Part I, Line 3c - Charity Care Eligibility Criteria (FPG Is Not Used)	Financial assistance approval can apply to an assortment of patients such as those who have exhausted their Medicaid/TennCare benefits, those who qualified for Medicaid/TennCare after the date of service, deceased patients with no estate or assets, uninsured patients, and underinsured patients. While Ballard Health's qualifications for financial assistance is based on federal poverty guidelines, asset values may also be used to determine eligibility. Unique circumstances may be assessed on a case-by-case basis. Charity approval covers current or active patient balances when they are approved and there is no limitation or cap on the amount of charity that a patient may receive. Ballard Health hospitals do not stop approving financial assistance for patient accounts if a hospital's charity write-offs exceed the hospital's charity budget. All Ballard Health hospitals provide an uninsured discount; the current uninsured discount is 85%. In addition, we have a number of programs with special discounts such as lactation consultation services; oncology treatment regimens; enrollment in various community programs, and prescription drugs filled post-discharge.
Part I, Line 7 - Explanation of Costing Methodology	The cost to charge ratio (worksheet 2 "ratio of patient care cost to charges") was used to calculate line 7a financial assistance (charity care) cost. Our cost accounting system was used to determine losses from Medicaid and TennCare reported on line 7b, with the exception of Home Health and Smyth County Physicians, both divisions of SCCH. We used the cost to charge ratio for their data because these are smaller divisions not available in our cost accounting software. Line 7e community health improvement includes costs that are taken directly from departmental operating reports or expenses specific to a community health event, with no additional overhead included in the cost. Line 7f health professions education is comprised of internships (primarily nursing, pharmacy, and therapy students) with schools and universities, allowing their health profession students to get hands-on training in a hospital setting. Another source of health professions education reported on line 7f is our Medicare-approved CNA, Certified Nursing Assistant, program. The CNA program cost and reimbursement information comes from our filed Medicare cost report, adhering to IRS 990 instructions. For line 7g subsidized health care services, we use our cost accounting system because we have established, standard costing reports for these services. We are careful to ensure no double counting of cost. Although we have other service lines within our hospital that lose money, we do not report services that hospitals are required by state licensure to provide, routine services or ancillary services. We included the subsidy of two hospital owned and operated physician clinics, Glade Springs and Rural Retreat. The clinics are located in rural, medically underserved areas. Line 7h research represents SCCH's expense allocation from Ballard Health for research. Line 7i cash and in-kind contributions include cash disbursements and in-kind donations of medications to local nonprofit rescue squads and fire departments. In-kind donations of medications are based on our actual cost for these items.

Other self-pay accounts are from patients with no insurance or other third-party coverage. Under Ballad Health's system-wide self-pay policy, any patient who has no insurance and is ineligible for any government assistance program received an 85% discount. Many self-pay patients will further qualify for financial assistance (sometimes referred to as charity care) if they provide the financial information we need to deem them eligible. After the normal collection process has indicated an account is uncollectible, SCCH writes the account off to bad debt. Pursuant to the merger, SCCH has begun to score accounts using a presumptive eligibility tool. This tool utilizes various data points for a proprietary algorithm operated by an outside vendor to provide an individual's score. We have instances of patients with account balances and no health insurance coverage that we believe would qualify for financial assistance. Although patients are encouraged to apply for assistance, many will not do so. SCCH would prefer for patients to submit completed financial assistance applications given that historical data clearly indicates that most uninsured patients and many underinsured will qualify for financial assistance under our program. Without a completed application, we have no choice other than to record an unpaid account as bad debt instead of charity care.</p>

We believe Medicare losses should be allowed as a reportable community benefit, similar to governmental programs such as Medicaid. As a participating provider in the Medicare program, hospitals are required to provide the full regimen of care for the Medicare population. There are a number of care regimens that are compensated by the Medicare program at levels below cost. Therefore, it is only logical to allow hospitals to report these uncompensated services as a community benefit. By making this change, nonprofit providers will be encouraged to continue important care delivery models for our aging population in spite of the fact it may be economically injurious.

When a patient requests financial assistance or when an application has been received, the patient's account is placed in a hold status to prevent further collection activities until financial assistance eligibility is determined. All Ballard Health hospitals comply with IRS 501(r) regulatory guidelines. Our collection policy clearly states that all patients are treated equally - with dignity and respect. We ensure that outside collection agencies used by our hospital adhere to our billing and collection guidelines. Our hospitals collection program includes communicating expected financial responsibility prior to service. Our hospital provides assistance to help underinsured and uninsured patients determine sources of payment for medical bills and to help patients determine eligibility for programs such as Medicaid or TennCare. Our hospital provides a number of payment options:- a pre-service discount may be offered- a discount in excess of established discounting rates may be granted for catastrophic high dollar accounts- our hospital accepts all non-contracted and out-of-network payers and will make attempts to work with these payers regarding appropriate reimbursement and billing to their members- payment arrangements are available so long as the account is not with a collection agency Reasonable efforts are made to determine if a patient is eligible for financial assistance - see Schedule H, Part VI, line 3 for information on how patients are informed about our financial assistance policy.</p>
Part VI, Line 2 - Needs Assessment	<p>Focusing on 25 active population health index measures allows Ballard Health to further engage the efforts of its hospitals in partnership with communities in our service areas. It has helped Ballard to better identify health disparities that appear across the individual communities and has helped Ballard to prioritize issues that are most important in each hospital's community. Engaging local community organizations will expand partnerships so that organizations work together more to address community health needs. Ballard Health uses a comprehensive process to gather input for and we continued to evolve our population health plan last year. The executive steering team, aided by national experts with experience in large-scale population health improvement, help guide the evolution. Printed financial assistance educational materials are part of each registration packet and posters are displayed in highly visible areas of the hospital. In all oral correspondences with a patient, if it is identified the patient cannot meet payment requirements on their account, financial assistance is discussed as an option. Part VI, Line 4 - Community Information	<p>SCCH is located in the town of Marion, Virginia, which is in Southwest Virginia. Southwest Virginia (SWVA) is located within the Appalachian Mountains, specifically the Blue Ridge Mountain Region. SWVA is considered rural and much different than the rest of the state. SWVA has been and remains a major coal mining region and has a high rate of uninsured adults. According to U.S. Census Bureau estimates, the Town of Marion has a population of 5,706, while Smyth County's population is 30,104. The latest census bureau data estimates the median age of residents of Smyth County is 45.0 which is older than the median age of 38.5 in Virginia. 21.3% of Smyth County residents are 65 or older compared to 15.9% for the state. The population projections for Smyth County over the next five years show that the county will likely experience little to no population growth overall. However, the age 65+ population for Smyth County is projected to experience the most population change over the next five years, as it moves to 24.3% of the population in 2023. The aging population of the county presents opportunities for earlier identification and better management of health conditions that oftentimes affect elderly populations in rural areas. The bureau estimates Smyth County's median household income at \$40,932 compared to the State of Virginia's median income of \$76,465. The Town of Marion's median income is \$31,544. Over 26% of Smyth County's children live in poverty compared to 13.4% statewide. Smyth County is 75.3% rural compared with the statewide rural rate of 24.5%. This factor is a significant contributing factor in influencing health outcomes in a population. Many rural residents must travel a greater distance to access different points of the health care delivery system; however, due to geographic distance, sometimes extreme weather conditions, lack of public transportation and challenging roads, rural residents may be limited, and in some instances, even prohibited from accessing health care services. There is an additional risk of injury-related deaths in rural communities. Within our own county, injury deaths are 40% higher than the statewide rate. Recruiting physicians to rural areas is often challenging due to a myriad of factors, such as geography, economics, culture and education. Geographically, rural communities are often far removed from suburban and urban centers that provide access to education, cultural and economic opportunities. These limitations influence the relocation decision of the physician candidate and their family to locate to a rural area. A number of factors contribute to a unique and challenging environment that influence overall health standing in our county. According to the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute County Health Rankings, 30% of the adults in SCCHs home county are obese. Obesity increases the risk for many health conditions such as coronary heart disease, type 2 diabetes, hypertension, stroke, cancer, sleep apnea and respiratory problems, and osteoarthritis. Evidence indicates physical activity, independent of its effect on weight, has substantial benefits for health. Our county's inactivity rate is 37% compared to the statewide rate of 22%. Other demographic factors influencing health status in the county also include education levels. A large portion of Smyth County residents do not have an education past high school (47%), compared to 29% in the State of Virginia. Additionally, a large portion of Smyth County residents (approx. 10%) do not have health insurance. According to the 2020 County Health Rankings, Smyth County is ranked 107th out of 133 in Virginia for health outcomes and 94th in health behaviors. When compared to other Virginia counties, Smyth County has high rates of adult obesity and physical inactivity, as well as high rates of alcohol-impaired driving deaths. As for social and economic factors, Smyth County ranks 94th due to high rates of children in poverty and higher unemployment rates.</p>

Senior leaders and board members set a positive example for SCCH team members, serving voluntarily on committees and boards of local service and nonprofit organizations. Some also serve as members and consultants on professional committees and task forces that affect regional development in healthcare and education. We do not capture costs associated with team members that serve on other nonprofit boards or provide services to other nonprofits. SCCH, in collaboration with area health agencies and providers, may offer assistance with coordination, advocacy, or contribute supplies to support groups for their program activities that serve to assist special populations within our area. Most of these organizations work to improve the lives of community members that have limited, or no, financial resources.

Surplus funds are invested into improving treatment options for our patients through new technologies, recruiting physicians and trained staff in shortage areas, and improving our facilities. Various checks and balances are established to ensure that expenditures for operating expenses and capital costs are reasonable and necessary. SCCH serves as a training site for many types of health professions: nursing, pharmacy, psychology, lab, respiratory therapy, EMT, public health, etc. Students from several colleges receive training and hands-on experience in our hospital. We devote resources to health conferences for local health professionals and offer other programs focused on improving the health of our residents. While we operate in a predominantly low-income, rural area, we continue to offer services that operate at a loss because Smyth County residents would otherwise need to leave their home town or county to receive needed care. The majority of SCCH's governing body is comprised of persons who reside in the organization's primary service areas. Physicians that request privileges who are qualified and credentialed are extended privileges by SCCH.

Facility: Smyth County Community Hosp. - Part V, Section B, Line 3j	During FY20, SCCH was operating under the three-year Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) approved by its board of directors at the end of FY18. Priorities established for our CHNA were determined by the most significant health needs of the community. MSHA hospitals, including SCCH, conducted their fourth CHNA this tax reporting period with board approval and publication occurring at the end of FY18. For the FY18 CHNA, Ballard Health and its hospitals and entities agreed to focus on an index of 25 active population health index measures (plus an additional 31 measures for monitoring). The population health index itself is based on the focus areas outlined in the previous FY15 CHNA and align with national health improvement efforts, such as Healthy People 2020. To understand each community's individual needs, Ballard Health conducted a community health needs assessment (CHNA) for each Ballard hospital to profile the health of the residents within its service area. Throughout the CHNA process, high priority was given to determining the health disparities and available resources within each community. Community members from each county met with Ballard representatives to discuss current health priorities and identify potential solutions. The Smyth County CHNA community members evaluated measures that make up SCCH's population health index and a few additional measures related to access to health screenings. The Smyth County groups members completed a survey relative to what health priorities should be a focus for their specific community over the next three years. After all the details and data collection was complete and interviews with various focus groups were complete, the Smyth County representatives identified four top focus areas: -Child abuse-Obesity -Mental health-Substance abuse
Facility: Smyth County Community Hosp. - Part V, Section B, Line 5	As part of the FY18 CHNA process, Ballard Health hospitals conducted localized community focus groups with organization representatives such as those from local health departments, school systems, health clinics, emergency services, businesses, and philanthropic boards. The individuals in SCCHs community were selected for participation by the hospitals CEO. The SCCH focus group members were represented by Mount Rogers Community Services Board, Mount Rogers Health District, Emory & Henry School of Health Sciences, Smyth County Sheriffs Department, Marion Police Department, Smyth County School Board, Smyth County Circuit Court, Smyth County Department of Social Services, members of the SCCH Health Trust Board and members of the SCCH Community Hospital Board. Low income, minority and medically underserved populations were represented by Mount Rogers Health Department, Virginia Department of Health, United Way of SWVA, Faith in Action and Childrens Advocacy Center of Smyth County Schools and Smyth County Department of Social Services. Also, between our foundation board and the community board, there are a number of individuals that sit on these boards that represent low income, minority populations, and medically underserved. Activities associated with the June 2018 assessment took place from fall of 2017 through the spring of 2018. Community members from Smyth County met with Ballard Health and SCCH representatives to discuss health priorities and identify potential solutions. Community members were made aware of the 25 measures that make up Ballard Healths population health index plus 3 additional measures related to access to health screening. Participants then completed a survey to indicate their opinion on what health priorities should be a focus for their community. The assessment activity including focus groups and surveys were used to develop the hospital implementation plan that was followed in FY19 and FY20.

SCCHs primary areas of focus included: child abuse, obesity, mental health and substance abuse. Many additional community needs exist in our region. It is fiscally impossible for a hospital to address every health need in a community, which is why the CHNA process is used to identify and prioritize areas of focus. A thoughtful CHNA evaluates overall community health needs to determine which ones the hospital can best influence in a positive way. Consideration is given to other organizations in the hospitals geographic area that already offer services addressing specific health needs. In some cases, it is best to simply support an identified health need through a financial donation to another nonprofit organization skilled in certain areas: teen pregnancy, dental health, fighting homelessness, etc. SCCH also lends support to other nonprofit organizations by serving on their boards, committees, and assisting with fundraising efforts. SCCH made financial contributions to other nonprofit organizations providing community services that support the hospitals CHNA. SCCH contributed to Mount Rogers Community Services, an organization focused on fighting substance abuse, as well as other donations to the community. Free medications were provided to some low-income patients at the time of their discharge and the hospital continued its practice of providing medications and supplies to area rescue squads this year. The hospital continues to conduct activities consistent with our respective implementation plan. SCCH obtained a Health Resources and Services Administration Rural Health Opioid Program (RHOP) grant in conjunction with participating in a Community Based Consortium composed of health care providers. The purpose of RHOP is to promote rural health care services outreach by expanding the delivery of opioid related health care services to rural communities. The goal is to reduce morbidity and mortality related to opioid overdoses in rural communities through the development of broad community consortiums to prepare individuals with opioid-use disorder (OUD) to start treatment, implement care coordination practices to organize patient care activities, and support individuals in recovery through the enhancement of behavioral counseling and peer support activities.

Mountain States Health Alliance is one of only 29 organizations in the country participating in the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) new initiative, Accountable Health Communities Model (referred to as AHC Program), aimed at improving the health of eligible Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries. The Southwest Virginia Accountable Health Communities Program (AHC) is a collaboration between community groups and Ballad Health that seeks to improve the overall health of Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries by helping address patients health-related social needs. As part of the program, Medicare and Medicaid patients in Southwest Virginia are screened for health-related social needs when they visit a Ballad Health facility. Once those needs are identified, Ballad Health tries to link those patients with resources and programs within their communities to resolve those needs. Ballad Health has provided new EKG equipment for regional emergency medical services to assist in accelerating diagnosis and management of people with cardiac events who might need to be transported for emergency medical care. On March 10, 2020, Ballad Health executed its disaster plan in response to the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) global pandemic. This included the activation of its Corporate Emergency Operations Center to coordinate efforts across the system, including SCCH, to rapidly plan for, and execute, ongoing response to the issues resulting from the pandemic. In May 2020, Ballad Health partnered with Premier, Inc. on a new program to ensure our team members and patients are always protected through the availability</p>

PPE products critical for the daily operations of health systems are overw helmingly sourced overseas. The risks associated with this overreliance on overseas provid ers came into focus twice in 2020, as the supply chain was disrupted when an overseas prov ider failed to meet FDA requirements for sterile gowns, and again as the COVID-19 pandemic swept across the globe. Prestige Ameritech operates primarily in the United States, where it obtains its raw materials. Ballard Health, provides numerous services to improve the he alth of our communities. The following services are provided by Ballard Health and funded b y the various hospitals and other divisions within our health system. The funding levels b y SCCH for these services are reflected below:The Ballard Health parish nurse program is de signed to provide holistic ministry and special promotion services within the faith commun ity. The parish nurse program assists individuals in gaining optimal mental, physical and spiritual health by complementing the ministry provided by pastors and other lay ministers . Some of the services and programs provided include screenings for blood pressure, choles terol, diabetes, glaucoma and overall fitness, classes for all age groups offered on healt h related issues (nutrition, exercise, parenting, care for elderly parents, stress managem ent, CPR), hospital, nursing home and home visits for assessment of health care needs, ref errals to appropriate community resources and the creation of health tips in congregational newsletters, bulletin boards and other forms of communication. Currently, there are doze ns of churches in Northeast Tennessee and Southwest Virginia that are serviced by the Ball ad Health parish nurse program. SCCH funded \$2,121 for this program in FY20. Ballard Health s Enterprise Call Center is a toll-free line that connects community members with experien ced nurses around the clock. The nurses provide expert medical advice anytime, day or nigh t, make referrals to a new primary care provider with a location and hours convenient to t he community member and referrals to a physician specialist when they need advanced local medical care. SCCH incurred a loss of \$1,066,502 providing care to this population of patients during the year.</p> <p>Uninsured Discount: Uninsured patients receive an 85% discount. Certain elective procedures are not eligible for the uninsured discount. This uninsured discount is calculated each year in accordance with Tennessee regulations and without regard to a patients income or assets. Although the uninsured discount is not required by the Commonwealth of Virginia, Ballad Health applies the same discount to our Virginia hospitals, including SCCH. The approximate cost of this discount in FY20, using a cost to charge ratio, was \$826,951 for SCCH. SCCH partnered with the company Bolder Outreach Solutions to work with self-paying patients who have limited financial resources. Representatives were available at SCCH to determine possible governmental medical assistance (Medicaid or TennCare) eligibility, and to help with the application process and follow-up. 421 patients were approved during FY20 for coverage. Once a person is approved for Medicaid or TennCare through this program offered through SCCH, they retain coverage for future medical care. SCCH incurred expense of \$31,973 during FY20 to provide this service.</p>

We have dedicated staff to work with regional colleges and universities to coordinate the placement of healthcare professional students as part of their educational curriculum. In addition to clinical training, the health care students entering our system are required to have orientation and computer training. Included in the number of participants receiving clinical experience at SCCH were 148 nursing students from various colleges, universities and programs. This nursing clinical experience required extensive SCCH nursing staff involvement. The clinical setting and hands-on instruction cost SCCH \$216,535. SCCH provided a clinical setting for another 126 students training in health-related programs such as pharmacy, social work, OT/PT, laboratory, EMT/paramedic and other allied-health disciplines. Improving the Community's Health Status	<p>SCCH subsidizes the Glade Springs Family Medicine Rural Health Clinic and the Family Medicine Practice in Rural Retreat, Virginia. These practices are located in rural, medically underserved areas. These clinics allow residents to receive quality care without having to travel outside of their home area. This is especially important for elderly residents and others that require family or friends to provide transportation to physician appointments. Our cost during the year to subsidize the two clinics was \$109,424. The Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) issued a press release dated April 11, 2018 stating that the United States could see a shortage of up to 120,000 physicians by 2030. The U.S. population is estimated to grow by nearly 11%, with those over age 65 increasing 50% by 2030. Much of the increased demand comes from a growing, aging population. The aging population will also affect physician supply since one-third of all currently active doctors will be older than 65 in the next decade and likely to retire. The AAMC points out that data conducted in 2017 indicated that an additional 31,600 physicians would have been needed if underserved populations utilized the same health care services as insured individuals. The data looked at people in non-metropolitan areas and people without insurance compared to people living in metropolitan areas. Furthermore, the study indicated nearly half of the shortage was in the South. SCCH spent \$257,586 during FY20 to recruit and retain physicians. SCCH recruitment efforts are based on documented community need. SCCH is located in a MUA (medically underserved area), as designated by the U.S. Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA). MUA designation indicates an area as: having too few primary care providers, having a high infant mortality, a high poverty rate or a high elderly population. SCCH hosted their fourth annual Law Enforcement Health Fair providing valuable medical services to local law enforcement officers and their spouses. The hospital provided free lab work and multiple screenings including blood pressure, height and weight, body mass index, grip test, bone density, vision, hearing and vascular, as well as a one-on-one review of lab work results with a nurse practitioner. Vaccinations were also provided, including flu, shingles and tetanus. Free pulmonary function testing and chest x-rays were offered to all meth lab officers at the Smyth County Sheriffs Office. In addition, the hospital recognized a special need due to the increase in responses to drug-related calls for law enforcement. After learning that this was not something they regularly had access to, the hospital is now providing sharps containers for every police officers vehicle throughout the county. In January 2020, SCCH CEO James Tyler testified before the Virginia Senate Health Subcommittee in support of Senate Bill 864 to continue the state health departments harm reduction and syringe services program. Community stakeholders in Smyth County are taking a leadership role in addressing the national opioid crisis at the local level, thanks to a \$737,000 federal grant last year from the Rural Health Opioid Program, which is part of the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. The three-year grant will be used to form a multi-disciplinary opioid consortium, with Smyth County Community Hospital serving as the lead organization. Other organizations participating in the consortium include Mount Rogers Health District-Virginia Department of Health, Mount Rogers Community Services Board, Southwest Virginia Community Health Systems (Saltville Medical Clinic), Smyth County School District, Smyth County Sheriffs Department, Marion Police Department, local ministerial associations, the Smyth County Board of Supervisors and the newly formed Smyth County Drug Recovery Court. Smyth County Community Hospital is a member of Ballad Health, a regional health system serving Northeast Tennessee and Southwest Virginia, formed by the merger of Mountain States Health Alliance and Wellmont Health System. As part of this merger, Ballad Health made specific commitments to the State of Tennessee and the Commonwealth of Virginia to improve measures related to the provision of addiction treatment services, the number of adults who abuse prescription drugs, the number of drug deaths and the number of babies exposed to addictive substances before birth. According to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, in 2015, 2 million Americans had a substance use disorder involving prescription painkillers. In Virginia, the total number of fatal drug overdoses statewide has increased each year. According to the states department of health, the number of fatal overdoses in 2016 increased by 39 percent from the previous year. The vast majority of overdose deaths are attributed to opioids. Opioids are a class of drugs that include the illegal drug heroin, synthetic opioids-such as fentanyl-and pain relievers available legally by prescription, like oxycodone, hydrocodone, codeine, morphine and many others. Opioids can be highly addictive, and for some, lead to drug dependency, severe withdrawal symptoms and even death. The new community-based program, which is focused on reducing morbidity and mortality related to opioid use disorder, will work to :Educate the community on overcoming the stigma of opioid addictionEducate people battling addiction on available services in the community and help guide them into treatmentProvide enhanced counseling for hands-on opioid addiction treatmentProvide expanded peer support opportunitiesAnd provide care coordination to support people battling opioid addiction to help them get treatment, make</p>

Improving the Community's Health Status	<p>appointments, and remove barriers to treatment such as transportation issues, etc. In the initial stage of the plan, the group will hire a program supervisor, a substance abuse counselor and two care coordinators. The employees will work out of the hospital's emergency department. When a patient is brought in with a suspected drug problem, care coordinators will perform an assessment and identify the best resources to help them. For example, if a patient is brought in by law enforcement and is facing charges, the navigators will work as a go-between for the patient and the local drug court. SCCH offers education to the local ministers concerning opioid addiction, substance abuse, and PTSD. In addition, the hospital also works with the local school system in the development of a Trauma Informed Community. Ballard Health and SCCH have sponsored training on Trauma Informed Care. Smyth County stakeholders and Smyth County Community Hospital have been on the forefront of opioid addiction solutions for several years. The hospital has partnered with East Tennessee State University's Bill Gatton College of Pharmacy to provide updated continuing education for its doctors and pharmacists on recent advances in treatment strategies for using pain medication. In 2017, the hospital's Health Trust, a nonprofit fundraising organization, purchased three drug take-back boxes for residents to safely dispose of unused prescription medications. These permanent boxes are located inside the Saltville town Hall, Chilhowie Town Hall and Smyth County Sheriff's Department. SCCH offers a variety of health education classes throughout the year. For example, SCCH offers CPR classes for local businesses and agencies and a joint class is offered for people with hip and knee pain. SCCH plays an active role in the community by providing several direct community events. Trunk or Treat for Halloween celebration at the hospital saw approximately 650 families participate. December to Remember was another community event where members of the community could bring their children to the hospital to visit with Santa and partake in a Carol Sing. The Smyth County Community Hospital Auxiliary, in an effort to promote reading in 1st through 3rd graders, donated books for each one of the children in those grades at all six elementary schools in Smyth County. The hospital also participates in the Bear Buddy program. Hospital Team Members commit to read once a week with a student in 3rd grade to help improve their reading skills and proficiency.</p>
