Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

St. Bernards Hospital, Inc. d/b/a St. Bernards Medical Center (the Medical Center) is operated by the Olivetan Benedictine Sisters and is a subsidiary of St. Bernards HealthCare, Inc. (SBHC). The Medical Center is an acute care hospital located in Jonesboro, Arkansas, that serves patients primarily from Craighead County and surrounding areas in northeast Arkansas. The Medical Center has controlling interest in PET Center, LLC (the PET Center), which provides patients with imaging services. All material intercompany accounts and transactions between the Medical Center and the PET Center have been eliminated in consolidation.

Noncontrolling Interest

Noncontrolling interest represents a 49% interest in the PET Center not owned by the Medical Center. Losses attributable to the noncontrolling interest are allocated to the noncontrolling interest even if the carrying amount of the noncontrolling interest is reduced below zero. Any changes in ownership that do not result in a loss of control will be prospectively accounted for as net asset transactions.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Cash

At September 30, 2014, the Medical Center's cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$37,394,934. The financial institutions had pledged collateral, held by a third party, in the name of the Medical Center sufficient to insure the excess amounts at September 30, 2014.

At September 30, 2014 and 2013, the Medical Center had repurchase agreements with a financial institution in the amount of approximately \$5,350,000.

Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are carried at fair value. The investment in equity investee is reported on the equity method of accounting. Other investments are valued at the lower of cost (or fair value at time of donation, if acquired by contribution) or fair value. Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income; realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments carried at fair value; and realized gains and losses on other investments.

Investment return that is initially restricted by donor stipulation and for which the restriction will be satisfied in the same year is included in unrestricted net assets. Other investment return is reflected in the statements of operations and changes in net assets as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted based upon the existence and nature of any donor or legally imposed restrictions.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include: (1) assets set aside by the board of governors for future capital improvements over which the board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes; and (2) assets held by the trustee.

Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Medical Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Medical Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payer has not yet paid, or for payers who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely).

For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Medical Center records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated or provided by policy) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts. The provision for uncollectible accounts decreased approximately \$5,361,000 during 2014. The main reason for the decrease in the provision was that the Medical Center served fewer uninsured patients since the inception of the Arkansas Private Option, which is further described in *Note 18*.

It is the Medical Center's practice to outsource the collection of self-pay patient accounts to a third-party collection agency after no more than 90 days from the date of discharge.

Supplies

The Medical Center states supply inventories at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method, or market.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost and are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of each asset. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives.

The estimated useful lives for each major depreciable classification of property and equipment are as follows:

Land improvements8–25 yearsBuildings10–40 yearsLeasehold improvements3–25 yearsEquipment3–20 years

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

The Medical Center capitalizes interest costs as a component of construction in progress, based on the weighted-average rates paid for long-term borrowing. Any capitalized interest recorded during the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, was not material to the consolidated financial statements.

Long-Lived Asset Impairment

The Medical Center evaluates the recoverability of the carrying value of long-lived assets whenever events or circumstances indicate the carrying amount may not be recoverable. If a long-lived asset is tested for recoverability and the undiscounted estimate future cash flows expected to result from the use and eventual disposition of the asset is less than the carrying amount of the asset, the asset cost is adjusted to fair value and an impairment loss is recognized as the amount by which the carrying amount of a long-lived asset exceeds its fair value.

There were no asset impairments recorded during the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013.

Interest in Net Assets of St. Bernards Development Foundation, Inc.

St. Bernards Development Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) and the Medical Center are financially interrelated organizations. The Foundation seeks private support for and holds net assets on behalf of the Medical Center. The Medical Center accounts for its interest in the net assets of the Foundation (the Interest) in a manner similar to the equity method. The changes in the Interest are included in change in net assets. Transfers of assets between the Foundation and the Medical Center are recognized as increases or decreases in the Interest.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Medical Center has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered, and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known.

Charity Care

The Medical Center provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

Contributions

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are accrued at estimated fair value at the date each promise is received. Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions. Conditional contributions are reported as liabilities until the condition is eliminated or the contributed assets are returned to the donor.

Self-Insurance

The Medical Center has elected to self-insure certain costs related to employee health and accident benefit programs. Costs resulting from noninsured losses are charged to expense when incurred.

Income Taxes

The Medical Center has been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. As such, it is required to file IRS Form 990 on an annual basis. The Medical Center is no longer subject to U.S. federal income tax and state income tax examinations by tax authorities for income tax returns filed for years before 2011. The Medical Center is subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

The PET Center is organized as an Arkansas limited liability company, which is not directly subject to income taxes under the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code and applicable state laws. Therefore, taxable income or loss is reported to the individual partners for inclusion in their respective tax returns, and no provision for federal and state income taxes has been included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include distributions to noncontrolling interest; changes in pension liability, net of periodic pension cost; permanent transfers to and from affiliates for other than goods and services; and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions that, by donor restriction, were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets).

Transfers Between Fair Value Hierarchy Levels

Transfers in and out of Level 1 (quoted market prices), Level 2 (other significant observable inputs) and Level 3 (significant unobservable inputs) are recognized on the period beginning date.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Records Incentive Program, enacted as part of the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009*, provides for one-time incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health records technology (EHR). Payments under the Medicare program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula. Payments under the Medicaid program are generally made for up to four years based upon a statutory formula, as determined by the state, which is approved by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). Payment under both programs are contingent on the hospital continuing to meet escalating meaningful use criteria and any other specific requirements that are applicable for the reporting period. The final amount for any payment year is determined based upon an audit by the fiscal intermediary. Events could occur that would cause the final amounts to differ materially from the initial payments under the program.

The Medical Center recognizes revenue ratably over the reporting period starting at the point when management is reasonably assured it will meet all of the meaningful use objectives and any other specific grant requirements applicable for the reporting period.

The Medical Center recorded approximately \$2,882,000 of revenue related to year two requirements in 2014, which is included in other operating revenues in the consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets. The Medical Center did not record any revenue in 2013 related to EHR incentive payments. As of September 30, 2014, the Medical Center has recorded cumulative revenues of approximately \$6,999,000 related to EHR incentive payments.

Reclassifications

A reclassification was made to change the presentation of transfers to affiliates in the 2013 consolidated statement of cash flows from operating activities to financing activities. Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

Third-Party Payer Agreements

The Medical Center recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payer coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients who do not qualify for charity care, the Medical Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Medical Center's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Medical Center records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. This provision for bad debts is presented on the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as a component of net patient service revenue.

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. These payment arrangements include:

Medicare—Inpatient acute care services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge and procedure, respectively. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Inpatient skilled nursing services are paid at prospectively determined rates that are based on the patients' acuity. Certain inpatient nonacute services and defined medical education costs related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Medical Center is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Medical Center and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. All cost reports have been finalized through September 30, 2011.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Medicaid—Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology, subject to certain cost limitations. The Medical Center is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Medical Center and audits thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary. Outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed based on fee schedules. All cost reports have been finalized through September 30, 2009.

Laws and regulations governing Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonable possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term.

Blue Cross—The Medical Center has entered into several payment arrangements with Blue Cross and its related entities. These arrangements include fixed payments per admission and discounts from standard charges.

The Medical Center also has entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

Upper Payment Limit Provisions

In addition, the Medical Center receives supplemental Medicaid funds under the Arkansas Medicaid program's Upper Payment Limit (UPL) provisions. Based on its status as a private hospital, the Medical Center was eligible to receive additional Medicaid payments equal to 100% of the gap between Medicare and Medicaid payments for equivalent patients. Under the UPL provisions, the Medical Center receives a portion of total allocated funds based on discharges, which significantly reduced payments received under the UPL program. Total funds received under this program, net of required matching funds paid by the Medical Center, were approximately \$1,358,000 and \$1,346,000 in 2014 and 2013, respectively, and are recorded under net patient service revenue.

Provider Assessment Program

The Medical Center participates in a provider assessment program, which is part of the Arkansas State Medicaid Plan. This program assesses a fee of no more than 5.5% on the net patient service revenue of private hospitals and allocates the proceeds to supplement Medicaid payments. The federal government matches the assessment amount at a rate of approximately 3 to 1, and these amounts are allocated to private hospitals in Arkansas based on each hospital's share of the total of the private hospitals' Medicaid discharges and outpatient Medicaid payments. Based on its status as a private hospital, the Medical Center participates in this program and records the assessed fees and supplemental payments as expenses and revenues in the period incurred or earned, respectively.

Amounts recorded as provider assessment taxes paid under the program for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, were approximately \$2,882,000 and \$3,359,000, respectively.

Amounts recorded as provider assessment tax receipts under this program for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013, were approximately \$12,036,000 and \$13,777,000, respectively.

The amounts received are reported as a component of revenues, gains and other support in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets, and the amounts paid are reported as a component of supplies and other expense for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013.

Note 3: Concentrations of Credit Risk

Note 6: Interest in the Net Assets of St. Bernards Development Foundation, Inc.

St. Bernards Development Foundation, Inc. was established to solicit contributions principally for funding a portion of the Medical Center's capital improvements. Funds are distributed to the Medical Center, as determined by the Foundation Board of Directors. The Medical Center's interest in the net assets of the Foundation is reported in the consolidated balance sheets and was \$3,070,520 and \$1,812,691 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

Note 7: Professional Liability Claims

The Medical Center purchases medical malpractice insurance under a claims-made policy. Under such a policy, only claims made and reported to the insurer during the policy term, regardless of when the incidents giving rise to the claims occurred, are covered. The Medical Center also purchases excess umbrella liability coverage, which provides additional coverage above the basic policy limits up to the amount specified in the umbrella policy.

Based upon the Medical Center's claims experience, an accrual had been made for the Medical Center's estimated medical malpractice costs, including costs associated with litigating or settling claims, under its malpractice insurance policy, amounting to approximately \$755,000 as of September 30, 2014 and 2013. It is reasonably possible that this estimate could change materially in the near term. Since the Medical Center is a charitable nonprofit institution, legal counsel has advised that the Medical Center would be immune from any amount above its insurance limits.

Note 9: Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets reflect the interest in net assets of St. Bernards Development Foundation, Inc. (*Note 6*) and were \$3,070,520 and \$1,812,691 at September 30, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

During 2014 and 2013, the Foundation made donations to the Medical Center for the purchase of property and equipment in the amounts of \$149,111 and \$165,000, respectively. Because these funds were spent during 2014 and 2013, they are not reported as restricted.

Note 10: Charity Care

In support of its mission, the Medical Center voluntarily provides free care to patients who lack financial resources and are deemed to be medically indigent. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported in net patient service revenue. In addition, the Medical Center provides services to other medically indigent patients under certain government-reimbursed public aid programs. Such programs pay providers amounts that are less than established charges for the services provided to the recipients, and many times the payments are less than the cost of rendering the services provided.

The costs of charity care provided under the Medical Center's charity care policy were approximately \$8,906,000 and \$12,997,000 for 2014 and 2013, respectively. The cost of charity care is estimated by applying the ratio of cost to gross charges to the gross uncompensated charges.

In addition to uncompensated charges, the Medical Center also commits significant time and resources to endeavors and critical services, which meet otherwise unfilled community needs. Many of these activities are sponsored with the knowledge that they will not be self-supporting or financially viable. Such programs include health screening and assessments, prenatal education and care, support for the elderly, community educational services and various support groups.

Note 12: Pension Plans

Defined Benefit Plan

The Medical Center has a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan (the Plan) covering substantially all employees hired on or before April 1, 2011. The Medical Center's funding policy is to make the minimum annual contribution that is required by applicable regulations, plus such amounts as the Medical Center may determine to be appropriate from time to time. Benefits are based on years of service and compensation. Benefits are vested 100% upon completion of five years of service. No benefits are vested prior to the completion of five years of service. Contributions to the Plan are intended to provide not only for benefits attributed to service to date, but also for those expected to be earned in the future. The Medical Center expects to contribute \$5,000,000 to the Plan in 2015.

Plan assets are held by a bank-administered trust fund, which invests the Plan assets in accordance with the provisions of the Plan agreement. The Plan agreement permits investment in common stocks, corporate bonds and debentures, U.S. government securities, certain insurance contracts, real estate and other specified investments, based on certain target allocation percentages. The finance committee of the board of governors may revise the target allocation percentages as the financial needs of the Plan and the outlook for capital markets changes.

Pension Plan Assets

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for pension plan assets measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets, as well as the general classification of pension plan assets pursuant to the valuation hierarchy.

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, plan assets are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 plan assets include money market funds, mutual funds, equity securities and foreign equity securities. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of plan assets with similar characteristics or discounted cash flows. Level 2 plan assets include cash surrender value of life insurance policies.

In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, plan assets are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy and include alternative investments in several private equity funds. Alternative investments are valued based on the net asset value reported by the investment managers.

Defined Contribution Plan

The Medical Center also offers a defined contribution plan to substantially all employees. As of September 30, 2012, the Medical Center does not make contributions to this plan. However, for employees hired on or after April 2, 2011, beginning on January 1, 2013, the Medical Center will match 75% of employee contributions up to 6% of compensation. In addition, the Medical Center will contribute an additional 1% of compensation if the employee contributed at least 1% and was employed on the last day of the plan year, which is September 30, 2013. Defined contribution expense was \$228,615 and \$88,622 for 2014 and 2013, respectively.

Allocated Expenses

Certain services are performed by SBHC for the benefit of its affiliates (including the Medical Center). These services include accounting, data processing, purchasing, personnel and other administrative functions. Costs allocated to the Medical Center for services provided by SBHC totaled \$14,771,837 and \$13,796,279 during 2014 and 2013, respectively. These expenses are included in professional fees on the consolidated statement of operations.

Clinic Support

The Medical Center provides computer equipment and support to an affiliate. The Medical Center received \$394,642 and \$779,309 in revenues from this affiliate for 2014 and 2013, respectively. This support is included in other operating revenues on the consolidated statement of operations.

Note 14: Disclosures About Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- **Level 3** Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Following is a description of the inputs and valuation methodologies used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets, as well as the general classification of such assets and liabilities pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no significant changes in the valuation techniques during the year ended September 30, 2014.

Investments

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, securities are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 securities include money market accounts, equity securities, U.S. Treasury obligations, mutual funds and corporate bonds. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of securities with similar characteristics or discounted cash flows. Such securities are classified in Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 2 securities include municipal bonds, mortgage-backed securities, repurchase agreements and foreign government obligations. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, securities are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. The Medical Center held no Level 3 securities at September 30, 2014 or 2013.

Cash

The carrying amount approximates fair value.

Long-term Debt

The carrying value approximates fair value.

Note 15: Asset Retirement Obligations

The Medical Center's conditional asset retirement obligations primarily relate to asbestos contained in buildings that the Medical Center owns. Environmental regulations exist in Arkansas that require the Medical Center to handle and dispose of asbestos in a special manner if a building undergoes major renovations or is demolished.

Note 16: Significant Estimates and Concentrations

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require disclosure of certain significant estimates and current vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations. Those matters include the following:

Investigation

The Medical Center is the subject of an investigation regarding specific third-party payer program billing issues. Management has accrued an estimated amount that they believe approximates the probable liability associated with this issue based on information currently available. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

Medical Malpractice Claims

Estimates related to the accrual for medical malpractice claims are described in *Notes 1* and 7.

Allowance for Net Patient Service Revenue Adjustments

Estimates of allowances for adjustments included in net patient service revenue are described in *Notes 1* and 2.

Estimated Amounts Due to Third-Party Payers

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term.

Admitting Physicians

The Medical Center is served by two major physician groups whose patients comprise approximately 43% of the Medical Center's gross patient service revenue for the years ended September 30, 2014 and 2013.

Self-Insurance

Under the Medical Center's insurance programs, coverage is obtained for catastrophic exposures as well as those risks required to be insured by law or contract. The Medical Center retains a significant portion of certain expected losses related primarily to workers' compensation and employee health. Provisions for losses expected under these programs are recorded based upon the Medical Center's estimates of the aggregate liability for claims incurred. The amount of actual losses incurred could differ materially from the estimates reflected in these consolidated financial statements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Medical Center is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Medical Center's self-insurance program or by commercial insurance described in *Notes 1* and 7; for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The Medical Center evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

Asset Retirement Obligations

Estimates related to the accrual for asset retirement obligations are described in *Note 15*. The actual amount of these obligations could differ materially from the estimates reflected in these consolidated financial statements.

Investments

The Medical Center invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks.

Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Pension Plan Assets

At September 30, 2014, the Medical Center's defined benefit pension plan's asset portfolio (the Portfolio) included cash surrender value of life insurance in the amount of approximately \$1,131,000 held by an insurance company in receivership. Management believes laws in the state of Arkansas provide security against potential losses relating to the failure of the insurance company.

In addition, the Portfolio includes an interest in a limited partnership that invests in collateralized debt obligations. This type of investment, which involves varying degrees and types of risk, is more susceptible to loss due to these risks. There is no public market for this type of investment.

The remainder of the Portfolio consists of various investment securities which are subject to the same risks discussed above under *Investments*.

It is reasonably possible that events could occur that would change the value of these investments.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements September 30, 2014 and 2013

Pension Benefit Obligations

The Medical Center has a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan whereby it agrees to provide certain postretirement benefits to eligible employees. The benefit obligation is the actuarial present value of all benefits attributed to service rendered prior to the valuation date based on the entry age normal cost method. It is reasonably possible that events could occur that would materially change the estimated amount of this liability in the near term.

Note 17: Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of the Independent Auditor's Report, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 18: Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) has and will continue to substantially reform the United States health care system. The legislation impacts multiple aspects of the health care system, including many provisions that change payments from Medicare, Medicaid and insurance companies. Starting in 2014, the legislation required the establishment of health insurance exchanges, which will provide individuals without employer-provided health care coverage the opportunity to purchase insurance. It is anticipated that some employers currently offering insurance to employees will opt to have employees seek insurance coverage through the insurance exchanges. It is possible the reimbursement rates paid by insurers participating in the insurance exchanges may be substantially different than rates paid under current health insurance products. Another significant component of PPACA is the expansion of the Medicaid program to a wide range of newly eligible individuals. In anticipation of this expansion, payments under certain existing programs, such as Medicare disproportionate share, will be substantially decreased. Each state's participation in an expanded Medicaid program is optional. The state of Arkansas has enacted a form of Medicaid expansion which uses the expansion funding to purchase private insurance policies on the health care exchanges for qualifying beneficiaries beginning January 1, 2014. This form of Medicaid expansion has been commonly referred to as the Arkansas Private Option. While hospitals may see improved reimbursement as previously uninsured patients gain coverage, the significance of the improvement remains unclear. In addition, the expansion must be reappropriated annually by the legislature.

PPACA is extremely complex and may be difficult for the federal government and each state to implement. While the overall impact of PPACA cannot currently be estimated, it is possible it will have a negative impact on the Medical Center's net patient service revenue. In addition, it is possible the Medical Center will experience payment delays and other operational challenges during PPACA's implementation.

INTRODUCTION

As a result of the Affordable Care Act, tax-exempt hospitals are required to assess the health needs of their communities and adopt implementation strategies to address identified needs. Compliance with section 501(r) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) requires that a tax-exempt hospital facility:

- Conduct a community health needs assessment every three years.
- Adopt an implementation strategy to meet the significant community health needs identified through the assessment.
- Report how it is addressing the significant needs identified in the community health needs assessment
 and a description of significant needs that are not being addressed with the reasons why such needs are
 not being addressed.

The community health needs assessment was initiated in January 2013 and ended in May 2013 at St. Bernards Medical Center. The Medical Center's defined community aligns closely with the boundaries of Craighead, Greene, Mississippi, Poinsett, Cross, Randolph, Clay and Lawrence Counties. Because the majority of the publicly available data used in the community health needs assessment is available at the county level rather than the zip code level, and because of the large number of zip codes included in the Medical Center's community, these eight counties will be used as a basis for presenting demographic and public health information about the community. The community health needs assessment took into account input from persons who represent the broad interest of the community served by the hospital facility, including those with special knowledge of or expertise in public health, as well as those representing medically underserved, low-income or minority populations. The hospital facility made the community health needs assessment widely available to the public.

The results of the community health needs assessment were presented to the leadership team at St. Bernards Medical Center. Based on the results of the assessment, the leadership team identified six priority areas. These priority areas as well as the results of the community assessment were presented to the St. Bernards Medical Center Board for final approval. The Community Education Department at St. Bernards Medical Center was then charged with the development of the implementation plan in collaboration with various other departments within the medical center. The final implementation plan was presented to the St. Bernards Medical Center Board for final approval.

NEEDS ST. BERNARDS MEDICAL CENTER WILL DIRECTLY ADDRESS

The main purpose of the community health needs assessment is to help further the Medical Center's understanding of the health needs of the community. Through this assessment the needs of the community have been identified and prioritized so that St. Bernards Medical Center (the Medical Center) may adopt an implementation strategy to address specific needs of the community. The health needs identified were ranked based on the following questions: how important the issue is to the community, how many people are affected by the issue, what are the consequences of not addressing the issue, how prevalent was the issue, and does the issue effect vulnerable populations. The needs were scored and ranked accordingly. The top six areas of community health of community health needs will be addressed in St. Bernards Medical Centers' Implementation Strategy for years 2014 through 2016, after which, the next community health needs assessment will be performed. The six emerging community needs include:

- Obesity
- Uninsured Adults
- Diabetes
- Access to Clinics/Physicians
- Heart Disease
- Tobacco Use



St. Bernards Medical Center has an increased focus on health and wellness within our community and continues to invest in opportunities that better help our patients achieve their health goals rather than only treating acute and episodic problems. Our implementation strategy for 2014 to 2016 will focus on improving the health of the communities in which we serve as well as increasing access to health care for those less who otherwise would not be able to receive it. We feel, as our mission states, it is our duty to provide Christ-like healing to the community through education, treatment, and health services regardless of ability to pay. Our implementation strategy was created with our mission in mind. Through the community needs assessment it was evident the burden of chronic illness within in our community and across the state of Arkansas. In efforts to address the needs of the communities in which we serve, St. Bernards Medical Center offers their commitment to the items indicated within the implementation plan. We understand this plan to be a "living document" subject to ongoing revision and enhancement as deemed necessary by the needs of the communities. We also anticipate some overlap in our efforts. Many of the strategies and activities outlined address risk factors associate with multiple identified needs. For example, strategies to improve obesity will also help to improve the health of those with diabetes and heart disease as well. The St. Bernards Medical Center Community Implementation Plan for 2014-2016 outlines the problems, strategies, activities, and desired outcomes for each of the six priority health needs identified. It will be a collaborative effort of various departments within the medical center as well as community partners in implementing and achieving the desired outcomes indicated in the implementation plan.

PRIORITY AREA #3 - DIABETES

Problem:

- In 2010, Arkansas reported an overall diabetes prevalence rate of 9.6%. The majority of counties in Arkansas (36) reported diabetes prevalence rates of 5 10%.
- The county with the highest rate of diabetes, Clay, reported a prevalence rate of 20.1%.

PRIORITY AREA #5- HEART DISEASE

Problem:

• Heart disease is the largest single killer of Arkansans. In 2011, almost a fourth (23.1%) of all Arkansas deaths was due to heart disease.

Why:

Self-reported data among Arkansas adults indicate that the prevalence of five of the seven major modifiable risk
factors for heart disease and stroke have increased over the last five to ten years in the state: high blood
pressure, high blood cholesterol, diabetes, overweight and obesity, and inadequate consumption of fruits and
vegetables. The prevalence for smoking and physical inactivity decreased during the last decade, but neither
decline was statistically significant.

PRIORITY AREA #5 - TOBACCO USE

Problem:

- In Arkansas, 14.5% of youth aged 12-17 years smoked a cigarette in the past month. Arkansas ranks 49th among the states on cigarette use.
- In Arkansas, 3% of current smokers who made a quit attempt in the past year called a quitline. Arkansas ranks 25th among the states.

- Cigarette use among Arkansas adults is at 27%: the national average is only 21.2%.

Why:

- Residents of rural communities more likely to use tobacco products, to start at a younger age, to use more
 heavily and to be exposed to secondhand smoke at work and at home than their counterparts in cities and
 suburbs. Tobacco use is deeply rooted in the social environment in many rural communities.
- Factors include: media targeting rural communities and youth, local government is less likely to pass tobacco free policies, high tobacco use encourages high tobacco use, fewer cessation resources
