MISSION

The Irving and Phyllis Millstein Foundation for Animal Welfare Ltd. wishes to assist organizations whose programs, goals, values, or actions contribute to the protection, care, and support of vulnerable, at risk, or otherwise homeless animals. The Foundation also supports education and research efforts that focus on the care and wellbeing of animals and their owners.

Irving and Phyllis: The initial Millstein Trust was born out of the unconditional love that Irving and Phyllis Millstein had for animals. Both found the comfort and companionship of animals a constant presence throughout their lives. After their passing, and since 2014, The Millistein Trust has valued and promoted the mutual benefit of animal and human connections as the Millsteins had, while following their wishes to protect and support vulnerable at-risk animals.

The Irving and Phyllis Millstein Foundation For Animal Welfare Ltd.

The corporate not-for-profit foundation began operation April 15th 2018, and now administers the assets of The Millstein Trust. The Foundation maintains the same mission, is a tax exempt foundation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and occupies the same physical address.

A VISION OF SOCIAL PHILANTHROPY:

The Irving and Phyllis Millstein Foundation for Animal Welfare(SM) addresses the roles that animals play in people's lives. Irving and Phyllis valued the animal and human connection, and the Foundation will develop programs that foster and preserve the animal and human bond while remaining committed to supporting animal centered organizations through traditional grants and by supporting endeavors that generate human and animal relationships.





GRANT MAKING CATEGORIES AND FUNDING:

The Irving and Phyllis Millstein Foundation categorizes grant components each year to understand impact. Typically, funding components within each Program Area are represented, however this reporting represents funding by the Program Area's leading category of giving. This is due to the eight month time frame and the reduced number of paid grants.

Grant Making Analytics: Grants are grouped by determining intended objectives, and single grants or grant components are assigned a Program Area. They are further segmented into categories to represent giving areas. Membership in a giving area may be determined through funding evaluation and final proposal, or by isolating specific components of grant funded activities. This analysis allows the Foundation to track how funds are utilized and to learn how components of funded activities are meeting overall grant objectives.

GRANT MAKING CATEGORIES AND DESCRIPTIONS:

The following giving areas represent grant making January through December, 2018 for the Irving and Phyllis Millstein Foundation and The Millstein Trust

Staff Salary

Funding for the acquisition or retention of staff members vital to the success and longevity of the program seeking funding. Salaries for staff with indirect oversight of funded programs are not considered. Grant recipients must demonstrate with measurable outcomes the impact of salaried positions to be considered for funding.

Shelter Development

Pertains to the funding of capital campaigns for the renovation or building of new facilities, the replacement of physical services, permanent or temporary fixtures, and activities associated with the planning and execution of these campaigns

Extraordinary Care

Veterinary care that exceeds \$3,500 per animal is considered an extraordinary expense and is funded separately from routine veterinary care. This category generally includes orthopedic surgeries, treatable canine and feline cancers with known positive outcomes, and other procedures necessary to treat the animal with the goal of maintaining a good quality of life with an increased possibility of adoption.

Training (Animal)

This activity is supported either through funding certified and/or experienced animal trainers or behaviorists, or by funding of facilities and/or necessary equipment. Training areas include socialization, PTSD companion or other specialized training, and other training necessary to facilitate adoption and retention of the animal in the home.

Animal Care

Program solutions to support activities and expenses associated with the everyday care of animals Expenses can include, but are not limited to housing, food, supplies, veterinary care, animal training, transportation, pay for animal handlers and care givers and the training of these personnel

Relocation

A refined application of the funding Program Area of the same name, activities in this category focus on the logistical aspects of the physical relocation of animals. Components of this category include costs for personnel, veterinary care, and transportation, including the purchase of vehicles dedicated for this purpose.

Vehicle Purchase

Vehicles for the exclusive use of the shelter or program for the relocation of animals to areas more favorable for adoption. Vehicles are often used to transport animals from areas with high euthanasia rates or areas without the resources to care for displaced animals.

Vaccinations

Funding of vaccinations as a part of routine veterinary care. This category includes vaccinations necessary to prepare animals during rescues, any type of animal relocation, or offered as a component of outreach efforts for low-cost clinic settings.

Veterinary Care (Routine)

Care for animals typically associated with establishing or maintaining fitness for adoption and general good health. Expenses funded in this category include check-up, vaccinations, spay and neuter (outside programs exclusive to spay and neuter), dental care, heartworm treatments and similar health promoting

Spay and Neuter

Funding for spay and neuter as a part of routine veterinary care and population control efforts (i.e., TNR). This category includes operations necessary to prepare animals during rescues, any type of animal relocation, or offered as a component of outreach efforts in a low-cost clinic setting.

Administrative/Overhead

Activities and expenses in this category fall under what is normally considered general support grants. The Foundation typically will not grant funds unless they are channeled towards activities directly related to the care of animals or outreach related programs. The Foundation will provide funds for Admin/Overhead if it is a component of supported programs.

Food/Specialized Supplies

As an area of outreach, grants in this area provide support for programs that help increase food security, treat or provide nutritional support for conditions that have specific requirements beyond what may be easily available or affordable to pet owners

NOTIFICATION OF TRANSFER OF ASSETS BY A PRIVATE FOUNDATION TO ANOTHER PRIVATE FOUNDATION PURSUANT TO SECTION 507(b)(2)

As of April 15, 2018, the Irving and Phyllis Millstein Charitable Trust for Animals (EIN 27-2294560) (hereinafter, "Transferor") transferred all of its assets and property to The Irving and Phyllis Millstein Foundation for Animal Welfare Ltd. (EIN 81-4594769) (hereinafter, "Transferee"); and the Transferee assumed all of the liabilities, legal commitments, duties and obligations of the Transferor (collectively, the "Transfer"). The purpose of the Transfer was for the Transferee to succeed to and continue in their entirety the exclusive charitable purposes, operations and activities of the Transferor. The Transferee previously notified the Internal Revenue Service, in its Application for Recognition of Exemption Under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (Form 1023), dated February 8, 2017, that (i) it was established as the successor organization to the Transferor, and (ii) the Transfer would be accomplished in due course.

The Transfer was made pursuant to the provisions of the Contribution Agreement dated February 1, 2017 and the Assignment, Delegation and Assumption Agreement dated as of April 15, 2018. A copy of each agreement is annexed hereto. The Transferor and the Transferee are tax exempt organizations pursuant to Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and have been classified as private foundations. Attached are copies of the Internal Revenue Service determination letters for the Transferor (letter dated May 30, 2014) and the Transferee (letter dated April 27, 2017).

The Transfer is a transfer of assets by the Transferor to the Transferee which is described in Section 507(b)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, whereby the Transferee is treated as a continuation of the Transferor for all purposes of the Internal Revenue Code, including succeeding to all of the Transferor's attributes thereunder, and is not treated as a newly created organization.

CONTRIBUTION AGREEMENT

THIS CONTRIBUTION AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), made as of the day of February, 2017 by and between the IRVING AND PHYLLIS MILLSTEIN CHARITABLE TRUST FOR ANIMALS U/D 2-1-16 (the "Charitable Trust"), a New York charitable trust and private foundation having an office at 30 Amherst Road, Valley Stream, New York 11581 and THE IRVING AND PHYLLIS MILLSTEIN FOUNDATION FOR ANIMAL WELFARE LTD.(the "Foundation"), a New York Not-For-Profit Corporation and a private foundation having an office at 30 Amherst Road, Valley Stream, New York 11581. Hereinafter, the Charitable Trust and the Corporation are sometimes individually referred to as a "Party, or collectively referred to as the "parties".

RECITALS

- A. The Charitable Trust was established by the late Phyllis Millstein pursuant to her Last Will and Testament dated the 1st day of May, 2001, for the purposes of promoting and providing for the protection of animals and the environments in which they live, and In furtherance thereof, distributing all or part of its income and principal to one or more charitable organizations directly for the care of neglected and homeless animals and/or for the prevention of cruelty to animals and/or for education and/or research in connection therewith, and to provide support to any organization dedicated to any such purpose. Thereafter, the trust was modified solely with respect to certain administrative provisions pursuant to Section 10-6.6 of the New York Estates, Powers and Trusts Law; and
- B. The Charitable Trust has been determined to be an organization that is exempt from taxation pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and it has been classified by the Internal Revenue Service as a private foundation. The Foundation intends to submit its application to the Internal Revenue Service in a timely manner for a determination of the Foundation's tax exempt status pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Code as a successor organization to the Charitable Trust, including confirmation of its status as a private foundation; and
- C. The parties contemplate that the Charitable Trust will in timely fashion, if and when the Internal Revenue Service determines that the Foundation is exempt from taxation pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Code, transfer and assign all of its assets and property to the Foundation and that the Foundation will accept such assets and property and will assume all of the liabilities and legal commitments of the Charitable Trust, and in connection therewith, the Foundation will succeed to and adopt the aforesaid charitable purposes of the Charitable Trust, and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, and intending to be legally bound, the parties have agreed as follows:

1. As soon as practicable on or after the date the Foundation is determined by the Internal Revenue Service to be exempt from taxation pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Code (hereinafter, said date is referred to as the "Start Date"), the

Charitable Trust shall contribute to the Foundation and shall transfer, convey, and assign to the Foundation all of its right, title and interest in and to all of the assets and property of the Charitable Trust, and the Foundation shall assume the liabilities and legal commitments of the Charitable Trust, as said assets and property are set forth on Schedule A annexed hereto and made a part hereof, and as said liabilities and legal commitments are set forth on Schedule B annexed hereto and made a part hereof.

- 2. Furthermore, on the Start Date, and in connection with such transfer and assumption, the Parties shall duly execute the form of Assignment, Delegation and Assumption Agreement annexed hereto as Schedule C.
- 3. The Parties shall make the appropriate registration and other required filings with the Charities Bureau of the New York Attorney General in timely fashion.
- 4. This Agreement may not be terminated, amended, or otherwise modified except by a written agreement signed by each of the Parties.
- 5. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with and governed by New York law in existence on the date hereof.
- 6. The Parties will execute and deliver such further instruments and do such further acts and things as may be required to carry out the intent and purpose of this Agreement.
- 7. This Agreement shall be binding upon, and shall inure to the benefit of, the heirs, administrators, personal representatives, successors and assigns of the Parties.
- 8. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be sufficient if in writing, and if sent by certified mail to the address shown at the head of this Agreement or such alternative address as a Party may provide in writing and delivered to the above listed address of the other Party hereto.
- 9. The waiver by either Party of a breach of any provision of this Agreement by the other Party shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach by such other Party.

Such assets and property interests are described on Schedule A, which is annexed hereto and made a part hereof (hereinafter said assets and property interests are referred to as the "Interests"). For the avoidance of doubt, the Interests shall be deemed to include all of the assets and property owned by the Assignor; and
- B. Assignor has incurred the liabilities, legal commitments and duties and obligations described on Schedule B, which is annexed hereto and made a part hereof (hereinafter said liabilities, legal commitments and duties and obligations are referred to as the "Liabilities") and
- C. Assignor hereby intends to transfer and assign all of Assignor's right, title and interest in and to the Interests to Assignee and Assignee intends to assume the Liabilities, as soon as practicable after receipt of the written determination of the Internal Revenue Service that Assignee is an organization exempt from taxation pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended ("Code").

- 1. Assignee warrants and represents that it is an organization exempt from taxation pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Code. Annexed as Exhibit II is a copy of the letter of the Internal Revenue Service making the determination that the Assignee is an organization exempt from taxation pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Code.
- 2. Assignor by these presents does hereby irrevocably ASSIGN, TRANSFER, CONVEY and DELIVER unto Assignee the Interests, subject to the Liabilities, to have and to hold together with all the rights and appurtenances thereto, with such rights and appurtenances inuring to Assignee, Assignee's heirs, legal representatives and assigns.
- 3. Assignor warrants and covenants to forever defend all the Assignor's right, title, and Interest in the Interest, subject to the Liabilities, that is being assigned hereby to Assignee, Assignee's heirs, legal representatives and assigns, and against every person whosoever lawfully claims same or any part thereof. Furthermore, Assignor shall execute

such additional instruments as shall be required to effectuate this Agreement and the assignments and transfers contemplated hereunder;

- 4. Assignee hereby assumes the Liabilities and warrants and covenants to indemnify the Assignor and Robert J. Randell, individually, and hold the Assignor and Robert J. Randell, individually, harmless from any and all manner of claims, demands, actions, causes of action, suits, acts, debts, reckonings, dues, sums of money, accounts, assessments of any kind including tax assessments, bonds, bills, covenants, contracts, controversies, agreements, promises, damages, judgments, matters, liability and/or accountability whatsoever, whether in law or in equity ("Claim"), for or on account of any and every matter and thing whatsoever arising from or in any manner relating to or connected with the Interests or the Liabilities, including the amount of reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection therewith, brought by any person or authority with respect thereto. In addition, upon the demand of Assignor or Robert J. Randell, individually, Assignee shall immediately refund to Assignor the amount of any Claim, including the amount of all reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection therewith;
- 5. This Agreement shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of New York, without giving effect to the choice of law provisions thereof.

Randell on the 18th day of March, 2010.
- B. The Assignee was established under Article FIFTH, Paragraph A of the Will, and is a tax exempt organization in accordance with the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and is exempt from New York State sales tax:
- C. Assignee was duly vested in and the legal and beneficial owner of the Property from the date of Decedent's death until the transfer of the title on July 14, 2015 (the "Transfer"); see *Estate of Joseph Seviroli*, 31 A.D.3d 452; 818 N.Y.S.2d 249 (2006 Appellate Division, Second Department)) and cases cited therein.
- D. Assignor was duly authorized under the Will and the New York Estates, Powers and Trusts Law to make the Transfer in an arm's length sale;
- E. In connection with the Transfer, Assignor filed the Form TP-584 (Combined Real Estate Transfer Tax Return, Credit Line Mortgage Certificate, and Certificate of Exemption from the Payment of Estimated Personal Income Tax) with the New York City Department of Finance and paid the sum of \$62,400 in transfer tax (the "Tax"). Site visits are documented with photographs and detailed notes, which are centrally archived to allow access and review by Members of the Foundation Advisory Committee to consider the nature and possible extent of funding.

Proposals: After due consideration by the Foundation, organizations may be invited to submit proposals addressing one or more of the needs identified during the site visit(s). To assist in the proposal process, an information packet describing grant proposal requirements and guidelines are provided to a potential applicant. If a proposal is received it is then evaluated by the Foundation's organization contact person

Funding Evaluation: Evaluation of the grant proposal starts with a thorough examination of the issues and needs described in the proposal. Qualitative and quantitative assessment is made. Claims for financial need are examined through cost analysis, benchmarking to local comparable resources and costs if available, and through consultation with subject matter experts when appropriate. Information gathered at site visits and supporting documents provided by candidates are used. Often, additional information, site visits, face-to-face meetings, and revised submissions are required before the application can be fully processed and a determination for funding is made.

Grant agreements are executed by authorized grantee personnel with signature authority and by the Foundation's President. The agreement lists the amount of the award and how funds must be spent on specific programs or specific needs.

Award and Control of Granted Funds: The Foundation exercises its expenditure responsibility through required *Milestone Reports* provided to be periodically rendered by the Grantee after the grant is received. Each grant agreement sets forth a schedule of quarterly "Milestone" dates by which the grantee is required to substantiate and provide documentation of the cumulative and quarterly expenditure of granted funds up to each Milestone date, and to show what funds remain

If the entire grant has been spent, the grantee is required to file a *Terminal Milestone Report* indicating that the terms of the agreement and the purpose of the grant have been fulfilled. 



Evaluation: Staff Salary and Shelter Development giving areas accounted for approximately 53% (\$378,732) of all paid grants (\$718,607) This portion had a predominantly singular focus Category representations of the remaining 47% were complex grants that addressed problems holistically.

- > Emerging Funding Areas: Funding related to *veterinary care* overall (vaccinations, spay and neuter, routine and extraordinary care, animal care) and *animal relocation* (\$68,748 not related to natural disaster) appear to be emerging funding areas
- > **Needs:** Shelters continue to enter locations without infrastructure for rescue, and without the means to medically treat and prepare animals for adoption

Summary:

Third Quarter of 2018: The Foundation Advisory Committee recommended research to establish ongoing Foundation charitable programs that address one or more areas of Outreach Programs would efficiently address community needs by providing focused solutions with measurable results. The Foundation devoted effort to research community-based actions that would address animal welfare needs

- > Research: Interviews with subject matter experts, former grant recipients, and archival research into the most pressing needs for the public health of animals and maintaining adopted animals in their homes was conducted
- > Outcome: Four needs were identified that are not being addressed at the community level 1) low cost routine veterinary care including required periodic vaccinations, 2) low cost spay and neuter services, 3) food security for low income families that have pets, and 4) animal behavior training of new and existing pet owners
- > 2019 Priority: Research and development effort to create a Foundation-based program of on-going pet vaccination clinic sponsorships

Additional grant making efforts the latter part of 2018 going into 2019:

- > Evaluation of dog and cat animal shelters and sanctuaries in New York and Pennsylvania.
- > Grant development for Outreach, Veterinary Medical Aid, and Shelter/Capital Support Program Areas for a large veterinary university.
- > Support to an equine organization for their Equine-Assisted Therapy program that provides care and housing of retired horses used for therapeutic and rehabilitative activities.
- > Support for animal shelter administrative, educational, and outreach functions for an animal behavior training program that helps rehabilitate and train hard to place dogs at their facility.
- > Support for service and companion animal training for U.S. Veterans.
