Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity and Corporate Structure - McLaren Health Care Corporation and Subsidiaries (the "Corporation" or MHC), a not-for-profit corporation, is a major provider of healthcare services to residents of Flint, Lansing, Bay City, Lapeer, Macomb, Oakland, Mt. Pleasant, Petoskey, Detroit, and Port Huron, Michigan and surrounding communities.

The consolidated financial statements include the corporations listed below, as well as their subsidiaries and related foundations, of which MHC is the sole member:

On January I, 2014, the Corporation acquired Barbara Ann Karmanos Cancer Institute and its controlled nonstock affiliate and wholly owned taxable subsidiary, known collectively as Barbara Ann Karmanos Cancer Institute. On May I, 2014, the Corporation acquired Port Huron Hospital and its nonstock subsidiaries and taxable subsidiary, known collectively as Port Huron Hospital and Subsidiaries (Note 18).

Significant accounting policies include the following:

Principles of Consolidation - The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of McLaren Health Care Corporation and its subsidiaries. Intercompany transactions and balances have been eliminated in consolidation.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Cash and Cash Equivalents - Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding amounts limited as to use by board designation or other arrangements under trust agreements (see Note 6).

The Corporation routinely invests its surplus operating funds in money market mutual funds. These funds generally invest in highly liquid U.S. government and agency obligations. Investments in money market funds are not insured or guaranteed by the U.S. government; however, management believes that credit risk related to these investments is minimal.

Accounts Receivable - Accounts receivable from patients, insurance companies, and governmental agencies are based on gross charges. An allowance for contractual adjustments and interim payment advances is based on expected payment rates from payors based on current reimbursement methodologies. This amount also includes amounts received as interim payments against unpaid claims by certain payors.

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Corporation analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Corporation analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely).

For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which include both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Corporation records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates, if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts in the period they are determined to be uncollectible.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Investments - Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are stated at fair market value. Investments in other equity securities or privately held companies are recorded at cost. Investment income or loss (including realized and changes in unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in excess of revenue over expenses, unless the income or loss is restricted by the donor.

The Corporation's investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risk. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in risks in the near term could materially affect the amounts reported in the consolidated balance sheet and the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

Securities Lending Arrangements - The Corporation engages in transactions whereby certain securities in its portfolio are loaned to other institutions, generally for a short period of time. The Corporation records the fair value of the collateral received as a current asset and a current liability since the Corporation is obligated to return the collateral upon the return of the borrowed securities.

Pooled Funds - The Corporation has authorized investment pools for flexibility in investing its assets and maximizing its rate of return. Realized and unrealized gains or losses and income on unallocated investments are allocated to the unrestricted and temporarily restricted net assets participating in the pool based upon the average balance of the respective net assets.

Assets Limited as to Use - Assets limited as to use include assets set aside by the governing boards of various subsidiaries for future capital improvements, over which the boards retain control and may at their discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Assets limited as to use also include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements, funds held in trust by foundations, funds restricted by donors for specific purposes, funds held in trust for payment of employee benefits, and self-insurance trust arrangements (see Note 6).

Property and Equipment - Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Donated property and equipment are recorded at the estimated fair market value at the time of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Costs of maintenance and repairs are charged to expense when incurred.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Intangible Assets - The recorded amount of intangible assets results primarily from the acquisition of plan members and provider networks related to MHP's acquisition of CareSource Michigan (see Note 6) and the acquisition of various physician practices. Intangible assets are based on management's best estimates of the fair value of assets acquired at the date of acquisition. As described in Note 6, certain components of the intangible assets are being amortized. The remainder is assessed for impairment on an annual basis. No impairment charge was recognized in the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013.

Interest Rate Swaps - The Corporation has entered into interest rate swap agreements to manage its investments and capitalization, including risks associated with changes in interest rates. The Corporation records its interest rate swaps at fair value in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet as either assets or liabilities. None of the Corporation's current swaps are designated as a hedge. Accordingly, both the unrealized and realized gains or losses related to the interest rate swaps are included in nonoperating income (loss) on the consolidated statement of operations (see Note 8).

Classification of Net Assets - Net assets of the Corporation are classified as permanently restricted, temporarily restricted, or unrestricted depending on the presence and characteristics of donor-imposed restrictions limiting the Corporation's ability to use or dispose of contributed assets or the economic benefits embodied in those assets. Donor-imposed restrictions that expire with the passage of time or that can be removed by meeting certain requirements result in temporarily restricted net assets. Permanently restricted net assets result from donor-imposed restrictions that limit the use of net assets in perpetuity. Earnings, gains, and losses on restricted net assets are classified as unrestricted unless specifically restricted by the donor or by applicable state law.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets - Temporarily restricted net assets reflect assets contributed or pledged to the Corporation and its subsidiaries, the use of which is restricted by the donor. Temporarily restricted net assets are restricted for medical education, research, clinical and outreach programs, indigent care, and property and equipment purchases. Investment earnings on temporarily restricted investments are restricted by donors for specific purposes.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets - Permanently restricted net assets are comprised of the estimated present value of the future cash receipts from certain trust assets and restricted investments held in perpetuity for research, clinical, and outreach programs. The present value of the future receipts from the trusts is recorded at the fair value of the assets of the trusts, net of liabilities.

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Excess of Revenue Over Expenses - The consolidated statement of operations includes excess of revenue over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include net assets released from restrictions for the acquisition of long-lived assets, pension-related changes other than net periodic benefit cost, and other.

Net Patient Service Revenue - The Corporation recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Corporation recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Corporation's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Corporation records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided.

Retroactively calculated adjustments arising under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods, as final settlements are determined.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. Management believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. Final determination of compliance of such laws and regulations is subject to future government review and interpretation. Violations may result in significant regulatory action including fines, penalties, or exclusions from the Medicare and/or Medicaid programs.

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Contributions - The Corporation reports gifts of cash and other assets as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statement of changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions.

The Corporation reports gifts of property and equipment as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, the Corporation reports the expiration of donor restrictions when the assets are placed in service.

Premium Revenue - MHP recognizes premium revenue in the period the subscribers are entitled to related healthcare services. Premium revenue is reported in other revenue in the consolidated statement of operations and was approximately \$667,600,000 and \$522,400,000 for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

Healthcare Costs - MHP contracts with various healthcare providers for the provision of certain medical services to its members. Healthcare costs include all amounts incurred under capitation payment agreements and services rendered under fee-for-service arrangements, including an estimate of costs incurred but not reported at each year end. Healthcare costs are reported in other expenses in the consolidated statement of operations.

Professional and Other Liability Insurance - All subsidiares of the Corporation and qualifying medical staff, except for Port Huron, are insured for professional liability on a claims-made basis by MICOL, a multiprovider, offshore captive insurance company which is wholly owned by the Corporation. The Corporation and its subsidiaries accrue an estimate of the ultimate expense, including litigation and settlement expense, for incidents of potential improper professional service and other liability claims occurring during the year as well as for those claims that have not been reported at year end, which is based on estimates provided by an independent actuary (see Note 14). The expected amount of insurance recoveries is recorded as a receivable, net of allowance for uncollectible receivables.

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Charity Care - Subsidiaries of the Corporation provide care to patients who meet certain criteria under charity care policies without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Because the Corporation and its subsidiaries do not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue (see Note 4).

Tax Status - The Corporation and substantially all of its subsidiaries are nonprofit, tax-exempt organizations; accordingly, no tax provision is reflected in the consolidated financial statements. Some subsidiaries are for-profit corporations. Income tax provisions are not material to the consolidated financial statements.

The accounting standard that refers to accounting for uncertainty in income taxes addresses the determination of how tax benefits claimed or expected to be claimed on a tax return should be recorded on the consolidated financial statements. Companies must recognize the tax benefit from an uncertain tax position only if it is more likely than not that the tax position will be sustained on examination by the taxing authorities, based on the technical merits of the position. The standard also provides guidance on derecognition, classification, interest and penalties on income taxes, and accounting in interim periods, and requires increased disclosures. The evaluated potential exposure related to uncertain tax positions was found to be immaterial.

The Corporation is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions. The Corporation and certain of its subsidiaries were audited by the Internal Revenue Service for the 2012, 2011, and 2010 tax periods. The audits were recently settled and closed for all the subsidiaries involved in the audit, with the exception of MHP. The completion of the IRS audit for MHP is subject to completion of MHP's application to be recognized under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(4). Subsequent to year end, MHP has submitted the application requesting exemption and is awaiting a response from the Internal Revenue Service. If MHP is not able to obtain recognition under Section 501(c)(4), the Internal Revenue Service could potentially proceed with revoking the tax-exempt status of MHP for the year ended December 31, 2010 and all years subsequent. The Corporation is currently in the process of responding to this proposed action. The financial statements have not been adjusted for any potential outcomes of this uncertainty at September 30, 2014 and 2013.

Management believes the Corporation is not subject to tax examinations for years prior to September 30, 2011.

Note I - Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Payments - The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) established funding in order to provide incentive payments to hospitals and physicians that implement the use of electronic health record (EHR) technology by 2014. The Corporation may receive an incentive payment for up to four years, provided the Corporation demonstrates meaningful use of certified EHR technology during the EHR reporting period. The revenue from the incentive payments is recognized ratably over the EHR reporting period when there is reasonable assurance that the Corporation will comply with eligibility requirements during the EHR reporting period and an incentive payment will be received. The amounts are recorded within other operating revenue, as the incentive payments are related to the Corporation's ongoing and central activities, yet not critical to the delivery of patient service.

Subsequent Events - The consolidated financial statements and related disclosures include evaluation of events up through and including January 6, 2015, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Cost Report Settlements

Medical centers of the Corporation have agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement at amounts different from the subsidiaries' established rates. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with these third-party payors is as follows:

- Medicare Inpatient, acute care, psychiatric, and rehabilitation services rendered to
 Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per
 discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system based on
 clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Long-term acute care services are reimbursed
 on a prospectively determined per-diem basis. Outpatient, physician, and homecare
 services related to Medicare beneficiaries are reimbursed based on a prospectively
 determined amount per episode of care or on an established fee-for-service
 methodology.
- Medicaid Inpatient, acute care services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are also paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Capital costs relating to Medicaid patients are paid on a cost reimbursement method. Outpatient and physician services are reimbursed on an established fee-for-service methodology.
- Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan Inpatient, acute care services are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services are reimbursed on fee-for-service and percentage-of-charge bases.
- **Health Maintenance Organizations** Services rendered to HMO beneficiaries are paid at predetermined rates or at a percentage of hospital charges.

Note 3 - Cost Report Settlements (Continued)

Cost report settlements result from the adjustment of interim payments to final reimbursement under the Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan, and HMO programs and are subject to audit by fiscal intermediaries.

The Medicare program has initiated a recovery audit contractor (RAC) initiative, whereby claims subsequent to October I, 2007 may be reviewed by contractors for validity, accuracy, and proper documentation. The Corporation is unable to determine the extent of liability for overpayments, if any. The potential exists for significant overpayment of claims liability for the Corporation at a future date.

Note 4 - Community Benefit

The Corporation and its subsidiaries accept all patients regardless of their ability to pay. The Corporation has established a formal policy whereby a patient may qualify as a charity patient if certain criteria are met. These policies define charity services as those services for which no payment is anticipated. In assessing a patient's ability to pay, the Corporation utilizes multiples of the Federal Poverty Guideline consistent with industry practice, but also includes certain cases where incurred charges are significant compared to the patient's available resources. In addition to providing services to the financially disadvantaged, the medical centers participate in county, state, and federal programs designed for the indigent and elderly, whereby the medical centers may be reimbursed at less than the cost of providing those services, provide other community services at no or nominal cost, and subsidize graduate medical education in the community. The estimated cost of providing charity services is based on a calculation that applies a ratio of cost to charges to the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients. The ratio of cost to charges is calculated based on the Corporation's total expenses divided by gross patient service revenue. The Corporation participates in the JPMorgan Chase Bank, N.A. Security Lending Program for its U.S. and non-U.S. securities held in custody at JPMorgan Chase Bank, N.A. (JPMorgan Chase). These securities are loaned to certain unrelated third-party brokers in exchange for collateral, usually in the form of cash. Both the collateral and the securities loaned are marked-to-market on a daily basis so that all loaned securities are more than fully collateralized at all times. Collateral received is invested in a segregated account managed by JPMorgan Chase, which consists of high-quality short-term investments. In the event that the loaned securities are not returned by the borrower, JPMorgan Chase will, at its own expense, either replace the loaned securities or, if unable to purchase those securities on the open market, credit the Corporation's accounts with cash equal to the fair value of the loaned securities.

The Corporation receives 40 percent of any residual income earned on the securities held as collateral. [PMorgan Chase receives the remainder of the income.

Although the Corporation's securities lending activities are collateralized as described above, and although the terms of the securities lending agreement with JPMorgan Chase require JPMorgan Chase to comply with government rules and regulations related to the lending of securities held by the Corporation, the securities lending program involves both market and credit risk. In this context, market risk refers to the possibility that the borrower of securities will be unable to collateralize its loan upon a sudden material change in the fair value of the loaned securities or the collateral, or that JPMorgan Chase's investment of collateral received from the borrowers of the Corporation's securities may be subject to unfavorable market fluctuations. Credit risk refers to the possibility that counterparties involved in the securities lending program may fail to perform in accordance with the terms of their contracts.

At September 30, 2014 and 2013, the fair value of securities loaned in the portfolio was \$1,960,000 and \$3,806,000, respectively, while the collateral held was \$1,802,000 and \$3,648,000, respectively. Collateral received consists of cash and fixed-income securities. The value of the collateral held and a corresponding liability to return the collateral have been reported on the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

On August I, 2012, MHP purchased CareSource Michigan for approximately \$27,000,000. As part of that transaction, MHP recorded \$18,000,000 of intangible assets for plan members and provider networks that is being amortized over 18 years. In addition, MHP recognized \$3,000,000 of intangible assets related to Medicare Advantage contracts and goodwill of approximately \$5,500,000. These assets are considered to have an indefinite useful life and therefore are not being amortized but are tested for impairment on an annual basis.

Note 7 - Fair Value Measurements

Accounting standards require certain assets and liabilities be reported at fair value in the financial statements and provide a framework for establishing that fair value. The framework for determining fair value is based on a hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs and valuation techniques used to measure fair value.

The following tables present information about the Corporation's assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis at September 30, 2014 and 2013 and the valuation techniques used by the Corporation to determine those fair values.

Fair values determined by Level I inputs use quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Corporation has the ability to access.

Fair values determined by Level 2 inputs use other inputs that are observable, either directly or indirectly. These Level 2 inputs include quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, and other inputs such as interest rates and yield curves that are observable at commonly quoted intervals.

Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs, including inputs that are available in situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the related asset or liability. These Level 3 fair value measurements are based primarily on management's own estimates using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques taking into account the characteristics of the asset or liability.

In instances whereby inputs used to measure fair value fall into different levels in the above fair value hierarchy, fair value measurements in their entirety are categorized based on the lowest level input that is significant to the valuation. The Corporation's assessment of the significance of particular inputs to these fair value measurements requires judgment and considers factors specific to each asset or liability.

The Corporation's policy is to recognize transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy as of the actual date of the event of change in circumstances that caused the transfer. There were no significant transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy during 2014 and 2013.

Collateral from securities lending, assets whose use is limited or restricted, and investments on the consolidated balance sheet, as further discussed in Note 6, at September 30, 2014 and 2013 included cash and certificates of deposit of \$20,613,000 and \$9,896,000, respectively, and an investment in Anthelio Healthcare Solutions, Inc. (Anthelio) recorded at cost of \$32,075,000 and \$33,187,000 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Cash and certificates of deposit and the investment in Anthelio are not measured at fair value on a recurring basis and therefore are not included in the table above.

The fair value of the fixed-income mutual funds, preferred stocks, debt securities, securities lending, due from trusts, and swap arrangements at September 30, 2014 and 2013 was determined primarily based on Level 2 inputs. The Corporation estimates the fair value of these investments using quoted prices for similar assets in active markets. The fair value of the assets was determined primarily based on quoted market prices from the investment custodians. The Level 2 inputs used in estimating the fair value of the swap agreements include the notional amount, effective interest rate, and maturity date.

The McLaren Health Care Series bonds are issued through MHC as credit group agent, on behalf of the Credit Group, which consists of the following medical centers: Bay, Flint, Lansing, Oakland, Lapeer, Macomb, Northern, Central, Port Huron; along with the following foundations: McLaren Foundation, McLaren Macomb Healthcare Foundation, and McLaren Lapeer Region Foundation. As credit group agent, MHC has the power to cause any member of the Credit Group to make required principal and interest payments on the bonds issued by the Credit Group.

In September 2014, the Michigan Finance Authority issued the Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (McLaren Health Care), Series 2014A, totaling \$36,220,000. The proceeds of the bonds were used to refund the following outstanding bonds: Michigan Finance Authority Revenue Refunding Bonds (Port Huron Hospital Obligated Group), Series 2011A and Michigan Finance Authority Hospital Revenue and Refunding Bonds (Port Huron Hospital Obligated Group), Series 2011B. The bond bears interest at 3.00 percent and annual principal of \$3,622,000 through 2024. The bonds are secured by the gross revenue of the Credit Group.

In June 2012, the Michigan Finance Authority issued the Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (McLaren Health Care), Series 2012A, totaling \$107,695,000. The proceeds of the bonds were used to refund the following outstanding bonds: Michigan Finance Authority Revenue and Refunding Bonds (McLaren Health Care Corporation), Series 1998A; Petoskey Hospital Finance Authority Limited Obligation Revenue and Refunding Bonds (Northern Michigan Hospitals Obligated Group), Series 1998; Petoskey Hospital Finance Authority Limited Obligation Revenue Bonds, Series 2003 (Northern Michigan Hospitals Obligated Group); and Petoskey Hospital Finance Authority Limited Obligation Lease Revenue Bonds, Series 2006 (Northern Michigan Hospitals Obligated Group), along with outstanding indebtedness on McLaren's line of credit. The bonds are secured by the gross revenue of the Credit Group.

The 2012A bonds consist of serial bonds with interest ranging from 4.0 percent to 5.0 percent and annual maturities ranging from \$5,495,000 to \$7,385,000, a term bond in the amount of \$10,285,000, due June 1, 2035 with interest at 5.0 percent, and an additional term bond in the amount of \$660,000, due June 1, 2035 at 4.0 percent.

McLaren Health Care Series 2010 bonds consist of revenue bonds issued by Michigan Finance Authority on behalf of the Credit Group. The bonds are secured by the gross revenue of the Credit Group and are payable in annual installments beginning December 1, 2021 of \$3,356,250, plus interest. Flint will pay the remaining outstanding principal on December 1, 2040. The bonds bear interest at 3.25 percent per annum until the initial optional tender date on December 1, 2020.

McLaren Health Care Series 2008A and 2008B bonds (collectively, the "2008 Bonds"), consist of Revenue and Refunding Bonds issued by Michigan Finance Authority. The Series 2008A bonds are secured by the gross revenue of the Credit Group and consist of serial bonds with interest at 5.25 percent annual maturities ranging from \$3,335,000 in 2015 to \$5,135,000 in 2018, a term bond in the amount of \$68,890,000, due May 15, 2028 with interest at 5.625 percent, and an additional term bond in the amount of \$116,195,000, due May 15, 2038 with interest at 5.75 percent.

The Series 2008B bonds consist of variable rate bonds bearing interest based on a weekly interest rate determined by a remarketing agent to reflect current prevailing market conditions. The bonds are secured by the gross revenue of the Credit Group and have mandatory sinking fund redemption requirements in various amounts through 2038.

Holders of the Series 2008B bonds have the option to demand payment of their outstanding bonds. The Credit Group has entered into a remarketing agreement that requires the remarketing agent to utilize best efforts to remarket any such bonds that may be tendered for payment. The Credit Group has entered into a credit facility with a bank to provide for payment in the event any of the bonds cannot be remarketed. Draws on the credit facility are required to be reimbursed to the credit facility at the earliest remarketing or expiration of the credit facility. The credit facility expires on December 1, 2016 and may be extended. Any outstanding draws on the credit facility at expiration will be converted to a term note payable over three years.

McLaren Health Care Series 2005C bonds consist of revenue bonds issued by Michigan Finance Authority. The bonds are secured by the gross revenue of the Credit Group and consist of term bonds with annual principal payments including mandatory sinking fund payments ranging from \$855,000 to \$14,550,000. The bonds bear fixed interest rates ranging from 4.75 percent to 5.0 percent.

Under the terms of the revenue bond indentures, the revenue bonds are subject to certain financial covenants calculated on a quarterly basis. As of September 30, 2014, management believes that the Corporation was in compliance with financial covenants.

Karmanos has various promissory notes that are due to a financial institution and are guaranteed by various donors. Donors have committed to support and guarantee various components of donor-collateralized debt. These pledges are reflected as other assets in the consolidated balance sheet and follow the maturity schedules of the debt instruments. Interest is payable quarterly at an interest rate of 3.00 percent over the LIBOR-based rate, for an effective rate of 3.23 percent. The promissory notes mature on October 1, 2015 and are subject to certain financial covenants calculated on a quarterly basis. As of September 30, 2014, management believes that Karmanos was in compliance with debt covenants.

Karmanos has a bank line of credit with a financial institution in the amount of \$12,000,000, and is collateralized by certain hospital patient accounts receivable. The line of credit has monthly interest payments at LIBOR plus an applicable margin rate, for an effective rate of 1.73 percent at September 30, 2014. There are no principal payments due until maturity on October 1, 2015. At September 30, 2014 there was \$10,000,000 outstanding on the line of credit.

Derivatives

The derivative instruments used by the Corporation are interest rate swap agreements that are used to manage variability in interest rates.

(a) Objectives and Strategies

The Corporation's objectives with respect to its use of derivative instruments include managing the risk of increased debt service resulting from rising market interest rates, the risk of decreased surplus returns resulting from falling interest rates, and the management of the risk of an increase in the fair value of outstanding fixed rate obligations resulting from declining market interest rates.

Debt obligations expose the Corporation to variability in interest payments due to changes in interest rates. Management believes that it is prudent to limit the variability of a portion of its interest payments. To meet this objective, management enters into interest rate swap agreements to manage fluctuations resulting from interest rate risk.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Note 8 - Long-term Debt (Continued)

By using derivative financial instruments to hedge exposure to changes in interest rates, the Corporation exposes itself to credit risk and market risk. Credit risk is the failure of the counterparty to perform under the terms of the derivative contract. When the fair value of a derivative contract is positive, the counterparty owes the Corporation, which creates credit risk for the Corporation. When the fair value of a derivative contract is negative, the Corporation owes the counterparty and, therefore, it does not pose credit risk. The Corporation minimizes the credit risk in derivative instruments by entering into transactions with high-quality counterparties.

Market risk is the adverse effect on the value of a financial instrument that results from a change in interest rates. The market risk associated with interest rate contracts is managed by establishing and monitoring parameters that limit the types and degree of market risk that may be undertaken.

(b) Risk Management Policies

The Corporation assesses interest rate risk by continually identifying and monitoring changes in interest rate exposures that may adversely impact expected future cash flows and by evaluating hedging opportunities. The Corporation maintains risk management control systems to monitor interest rate risk attributable to both the Corporation's outstanding or forecasted debt obligations, as well as the Corporation's offsetting hedge positions. The risk management control system involves the use of analytical techniques, including cash flow sensitivity analysis, to estimate the expected impact of changes in interest rates on the Corporation's future cash flows.

The Corporation does not use derivative instruments for speculative investment purposes.

(c) Transactions

MHC has entered into three interest rate swap agreements to manage the overall variability in interest rates.

Under the terms of the ISDA master agreement, the Corporation is required to maintain collateral posted within the counterparty to secure a portion of the estimated value of the derivative instruments when said instruments are valued in favor of the counterparty, as periodically determined by the counterparty. The Corporation was not required to post collateral at September 30, 2014 or September 30, 2013. The Corporation's accounting policy is to not offset collateral amounts against fair value amounts recognized for derivative instrument obligations. Accordingly, any posted collateral would be included in cash and cash equivalents in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

Note 8 - Long-term Debt (Continued)

One swap agreement is for a notional amount of \$225,000,000. Under the terms of the agreement, MHC pays the counterparty a rate equal to the USD-SIFMA Municipal Swap Index rate and receives in exchange 61.3 percent of LIBOR plus 0.776 percent.

The second swap agreement is for a notional amount of \$80,860,000 and \$83,320,000 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. Under the terms of the agreement, MHC pays the counterparty a fixed rate of 3.355 percent and receives in exchange 65 percent of LIBOR plus 0.12 percent.

The third swap agreement is for a notional amount of \$75,000,000. Under the terms of the agreement, MHC pays the counterparty a fixed rate of 3.64 percent and receives in exchange 65 percent of LIBOR plus 0.12 percent.

These swap agreements are recorded on the consolidated balance sheet at their fair value. Changes in the fair value of the swap agreements are reported as a component of excess of revenue over expenses, as well as any settlements on the interest rate swaps. There were no settlements in 2014 or 2013.

The Corporation's interest rate swap liability was \$31,871,000 and \$31,501,000 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. The amount of (loss) gain recognized in the consolidated statement of operations attributable to derivative instruments as changes in fair market value of interest rate swap agreements was (\$369,000) and \$10,789,000 for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

Note 9 - Notes Payable

MHC negotiated, on behalf of the Corporation, a revolving line of credit agreement, secured by the gross revenue of the Credit Group, with a bank in the amount of \$100,000,000. The line of credit agreement was amended in August 2013 whereby the interest rate is based on an adjusted LIBOR which ranged from .80 percent to 1.21 percent at September 30, 2014, and ranged from .91 percent to 1.32 percent at September 30, 2013. The line of credit agreement expires on August 30, 2015.

There was \$4,334,000 and \$4,668,000 outstanding on the line of credit as of September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

Note 13 - Pension and Other Postretirement Benefit Plans

MHC, Flint, MHP, MHG, and MMG participate in a single defined benefit pension plan. Bay, Lansing, Lapeer, Oakland, Macomb, and Northern have separate noncontributory defined benefit pension plans covering certain employees. The Corporation intends to annually contribute amounts deemed necessary, if any, to maintain the plans on a sound actuarial basis.

In 2014, the Corporation acquired Port Huron, which resulted in the Corporation assuming the existing defined benefit pension plan obligations for the employees of Port Huron that participate in the defined benefit pension plans sponsored by Port Huron. The plan's funded status at May 1, 2014 was \$133,758,878. Activity and funded status of the plan are included within the tables below. The plan was frozen prior to the Corporation acquiring Port Huron.

The various defined benefit pension plans have taken steps to freeze accrual of future benefits or participation in the plans by new hires. The McLaren plan covering MHC, Flint, MHP, MHG, and MMG was frozen for all nonbargaining group employees effective October 1, 2012 and was frozen to bargaining units during 2013. No additional benefits will accrue for employees covered by this plan. Effective January 1, 2013, the Lansing plan froze benefits for a specific employee group in which no additional benefits will accrue. Lapeer benefits were frozen for a specific employee group during 2014. As of September 30, 2014, essentially all the defined benefit plans have been frozen for future benefit accruals.

Substantially all employees of the Corporation also participate in defined contribution pension plans that provide benefits to eligible participants as determined according to the provisions of the plan agreements.

MHC, Flint, Lansing, Macomb, and Bay also sponsor defined benefit postretirement plans that provide postretirement medical benefits summarized as follows:

MHC and Flint - The plan includes substantially all employees who have a minimum of 10 years of service after the age of 45. Employees who elect for early retirement can purchase benefits at the group rate through the plan. MHC and Flint currently fund the cost of these benefits as they are incurred. The retiree healthcare plan requires participant contributions and deductibles.

Lansing - The plan allows retirees to purchase health insurance coverage at group rates through Lansing. Individuals who retired before December 31, 1993 also receive a maximum monthly contribution for the purchase of health insurance coverage. Individuals who retire after January 1, 1994 and have attained the age of 65 do not receive postretirement medical benefits under this plan. Lansing does not prefund the plan and has the right to modify or terminate the plan in the future.

Bay - The plan provides certain health care and prescription drugs for employees who retired prior to October 1994. Bay funds the cost of these benefits as they are incurred. During 2014, benefits were frozen for certain employee groups under this plan.

Macomb - The plan provides medical savings account plan benefits to substantially all employees who are subject to certain collective bargaining unit agreements.

The actuarial assumption for rate of compensation increase is age graded for the benefit obligation at September 30, 2014 and 2013. The rate of compensation increase assumption for the net periodic benefit cost is age graded for 2014 and 2013.

The overall expected rate of return on plan assets represents a weighted average composite rate based on the historical rates of returns of the respective asset classes adjusted for anticipated market movements. The determination is influenced by the asset allocation, as well as the Corporation's investment policy. The Corporation's investment strategy is of a long-term nature and is intended to ensure that funds are available to pay benefits as they become due and to maximize the trust's total return at an appropriate level of investment risk.

Pension Plan Assets

The goals of the pension plan investment program are to fully fund the obligation to pay retirement benefits in accordance with the plan documents and to provide returns that, along with appropriate funding from the Corporation, maintain an asset/liability ratio that is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations and ensures timely payment of retirement benefits.

The target allocation asset categories are 60 percent global equity, 30 percent global fixed income, 5 percent real assets, and 5 percent diversifying strategies.

Note 14 - Professional and Other Liability Insurance

The Corporation's professional malpractice liability coverage is provided by a multiprovider offshore captive insurance company (MICOL) on a retrospectively rated claims-made policy to Flint, Lansing, Lapeer, Bay, Macomb, Oakland, Central, Northern, Karmanos, MHG, and MMG. MICOL covers claims occurring and reported after March 31, 2004 for Flint, Lapeer, Lansing, and MMG, as well as claims occurring after 1979 but not reported as of April 1, 2003 for Lansing. Central began participating in MICOL on January 1, 2011. Northern began participating in MICOL on April 1, 2012. Effective April 1, 2014, Karmanos began participating in MICOL.

MICOL has purchased commercial excess insurance coverage for claims exceeding specified amounts.

Note 14 - Professional and Other Liability Insurance (Continued)

The Corporation records an estimate of the present value of the ultimate settlement cost of settling and defending professional liability claims based on projections from a consulting actuary. The estimate of losses is based on the covered entities' own past experience along with industry experience. This estimate includes a reserve for known claims and unreported incidents. A discount rate of 4 percent was used in determining the present value of the claims. Claims expected to be settled within one year and the related assets are recorded as a current liability and current asset, respectively, in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet.

For professional liability claims occurring prior to April 1, 2003, Flint, Lansing, MMG, and Lapeer maintained a program of self-insurance for professional and other liability claims. Revocable trusts are maintained with local banks as trustees to maintain funds for payment of any future settlements. Flint, Lansing, MMG, and Lapeer make necessary contributions to the trust funds, as determined by an independent actuary, to adequately provide for asserted or expected claims. The assets of the trust are included in the consolidated balance sheet with assets limited as to use (see Note 6).

Prior to July I, 2006, Macomb participated in a separate multiprovider offshore captive insurance company. Macomb terminated its participation in this company effective July I, 2006 and obtained insurance coverage through MICOL. MICOL covers claims reported after July I, 2006. Macomb continues to be responsible for retrospective premiums which may be assessed by the former insurer.

Prior to July 1, 2008, Oakland participated in a separate multiprovider offshore captive insurance company. Oakland terminated its participation in this company effective July 1, 2008 and obtained insurance coverage through MICOL. MICOL covers claims reported after July 1, 2008. Oakland continues to be responsible for retrospective premiums which may be assessed by the former insurer.

Prior to January 1, 2011, Central was insured against potential professional liability claims under a claims-made policy, whereby only the claims reported to the insurance carrier during the policy period are covered regardless of when the incident giving rise to the claim occurred. MICOL covers claims reported after January 1, 2011.

Prior to April 1, 2012, Northern was insured against potential professional liability claims through its captive insurance company, Petoskey Assurance Limited (PAL). PAL was a subsidiary of Northern. Effective May 31, 2012, PAL was acquired by MICOL and ceased to exist; however, the assets and liabilities transferred from PAL are being tracked separately by MICOL until all claims reported under PAL are settled. MICOL covers claims reported after April 1, 2012.

Note 14 - Professional and Other Liability Insurance (Continued)

Prior to April 1, 2014, Karmanos was insured against medical malpractice claims under a claims-based policy, whereby only the claims reported to the insurance carrier during the policy period were covered regardless of when the incident giving rise to the claim occurred. MICOL covers claims reported after April 1, 2014.

Port Huron maintains a program of self-insurance for professional and other liability claims. A revocable trust is maintained with a trustee to provide funds for payment of any future settlements. Port Huron makes necessary contributions to the trust fund, as determined by an independent actuary, to adequately provide for asserted or expected claims.

At September 30, 2014, Port Huron made provisions for the estimated losses in connection with those professional and other liability claims for incidents occurring during the year then ended for which amounts can be reasonably estimated, including provision for claims incurred by not reported at year end. Estimates are based upon projections by an independent actuary and the evaluation of claims of substance by professional liability legal counsel.

The assets of the Port Huron self-insurance revocable trusts are included in the consolidated balance sheet with assets limited as to use.

Note 15 - Investment in Anthelio Healthcare Solutions, Inc.

The Corporation has an investment in Anthelio Healthcare Solutions, Inc. (Anthelio), along with other healthcare providers and investors. Anthelio provides outsourced information technology services, system support, and other services such as transcription and communications to healthcare providers, including the Corporation and its subsidiaries.

The investment in common stock of Anthelio is included in other assets at a basis of approximately \$32,000,000 and \$33,000,000 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively. In 2010, the Corporation negotiated a five-year contract extension with Anthelio, for which it received an additional 30 million shares of Anthelio stock. A deferred liability has been recorded corresponding to the value of the shares received in the contract extension. The deferral is being recognized as a reduction to purchased services over the contract period.

During the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Corporation and its subsidiaries purchased services from Anthelio of approximately \$103,972,000 and \$105,728,000, respectively.

Note 18 - Acquisitions

On January 1, 2014, the Corporation acquired Barbara Ann Karmanos Cancer Institute (Karmanos). The Corporation's board of directors provides governance oversight of Karmanos' assets and operations. The accompanying consolidated financial statements represent the results of operations for the nine-month period as of the acquisition date of January 1, 2014 and ending on September 30, 2014, the Corporation's fiscal year end.

The transaction has been accounted for as an acquisition in accordance with FASB Accounting Standards Codification Topic 958-805, *Not-for-Profit Entities: Mergers and Acquisitions*. The assets and liabilities of Karmanos have been adjusted to fair value as of January 1, 2014. The fair value of the net assets on January 1, 2014 acquired from Karmanos was approximately \$53,895,000. The net assets, based on fair value calculations, are reflected as inherent contributions due to the acquisition in the consolidated statement of operations and statement of changes in net assets at January 1, 2014. The inherent contributions are the result of the lack of financial contributions in the acquisition. Significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in the consolidation of the Corporation's financial statements.

The amount excluding the inherent contribution of Karmanos' excess of revenue over expenses for the nine-month period ended September 30, 2014 that is included in the Corporation's financial statements is \$1,578,000. The amount of Karmanos' operating revenue, excess of revenue over expense, and changes in unrestricted net assets for the 12-month period ended September 30, 2014 was \$251,821,000, (\$1,143,000), and \$27,311,000, respectively (unaudited).

The Corporation acquired cash of \$13,482,000, accounts receivable of \$20,735,000; other current assets of \$30,341,000; property, plant, and equipment of \$43,158,000; other assets of \$32,627,000; accounts payable of \$16,466,000; debt of \$33,231,000; other liabilities of \$29,544,000; and cost report settlements of \$7,207,000 at January 1, 2014.

The accompanying consolidated financial statements represent the results of operations for the five-month period as of the acquisition date of May I, 2014 and ending on September 30, 2014, the Corporation's fiscal year end.

The transaction has been accounted for as an acquisition in accordance with FASB Accounting Standards Codification Topic 958-805, *Not-for-Profit Entities: Mergers and Acquisitions*. The assets and liabilities of Port Huron have been adjusted to fair value as of May 1, 2014. The fair value of the net assets on May 1, 2014 acquired from Port Huron, including the Port Huron Foundation, was approximately \$84,924,000. The net assets, based on fair value calculations, are reflected as inherent contributions due to the acquisition in the consolidated statement of operations and statement of changes in net assets at May 1, 2014. The inherent contributions are the result of the lack of financial contributions in the acquisition. Significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in the consolidation of the Corporation's financial statements.

The amount of Port Huron's excess of revenue over expenses for the five-month period ended September 30, 2014 that is included in the Corporation's financial statements is \$4,048,000, excluding the inherent contribution recognized. The amount of Port Huron's operating revenue, excess of revenue over expense, and changes in unrestricted net assets for the 12-month period ended September 30, 2014 was \$187,629,000, \$6,164,000, and \$86,356,000, respectively (unaudited).

The Corporation acquired cash of \$27,039,000; accounts receivable of \$10,718,000; cost report receivables of \$3,461,000; other current assets of \$4,277,000; property, plant, and equipment of \$78,391,000; other assets of \$50,629,000; accounts payable of \$9,481,000; debt of \$18,914,000; other liabilities of \$58,753,000; and cost report settlements of \$2,443,000 at May 1, 2014.

The Corporation is required to disclose the unaudited pro forma financial information that presents the combined results of operations of the Corporation and the entities for the year ended September 30, 2013 as though the business combination transactions had occurred on October 1, 2012. The unaudited pro forma financial information for the year ended September 30, 2013 for operating revenue, excess of revenue over expense, and the changes in unrestricted, temporarily, and permanently restricted net assets was approximately \$450,700,000, \$14,900,000, \$28,800,000, (\$500,000), and \$50,000, respectivley. This pro forma financial information is not necessarily indicative of the results of the operations that would have occurred had the Corporation and the entities constituted a single entity during those periods, nor is it necessarily indicative of future operating results.
