SC is not subject to state income taxes and it is licensed as a health insurance company under Chapter 1751 of the Ohio Revised code. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognized for the future tax consequences attributable to differences between the financial statemen to carrying amounts of existing assets and liabilities and the respective tax basis and ope rating loss and tax credit carryforwards. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using enacted tax rates expected to apply to taxable income in the years in which those temporary differences are expected to be recovered or settled. The effect of deferred tax assets and liabilities of a change in tax rates is recognized in income in the period that includes the enactment date. Summa recognizes interest income, interest expense, and penal ties related to uncertain tax positions with the provision for income tax.


