CHI St. Joseph Health (CHI SJHS) has been actively working to assess these unique needs and create plans that respond to them. The CHI St. Joseph Health community benefit program encompasses services provided, with little or no compensation, in response to identified community need, including community health education activities, community screenings, cash and in-kind contributions to community organizations, efforts to improve access to health care, charity care to residents and the shortfall of federal and state health reimbursements for patients served. Established in 1936, CHI St. Joseph Health is a faith-based, not-for-profit health system committed to excellence and compassion in caring for the mind, body and spirit while also creating healthier communities. CHI St. Joseph Health is comprised of five hospital facilities across the Brazos Valley, including CHI St. Joseph Health Regional Hospital, the region's highest level trauma center. CHI St. Joseph Health is a part of Catholic Health Initiatives (CHI), one of the nation's largest Catholic health systems. As an active member of the communities it serves, CHI St. Joseph Health is a leader in health improvement and access and is proud to present the 2016 annual report of community benefit initiatives. Overview of the Community Served by CHI St. Joseph Health Located in Bryan, Texas, the CHI St. Joseph Health hospital service area includes a large rural area, as well as many smaller rural communities. The hospital service area includes 9 counties, with the majority of the service area found within Brazos County. CHI St. Joseph Health serves an area that is home to a population of over 350,000 residents that represent diverse ethnicities, backgrounds, and needs. Key descriptors of the community served by CHI St. Joseph Health include: * Age: The largest population in the CHI St. Joseph Health service area falls in the age category of 20-24 years (15.4%). The second-largest age category is 25-34 years (13.4%). There is the smallest number of persons in the CHI St. Joseph Health service area within the youngest (5-9) years (5.9%) and oldest (85+ years (1.5%)) age categories. * Race/Ethnicity: The majority of CHI St. Joseph Health's community residents identify as White, Not-Hispanic (60.7%) and Hispanic (22%). 12.2% of the population identifies as Black/African American, Not Hispanic and 5.1% as All Other Races, Not Hispanic. * Education: Most residents in the CHI St. Joseph Health community have more than or equal to a high school education and/or GED. CHI St. Joseph Health assesses the health needs of the community using internal and external information. The primary assessment tool is the Regional Health Partnership 17 Health Assessment, which includes an assessment of the Brazos Valley. This assessment is conducted every three years. Using information from the 2013 health needs assessment, CHI St. Joseph Health provided programs in 2016 to improve the health of residents, such as community-based health screenings, education, awareness and prevention programs, as well as programs designed to improve access to primary care providers. CHI St. Joseph Health also delivers uncompensated health services to residents qualifying for charitable care or those covered through state and federal programs, such as Medicare and Medicaid, where the reimbursement for services provided are less than the costs of providing that service. CHI St. Joseph Health 2016 Community Benefit Community Benefit provided by CHI St. Joseph Health can be broken down into three primary areas: - health care services delivered to patients meeting qualifications of the health system's charity care policy or government-sponsored indigent health care programs, - subsidized health care services and - programs aimed at improving community health overall. Health Care Needs of the Brazos Valley Community health initiatives completed by CHI St. Joseph Health in FY16 were based upon results of the 2013 Regional Health Partnership 17 Health Assessment, as well as state and national data. Those sources identified the leading causes of death in the Brazos Valley as coronary heart disease, cancer, stroke, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and diabetes. The most frequently reported chronic diseases and conditions included obesity, hypertension, high cholesterol, arthritis, rheumatism, diabetes, congestive heart failure, emphysema and COPD. As a part of the RHP 17 Assessment, the Brazos Valley region included Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson and Washington counties. The assessment identified obesity as a common health issue across the Brazos Valley, consistent with data collected in three previous surveys. In 2013 the assessment noted that obesity rates appeared to be

Schedule H, Part VI LINES 2, 4, & 5	Access to Primary Care CHI St Joseph Health is comprised of five hospital facilities, six rural clinics, three Express Care clinics, two skilled nursing facilities, one freestanding emergency room and a freestanding rehabilitation hospital, in partnership with HealthSouth. Rural clinics are located in Bellville, Navasota, Lexington, Hearne, Normangee and Brenham and, through a partnership with HealthPoint, in Franklin, Hearne, Somerville, Caldwell and Madisonville. Acute care facilities include CHI St Joseph Health Regional Hospital (Bryan), CHI St Joseph Health Bellville Hospital (Bellville), CHI St Joseph Health Burleson Hospital (Caldwell), CHI St Joseph Health Grimes Hospital (Navasota) and CHI St Joseph Health Madison Hospital (Madisonville). CHI St Joseph Health Express Care, the urgent medical care clinic, has locations in Bryan, College Station and Brenham. These clinics provide services related to minor injuries, routine check-ups, physicals and drug screenings, as well as laboratory and imaging services. CHI St Joseph Health works to accomplish its Mission to increase access to care and promote wellness throughout the Brazos Valley for rural residents through collaboration and coordination of services that address identified service needs of residents. In the rural areas, the top five community service needs identified included - care of a medical specialist, - financial assistance, - work-related or employment services, - early childhood programs, - utility assistance. To help address rural access to medical specialists and the high incidence of uninsured residents, CHI St Joseph Health secured a \$19,000 grant to support efforts to educate residents about health insurance options and enroll them in coverage. In 2015, the Brazos Valley region had one of the state's lowest participation rates in health insurance exchange programs created by the Affordable Care Act (ACA). CHI St Joseph Healthy Communities, a team that works to reduce the serious problem of chronic diseases in communities served by CHI St Joseph Health, received the grant through a partnership with CHI and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Efforts with Enroll Brazos Valley Coalition, a group of Brazos Valley health providers working collaboratively to educate residents on health insurance under the ACA, enabled the health system to help more than 2,700 local residents find and enroll in medical coverage. Also, to improve rural access to care and to remove some of the social barriers patients often face, CHI St Joseph Health gives ongoing support to four Health Resource Centers operated by the Brazos Valley Health Partnership (BVHP). The BVHP works to improve health status and access to care through the collaboration of services and creation of local partnerships. Health professionals in these centers, in Caldwell and Somerville (Burleson County), Navasota (Grimes County), Centerville (Leon County) and Madisonville (Madison County) provide case management, referrals, telehealth counseling and specialty care. CHI St Joseph Health Madison Hospital provided facilities and utilities to support the Madison Health Resource Center, offering 2,200 square feet of office space, utilities and internet access valued at \$27,480 during FY16. Madison Hospital continues to employ the case manager and office manager, receiving funding for 90% of these costs from Madison County and the city of Madisonville. In Grimes County, CHI St Joseph Health Grimes Hospital provides four office spaces for the Grimes Health Resource Center, including utilities and internet access. The Health Resource Center director is a Grimes Hospital employee. The Burleson Health Resource Center is housed in a facility provided by the Burleson County Hospital District. CHI St Joseph Health Burleson Hospital employs and fully funds the Health Resource Center staff. The coordinator position at the Somerville Health Resource Center is funded by the Burleson County Hospital District through Burleson Hospital and the city of Somerville. All Health Resource Centers provide residents transportation to and from medical appointments and support other community needs. In 2016, CHI St Joseph Health took steps to expand the network of Health Resource Centers by applying for and later receiving a \$432,351 grant from the Episcopal Health Foundation to open a Health Resource Center in Bryan. The grant funds will cover staffing the Health Resource Center with four employees, a director, office manager and two community health advocates. The grant also funds Telehealth connectivity, capital purchases and start-up costs. The center will handle referrals, find resources to pay for assistance for unfunded patients discharged from the hospital when they have no means for obtaining medication, durable medical equipment or transportation to safely discharge home. In addition, the Health Resource Center will do home visits and management for people with complex social issues, address

Schedule H, Part VI LINES 2, 4, & 5	Heart Disease and Stroke CHI St Joseph Health promotes heart health and stroke awareness each year in the Brazos Valley by offering discounted blood screenings to Gold Medallion Club members, free blood pressure checks to the general community and evidence-based education. From July 2015 to June 2016, more than 1,000 community members received free blood pressure screenings at CHI St Joseph Health facilities and health education fairs across the Brazos Valley. Additionally, close to 500 people received free or highly discounted blood glucose and/or cholesterol screenings and nearly 5,000 received education on heart healthy habits, stroke and chest pain awareness. Dietitians offered monthly education for cardiac rehabilitation patients, including nutritional counseling and support as a part of their follow-up care. CHI St Joseph Health Regional Hospital continues to maintain its status as the region's only Primary Stroke Center with Intervention Capabilities. The Chest Pain Center's protocol-driven and systematic approach to patient management allows physicians to reduce time to treatment during the critical early stages of a heart attack, when treatments are most effective, and to better monitor patients when it is not clear whether they are having a coronary event. Such observation helps ensure that patients are not sent home too early nor needlessly admitted. As the region's first Joint Commission Certified Primary Stroke Center, Regional Hospital was also awarded the American Stroke Association's (ASA) Get With The Guidelines Stroke Silver-Plus Target Stroke Elite Plus Honor Roll Award. This level of recognition designates and recognizes CHI St Joseph Health's commitment and success in implementing excellent care for stroke patients according to evidence-based guidelines. The Plus designation, a new award level in 2016, looked at best practices for treatment. Regional Hospital is required to organize a multidisciplinary stroke team to coordinate care among first responders, emergency room staff, physicians, diagnostic staff, rehabilitation staff and other health providers who care for stroke patients. The team implemented best practice protocols shown to provide the best outcomes when diagnosing and treating stroke patients. All three critical access hospitals have achieved Support Level (Level III) Stroke Facility designation by the Texas Department of State Health Services. CHI St Joseph Health Bellville Hospital also received this designation, making CHI St Joseph Health the only system in Texas that provides stroke care in all of its inpatient facilities. Each site has a stroke coordinator, who oversees the stroke program and ensures that Joint Commission- and state-defined timeframes for lab work, imaging, medications and other care components are met. In addition to a medical director and coordinator, each of these programs requires a multi-departmental effort for success, including the lab, pharmacy, director of nursing, floor and ER nurses and a representative from EMS to ensure a seamless transition from ambulance to ER team. Education programs are also a continuing part of stroke prevention education for all community residents in the seven-county area. In 2016 Regional Hospital also received the American College of Cardiology's National Cardiovascular Data Registry ACTION Registry Get With The Guidelines Gold Performance Achievement Award. As one of only 36 hospitals nationwide to receive the honor, Regional demonstrates its commitment and success in implementing a higher standard of care for heart attack patients. It also signifies that CHI St Joseph Health offers patients the most appropriate treatment according to nationally-recognized clinical guidelines and recommendations established by the latest scientific evidence. In addition to this award, CHI St Joseph Health is also recognized as an Accredited Chest Pain Center V5 with Primary PCI and Resuscitation, meaning the hospital offers a comprehensive program for the rapid diagnosis and treatment of heart attacks and cardiac conditions for patients who come into either Regional Hospital or South College Station Emergency departments. This was a new, higher accreditation for CHI St Joseph Health for 2016. Trauma and Emergency Care In 2016, the trauma program at CHI St Joseph Health Regional Hospital was re-verified as a Level II Trauma Center by the American College of Surgeons (ACS) and a designated Level II Trauma Center by the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS). This verification and designation makes CHI St Joseph Health Regional Hospital the highest level trauma center in the region between Houston, Temple, Austin and San Antonio. This achievement recognizes CHI St Joseph Health's dedication to providing optimal care for patients suffering from all types of injuries, including those that are life-threatening. Designation as a Trauma Center requires a commitment to organized, multidisciplinary care of the trauma patient.

Having this level of trauma care available in the region enables patient access to high-quality trauma care for the best possible outcome. In the last five years, CHI St. Joseph Health has cared for more than 16,500 trauma patients systemwide. Forty-five percent of the system's trauma cases were caused by a fall and approximately 30% were caused by car crashes. As a leader in trauma care in the region, Regional Hospital and CHI St. Joseph Health outlying facilities participate in the area Regional Advisory Council. This includes injury prevention programs that run throughout the year to help reduce the number of traumatic injuries. From July 2015 to June 2016, CHI St. Joseph Health provided trauma prevention education and awareness to nearly 3,600 residents in the region through the RED (Reality Education for Drivers) program, Shattered Dreams, community CPR/AED and First Aid education, EMS student training and community outreach, the Safe Sitter Program, newborn care and fall prevention education. In May 2016, CHI St. Joseph Health opened a new 24,000-square-foot, 33-bed Emergency and Trauma Center located at Regional Hospital, more than doubling the size of its previous Emergency Department. The number of trauma patients CHI St. Joseph Health cares for has continued to increase since its Level II Trauma Center designation. In addition, according to U.S. Centers for Disease Control data, the CHI St. Joseph Health Emergency Department has cared for patients who are more acutely ill than national averages. The new, larger facility has improved patient flow, reduced wait times and improved the privacy and comfort level of patients. Regional Hospital receives ambulance transport service from more than 15 counties across the Brazos Valley and is the primary 911 Service Provider for Burleson, Grimes, Leon and Madison counties. The trauma program operates both a ground and air ambulance service. Through CHI St. Joseph Health Air Medical, housed at Regional Hospital, crew members gain hospital experience in emergency and trauma care while rounding with emergency department physicians and trauma surgeons. CHI St. Joseph Health EMS Services also provided more than 1,700 hours of EMS standby time at a cost of over \$37,000, for support or educational demonstrations across the Brazos Valley. Obesity Awareness and Prevention: CHI St. Joseph Health collaborated with the Texas A&M School of Public Health to offer programs to address obesity and its health impact, given it is the most significant health problem in every county that CHI St. Joseph Health serves. 'Fit & Strong!' is a physical activity and behavioral change, evidence-based program that is structured around two key components - physical activity and health education/group problem-solving. This program was offered at several CHI St. Joseph Health facilities in Brazos and Grimes Counties. Community education was also provided for people who are overweight or obese, covering nutrition, exercise, emotional wellness and other topics related to weight loss. Weight and BMI screenings were also offered at no charge. Meeting space was provided for a weekly support group that discussed lifestyle changes and shared tips for weight loss. From July 2015 to June 2016, CHI St. Joseph Health provided obesity awareness and prevention education to over 1,700 area residents.

The Living Well with Diabetes Program focuses on Type 2 diabetes and prediabetes and is taught by a Certified Diabetes Educator and Registered Dietitian. The program includes two, 3-hour core sessions (offered bi-monthly) that focus on proper nutrition using carbohydrate counting, exercise, blood glucose monitoring, foot care and other topics. Additional one-hour informational seminars are offered monthly and cover topics like Setting Yourself Up for Success, It All Starts in the Kitchen!, Staying in Control of Your Diabetes While You Travel, Foot Care, How to Have a Healthy Heart with Diabetes and more. A monthly grocery store tour led by a Registered Dietician, is included in the program and has been expanded to multiple locations in an effort to better serve community demographics. Participants receive a one-month membership in the CHI St Joseph Health Wellness Program. Local healthcare providers refer newly diagnosed patients to the bi-monthly diabetes education program. CHI St Joseph Health dietitians also provide program information to diabetes patients in all its facilities. In addition to the Living Well with Diabetes Program, education efforts have continued with participation in area health fairs by providing diabetes education and glucose screenings, reaching nearly 800 residents from July 2015 to June 2016. CHI St Joseph Health also collaborated with the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service to offer the "Do Well, Be Well with Diabetes" course to residents in rural communities. Support Groups Having a support system is essential to the community's health and well-being. CHI St Joseph Health publications and website highlight a listing of 16 area support groups offered at CHI St Joseph Health facilities and throughout the community, many of which meet in CHI SJH facilities or are facilitated by CHI SJH team members. Senior Life Services As the population ages, care for older adults has become increasingly important. CHI St Joseph Health, through its affiliates, offers this group many opportunities for care and growth, including assisted living, intermediate and skilled nursing care at CHI St Joseph Health Skilled Nursing & Rehabilitation in Bryan and Caldwell and senior education and outreach events throughout the Brazos Valley. Lifelong fitness is also encouraged through the CHI St Joseph Health Wellness Program, which offers cardiac rehabilitation, water aerobics, group fitness and physical strength training. The CHI St Joseph Health Gold Medallion Club provides health education classes and seminars, social outings, local discounts and hospital benefits in all facilities for over 4,000 members ages 50 and up. From July 2015 to June 2016, more than 1,700 senior citizens attended seminars, various social events and health fairs and 518 members traveled on day trips, domestic and international trips. With a service area spanning 10 counties, CHI St Joseph Health Helpline, an in-home personal emergency response service operated by Philips Lifeline, offered safety, security and independence to 400 seniors to support them in safely living at home. More than 40 Helpline subscribers received a discounted rate based on their income. CHI St Joseph Health also partners with PremierCare, Inc. to offer Senior Renewal programs in several of the counties it serves. The Senior Renewal program, located in the critical access facilities in Caldwell, Navasota and Madisonville, is an outpatient counseling service that helps to renew quality of life for senior adults. CHI St Joseph Health broke ground on the MatureWell Lifestyle Center in March 2016. Developed in partnership with Texas A&M Health Science Center College of Medicine, the center will provide access to health resources for mature adults and bring seniors' wellness needs together under one roof. Located in Bryan, the 23,000-square-foot, two-story facility will offer services and programs designed to meet the needs of a growing senior population. Services include a dedicated Personal Liaison (one point of contact to help patients find their way around, answer questions and schedule appointments and classes), clinical services (medication management, a clinical social worker, nutrition counseling, outpatient therapy services) and wellness resources (fitness coaching, educational seminars and cooking classes, disease and lifestyle management programs, social engagement opportunities and support groups). Special Events More than 600 community members joined CHI St Joseph Health to celebrate the opening of the new Emergency and Trauma Center at CHI St Joseph Health Regional Hospital. The event involved an injury prevention health fair with activities including Hands-Only CPR/how to recognize the signs of heart attack and stroke, head injury prevention with bicycle helmet fit testing and free helmet giveaways, fall prevention

In Brazos County, CHI St. Joseph Health supports special health and wellness events in the community, such as the annual Texas Brain and Spine Institute Neurosciences Symposium, the American Heart Association's Go Red for Women luncheon, Food for Families Food Drive, Junior League Kids in the Kitchen and the Gran Fondo Cycling Event. In 2016 the Gran Fondo cycling event had 250 rider participants who raised money for cancer services and developed awareness of the importance of cancer screenings. Community health fairs provide an avenue for increasing access to care and promoting wellness for residents across the seven-county region. Annual health fairs in Caldwell, Navasota and Madisonville provide rural residents the opportunity to participate in free health screenings related to health assessment findings, such as obesity, cancer, diabetes, heart disease and pulmonary issues. More than 1,000 free flu shots were administered across the Brazos Valley. CHI St. Joseph Health Madison Hospital funded the Shiitake 5K Health Run during the county's annual Mushroom Festival, supported local Relay for Life activities and participated in the Health First Health Fest annual community-wide health fair. In Burleson County, community benefit initiatives included participation in the annual Kolache Festival held in Caldwell. CHI St. Joseph Health Burleson Hospital provided a minor first aid and water station for the event. EMS services for major emergencies were also provided during this two-day event and for Chilifest, an annual fundraiser in the town of Snook. CHI St. Joseph Health Grimes Hospital also actively participated in many community benefit initiatives, including Special Olympics, Senior Day, Red Cross Health & Safety Day and various health and wellness fairs and screenings for local school district employees and businesses. In Austin County, Bellville Hospital supported the annual "Safety Day" for school-aged children in Austin County and numerous community fundraising efforts. They also supported the Friend-to-Friend voucher program, offering free women's health screenings and mammograms, general wellness education and cancer prevention education to underserved women in Austin County.

Topics presented included weight loss and dieting, fall prevention, injury prevention, violence prevention, financial stability training, chronic disease self-management, arthritis and cancer awareness. Other topics included sleep disorders, diabetes management, healthy eating, heart health, stroke prevention, CPR and First Aid, parenting, family health counseling, anger management and more. Education was provided on areas of need identified by the health status assessment, as well as prevention and rehabilitation for a variety of other health issues. A certified Child Passenger Safety Technician with CHI St. Joseph Health Communities offers free education to parents and guardians on how to properly install car and booster seats. The proper use of child safety seats reduces the risk of injury and death, leading to reduced medical costs, avoidance of loss of future earnings and improved quality of life. CHI St. Joseph Health continues to partner with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and the Brazos Valley Injury Prevention Coalition to offer Reality Education for Drivers (RED). The free program is a one-day, hospital-based injury prevention tool targeted to young drivers. Using the path of injury as a backdrop, RED provides young persons who have exhibited risky behavior involving alcohol, drugs and motor vehicles with fact-based information they can use to make better decisions. The goal is to reduce the number of motor vehicle crashes involving young drivers by encouraging them to drive sober, silent and secure, within the speed limit. This program is designed for ages 15-21, uses pre- and post-tests to gauge learning and is facilitated by clinical staff at CHI St. Joseph Health Regional Hospital. From July 2015 to June 2016, four classes were held at CHI St. Joseph Health Regional Hospital, and one class was held at CHI St. Joseph Health Burleson Hospital, reaching 171 participants. Because of the success of this program, more classes have been scheduled at CHI St. Joseph Health facilities than ever before, and the classroom portion of the program had to be moved to a larger space! CHI St. Joseph Health is also an organizational partner in the Brazos Interfaith Immigration Network (BIIN). This collaboration works to serve and support the immigrant community in Brazos County by increasing access to legal, educational and social services. BIIN provides information and referral services for immigrants, regardless of legal status, information for the larger community about immigrants and their needs, and immigration information and services provided by volunteers, in cooperation with private attorneys and attorneys and staff from Catholic Charities Legal Immigration Services. Health Professions Education Educational opportunities for certain health professions are provided through several of our facilities and physician partnerships. CHI St. Joseph Health collaborates with the physician program at the Texas A&M College of Medicine, Texas A&M Family Medicine Residency, Physician Assistant program at the University of Texas Medical Branch, Nurse Practitioner Program at University of Texas at Tyler, Emergency Medical Residency at Darnall Army Medical Center and University of Toledo. From July 2015 to June 2016, 56 first, second and third year residents, physician assistants, nurse practitioners and emergency medical residents were trained in facilities throughout the system. Clinical rotation opportunities are also provided for area students in health professions such as nursing, EMT (basic and paramedic), radiology, pharmacy and physical therapy. School partnerships include the Blinn College RN and LVN program, radiology technician program, physical therapy assistant program and emergency medical services (EMS), Lone Star College Ultrasound Program, Oregon Institute of Technology Nuclear Medicine Program, Rangel College of Pharmacy through the Texas A&M Health Science Center, Texas A&M Health Science Center College of Nursing, Texas A&M Health Science Center - Corpus Christi College of Nursing and the Texas Engineering Experiment Station (TEEX) Emergency Medical Services through the Texas A&M University System, physical therapy and physical therapy assistant programs from University of St. Augustine, University of Texas - El Paso, Texas Woman's University - Dallas, University of Incarnate Word and Wharton County Junior College. From July 2015 through June 2016, over 1,000 students were trained in our facilities, working more than 46,000 hours in various departments. In comparing HUD guidelines to the Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPG), we find that on average HUD guidelines compute to approximately 200% to 250% (and sometimes 300%) of FPG. St Joseph Regional Health Center bases its financial assistance eligibility on HUD's 130% of Very Low Income Guidelines based on geography, and affords the uninsured and underinsured the ability to obtain financial assistance write-offs, based on a sliding scale, ranging from 25%-100% of charges. An individual's income under the HUD guidelines is a significant factor in determining eligibility for financial assistance. However, in determining whether to extend discounted or free care to a patient, the patient's assets may also be taken into consideration. For example, a patient suffering a catastrophic illness may have a reasonable level of income, but a low level of liquid assets such that the payment of medical bills would be seriously detrimental to the patient's basic financial (and ultimately physical) well-being and survival. Such a patient may be extended discounted or free care based upon the facts and circumstances.

With respect to those audiences for which the C-CIRC has review responsibility, the C-CIRC will facilitate development of any such conflict of interest management plan in collaboration with local CRP staff. A designated CHI Entity staff will be responsible for monitoring the COI management plan and for documenting monitoring activities. At its sole discretion, a CHI Entity may reject a Person's request to enter into the relationship in question, or require the relationship be sufficiently altered to avoid a potential COI. If the C-CIRC determines that there is a potential or actual conflict of interest that does not currently have appropriate controls to address the conflict of interest, it may recommend that the disclosing person be allowed to participate in the activity or transaction subject to restrictions as outlined in the COI management plan. If a Person does not agree with a determination made by the C-CIRC, its interpretation of the Policy or Addenda, or seeks an exemption or exception, the following steps should be followed. The Employee disputing the review decision, interpretation of the Policy, or seeking exemption or exception must present the matter to the Employee's immediate direct manager or supervisor for review and determination. If the Employee and the manager do not agree with the review decision, interpretation of the Policy, or seek exemption or exception, the manager shall consult with the manager's Vice President (or higher if the manager is a Vice President) to reach a determination. If the matter remains unresolved, it shall be referred to the CHI Vice President of Human Resources and the CHI Corporate Responsibility Officer. Based on review and evaluation of the relevant facts and circumstances, the Board Chair will make an initial determination as to whether a conflict of interest exists and whether, pursuant to the COI Policy, review and approval or other action by the Board is required. A written record of the Board Chair's determination, including relevant facts and circumstances, will be made. The Board Chair shall then make an appropriate report to the Executive Committee of the Board concerning such review, evaluation and determination. If a difference of opinion exists between the Board Chair and another Trustee as to whether the facts and circumstances of a given situation constitute a conflict of interest or whether Board review and approval or other action is required within the COI Policy, the matter shall be submitted to the Board's Executive Committee, which shall make a final determination as to the matter presented. Such determination, including relevant facts and circumstances, will be reflected in the Executive Committee minutes and will be reported to the Board. When any conflict of interest is considered by the board, the trustee or corporate officer, as appropriate, must disclose all of the material facts to the Board.
