Legacy follows the guidance in the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) in determining the net asset classification of all donor-restricted endowment funds. In accordance with UPMIFA and board policy, assets classified as permanent endowments in accordance with donor intent are only utilized for current period expenditures to the extent that earnings on the endowment exceed the original fair value of the donation. To the extent earnings on endowment funds exceed identified expenditures on which to apply those earnings, the earnings are classified as temporarily restricted net assets.

Legacy has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment and to maintain the value of the endowment assets. Asset allocation is reviewed quarterly with respect to: i) Legacy's tolerance for risk based on its financial condition and need for cash from investments to support operations; ii) expected asset class return, risk and correlation characteristics; iii) changes in accounting guidance or tax law and iv) changes in bond covenants or other restrictions.

Legacy's spending practices are intended to comply with donor's wishes and meet all applicable laws and regulations. Spending must be for a purpose that is consistent with the documented intent of the donor, and may not exceed the amounts annually determined by Legacy. Factors that are considered in addressing the annual spending allocation are: i) market value of the fund relative to the principal of the gift and ii) the level of spending in prior years.

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires Legacy to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. Deficiencies of this nature are reported as a reduction to unrestricted net assets and are excluded from the performance indicator.

Community health improvement will be accomplished through strong partnerships with community agencies, such as Marion County Health Department, Boys and Girls Club of Marion and Polk County, Salvation Army, United Way, Community Action Agency, Early Learning Hub, surrounding school districts, and the faith-based community. Legacy Silverton Medical Center will look to champion and support efforts that align with the identified health priorities of this CHNA.

In the summer of 2014, Marion and Polk County Health departments began to discuss a vision for a joint community health assessment and improvement plan. Both counties enjoy working with similar partners including Legacy Silverton Medical Center, Salem Health, Kaiser Permanente, Willamette Valley Community Health, OSU Extension, Early Learning Hub, Inc., and United Way. Driven by shared data needs, Marion and Polk counties began planning for a joint community health assessment in September 2014. The Steering Committee selected the national model, Mobilization for Action through Planning and Partnerships or MAPP as the framework for the community health assessment. The four assessments of the MAPP framework include: Community Themes and Strengths, Local Public Health System Assessment (conducted in 2013), Community Health Status Assessment and The Forces of Change Assessment.

The Community Themes and Strengths Assessment was conducted by surveying community partners working in social, health, community, educational and correctional health

settings and the community at large. The surveys used in both Marion and Polk counties consisted of the same questions and used the 2011 Marion County survey as a template. Paper and electronic surveys were allocated based on population distribution throughout our communities. The Community Health Status Assessment was conducted by compiling data from national surveillance systems like the Behavior Risk Factor Surveillance Survey and Oregon Healthy Teens as well as state and local data from birth and death certificates.

Community partners were invited to participate in the review of community-level data, including surveys of community residents and health, education and social service providers and county-level data including demographics, socio-economic and health indicators. The regional groups prioritized the top 10 health indicators, set goals, identified strategies and developed a plan for improving the health of the community.

Silverton Health (SH) uses many different approaches to inform and educate patients on the availability of financial assistance as is described later in Part VI of Schedule H. Still, many patients do not respond to requests for information or provide appropriate documentation to benefit from financial assistance. As a result, SH must report these amounts as bad debt.

Due to the short year and timing difference between book and tax, SH has a negative bad debt expense for the FY2017 return. However, SH had about \$1.5 million in bad debts according to book for a period of 10 months.

Part III, Line 4 - Bad Debt Expense

The organization utilizes a cost accounting system for determining the associated cost of providing services to patients without insurance that are subsequently written off as bad debts. That percentage is then applied to the total bad debt expense per the general ledger (based on charges) to determine the associated cost. Collections from the patient/guarantor are netted against that cost to determine a net cost. Any collections received on accounts that were written off to bad debt (either partially or in full) were netted against the cost of providing the services to the patient in order to determine a net cost.

The organization currently does not have the systems necessary to reasonably

The hospital reports patient accounts receivable for services rendered at net realizable amounts from third-party payors, patients and others. The hospital provides an allowance for doubtful accounts based upon a review of outstanding receivables, historical collection information and existing economic conditions. As a service to the patient, the hospital bills third-party payors directly and bills the patient when the patient's liability is determined. patient accounts receivable are due in full when billed. Accounts are considered delinquent and subsequently written off as bad debts based on individual credit evaluation and specific circumstances of the account.

The entire Medicare shortfall should be considered a community benefit. represent all of the organization's revenues and costs associated with its participation in Medicare programs. The methodology used in reporting in Part III Section B Medicare is inconsistent with the other sections in Schedule H, as the instructions limit Medicare revenues and allowable cost to those from only the Medicare Cost Report. Revenue and costs from Medicare Part C patients, Part B physician services billed by the organization, and clinical laboratory services weren't included. In addition, hospitals incur other costs to provide care that Medicare does not allow in the cost report, such as Physician Call pay to ensure adequate physician coverage for the ED.

The total revenues and costs attributable to all Medicare services are \$7,794,500 and \$10,775,000 respectively. This results in a total Medicare shortfall of \$2,980,500.

Costing Methodology (Part III, Line 8).

Medicare allowable costs were calculated using the costing methodologies in the Medicare Cost Report. The cost report arrives at total allowable hospital cost through a cost finding process that includes direct cost allocations and a step-down allocation of indirect or overhead costs. general inpatient routine and ICU unit costs derived from cost per diems, as well as inpatient ancillary service costs that utilize cost to charge ratios to arrive at cost. Apportionment of cost applicable to hospital outpatient services is through the application of cost to charge ratios. This excludes other costs incurred to provide services of the hospital to the community that the cost report deems as unallowable costs, such as Physician on-call pay.

Legacy provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients who meet certain criteria under its financial assistance policy. Since Legacy does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are excluded from net patient service revenues.

The described CHNA provides the primary source for assessing needs. Community Benefit and Community Relations staff as well as Legacy representatives on nonprofit and community based boards serving communities at risk also provide ongoing informal feedback regarding needs. These are then aligned to the community health needs identified in the formal CHNA.

SH also uses a product from Healthy Communities Institute which provides

high-quality community health assessment data, improved health indicator tracking, best practice sharing and community development tools that function together to help improve the health and environmental sustainability of the community. The product (which highlights by county and zip code) is used in conjunction with community health work groups which are assembled in three areas of our PSA: Salem, Silverton and Woodburn. We also work with local not-for-profit community organizations and local schools to identify additional smaller needs.

Direct requests (via email, call, letter) from state, local, and not-for-profit groups/organizations are also received for assistance in meeting other health and community building needs.

Part VI - Patient Education of Eligibility for Assistance

SH employs financial counselors and social workers that assist patients in obtaining coverage for their healthcare needs. This includes assistance with workers compensation, motor vehicle accident policies, COBRA, veterans' assistance, SH's financial assistance program, and public assistance programs, such as Medicaid.

The criteria for financial assistance under SH's program is determined based on eligibility for insurance coverage, household income, qualified assets, catastrophic medical events, or other information supporting a patient's inability to pay for

services provided. Specifically, the SH's Financial Assistance Program provides an uninsured discount of 35% to patients who have resided within SH's primary service area for a period of six months, are uninsured for hospital care, and have a household income of less than \$100,000 annually. Further discounts are available for patients, on a sliding scale, whose household income is less than 400% of the federal poverty level or roughly \$97,000 for a family of four in the Portland, Oregon metropolitan area. For patients whose household income is at or below 300% of the federal poverty level, a full subsidy is available. In addition to the household income criteria, the patients' qualified assets (e.g. 25% of household assets), and other catastrophic or economic circumstances are considered in determining eligibility.

In addition to financial counselors and social workers, SH makes every effort to communicate its Financial Assistance Program to all patients. This includes signage in main admitting areas of the hospital and brochures explaining financial assistance in all patient care areas, as well as in appropriate languages. Financial counselors are available to assist patients in understanding and applying for available resources, including the SH's Financial Assistance Program. SH's website also has information about the availability of financial assistance. SH offers financial assistance customer service Monday through Friday, as well as the

availability of voice mail so patients can leave confidential, detailed messages during non-business hours. Finally all of SH's billing statements include information regarding the availability of financial assistance. If SH requires the use of a collection agency, those agencies are required to provide a telephone number that patients can call to request financial assistance.

In 2010, Legacy Health established the Health Literacy initiative. Nearly all Legacy employees are touch points to patients and families and health literacy is involved in every touch point.

What is health literacy? The Institute of Medicine defines health literacy as the capacity to obtain, understand, and process basic health information and services needed to make appropriate health decisions. In short, health literacy is the ability to understand and act on health information.

Nearly half of the U.S. adult population has a low level of health literacy.

Patients with low health literacy are less likely to comply with treatment, less likely to seek preventive care and twice as likely to be hospitalized. Quality, safety and cost are all affected by a patient's inability to understand medical

instructions and to explain their symptoms/issues.

Legacy's employees are learning and practicing new way of communicating with patients using health literacy tools such as universal precautions, plain language and teach back methods.

Annual education is provided to all billing and admitting staff so they can be kept informed of and speak with knowledge about current financial assistance policies and options. SH provides copies of the latest policies in main admitting areas, as well as through newsletters and other publications.

Silverton Health (SH) serves Marion County which is located in the Willamette Valley and is the fifth most populous county in Oregon. The population of Marion County was estimated to be about 326,000. It also serves Clackamas county due to the inclusion of the city of Molalla under it's service area. LSMC defines its primary service area by the following zip codes: 97381, 97362, 97071, 97038, 97375, 97026, 97032, 97301, 97302, 97303, 97305, 97373 and 97317. This includes the cities of Silverton, Mt. Angel, Woodburn, Gervais, Hubbard, Scotts Mills, St. Benedict, Molalla, Keizer and parts of Salem. These cities make up the top 85% of the total business. The

community has a very diverse population in age and race/ethnicity. It is also primarily an agricultural community and sees a seasonal influx of migrant farmworkers. The youth population (under age 18) represents more than 26 percent of the population and age 55 and older represents almost 25 percent of the population. Both segments continue to grow. The Latino population also continues to grow and is the majority population in two of the communities (Woodburn and Gervais). Young Latinos represent the fastest growing segment of the primary service area population.

Marion county residents have a lower median household income than Oregon residents and U.S. residents in general. A larger percent of Marion County residents (especially residents under 18) live below the federal poverty level than Oregon residents and U.S. residents in general. Graduation rates are poor and fewer residents attend college. Marion County has a lower median household income (\$47,360) than both Oregon (\$50,521) and the United States.

Clackamas County's median household income (mhi) average 2008-2012 was \$63,951 with 9.7 percent of the families living below poverty. This compared to Washington County's mhi average at \$64,375 with 10.9 percent below poverty. Enormous disparities exist disaggregating by race and ethnicity.

Assessment Steering Committee, Silverton Health leaders have chosen to support and align community benefits with the four priority areas identified during the community needs assessment process. These priorities included Timeliness of Prenatal Care, Obesity Prevention, Depression Screening, and Tobacco Cessation.

Part VI - Explanation Of How Organization Furthers Its Exempt Purpose

The Legacy Health Board is comprised of community and business leaders as well as representatives of the medical staff. The Legacy Silverton medical staff is open, with physicians submitting credentialing information reviewed according to Legacy Silverton policies and standards.

Silverton Health/Legacy Health collaborates with other health care providers, community-based organizations, business and the public on projects to improve the health of the community. Non-cash donations of resources include clinical and non-clinical services and items, e.g., screenings and support services, internships, information and referral services and health fairs. Legacy's warehouse, located in NW Portland, is open to nonprofit organizations to obtain surplus equipment and furniture. In addition, conference room space is made available at no charge to local nonprofits for Board and community meetings.

Clinical staff is involved with local communities through many child safety programs. In 1986, nurses in the sister Legacy Emanuel Medical Center's Level I

Trauma Center developed the Trauma Nurses Talk Tough (TNTT) program. The American Hospital Association awarded the TNTT program its NOVA Award. In addition, Legacy staff members conduct free checks to show parents how to properly install car seats. Last year, Legacy staff fit and sold more than 8,000 bicycle helmets to children at a nominal or no fee based on need. Legacy staff members also provide new parents with training to reduce the incidences of shaken baby syndrome and a Safety Store sells child protection devices for the home at nominal charge.

Silverton Health is a subsidiary of Legacy Health (Legacy). Legacy is an integrated health system based in Portland, Oregon, and primarily operates six acute care hospitals and related services (e.g., physician practices, hospice, preferred provider network) in the four county metro area of Portland and SW Washington.

In 1998, the Legacy Health Board approved a \$10 million Community Health Fund from operating revenue to address major community health issues. About \$500,000 annually has been granted to community-based projects addressing racial and ethnic inequities and root causes. These dollars are in addition to the system's generous charitable contributions. The Community Health Fund has provided 50 grants since 1998 totaling over \$8 million; about 60 percent of these grants served communities of color.

In 2010, Legacy Health established the Health Literacy initiative. Communication

with patients such that patients both understand AND can act on the information required of and provided to them is critical to their health outcomes. Patients must use information to navigate the health system (complete insurance and government forms, sign consents, schedule appointments), manage diseases and acquire preventive screenings. Providers (defined as all staff interacting with or developing materials used by patients) are responsible for ensuring that patients can act on the information provided. Between 2012 and 2017, funded by the Community Health Fund, Legacy Health hosted an annual Oregon and SW Washington Health Literacy Conference—500 people from 80 organizations attending each. Legacy Health is the recognized leader in moving health literacy forward both in the health delivery system and broader community. Attendance at the 2017 conference surpassed 700. In 1999, recognizing that education, employment and income inequities exist for communities of diversity, and that health professions are lacking in diversity, Legacy established the Youth Employment in Summer (YES) program. In any given year, seven to 15 African American, Hispanic and Native American youth receive paid summer employment in departments where they work with health professionals; each student is paid \$13 an hour and may work up to 400 hours during the summer. YES students also receive college scholarships, between \$3,000 and \$6,000 annually. Students remain in the program as long as they remain in school and pursued health careers. Some

students remain in the program as long as seven graduating with imaging tech degrees, bachelor degrees in nursing, etc. The vast majority of the students are the first in their families to go to college. To date, there have been more than 125 YES students.

In addition to the Community Health Fund, Legacy provided cash donations to local health and human service, education, economic development and civic organizations. Donations focus on organizations with year-round relationships through programs and board representation-specifically focused organizations addressing disparities.
