1. Description of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization

Houston Healthcare System, Inc. (System), located in Warner Robins, Georgia, is a not-for-profit corporation that provides a full range of services to the residents of Houston County and surrounding areas. The following entities comprise the System: Houston Hospitals, Inc. operates two acute care hospitals, Houston Medical Center and Perry Hospital, which provide inpatient, outpatient, and urgent care services; Houston Healthcare EMS, Inc. provides ambulance services to the residents of Houston County; Houston Healthcare Properties, Inc. owns and manages the non-hospital property of the System; Houston Health Ventures, Inc. is a for-profit corporation engaged in joint ventures that assist and promote the tax exempt purposes of the System; and Houston Primary Care Physicians, LLC operates a free-standing primary care physician practice. All intercompany transactions have been eliminated.

Effective January 1, 2009, the Hospital Authority of Houston County (Authority) implemented a reorganization plan for Houston Hospitals, Inc. and related facilities whereby all the assets, liabilities, management and governance of the facilities were transferred to Houston Hospitals, Inc., pursuant to a lease and transfer agreement which provides for a nominal rate to the Authority by the System. The lease term expires December 31, 2048.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of combined financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the combined financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, Continued December 31, 2014 and 2013

1. Description of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, Continued

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the System analyzes a variety of information for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the System provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectibles, deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). There were no significant changes to the underlying assumptions in the allowance methodology for third-party payors.

For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the System records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected, after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted, is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The System's provision for bad debts increased approximately \$10,648,000 from approximately \$35,998,000 for 2013 to approximately \$46,646,000 for 2014. This was the result of increased documentation requirements due to the System's change in its charity care and uninsured discount policies during fiscal year 2014 to comply with IRS Regulation 501(r). Allowance for contractuals and doubtful accounts decreased approximately \$30,741,000 and gross accounts receivable decreased approximately \$33,472,000 from 2013 to 2014. During 2014, management focused directly on collecting payments on current accounts receivable. The older accounts receivable were significantly reserved. When those accounts were written off, gross accounts receivable and the corresponding allowance for doubtful accounts decreased, with little effect on net patient accounts receivable.

1. Description of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, Continued

Investments and Investment Income

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the combined balance sheets. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in excess revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from excess revenues over expenses unless the investments are trading securities. Losses on other than temporary impairment declines are included in excess revenues over expenses.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustee under indenture agreements and designated assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements and other, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the System have been reclassified in the combined balance sheets at December 31, 2014 and 2013.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the combined financial statements.

Gifts of long-lived assets, such as land, buildings, or equipment, are reported as unrestricted support, and are excluded from excess revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations addressing how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

The System evaluates on an ongoing basis the recoverability of its assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is required to be recognized if the carrying value of the asset exceeds the undiscounted future net cash flows associated with that asset. The impairment loss to be recognized is the amount by which the carrying value of the long-lived asset exceeds the asset's fair value. In most instances, the fair value is determined by discounted estimated future cash flows using an appropriate interest rate. The System has not recorded any impairment charges in the accompanying combined statements of operations and changes in net assets for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013.

Cost of Borrowing

Interest cost on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. There was no capitalized interest cost for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013.

Long-Term Investments and Other

Long-term investments and other consist of notes receivable, investments in unconsolidated companies, and deferred financing cost. Notes receivable are from loans secured by promissory contracts. Investments in unconsolidated companies represent the System's participation in joint ventures and partnerships, which are accounted for on the cost and equity methods. Deferred financing costs related to the issuance of long-term debt were deferred and are being amortized using the straight line method, which approximates the effective interest method.

Excess Revenues Over Expenses

The combined statement of operations and changes in net assets includes excess revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets).

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS. Continued December 31, 2014 and 2013

1. Description of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, Continued

Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Charity Care

The System provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported in net patient service revenue.

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the System are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the combined statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying combined financial statements.

Estimated Malpractice Costs and Other Self-Insurance Costs

The provision for estimated medical malpractice claims and other self-insurance plans includes estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, Continued December 31, 2014 and 2013

Risk Management

The System is exposed to various risks of loss from torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; business interruption; errors and omissions; employee injuries and illnesses; natural disasters; medical malpractice; and employee health, dental, and accident benefits.

Commercial insurance coverage is purchased for claims arising from such matters. Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the three preceding years. The System is partially self-insured for employee health and professional liability as disclosed in Notes 10 and 11.

Income Taxes

The System is a not-for-profit corporation that has been recognized as tax-exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The System applies accounting policies that prescribe when to recognize and how to measure the combined financial statement effects of income tax positions taken or expected to be taken on its income tax returns. These rules require management to evaluate the likelihood that, upon examination by the relevant taxing jurisdictions, those income tax positions would be sustained. Based on that evaluation, the System only recognizes the maximum benefit of each income tax position that is more than 50% likely of being sustained. To the extent that all or a portion of the benefits of an income tax position are not recognized, a liability would be recognized for the unrecognized benefits, along with any interest and penalties that would result from disallowance of the position. Should any such penalties and interest be incurred, they would be recognized as operating expenses.

Based on the results of management's evaluation, no liability is recognized in the accompanying combined balance sheets for unrecognized income tax positions. Further, no interest or penalties have been accrued or charged to expense as of December 31, 2014 and 2013 or for the years then ended. The System's tax returns are subject to possible examination by the taxing authorities. For federal income tax purposes, the tax returns essentially remain open for possible examination for a period of three years after the respective filing deadlines of those returns.

Income Taxes, Continued

Houston Health Ventures, Inc. is a for-profit corporation and wholly-owned subsidiary of the System. The System has not recorded a current or deferred tax provision, as this would not have a material effect on the combined financial statements.

Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurement and Disclosures, defines fair value as the amount that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (i.e., an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. FASB ASC 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy that requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value.

FASB ASC 820 describes the following three levels of input that may be used:

- Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical assets and liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs.
- Level 2: Observable prices that are based on inputs not quoted on active markets but corroborated by market data.
- Level 3: Unobservable inputs when there is little or no market data available, thereby requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs.

Subsequent Event

In preparing these combined financial statements, the System has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through April 21, 2015, the date the combined financial statements were issued.

NOTES TO COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, Continued December 31, 2014 and 2013

2. Patient Service Revenue

The System has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the System at amounts different from its established rates. The System does not believe there are any significant credit risks associated with receivables due from third-party payors.

A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

Medicare

Inpatient acute care services and outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors.

The System is reimbursed for certain reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the System and audits thereof by the Medicare Administrative Contractor (MAC). The System's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the System. The System's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the MAC through 2009.

Revenue from the Medicare program accounted for approximately 41% of the System's patient service revenue for the years ended 2014 and 2013. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare program are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Estimated reimbursement amounts are adjusted in subsequent periods as cost reports are prepared and filed and as final settlements are determined. The 2013 patient service revenue increased approximately \$1,556,000 primarily due to retroactive adjustments in amounts previously estimated. The 2014 patient service revenue increased approximately \$1,815,000 primarily due to retroactive adjustments related to Medicare DSH and Graduate Medical Education payments.

Medicare, Continued

The System believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations and is not aware of any pending or threatened investigations involving allegations of potential wrongdoing. However, there has been an increase in regulatory initiatives at the federal level including the initiation of the Recovery Audit Contractor (RAC) program. The RAC program was created to review Medicare claims for medical necessity and coding appropriateness. The RAC's have authority to pursue improper payments with a three year look back from the date the claim was paid. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation, as well as significant regulatory action including fines, penalties and exclusion from the Medicare program.

CMS has recently made an offer to providers to settle all pending RAC appeals with a date of admission prior to October 1, 2013 for a partial payment of 68% if the provider will withdraw their claims. This attempt is due to a backlog of claims, in which there is no current plan to increase personnel to review these appeals. In December 2014, the System signed an administrative agreement with CMS to withdraw their pending RAC appeals. The System recognized approximately \$1,596,000 in 2014 related to this settlement, included in estimated third-party payor settlements.

Medicaid

Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid at a prospectively determined rate per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Outpatient services rendered to the Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology.

The System is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the System and audits thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary. The System's Medicaid cost reports have been audited by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary through 2009.

Medicaid, Continued

Revenue from the Medicaid program accounted for approximately 13% and 12% of the System's patient service revenue for the years ended 2014 and 2013, respectively. Laws and regulations governing the Medicaid program are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Estimated reimbursement amounts are adjusted in subsequent periods as cost reports are prepared and filed and as final settlements are determined.

The System also contracts with certain managed care organizations to receive reimbursement for providing services to selected enrolled Medicaid beneficiaries. Payment arrangements with these managed care organizations consist primarily of prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, or prospectively determined per diems.

The System believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations and is not aware of any pending or threatened investigations involving allegations of potential wrongdoing. However, there has been an increase in regulatory initiatives at the state level including the initiation of the Medicaid Integrity Contractor (MIC) program. This program was created to review Medicaid claims for medical necessity and coding appropriateness. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation, as well as significant regulatory action including fines, penalties and exclusion from the Medicaid program.

During 2010, the state of Georgia enacted legislation known as the Provider Payment Agreement Act (Act) whereby hospitals in the state of Georgia are assessed a "provider payment" in the amount of 1.45% of their net patient service revenue. The Act became effective July 1, 2010, the beginning of state fiscal year 2011. The provider payments are due on a quarterly basis to the Department of Community Health. The payments are to be used for the sole purpose of obtaining federal financial participation for medical assistance payments to providers on behalf of Medicaid recipients. The provider payment results in an increase in payments for Medicaid services to hospitals of approximately 11.88%. Approximately \$3,181,000 and \$3,190,000 of provider payments relating to the Act are included in other expense in the accompanying combined statements of operations and changes in net assets for the years ended 2014 and 2013, respectively.

Other Agreements

The System has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the System under these agreements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, prospectively determined daily rates, fixed rates fee schedules, and discounts from established charges.

The System recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the System recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the System's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the System records a provision for bad debts equal to charges related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided.

The System's investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying combined financial statements.

Management evaluates securities for other-than-temporary impairment at least on an annual basis, and more frequently when economic or market concerns warrant such evaluation. In analyzing an issuer's financial condition, management considers whether the investments are issued by the federal government or its agencies, whether downgrades by bond rating agencies have occurred, and the results of reviews of the issuer's financial condition.

Discounts on long-term debt are amortized using the straight-line method over the life of the related bonds, which approximates the effective interest method.

Under the terms of the 2007 revenue certificates, the System is required to maintain certain deposits with a trustee. Such deposits are included with assets limited as to use. The 2007 and 2013 revenue note indentures also place limits on the incurrence of additional borrowings and require that the System satisfy certain measures of financial performance as long as the notes are outstanding. The System is in compliance with these requirements at 2014 and 2013.

8. Pension Plan

Plan Description

The System contributes to a defined benefit pension plan (Plan) managed by a trustee. All full-time System employees hired prior to May 1, 2009, age 21 or older, with at least one year of service, are eligible to participate in the Plan. System employees who are vested are entitled to an annual benefit payable monthly for life, in an amount equal to 1% of final average earnings up to covered compensation, plus 1.55% of final average earnings in excess of covered compensation, times credited service up to 30 years. Participants are 100% vested after five years of employment. Participants are fully vested at age 65. The System's funding policy is to make the minimum annual contribution required by applicable regulations. Contributions are intended to provide not only for benefits attributed to service to date but also for those expected to be earned in the future.

The System's investment strategy is to manage the portfolio to preserve principal and liquidity while maximizing the return on the investment portfolio through the full investment of available funds. The portfolio is diversified by investing in multiple types of investment-grade securities. The investment policy requires assets of the Plan to be primarily invested in securities with at least an investment grade rating to minimize interest rate and credit risk. The Plan assets are long-term in nature and are intended to generate returns while preserving capital. The target allocation for the investment is 45% U.S. equity, 10% international equity, 35% fixed income, and 10% other securities.

Pension assets are invested in equities, fixed income securities, government agency and corporate obligations, corporate bonds, and cash and cash equivalents. The allocation between different investment vehicles is determined by the System's investment committee, based on current market conditions, short-term and long-term market outlooks, and cash needs for distributions and Plan expenses. Assumptions for expected returns on Plan assets

are based on historical performance, long-term market outlook, and a diversified investment approach designed to provide steady, consistent returns that minimize market fluctuations. The System utilizes the services of a professional investment advisor in the selection of individual fund managers. The investment advisor tracks the performance of each fund manager and makes recommendations for redistributions, as needed, to comply with targeted allocations or to replace underperforming funds.

The System attempts to mitigate investment risk by rebalancing between investment classes as the System's contributions and monthly benefit payments are made. Although changes in interest rates may affect the fair value of a portion of the investment portfolio and cause unrealized gains and losses, such gains or losses would not be realized unless the investments are sold.

The System will recognize approximately \$620,000 of actuarial loss during the next 12 months beginning January 1, 2015.

9. Defined Contribution Plan

The System has a defined contribution retirement plan (Retirement Plan) covering substantially all employees. The Retirement Plan is a tax-deferred annuity plan under Section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code which allows employee contributions upon employment and at least 1,000 hours of work, and allows employer contributions upon attainment of the age of 21 and at least one year of service. Participants may contribute up to 20% of their annual compensation up to a maximum dollar limitation. Employer contributions are made at a matching level of 50% of the participants' annual contribution to the Retirement Plan, up to a maximum of 4% of the employee's annual compensation. The System made contributions to the Retirement Plan of approximately \$1,759.000 and \$1,518,000 for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

10. Employee Health Plan

The System has a self-insurance program under which a third-party administrator processes and pays claims. The System reimburses the third-party administrator for claims incurred and paid and has purchased stop-loss insurance coverage for claims in excess of \$150,000 for each individual employee. Under this self-insurance program, approximately \$17,131,000 and \$13,388,000 was paid or accrued during the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

11. Professional Liability Claims

The System is covered by a claims-made general and professional liability insurance policy with excess coverage not to exceed \$35 million. Self-insured retention related to this policy in 2014 and 2013 was \$1 million per occurrence and \$5 million in aggregate. The System uses a third-party administrator to review and analyze incidents that may result in a claim against the System. In conjunction with the third-party administrator, incidents are assigned reserve amounts for the ultimate liability that may result from an asserted claim. The System also uses independent actuaries to estimate the ultimate costs, if any, of the settlement of such claims. Long-term accrued professional claims are included in self-insurance reserves and the current portion is included in other current liabilities in the combined balance sheets, and in management's opinion, provide an adequate reserve for loss contingencies.

Various claims and assertions have been made against the System in its normal course of providing services. In addition, other claims may be asserted arising from services provided to patients in the past. In the opinion of management, adequate provision has been made for losses which may occur from such asserted and unasserted claims that are not covered by liability insurance.

Obligations covered by reinsurance contracts are included in the reserves for professional liability risks, as the System remains liable to the extent the reinsurers do not meet their obligations under the reinsurance contracts. The current amount receivable under the reinsurance contracts include \$1,738,000 and \$1,699,000 at December 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively, and is recorded in supplies and other assets. The long-term portion of \$4,389,000 and \$4,102,000, respectively, is recorded in insurance recoveries.

13. Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The remaining long-term debt carrying amount approximates its fair value. Based on inputs used in determining the estimated fair value, the System's long-term debt would be classified as Level 2 in the fair value hierarchy.

13. Fair Value of Financial Instruments, Continued

Financial assets valued using Level 1 inputs are based on unadjusted quoted market prices within active markets. Financial assets valued using Level 2 inputs are based primarily on quoted prices for similar investments in active or inactive markets. Valuation techniques utilized to determine fair value are consistently applied. All assets have been valued using a market approach.

- Cash and cash equivalents: Level 2 assets consist of certificates of deposit valued at amortized cost, which approximates fair value.
- Government agency obligations and corporate obligations: Level 2 assets are valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities.
- U.S. corporate bonds: Level 2 assets are valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities. This includes basing values on yields currently available on comparable securities of issuers with similar credit ratings. The corporate bonds contain credit ratings of Baa3 to Aa1.

14. Medicaid Upper Payment Limit

The Medicare, Medicaid, and SCHIP Benefits Improvement and Protection Act of 2000 (BIPA) provides for enhanced payments to Medicaid providers under the Upper Payment Limit (UPL) methodology. Subsequent to the implementation of the UPL methodology, federal budget concerns have led to reconsideration of the BIPA legislation with possible elimination or reduction of enhanced Medicaid payments. Legislation has been enacted to reduce the level of UPL payments. These reductions are anticipated to remain in effect in future periods. The combined financial statements include enhanced payments for December 31, 2014 and 2013 of approximately \$270,000 and \$853,000, respectively.

15. Indigent Care Trust Fund

The System participates in the Georgia Indigent Care Trust Fund (ICTF) Program. The System receives ICTF payments for treating a disproportionate number of Medicaid and other indigent parients. ICTF payments are based on the System's estimated uncompensated cost of services to Medicaid and uninsured patients. The amount of ICTF payments recognized in net patient revenue was approximately \$4,219,000 and \$2,962,000 for the years ended December 31, 2014 and 2013, respectively.

16. Commitments and Contingencies

Operating Leases

The System leases various equipment and facilities under operating leases expiring at various dates. Total rental expense in 2014 and 2013 for all operating leases was approximately \$468,000 and \$412,000, respectively.

The following is a schedule by year of future minimum lease payments under operating leases as of December 31, 2014, that have initial or remaining lease terms in excess of one year.

Compliance Plan

The healthcare industry has recently been subjected to increased scrutiny from governmental agencies at both the national and state level with respect to compliance with regulations. Areas of noncompliance identified at the national level include Medicare and Medicaid, Internal Revenue Service, and other regulations governing the healthcare industry. The System has implemented a compliance plan focusing on such issues. There can be no assurance that the System will not be subjected to future investigations with accompanying monetary damages.

16. Commitments and Contingencies, Continued

Health Care Reform

In recent years, there has been increasing pressure on Congress and some state legislatures to control and reduce the cost of healthcare on the national or at the state level. In 2010, legislation was enacted which included cost controls on hospitals, insurance market reforms, delivery system reforms and various individual and business mandates among other provisions. The costs of certain provisions will be funded in part by reductions in payments by government programs, including Medicare and Medicaid. There can be no assurance that these changes will not adversely affect the System.

Litigation

The System is involved in litigation and regulatory investigations arising in the normal course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the System's future financial position or results from operations.

17. EHR Meaningful Use Incentives

The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (HITECH Act) was enacted into law on February 17, 2009, as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA). The HITECH Act includes provisions designed to increase the use of Electronic Health Records (EHR) by both physicians and hospitals. Beginning with federal fiscal year 2011 and extending through federal fiscal year 2016, eligible hospitals participating in the Medicare and Medicaid programs are eligible for reimbursement incentives based on successfully demonstrating meaningful use of its certified EHR technology. Conversely, those hospitals that do not successfully demonstrate meaningful use of EHR technology are subject to reductions to Medicare reimbursements beginning in fiscal year 2015. On July 13, 2010, the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) released final meaningful use regulations. Meaningful use criteria are divided into three distinct stages: I, II and III. The final rules specify the initial criteria for physicians and eligible hospitals necessary to qualify for incentive payments; calculation of the incentive payment amounts; payment adjustments under Medicare for covered professional services and inpatient hospital services; eligible hospitals failing to demonstrate meaningful use of certified EHR technology; and other program participation requirements.

17. EHR Meaningful Use Incentives, Continued

The final rule set the earliest interim payment date for the incentive payment at May 2011. The first year of the Medicare portion of the program is defined as the federal fiscal year October 1, 2010 to September 30, 2011.

The System recognizes income related to Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments using a gain contingency model. Under this model, the income from incentive payments is recorded entirely in the period in which the last remaining contingency is resolved.

The System attested that it met all requirements to receive Medicare Year 1 and Medicaid Year 2 in 2013 and Medicare Year 2 in 2014. The System applied for and received approval from Medicare and Medicaid notifying the System qualified for approximately \$3,091,000 in 2014 and \$4,798,000 in 2013 from the programs. This amount is included with other revenue on the combined statement of operations, and changes in net assets. Also, if the System satisfies specified meaningful use criteria in future periods, they may become entitled to additional Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments; however, as they have not met these specific requirements as of December 31, 2014, no such additional amounts are accrued.

Implementation Plan Houston Healthcare 3 Year Plan

Description of Plan

Every three years a Community Health Needs Assessment is completed and a three year plan is rewritten. The three year plan addresses the needs identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment. The three year plan includes the four priority areas of (1) Promote Health and Wellness (2) Improve Ease of Access to Health Care, (3) Management of Chronic Disease, and (4) Assist Vulnerable Populations. A detailed annual work plan is developed to measure the progress of reaching the goals and addressing the priorities described in the three year plan. The three year plan will be evaluated by utilizing a score card.

Each of the four priority area will include

Focus Area

- A- An overview of the health priority
- B- Goal/Strategy
- C- The Score Card- objective, baseline, and target (Details for scorecard are listed in appendix 3)

Houston Healthcare Community Benefit Plan

Houston Healthcare includes Perry Hospital and Houston Medical Center. Both facilities are located in Houston County and serve the same populations. Residents can and often do utilize both facilities. Because of this, there are few differences in our community implementation strategy plan.

1- Focus Area - Promote Health and Wellness

Overview - Importance of Community Based Programs

Educational and community-based programs play a key role in

- Preventing disease and injury
- Improving health
- Enhancing quality of life

Healthy People 2020 information states "Educational and community-based programs and strategies will play an important role in improving the health of the community "Community settings such as churches, lower income housing projects, and worksites increase the access to populations with health disparities Barriers such as low literacy rates, non-traditional work hours, and limited education contribute to a decreased understanding of addressing health challenges early and setting healthy lifestyles as a priority to prevent illness. Houston Healthcare has explored and is continuing to seek methods to reach all populations within the service area.

but especially those with the greatest need. This is accomplished by taking needed health information out into the communities we serve. Community Partnerships provide a vehicle to broaden the outreach as well as to provide feedback on methods to reach vulnerable populations. Strong partnerships established to aid in our efforts include Warner Robins Housing Authority, Perry Volunteer Outreach, and Faith Community Nurses. The Faith Community Nurse Program was established by Houston Healthcare and continues as a method to reach the Faith Community as well as populations or neighborhoods the church serves through such avenues as "Soup Kitchens or Clothing Closets"

Community Based Program - Goal Decrease the number of persons developing illness or disease by providing community based outreach programs

Community Based Program - Strategy: The strategy is two-fold first to provide quality community programs reaching a variety of populations out in the community and second that these programs will address major risk factors for illness or disease Partnership with multiple community groups enhances the ability to reach increased numbers of persons as well as reach the underserved population. One example includes, by utilizing the Faith Community nurses to reach not only the population attending the church or temple but also the communities served by these churches. Houston Healthcare provides training for any church or faith group who would like to initiate a health program. Included in the training is how to provide health screenings and resources for referrals. Houston Healthcare also works closely with other organizations serving the lower income or uninsured such as education and screenings provided for tenants at lower income housing or clients served by the Perry Volunteer Outreach and the elderly served by Middle Georgia Community Action Agency. These organizations are addressing underlying causes contributing to poor health such as need for nutritious food and adequate housing.

Overview - Major Risk Factor- Nutrition and Healthy Weight

The Nutrition and Weight Status information included in Healthy People 2020 reflect strong science supporting the health benefits of eating a healthful diet and maintaining a healthy body weight. The information also emphasizes that efforts to change diet and weight should address individual behaviors, as well as the policies and environments that support these behaviors in settings such as schools, worksites, health care organizations, and communities. Our community adults as well as children will face chronic obesity-related health problems like heart disease, high blood pressure, cancer, and asthma if the present trends continue. The 2011 Community Needs Assessment defined overweight as BMI of 25.0 to 29.0 and obesity as BMI over 30. Based on self—reported heights and weights, only 30.4% of Houston County adults are at a healthy weight. More than 2 in 3 Houston County adults (68.9%) are overweight, 30.7% of these adults are obese.

<u>Goal Nutrition - Healthy Weight-</u> Promote health and reduce chronic disease risks through the consumption of healthful diets and achievement and maintenance of healthy body weights.

Strategy - The strategy will include promotion of the plate method and promotion of the Healthy People 2020 recommendations to "Consume a variety of nutrient-dense foods within and across the food groups, especially whole grains, fruits, vegetables, low-fat or fat-free milk or milk products, and lean meats and other protein sources and limit the intake of saturated and *trans* fats, cholesterol, added sugars, sodium (salt), and alcohol "The strategy will also include programs specifically designed to promote healthy weights such as the Healthy Living Class, and Nutrition Education along with exercise promotion classes In addition, health screenings will be provided at worksites, churches and other community sites will include BMI measurements The local school system is targeting youth promotion of healthy weight

Overview - Major Risk Factor for illness and death- tobacco

A major goal of Healthy People 2020 is prevention and cessation of tobacco usage. The report shares "The United States has made historic progress in combating the epidemic of tobacco-caused illness and death. Despite this progress, tobacco use remains the leading cause of premature and preventable death in our nation, responsible for 443,000 deaths each year. Tobacco use causes cancer, heart disease, lung disease as well as premature birth and low birth weight infants." In Houston County the leading causes of death include cardiovascular disease and cancer, and tobacco is a major contributor to these diseases. 18 6% of persons living in Houston County smoke tobacco. In Houston County the rate of tobacco usage is highest among residents age 40 to 59 (18 4%) Lower income residents had higher rates of tobacco usage that the upper income. The tobacco usage among pregnant women in our area is higher than the state and national averages.

<u>Tobacco Cessation-Goal</u>: Decrease the incidence of cancer and cardiovascular disease and other respiratory illnesses by decreasing the usage of tobacco products.

Tobacco related Strategy: Addressing this health issues requires multiple methods and partnerships While it is recognized tobacco cessation is difficult, it is possible Houston Healthcare will provide ongoing tobacco cessation classes called "Fresh Start" which is an evidence based program from the American Cancer Society Georgia also has the Quit Line which offers individual assistance through a phone line This resource will be shared at Community outreach events In addition, each hospitalized patient who states they are a tobacco user will receive tobacco cessation information along with information on the Fresh Start tobacco cessation program Information on the five A's, which is a quick method for physicians to counsel a tobacco user, will be provided to local physician offices Community Partners include District Public Health and The American Cancer Society

2- Focus Area - Improve Ease of Access to Health Care

Overview - Ease of Access to comprehensive, quality health care services is important for the achievement of a healthy life The Healthy People 2020 review includes "Access to health care means the timely use of personal health services to achieve the best health outcomes" Limited access to health care impacts people's ability to reach their full potential, negatively affecting their quality of life Barriers to services include

- Lack of availability which is impacted by the number of health workers
- Limited financial ability to pay for services
- Lack of insurance coverage

These barriers to accessing health services lead to

- Unmet health needs
- Delays in receiving appropriate care
- Inability to get preventive services
- Hospitalizations that could have been prevented

The PRC Community Health Needs Assessment information included 53 9% of Houston County adults aged 18 to 64 report having healthcare coverage through private insurance 32 9% report coverage through a government sponsored program (e.g. Medicaid, Medicare, military benefits) 13 2% report having no insurance coverage A total of 35 2% of Houston County adults report some type of difficulty or delay in obtaining healthcare services in the past year A total of 12 9% of Houston County adults have gone to a hospital emergency room more than once in the past year about their own health. This is twice the national average for ED usage. A closer review showed

- 47 8% had an emergency situation
- 34 3% indicated the visit was during after-hours or on a weekend
- 13 5% cited difficulties accessing primary care

Access to Care-Goal: Improve access to comprehensive, quality health care services.

Access to Care -Strategy: Houston Healthcare is addressing this critical issue in multiple ways including (1) funding support for local technical schools and colleges for training additional health care workers, (2) establishing a physician's residency program, (3) providing services for referrals from the Volunteer Medical Clinic as well as (4) a phone referral service and distribution of information on financial assistance programs (5)Health fairs and community screenings include information on qualifying for financial assistance (6)Partnerships with groups such as Komen For the Cure, March of Dimes and others provide assistance in obtaining health services (7)Houston Healthcare has added Care Managers to assist in-patients as well as patients utilizing the ED to better navigate the health care system linking them to needed services and encouraging establishing a "medical home" (8)Houston Healthcare is also providing Med Stops for urgent care in three locations for easier access

3- Focus Area - Improve Individual's Management of Chronic Diseases

Overview

Chronic diseases are the leading cause of death and disability in the United States They cause 7 out of 10 deaths each year Heart disease, cancer, and stroke alone cause more than 50 percent of all deaths each year 107 million Americans, almost 1 out of every 2 adults age 18 or older, had at least 1 of 6 reported chronic illnesses Cardiovascular disease, Arthritis, Diabetes, Asthma, Cancer and Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)

The 2011 Community Assessment reports "together cardiovascular disease and cancers accounted for more than one-half of all deaths in Houston County in 2007" Heart Failure is noted as the number one cause for readmission at both HMC and Perry Hospital The PRC assessment reports 14% of the population has diabetes and the stroke rate at 49 1 per 100,000 is higher than the national average of 44 2 per 100,000 population. Other chronic disease noted in the community assessment includes kidney disease which is often the result of uncontrolled diabetes and hypertension.

Chronic Disease Goal: Provide Chronic Disease Management to equip persons with skills needed to control their condition in such a way that decreases complications, and improves their quality of life

Chronic Disease Strategy: The first strategy is to prevent chronic disease. These efforts are listed in our first and second priority areas which include addressing risk factors, early identification through screenings and improving the access to appropriate health services. All of these play an important role in addressing chronic illness. Once a person has a chronic illness our strategy becomes (1) to provide chronic disease management programs that empower and encourage the patient to be an active participant in their care. We strive to provide evidenced based chronic disease management programs which include. Diabetes Management- nationally recognized program from American Diabetes Association, Cancer Survivors- I Can Cope program from American Cancer Society, Arthritis Management- Walk with Ease from Arthritis Association, as well as Heart Failure and Hypertension Management both based on chronic disease management models (2)Provide a smooth transitional care process to provide hospitalized patients with education and skills to manage their illness. Transitional Care is a priority for Houston Healthcare and includes appropriate discharge planning and referrals

4- Focus Area-Assist Vulnerable Populations - Improve the health of populations at higher risk for poor health specifically targeting women with higher risk pregnancies and their newborns as well as older adults.

Overview

Older adults are among the fastest growing age group The Healthy People 2020 review states "More than 37 million people in this group (60 percent) will manage more than 1 chronic condition by 2030" Older adults are at high risk for developing chronic illnesses and other disabilities Many older adults will experience hospitalizations, nursing home admissions, as well as the need to move to assisted living facilities. The ability to complete basic daily activities may decrease if illness, chronic disease, or injury limits physical or mental abilities of older adults. These limitations make it hard for older adults to remain at home. Early prevention and physical activity can help prevent such declines. Unfortunately, less than 20 percent of older adults engage in enough physical activity, and fewer do strength training. Each year, 1 out of 3 older adults falls. Falls often cause severe disability among survivors. Falls are the leading cause of death due to unintentional injury among older adults, deaths and injuries can be prevented by addressing risk factors. According to the Healthy People 2020 Report, "Behaviors such as participation in physical activity, self-management of chronic diseases, or use of preventive health services can improve health outcomes."

Older Adults Goal: Improve the health, function, and quality of life of older adults.

Older Adults Strategy- Provide a free exercise program for older adults in collaboration with other community organizations such as the City of Centerville and the Perry Recreation department Provide free and ongoing blood pressure screenings and education at convenient locations including referrals as needed to physicians care Partner with other local organizations that are providing services for older adults Include ongoing educational programs (1) tools for medication management and the (2) importance being engaged and taking responsibility for personal health In addition specific training for caregivers will be provided in order to establish support for older adults

Overview - Low Birth Weight Infants

Preterm/ low birth weight is the leading cause of newborn death in the United States Low birth weight babies, those who weigh less than 5 pounds 8 ounces at birth are much more prone to illness and neonatal death than are babies of normal weight Risk factors for low birth weight are continuing to be studied, however, known risk factors include women who are uninsured and lower income, tobacco usage and lack of prenatal care as well as pre-existing medical conditions Houston County has a low birth weight percentage of 8 8% The US average is 8 2% and the Healthy People 2020 goal is 7 8%

Healthy Newborns Strategy The strategy is to target women with a higher risk pregnancy due to socio-economic risk or a medical risk Activities will include (1) partnering with other organizations providing pregnancy related services through the Perinatal Coalition (2) Providing a Hispanic interpreter/care manager for uninsured and non-English speaking pregnant women and working with the local health department as well as local physicians to ensure all women have access to prenatal care (3) providing a Nurse care manager for pregnant women with a medical condition (4) providing a Nurse Educator to meet with pregnant teens in the high schools
