For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, RIH analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), RIH records a significant allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates, if applicable) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts receivable at September 30, 2016 RIH's self-pay writeoffs for the years ended September 30, 2016 and 2015 amounted to approximately \$38,316,000 and \$45,184,000, respectively RIH did not change its charity care or uninsured discount policies during the years ended September 30, 2016 and 2015, respectively

After all collection attempts are exhausted, any remaining balances, including any co-payments and deductibles, are written off as bad debts. RIH classifies its bad debts as uncompensated care. At 120 days, if there is no payment activity or no hold placed on the account, the account is transferred to the appropriate collection agency.
