However, Rush did not calculate AGB on an annual basis after that calculation was completed in January 2016 as required. This was discovered in November 2017 as Rush worked with tax consultants on Schedule H. Rush calculated what AGB would have been for FY17 on February 2, 2018. This was evaluated by determining the AGB for claims allowed in FY17 and comparing that to the discounts offered to patients who qualify for financial assistance under the FAP (either 75% discount or 100% discount, depending on patient eligibility). Rush identified three instances where the patient remitted payment for a percent of charges exceeding AGB. These payments, totaling \$305.62, were made by the patient prior to applying for and obtaining FAP eligibility. The charges in excess of AGB weren't made or requested as a pre-condition of RUMC providing medically necessary care and refunds were initiated on all three payments in FY19. Rush has provided additional training to the credit balance team and has implemented a checklist of items that will ensure compliance with the AGB requirement. The AGB calculation has been moved to a standard schedule within the accounting department to ensure this does not occur again and the most recent AGB calculation was implemented by April 1, 2019. In addition to above, in FY17 the language in the FAP was updated to include a hyperlink to the actual AGB percentage calculated, however for part of FY18 that hyperlink was not functional and the AGB percentage could not be found online. As described, this group has since grown with the merging of HICCC and the Healthy Chicago Hospital Collaborative as we developed our recommended actions for this iteration of the CHNA, we again sought input from our key stakeholders.
