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds. These costs are being amortized over the term of the bonds. Amortization expense for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, was approximately \$61,000 and \$63,000, respectively. The original issue discount/premium is accreted over the term of the related bonds using the effective interest method.

The Medical Center has a \$25,000,000 revolving line of credit with a bank, which expires March 2016, with interest at a per annum rate equal to one and one-half percent (1.5%) above the one month London InterBank Offered Rate (LIBOR). There was no outstanding balance on this line of credit at September 30, 2014. At September 30, 2013 the Medical Center had an outstanding balance on its line of credit in the amount of \$15,000,000, which was paid off in full in 2014.

MaineHealth established an information systems project, known as the Shared electronic Health Record (SeHR) Project (the Project) that will implement a system wide integrated electronic health record system and financial system. The SeHR Project is an integrated suite of technology solutions to support the healthcare delivery of MaineHealth members, providers and the communities MaineHealth services. Initial funding for the Project was drawn from cash reserves held by MaineHealth and many of the subsidiary members.

In 2014, additional funding for the Project was acquired by MaineHealth through loan agreements that provide borrowings of up to a combined \$101,500,000 under both tax-exempt interest and taxable interest debt instruments. MaineHealth issued a tax exempt revenue bond through the Finance Authority of Maine (FAME) and entered into a bond purchase agreement for the direct placement of these bonds with TD Bank, N. A. for up to \$94,800,000. MaineHealth also entered into a term loan with TD Bank, N. A. for up to \$6,700,000 to be drawn upon in support of the SeHR Project. As of September 30, 2014, MaineHealth had outstanding \$44,000,000 on the FAME Revenue Bonds and \$3,500,000 on the TD Bank, N.A. term loan.

Repayment of the debt instruments will be the responsibility of MaineHealth and certain system members deemed "SeHR Affiliates" under a project specific system funding agreement called the "SeHR System Funding Agreement" (SFA). The SFA outlines the requirements of participation of MaineHealth and each SeHR affiliate. The SeHR affiliates mean the following affiliates of MaineHealth: Maine Medical Center, HomeHealth – Visiting Nurses of Southern Maine, Lincoln County Health Care, Inc., NorDx, Pen Bay Healthcare, Southern Maine Health Care, Waldo County Healthcare, Inc., and Western Maine Health Care Corporation.

The obligations of MaineHealth under the debt instruments with TD Bank, N. A. were allocated to each SeHR affiliate based on percentages stated in the SFA. The allocation to the Medical Center was 60.79%. The maximum amount expected to be allocated to the Medical Center is not anticipated to exceed \$61,700,000 combined. The SFA also requires each SeHR Affiliate to fund a Debt Service Reserve Fund to be held by an agent determined by MaineHealth. The closing for these loans was completed in September 2014 and, as a result, the Debt Service Reserve Fund was not established as of September 30, 2014. In the event any SeHR Affiliate fails to pay its allocable share of the loan obligations and the

amounts due to the Debt Service Reserve Fund, then the remaining SeHR Affiliates will be obligated to fund that shortfall based on its allocable share as a percentage of the total of the nondefaulting SeHR Affiliates.

(12) Self-Insurance Trusts and Reserves

The Medical Center is partially self-insured for professional and general liability risks. The Medical Center shares risk above certain amounts with an insurance company for all claims related to the partially self-insured plans. The Medical Center maintains separate trusts for professional and general liability insurance. The Medical Center funds these trusts based upon actuarial valuations and historical experience. Self-insurance reserves for self-insured unpaid claims and incidents are estimated using actuarial valuations, historical payment patterns, and current trends. Self-insurance reserves are recorded in the period the claim or incident occurs and adjusted in future periods as additional data become known.

The Medical Center provides health and dental insurance for its employees through a self-insured plan administered by MaineHealth, the parent corporation of the Medical Center. For financial reporting purposes, the Medical Center is allocated its pro rata share of plan expenses based on its number of employees and dependents. Self-insurance reserves for unpaid claims and incidents are carried at MaineHealth. The difference between actual and projected plan expenses is reflected in the future premiums charged to the Medical Center by MaineHealth.

The Medical Center provides workers' compensation insurance for its employees through a self-insured plan administered by MaineHealth. Employees covered under this plan include all current employees, as well as employees with work injury claims incurred after December 31, 1995. For financial reporting purposes, the Medical Center is charged a pro rata share based on payroll classifications. Self-insurance reserves are carried at MaineHealth for unpaid claims, and settlements are estimated using actuarial valuations. Self-insurance reserves are recorded in the period the incident occurs and adjusted in future periods as additional data become known.

(13) Asset Retirement Obligations

The Medical Center has previously recognized a liability for the fair value of its AROs. The liability is related to the estimated costs to remove the asbestos contained within the Medical Center's facilities. The ARO is reported with other liabilities.

(14) Retirement Benefits

(a) Defined Benefit Pension Plan

The Medical Center sponsors a defined benefit pension plan (the Plan) covering all employees that work 750 or more hours in a plan year. Effective January 1, 2014, all new hires are excluded from participation in the Plan. Such employees will be eligible to participate in the defined contribution plan. The Plan was also amended effective January 1, 2011, to change the basis of a participant's accrued benefit. Prior to January 1, 2011, accrued benefits were based on final average pay. Effective January 1, 2011, for participants hired on or before December 31, 2009, there is a benefit based on the participant's final average pay through December 31, 2020, and years of service through December 31, 2010. For participants currently employed or hired on or after January 1, 2010, accrued benefits are based on a cash balance formula that became effective January 1, 2011. A participant's cash balance account is increased by an annual cash balance contribution for participants with 750 hours of service, and interest credits in accordance with the terms of the amended Plan document. The annual cash balance contribution is determined by applying a rate based on age and years of service to the participant's annual compensation. Interest credits are equal to a percentage of the participant's cash balance account on the first day of the Plan year and are credited on the last day of the Plan year prior to payment of the annual cash balance contribution. Except for certain instances, the rate of interest used to determine the interest credit for a Plan year is 5%. Retiring or terminating employees have the option to receive a lump-sum payment, annuity, or transfer to another qualified plan in accordance with the terms of the amended Plan document, an amount that was earned subsequent to January 1, 2011.

The Medical Center's funding policy is to contribute amounts to fund current service cost and to fund over 30 years the estimated accrued benefit cost arising from qualifying service prior to the establishment of the Plan. The assets of the Plan are held in trust and are invested in a diversified portfolio that includes temporary cash investments, marketable equity securities, mutual funds, U.S. Treasury notes, corporate bonds and notes, hedge funds, and other funds.

(b) Defined Benefit Postretirement Medical Plan

The Medical Center offers its employees who retire from the Medical Center prior to age 65 the option to continue their participation in the employee health plan until age 65. Retirees pay 100% of the cost. The retiree must terminate from the plan upon age 65 (the age for Medicare eligibility). In addition, the Medical Center offers a Retiree Group Companion Plan benefit to a limited group of employees if certain special eligibility requirements are met. To be eligible to access this benefit, an employee must have attained age 55 with five years of pension service as of December 31, 2004, and be enrolled in the employee health plan at the time of their retirement. If under 65 when retiring, the retirees must continue their enrollment in the active employee plan until they turn 65 at 100% of the active rate. The retiree may then enroll in the Retiree Group Companion Plan at age 65 once they have first enrolled in Medicare.

Unrestricted net assets at September 30, 2014 and 2013, include unrecognized losses of \$250,227,000 and \$194,348,000, respectively, related to the Plan. Of this amount, \$19,329,000 is expected to be recognized in net periodic pension cost in 2015. The expected long-term rate of return on plan assets for the Plan reflects the Medical Center's estimate of future investment returns (expressed as an annual percentage) taking into account the allocation of plan assets among different investment classes and long-term expectations of future returns on each class.

The targeted allocation for the Plan investments are: debt securities -30.0%, U.S. equity securities -22.5%, international equity securities -17.5%, emerging market equity securities -5.0%, natural

resources -10.0%, and alternative investments -15.0%. The Plan's investments as of September 30, 2014 and 2013, are disclosed in note 7.

The Plan's overall financial objective is to provide sufficient assets to satisfy the retirement benefit requirements of the Plan's participants. This objective is to be met through a combination of contributions to the Plan and investment returns. The long-term investment objective for the Plan is to attain a total return (net of investment management fees) of at least 5% per year in excess of the rate of inflation measured by the Consumer Price Index. The nature and duration of benefit obligations, along with assumptions concerning asset class returns and return correlations, are considered when determining an appropriate asset allocation to achieve the investment objectives.

Investment policies and strategies governing the assets of the Plan are designed to achieve the financial objectives within prudent risk parameters. Risk management practices include the use of external investment managers, the maintenance of a portfolio diversified by asset class, investment approach, and security holdings, and the maintenance of sufficient liquidity to meet benefit obligations as they come due.

The medical inflation assumption used for measurement purposes in the per capita cost of covered health care benefits for the Postretirement Medical Plan was 7.5% annual rate of increase for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013. This rate was assumed to gradually decrease to 5% by 2019 and remain at that level thereafter. A 1% increase in the medical inflation rate would cause an approximately \$1,195,000 increase in the benefit obligation, whereas a 1% reduction would cause a \$1,025,000 reduction in the benefit obligation.

The weighted average discount rates used in determining the accumulated postretirement medical benefit obligation were 4.61% and 5.13% for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. The weighted average discount rates used in determining the net periodic postretirement medical benefit cost were 5.13% and 4.25% for fiscal years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. As the postretirement medical plan is unfunded, no assumption was required as to the long-term rate of return on assets.

The estimated expected contribution to be made during 2015 is \$36,000,000.

(c) Defined Contribution Pension Plans

The Medical Center sponsors a 403(b) retirement plan for all of its employees. The plan has two components: 1) an employer contribution with a sliding scale of 2%-6% of eligible compensation depending on length of service; and 2) an employer discretionary matching contribution of 50% of the first 4% of the employee compensation deferrals. All employees hired on or after January 1, 2014 participate in the Plan and receive an initial employer contribution of 2%. Such employees are also auto-enrolled with a 4% employee contribution thus making the employee eligible to receive the maximum 2% match. Employees hired prior to January 1, 2014 are eligible for only the employer discretionary match inasmuch as such employees are otherwise covered under the closed Maine Medical Center Pension Plan. The expense recognized for the Medical Center's match was approximately \$6,806,000 and \$6,294,000 in 2014 and 2013, respectively.

(c) Endowment Funds

The Medical Center's endowment consists of funds established for a variety of purposes. For the purposes of this disclosure, endowment funds include donor-restricted endowment funds. As

required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

(d) Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Medical Center has interpreted state law as requiring realized and unrealized gains on permanently restricted net assets to be retained in a temporarily restricted net asset classification until appropriated by the Board and expended. State law allows the Board to appropriate as much of the net appreciation of permanently restricted net assets as is prudent considering the Medical Center's long-and short-term needs, present and anticipated financial requirements, and expected total return on its investments, price level trends, and general economic conditions. The amount appropriated related to the net appreciation of permanently restricted net assets for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, was \$3,000,000 and \$6,200,000, respectively.

As a result of this interpretation, the Medical Center classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of the gifts donated to the permanent endowment when explicit donor stipulations requiring permanent maintenance of the historical fair value are present and (b) the original value of the subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment when explicit donor stipulations requiring permanent maintenance of the historical fair value are present. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund comprised of accumulated gains not required to be maintained in perpetuity is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure in a manner consistent with the donor's stipulations. The Medical Center considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: duration and preservation of funds, purposes of the donor-restricted endowment funds, general economic conditions, the possible effect of inflation and deflation, the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, other resources of the Medical Center, and the investment policies of the Medical Center.

(e) Endowment Investment Return Objectives

The Medical Center has adopted investment policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to the programs supported by its endowment, while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the organization must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period(s), as well as Board-designated funds. Under this policy, the endowment assets are invested in a manner to attain a total return (net of investment management fees) of at least 5.5% per year in excess of inflation, as measured by the Consumer Price Index. To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Medical Center targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments within prudent risk constraints.

(16) Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Medical Center to concentration of credit risk, consist of patient accounts receivable, estimated amounts receivable under reimbursement regulations, and certain investments. Investments, which include government and agency securities, stocks, and corporate bonds, are not concentrated in any corporation or industry. The Medical Center grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. (18) Related-Party Transactions

For the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Medical Center charged affiliates \$54,248,000 and \$51,107,000, respectively, for services provided. For the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, MaineHealth charged the Medical Center \$15,561,000 and \$41,820,000, respectively, for management, legal, audit, and other services. For the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, MaineHealth charged the Medical Center \$68,480,000 and \$64,906,000, respectively, for health insurance, see note 12. For the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, MaineHealth charged the Medical Center \$4,166,000 and \$4,143,000, respectively, for workers' compensation insurance, see note 12.

The Medical Center maintains an agreement with NorDx, a subsidiary of MaineHealth, to receive substantially all laboratory services. For the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, NorDx charged the Medical Center \$22,859,000 and \$22,510,000, respectively, for the laboratory services.

The Medical Center invests monies for MaineHealth and certain MaineHealth subsidiaries in commingled investment and endowment accounts. The amounts invested at September 30, 2014 and 2013 were approximately \$35,323,000 and \$24,435,000, respectively.

MaineHealth's Board of Trustees has approved \$205 million in capital expenditures to acquire and implement an enterprise-wide software solution to include inpatient clinical information systems, revenue cycle management, financial management systems, supply chain, and human resource management systems. The systems will be implemented over several years. Funding for the project will be primarily provided by the MaineHealth members that will benefit from the future use of these systems. The MaineHealth members will recognize a prepaid purchase service as a long-term asset equivalent to the amount contributed. The prepaid purchase service is being reduced as the service is provided by MaineHealth. The amount of prepaid purchased service reported by the Medical Center as of September 30, 2014 and 2013 was \$63,312,000 and \$41,100,000, respectively.



Maine Medical Center FY2014 Community Benefit Report

I. Why create a Community Benefit report?

Maine Medical Center (MMC), recognized as the number-one ranked hospital in Maine by US News and World Report for 2014-2015, is a complete health care resource for the people of Greater Portland and the entire state, as well as northern New England Incorporated in 1864, MMC is the state's largest medical center, licensed for 637 beds and employing nearly 6.500 people

Our care model includes the state's largest multispecialty medical group. Maine Medical Partners, employing more than 400 physicians. Maine Medical Partners provides a wide range of primary, specialty, and subspecialty care delivered through a network of more than 30 locations throughout greater Portland.

Maine Medical Center provides more than 20 percent of all the charity care delivered in Maine, and by practicing healthy behaviors, educating the public, and providing services for all who need them, it aims to increase the health of the population of Maine, regardless of socioeconomic factors

This report summarizes Maine Medical Center's community benefits efforts over the last year. The final section (VIII) also provides a financial summary of charity care, bad debt, government-sponsored health care, and all subsidized community programs and other support.

II. Organizational Description and Information

Maine Medical Center is the state's premier hospital, providing the widest range of safe, high-quality services available in northern New England With our expert physicians and highly decorated nursing staff. MMC offers leading-edge care with a community hospital feel Every day, more than 6,000 people are focused on caring for our community, educating tomorrow's caregivers, and researching new ways to provide care — all so we can help Maine become the healthiest state in the nation

Under the governance of its Board of Trustees, MMC's Senior Leadership Team is responsible for the quality and safe delivery of care provided to patients and their families MMC's unique role as both a community hospital and a referral center requires an unparalleled depth and breadth of services, including an active educational program and a world-class biomedical research center MMC is a member of the MaineHealth system, a growing family of health care services in northern New England

III. Community Needs Assessment

The Maine Medical Center Board is made up of a diverse set of community members. Each MaineHealth Member Board requires a thorough community needs assessment and directs its organization to respond to the needs identified. MaineHealth also participates in various

initiatives to help support and provide updates to community needs assessment planning. Some of these initiatives include

- Clinical Strategic Planning
- Financial Strategic Planning
- Facility Planning
- Manpower Planning
- Physician Recruitment Strategic Planning
- Emergency Preparedness Planning

Along with the internal assessments, member organizations also review and act on recommendations provided by local and state partners, such as the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention (MCDC)

MaineHealth and its partners in the OneMaine Health Collaborative. Eastern Maine Health System and MaineGeneral Health, released the OneMaine Health Community Health Needs Assessment Report in March 2011. The report was a comprehensive compilation and analysis containing primary and secondary health data sources. The report contained a Health Status Profile for the state as a whole and for each of Maine's sixteen counties. The primary data source was a randomized telephone survey, the sampling methodology was designed to permit comparisons at the county level. Secondary data sources include numerous state and federal sources. This report provided baseline data on hundreds of health indicators that are relevant to hospitals and communities to inform planning and evaluation activities. Each member and affiliate hospital held community forums in partnership with local and regional organizations to increase understanding and use of the Community Needs Health Assessment and to inform action on local, community-based health priorities.

Plans call for a Community Health Needs Assessment to be replicated every three years. In late 2013, CHNA and Implementation Plan Reports were produced by each MaineHealth member hospital, in collaboration with MaineHealth. These detailed reports covered the time period of 2013-2015 and were formally adopted by each member organization Board for submission with their respective FY13 990 filings.

In 2015, a new process of conducting a statewide community health needs assessment, called the SHNAPP (Statewide Health Needs Assessment Planning Program) was launched. County-level CHNA reports will be produced in 2016, these reports will be used to inform community engagement and action by hospitals, state/local governments and other partners. MaineHealth, EMHS, CMHC and the MCDC are contributing financial support to the study and reports.

IV. Subsidized Maine Medical Center Community Programs and Other Support*

Community Health Improvement Services and Community Benefit Operations

Sagamore Village Health Center

MMC supports staff and clinic operations in a disadvantaged Portland neighborhood

Portland Community Free Clinic

MMC doctors from the Emergency Medicine department volunteer at the Portland Free Clinic, providing primary care to uninsured, low-income adults

Medical Tent Support

MMC physicians provide medical support for local and regional running events including the Maine Marathon and Boston Marathon

School-based Clinics

MMC provides staff and support for clinics in several Portland Public Schools

Sports Medicine Game Coverage and Pre-Assessments

The Sports Medicine division at MMC's Family Medicine Center provides physical exams and training room support for area school teams and marathons and other sports events

Taxi Vouchers and Clothing

MMC provides taxi vouchers to patients who need transportation home, as well as providing petty cash and clothing for some patients

Health Professions Education

MMC provides a clinical setting for medical students from a number of medical schools as they rotate through the clinical services, post-graduate training in a number of specialties, in both residencies and fellowships, rural practice settings as part of resident education and as a service to the practices, and numerous sessions in which practicing physicians can keep their knowledge current

Subsidized Health Services

Care Partners

MMC plays two roles in this MaineHealth-sponsored program funding and providing free care CarePartners is a "safety net" program designed to provide care for those who cannot afford commercial insurance but are not eligible for government programs. CarePartners provides administrative support to help serve the target population, including comprehensive eligibility assessment, care management, and access to low cost or free pharmaceuticals. In addition to the free care that MMC gives as a provider in the program, we make a financial contribution to its operations.

Outpatient Clinics

Many MMC Outpatient Clinics serve specific patient populations with services that would otherwise not be available in the community, including a Virology Treatment Center clinic that is a statewide resource to physicians caring for patients with HIV/AIDS, it also provides education and conducts clinical trials including many that otherwise would not be available in the State—In addition, one afternoon a week, the International Clinic provides services to immigrants and refugees from around the world who have settled in Portland

Behavioral Health Care

MMC is a safety-net provider of behavioral healthcare services

Care Management

MMC assists patients at times with lodging, medicine, transportation, and medical equipment

Oncology Patient Navigators

Seven specially trained oncology nurse Clinical Patient Navigators work with patients diagnosed with cancer to ensure the patient and their family have all of the information they need to make the most informed and timely decisions about their treatment plan MMC navigators represent all of the major tumor sites breast, prostate/genitourinary, lower GI (colon/rectal), upper GI (liver/pancreas), gyn-onc, and thoracic (lung/esophageal). There is also a Neurosciences Patient and Family Liaison who spends part of her time working with neuro-oncology (brain tumor) patients. MMC also pays for half of the expense of an American Cancer Society Patient. Navigator who is available to help patients navigate the myriad of community support resources available as part of the cancer care process.

Language Line and Interpretive Services

Live and telephonic interpretation services are provided for patients who do not speak English

Palliative Care Program

This program is dedicated to relieving the suffering and improving the quality of life for patients with advanced and life-threatening illnesses

Sign Language Interpreting Services

MMC provides on-site interpreters for deaf patients who use American Sign Language and offers accommodations and services for deaf and hard-of-hearing patients and family members. The coordinator trains MMC staff to better accommodate deaf and hard-of-hearing patients and, with local agencies, brings medical information to members of the deaf community.

Uncompensated Care Drug Program

MMC's Pharmacy provides free medications to qualifying MMC cancer patients and discharged patients, and patients of the Emergency Department and Brighton FirstCare receive 'starter packs' and some routine drugs at no charge when they are discharged

Tutoring

MMC provides tutoring for students who miss school due to hospitalization

Northern New England Poison Center

The NNEPC serves Maine. New Hampshire, and Vermont with 24/7 toll-free telephone consultations with health care professionals and lay persons about toxic substances. MMC contributes funding to provide services that are not sufficiently supported by state or federal government, such as poison- and drug-related outreach education for health care professionals and lay persons, poison and drug-related research, surveillance for terrorism, tampering/contamination, unanticipated adverse drug events, food poisoning and other public health emergencies, and support for all-hazards preparedness and response. The in-kind contribution includes partial salaries for clinical toxicologists, nurse-certified specialists in poison information, and other staff, as well as employee benefits and operating overhead

Research

The Maine Medical Center Research Institute is the largest hospital-based biomedical research facility in northern New England Many clinicians author scholarly work or participate in various studies and research activities, and the Institute offers a summer student program

Cash and In-Kind Contributions

Contributions

MMC makes carefully selected contributions to other nonprofit organizations whose activities augment or complement MMC's mission. Significant contributions in FY14 went to the United Way, the American Heart Association, Let's Go, Educate Maine, and the Campaign for Maine's Community Colleges.

Charles A. Dana Health Education Center & East Tower Classrooms

The classroom facilities of the Dana Center and the East Tower are available free of charge to external groups who have MMC sponsors Regular users include Alcoholics Anonymous, the National Alliance for the Mentally III, HOPE, etc

United Way

MMC makes a contribution to and supports the annual United Way campaign

Portland Area Schools

MMC donates used computer equipment to Portland area school systems

Community Support

Disaster Preparation

MMC is deeply involved in disaster planning at the local and State levels. One of three state Regional Resource Centers for Emergency Preparedness is located at MMC, and the hospital has a full-time Director of Emergency Preparedness.

Southern Maine Regional Resource Center for Health Emergency Preparedness

This organization coordinates all Emergency Preparedness Activities for the Southern four Counties of Maine, which include York, Cumberland, Sagadahoc and Lincoln This includes 2 regional Hospitals and over 300 Medical Centers, Laboratories, Clinics, Ambulatory Center, Physician Practices Long Term Care Centers, Home Health Agencies in our region

Clinical Pastoral Education

Placement of pastoral care students in community agencies one day per week during the summer, including outpatient cancer. Preble Street, nursing homes and Seafarers

Doc4aDay

Students, chosen from underrepresented minority groups or educationally or economically disadvantaged backgrounds, receive an overview of what is involved in becoming a physician, and participate in hands-on clinical activities in the simulation lab

CNA Training Program

The CNA course is a state approved. 190-hour course which is free of charge to students accepted to the program. It includes classroom work, skills labs, and clinical experiences. The 11-week program is offered through the Center for Clinical & Professional Development with support and ongoing interaction from Human Resources. Upon course completion, students sit for the state certification exam. This initiative is a service to our community offering unique opportunities for diverse populations who otherwise might not be able to afford the education. Many CNA graduates are ultimately employed by Maine Medical Center. However, the program also provides graduates for other agencies or settings within the area. CNAs are a valued part of the

Other

Maine Medical Partners

MMC supports mission-critical physician practices to ensure coverage for the community in such specialties as trauma neurosurgery, various pediatric specialties, and high-risk obstetrics

* In addition to the aforementioned programs. Maine Medical Center provides its proportional share of support for the annual budget of the following programs, through both "member dues" and "fund balance transfers." While all member organizations may not participate directly in the following initiatives, all members provide some level of financial support to help sustain and grow these MaineHealth programs

Community Health Improvement Services and Community Benefit Operations

AMI/PERFUSE Program – The AMI/PERFUSE program helps caregivers provide the highest quality care and achieve the best possible outcomes for patients who experience an acute myocardial infarction – regardless of the patient's point of entry into the MaineHealth system. A network of providers ensures that heart attack patients receive timely, evidence-based treatment

Behavioral Health Integration – The Mental Health Integration Program works to improve patient care by bringing mental health clinicians into medical settings, and by improving the collaboration between medical and mental health providers. The goal of the program is to help people get effective and efficient care for mental and behavioral health problems.

Chronic Disease – The Chronic Disease program increases awareness and utilization of quality care measures for both pediatric/adult asthma. COPD, and Diabetes – this program was formerly listed separately as "Asthma", "Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease" and "Diabetes"

Clinical Informatics – The MaineHealth Informatics Committee directs the integration of MaineHealth best practices into the electronic health record to advance the practice and delivery of care to patients across all care settings. This Committee's work will be informed by the evaluation of patient outcomes, quality measures, financial markers and clinical satisfaction.

Emergency Medicine – The Emergency Medicine Program improves the quality of care received by patients in the emergency departments of MaineHealth member and affiliate hospitals. The program works to streamline processes and to effectively meet the acute medical needs of patients in the ED. Program staff provide training to emergency medical personnel and work with ambulance services to inform the care provided before patients arrive at the hospital

Heart Failure – The Heart Failure Program improves health outcomes for patients with heart failure by promoting best practices in care at MaineHealth hospitals and across all care

settings The program supports a comprehensive, integrated approach for patients and their families as they move from one care environment to another

Infection Prevention – The Infection Prevention Program works to reduce infection rates, improve outcomes for patients and decrease preventable hospitalizations across the MaineHealth system. The program aims to reduce hospital-acquired infections through improved hand hygiene compliance.

Palliative Care - The Palliative Care Program promotes palliative care across the system. The initiative includes clinician education about palliative care including identification of patients who may benefit from palliative care, provision of palliative services for complex medical conditions, addressing ethical issues and engaging patients in discussing goals of care. The program promotes the use of Physician Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment (POLST) within each MH institution as well as community based advance directive/care planning.

Patient Centered Medical Home – This program supports the MaineHealth Members' strategy for creating a strong primary care network by assisting primary care practices with Patient Centered Medical Home transformation. Efforts include increasing regional capacity in quality improvement and practice redesign by offering learning collaboratives for practices, a coach development program and providing educational opportunities including the dissemination of tools and resources.

Pharmacy and Therapeutics - The Pharmacy and Therapeutics Program works to improve outcomes of patients in the MaineHealth system by reducing variations in care and promoting best practices The program seeks to coordinate purchasing and performance initiatives in MaineHealth hospitals

Preventive Health - The Preventive Health Program works to deliver consistent, high-quality, preventive healthcare across the MaineHealth region for adults and children by providing best-practice, evidence-based tools and support to primary care practice teams. The purpose is to provide a preventive health focus for patients and providers that helps to reduce the prevalence and severity of chronic disease.

Surgical Quality Collaborative – The goal of the MaineHealth Surgical Quality Collaborative is to create a collaborative encompassing surgical and quality staff from system hospitals to foster learning, measure improvement, and use empirical data to improve the quality, safety and value of surgical care

Telehealth - The Telehealth Program works to improve the health status of our communities by integrating, advancing and optimizing the use of telehealth technologies. Current telehealth technologies include connections between hospitals, such as bringing specialists to rural areas, connecting providers to patients' homes and remote monitoring of patients in critical care units in most MaineHealth hospitals.

Transitions of Care - The Transitions of Care Program works to ensure that patients receive excellent care throughout the transition from hospital to home and to community-based providers. The program works to improve patient outcomes and reduce unnecessary readmissions by supporting best practices for provider follow-up visits, coordinating medications, patient and family education, and enhancing the communications critical for excellent care once the patient leaves the hospital

Subsidized Health Services

CarePartners – The program arranges the provision of donated healthcare services for low income uninsured Mainers in Cumberland, Kennebec, Lincoln, and Waldo and York Counties CarePartners also provides administrative support to help serve the target population, including comprehensive eligibility assessment, care management, and access to low cost or free pharmaceuticals

MedAccess – The program provided access to approximately \$35.6 million of free medications in FY14, with 11.356 applications completed for more than 5.505 patients (1.600 of them new to the program in FY14). CarePartners provides this community resource to uninsured and underinsured community members through the Patient Assistance Programs (PAPs). In addition to this service, MedAccess offers application assistance for other prescription access programs, local low-cost generic programs, and other state and federal programs either in-person or through a toll-free number (therefore, MaineHealth only counts the staff and program costs/support as a "net community benefit investment" here, and not the actual dollar figure of free medications provided through the program)

Community Support

Healthy Weight Initiative – This initiative targets both children and adults in the community. The key parts of the initiative include clinical, community, and environmental/policy interventions. Maine Health's financial support for this initiative recognizes the importance of preventing obesity as a major driver of health care costs, a major risk factor for chronic diseases, and a well-documented community epidemic.

Community Health Needs Assessment – As described earlier in Section III of this report, plans call for a Community Health Needs Assessment to be replicated every three years. In the summer of 2013, MaineHealth created "CHNA and Implementation Plan Reports" in collaboration with member hospitals. These detailed reports covered the period of 2013-2015 and were formally adopted by each member organization Board for submission with the FY13 990 filing – ACA compliance required these reports to be completed no later than April 2014

Health Index Report – MaineHealth staff creates the Health Index report to present key factors and specific elements of the health status throughout many Maine counties, focusing on measures of health improvement and specific health outcomes/goals – nearly 2,000 copies of the health index report are distributed annually to health and other community leaders and organizations

Child Health Program - The Child Health program is focused on increasing rates of child immunizations within the MaineHealth system and statewide through clinical, community and policy interventions. The program engages health professionals and provider organizations, community partners, family members, and local and state government in its efforts in order to meet the goal of increasing Maine's 19-35 month old vaccination rate for the standard series of seven immunizations from 67% in 2010 to 82% or higher by 2016. Amid evidence of increased vaccine refusal and delay in our communities. MaineHealth's financial support for this program underscores the importance of vaccinations as the most cost-effective health prevention activity for children and one of society's greatest public health achievements

Partnership for Healthy Aging - PHA leads the implementation of evidence-based prevention programs for older adults (Living Well, A Matter of Balance, EnhanceWellness, EnhanceFitness.

Healthy IDEAS) throughout Maine The efforts of Elder Care Services focus upon improving transitions, prevention, and quality across the care continuum. Initiatives include Care Transitions coaching, Community Links, and Falls Prevention Tools for providers and patients

Community Health Improvement Advocacy

MaineHealth Learning Resource Centers – With four locations in Maine, the LRCs provide patients, health care providers and community members with easy access to quality health information and a wealth of educational reference material. In addition, the LRCs offer the public over 100 unique classes taught by professionals (e.g. healthy cooking, yoga, chronic disease self-management, cancer prevention, and mental health awareness)

Parkinson's Information and Referral Center – The Center is a primary resource for people with Parkinson's disease, as well as their families and healthcare providers. Assistance includes "patron requests" for information, direct physician referrals, educational outreach to health care facilities, coordinating support groups, and specialized classes for newly-diagnosed individuals

V. Billing and Collection Practices

Maine Medical Center charges all patients the same price for the same services regardless of payor source. Individuals are not required to pay or to make arrangements to pay prior to the services being provided. On average, the first bill is sent to a patient seven days after services are provided. After that initial billing date, and after all insurances have paid on that account, the patient has 30 days to pay their portion of the bill for those services. Before collection action is taken by MMC, four notices will be sent to patients informing them of their lack of proper payments and continued attempts will be made to communicate with them about a solution

In the absence of either full payment or a patient's attempts to communicate in order to resolve the situation, which may include the patient's agreement to enter into a monthly payment program. MMC does use a responsible and professional collection agency if necessary. A bill will become classified as "bad debt" once it has been assigned to our collection agency. If the balance is paid in full within 90 days of placement with our collection agency, it is not reported on their credit file. MaineHealth hospitals may pursue legal action for collecting an outstanding bill only with prior Board approval. MMC's Board has not voted to pursue such legal action in, at the minimum, the past 19 years

VI. Charity Care Policies

Maine Medical Center's policy of charity care and financial assistance is easily understood, prominently posted, and publicly available. A process exists for offering charity care or financial assistance to patients who are unable to pay both before and after services have been rendered and they have been billed. In addition to monitoring collection practices, copies of the charity care policy are made available to patients at all entry points (Registration, Emergency Department, etc.) and with bill/collection notices. The organization uses simple application procedures as defined by the State of Maine Department of Health and Human Services for charity care or financial assistance that do not intimidate or confuse applicants.

Maine Medical Center's employees who work in Admitting. Billing. Accounts Receivable, or Patient Services are fully informed and educated about all financial assistance policies These

staff members identify unpaid bills where persons are unable to pay, and separate these potential 'charity care' bills from other bad debt accounts

Maine Medical Center provides 100% free care to our patients who are at or below 175% of the Federal Poverty level. We also provide additional discounted care on an income-based sliding scale program for patients who are between 176% and 225% of the Federal Poverty level.

VII. Good Governance and Executive Compensation Policies

Good Governance

Maine Medical Center has a Board of 29 community members, a majority of whom are not practicing physicians, officers, department heads, or other employees with a financial connection or otherwise affiliated with the organization itself. The Board meets 11 times a year (on average). and has a written "conflict of interest" policy in place. The Board understands the specific mission of the organization, and approves strategic planning initiatives aimed at carrying out this mission Trustees understand their fiscal and other specific responsibilities while serving on the Board, and further education/information is provided to Board members if requested Trustees and executive officers of Maine Medical Center do not receive loans on behalf of the organization The organization ensures that a substantial part of its activities does not involve attempts to influence legislation, and that it will not take an official position or provide direct support for or against a political candidate Moreover, in addition to the CEO, CFO, or both officially signing off on Maine Medical Center's yearly 990 and audited financial statements, the Board of Trustees must also have final approval of the yearly audited financial statements The Board has also adopted and maintains a corporate compliance program that includes a Code of Conduct for all staff education and training, monitoring for compliance, and a Helpline for staff to call, all intended to produce continual compliance with organizational policies and the law

Executive Compensation

Maine Medical Center has a formal written compensation policy in place In consultation with Sullivan Cotter and Associates, the MaineHealth Board Compensation Committee establishes appropriate compensation parameters for each member organization's CEO and certain members of their Senior Management team Working within those parameters, the organization's Board determines the level of compensation for its CEO The findings of the Compensation Committee are made transparent to, and voted on by the full Governing Board This "total executive compensation" is filed publicly by the organization, and includes "total cash compensation" and "total value of all benefits and perquisites associated with position (such as housing allowances. social club memberships, signing bonuses, etc.)" The Board takes necessary action to prevent the CEO from voting or directly participating in the final Committee determination of his own compensation The organization's executive compensation procedure relies upon appropriate data for comparability (e.g. compensation levels paid by both taxable and tax-exempt similarly situated organizations and independent compensation surveys by nationally recognized independent firms) Finally, the organization refrains from allowing executive compensation to ever be based solely on Maine Medical Center's revenues or other similar profit-sharing strategies
