In support of its mission, the Indiana University Health System provides care to uninsured and underinsured patients. Under its financial assistance policy, the Indiana University Health System provides medically necessary care to uninsured patients with inadequate financial resources at charitable discounts equivalent to the amounts generally billed, and it provides eligibility for full charity for emergent encounters for uninsured patients who earn less than 200% of the federal poverty level and who meet application criteria. Patients whose liability is deemed catastrophic relative to their annual household income are also eligible for reduced charges. Since the Indiana University Health System does not pursue collection of these amounts, the discounted amounts are not reported as patient service revenue. The Indiana University Health System uses presumptive eligibility screening procedures for free care and recognizes net patient service revenue on services provided to self-pay patients at the discounted rate at the time services are rendered. The estimated cost of charity care, using the consolidated cost to charge ratio, was \$94,886,000 and \$85,295,000 in 2018 and 2017, respectively.

For example, the Medicare Cost Report excludes certain costs such as billed physician services, the costs of Medicare Parts C and D, fee schedule reimbursed services, and durable medical equipment services. In addition, physical inactivity and access to healthy food were split into their own line items, instead of being combined. During the meetings, a range of other topics was discussed, including - Differences in secondary data for mental health indicators - Inter-relatedness of needs - Services for the elderly - Difference between obesity, physical activity, and access to healthy food. After discussing the needs identified through secondary data and adding others to the list, each participant was asked through a voting process to identify "three to five" they consider to be most significant. The interview was guided by a structured protocol. The interview was guided by a structured protocol that focused on opinions regarding significant community health needs, describing why such needs are present, and seeking ideas for how to address them. The interviewee confirmed that some of the top needs identified by the community meeting group were some of the most significant in the community. These needs were - Mental health, addictions, and supply of mental health providers (including rehabilitation and addiction services) - Poverty rates and children in poverty - Obesity - Physical inactivity - Access to healthy foods. Drug addiction was identified as a major issue, and it was believed that receiving long-term treatment is not an option for many seeking treatment. While healthy options were thought to exist on a smaller scale, cheaper unhealthy food is more readily accessible. A lack of regular exercise was also identified as a main contributor to the issue of obesity, particularly among poorer communities. Many neighborhoods did not have a built environment to support regular exercise, with issues such as crime, lack of sidewalks, heavy traffic, and others contributing to an unsafe physical environment. Infant mortality was identified as a significant issue, with a lack of parent education on child safety (such as infants sleeping in the same bed as parents or other children) contributing. 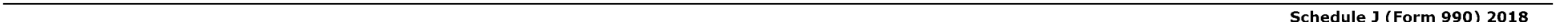

The Committee reviews the entire compensation package including base compensation, short term and long term incentive plans, basic health and welfare benefits, qualified and nonqualified plans as well as any additional fringe benefits. Further, SullivanCotter will provide recommendations based upon the reasonable compensation information as it relates to salary increases, bonuses and benefits that are consistent with the compensation philosophy of the Committee. A separate analysis using the same methodology is done for the Chief Executive Officer. (3) The Committee reviews the salary survey and, if appropriate, makes recommendations on increases in salary and any changes in bonuses or benefits. The Committee's goal is to ensure that the total compensation and benefits package is reasonable based upon the independent data provided by SullivanCotter. The Committee votes on any changes in compensation or benefits. This review, discussion and vote are documented in the minutes for the meeting. There are no executives present during the final discussion and approval of compensation. (4) The Board reviews the report prepared by SullivanCotter as well as the recommendations of the Committee on Personnel and Compensation as to changes in compensation approved by the Committee. As requested, the Committee on Finance also provides its review of recommendations on changes in executive compensation and benefits. This review, discussion and vote are documented in the minutes.
