





2018 Program Guidelines

Our Mission

The Joyce Foundation believes communities are stronger when they share benefits broadly among their people. We invest in evidence-based policies that improve quality of life, promote safe and healthy communities, and build a just society for the people of the Great Lakes region. This requires that our public systems get a few essentials right. Working with grantee partners, we invest in policy reforms to provide quality public education, especially for children growing up in poverty; expand economic opportunity for low-income and minority young people; and create a more representative and informed democracy with broad public participation. We support policies to address the long-term challenges of climate change and threats to the Great Lakes; and stronger policies to reduce gun violence and reform how the justice system deals with young, non-violent gun offenders. Finally, we support a stronger role for arts and arts organizations in fostering racial equity, diversity and inclusion in our communities.

About the Foundation

The Joyce Foundation was created in 1948 by Beatrice Joyce Kean of Chicago. The Joyce family wealth, based on lumber and sawmill interests, was left to the Foundation when Mrs. Kean died in 1972. Over the years, the Foundation has continued to respond to changing social needs, awarding approximately \$965 million in grants to groups working to improve the quality of life in the Great Lakes region.

Programs

Our program areas are Education and Economic Mobility, Environment, Gun Violence Prevention and Justice System Reform, Democracy, and Culture. We focus most of our grant making on initiatives that have an impact on the Great Lakes region, specifically the states of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, and Wisconsin. Our work in these states can have an impact in other states or on national policy, too. A limited number of environment grants are made to organizations in Canada. Culture grants are primarily focused in Chicago, except for the Joyce Awards, which extend to other Midwest cities. We do not generally support capital proposals, endowment campaigns, religious activities, commercial ventures, direct-service programs, or scholarships.

The Joyce Foundation is committed to improving public policy through its grant program. Accordingly, the Foundation welcomes grant requests from organizations that engage in public policy advocacy. Federal tax law prohibits private foundations from funding lobbying activities. The Foundation may support organizations engaged in public policy advocacy by either providing general operating support or by funding educational advocacy such as nonpartisan research, technical assistance, or examinations of broad social issues. The Foundation encourages grant applicants to describe the nature of advocacy activities in their grant applications and reports, so the Foundation can ensure that it is in compliance with federal tax laws. For further information on the relevant federal tax laws, grant applicants should consult their tax advisors.

Education & Economic Mobility

To ensure our young people are prepared for the future and are economically mobile, the Joyce Foundation will work to ensure equitable access to high-quality education and jobs. We will focus our efforts on young people of color and those from low-income backgrounds. We will advance policies that ensure K-12 students attend

schools with high-quality educators, graduate high school with the momentum they need to be successful in college, and attain college credentials that lead to careers with family-sustaining wages. We also will invest in emerging ideas in innovative K-12 schools and reform efforts, and emerging ideas on how the safety net and workforce development will need to adapt to a changing economic milieu.

Educator Quality: The Joyce Foundation will work to ensure that students, especially those of color and those who are low-income, attend schools where high-quality teachers and principals work together to create strong learning environments. We will support efforts to improve federal, state, and district policies that ensure students have teachers and principals who are highly trained, properly evaluated, and well supported in their professional growth. We will focus our educator quality investments mainly on Chicago, Indianapolis, and Minneapolis school districts and on state policies in Indiana, Illinois, and Minnesota. We will have two focus areas:

- Teachers: We will work across the pipeline. In teacher preparation, we'll work to ensure states and teacher preparation programs use data for accountability and improvement, and that school districts/states and teacher training programs work together to align teacher supply and demand, especially around STEM and ELL teachers. We will work on policies that ensure teachers have high-quality evaluations, and on policies aimed at retaining top talent, including teacher leadership/career ladder models. We also will support efforts to empower teachers and build their voice into policy conversations.
- Principals: We will support evidence-based policy reforms aimed at ensuring principals have the autonomy and data they need to lead schools with strong learning cultures focused on improving teaching and learning.

Pathways to College Credentials and Careers: In order to increase the economic mobility of low-income and minority students, the Joyce Foundation will support state and federal policy work to: (1) better prepare students for college and career through early college credits, work-based learning, and high school interventions to reduce college remediation; (2) increase the likelihood that low-income and minority students will complete credentials or degrees of economic value at the institutions they attend; and (3) increase access and success for low-income and minority students in the public institutions with the highest economic payoffs.

Innovation: Our rapidly changing economy demands innovative thinking in both K-12 education and the labor market. The Joyce Foundation will support efforts to reimagine K-12 schools and policy reforms. On the labor market side of the equation, the Joyce Foundation will support (1) state policies that simultaneously increase regional economic competitiveness, support middle-class job growth, and develop a workforce of the future and (2) state safety net policies that mitigate the impact of these troubling trends on hard-hit populations.

Environment

To improve the prospects for the next generation in the Great Lakes region, the Joyce Foundation will address two of the region's critical long-term environmental challenges: climate change and the health of the Great Lakes.

Climate change is the biggest intergenerational threat to our communities and our planet. Failure to address it would hinder progress across all sectors. Joyce will advance public policies that promote practical climate



solutions, including pursuing clean energy strategies specifically designed to remedy economic and equity issues facing the next generation in our region.

For more than two decades, Joyce has been a leading funder of policy work related to the Great Lakes. The Foundation will continue to pursue efforts to protect and restore the Great Lakes, and add grants to help ensure that everyone in our region shares the most fundamental benefit of the Great Lakes: clean, safe, affordable drinking water.

The Joyce Foundation seeks to support people from highly impacted communities to participate in environmental policy processes. Moreover, applicants pursuing efforts to integrate values of racial equity, social justice, inclusion, and diversity throughout their organization are invited to describe their efforts and how additional support from Joyce for those efforts would help achieve their goals.

Proposals should include a clear plan for tracking progress over the next year, the next three years, and the next five years. The Foundation is interested in long-term goals for all projects, including those where short-term funding is requested. Applicants requesting funds to advance policy goals are invited to review this <u>environmental policy advocacy benchmarking quide</u> for ideas about tracking progress.

The Joyce Foundation will consider grant requests to use evidence-based public policies to make progress on the following environmental priorities:

Climate Solutions

The Joyce Foundation believes the Great Lakes region can and should be a leader in fighting climate change by accelerating the transition to clean energy systems. To that end, the Foundation will support work in two areas:

- 1) Accelerating adoption of energy efficiency and renewable energy through state utility policies. This will include efforts to defend and fully implement the Future Energy Jobs Act in Illinois, the new utility policies adopted in Michigan in December 2016, and existing utility energy efficiency and renewable energy requirements in Minnesota and Ohio; and to leverage "utility of the future" planning processes in Illinois and Ohio to set the stage for aggressive decarbonization of the region's electric sector during the 2020s and 2030s.
- 2) Capturing the benefits of advanced transportation technologies. This will include efforts to develop equitable surface transportation system decarbonization plans in select Great Lakes cities; to secure adoption of local and state policies to begin implementing those plans; and to develop and secure adoption of electric vehicle charging infrastructure policies for Great Lakes states to accelerate the shift to electric vehicles while protecting low-income utility customers and those who do not own cars.

Great Lakes

The Joyce Foundation seeks to ensure that the next generation in our region will have healthy Great Lakes and clean water from lake to tap. Accordingly, the Foundation will support work in three areas:

1) Addressing three major threats to the Great Lakes: polluted runoff from cities and farms, aquatic invasive species, and surface water diversions. This will include efforts to reduce phosphorus loads to Lake Erie by 40 percent by 2050; to advance utility, municipal, and state policies that expand green infrastructure and reduce urban flooding; to preserve strong federal and state ballast water standards; to prevent the movement of Asian Carp through the Chicago Area Waterways; and to enforce the Great Lakes Compact.

- 2) Strengthening state and federal policies that restore the Great Lakes and improve the region's water infrastructure systems. This will include supporting the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative and federal and state water infrastructure funding; efforts to create and implement tools that allow cities and water utilities to improve water systems; and exploring new governance and business models to help water utilities deliver efficient, high-quality, affordable water services.
- 3) Ensuring that everyone has access to clean, safe, affordable drinking water. This will include efforts to improve the effectiveness of communications about the risks of lead exposure in water; to advance policies that reduce the risk of drinking water lead exposure in places frequented by children; to remove barriers to full lead service line replacement; and to develop and implement affordability policies that ensure all residents can access high quality water services.

Culture

The mission of the Culture program is to Inspire creativity and cultural stewardship in the next generation of Great Lakes residents by strengthening the role of artists and arts organizations in fostering culturally vibrant and sustainable communities. We seek partners that share commitment to eliminate barriers to arts engagement; grow a skilled arts workforce that is reflective of the region's full talent pool; and support the role of artists as makers, facilitators and problem-solvers. Our funding will focus on the following areas:

Arts Access and Participation: The Foundation supports efforts to strengthen arts presenting, engagement and non-curricular instruction capacity at (or in partnership with) neighborhood-based arts organizations that predominantly serve low income or culturally specific communities. We seek proposals that will reduce the costs of or distance to high quality arts experiences (productions, presentations, exhibitions, learning, etc.) in communities with limited arts access. In addition, we welcome proposals from arts and cultural organizations located in these communities seeking to expand or improve their programmatic and/or operational capacity. We also welcome research and evidence-based initiatives that seek to better understand the impact of arts access on individual life and community outcomes.

Arts Leadership and Workforce: The Foundation supports initiatives focusing on the career exposure, education, preparation or placement of racially underrepresented arts administrators, board members, stewards, funders and creative industry workers for institutional or sector positions Chicago. We seek proposals that focus on growing and diversifying the ranks of skilled employees in Chicago's arts and creative sectors (executive and artistic directors, managers, curators, critics, teaching artists, production assistants, technicians, craftspeople, etc.) through career exposure, job training and professional development opportunities. Additionally, we welcome proposals that seek to ensure that the makeup of cultural institution boards and arts funding bodies are reflective of regional and national demographics.

Creativity and Cultural Production: The Foundation supports initiatives to heighten and expand the artistic practice, public awareness, critical audience, and institutional and market access of artists of color and their artworks.

Democracy

The goal of this program is to strengthen our democracy by ensuring that it is built on citizen access—access to information from a strong, independent and trusted media, access to meaningful engagement in policymaking, and most of all, access to the ballot. We will make grants to strengthen evidence-based public policies to strengthen democracy in the Great Lakes region in the following areas:

Fair Elections: The Foundation supports research, public engagement and litigation strategies to strengthen election administration policies that expand access to the ballot as well as efforts to challenge restrictive voting measures in the Great Lakes region. The Foundation also supports strategies to reform the redistricting process through public engagement and litigation efforts.

Media: The Foundation supports local, state and national media, primarily nonprofit, covering issues in the Great Lakes region related to Joyce program areas. Joyce also supports professional development, trainings and other opportunities for journalists to expand their understanding of issues in the Joyce grant portfolio.

Gun Violence Prevention and Justice System Reform

Gun violence is one of the central health and safety challenges of our time, with more than 110,000 Americans injured or killed by guns every year. Gun violence in all its forms—community violence, domestic violence, mass shootings, suicide, and accidental gun deaths and injuries—undermines the ability of the next generation to thrive. In urban areas, the impact of gun violence is experienced most acutely by young people of color and their families and communities. At the same time, lack of trust between police and community members and an overreliance on incarceration for even nonviolent offenders further weaken communities and compromise public safety. The Joyce Foundation makes grants in the Great Lakes region to strengthen evidence-based public policies to promote safe and just communities in the following areas:

Focus Area 1: Gun Violence Prevention: To reduce deaths and injuries from gun violence, the Foundation supports efforts to strengthen state gun violence prevention policies in the Great Lakes region; educate young people about the risks of guns; use the courts to advance gun violence prevention; conduct research and improve data collection to inform policy development, implementation, and advocacy; and increase funding for gun violence prevention.

Focus Area 2: 21st Century Policing: To build police-community trust, promote legitimacy and improve public safety, we will support initiatives to advance local reform initiatives in Great Lakes police departments; improve state policies to promote 21st century policing; and conduct and disseminate research on best practices for reform.

Focus Area 3: Reducing Mass Incarceration: With the goals of reducing incarceration of young people and reducing gun violence in the Great Lakes region, the Foundation will fund projects to collect data on the criminal justice system's response to gun violence; conduct research on policies, models, and best practices for reducing incarceration of young, nonviolent gun offenders and their impact on public safety; launch and evaluate local city or county pilot initiatives aimed at reducing incarceration of young, nonviolent gun offenders and reducing gun violence; and develop and advocate for evidence-based state policies to reduce incarceration of young, nonviolent gun offenders.

Guidelines

Special Opportunities

The Special Opportunities Program gives the Foundation a measure of flexible funding with which to respond to important opportunities outside or across the Foundation's core giving programs, or to develop new ideas and promote innovation in how the Foundation and its grantees operate.

The Special Opportunities fund is used to support

- Innovative solutions to complex policy issues aligning with our program areas.
- Public engagement strategies that include public opinion research and/or efforts to mobilize action around our priority issues.
- One-time programs and/or events that address a timely and critical issue in our region.
- Support of the philanthropic sector.

President's Discretionary Fund

The President's Discretionary Fund is used to make small, expeditious grants that advance the Foundation's priorities, and to support other activities of interest to the Foundation Competition for discretionary funds is very high.

How to Apply

The Joyce Foundation accepts grant inquiries throughout the year.

Letters of Inquiry

Before submitting a formal proposal to the Foundation, prospective applicants should write a two- or three-page letter of inquiry outlining the proposed project to the appropriate program officers, whose names are listed below. The letter should describe the goals of the project, how it relates to the Foundation's interests, the target audience and beneficiaries, the estimated budget and duration, and plans for evaluation and dissemination of findings. Letters of inquiry should be submitted at least six to eight weeks prior to the proposal deadline for a given grant cycle. Program officers endeavor to respond in a timely manner and to advance all grant proposals expeditiously. Program officers, however, have discretion as to if and when to schedule formal proposal review.

Requests for Proposals

Certain grant making initiatives in the Employment and Environment Programs can be accessed only by going through a special request for proposal (RFP) process. For those initiatives, RFPs will be sent to preselected participants, and an announcement will be posted on the Foundation's website, www.joycefdn.org. For the Culture Program's Joyce Awards, a Call for Entries is published each January and posted on the website. Those having further questions about any of these RFPs are welcome to contact the Foundation.

Formal Proposals

After reviewing the letter of inquiry, the program officer may request a formal proposal. The proposal should include the application cover sheet. It should also include the following:

Grant Application Information

Executive summary or overview (1-2 pages)

Information on the project for which funding is requested, including the issue to be addressed, how the proposed project would address it, and plans for implementation, evaluation, and dissemination of findings

Description of the organization, including its background, purpose, objectives, and experience in the area for which funds are sought

Itemized project budget with narrative and proposed funding sources, amount of funds requested from the Joyce Foundation, their proposed use, and the time period over which they will be expended

Names and qualifications of people involved in the project

Organizational expenses and income for the previous, current, and coming fiscal years

Board members, their titles, outside affiliations, and telephone numbers

BY-LAWS of THE JOYCE FOUNDATION

ARTICLE I

Purposes

The purposes of the corporation as stated in its certificate of incorporation are charitable, scientific, literary and educational purposes, no part of the net earnings of which shall inure to the benefit of any member or individual.

The corporation also has such powers as are now or may hereafter be granted by the General Not For Profit Corporation Act of the State of Illinois.

ARTICLE II

Offices

The corporation shall have and continuously maintain in this state a registered office and a registered agent whose office is identical with such registered office, and may have other offices within or without the State of Illinois as the board of directors may from time to time determine.

ARTICLE III

Members

<u>SECTION 1. MEMBERSHIP.</u> The corporation shall have one class of members, to be designated Regular Members.

SECTION 2. ELECTION AND TENURE OF MEMBERS. Applicants for membership shall be nominated by a member and shall be elected and reelected to full status as a regular member of the corporation by an affirmative vote of a majority of members. All members shall serve terms of three years.

<u>SECTION 3. VOTING RIGHTS</u>. Each member shall be entitled to one vote on each matter submitted to a vote of the members.

(Includes all amendments through December 1, 2017)

<u>SECTION 4. TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP</u>. The members by affirmative vote of two-thirds of all of the members may suspend or expel a member with or without cause.

<u>SECTION 5. RESIGNATION</u>. Any member may resign by filing a written resignation with the Secretary, but such resignation shall not relieve the member so resigning of the obligation to pay any dues, assessments, or other charges theretofore accrued and unpaid.

<u>SECTION 6. REINSTATEMENT</u>. Upon written request signed by a former member and filed with the Secretary, the members may by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members reinstate such former member to membership upon such terms as the members may deem appropriate.

<u>SECTION 7. TRANSFER OF MEMBERSHIP.</u> Membership in this corporation is not transferable or assignable.

ARTICLE IV

Meetings of Members

SECTION 1. ANNUAL MEETING AND ELECTION AND REMOVAL OF DIRECTORS. An annual meeting of the members shall be held on the second Tuesday in December of each year, at the hour of 9:15 o'clock A.M., for the purpose of electing directors and the consideration of the election of directors emeritus and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. If such day be a legal holiday, the meeting shall be held at the same hour on the next succeeding business day. If the election of directors and the consideration of the election of directors emeritus shall not be held on the day designated herein for any annual meeting, or at any adjournment thereof, the members shall cause the election and consideration to be held at a special meeting of the members called as soon thereafter as conveniently may be. Members shall elect and reelect directors and directors emeritus by a majority vote. Members may remove directors by a two-thirds vote and may remove directors emeritus by a majority vote, in either case with or without cause.

<u>SECTION 2. SPECIAL MEETING</u>. Special meetings of the members may be called either by the president or not less than one-third of the members having voting rights.

SECTION 3. PLACE OF MEETING. The president may designate any place, either within or without the State of Illinois, as the place of meeting for any annual meeting or for any special meeting of the members. If no designation is made, the place of meeting shall be the registered office of the corporation in the State of Illinois, provided, however, that if all of the members shall meet at any time and place, either within or without the State of Illinois, and consent to the holding of a meeting, such meeting shall be valid without call or notice, and at such meeting any corporate action may be taken.

SECTION 4. NOTICE OF MEETINGS. Written or printed notice stating the place, day and hour of any meeting of members shall be delivered, either personally or by mail, to each member entitled to vote at such meetings, not less than five nor more than forty days before the date of such meeting, by or at the direction of the president, or the secretary, or the officers or persons calling the meeting. In case of a special meeting or when required by statute or by these by-laws, the purpose for which the meeting is called shall be stated in the notice. If mailed, the notice of a meeting shall be deemed delivered when deposited in the United States mail,

addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the records of the corporation, with postage thereon prepaid.

SECTION 5. INFORMAL ACTION BY MEMBERS. Any action required to be taken at a meeting of the members of the corporation, or any other action which may be taken at a meeting of members, may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, shall be signed by all of the members entitled to vote with respect to the subject matter thereof.

SECTION 6. QUORUM. The members holding one-half of the votes which may be cast at any meeting shall constitute a quorum at such meeting. If a quorum is not present at any meeting of members, a majority of the members present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

SECTION 7. PROXIES. At any meeting of members, a member entitled to vote may vote either in person or by proxy executed in writing by the member or by his duly authorized attorney-in-fact. No proxy shall be valid after eleven months from the date of its execution unless otherwise provided in the proxy.

ARTICLE V

Board of Directors

<u>SECTION 1. GENERAL POWERS</u>. The affairs of the corporation shall be managed by its board of directors.

SECTION 2. NUMBER, TENURE AND QUALIFICATIONS. The number of directors shall be not less than eleven and not more than fifteen. Each director except the Chairman shall hold office until the next annual meeting of members and until his or her successor shall have been elected and qualified. The Chairman's term is governed by Article VI.6. Directors need not be residents of Illinois or members of the corporation.

SECTION 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. A regular annual meeting of the board of directors shall be held without other notice other than this by-law, immediately after, and at the same place as, the annual meeting of members. The board of directors may provide by resolution the time and place, either within or without the State of Illinois, for the holding of additional regular meetings of the board without other notice than such resolution.

SECTION 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the board of directors may be called by or at the request of the president or any two directors. The person or persons authorized to call special meetings of the board may fix any place, either within or without the State of Illinois, as the place for holding any special meeting of the board called by them.

SECTION 5. NOTICE. Notice of any special meeting of the board of directors shall be given at least two days previously thereto by written notice delivered personally or sent by mail or telegram to each director at his address as shown by the records of the corporation. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail in a sealed envelope so addressed with postage thereon prepaid. If notice be given by telegram, such notice shall be deemed delivered when the telegram is delivered to the telegraph company. Any director may waive notice of any meeting. The attendance of a director at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a director attends a meeting for the

purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened. Neither the business to be transacted at, nor the purpose of, any regular or special meeting of the board need be specified in the notice or waiver of notice of such meeting, unless specifically required by law or by these by-laws.

<u>SECTION 6. QUORUM</u>. A majority of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the board, provided, that if less than a majority of the directors are present at said meeting, a majority of the directors present may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

<u>SECTION 7. MANNER OF ACTING</u>. The act of a majority of the directors present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the board of directors, except where otherwise provided by law or by these by-laws.

<u>SECTION 8. VACANCIES</u>. Any vacancy occurring in the board of directors or any directorship to be filled by reason of an increase in the number of directors, shall be filled by the members. A director elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term of his predecessor in office.

SECTION 9. COMPENSATION. In the discretion of the board of directors the directors may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance at each meeting of the board of directors and may be paid an annual or other periodic retainer and/or a fixed sum for attendance at each meeting of the board of directors. No such payment shall preclude any director who is not a governmental official (as defined in Section 4946(c) of the Internal Revenue Code) from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor. Furthermore, directors who are governmental officials shall not be paid any compensation for any services they have in the past or may in the future furnish the corporation, nor shall their travel expenses be reimbursed except to the extent described in Section 4941(b)(2)(G)(vii) of the Internal Revenue Code, nor shall the corporation enter into any agreement to make any payments for such services or unpermitted expenses. Members of special or standing committees who are not governmental officials may be allowed additional compensation for service on such committee.

SECTION 10. ELECTION OF DIRECTORS EMERITUS.

- (a) <u>Term</u>. The members may elect any number of directors emeritus who shall hold office for four years.
- (b) <u>Eligibility</u>. Eligibility for service as a director emeritus shall be available to any director who has served with distinction as a director for at least four one year terms. A director emeritus may not also serve as a regular director or member at the same time as serving as a director emeritus. Reference in the Bylaws to "directors" shall not mean or include directors emeritus.

SECTION 11. RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF DIRECTOR EMERITUS.

- (c) <u>Access to Director Information</u>. A Directors emeritus shall be included in all director communications including but not limited to all notices, minutes, reports and similar director materials.
- (d) <u>Nonvoting Status</u>. Directors emeritus may participate in meetings of directors but shall not be permitted to vote on any matters and shall not be counted for a necessary quorum.

- (e) <u>Compensation</u>. Service as a director emeritus shall be without compensation but expenses to attend director meetings will be paid by the corporation.
- (f) <u>Committee Participation</u>. Directors emeritus shall be eligible for committee appointment, except for the Executive and the Governance and Nominating Committees. Participation in such committee activities shall be on a nonvoting basis and directors emeritus shall not be counted for a necessary quorum. Expenses to attend meetings of committees to which a director emeritus has been appointed will be paid by the corporation.
- (g) <u>Limitation of Rights and Liability</u>. Directors emeritus shall have no other rights, powers, privileges, duties, responsibilities or liabilities other than those stated in these Bylaws herein. Directors emeritus shall have no liability for any action or failure to take action of the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI

Officers

SECTION 1. OFFICERS. The officers of the corporation shall be a chairman of the board of directors, a vice-chairman of the board of directors, a president, one or more vice presidents (the number thereof to be determined by the board of directors), a treasurer, a secretary, a chairman emeritus and such other officers as may be elected in accordance with the provisions of this article. The board of directors may elect or appoint such other officers, including one or more assistant secretaries and one or more assistant treasurers, as it shall deem desirable, such officers to have the authority to perform the duties prescribed, from time to time, by the board of directors. Any two or more offices may be held by the same person, except the offices of president and secretary.

SECTION 2. ELECTION AND TERM OF OFFICE. The officers of the corporation shall be elected annually by the board of directors at the regular annual meeting of the board of directors, except for the chairman whose term is governed by Article VI.6. If the election of directors shall not be held at such meeting, such election shall be held as soon thereafter as conveniently may be. Vacancies may be filled or new offices created and filled at any meeting of the board of directors. Each officer shall hold office until his successor shall have been duly elected and shall have qualified.

SECTION 3. REMOVAL. Any officer or agent elected or appointed by the board of directors may be removed by the board of directors whenever in its judgment the best interests of the corporation would be served thereby, but such removal shall be without prejudice to the contract rights, if any, of the person so removed.

<u>SECTION 4. VACANCIES</u>. A vacancy in any office because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification or otherwise, may be filled by the board of directors for the unexpired portion of the term.

SECTION 5. SELECTION AND NOMINATION PROCESS Whenever there is an officer vacancy or a need for selection of an officer, the Governance and Nominating Committee shall promptly identify nominees for such position(s). The nominees shall have demonstrated accomplishments, leadership qualities and high ethical standards and shall bring a range of skills, diverse perspectives and backgrounds to the position. The Committee shall establish and share with the board a process and criteria for evaluation of the candidates and their suitability for

service as an officer. The Committee shall evaluate candidates and their suitability for services as an officer in whatever fashion the committee deems appropriate.

- (a) For officers to be selected at the regular annual meeting of the board of directors, the Committee shall convene in person, by telephone or by electronic conferencing no later than 90 days prior to the regular annual meeting. At the initial meeting, the Committee shall review a list of the current officers, potential candidates and any additional information the chairman of the committee shall deem appropriate. At the initial meeting, the Committee shall also adopt a schedule for its deliberations so as to submit to the board no later than 30 days prior to the regular annual meeting a slate of nominees for the board's consideration. The Chairman of the board shall in turn advise the entire board of the names of the nominees.
- (b) The Committee schedule and a solicitation of comments or suggestions shall be distributed to the members of the board of directors promptly after the initial meeting of the Committee.
- (c) In the event of a selection of officers to fill vacancies at other times, the same procedures shall be followed except the timeframe may be adjusted as deemed suitable by the Committee.
- (d) The Committee shall consult with the Chairman of the board in determining its slate of nominees.

SECTION 6. CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD. The chairman of the board shall preside at all meetings of the members and of the board of directors and shall perform such other duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the members or the board of directors. The term of the chairman of the board shall be three (3) years and until his or her successor shall have been elected and qualified. The chairman may be elected to a maximum of two three (3) year terms.

SECTION 7. VICE-CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD. The vice-chairman of the board shall preside at meetings of the members and of the board of directors in the absence of the chairman of the board and shall perform such other duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the members or the board of directors.

SECTION 8. PRESIDENT. The president shall be the principal executive officer of the corporation and shall in general supervise and control all of the business and affairs of the corporation. He may sign, with the secretary or any other proper officer of the corporation authorized by the board of directors, any deeds, mortgages, bonds, contracts, or other instruments which the board of directors have authorized to be executed, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the board of directors or by these by-laws or by statute to some other officer or agent of the corporation; and in general shall perform all duties incident to the office of president and such other duties as may be prescribed by the board of directors from time to time.

SECTION 9. VICE PRESIDENT. In the absence of the president or in the event of his inability or refusal to act, the vice president (or in the event there be more than one vice president, the vice presidents, in the order designated, or in the absence of any designation, then in the order of their election) shall perform the duties of the president, and when so acting, shall have all the powers of and be subject to all the restrictions upon the president. Any vice president shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the president or by the board of directors.

SECTION 10. TREASURER. If required by the board of directors, the treasurer shall give a bond for the faithful discharge of his duties in such sum and with such surety or sureties as the board of directors shall determine. He shall have charge and custody of and be responsible for all funds and securities of the corporation; receive and give receipts for monies due and payable to the corporation from any source whatsoever, and deposit all such monies in the name of the corporation in such banks, trust companies or other depositories as shall be selected in accordance with the provisions of Article VIII of these by-laws; and in general perform all the duties incident to the office of treasurer and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the president or by the board of directors.

SECTION 11. SECRETARY. The secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the members and of the board of directors in one or more books provided for that purpose; see that all notices are duly given in accordance with the provisions of these by-laws or as required by law; be custodian of the corporate records and of the seal of the corporation and see that the seal of the corporation is affixed to all documents, the execution of which on behalf of the corporation under its seal is duly authorized in accordance with the provisions of these by-laws; keep a register of the post office address of each member which shall be furnished to the secretary by such member; and in general perform all duties incident to the office of secretary and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the president or by the board of directors.

SECTION 12. ASSISTANT TREASURERS AND ASSISTANT SECRETARIES. If required by the board of directors, the assistant treasurers shall give bonds for the faithful discharge of their duties in such sums and with such sureties as the board of directors shall determine. The assistant treasurers and assistant secretaries, in general, shall perform such duties as shall be assigned to them by the treasurer or the secretary or by the president or the board of directors.

SECTION 13. CHAIRMAN EMERITUS. The board of directors may elect a chairman emeritus. The chairman emeritus shall be entitled to receive notice of all meetings of the board of directors and attend and participate in all meetings and shall have the right to vote. The chairman emeritus may be appointed to sit as a voting member of any committee. Election of chairman emeritus shall be by a majority of the members of the board of directors and shall be elected for a one year term renewable for as many terms as the board shall choose.

ARTICLE VII

Committees

SECTION 1. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The chairman of the board, with the approval of the majority of the board, shall establish an executive committee, which shall consist of two or more directors who shall be appointed by the chairman of the board and approved by a majority of the board of directors. Between meetings of the board of directors, the executive committee shall have and may exercise all of the authority of the board of directors in the management of the corporation, but the designation of such committee shall not operate to relieve the board of directors or any individual director of responsibility imposed on him by law. The chairman of the board shall chair the executive committee. The executive committee members shall serve at the pleasure of the board of directors. Action taken by the executive committee shall be reported to the board of directors promptly after adoption. The executive committee may not:

- (1) Adopt a plan for the distribution of the assets of the corporation, or for dissolution;
- (2) Approve or recommend to members any act the General Not For Profit Corporation Act or these by-laws requires to be approved by members;
- (3) Fill vacancies on the board or on any of its committees;
- (4) Elect, appoint or remove any officer or director or member of any committee, or fix the compensation of any member of a committee;
- (5) Adopt a plan of merger or adopt a plan of consolidation with another corporation, or authorize the sale, lease, exchange or mortgage of all or substantially all of the property or assets of the corporation; or
- (6) Amend, alter, repeal or take action inconsistent with any resolution or action of the board of directors when the resolution or action of the board of directors provides by its terms that it shall not be amended, altered or repealed by action of a committee.

SECTION 2. OTHER COMMITTEES. The chairman of the board, with the approval of the majority of the board, may create one or more other committees to serve such purpose or perform such functions as the chairman of the board specifies. The chairman of the board, with the approval of the majority of the board of directors shall appoint the committee chairs and shall appoint directors or such other persons to serve on the committee or committees. Each committee shall have two or more members, who serve at the pleasure of the board.

SECTION 3. PROCEDURE. Unless the appointment by the board of directors requires a greater number, a majority of any committee shall constitute a quorum, and a majority of committee members present and voting at a meeting at which a quorum is present is necessary for committee action. A committee may act by unanimous consent in writing without a meeting and, subject to the action of the board of directors, the committee by majority vote of its members shall determine the time and place of its meetings and the notice required therefor.

ARTICLE VIII

Contracts, Checks, Deposits and Funds

SECTION 1. CONTRACTS. The board of directors may authorize any officer or officers, agent or agents of the corporation, in addition to the officers so authorized by these bylaws, to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of and on behalf of the corporation and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

SECTION 2. CHECKS, DRAFTS, ETC. All checks, drafts or other orders for the payment of money, notes or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the corporation, shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents of the corporation and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by resolution of the board of directors. In the absence of such determination by the board of directors, such instruments shall be signed by the treasurer or an assistant treasurer and countersigned by the president or a vice president of the corporation.

SECTION 3. DEPOSITS. All funds of the corporation shall be deposited from time to time to the credit of the corporation in such banks, trust companies or other depositories as the board of directors may select.

<u>SECTION 4. GIFTS</u>. The board of directors may accept on behalf of the corporation any contribution, gift, bequest or devise for the general purposes or for any special purpose of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX

Certificates of Membership

SECTION 1. CERTIFICATES OF MEMBERSHIP. The board of directors may provide for the issuance of certificates evidencing membership in the corporation which shall be in such form as may be determined by the board. Such certificates shall be signed by the president or a vice president and by the secretary or an assistant secretary and shall be sealed with the seal of the corporation. All certificates evidencing membership of any class shall be consecutively numbered. The name and address of each member and the date of issuance of the certificate shall be entered on the records of the corporation. If any certificate shall become lost, mutilated or destroyed, a new certificate may be issued therefor upon such terms and conditions as the board of directors may determine.

SECTION 2. ISSUANCE OF CERTIFICATES. When a member has been elected to membership and has paid any initiation fee and dues that may then be required, a certificate of membership shall be issued in his name and delivered to him by the secretary, if the board of directors shall have provided for the issuance of certificates of membership under the provisions of Section I of this Article.

ARTICLE X

Books and Records

The corporation shall keep correct and complete books and records of account and shall also keep minutes of the proceedings of its members, board of directors and committees having any of the authority of the board of directors, and shall keep at the registered or principal office a record giving the names and addresses of the members entitled to vote. All books and records of the corporation may be inspected by any member, or his agent or attorney for any proper purpose at any reasonable time.

ARTICLE XI

Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the corporation shall begin on the first day of January and end on the last day of December in each year.

ARTICLE XII

Seal

The board of directors shall provide a corporate seal which shall be in the form of a circle and shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the words, "Corporate Seal, Illinois."

ARTICLE XIII

Waiver of Notice

Whenever any notice is required to be given under the provisions of the General Not For Profit Corporation Act of Illinois or under the provision of the articles of incorporation or the bylaws of this corporation, a waiver thereof in writing, signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to the giving of such notice.

ARTICLE XIV


Amendments to By-laws

These by-laws may be altered, amended or repealed and new by-laws may be adopted by a majority of the members present at any regular meeting or at any special meeting, provided that at least two days' written notice is given of intention to alter, amend or repeal or to adopt new by-laws at such meeting.

ARTICLE XV

Indemnification of Directors and Officers

SECTION 1. RIGHT TO INDEMNIFICATION. Each person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to or is involved in any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, (including, without limitation, an action, suit or proceeding by or in the right of the corporation), whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative ("Proceeding"), by reason of the fact that he or she, or a person of whom he or she is the legal representative, is or was a director, director emeritus or officer of the corporation or, as a director, director emeritus or officer of the corporation, is or was serving at the request of the corporation's Board of Directors or its designee as a director, director emeritus or officer, employee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, including service with respect to employee benefit plans, whether the basis of such Proceeding is alleged action in an official capacity as a director, officer or director emeritus, trustee, employee or agent or in any other capacity, shall be indemnified and held harmless by the corporation to the fullest extent not prohibited by law, including but not limited to Section 108.75 of the Illinois General Not For Profit Act of 1986 (the "Act"), as the same exists or may hereafter be amended (but, in the case of any such amendment, only to the extent that such amendment permits the corporation to provide broader indemnification rights than said Act permitted the corporation to provide prior to such amendment), against all expenses, liability and loss (including attorney's fees, judgments, fines, ERISA excise taxes or penalties and amounts paid or to be paid in settlement) reasonably incurred or suffered by such person in connection therewith; provided, however, that the corporation shall indemnify any such person seeking indemnity in connection with an action, suit



SECTION 2. RIGHT TO ADVANCEMENT OF EXPENSES. The right to indemnification granted in Section 1 shall include the right to be paid by the corporation expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) incurred in defending any such Proceeding in advance of its final disposition; provided, however, that the payment of such expenses in advance of the final disposition of such Proceeding shall be made only upon delivery to the corporation of an undertaking, by or on behalf of such director, director emeritus or officer, in which such director, director emeritus or officer, agrees to repay all amounts so advanced if it should be ultimately determined that such person is not entitled to be indemnified under Section 1 or otherwise.

SECTION 3. RIGHT OF CLAIMANT TO BRING SUIT.

- (a) If a claim under Sections 1 or 2 is not paid in full by the corporation within thirty days after a written claim therefor has been received by the corporation, the claimant may any time thereafter bring suit against the corporation to recover the unpaid amount of the claim and, if successful in whole or in part, the claimant shall be entitled to be paid also the expenses of prosecuting such claim (including reasonable attorneys' fees). It shall be a defense to any such action (other than an action brought to enforce a claim for expenses incurred in defending any proceeding in advance of its final disposition where the required undertaking has been tendered to the corporation) that the claimant has engaged in conduct which prohibits the corporation under the applicable law from indemnifying the claimant for the amount claimed, but the burden of proving such defense shall be on the corporation.
- (b) None of (i) the failure of the corporation (including its board of directors, independent legal counsel, or its members) to have made a determination prior to the commencement of such action that indemnification of the claimant is proper in the circumstances because he or she has met any required standard of conduct, (ii) an actual determination by the corporation (including its board of directors, independent legal counsel, or its members) that the claimant has not met any required standard of conduct, nor (iii) the termination of any action, suit or proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, conviction, or upon a plea of nolo contendre or its equivalent shall be a defense to the action or create a presumption that the claimant has not met any required standard of conduct.

SECTION 4. CONTRACTUAL RIGHTS: APPLICABILITY. The right to be indemnified or to the reimbursement or advancement of expenses pursuant hereto (i) is a contract right based upon good and valuable consideration, pursuant to which the person entitled thereto may bring suit as if the provisions hereof were set forth in a separate written contract between the corporation and the director or officer, (ii) is intended to be retroactive and shall be available with respect to events occurring prior to the adoption hereof, and (iii) shall continue to exist after the rescission or restrictive modification hereof with respect to events occurring prior thereto.

SECTION 5. NON-EXCLUSIVITY OF RIGHTS. The rights conferred on any person by Sections 1, 2 and 3 shall not be exclusive of and shall be in addition to any other right which such person may have or may hereafter acquire under any statute, provision of the Articles of Incorporation, bylaw, agreement, vote of members or disinterested directors or otherwise, and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors and administrators of such person.

<u>SECTION 6. NOTICE TO MEMBERS</u>. If the corporation has paid indemnity or has advanced expenses under this Article to a director, director emeritus officer, employee or agent, the corporation shall report the indemnification or advance in writing to any members entitled to vote with or before the notice of the next meeting of the members entitled to vote.

SECTION 7. AUTHORITY TO INSURE. The corporation is authorized to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, director emeritus or officer, employee or agent of the corporation or is or was serving at the request of the corporation as a director, director emeritus, officer, employee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, including service with respect to employee benefit plans, against any liability asserted against such person and incurred by such person in any such capacity, or arising out of such person's status as such, whether or not the corporation would have the power to indemnify such person against such liability under the provisions of this Article or otherwise, provided the purchase or maintenance of such insurance shall not be prohibited by law, including but not limited to Section 108.75 of the Act.

SECTION 8. SAVINGS CLAUSE. If this Article or any portion thereof shall be invalidated on any ground by any court of competent jurisdiction, then the corporation shall nevertheless indemnify each person afforded indemnification under this Article as to expenses, liability and loss (including attorneys' fees reasonably incurred, judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement) with respect to any Proceeding or appeal to the full extent permitted by any applicable portion of this Article which shall not have been invalidated by the Act or by any other applicable law.
