

Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program

Deadline: February 10, 2017

The Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program supports the research and teaching careers of talented young faculty in the chemical sciences. Based on institutional nominations, the program provides discretionary funding to faculty at an early stage in their careers. Criteria for selection include an independent body of scholarship attained in the early years of their appointment (see below), and a demonstrated commitment to education, signaling the promise of continuing outstanding contributions to both research and teaching. The Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program provides an unrestricted research grant of \$75,000.

Eligibility

The Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program is open to academic institutions in the States, Districts, and Territories of the United States of America that grant a bachelor's or higher degree in the chemical sciences, including biochemistry, materials chemistry, and chemical engineering. Nominees must hold a full-time tenure-track academic appointment, and are normally expected to have been appointed no earlier than mid-year 2011. Awardees are from Ph D. granting departments in which scholarly research is a principal activity. Undergraduate education is an important component. Institutions may submit only one Camille Dreyfus nomination annually. Renominations are accepted.

Selection

The Foundation seeks Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholars who demonstrate leadership in research and education. Nominations must provide compelling evidence of the advance of important knowledge in the chemical sciences by the nominee. Further, the nomination should describe dedication and contributions to education in the chemical sciences, particularly with respect to undergraduates.

The nominee's scholarly research achievements are assessed by a panel of distinguished faculty in the chemical sciences. The letters of recommendation should address the nominee's research accomplishments as an independent faculty member. Other considered factors are: awards and honors, publication of research achievements in leading journals, and success in attracting research funding.

Budget

The Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Award provides a \$75,000 unrestricted research grant. Of the total amount, \$7,500 is for departmental expenses associated with research and education. Charges associated with indirect costs or institutional overhead are not allowed. Defrayal of academic-year salary is not permitted. Funds are normally expended over a period of five years. Foundation approval is not required for budgetary changes after an award is made. If the awardee leaves the institution, the transfer of the remaining funds requires prior Foundation approval.

- 6. A budget (limited to one page) describing how award funds are anticipated to be used

Letters of support Three letters of support should be sent directly to the Foundation from individuals who know and address the nominee's accomplishments as an independent faculty member. No more than one of these letters may be from the candidate's nominating institution. Outside letters are generally given a greater weight. 

The award is based on accomplishment in scholarly research with undergraduates, as well as a compelling commitment to teaching, and provides an unrestricted research grant of \$60,000

The Henry Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program is open to academic institutions in the States, Districts, and Territories of the United States of America that grant a bachelor's or master's degree in the chemical sciences, including biochemistry, materials chemistry, and chemical engineering. Awardees are typically in departments that do not grant a doctoral degree Nominees must hold a full-time tenure-track academic appointment, be after the fourth and not after the twelfth years of their independent academic careers, and be engaged in research and teaching primarily with undergraduates. Institutions may submit only one Henry Dreyfus nomination annually Renominations are accepted.

Selection

The Foundation seeks Henry Dreyfus Teacher-Scholars who, as independent faculty members, have demonstrated leadership in original scholarly research of outstanding quality, substantially with undergraduates, as well as excellence and dedication in undergraduate education

Recommendations for awards are based on evidence of outstanding educational efforts and the nominee's scholarly research achievements with undergraduates as an independent faculty member, as assessed by a panel of distinguished faculty in the chemical sciences. The three outside letters of support (see below for details) are of particular value to the reviewers. Other considered factors are awards and honors, publication of research achievements in leading journals, and success in attracting research funding

The Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation seeks to further the development of scientific leadership in the field of environmental chemistry with a postdoctoral fellowship program. The Postdoctoral Program in Environmental Chemistry provides a principal investigator with an award of \$120,000 over two years to appoint a Postdoctoral Fellow in environmental chemistry.

Eligibility

The Postdoctoral Program in Environmental Chemistry is open to all academic and other not-for-profit organizations in the States, Districts, and Territories of the United States of America. Applications are accepted from **principal investigators** who have well-established research efforts in environmental science or engineering. These research activities need not be located in traditional departments in the chemical sciences, and collaboration across departments and institutions is encouraged. The postdoctoral fellow is usually not already identified nor in the principal investigator's lab at the time of application. Note award recipients must wait two years from the conclusion of an award before being eligible to reapply

Research Areas of Interest

Applications most likely to be of interest should describe innovative fundamental research in the chemical sciences or engineering related to the environment. The importance of the research should be explained. Examples include but are not limited to the chemistry associated with the climate, the atmosphere, aquatic or manne settings, toxicology, soil or groundwater. Also of interest are chemistry-related energy research (renewable sources, sequestration, etc.), and new or green approaches to chemical synthesis and processing, both with a clearly stated relation to the environment.

Selection

Applications come from the principal investigator. Recommendations for awards are based on several factors assessment of the proposed research, the arrangements for the interdisciplinary educational broadening of the Fellow, and an assessment of the ability to both attract the best young Ph.D. candidates and subsequently place them in high level independent starting positions. Applications are reviewed by distinguished scientists in the environmental and chemical sciences.

Budget

The Postdoctoral Program in Environmental Chemistry provides a \$120,000 award, payable in two \$60,000 installments. Funds are normally expended over a period of two years after the appointment of the Fellow Charges associated with indirect costs or institution overhead are not allowed. Of the total annual award amount, the supend support of the Fellow is no less than \$48,000 (supends may be supplemented from institutional or other sources). Fringe benefits of the Fellow taken from this award may not exceed \$12,000 annually.

Application Procedure

All application materials must be received at the Foundation office by the deadline. Applications

recommended for approval are presented to the Foundation's Board of Directors in time for award announcements by early November

The first-year award of \$60,000 will be paid after the Foundation has been provided with the Fellow's CV and anticipated start date. The second-year award of \$60,000 will be paid upon request, after completion of the first year. The request should be accompanied or preceded by a financial report and a progress report from the project director that contains highlights of accomplishments under the award and the research plan for the coming year.

The Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation supports emeritus faculty who maintain active research programs with undergraduates in the chemical sciences. The Senior Scientist Mentor Program provides an award of \$20,000 over two years for undergraduate stipends and modest research support

Eligibility

The Senior Scientist Mentor Program is open to all academic institutions in the States, Districts, and Territories of the United States of America that grant a bachelor's degree or higher in the chemical sciences, including biochemistry, materials chemistry, and chemical engineering. Faculty with emeritus status on or before July 2016, and who maintain active research programs in the chemical sciences, may apply to the program More than one application per department or institution is permitted

Selection

Successful applicants are expected to be closely engaged in a mentoring relationship with undergraduate students. The evaluation will be based on both an assessment of the research proposed and the plans for undergraduate participation in the research. 

The Jean Dreyfus Boissevain Lectureship awards provide an \$18,500 grant to bring a leading researcher to a primarily undergraduate institution to give at least two lectures in the chemical sciences. One of the lectures should be accessible to a wide audience. The remaining lecture(s) may be more technical. The lecturer is expected to spend more than one day at the institution to substantively interact with undergraduate students and a broad range of faculty over the period of the visit

A portion of the award is to support two undergraduates in summer research. The undergraduates engaged in summer research are expected to work with mentors in contemporary chemistry.

Eligibility

Applications are accepted from departments in the chemical sciences at primarily undergraduate institutions in the States, Districts, and Territories of the United States of America. Eligible departments grant a BS or MS degree in chemistry, but not a Ph D. Institutions are restricted to only one application annually for this program Institutions that receive an award are not eligible to re-apply for five years. Applications not funded in the year of submission will remain in contention for two additional years, though updated applications may be submitted during this period


The application is evaluated based upon the following:

- 1 One or two examples of the proposed invited lecturer and a schedule for the visit, which is expected to be a minimum of two days. The potential lecturer(s) may be contacted in advance of the proposal submission to gauge interest and to allow for planning a better integration of the visit with departmental initiatives
- 2 A description of the department's efforts in scholarly research and education in the contemporary chemical sciences. Cited examples of the latter should include, but are not limited to
 - descriptions of the faculty research programs
 - external research support
 - undergraduate participation in research
- 3 In addition, the following may also be included
 - the historical number of chemistry majors, and the number of those that go on to graduate school in the chemical sciences
 - special educational or outreach efforts

Nominations are reviewed by distinguished faculty in the chemical sciences

Budget

The award total is \$18,500 Of this amount, \$2,500 is an honorarium for the lecturer, and \$5,000 is to be



allocated to the support of the lectures (for example travel, accommodation, receptions and/or dinners, etc.) The remaining \$11,000 is to support the summer research of two undergraduate students. Each stipend is to be no less than \$4,500. The balance may be used to defray costs associated with the research and/or the scientific advancement of each student—e.g., travel to scientific meetings. Charges associated with indirect costs or institutional overhead are not allowed.

- 8 A description of the process to select the undergraduate research students
- 9 A simple budget describing how award funds are anticipated to be used

Jean Dreyfus Boissevain

Jean Dreyfus Boissevain was President of the Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation from 1956 until her death in 1991. Born in Chicago, in 1931 she married Camille Dreyfus, founder and chairman of the Celanese Corporation of America and of the Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation. Her second husband, Ernest W. Boissevain, died in 1984.

An operatic soprano and patron of the arts, as Jean Tennyson she sang with several leading European and American opera companies, including La Scala in Milan, the Chicago Civic Opera, and the San Francisco Opera Company. She also sang on the CBS Radio program "Great Moments in Music" from 1942 to 1946

After World War II, Mrs Boissevain founded the Artists Veterans Hospital Programs of the Musicians Emergency Fund, which presented concerts for patients in veterans hospitals. She also served as a patron of the Philharmonic Society of New York and as vice chair of New York City's Lewisohn Stadium Concerts. She was a trustee of the New York City Opera and a principal supporter of the Spoleto Festival

Mrs Boissevain received several awards, including the Stella della Solidaneta from the Italian government, the St Olaf Medal from the King of Norway, and an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from the University of Vermont
