The key identified needs listed in the facility's CHNA were grouped into four major categories to take advantage of Providence's regional assets in Oregon. Access to Preventive and Primary Care, Mental Health and Substance Use, Chronic Conditions, and Oral Health. These categories include basic needs, such as food security, stable housing, and transportation. 

Providence is one of the larger health systems in the country, and as such, the Board benchmarks executive compensation against other large, not-for-profit health systems whose revenue is similar to that of Providence Base salaries for Providence executives are set at the median level of the market, as identified by the independent consultant and reviewed with the Human Resources Committee. Each year, the Board Chair conducts a formal performance evaluation of the President/CEO that considers input from the other dire
