



- A. **Percentage of Financial Support:** The Women Win Foundation's public support is currently at 13.35% for the five years ended with FY 2014. This was an increase from the 11% public support that the Women Win Foundation had at the end of its first five years, ending FY 2013. We anticipate that this public support will continue to grow as the Women Win Foundation extends its outreach and fundraising activities in 2015 and beyond with more public events, public presentations and online public awareness/fundraising campaigns. The Women Win Foundation will also continue to broaden its support among private foundations, corporations and the U.S. government through ongoing prospecting, cultivation and solicitation of targeted donors. Accordingly, Women Win exceeds the threshold requirement of support set forth in Treas. Reg. § 1.170A-9(f)(3)(i).
- B. **Sources of Support:** The Women Win Foundation currently receives support from a variety of sources and geographic areas. The Women Win Foundation has received major grants and donations from the Novo Foundation based in New York and dedicated to the empowerment of adolescent girls and ending violence against girls and women (www.novofoundation.org); the Segal Family Foundation based in New Jersey and focused on providing support to grassroots organizations to improve the quality of life in sub-Saharan Africa, including such projects as assisting HIV/AIDS orphans, supporting local businesses and empowering women and girls (www.segalfamilyfoundation.org); the Greenpark Foundation, a family foundation based in Great Britain, who awarded the Women Win Foundation a grant to implement high quality and safe sports programs for adolescent girls; the Nike Corporation based in Oregon and one of the world's largest manufacturers of athletic apparel (www.nike.com); DLA Piper LLC headquartered in Maryland and one of the world's largest global law firms (www.dlapiper.com), and from Laitram LLC, an international corporation headquartered in Louisiana and engaged in the manufacture of industrial machinery and equipment (www.laitram.com). The Women Win Foundation's individual supporters come from across the US, from California to NY, with the majority of individual donors coming from the Northeast of the United States.
- C. **Attraction of Public Support:** Over the past five years, the Women Win Foundation, Inc. has consistently carried out ongoing fundraising activities by seeking and receiving funding from a variety of sources consisting of individuals, corporations, and private foundations. These funds were solicited by a variety of methodologies including face to face solicitations, on-line fundraising, house parties and submitting grant proposals to private foundations. These fundraising efforts have been primarily carried out by the Women Win Foundation's volunteer Board of Directors, many of whom have substantial fundraising experience, and with the help of some outside consultants.

Set forth below are examples of some of the public outreach and fundraising activities that the Women Win Foundation has been engaged in over the past five years:

- 1) The Women Win Foundation has been represented on two occasions at the Clinton Global Initiative (CGI) in New York City which has given Women Win wide exposure to the funding community. While attending CGI, our Chair, Astrid Aafjes was able to meet the Segal Foundation, which ultimately resulted in the Segal Foundation awarding a grant to the Women Win Foundation for its work in East Africa.
- 2) The Women Win Foundation has submitted written grant proposals to a variety of private foundations and has received funding from the Novo Foundation, Greenpark Foundation, and the Segal Foundation. As mentioned above the Segal Foundation grant was initiated as a result of meeting at CGI. The Novo Foundation grant came about through research and matching Women Win's programs with the Novo Foundation's mission. The Greenpark Foundation grant came about through personal board contacts.
- 3) The Women Win Foundation has received funding and support from three major corporate donors, Nike Corporation, DLA Piper, LLC, and Laitram LLC. These corporate supporters were solicited by members of Women Win's board of directors.
- 4) The Women Win Foundation held a major house party in New York City, hosted by a Women Win board member, which raised public awareness and support among individuals.
- 5) The Women Win Foundation has arranged for its individual supporters to donate on-line either directly through the Women Win website or via the Network for Good website. The combination of additional exposure through the activities described above and the ease of making on-line donations has enabled the Women Win Foundation to reach a broad public base and to solicit and obtain funding from a cross section of corporate, individual and charitable organization donors.
- 6) Thus, momentum generated by Women Win's prior fundraising activities in the business and charitable community, has enabled Women Win to solicit and seek additional funding from government sources. In March 2015, Women Win met with representatives of the US State Department in New York City. As a result of these meetings, Women Win has been invited to submit an application for the Global Women Peace and Security 2015 Call for Proposals in support of Women Win's work in Cambodia and Myanmar, focusing on gender-based violence and early forced marriages.
- 7) The Women Win Foundation initiated a campaign in 2013 to reach young women athletes in the U.S., initially with a focus on colleges in the Northeast. This campaign was supported in part by the Nike Corporation, a funding source for Women Win.

Based on the foregoing, the Women Win Foundation attracts public support by maintaining a continuous and bona fide program for the solicitation of funds from the general public, community, governmental units and other charitable organizations, as specified in Treas. Reg. § 1.170A-9(f)(3)(ii).

D. Representative Governing Body: The Women Win Foundation's Board of Directors is comprised of professional women and men, who have extensive fundraising experience as well as experience working in the field of women's rights and sports. Additionally, the major donors whose gifts do not qualify as public support, have no representation on the Board of

Directors and have no self interest in the organization, other than their commitment and support for women's rights and sports. Based on the foregoing, the Women Win Foundation has a representative governing body as specified in Treas. Reg. § 1.170A-9(f)(3)(iii)(C). Please see the below the short profiles for each member of the Women Win Foundations' Board of Directors.

E. Program Activities that attract broad public support: The Women Win Foundation supports programs with the aim to improve access and quality of sport programming for girls with a focus on using sport as an innovative and impactful strategy to build leadership and empower adolescent girls to address gender-based violence, access to sexual and reproductive health and rights and achieve economic empowerment. The programs Women Win supports are in communities around the world where adolescent girls have little or no access to sports. During the past five years, the Women Win Foundation has supported programs in Brazil, Cambodia, Kenya and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Next year, based on the experience that the Women Win Foundation has garnered from its international work, the Women Win Foundation will be launching programs for disadvantaged communities in the United States. We anticipate that this will broaden and grow Women Win's public support.

As set forth in Treas. Reg. § 1.170A-9(f)(3)(iii)(E)(3), an additional factor in the consideration of public charity status under the facts and circumstances test, is whether "the organization will be likely to appeal to persons having some broad common interest or purpose." The Women Win Foundation's programs, which target the use of sports and fitness programs for young women as a means of empowering adolescent girls, has broad public acceptance, appeal and support. This is demonstrated by a vast cross section of donors that include individuals from coast-to-coast, other charitable organizations and non-profit and for profit businesses (engaged in such diverse business activities as the world's leading sports apparel company headquartered in Oregon, one of the world's largest global law firms with dozens of domestic and international offices, and a leading manufacturer of business machinery and equipment located in Louisiana). Moreover, the actual programs provide support for young women in such disadvantaged locations as Brazil, Cambodia, Kenya, the Congo, and an anticipated imminent expansion to low income and other communities in the United States. Accordingly, under any plausible interpretation, the Women Win Foundation appeals to persons "having some broad common interest" within the meaning of Treas. Reg. § 1.170A-9(f)(3)(iii)(E)(3).

Board of Directors Profiles

Astrid Aafjes, Founder and Board Chair – For more than 20 years, Ms. Aafjes has focused her career on gender and human rights and gained extensive experience on advancing the lives of girls and women and creating social change through innovative strategies. In 1996, she worked for Women, Law and Development International and worked with the UN Special Rapporteur on Violence Against Women. In 2002, she worked for Mama Cash, the first international Women's Fund and was responsible for their Program Department. Ms. Aafjes holds a Law degree from the University of Amsterdam.

Tuti Scott. Tuti B. Scott is President and Founder of Imagine Philanthropy, an international consulting firm that guides organizations and their leadership in 'smarter' and effective performance and coaches philanthropic leaders who wish to work from a place of mindfulness. During her 15-year tenure at the Women's Sports Foundation, Tuti raised more than \$70 million while marketing sports and health as a 'cause' and engaging thousands of donor activists in the mission of "equal play."

Ziba Cranmer - Ziba Cranmer joined Cone in January 2011 as a Vice President in the Cause Branding practice. Ziba brings with her deep experience in corporate sustainability, strategy development and a history of incubating successful innovation initiatives in the areas of strategic philanthropy, product and category development, transparency and stakeholder engagement. Ziba is a lifelong athlete; she plays lacrosse, basketball, runs, and snowboards.

Sara Andrews - Sara K. Andrews serves as Counsel and Program Manager for New Perimeter, DLA Piper's international pro bono initiative and non-profit affiliate. In this capacity, she develops, manages and participates in projects for which teams of DLA Piper lawyers provide legal assistance on economic development, law reform, legal education, and human rights issues in developing and post-conflict nations.
